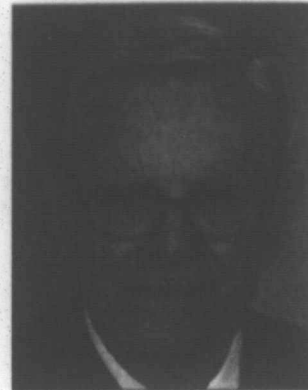
Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery under the direction of Carmichael-Whitley Funeral Directors.

Convicted sex offender still loose

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Rewards totaling \$30,000 are offered for information leading to Texas prison escapee Arcade Joseph Comeaux Jr.

Department of Corrections spokeswoman Michelle Lyons said Thursday that the convicted sex offender was still on the run.

Comeaux was in a wheelchair Monday when he pulled a gun on two guards during a transfer from a unit in Huntsville to one in Beaumont. Both guards were released after being forced to drive to the Baytown area, where Comeaux ran away.

Comeaux was serving life in prison for aggravated sexual assault out of Brazos County.

The U.S. Marshal's Service is offering a \$25,000 reward for information leading to the capture of Comeaux. Crime Stoppers will pay up to an additional \$5,000 for tips leading to his arrest.

2 hurt in fall from roof area at Cowboys Stadium

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Two maintenance workers who were not wearing safety harnesses slipped and fell from the roof area of towering Cowboys Stadium on Thursday morning, and at least one suffered serious injuries, authorities said.

The two were working on the top hatch of the retractable-roof venue around 7:20 a.m. when they slipped, Assistant Fire Chief Don Crowson said. They were not using "fall protection," he said.

The workers fell from an upper roof to a lower section, police spokeswoman Tiara Ellis Richard said.

Live TV coverage showed fire department crews on the roof of the nearly \$1.2 billion stadium, where the Dallas Cowboys began playing this season.

Crews used baskets, lines and ladders to lower the workers in a rescue that took about 90 minutes.

Both workers were transported to hospitals. Crowson said one man was severely injured but he had no details.

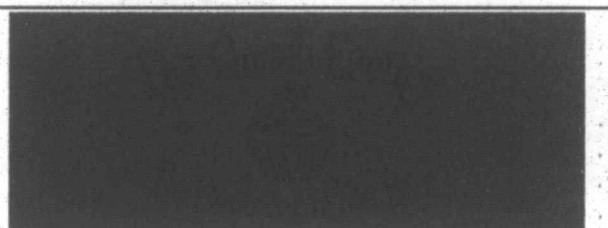

Protests prompt Salvation Army policy change

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Salvation Army says it will no longer ask for a parent's social security number before giving Christmas toys to children at some local branches.

Juan Alanis, a spokesman for the Salvation Army's Houston branch, says the charity changed its policy Wednesday following a protest by Hispanic immigrants in Los Angeles.

Alanis says the Christian organization never wanted to give the appearance of discrimination based on legal status and decided to not require a social security number to register for its Angel Tree program.

About two dozen parents and children protest-

ed outside a Los Angeles Salvation Army store with signs that read, "A gift from the heart, doesn't ask for documents."

Fort Hood units may be part of deployment

HOUSTON (AP) — A Pentagon spokesman says hurry-up deployments to Afghanistan by Army combat units at Fort Hood and other stateside posts are likely early next year.

That's in the wake of President Barack Obama's disclosure Tuesday night of plans for a 30,000-troop surge to Afghanistan. Marine Maj. Shawn

Turner is a spokesman for Secretary of Defense Robert Gates. He said Fort Hood-based units and others at U.S. Army and Marine corps bases will be designated publicly as soon as Friday to join the surge.

Today is Thursday, Dec. 3, the 337th day of 2009. There are 28 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Dec. 3, 1984, thousands of people died after a cloud of methyl isocyanate gas escaped from a pesticide plant operated by a Union Carbide subsidiary in Bhopal, India.

On this date:

In 1818, Illinois was admitted as the 21st state.

In 1828, Andrew Jackson was elected president of the United States by the Electoral College.

In 1833, Oberlin College in Ohio — the first truly coeducational school of higher learning in the United States — began holding classes.

In 1925, Concerto in F by George Gershwin had its world premiere at New York's Carnegie Hall, with Gershwin himself at the piano.

In 1947, the Tennessee Williams play "A Streetcar Named Desire" opened on Broadway.

