## Peet, Willoughby, Vanderpool win races Precinct 4 runoff set

There will be a runoff on April 13 for the Precinct 4 County Commissioner's post. None of the four candidates in the race reached the 50 percent needed to win the primary outright.

Jeff Hale received the most votes with 460, or 37.10 percent of the votes and Lynn Allison followed with 432, or 34.84 percent.

Wayne Leathers garnered 191, or 15.40 percent and Mark Simmons trailed with 157, or 12.66 percent.

In precinct 2, incumbent Gary Willoughby soundly defeated challenger Raymond Douglas, 476 to 165, gathering 74.26 percent of the vote.

Current County Judge Richard Peet garnered 1,540 votes, or 54.78 percent of those cast to win re-election in Tuesday's primary. Peet won substantially more than the 50 percent required to avoid a run-off in the April 13 election. There are no Democrats signed up to oppose Peet in November. Steve Hall received 870, or 30.95 percent of the vote

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## Perry defeats Hutchison in GOP primary

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas Gov. Rick Perry tapped into a rising wave of anti-Washington ire and rode it to an easy Republican primary win over Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, once seen as the candidate who could block his march toward four more years in the state's highest office.

Perry emerged from the rancorous battle with Texas' senior senator and a third candidate backed by some in the tea party movement to face a Democrat in many ways his polar opposite. Former Houston Mayor Bill White, a calm consensus-builder, easily defeated six opponents to win his party's nomination.

Shortly after Hutchison called him to concede, Perry continued his non-stop attack on the nation's capital, slamming Washington on spending, job losses and the health care debate.

"Texas voters said no to Washington bureaucrats ... and yes to leadership that controls spending, fights for individual freedoms and the United States Constitution," Perry told cheering supporters at the famous Salt Lick barbecue restaurant in Driftwood, just outside Austin. "Hardworking Texans sent a simple, compelling message to Washington: Quit spending all the money!"

## House members win in primary election

HOUSTON (AP) — The anti-incumbent sentiment presumably aimed at Congress isn't costing any Texas congressional members their jobs — for now.

Nearly half of Texas' 32 U.S. House members faced opposition in Tuesday's primary election from within their own party, some for the first time in years. But the 11 Republicans and three Democrats easily won, and many will have to defend their seats again in November.

"The people who voted said, 'We understand you've always fought for us and are fighting the Obama administration and what's coming is this gigantic overreach of government,'" said Republican Rep. Kay Granger, who defeated two GOP opponents in the 12th District west and north of Fort Worth.

Rice University political science chair Mark Jones said the results show that tea party activists and voter disgust with Congress didn't affect the final count in Texas said.

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## Life term for Temple man

BELTON, Texas (AP) — A jury in Belton has ordered life in prison for a 55-year-old man who confessed years later to the 1994 shooting death of his wife.

Milton Britt Crowe on Monday pleaded guilty to murder.

Jurors on Tuesday sentenced him to life behind bars over the July 1994 slaying of his 47-year-old wife, Linda. Her body was found dumped near Nolanville.

Crowe said he and his spouse were depressed after he lost his job, he had drinking problems and they were in debt. Crowe testified that his wife told him that she was tired and was not sure if she could go on any more.

Prosecutors say Crowe had not been truthful from the initial investigation, up to when he confessed last year, to an investigator, at the urging of his pastor.

## Penalty phase for convicted San Antonio killer

VICTORIA, Texas (AP) — Both sides have rested in the penalty phase for a San Antonio man convicted of killing a restaurant founder by shooting her in the head with an arrow.

A jury in Victoria on Wednesday was expected to hear closing arguments

in the life-or-death punishment phase for 20-year-old Joe Estrada Jr.

Jurors on Feb. 18 convicted Estrada of the 2008 killing of Viola Barrios, who had been his neighbor, in what prosecutors say was a burglary. The 76-year-old victim was the matriarch of the Los Barrios Mexican restaurant, which she opened in 1979.

