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Gray County grand jury indicts 12

A Gray County Grand Jury handed up the following indictments to the judge of the 31st Judicial District on Jan. 7.

Gabriel Cahvez, 44, was indicted on one charge of possession of methamphetamine, in the amount of less than one gram, a third degree felony. The charge was enhanced by a 2001 conviction in Hutchinson County for the state jail felony of delivery of a controlled substance, and further by a conviction in 2007 in Randall county of possession of a controlled substance. Bond was set at \$15,000.

Daniel Jay Whitley, 39, was indicted for possession of methamphetamine in the amount of more than one gram, but less than four grams, a third degree felony. Bond was set at \$10,000.

Desiray Gabrielle Vance, 19, was indicted on one count of possession of methamphetamine in an amount greater than four grams but less than 200 grams, a second degree felony. Bond was set at \$15,000.

Michael Anthony Repucci, Jr., 27, was charged with one count of possession of a controlled substance that contained a quantity of methylenedioxymethamphetamine, in the amount of more than one but less than four grams, a third degree felony. Bond was set at \$7,500.

James David Patton, 27, was indicted on one count of possession of methamphetamine in an amount less than one gram, a state jail felony. Bond was set at \$7,500.

Marissa Ramirez, 30, was indicted on one count of possession of cocaine in an amount of less than one gram, a state jail felony. Bond was set at \$2,500.

James Robert Ostercamp, 30, was indicted on one count of possession of cocaine in the amount of less than one gram, a state jail felony. The charge was enhanced.

Texas GOP gov. candidates clash over taxes, jobs, abortion

DENTON, Texas (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry and Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison sparred over taxes, spending and the economy in their first Republican governor's race debate, but their differences on abortion also took a spotlight.

Abortion is a leading issue for voters who tend to participate in Texas Republican primaries. The primary is March 2.

"My record is one that always comes down on the side of life," Hutchison said Thursday night during the televised verbal bout at the University of North Texas. She said she voted against late-term abortions and federal funding for abortions.

Perry, seeking an unprecedented third four-year term, chided Hutchison for voting in favor of a nonbinding resolution supporting Roe v. Wade and noted she was once praised by an abortion rights group.

"The consistency issue is one

I'm having trouble with, senator," he said.

Republican candidate Debra Medina also participated in the debate and appeared to be the only one of the trio familiar with the state's so-called futile care law, another issue important to anti-abortion groups.

The law gives families of some terminally ill patients 10 days notice before life support is cut off unless a court intervenes or the patient is moved. Texas Right to Life, disabled activists and others say they don't want medical officials making those decisions.

Medina, a registered nurse, said she sees its real-life effects and pressed Perry on why he hadn't repealed it. Neither he nor Hutchison seemed familiar with the law.

Throughout the debate, Hutchison and Perry accused

NEW YORK (AP) — Johnson & Johnson is again expanding a recall of Tylenol caplets due to a moldy smell that made some users sick. The company says the problem also affects some lots of its fever and pain drug Motrin.

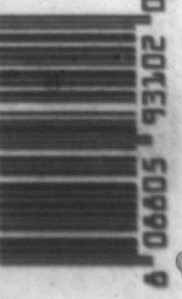
The company's McNeil Consumer Healthcare Products business said the voluntarily recall applies to some batches of Tylenol caplets, gels, arthritis treatments, rapid release, and extended relief Tylenol, as well as Motrin IB, chewable extra strength Roloids, Benadryl allergy tablets, and St. Joseph aspirin.

The recall applies to products sold in the Americas, the United Arab Emirates, and Fiji. Johnson & Johnson initially recalled some Tylenol Arthritis Caplets in November and December.

Dallas police office fired over nude photos

DALLAS (AP) — A 30-year-old Dallas police officer has been fired in an internal investigation that revealed he sent nude photos of himself to a high school student.

Police Chief David Kunkle on Thursday fired four-year Officer Bryan Crews.

The Dallas Morning News report the investigation also found that Crews kept several people's identification cards and failed

to give copies of tickets to some violators. Those violators were later sought for arrest because they did not pay the tickets.

Crews attorney Haakon Donnelly says his client will appeal. Donnelly also

says the department should be "ashamed of its actions and methods of investigation into this officer's personal private life."

