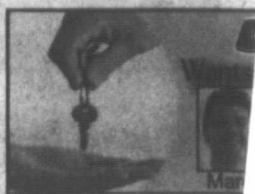

Pampa man charged with possession of child pornography

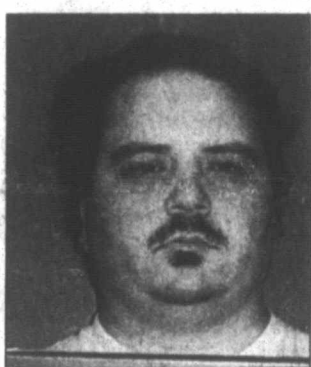
A Pampa man has been charged with possession of child pornography following a tip from a national agency.

Alex Ray Fox, 29, was arrested and charged with 10 counts of possession with intent to promote child pornography, according to a report by the Pampa Police Department.

Police acted on a tip from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and sought a warrant to search the suspect's residence in the 400 block of North Doyle Street, the

report said. Fox was taken to Gray County Jail where bond was set at \$250,000.

'Death penalty' judge under fire

HOUSTON (AP) - A state district judge in Houston is answering a torrent of high-profile criticism after he declared the death penalty unconstitutional.

Judge Kevin Fine said during a court hearing Friday he is not legislating from the bench and there

is no precedent to guide him in resolving the issues raised by defense attorneys in a pre-trial motion in a capital murder case.

Fine has been heavily criticized since Thursday, when he granted a motion by attorneys for a man accused of fatally shooting a Houston woman and

wounding her sister in June 2008.

Harris County District Attorney Patricia Lykos, as well Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott and Gov. Rick Perry criticized Fine's ruling, calling it judicial activism.

Texas Gov. Perry must win in Nov. before 2012 talk

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Before Rick Perry can parlay his tea party-powered victory in the Texas governor's primary into something bigger — a 2012 Republican presidential ticket, perhaps — he'll have to actually win a record-setting, third four-year term.

Doing that will require beating Bill White, the former Houston mayor who might be the only Democrat with the cash and base of support to counter Perry's Texas swagger and cut-throat campaign style and end his undefeated streak at the ballot box.

"This will be the toughest race that Rick Perry has ever been in," said Craig Varoga, a Houston-based political consultant who has known the mild-mannered White for years.

Perry, who defeated Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison in the GOP primary Tuesday with a relentless anti-Washington message, plans to keep up that theme ahead of the November general election. He'll say that White aligned himself with President Barack Obama on issues like health care and climate change and try to paint the ex-mayor as a "liberal Democrat trial lawyer that's out of touch with mainstream Texans," said Perry spokesman Mark Miner.

The Perry game plan also centers on raising questions about Houston's city finances while portraying it as too friendly with illegal immigrants, Perry associates say.

"We're going to find out if Bill White can take the punch," said Marc Campos, a political consultant who worked for a candidate running against White in the non-partisan mayor's race. "It's going to be interesting how he reacts to a full-fledged negative campaign against him. He's never done that. He's never had to go through something like this."

It appears that White is already trying to beat Perry to the punch.

The day after he easily defeated six Democratic primary opponents, White confronted Perry's anti-Washington message head-on, calling it a distraction from his failed record as governor on issues like job losses and the high school dropout rate. White, a former U.S. deputy energy secretary, said he's the one who knows how to work with Washington and get results, citing his dealings with the Federal Emergency Management Agency when hurricanes Katrina, Rita and Ike hit the Gulf Coast.

"Perry is more interested in the angry headline," White told reporters. "Tell me one case where over the last year Gov. Perry has been effective in changing the policy of this administration in D.C."

Varoga predicted that White will react swiftly if he's painted as a "dangerous Democrat tied to Obama."

"We're not going to see a lot of glitz, but he's not going to be a candidate who sits there and lets Rick Perry distort his record," Varoga said. "This is going to be a very competitive race."

While White lacks Perry's pizzazz, Varoga said the former mayor's strengths are his bipartisan appeal, his pragmatic approach to governing and his ability to raise money. Many who have underestimated White have lost, he said.

While Perry is famous for his back-slapping, traditional Texas image, White is seen as serious about big issues and handling crises. He's been known to delve into a book about the complexities of public school finance to talk about education policy at a city meet-

ing. "He's probably one of the smartest guys you'll ever meet," Campos said. "He's very knowledgeable about the issues."

White, who grew up in San Antonio, spent considerable time during his primary visiting the Rio Grande Valley, a Democratic stronghold, and showing his knowledge of Spanish. It also helps him to have a support base in Houston, the state's largest city.

