Pampa native's body ID'd after 55 years

In the spring of 1954, the Texas Panhandle was in the midst of a drought, but Pampa was growing thanks to the oil and gas industry. The front page of the daily newspaper reported hydrogen bomb tests and developments in Korea and China.

What wasn't reported was the disappearance of an 18-year-old blonde from Pampa. Even her family wasn't sure what had happened to her. Today, we know. Dorothy Gay Howard's unidentified nude and battered body had been found April 18, 1954, near a Boulder, Colo., creek. The

remains were buried there under a headstone that read simply "Jane Doe." Howard, known to her family and friends as "Dot," was born in Pampa in 1936. Her family soon moved to Wheeler where her two sisters were born. By the time Dot was six-years-old, the family move to Phoenix,

Ariz. By all accounts, Dot grew to be petite and attractive. With her parent's permission, she married when she was 15. That marriage didn't last long, and unknown to her parents, she married another man.

MASS MURDER AT FT. HOOD Army doctor kills, 13, wounds 30

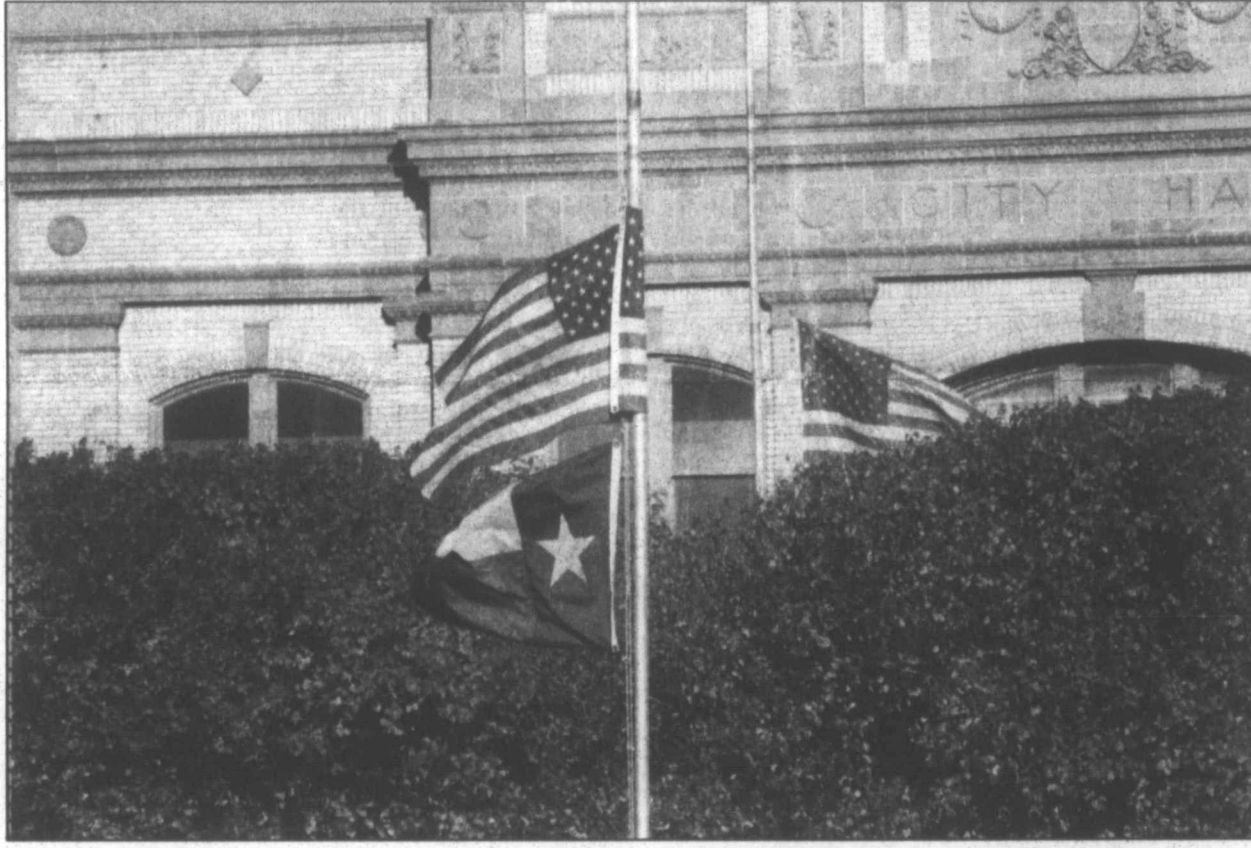
FORT HOOD, Texas (AP) — An Army psychiatrist set to be shipped overseas opened fire at the Fort Hood Army post Thursday, authorities said, a rampage that killed 13 people and left 30 wounded in the worst mass shooting ever at a military base in the United States.