Donnelly says he believes the complaint was initiated by the officer's

wife during divorce proceedings.

Kunkle declined further comment.

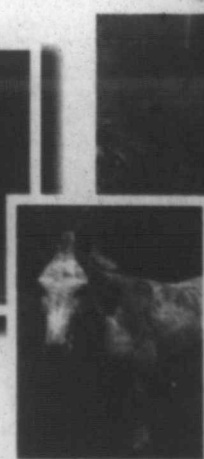

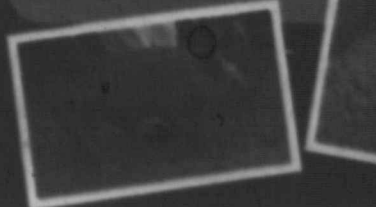

Texas board to vote on social studies standards

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — New standards for teaching social studies and other lessons in Texas that could affect students nationwide were scheduled for a vote Friday.

Texas Board of Education members spent more than five hours Thursday wading through dozens of amendments to the state's required curriculum. The debate was contentious at times as the guidelines will dictate what about 4.8 million students from kindergarten through 12th grade must learn in social studies, history and economics over the next decade.

They also will influence textbook publishers who develop material for the nation based on Texas, one of the largest markets. The board is set to adopt final standards in March.

Debating the required curriculum grade by grade Thursday, the board discussed everything from including Vaisakhi, the Sikh new year, alongside Christmas to the merits of teaching Aesop's Fables and whether first graders are old enough to learn about holding public officials accountable.

In vote after vote, the board added more names

to the list of historic figures elementary school students would be expected to learn.

"We're choking our kids with a list of names," board member Pat Hardy, a Republican from Fort Worth, said as astronauts James A. Lovell, Ellen Ochoa and Girl Scouts founder Juliette Gordon Low were added to the third-grade list.

Jose Antonio Navarro, a Texas revolutionary and contemporary of early Texas leader Stephen F. Austin, was added to the kindergarten curriculum in response to a public push for more examples of notable Mexican Americans.

Other discussion centered on whether first-graders are old enough to learn about the accountability of public officials.

"It ought to be in every single grade, so maybe by the time they get out of high school they understand that we need to hold our elected officials accountable," said board member Geraldine Miller, R-Dallas. "Maybe that's the problem, that we've got to start early."

"I would like to know how in the world a first grader can hold public officials accountable?" countered board member Mavis

Knight, D-Dallas. "I don't think it's appropriate for this grade level."

The amendment passed, and the topic could soon become required for first-grade classrooms.

The board also debated the merits of having second-graders read Aesop's Fables, which will be included in the curriculum. After an initial recommendation and ensuing outcry, the board chose not to remove Christmas from a list of religious holidays and observances in a sixth-grade world cultures class.

Another flashpoint was expected over how much emphasis should be given to the religious beliefs of the nation's founding fathers. Some activists want to highlight their Christianity, but others insist curriculum must emphasize the constitutional separation of church and state.

Struggle to get aid to Haitians as looters roam

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — Hundreds of U.S. troops touched down in shattered Port-au-Prince overnight as U.N. and other aid organizations struggled Friday to get food and water to stricken millions. Fears spread of unrest among the Haitian people in their fourth day of desperation.

Looters roamed downtown streets, small bands of young men and boys with machetes.

"They are scavenging everything. What can you do?" said Michel Legros, 53, as he waited for help to search for seven relatives buried in his collapsed house. A Russian search-and-rescue team said the looting and general insecurity were forcing them to suspend their efforts after nightfall.

"The situation in the city is very difficult and tense," said team chief Salavat Mingaliyev, according to Russia's Interfax news agency.

More and more, the focus fell on the daunting challenge of getting aid to survivors. On Friday morning, no sign was seen of foreign assistance entering the downtown area, other than a U.S. Navy helicopter flying overhead.

Ordinary Haitians sensed the potential for an explosion of lawlessness. "We're worried that people will get a little uneasy," said attendant Jean Reynol, 37, explain-

ing his gas station was ready to close immediately if violence breaks out.

"People who have not been eating or drinking for almost 50 hours and are already in a very poor situation," U.N. humanitarian spokeswoman Elisabeth Byrs said in Geneva. "If they see a truck with something, or if they see a supermarket which has collapsed, they just rush to get something to eat."

each other of misleading voters. Hutchinson tried to stick to fiscal issues and challenged Perry's claim that he cut business taxes.