Both sides rested Tuesday afternoon.

as the closest contender, with Robert Bank getting 401, or 14.27 percent of the votes.

In the race for the 223rd judgeship, Phil Vanderpool bested Todd Alvey, receiving 2,204, or 79.45 percent of the voted cast to Alvey's 570, or 20.55 percent.

There were no other opposed races in the county.

The propositions on the ballot, which are only to gage opinion, not to become law, all passed handily in Gray County and in the state.

Gray County totals:  
Proposition 1, Voter ID passed 2,557 to 247, or by 91.19 percent of the vote.

Proposition 2, Controlling government growth passed by 2,5531, or by 92.10 percent of the vote.

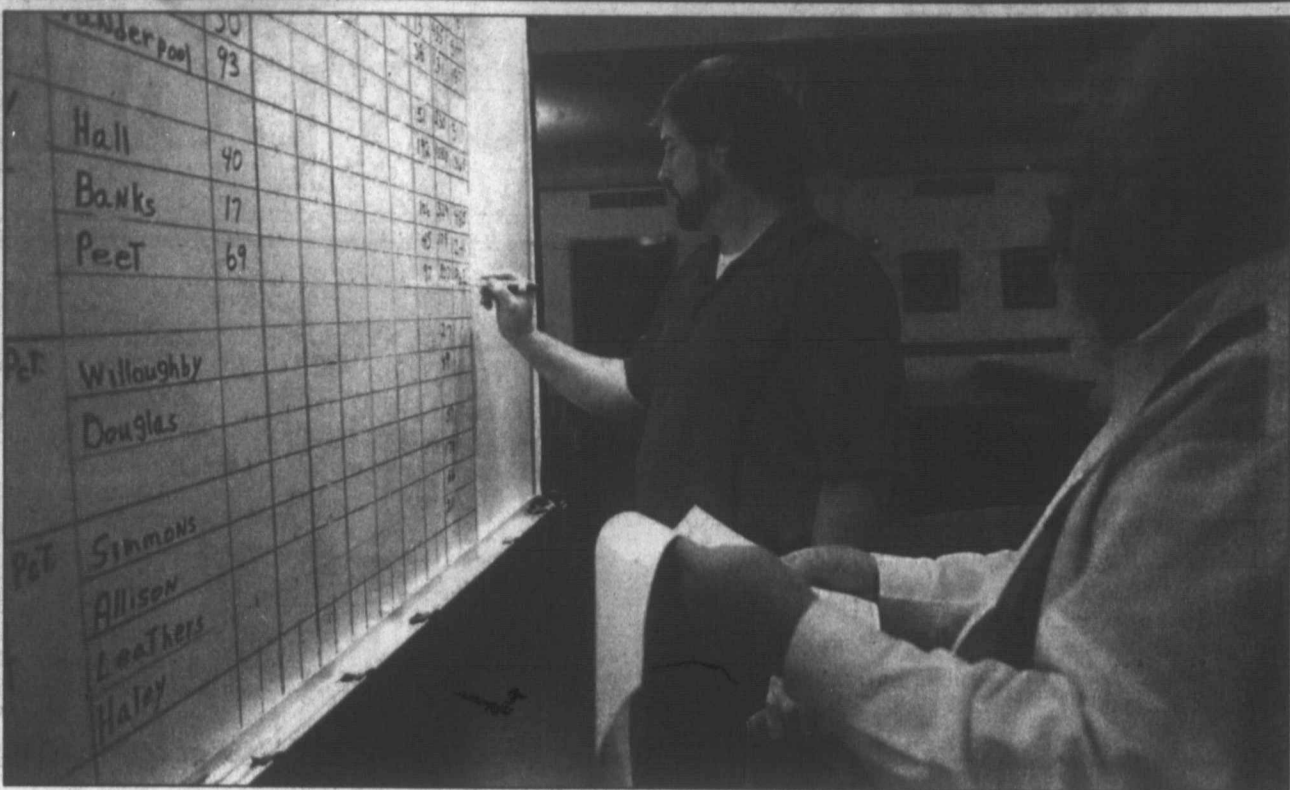
Proposition 3, Cutting federal income tax, passed 2, 598 to 157, or by 94.30 percent.