The gunman, first said to have been killed, was wounded but alive in a hospital under military guard, said Lt. Gen. Bob Cone at Fort Hood. He was shot four times, and was on a ventilator and unconscious, according to military officials. "I would say his death is not imminent," Cone said.

The man was identified as Maj. Nidal Malik Hasan, a 39-year-old from Virginia. President Barack Obama called the shooting at the Soldier Readiness Center, where soldiers who are about to be deployed or who are returning undergo medical screening, "a horrific outburst of violence." "It's difficult enough when we

lose these brave Americans in battles overseas," the commander in chief said. "It is horrifying that they should come under fire at an Army base on American soil." Soldiers rushed to treat their injured colleagues by ripping their uniforms into makeshift

Army: Civilian officer shot gunman, ended rampage

FORT HOOD, Texas (AP) — The top commander at Fort Hood is crediting a civilian police officer for stopping the shooting rampage that killed 13 people at the Texas post. Lt. Gen. Bob Cone said Friday that Fort Hood police Sgt. Kimberly Munley and her partner responded within three minutes of

reported gunfire Thursday afternoon. Cone said Munley shot the gunman four times despite being shot herself. Officials said Munley was in stable condition. Cone said, "It was an amazing and an aggressive performance by this police offi-

cer." Cone also said he was inspired by a woman who helped carry a wounded victim and used her blouse as a tourniquet, then later realized she'd been shot in the hip. The suspected gunman, Maj. Nidal Malik Hasan, is hospitalized on a ventilator.

Veterans parade tomorrow

Amid the martial music, veterans from various services and military vehicles, Pampa will celebrate Veteran's Day with a parade wending from the Cuyler Street underpass to the Freedom Museum. Rick Dunn with the Pampa Veterans of Foreign Wars post said the parade will be at 10 a.m. on Saturday, Nov. 7. All entries will meet on Atchison near the Cuyler Street underpass, Dunn said. They will form up at 8:30 a.m.

"Our route is going to be down Cuyler, to Francis," Dunn said. "We'll turn left on Francis and go down to Ward. We'll turn right at Ward." They will end the parade at the Freedom Museum. Troubling portrait emerges of Fort Hood suspect

WASHINGTON (AP) — His name appears on radical Internet postings. A fellow officer says he fought his deployment to Iraq and argued with soldiers who supported U.S. wars. He required counseling as a medical student because of problems with patients.

There are many unknowns about Nidal Malik Hasan, the man authorities say is responsible for the worst mass killing on a U.S. military base. Most of all, his motive. But details of his life and mindset, emerging from official sources and personal acquaintances, are troubling.

For six years before reporting for duty at Fort Hood, Texas, in July, the 39-year-old Army major worked at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center pursuing his career in psychiatry, as an intern, a resident and, last year, a fellow in disaster and preventive psychiatry. He received his medical degree from the military's Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences in Bethesda, Md., in 2001.

While an intern at Walter Reed, Hasan had some "difficulties" that required counseling and extra supervision, said Dr. Thomas Grieger, who was the training director at the time.

Grieger said privacy laws prevented him from going into details but noted that the problems had to do with Hasan's interactions with patients. He recalled Hasan as a "mostly very quiet" person who never spoke ill of the military or his country.

"He swore an oath of loyalty to the military," Grieger said. "I didn't hear anything contrary to those

oaths."

Authorities said Friday that Hasan remains in a coma but is expected to live.

A federal law enforcement official said investigators have not been able to talk to Hasan since the deadly rampage.

The initial investigation shows that Hasan allegedly used only one gun during the attack — a 5.7-caliber semiautomatic pistol.

Army officials said Hasan also was carrying another handgun. But the law enforcement official said there's nothing so far to indicate the second weapon was fired.

Recently, federal agents grew suspicious.

At least six months ago, Hasan came to the attention of law enforcement officials because of Internet postings about suicide bombings and other threats, including posts that equated suicide bombers to soldiers who throw themselves on a grenade to save the lives of their comrades.

In an interview with The Washington Post, Hasan's aunt, Noel Hasan of Falls Church, Virginia, said he had been harassed about being a Muslim in the years after the Sept. 11, 2001, terror attacks and he wanted out of the Army.

