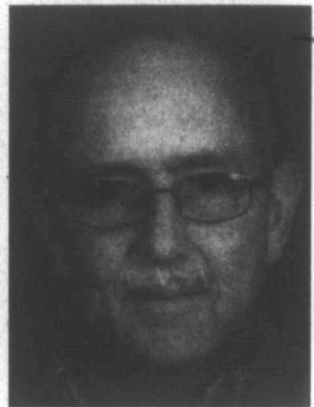

Farmers to trim Texas homeowners rate hike

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Some homeowners will be paying a lower-than-initially-sought rate hike by Texas Farmers Insurance Co.

The company on Monday agreed to trim its statewide rate hike request of nearly 10 percent.

The Texas Department of

Insurance says the increase will now be about 4.5 percent for its 300,000 homeowner customers.

The original rate request was filed in June 2009. Current rates will stay in effect until at least March 16. Homeowners already paying the higher rate will not get a refund.

Insurance Commissioner Mike Geeslin described the original rate increase request as "excessive and unfairly discriminatory."

Farmers spokesman Jerry Davies says the agreement shows that the company is committed to the Texas marketplace.

School board rejects child's longhair appeal

MESQUITE, Texas (AP) — A Dallas-area school board stood firm Monday night behind its ban on a 4-year-old boy's long, flowing hair.

Officials with the Mesquite school district have had pre-kindergarten Taylor Pugh under in-school suspension at Floyd Elementary School in Balch Springs since November because of his long hair.

His parents appealed the suspension, saying the child likes his hair long. After an hourlong closed-door meeting Monday night, the Mesquite school board decided to lift the suspension if Taylor reported to school with his hair

braided and kept no lower than his ears, said board spokesman Ian Halperin.

Taylor's mother, Elizabeth Taylor, said that was not good enough.

Taylor said she will take her son to school in a ponytail Tuesday morning, even though she acknowledges that means her son will remain under in-school suspension for violating the district grooming policy. That means he will remain alone in the school library with a teacher's aide, as he has since late November.

Taylor said her fight is not over. She and her husband are considering taking the district to court over the issue or appealing to the State Board of

Education in Mesquite. "I know that there are a whole set of steps we can take," she said.

What step will come next may take a while to decide, though. "I work 80 hours a week, and so does my husband, so it may take time," she said.