Proposition 4, public acknowledgement of God, passed 2, 753 to 80, or by 97.18 percent of the vote.

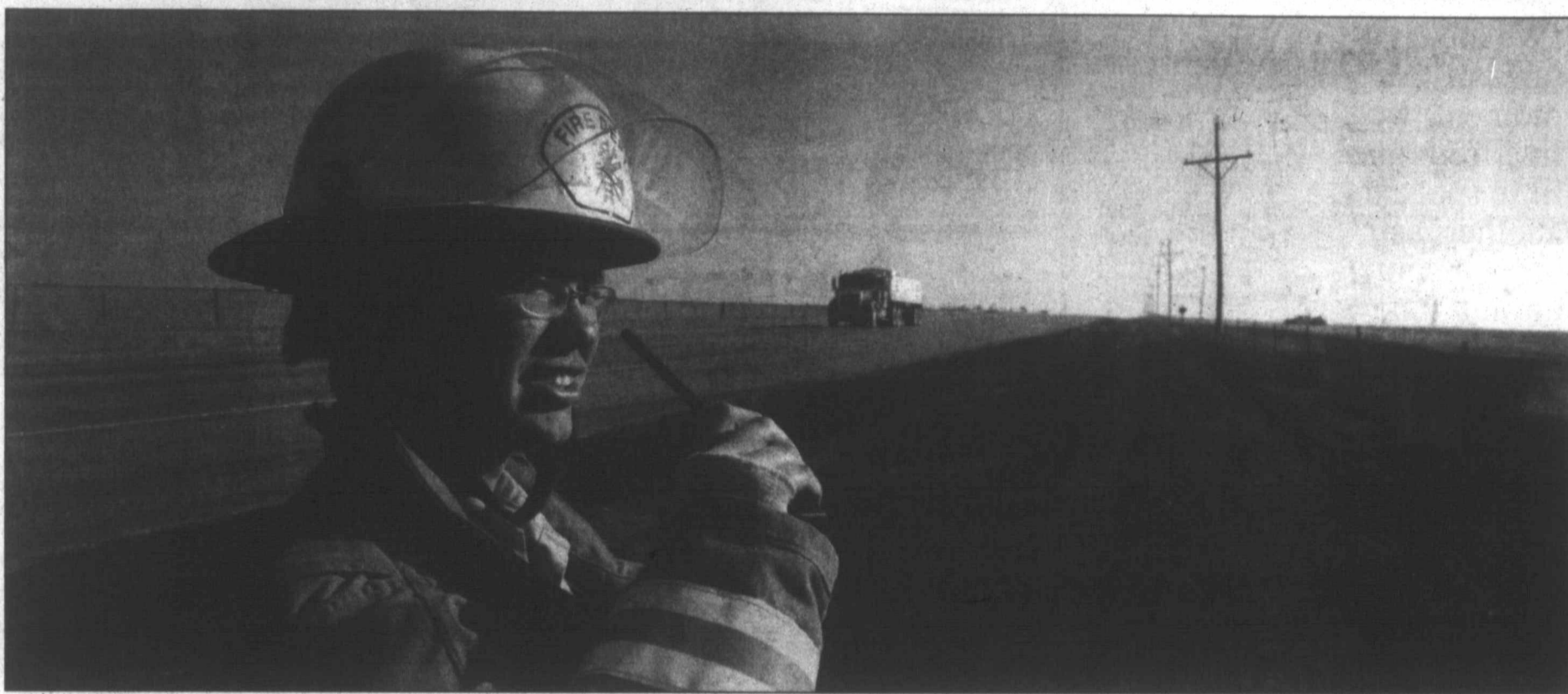
Proposition 5, requiring pregnant women to have a sonogram before receiving an abortion, passed 2, 127 to 651, or by 76.57 percent.