Perry repeatedly tried to tie Hutchinson to increased federal government spending and accused her of changing her position by voting for a fall 2008 financial industry bailout bill. Hutchinson said then-president Bush urged her and other Republicans in Congress to support the bailout bill to combat a "global meltdown" in the economy.

"He hated to do that. We hated to make that vote," she said.

But Hutchinson noted

that Perry, as chairman of the Republican Governors Association, wrote a letter urging Congress to pass the economic recovery bill. Perry later said he didn't support the federal legislation.

Perry tried to point to jobs he said he created while in office and cited statistics stretching from November 2007 to November 2008. Hutchinson responded by saying Texas lost 300,000 jobs last year and "that is not a record to be proud of."

Texas' unemployment is 8 percent, about two percentage points below the national average.

Oil slips below \$79 amid stronger dollar

Oil prices dropped below \$79 a barrel Friday amid a strengthening U.S. dollar and weak crude demand in developed countries.

By early afternoon in Europe, benchmark crude for February delivery was down 77 cents to \$78.62 a barrel in electronic trad-

ing on the New York Mercantile Exchange. On Thursday, the contract fell 26 cents to settle at \$79.39.

The euro was down to \$1.4371 Friday from \$1.4500 on Thursday, while the British pound dipped to \$1.6273 from

\$1.6332. Investors often buy commodities such as oil as a hedge against inflation when the dollar weakens and sell when it strengthens.

Crude prices also fell on concerns demand from the U.S. and Europe remains weak.

Prelim OK to fire subpar Houston teachers

HOUSTON (AP) — Trustees in Houston have given initial approval to a plan allowing the firing of teachers whose students consistently fail to do better on standardized tests.

The Houston Independent School District on Thursday endorsed the plan.

One of every 300 teachers in the Houston school district was fired for poor performance last year.

Superintendent Terry Grier said there was no "magic number" of teachers who should be ousted, but he suggested that the district's rate seems low given some academic shortcomings.

HISD data shows that last school year 36 teachers out of nearly 12,000, or about 0.3 percent, were fired for performance reasons.

Grier and board members say the goal is to help teachers improve. Evaluations will now include their so-called value-added scores, a statistical measure of effectiveness in helping students reach their potential on standardized exams.