In 1953, the musical "Kismet" opened on Broadway.

In 1960, the musical "Camelot" opened on Broadway.

In 1967, surgeons in Cape Town, South Africa led by Dr. Christiaan Barnard performed the first human heart transplant on Louis Washkansky, who lived 18 days with the new heart. The 20th Century Limited, the famed luxury train, completed its final run from New York to Chicago.

In 1979, 11 people were killed in a crush of fans at Cincinnati's Riverfront Stadium, where The Who were performing.

In 1992, the Greek tanker Aegean Sea spilled 21.5 million gallons of crude oil when it ran aground off northwestern Spain.

Ten years ago:

World Trade Organization talks collapsed in Seattle. Six firefighters died while battling a fire in an abandoned Worcester, Mass., industrial building. Scientists failed to make contact with the Mars Polar Lander after it began its fiery descent toward the Red Planet; the spacecraft is presumed destroyed. Tori Murden of the United States became the first woman to row across the Atlantic Ocean alone as she arrived at the French Caribbean island of Guadeloupe, 81 days after leaving the Canary Islands near the coast of Africa. Billionaire banker Edmond Safra suffocated in a smoke-filled bathroom in his Monaco apartment; American nurse Ted Maher confessed to setting the fire that killed the 67-year-old Safra. Oscar-nominated actress Madeline Kahn died at age 57.

Five years ago:

It was announced that Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld was staying on the job. Health and Human Services Secretary Tommy Thompson resigned, warning as he left of a possible terror attack on the nation's food supply. The Ukraine Supreme Court ordered a rerun of the head-to-head presidential contest, setting off rejoicing by supporters of Western-leaning Viktor Yushchenko, who ended up the winner.

One year ago:

President-elect Barack Obama selected New Mexico Gov. Bill Richardson as his commerce secretary. (Richardson withdrew a month later when it appeared his confirmation hearings would be complicated by a grand jury investigation over how state contracts were issued to political donors; Gary Locke replaced him at commerce.) Theological conservatives upset by liberal views of U.S. Episcopalians and Canadian Anglicans formed a rival North American province.

Will state raise gas tax?

Fort Worth Star-Telegram on Texas possibly increasing gasoline taxes:

The drumbeat for a gasoline tax increase during the 2011 legislative session is hard to hear unless you pay close attention, but it's slowly building and will be louder in the coming year.

The idea is to push the state motor fuels tax up by 10 cents per gallon. The current level of 20 cents per gallon has not been changed since 1991. Texans also pay 18.4 cents per gallon in federal fuel tax, a rate set in 1993.

There's also talk of indexing the state tax to inflation, meaning that it would go up each year in tandem with a selected measure of the overall cost of living. State estimates show that inflation has

eroded about a third of the buying power of the motor fuels tax over the years, a slide that indexing is aimed to halt.

The current state tax is projected to bring in \$6.3 billion during the next two years. Under the Texas Constitution, one-fourth of that is reserved for education.

The Legislature diverts some motor fuels tax revenue and other State Highway Fund revenue (motor lubricants tax, vehicle title and registration fees) to state agencies for purposes other than building, designing or maintaining roads. In the current two-year budget, diversions from the fund amount to almost \$1.6 billion.

Dallas-Fort Worth leaders have pushed hard during the past three legis-

lative sessions for more money to be devoted to transportation. The result: abject failure.

There is always opposition in Austin to any kind of tax increase.

Still, there's general agreement that traffic congestion in many parts of Texas is bad and getting worse. The chairmen of the Legislature's key transportation committees, Sen. John Carona of Dallas and Rep. Joe Pickett of El Paso, have said they will hold joint hearings on the issue in Austin next summer.

There's no use going back to the Legislature in 2011 with the same old approaches. Transportation advocates need more allies, and that means addressing some of the concerns that have blocked previous efforts.

Here are some issues that one group of those opponents, Texans for Fiscal Responsibility, wants to see on the table:

End diversions from the Highway Fund. "Put every state gas-tax dollar into road construction and maintenance," says TFR.

Devote money first "to the most congested areas,

providing relief that is real, measurable and substantive." Specifically to be excluded, TFR says, are "boondoggles like 'light rail'."

Require transparency for all local, regional and state transportation agencies that spend tax dollars. That means posting all revenues and expenditures online for all to see.