In the governor's race, Gray County voters chose Rick Perry over Sen. Kay Baily Hutchison by a margin of 1,630 to 927. Debra Medina received 323 votes.

The Democratic governor's race was a runaway in Gray County, with Bill White receiving 76.71 percent of the votes. All other candidates were under eight percent.

## Grass fire stops traffic

It was a bright clear day Tuesday afternoon as Gray County deputies and Texas Department of Public Safety troopers stopped traffic briefly south of Pampa because of poor visibility.

Smoke from a series of grass fires along the Texas Highway 70 right-of-way south of Pampa Tuesday afternoon blocked out the sun and reduced visibility to zero briefly.

Four units and eight

firefighters of the Hoover Volunteer Fire Department, returning from a false alarm, battled the flames, quickly bringing the blazes under control.

Three Gray County sheriff units and one Texas Department of Public Safety controlled traffic as the dense smoke hung over the highway.

Fire Chief Joe Millican said the fire units arrived at the scene about 4 p.m. Three of the blazes on the

east side of the road were quickly extinguished, but as flames from the fourth blaze, which was on the west side of the highway, reached a fence line and found the heavy growth of grass in a conservation program, it flared up.

Millican said it took only minutes to extinguish the blaze, however.

The origin of the fires was suspicious, officials said, and were being investigated today.

## Gov

With nearly all precincts reporting, Perry had 51 percent to Hutchison's 30 percent. He managed to avoid a runoff even though nearly one in five voters cast ballots for the third candidate — Debra Medina, a GOP party activist who has strong libertarian leanings and supporters in the tea party movement.

Competing with Perry for the most conservative GOP voters, Medina raised relatively little money and told talk show host Glenn Beck there were "some very good arguments" that the U.S. was involved in the 2001 terrorist attacks. Yet she still managed to win over some voters who might otherwise have sided with Perry.

The tea party movement's influence wasn't limited to the governor's race; tea party-backed candidates ousted a longtime ally of the Texas House speaker Tuesday and sent another into a runoff.

"A lot of people did not understand, including myself, the growing resentment, the growing opposition in the state toward Washington, D.C.," said longtime Republican consultant Reggie Bashur, who credited Perry with identifying the anti-Washington sentiment just as the tea party movement was taking off a year ago — and jumping aboard.

Perry spoke to tea party activists on April 15, 2009

— federal income tax filing day — and in response to a question by The Associated Press even flirted with the idea of Texas seceding from the Union as he criticized the federal government.

"I think the governor and his team recognized and became a leader in the anti-Washington movement," Bashur said.

White, in his measured and deliberate style, saluted the two Republicans who challenged Perry for the GOP nomination, saying Tuesday night in Houston that he admires their courage for taking on a "career politician" who knows every "trick in the book."

White easily dispatched with hair care magnate Farouk Shami and five others to win the Democratic nomination with 76 percent of the vote with nearly all precincts reporting. A lawyer and businessman with money to spend on an expensive race, White represents the Democrats' best hope in years at winning the governorship.

Democrats haven't won a statewide office since 1994, when George W. Bush was elected governor and the Republicans started their Texas takeover.

White predicted Perry will try to take credit for good things going on in Texas, including the creation of new jobs, but won't accept responsibility for a record 1 million

jobless or the high dropout rate.

"I think we're catching up to Mr. Perry," White said.

Already the state's longest-serving governor, Perry hammered Hutchison for her ties to the nation's capital as he pressed hard for a third, full four-year term. He criticized her votes in favor of bailing out troubled financial institutions when Bush was president; Perry's spokesman called her "Kay Bailout."

Hutchison said she tried to remind voters that she always fought for Texas values in Congress, but admitted during an interview last week that Perry succeeded in sticking her with a Washington label.

"We have fought valiantly for our principles, but we did not win," Hutchison said in Dallas on Tuesday night. "I will work with Gov. Perry and our fellow Republicans to keep Texas strong in the future."