"Some people can take it and some people cannot," she said. "He had listened to all of that and he wanted out of the military."

She said he had sought a discharge from the military for several years, and even offered to repay the cost of his medical training.

Terrorism task force agents plan to interview several of Hasan's rela-

tives Friday, according to a law enforcement official who spoke on condition of anonymity because the person was not authorized to discuss the case.

Noel Hasan said her nephew "did not make any friends" and would say "the military was his life."

bandages. Officials have not ruled out the possibility that some casualties may have been victims of "friendly fire," shot by authorities amid the mayhem and confusion at the scene, said a senior U.S. official who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss matters that were under investigation.

Hasan had transferred to Fort Hood in July from Walter Reed Medical Center, where he received a poor performance evaluation, according to an official who spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to discuss the case publicly.

Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, said generals at Fort Hood told her that Hasan was about to deploy overseas. Retired Col. Terry Lee, who said he had worked with Hasan, told Fox News he was being sent to Afghanistan.

Lee said Hasan had hoped Obama would pull troops out of Afghanistan and Iraq and got into frequent arguments with others in the military who supported the wars.

Faizul Khan, a former imam at a mosque Hasan attended in Silver Spring, Md., said he spoke often with Hasan about how Hasan wanted to find a wife. Hasan was a life-long Muslim and attended prayers regularly, often in his Army uniform, Khan said.

The shooter used two pistols, one of them semi-automatic. Neither were military-issued, Danner said.

Video from the scene showed police patrolling the area with handguns and rifles, ducking behind buildings for cover. Sirens could be heard wailing while a woman's voice on a public-address system urged people to take cover. "I was confused and just

shocked," said Spc. Jerry Richard, 27, who works at the center but was not on duty during the shooting. "Overseas you are ready for it. But here you can't even defend yourself."

Soldiers at Fort Hood don't carry weapons unless they are doing training exercises.

The Rev. Greg Schanep was about to head into a graduation ceremony when a man in uniform approached him, warning him that someone had opened fire. Schanep heard three volleys of gunfire and saw people running.

"There was a burst of shots and more bursts of shots and people running everywhere," said Schanep, who works for local Congressman John Carter.

The uniformed man who had warned him ran to the theater. Schanep said he could see the man's back was bloodied from a wound. The man survived, was treated and will be fine, Schanep said.

Cone said initially three people were held, and all have been interviewed. Authorities believe, however, that there was a single shooter. In Washington, the senior U.S. official said authorities at Fort Hood initially thought one of the slain victims was the shooter, a mistake that resulted in a delay of several hours in identifying Hasan as the suspect.

The Soldier Readiness Center holds hundreds of people and is one of the most populated parts of the base, said Steve Moore, a spokesman for III Corps at Fort Hood. Nearby there are barracks and a food center where there are fast food chains.

The wounded were dispersed among hospitals in central Texas, Cone said. Their identities, and the

identities of the dead, were not immediately released.

Amber Bahr, 19, was shot in the stomach but was in stable condition, said her mother, Lisa Pfund of Random Lake, Wis.

"We know nothing, just that she was shot in the belly," Pfund told The Associated Press. She couldn't provide more details and only spoke with emergency personnel.

Hasan, whose family said he was born in suburban Washington, is single with no children. He graduated from Virginia Tech, where he was a member of the ROTC and earned a bachelor's degree in biochemistry in 1997. He received his medical degree from the military's Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences in Bethesda, Md., in 2001 and was at Walter Reed for six years for his internship, residency and a fellowship.

"We are shocked and saddened by the terrible events at Fort Hood today," his cousin, Nadar Hasan, said in a statement issued on behalf of their family. "We send the families of the victims our most heartfelt sympathies."

The attack happened just down the road from one of the worst mass shootings in U.S. history. On Oct. 16, 1991, George Hennard smashed his pickup truck through a Luby's Cafeteria window in Killeen, Texas, and fired on the lunchtime crowd with a high-powered pistol, killing 22 people and wounding at least 20 others.

No other shooting at a military base in the U.S. has been anywhere near as deadly as Thursday's. In 1993, a gunman at Fort Knox shot five civilian co-workers, killing three, and then fatally shot himself.

Around the country, some bases stepped up security precautions, but no others were locked down.

Texas flags be lowered to half-staff until Sunday, and ask all Texans to pray for the victims, their families and the extended Fort Hood community."

The governor has been in contact with military and state law enforcement officials. To provide support at Fort Hood, Gov. Perry directed the deployment of a variety of state resources to the

area, including Texas Department of Public Safety troopers, Texas Rangers and helicopters, to assist in securing the perimeter of the base and provide other support as necessary.