The lawyer and energy business executive was elected Houston mayor in 2003 in the costliest mayoral race in the city's history. He was re-elected twice with large margins until term limits forced him out.

White also can match Perry's large sums of campaign cash. A key factor needed to win a gubernatorial race in a state of 24 million people where television ads can cost more than \$1 million a week to air in all markets. White quipped on Wednesday that Perry's vulnerability is his record in office, but admitted "he does good TV commercials."

Still, even though White is the Democratic Party's best hope in years, no Democrat has been elected to statewide office in Texas since 1994.

Perry has never lost a race in his 25 years. He was promoted from lieutenant governor to governor when George W. Bush left Austin to become president. In 2002, he defeated Democratic challenger Tony Sanchez, a banker and businessman who spent tens of millions of dollars of his own money. Perry was re-elected in 2006 and during that term became Texas' longest-serving chief executive.

As usual, Perry is expected to run another disciplined campaign and relish in his role as a candidate, said consultant and lobbyist

Luis Saenz, who managed Perry's winning campaign in 2006.

"The governor has so much energy, loves being in crowds," Saenz said. "It's all natural for him."

Though Perry has adamantly denied he has 2012 aspirations, he also knows Texas remains a conservative state overall, which could give him a platform as a national party standard-bearer.

He is a darling of the growing tea party movement and surrounds himself with nationally prominent Republicans like former Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin and ex-New York Mayor Rudolph Giuliani, both of whom campaigned for him.

"I think the message is pretty clear: Conservatism has never been stronger than it is today," Perry said Tuesday after claiming the primary victory. "We're taking our country back, one vote at a time, one election at a time."

Highlights in history on this date:
1573 - Peace of Constantinople ends war between Turkey and Venice.

1793 - France declares war on Spain, and Spanish forces invade Roussillon and Navarre.

1820 - Spain's King Ferdinand II is forced to restore the Constitution of 1812 and end the Inquisition.

1821 - Neopolitan rebels are crushed by Austrians at Rieti.

1854 - A sewing machine that could stitch buttonholes is patented by Charles Miller of St. Louis.

1876 - Egyptian forces are defeated at Gura by Ethiopians; Alexander Graham Bell receives a patent for his telephone.

1936 - Germany violates Treaty of Versailles by occupying demilitarized zone in the Rhineland.

1939 - Civil war breaks out in Madrid between communist and anti-communist factions while Nationalist forces lay siege to the city.

1941 - British troops invade Italian-occupied Abyssinia — now Ethiopia — in World War II.

1947 - Terrorist attack on police headquarters in Asuncion, Paraguay, sparks bloody five-month civil war.

1951 - Iran's Prime Minister Ali Razmara is assassinated.

1965 - A march by civil rights demonstrators is broken up in Selma, Alabama, by state troopers and a sheriff's posse.

1968 - United States and Soviet Union pledge to protect all weaker nations from nuclear blackmail and aggression.

1975 - U.S. Senate revises its filibuster rule, allowing 60 senators to limit debate in most cases, instead of the previously required two-thirds of senators present.

1977 - Saudi Arabia announces it will give one billion dollars in aid to Africa.

1988 - British soldiers and police fatally shoot three Irish Republican Army guerrillas after they plant a car bomb set to go off during military parade in British colony of Gibraltar.

1989 - China declares martial law in Tibetan capital of Lhasa following three days of anti-Chinese rioting.

1990 - Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev demands billions of dollars in hard currency to cover Soviet investments if Lithuania secedes from Soviet Union.

1991 - Forces loyal to Saddam Hussein reportedly execute as many as 400 people in southern Iraq following days of rebellion in Basra and other cities.

1992 - Russian President Boris Yeltsin ends price controls on bread and other staples, leading to steep price increases.

1993 - Angola says its troops have withdrawn from Huambo after two months of fighting with rebels that left 10,000 dead.

1994 - Multinational African army installs new government in Liberia.

1996 - Three U.S. servicemen are convicted in the rape of a 12-year-old Japanese girl and sentenced to between 6 1/2 and 7 years in prison.

1999 - Bosnian Serb lawmakers reject the firing of their hard-line president and suspend cooperation with the country's federal government after mediators say the strategic town of Brcko should leave Serb hands.

