Federal troops pushed the Indians back onto their reservations in Oklahoma. That paved the way for the settlement of the area, but the government was concerned about keeping

Texas Panhandle. During the Red River Indian War Lt. Col. George Buell, a Union officer in the Civil War who went, on to serve on the frontier, found what he thought would make a good camp-

site along Cantonment Creek in what is now the eastern part of Gray County, Wright said. On Feb. 3, 1875, Camp Cantonment was estab-

lished under the command of Major James Biddle, a Philadelphia aristocrat. "There were 422 offi-

cers and men of the Fifth Infantry and Sixth Cavalry

in Panhandle region sent to the panhandle,"

Wright said. Because there had been little research on Camp Cantonment, Wright and a friend, Walt West, undertook the task in 1990. With Camp Cantonment little more than a tent city, they feared it would be difficult to find much.

Finding the location turned out to be easier that anticipated.

They tracked the location to a ranch in eastern Gray County and found the site, but they spent years excavating and mapping the site.

Eventually, their crew grew to include Richard Mackie, Kelly Baker and Alvin Lynn.

Rick Dunn with the Pampa Veterans of Foreign Wars post said the parade will be at 10 a.m. on Saturday, Nov. 7.

All entries will meet on Atchison near the Cuyler Street underpass, Dunn said. They will form up at 8:30 a.m.



Tick-transmitted horse disease detected on South Texas ranch

A tick-borne disease carry the parasite, which has known as equine piroplasmosis has been confirmed on a ranch in South Texas. Additional testing is being conducted to determine the extent of infection. Horses on the ranch are quarantined to their premises, and a thorough disease investigation is underway.

Equine piroplasmosis can affect horses, donkeys, mules or zebras and cause clinical signs common to many diseases, including poor appetite and weight loss. Death losses can occur. Some infected equine animals may exhibit few or no signs of disease. Those animals that survive the acute phase of infection may continue to

been identified as Theileria equi (formerly known as Babesia equi), for long periods of time.

"Although equine piroplasmosis is not considered to be endemic in the U.S. cases have been detected on occasion," said Dr. Bob Hillman, Texas' state veterinarian and head of the Texas Animal Health Commission, the state's livestock and poultry health regulatory agency. "In June, equine piroplasmosis was detected in Missouri, with a related case found in Kansas. In 2008, the infection was detected in Florida. These cases have been closed."

"As many as 15 tick spe-

cies are capable of carrying and transmitting the blood parasite responsible for causing equine piroplasmosis," Dr. Hillman explained. "At this time, we do not

know which species of tick is responsible for transmitting infection on the South Texas ranch. Additional blood and tick samples are being collected and will be submitted for analysis to the National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL) in Ames, Iowa."

Dr. Hillman said there is no vaccine for equine piroplasmosis, and treatment generally is not effective against this tick-borne infection. To avoid spread of the disease, it is important to

eliminate contact with ticks and to prevent the transfer of blood from one equine animal to another.

"Equine owners may want to consult with their veterinarians for recommendations on preventing tick infestation," said Dr Hillman. "If equine animals exhibit signs of illness, a veterinarian should be contacted, so appropriate samples may be collected for laboratory testing. Currently, we have no indication that this tick transmitted disease has occurred at other sites ir Texas, but maintaining vigilance for this blood parasite is necessary in determining the extent of this disease



Playing baseball at the OC also taught me how to be a good teammate... how to pick up someone when they made an error, and how good it felt when I made a mistake for someone to say "hey, it's okay...you'll get "em next time.

Texline schools latest to close due to illness

AMARILLO. Texas (AP) - The tiny Texline school district in the Texas Panhandle shut down Friday because of illness, making it the latest of more than 40 districts around the state to close campuses this year because of the flu.

Most of the 100 or so schools in those districts that shut down over the past month or so have recently reopened, according to the Texas Education Agency. But the Panhandle has been hit hard recently, with some or all campuses in at least eight communities closed.

Local and state health officials said most flu cases are the H1N1 strain.

The entire Cumby, Higgins, Kerens, Sam Rayburn and Trinidad

districts remained closed Friday, affecting about 1,800 students.

Texline, on the Texas-New Mexico border in northwest corner of the state, is a community of about 500.

Texline Superintendent Gary B. Laramore said the district will reopen Wednesday.

"The best thing to do is to give everyone time to stay home," he told the Amarillo Globe-News.

According to the TEA Web site, 35 districts have completely shut down this year and another 10 have partially closed. Those figures could be low, though, because districts are not required to report their closures to the state.

Camp Cantonment was moved east to Sweetwater Creek in what is now Wheeler County some five months after it had been established. Fort Elliott. The fort was named for an Army officer, James Elliott, who was killed in the Battle of the Washita just across the state line near present day Cheyenne, Okla., in 1868, when George Armstrong Custer raided an Indian Village there.

"The importance of Camp Cantonment, and later Fort Elliott, is that it achieved what the government had set out for it to do," Wright says. "That was to let the buffalo hunters be able to hunt the buffalo in the panhandle without being disturbed by the Indians and also for settle-

In 1875, the year Camp Cantonment was established, the town of Mobeetie was established. The following year,

1876, Tascosa was founded in the western Texas Panhandle

community of The Clarendon was established in 1878, south of what was then Fort Elliott

Camp Cantonment in Gray County was the forerunner of the settlement of the panhandle.