The governor's flag order applies to all U.S. and Texas flags under the control of the state. Flags will be lowered to half-staff on the State Capitol

Building, flag displays in the Capitol Complex, and upon all public buildings, grounds and facilities beginning immediately until sunset on Sunday, November 8th.

Individuals, businesses, municipalities, counties and other political subdivisions are encouraged to fly the flag at half-staff for the same length of time as a sign of respect.

Howard was working as a live-in nanny in Phoenix the last time her family heard from her.

The 18-year-old was reported missing when she failed to show up to take one of her sisters to the movies.

Her family hoped Howard had gone to Hollywood for a career in the movies or as a model, which had been one of her dreams.

Howard had run away from home once before, so the family thought she just didn't want to see them again, said Marlene Howard Ashman, of Mena, Ark., Howard's youngest sister.

"We always waited to hear from her," Ashman said.

Ashman still has a letter that Howard wrote to her parents just before she disappeared.

"She just said, 'Here's some money to help out,'" Ashman said. "She signed it, 'Love always, Dot.'"

In the 1990s, a Colorado historian and newspaper columnist for The Boulder Camera, Silvia Pettem, became interested in the Jane Doe buried in the Boulder Cemetery. She eventually wrote a book, "Somebody's Daughter: In Search of Justice for Jane Doe," about the unidentified person in the cemetery.

The case was featured on the television show "America's Most Wanted."

Howard's great-niece, Michelle Marie Fowler of Phoenix, had been following Pettem's website, but concluded that Jane Doe was not her great-aunt because investors believed Jane Doe to be Katharine Farrand Dyer.

When Dyer was discovered in September this year in an assisted living center in Australia, Fowler came forward. Boulder County Sheriff's Deputy Steve Ainsworth asked Ashman

for a DNA sample.

The DNA match established the identification.

Ainsworth told the Associated Press that Howard has died of blunt-force trauma and couldn't be identified because her body was found a week after she was killed and animals had gotten to her face and fingers.

He said now that she's been identified, the next step is to figure out who her killer was.

So far, the investigation has led to Harvey Glatman, a serial killer executed in California in 1959 for the murder of three women. The press had dubbed him "The Lonely Heart Killer."

Glatman had served time in a Colorado state prison for violent assaults on women, including one about a quart of a mile from where Howard's body was found.

Because of marks on Howard's body, evidence where she was found and a passing reference Glatman made to a California police detective, Ainsworth believes Glatman hit Howard with his car as she tried to get away. The question remains, however, whether Ainsworth can prove it.

Ashman told the Associated Press that Howard was strong-willed.

"Once she decided on a course," Ashman said, "it would take heaven and earth to stop her."

Howard's surviving family decided to leave Howard in Boulder's Columbia Cemetery.

Pettem and Boulder Sheriff Joe Pelle have organized a fund drive to purchase a new headstone.

Fr. Harvesters hold off Dons fourth quarter rally

The Pampa Harvesters freshman football team jumped out to an early lead and held off a late Palo Duro rally, in a 28-26 victory over the Dons, Thursday at Harvester Field.

Coach Kaleb Snelgrooes said this victory meant the most for the freshman team.

"They had to work for four quarters," Snelgrooes said. "Hang on and win by two points. That says a lot about their character. Momentum switched and we still made plays."

The Harvesters went on defense first and forced a turnover, recovering the fumble deep in Palo Duro territory. Tyler Powell put the Harvesters on the scoreboard with a two-yard run. Pampa converted the two-point conversion to take an 8-0 lead 28 seconds into the game.

After the defenses exchanged stops for four minutes, Samuel Smith broke a 60-yard run for a touchdown expanding Pampa's lead to 14-0. Quarterback Ryan Smith

added to the Harvesters lead with a five-yard touchdown run. Following the two-point conversion the Harvesters led 22-0 after the first quarter.

Palo Duro got the only points of the second quarter when their quarterback scored on a two-yard run. The Dons cut the Harvesters lead to 22-8 which would end up the halftime score. Neither team scored in the third quarter. Pampa expanded their lead when Ryan Smith threw his second touchdown pass. The two-point conversion failed and Pampa led 28-8 with 5:33 left in the game.

