## Big Spring

 FestivalWhat do the states of Indiana, Illinois, Vermont, Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and TExas have in common? They will each have residents participating in the sixth annual Big Spring Arts and Crafts Festival to be held in the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum on October 16-17, 1982. The local festival, already the largest show of its kind in the western half of the state, will open with 187 booths-the largest show to date.
Organizers of the highly successful festival said they had to expand the size of the show to accommodate those exhibitors who had mailed in theri entry forms and booth fees as much as a year ago. The festival committee said thay felt it would be unfair to return those requests after a year. As a result, the 1982 Big Spring Arts and Crafts Festival will open with its maximum capacity. It will utilize the entire main floor and concourse including the entrances and will reroute the flow of traffic on the east concourse through the east room. The east room alone will add 20 booths to the local festival.
As to the makeup of the entries, the number of exhibitors featuring fine art, pottery, stained glass, bronze, brass, wood, and handmade jewelry has been greatly expanded. The number of potters has more than doubled over the 1981 entries with a total of ten. There will also be seven booths featuring stained glass, and an equal number fisplaying handmade jewelry from bronze to brass.

-HARD COLD FACTS
Americans will suffer through an estimated 70 million colds this year.
This means that we'll be missing work, falling behind in school and worst of all spending a lot ot time feeling just plain "miserable."
Contrary to popular belief, colds are caused by viruses not by exposure to rain, cold ordrafts although these lower our residtance and make us more susceptible to viruses. By nature, viruses are highly contagious, and they're spread more rapdily in the fall and winter when people are in closer contact and spend more time indoors.
Here are some ideas to help you survive the cold season:

1. Stay away from cold sufferers and from surfaces they've touched. If a member of your family is sick, let him or her use disposable plates and utensils to prevent the spread of the infection.
2. Don't allow the air in your home to become excessively dry. A humidity level of 35 to 40 percent will
keep the muks membrane of the nose and throat moist and thus serve more effectively in trapping germs before they can infect the body.
3. If you do come down with a cold, follow the time honored guidelines of staying in bed, drinking plenty of liquids, and taking medication to bring down your temperature. This will probably be more effective then any cold remedy you can buy. A study by the Food and Drug Administration reports that cold medicines may temporarily relieve the symptoms of a cold, but none can cure it or alter its course. Even Vitamin Chas yet to be proved effective in preventing or curing colds.
4. Be patient. A cold needs to run its $7-10$ day course, and if you attempt to carry on with business as usual you will probably wear down your strength and prolong the infection. Be good to yourself and remain in bed for at least a day, covering with a warm blanket. By, resting and relaxing, your body will have a chance to fight the old without everyday stress.

CULL OPEN LATE CALVING COWS
Despite a weak cattle market, it's wise to clean up your herds by culling open cows and giving more attention to a controlled breeding program by culling late calving cows.

There's no need to put expensive winter feed into unproductiv cows. Culling the cow herd now will also help you plan on feed supplies for the winter months.
Also, pregnancy testing cows this fall may be a more profitable managementtool than ever before. This can be done easily while you are shipping calves.
Since it's difficult for a cow to produce a calf large enough to pay her annual maintenance cost and leave some profitfor the producer, we know an open cow is losing money. Cows calving during the summer months wean calves 30 to 90 pounds lighter than their herd mates which calve at other times. For this reason it's advisable to cull cows which will calve late next year and buy a replacement which will calve early
Whoever does the pregnancy testing, whatever it be you or the vet, will be able to estimate the calving date on each animal and make it easy to identify next year's late calving cows. Your definition of a late calving cow should change every year until your calving season has been reduced to 60 days preferably, and certainly no longer than 90 days.
Remove barren and late calving cows from the herd

FARMERS ARE ASKED TO MAKE NOMINATIONS FOK THE ASC COMMITTEE
farmers are asked nominate candidates of their choice to be on the ASC committee ballot.
The Borden County ASC committee election will be conducted from November 26 to December 6 by mail ballot.
ASC committees are responsible for managing government farm programs on the local level. To meet the needs of individual producers, ASC committee members must be concerned and responsible individuals. Borden county farmers have the opportunity to nominate persons they feel would best serve the farm community. Farmers will receive petition forms by mai for submission to the county scs office
A few basic considerations should be kept in mind when circulating petitions. In order to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected must be signed by at least three eligible farm voters and must be received in the county ASCS office no later than Nov. 1.

Farmers may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many candidates as they choose. Anyone wishing to nominate a farmer for the ASC committee election may contact the county ASC'S office for full details, including eligibility requirements for office holders.

Farmers should petition for and elect those individuals they feel would do a good job as a member of the sc committee. The election of concerned farmers to positions on ASC committee is essential in the administration of farm programs."
The county ASC'S office welcomes all valid petitions. The opportunity to nominate, vote, and be elected to office is guraranteed to all farmers regardless of race, religion, sex, age, color, or national origin.

## Campaign Platform on Agriculture

"All of us are extremely affected by the health of the agricultural business community. West texas depends to a large degree on an agricultural based economy. The farm dollar multiplies roughly eleven (11) times through our State's economy and roughly seven (7) times through our local economy. We must support our farmers. I will fight any efforts to repeal the gasahol tax exemption, one of the few pieces of legislation passed by the State to assist the farmer in gaining a fair market price for his product.