Wright said that the troops from Fort Elliott continued to use Camp Cantonment as an overnight base when they were on patrol along the North Fork of the Red River.

"Camp Cantonment was moved," Wright says, "but it was also used until 1890, when Fort Elliott no longer existed. It was still used by the military as an overnight camping place because it provided what the military was looking for -wood and

Oil holds above \$81 as global economy recovers

NEW YORK (AP) - Oil prices surged 15 percent this month, dredging up memories of last year's spike and gas prices could soon eclipse summer highs.

Crude is being tugged higher for different reasons this time, rising primarily as the dollar gets weaker. Oil is traded in the dollar, which allows investors holding euros or other strong currencies to buy more as the dollar falls.

The dollar hit an annual low on Friday, and anyone holding a euro could trade it in for more than \$1.50.

By Friday, even the plunging value of the dollar could not push prices higher as it had throughout the week, most likely because there is little to suggest that all of that oil will be used.

Energy demand is extremely weak and the country's storage tanks are brimming with crude, said Peter Beutel, an analyst at Cameron Hanover.

There are also whispers that the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries, which supplies more than 35 percent of the world's crude, will decide to open up the spigots when it meets in December.

"At some point, the bubble has to burst," Beutel said.

The dollar had also weakened during last year's runup to \$147 per barrel, but there were other reasons for buying oil. Petroleum companies were nearing their peak production levels and traders fretted about the growing energy appetites of China and other developing countries.

This year, there is no immediate danger of an oil other countries mired in recession.

Benchmark crude for December delivery gave up 10 cents Friday to \$80.09 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. Oil was trading at less than \$70 per barrel to start the month.

In London, Brent crude for December delivery lost 60 cents to \$78.91 on the ICE Futures exchange.

Just like last summer when soaring oil prices dragged gasoline prices higher, prices at the pump have been rising steadily.

At the pump, retail gas prices added 2 cents to a

new national average of \$2.636, according to auto club AAA, Wright Express and Oil Price Information Service. A gallon or regular unleaded is 9.6 cents more expensive than last month, but it's still 18.6 cents cheaper than a year

1992 - U.S. President George H. W. Bush announces the Vietnamese government will turn over all documents, photographs and personal effects of U.S. personnel it collected in the Vietnam

1993 - Irish Republican Army bomb kills 10 people in Belfast.

1994 - A Tamil rebel suicide bomber at an election rally in Colombo, Sri Lanka, kills at least 50 people, including Gamini Dissanayake, opposition candidate for president.

1995 - After a meeting in New York, Russian President Boris Yeltsin announces accord with U.S. President Bill Clinton that Russian troops would help enforce peace in Bosnia.

1996 - A historian reveals that the Swiss bank accounts of presumed Holocaust victims were used to settle Switzerland's postwar compensation dis-

putes with Poland and Hungary. 1997 - South Africa's Nelson Mandela receives a hero's welcome in Libya, and calls for the United Nations to lift sanctions that are harming "our African brothers and sisters.'

1998 - Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat agree on a breakthrough land-for-peace West Bank accord after eight days of negotiations in the United States.

1999 - Illinois' George Ryan pays the first visit to communist Cuba by a U.S. governor since Fidel Castro's 1959 revolution, declaring he has come "to build bridges between people."

2001 - Indonesia's parliament passes a bill granting the rebellious province of Irian Jaya sweeping autonomy, a greater share of resource revenues and a new name ,Aî Papua.

2002 - British police detain Abu Qatada, a fugitive Muslim cleric who allegedly was an influential supporter of the al-Qaida terrorist network.

2004 - Suspected Islamic militants kill 16 people heading to a soccer match in a pre-dawn ambush south of Algeria's capital - the first bloodshed since the start of the Muslim holy month of Ramadan.

2005 - Hurricane Wilma punishes Mexico's Caribbean coastline for a second day, ripping away storefronts, peeling back roofs and forcing tourists and residents trapped in hotels and shelters to scramble to higher floors. At least seven people are killed.

2006 - Police in Hungary fire tear gas, rubber bullets and water cannons to disperse protesters in anti-government demonstrations coinciding with the nation's commemoration of the 50th anniversary of its uprising against Soviet rule.

2007 - NASA's space shuttle Discovery and a crew of seven rocket into orbit in pursuit of the international space station, where a formidable construction job awaits them.

2008 - A Paris court convicts nine people of charges linked to financing and associating with a terror group, including Safe Bourada, a French-Algerian who admitted forming an Islamic group that called for armed jihad in France.

"I'm looking forward to getting better in the offseason and just seeing the results (in the spring)," Ware said.



Sammi Finney won her singles match 6-0 and 6-3. Gage won her singles match 6-0 and 6-1. Acker won her match 6-2, and 6-2.


The Harvesters final match of the fall season is 9 a.m. Saturday in Dumas. Corse said her team will play their hardest and just see what happens.