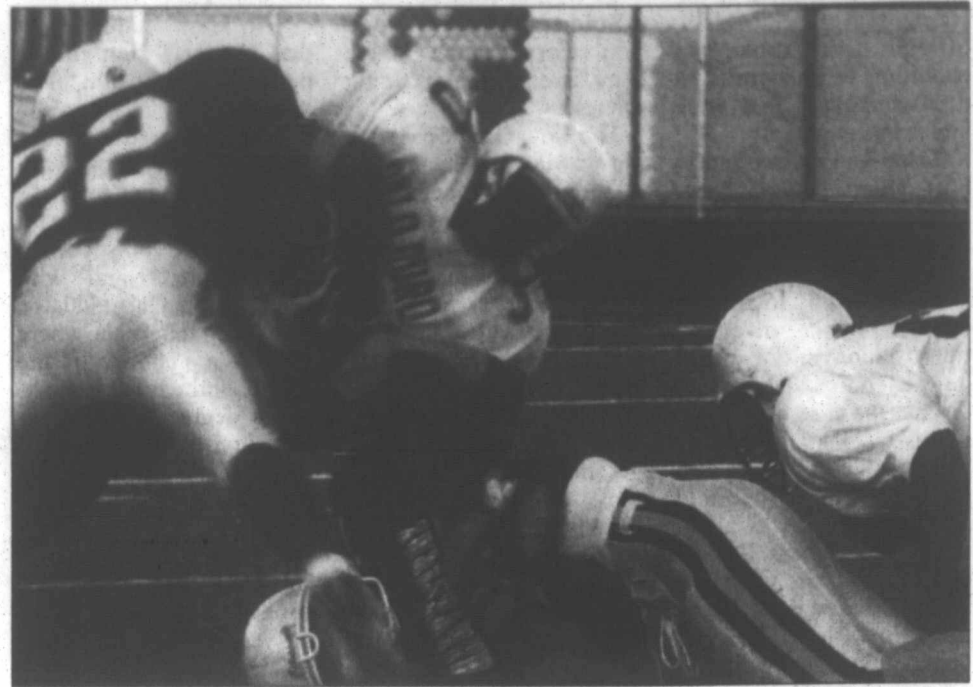
That's when Palo Duro would start their rally. The Dons scored on a touchdown pass but missed the two-point conversion cutting Pampa's lead to 28-14. The Dons attempted an onside kick and recovered. Palo Duro's quarterback completed another touchdown pass and failed to convert the two-point conversion cutting Pampa's lead to eight. The Dons attempted another onside kick but the Harvesters

recovered.

However, Pampa couldn't do anything with the ball and had to punt. On Palo Duro's next possession, the Dons quarterback completed a pass for a 62-yard touchdown. The Dons failed to convert the two-point conversion that would have tied the game. The Harvesters recovered Palo Duro's final onside kick attempt and Ryan Smith took a knee to seal the victory.

The freshmen (4-5-1) finished the season with a two-game winning streak just like they started the season. Snelgrooes was proud of how his freshman played this season and looks forward to seeing them continue to play at higher levels.

"I told this kids it doesn't matter what game you win, everyone remembers the last one especially at home," Snelgrooes said. "For us to win four games this year, this kids have had some success, they know what it takes to win. I'm just hoping it can help us towards the next couple years and help us grow."

No. 18 Oklahoma St. hopes Cyclones cure ills

AMES, Iowa (AP) — In the last few years, Iowa State was often the cure for whatever ailed the rest of the Big 12.

No. 18 Oklahoma State could sure use a pick-me-up after getting blasted by No. 2 Texas 41-14 in Stillwater last week. But the Cyclones don't appear to be quite the pushovers they once were and the Cowboys (6-2, 3-1 Big 12) know that just because they throttled Iowa State 59-17 last season doesn't necessarily mean they can do it again.

The Cyclones (5-4, 2-3),

who host Oklahoma State on Saturday, are in the thick of the muddled mess that is the Big 12 North title chase just a year after finishing 2-10.

"You really can't look past anyone. There's a lot of upsets that happen in football and you don't ever want to be that guy or that team that gets upset," Oklahoma State wide receiver Justin Blackmon said.

To avoid that, the Cowboys will need to get senior quarterback Zac Robinson on track after a terrible outing against the

Longhorns.

Robinson threw a career-high four interceptions in the loss to Texas, one more than he had all season. Robinson finished with just 143 yards passing against the Longhorns — who raced out to a 34-7 lead by taking two of Robinson's picks back for touchdowns — and he didn't complete a pass of at least 25 yards for the first time this season.

Robinson is still the Big 12's highest-rated passer and is just 74 yards shy of passing his coach, Mike Gundy, for the most in Cowboys history.