Hutchison spokeswoman Jennifer Baker said the senator "was just overtaken by a wave of anti-Washington sentiment that all members of Congress are being swept up in."

Jim Henson, director of the Texas Politics Project at the University of Texas, said Perry's campaign "boned in on where the Republican election was and defined Hutchison in a way that she couldn't escape."

gressional primaries. But it forced incumbents into active campaigns.

"The tea party impact was overstated if it was ever in existence at all, particularly at the House level," Jones said. "It was sort of a signal to a lot of incumbents they needed to get out and work the primary and couldn't just afford to sit back and ignore it. A lot of these incumbents did have to spend some serious money."

In an election with decent voter turnout, he said, "it's really tough for those smaller underfunded candidates to really have an effect."

Texas' longest-serving House member and the chamber's oldest representative, Republican Ralph Hall, fought off six GOP challengers. The 86-year-old earned about 57 percent of the vote — nearly double the amount of his nearest challenger, with nearly all precincts reporting — to keep his 4th District seat in far northeast Texas.

Democrat Sheila Jackson Lee, who's held the 18th District seat in Houston since 1994, dispatched two challengers who provided her first organized opposition ever.

"Any race that causes you to run and ask for vote of the people is a challenging race," she said.

Suburban Houston Rep. Kevin Brady, who beat three challengers to his 8th District, agreed.

"You do take them seriously," he said. "It's been a decade since I had a primary. You almost have to relearn (to campaign)."

Seven GOP incumbents will face only third-party or independent opponents but no Democrats in November. All 12 seats held by Democrats will have Republican opponents.

"We do the same thing we did in the primary — focus on what Washington is not doing today, not focusing on jobs, the economy, getting deficit spending under

control," said Bill Flores, a retired energy company executive who faces a runoff with Robert Curnock after the two emerged from a field of five Republicans in the 17th District. The central Texas district is represented by Democrat Chet Edwards.

Republican Mike Conaway beat two opponents to retain his seat in District 11, which spans from west of Austin to Midland-Odessa, while fellow Republican Ron Paul topped three challengers in his District 14 south of Houston along the Gulf Coast from Baytown to Rockport.

Other Republican incumbents who survived the primary include Kenny Marchant in the 24th District, which covers the area between Dallas and Fort Worth; John Carter in District 31, northeast and northwest of Austin; Lamar Smith in the 21st District north and west of San Antonio and west of Austin; Michael Burgess in District 26 from Fort

Worth to north of Denton; Michael McCaul in the 10th District east of Austin to nearly Houston; and Pete Sessions in the Dallas area's District 32.

Republicans facing only third-party opposition in November are Louie Gohmert in the 1st District, which covers from Tyler and Longview to Lufkin; Ted Poe in the 2nd District from northeast Houston to Beaumont and Port Arthur; John Culberson in the 7th District in west Houston; and Mac Thornberry in the 13th District, which stretches northwest of Fort Worth into the Texas Panhandle.

A handful of other races — Democrats in District 14 and Republicans in Districts 20, 23, and 27 — also require runoffs. The GOP winner in District 23, which sprawls across southwest Texas from west of San Antonio to nearly El Paso, will face Democratic incumbent Ciro Rodriguez, who won his primary.

## Today in History

### Today's Highlight in History:

On March 3, 1931, President Herbert Hoover signed a measure making "The Star-Spangled Banner" the national anthem of the United States.

### On this date:

In 1894, British Prime Minister William Gladstone submitted his resignation to Queen Victoria, ending his fourth and final premiership.

In 1945, the Allies fully secured the Philippine capital of Manila from Japanese forces during World War II.

In 1969, Apollo 9 blasted off from Cape Kennedy on a mission to test the lunar module.

In 1974, a Turkish Airlines DC-10 crashed shortly after takeoff from Orly Airport in Paris, killing all 346 people on board.

In 1991, motorist Rodney King was severely beaten by Los Angeles police officers in a scene captured on amateur video. Twenty-five people were killed when a United Airlines Boeing 737-200 crashed while approaching the Colorado Springs airport.