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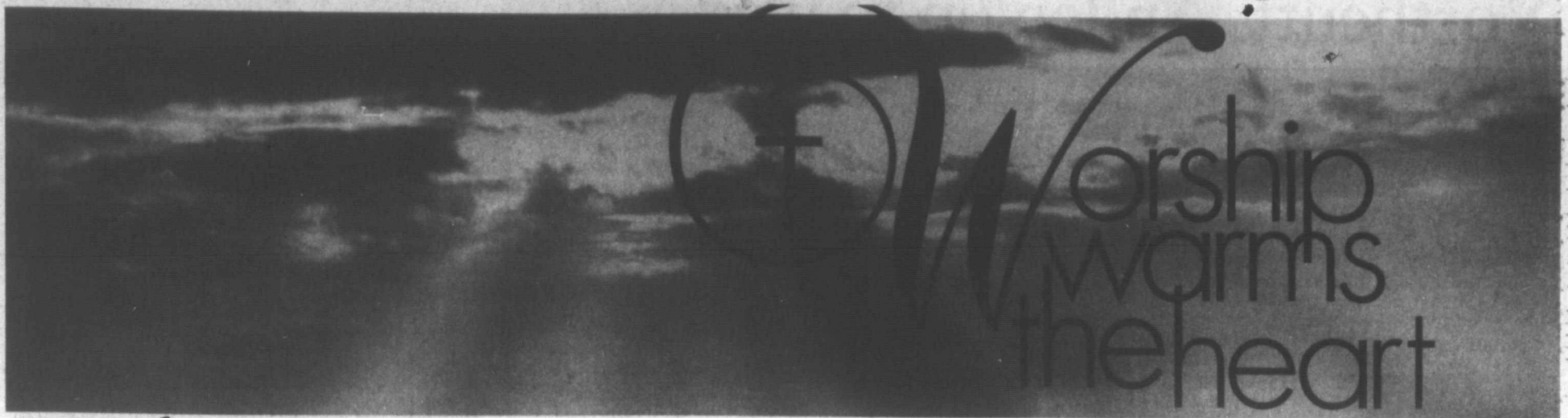
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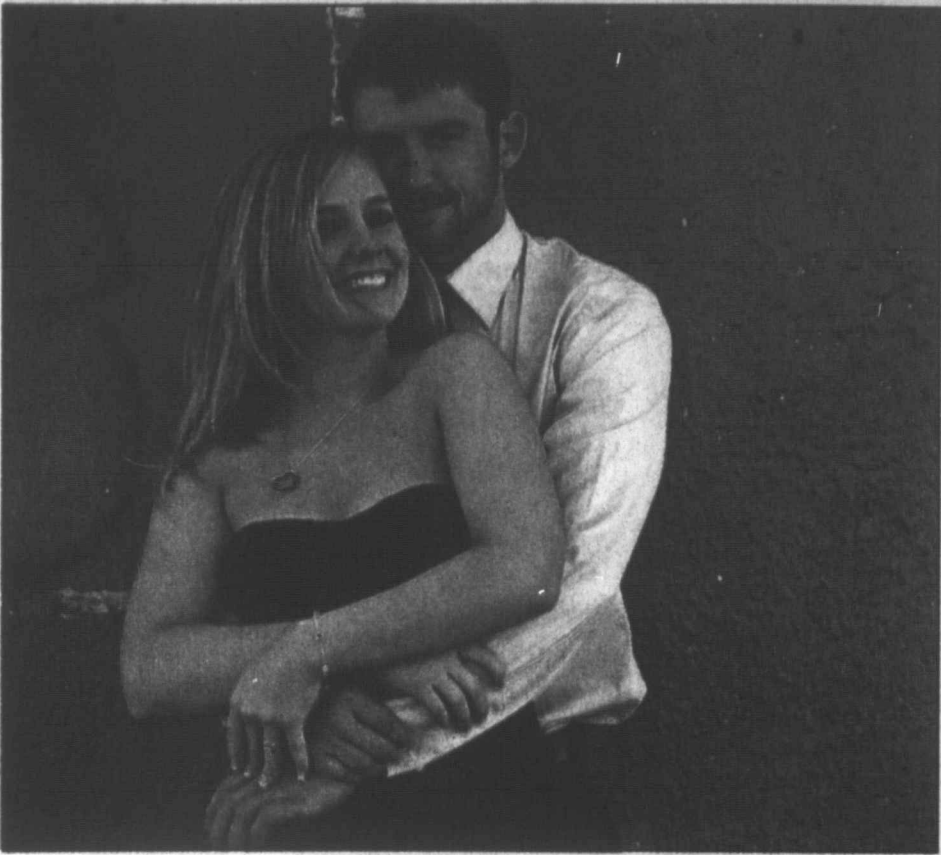
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Northcutt, Anderson to wed

Vlasek, from Hunt, Texas, was among 7,889 who applied in a TPWD's first special drawing for a lifetime license combo.

"When they told me I had won, my first thought was it was a hoax because I've never won anything," said Vlasek. "It's like the lottery; I play every week, but never really thought about being drawn. I'm excited. That'll save me a lot of money every year."

Vlasek will be permanently exempted from purchasing state hunting and fishing licenses.

TPWD is this year again offering Texas hunters and anglers the chance to win a Lifetime Super Combo hunting and fishing license — an \$1,800 value — for only \$5.

Entries for the next Lifetime License Drawing on June 30 can be purchased anywhere hunting and fishing licenses are sold, as well as on the TPWD Web site. Entries received during the first round will still be eligible for the second drawing. Entries for the June 30 drawing must be purchased by June 27. In all, 10,008 entries were received for the initial drawing, generating \$48,943 for TPWD conservation efforts.

Participants can purchase as many entries as they like, and winners are allowed to give the license as a gift to family or friends who are Texas residents.

Texas PUC penalties for 2 former providers

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Two former electric providers face nearly \$3.7 million in penalties for not properly advising Texas regulators that they were ceasing operations in 2008.

The Public Utility Commission approved enforcement orders against National Power Co. Inc. of Houston and Pre-Buy Electric LLC of Grapevine.

