Cold and slick is how city officials were describing Pampa streets today. A number of accidents were reported in Pampa today. One weather-related wreck at Kentucky and Hobart snarled morning traffic for a while. Law enforcement officials reported multiple wrecks across the panhandle today, but they said none appeared to be life-

threatening. Pampa's street department was busy sanding city streets today, according to city officials. The Gray County Sheriff's Office reported icy roads around the county. A representative of the sheriff's office said they had reports of wrecks north, east and south of Pampa. Deputies reported slick roads and trees frozen over with ice around the county.

Wrecks were reported on Texas Highway 152 east of Pampa, on Interstate 40 and Texas Highway 70 north of the Red School House. The Wheeler County Sheriff's Office reported conditions there as icy and slick. They were advising people to stay home. They reported numerous accidents on Interstate 40. PGCD may change reporting rules

The Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District may change its rules this month concerning reporting. On Dec. 16, the district's board of directors will take up the issues at their offices in White Deer. They are proposing a requirement that oil and gas operators install meters and report production annually. They are also proposing to amend their rules to allow the board to require meters and reporting of contiguous acreage in the second year and subsequent years after a Study Area has been designated. An area can be designated a Study Area is the water table drops in a given period of time. No action is taken at that time other than to monitor the area. If water table continues to drop, it may be designated a Conservation Area and pumping may be reduced or stopped. The district also proposes to inform interested

parties of board decisions regarding Study and Conservation Areas in subsequent years by regular mail rather than certified mail. "This would only apply to Study or Conservation Areas maintaining their current status, not creating new areas," according to the C.E. Williams, general manager of the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District. The board will also discuss amending the method of metering and delete the Sunset Provision from the existing rules. The district is taking public comments on the proposed amendments to their rules. Comments can be sent to the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District, 201 West Third, Post Office Box 637, White Deer, TX 79097. Written and oral comments on the proposed rules must be submitted to the district on or prior to the hearing at 1:30 p.m., Dec. 16. "When I saw the course," he admitted, "I was a little disappointed."

Now, Dewey is leading a move to expand or replace the Disc Golf Course from a 9-hole course to a full 18 holes.

There are more than 2700 Disc Golf courses in the U.S. and Canada. More than 150 of them are within 300 miles of Pampa, Dewey said.

Because the game is inexpensive and easy to play, Dewey said he sees a popular future for it.

After playing Disc Golf at Red River, Dewey played in the three courses in Oklahoma City.

"From their courses to our course is just a completely different thing," he said.

While Dewey and his friends still play on the Pampa Disc Golf Course, it criss-crosses itself and is difficult to play.

"It's outdated," he admitted.

The sport is growing exponentially, he said, and Pampa needs a larger Disc Golf Course.

"The holes that we have here are what they call Tone Poles," he said.

The Tone Pole has chains around a cylinder hanging on a pole.

"The chains hit the cylinder and it makes a tone," Dewey said.

What Dewey wants to do is have a basket around the pole so when the disc hits the basket, it falls in the basket.

"The hole is completed by either the disc resting in the basket or resting in the chains," he said.

The scoring is just like regular golf, he said.

"In the past five to ten years," he said, "it's just exploded."

Dewey said it's a great sport for anybody to play, and he figured he'd do something about getting a new course.

"I went ahead and got a proposal together and went to the economic development corporation," he said, "and talked to Kathy Cota and Clay Rice there."

Rice and Cota helped him put together a proposal and are helping to get backers for the project.

He is proposing an 18-hole Disc Golf Course in Highland and the west end of Central Park.

"We're working on the funding right now," Dewey said.

Cota estimated that it would take \$9,000, and Dewey said he's a little over a quarter of the way there. Different people and groups are sponsoring individual holes on the course.

"We're getting some good support from places like Clifton Supply and Hudson Tire," he said. "A Cut Above has donated some money."

The Pampa Chamber of Commerce Tourism Committee has chipped in as has Lee Cornelison and his wife.

"It's gotten really, really good support," Dewey said. "It's grown way more than what I ever expected. I'm just so excited."

As fast as the support in rolling in, Dewey said he hopes to have the course completed by April or May.

County Judge Vernon Cook said today.

Like other county officials in the area, Cook said the roads around the eastern panhandle were icy.

"It's treacherous," Cook said.

The National Weather Service was calling for a wintry mix of weather in Pampa today with a 60 percent chance of precipitation.

The forecast low over night in Pampa was 13. The high is expected to reach 48 degrees.

Weather forecasters reported 29 degrees shortly before noon today with a chill factor lowering that to 11 degree in Pampa.

They were reporting freezing drizzle, but expected it to turn to rain this afternoon. A predicted low of 12 degrees tonight could make streets

and roads even worse Wednesday morning.

Visibility in Gray County was two miles with a nine-mile an hour wind out of the South-Southeast.

The Texas Department of Public Safety was reporting at dawn that all roads in the panhandle were open, but they cautioned the roads today were slick from freezing drizzle and light freezing rain.

The National Weather Service issued a winter weather advisory for the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles until noon today.

Wednesday should be sunny but cold. The high Wednesday is forecast be 32 degrees.

It will be slightly warmer Thursday with a low of 21 and a high of 37 degrees.

It's forecast to be cloudy Friday morning, but sunny

about apparently inebriated students getting off a school bus and carrying cups that allegedly contained booze.



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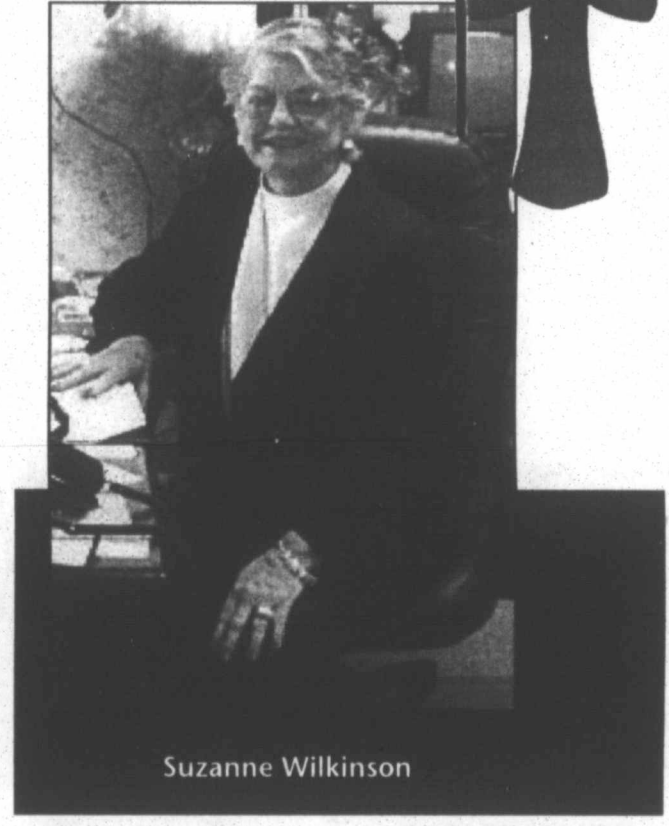