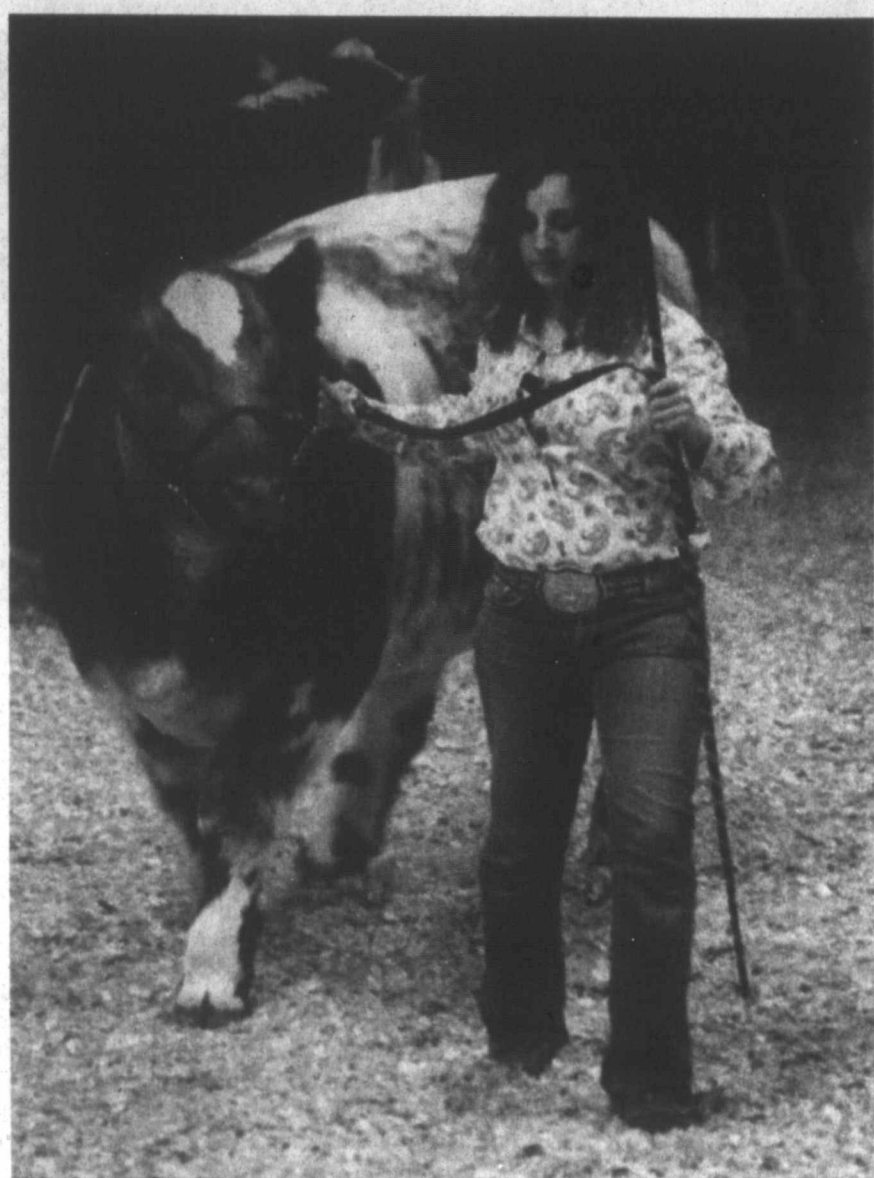

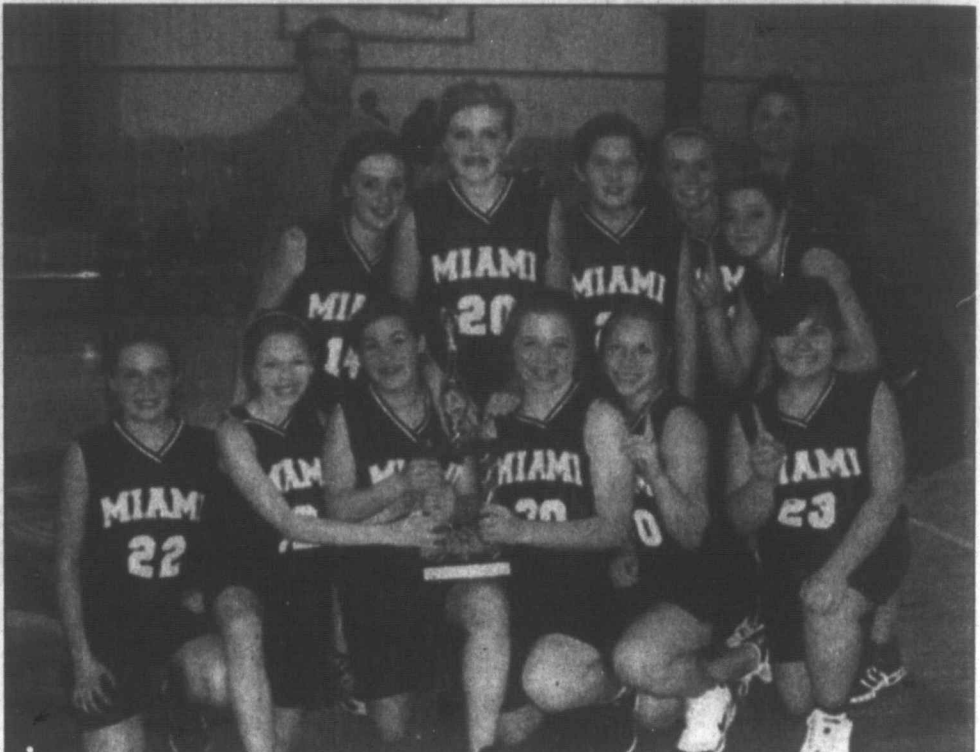
Miami Junior High girls win McLean tournament