Ten years ago: Former dictator General Augusto Pinochet returned to Chile a free man, 16 months after he was detained in Britain on torture charges. Bob Jones University, a fundamentalist Christian college, said it was lifting its ban on interracial dating. (University president Bob Jones III made the announcement on CNN's "Larry King Live.")

Five years ago: President George W. Bush visited CIA headquarters, where he promised agency employees they would retain an "incredibly vital" role in safeguarding the nation's security despite the creation of a new post of national director of intelligence. Millionaire adventurer Steve Fossett became the first person to fly around the world alone without stopping or refueling, touching down in central Kansas after a 67-hour, 23,000-mile journey.

One year ago: U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, during a visit to Israel, promised to work with the incoming government, but said movement toward establishment of a Palestinian state was "inescapable." Guinea-Bissau's parliamentary leader Raimundo Pereira was sworn in as the country's new president, following the assassination of Joao Bernardo "Nino" Vieira. Sydney Chaplin, Charlie Chaplin's son and himself a Tony-winning actor, died in Rancho Mirage, Calif. at age 82.

## Analysis: Washington ties big loser in Texas

An AP News Analysis WASHINGTON (AP) — Winners: Texas Gov. Rick Perry and "tea party" anger. Losers: Texas Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison and anybody else tied to Washington.

Take note, House and Senate members up for re-election or running for governor this fall: Your connections to the nation's gridlocked capital — and particularly your votes for the Wall Street bailout — could be debilitating.

Tuesday's GOP primary in the Texas governor's race showed as much.

Texas Republicans sent these messages, Perry said: "Stop messin' with Texas!" and "Quit spending all the money!"

The race pitted the public's fury at Washington against its anti-incumbent fervor. And it turned out that Republican primary voters hated Washington more than they did incumbency. They nixed Hutchison, an indisputable capital insider after 16 Senate years, in favor of keeping Perry — even though he's Texas' longest-serving governor, in his 10th year at the helm.

Perry, who became governor when George W. Bush left office, is seeking an unprecedented third four-year term. He will face Democrat Bill White, the former Houston mayor, this fall in a race that Democrats and Republicans alike expect to be competitive.

Underscoring its belief that White can win, the Democratic Governors Association already has given him \$500,000. More is expected to follow as Democrats portray White "as an outsider who can bring people together," according to a DGA memo, and use Perry's long tenure against him.

That strategy failed for Hutchison.

The GOP matchup had been expected to be a suspenseful clash of Texas titans.

But it was hardly that in the final weeks. Perry successfully painted Hutchison as the epitome of everything that's wrong with Washington and effectively played to animosity fueling the "tea party" coalition over excessive federal spending. It didn't help Hutchison that their images played into his message: He's down-home Texas, with a swash-buckling style. She's every bit Washington, from her polished appearance to her Senate-tinged vernacular.

To be sure, Texas GOP primary voters are a tiny part of the nation's elector-

ate — and a very conservative sliver at that. But the outcome teased out important lessons for Republicans and Democrats ahead of November's midterm elections.

Among them: —Washington is toxic. So is a vote supporting the 2008 Wall Street bailout, at least in Republican primaries.

Much of the public's anger is directed at the nation's capital over budget-busting spending, including the financial industry rescue. Perry seized on that rage to define race as a referendum on Washington — and Hutchison as nothing more than an extension of it and a purveyor of fiscal waste. Perry, thus, prevented the race from being defined as a referendum on his near decade in office.

His campaign tagged the senator as "Kay 'Bailout' Hutchison," hammering her over federal money she secured for Texas over the years and depicting her as deeply entrenched in Washington. All that nationalized the race; local issues largely took a back seat.

"It definitely has made it more difficult for me," Hutchison said. "I didn't think that anyone could turn my success in producing results for Texas into a negative." But that's just what Perry did.