Require accountability for those same agencies, allowing state officials to audit their books. Forbid tax expenditures on lobbying.

Those aren't easy steps. Most of the gas-tax diversions, \$1.2 billion, go to support the Department of Public Safety. The need for DPS won't go away; money for it must come from somewhere.

By 2012, the state Transportation Department is expected to have no money -- other than what it can borrow -- to build new roads. It will struggle to find enough revenue to maintain existing roads.

Increasing the gasoline tax may be the way to go, but to avoid another failure, advocates must learn from their opponents.

These families and thousands of other similar ones from all over the world filled this country with good hardworking and decent people for the most part. Now and then a few would disappoint their family and be an undesirable.

This stream of immigrants has continued to this day. Most of them contribute greatly to our society, our culture, our morals, our economy. I've heard it said that an American Indian and a Danish immigrant make pretty babies. The same can be said of any combination of immigrant descendants. All this has created and will continue to add to this nation a pool of perpetually improving descendants.

Somehow a part of our population has turned the word immigrant into a bad word when all the evidence shows that the more we participate in the immigration process the better our nation of people will become. It's a little like choosing the best ingredients and the best recipe for a cake and putting it together to make a better cake. So being a proud descendant of some immigrants who left their home country to seek a better future for themselves and their children and a Choctaw Indian named Mary Short, I'd like to thank all the Immigrants and American Indians for making the country I love a better place for all of us.

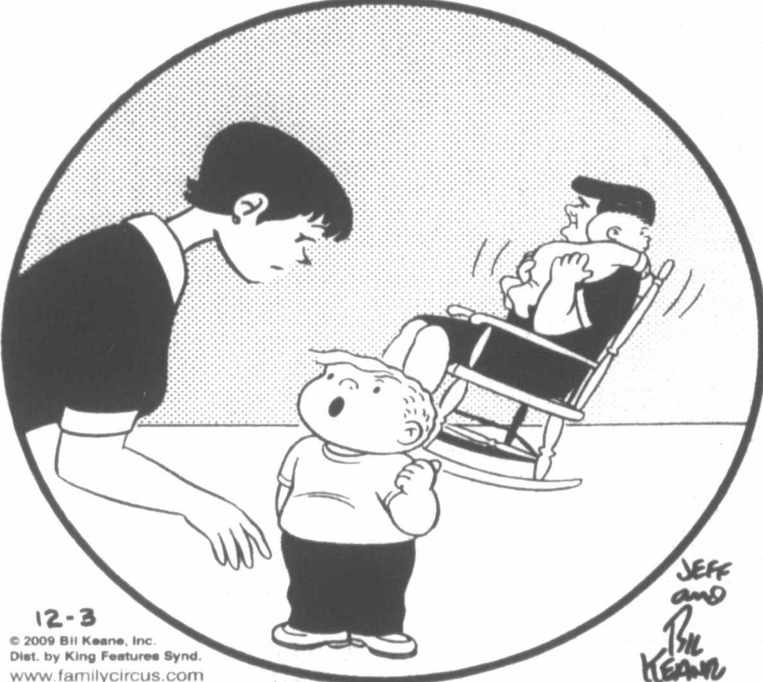

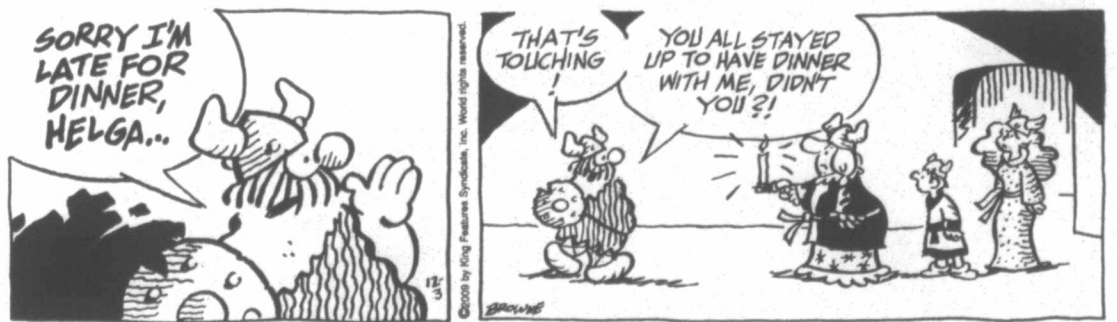
