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PUC challenge not slowing CTT plans BY DAVID BOWSER dbowser@thepampanews.com

A court case in Dallas isn't expected to slow progress on transmission lines from Pampa to downstate users, according to a spokesman for Cross Texas Transmission, LLC.

"We're proceeding as normal," said Julie Ramsey, a spokesman for the electric transmission company, today. CTT is one of two transmission companies expected to build

electric lines from this region to downstate users of the power. The other is Sharyland Utilities.

The \$5 billion program will transport wind-generated electricity from the panhandle region to the ERCOT (Electric Reliability Council of Texas) that operates the electrical grid for the rest of the state. The Texas panhandle and South Plains have been tied to the Southwest Power Pool (SPP) that operates to the north and east of Pampa.


The City of Garland, on the northeast side of Dallas, challenged the Texas Public Utility Commission's decision to award the transmission contracts to private companies Cross Timbers and Sharyland, claiming that municipalities could do build and maintain the lines at a lower cost since they don't have to pay property taxes and can borrow money at a lower interest rate.

A district judge in Austin sent the PUC's order back to them for

"If you're not taught your heritage, you don't have a foundation to go forward," he said.

"It's only a first step. It's not about having a black president. It's about having a president whose race you don't care about," said Jones, who would only describe his age as "over 60."

Health providers to test pregnant women for HIV

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -Pregnant woman are being tested during their last trimester for the virus that causes AIDS as part of a new effort to save young lives in Texas.

took effect this month, health care providers must conduct the HIV testing unless the woman objects.

Allison Lowery with the Department of State Health Services told the Austin American-Statesman that mothers-to-be generally will be billed for the test, but the cost is expected to be covered by insurance or Medicaid.