Republicans can capitalize on the antiestablishment "tea party" coalition. Watch out, Democrats. Perry was among the first Republicans to craft his candidacy around the anger of this loose network of conservative-libertarian voters who criticize what they call a big-government, big-spending Democratic agenda. He proved that Republicans who embrace antiestablishment views can attract these voters without turning off the GOP base.

Although the incumbent governor, Perry ran as the outsider. He secured an endorsement and a campaign appearance from "tea party" darling Sarah Palin. Hutchison got the same from former Vice President Dick Cheney, and nods of approval from former President George H.W. Bush as well as the state's major newspapers.

Perry also embraced the cause of state sovereignty and suggested that Texans might get so fed up with Washington that they would want to secede.

Still, "tea party" support in principle doesn't always translate into ballot box victories.

Conservative activ-

ist Debra Medina, who was considered the "tea party" candidate, didn't get enough votes to force a runoff. But Republicans and Democrats alike would be wise to take note that a whopping 19 percent of Republican primary voters backed her.

—To take advantage of the electorate's anti-incumbent inclination, challengers may have to give voters a clear reason to choose them instead of incumbents.

Hutchison's primary pitch seemed to be that it was her turn to be governor. She made that argument right up until the election, saying at a polling place, "Gov. Perry is trying to stay too long."

But she never seemed to be able to articulate to voters why Perry didn't deserve another term and why Texas Republicans

should upset the status quo: Two popular Texas Republicans in positions of power, one in Austin as the governor, one in Washington as a senator.

Republican primary voters simply didn't buy Hutchison's complaint that Perry had overstayed his welcome.

And why would they? Texas has seemed to weather the recession better than most states. Its budget isn't nearly as bad as others. And its unemployment rate trails the national average.

With that backdrop, Texas Republicans dismissed the notion that Perry was to blame for their woes and, instead, gave him credit for the state being in better shape than others.

In the end, they rejected change — and Washington.

## Armstrong focused on Tour of Murcia time trial

SAN PEDRO DEL PINATAR, Spain (AP) — Lance Armstrong is looking to improve his time trial performance in the Tour of Murcia as part of his Tour de France preparations.

Armstrong expects the five-day race along the southeastern Mediterranean coast, starting Wednesday, will boost his chances of winning an eighth Tour de France.

"Considering we haven't raced since January, it's important. It's definitely important," the Team RadioShack rider said.

On Tuesday, team boss Johan Bruyneel said he believed the 38-year-old Armstrong was looking better than when he returned in 2009 after a 3½-year retirement.

But the Texan isn't so sure his physical condition has improved.

"Maybe it's similar. It's a little different too, because last year we had the benefit of a hard Tour of California, which this year we didn't have," said Armstrong, who hasn't raced since January's Tour Down Under in Australia.

Armstrong said he has been focusing on getting his body position right for Saturday's 13.7-mile time trial.

"I've tried to work on the positioning and on the training aspects," he said. "Last year, I didn't train very much on the time trial bike, which was my mistake. (It) requires a lot of specific training, which I didn't do."

"We tweaked the position a little bit. We also worked on the bike, which has continued to evolve and the helmet has evolved."

Armstrong says he is

more relaxed and feels less pressure as cycling is no longer his top priority. He wouldn't predict how he'd fare in the time trial, saying "the most important thing is to ride as hard as I can and run a smart race, a time trial that's well tempoed."

RadioShack is one of 16 teams taking part in the five-day race, which includes other Tour hopefuls like Bradley Wiggins of Team Sky and Denis Menchov of Rabobank.

There are no Italian teams involved, but race director Francisco Guzman denied reports that organizers had banned them because of ongoing problems with

Alejandro Valverde. He cannot compete in Italy because of an ongoing doping case.

"I made a mistake in the press conference when I said that we preferred not to have Italian teams of a low level because of everything that has happened with Valverde," Guzman said. "But they were never denied, they just could not make it due to scheduling conflicts."

The opening leg Wednesday was an 103-mile ride around the coastal town of San Pedro del Pinatar.
