Enhanced security for school buildings in effect after holidays

The Pampa High School Marching Band will get new uniforms next year.

The board of trustees for the Pampa Independent School District voted to spend \$61,699.50 on the 150 uniforms from DeMoulin Bros and Company of Greenville,

Ill., who is expected to deliver the new uniforms in time for the Fall semes-

ter next year. Superintendent Barry Haenisch told the board that the money will come

out of next year's budget. The uniform includes Harvester green coats, broad brimmed hats with black plumes and gaunt-

lets. Band members will wear black trousers and black shoes with the uniform. The students selected the style.

The last time the band got new uniforms was in 1999. Band officials said uniforms last about 10 years and the old uniforms are showing quite a bit of

The school board also approved a \$51,283 bid for wi-fi internet computer access. The wi-fi net-

work with 50 access points should extend access throughout the campus.

The board also approved a \$1,250 installation fee.

"We need it," said PISD President Darrell DeLoach. "No doubt."

Among the other items on the school board's agenda Thursday evening was a report on the checkin security system at each

of the district's schools. Earlier this fall, pilot security programs were

put in place at Lamar and Austin Elementary Schools. In January, the system will be extended to every campus.

The security system, Haenisch said, is a safeguard for the students' protection.

He said visitors to schools will need to have their driver's license or state ID card to access the school during the school day, but not for evening

Texas jobless rate drops for first time in 16 months

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The state unemployment rate dropped to 8 percent in November, the first decrease in Texas in 16 months.

Texas Workforce Commission said Friday the jobless rate fell from 8.3 percent in October.

The last monthly decrease came in June 2008, when the rate fell to 4.4 percent from 4.5 percent the

previous month. Texas added 17,300 nonagricul-

tural jobs in November for a total of 70,000 jobs over two months. The state's jobless rate is still tracking well below the national

average of 10 percent. Workforce commission chairman Tom Pauken says job growth and a dip in the unemployment rate are positive signs for the Texas economy.

This Saturday starts one of the most storied sports Christmas time traditions: the college football bowl season. This year's bowl season kicks off with the New Mexico Bowl between the Fresno State Bulldogs and the Wyoming Cowboys at 3:30 p.m.

So, I decided to share my predictions for this year's bowl season or spoil the season finale for 34 teams just kidding. I'm not predicting these games the same way I predicted the Pampa vs. Perryton football game. I used a foolproof simulation website and simulated each game 100 times. I will do this in two parts. My second part will be published December 28.

The best case scenario for Oregon State is they put the loss to Oregon behind them and easily dismantle the Cougars 39-15.

Best case scenario for BYU is they look like the team that beat Oklahoma and bury the Beavers 30-11. I think Oregon State's tough Pac-10 schedule will lead them to a 27-24 victory. The Poinsettia Bowl on

Wednesday also features a Pac-10 vs. Mountain West matchup with the California Golden Bears (8-4) representing the Pac-10 and the No. 23 Utah Utes (9-3) representing the Mountain West.

Best case scenario for Utah is they play a California team that got blown out by Oregon and USC and win 35-17.

The Best case scenario for the Golden Bears is they easily beat Utah who lost all three of their toughest games 25-3. This game won't be a blow out and Cal pulls out a one-point victory 23-22 The Hawaii Bowl which

Wolfpack (8-4) and the Southern Methodist (SMU) Mustangs

SMU is back in a bowl game for the first time since 1984. The Wolfpack have been to bowl games before and was one of the few teams that played close with undefeated Boise

With that said Nevada beats an inexperienced SMU 59-18.

Best case scenario for SMU is they play fired up being in their first bowl game and with a state champion quarterback Bo Levi Mitchell who went to Katy, hunt down the Wolfpack 44-41.

My actually prediction is Nevada will make plays when it counts and will win 41-22

December 26 will have three bowl games starting with the Little Caesars Bowl at 1 p.m. between the Ohio Bobcats (9-4) and the Marshall Thundering Herd

Best case scenario for Ohio is they play like a 9-4 team and crush Marshall 29-3.

Best case scenario for Marshall is they play inspired football like they did in the movie We are Marshall, and beat a team from the Mediocre Athletic Conference, oh I mean the Mid-American Conference 29-17.

But in all actuality Ohio is the better team and pulls out a close one 24-17.

The Trojans aren't in a BCS bowl for the first time since 2001. The USC team that lost to Oregon, and Stanford will come to play leading to a 23-12 win for the Eagles.

Best case scenario for the Trojans is they look like the USC we've seen between 2002-2008 and shoot down the Eagles 46-17.

But Carson Palmer, Matt Leinart and Mark Sanchez aren't playing quarterback for the Trojans and they don't have Reggie Bush in the backfield. However, USC wins a close one 24-17.

On December 27 is the Music City bowl between the Kentucky Wildcats (7-5) and the Clemson Tigers (8-5).

To close out part one the Georgia Bulldogs (7-5) and the Texas A&M Aggies (6-6) play in the Bowl Independence December 28.

Best case scenario for the Aggies is they play like they unfortunately did when they played my school Texas Tech and end the season with a 35-25 win.

Best case scenario for Georgia is A&M plays like the team that lost to Kansas State (62-14) and Oklahoma (65-10) and the Bulldogs run loose in a 52-21 victory.