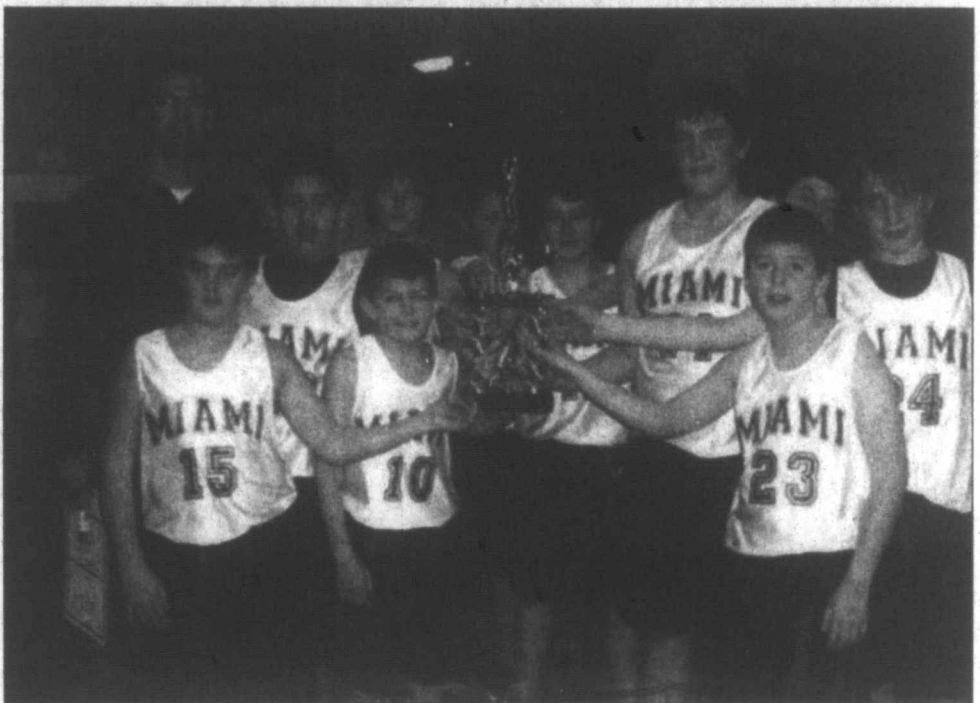

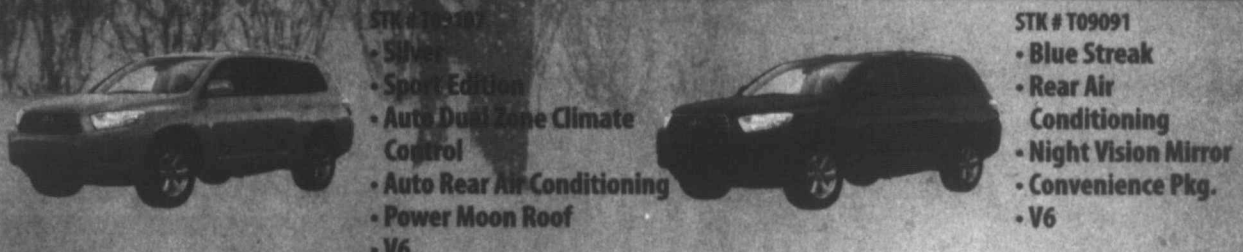

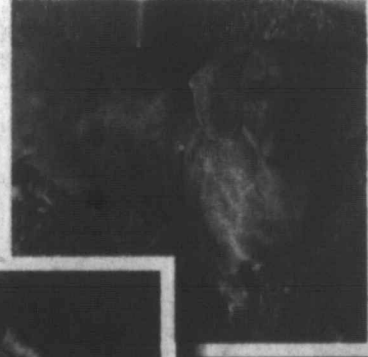