National Power must pay a \$1.8 million fine. Pre-Buy Electric was ordered to pay almost \$1.9 mil-

lion. Both also must refund all customers deposits and prepayments.

The commission on Thursday approved a preliminary order against HWY 3 MHOP also known as eTricity, of Denton, with a recommended penalty topping \$1.4 million.

The company is accused of failing to notify regulators and customers of its intent to cease operations. A hearing is set for Thursday.

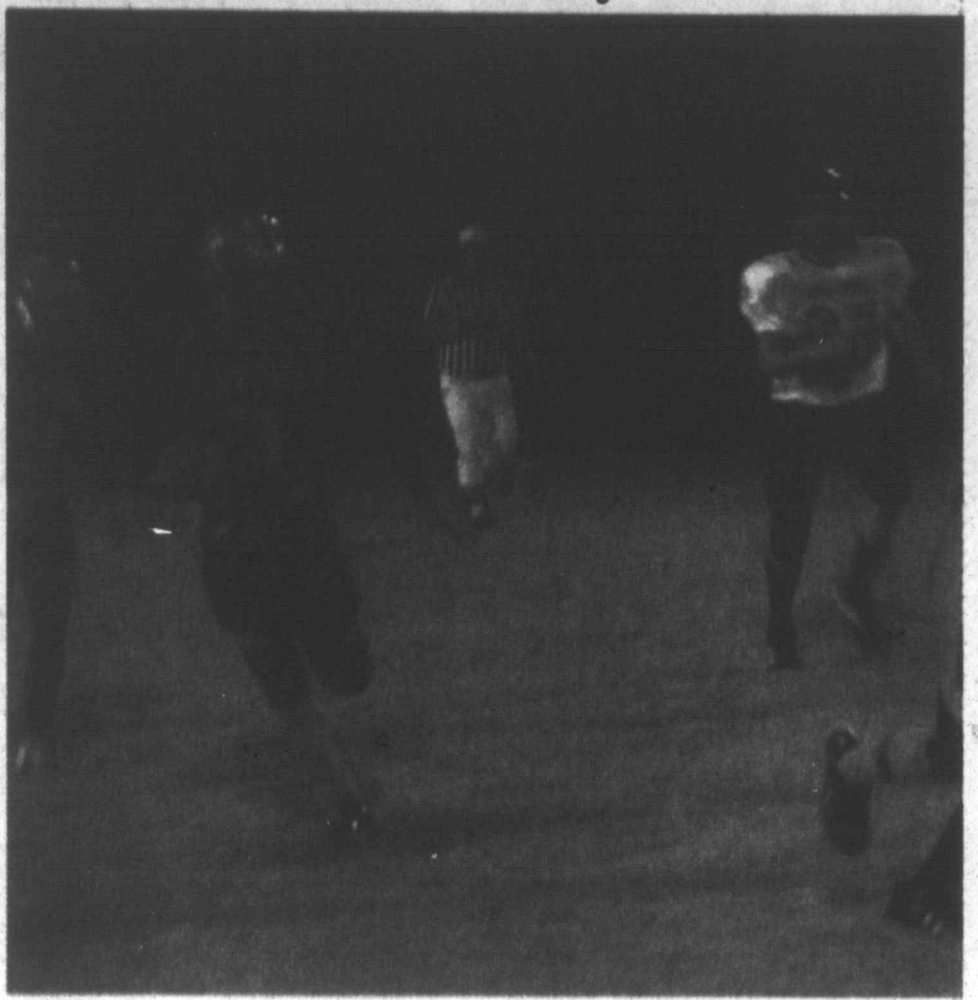

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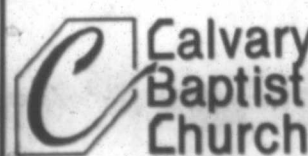
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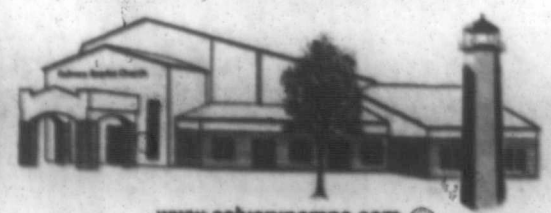