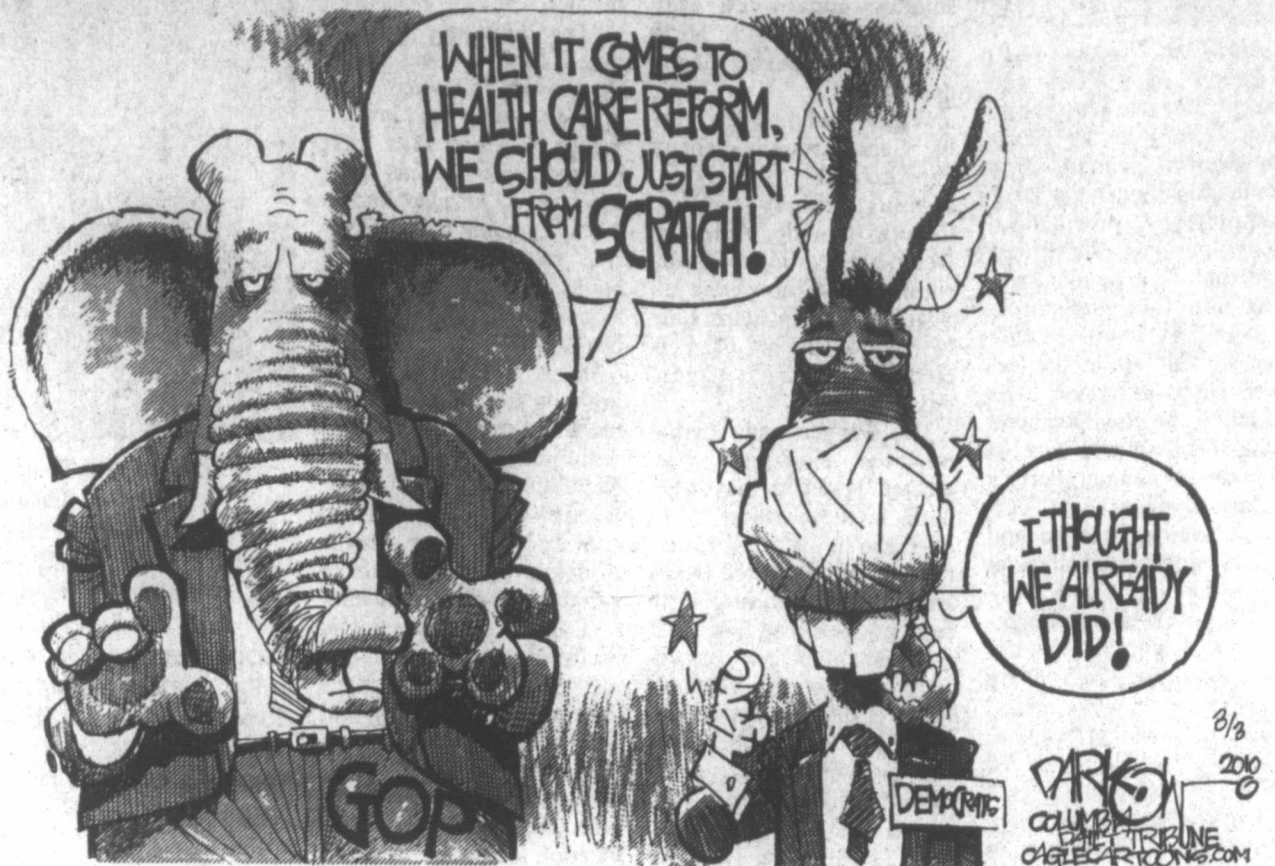
2001 - Ariel Sharon takes over as Israel's prime minister.

2002 - Hindu-Muslim rioting in the western Indian state of Gujarat leaves more than 600 people dead. Hindu mobs massacre Muslims after a train carrying Hindu activists was torched by Muslims in the city of Godhra the previous week.

2003 - The United States, Britain and Spain amend a draft U. N. Security Council resolution they had earlier proposed, setting a deadline of March 17 for the council to determine whether Iraq is serious about its disarmament obligations.

Analysis: Obama the 'outsider' from inside DC

WASHINGTON (AP) — The throw-the-bums-out mentality is so strong in American politics that even the ultimate insider — the president of the United States — is running against Washington.

Casting yourself as an outsider from inside the White House is no easy trick, especially when your party controls both houses of Congress. But that doesn't stop Barack Obama from trying.

"At stake right now is not just our ability to solve this problem," Obama said Wednesday, referring to the U.S. health care system, "but our ability to solve any problem. The American people want to know if it's still possible for Washington to look out for their interests and their future."

It may seem like a stretch, but it makes political sense for Obama to run against Washington. Other presidents, including Ronald Reagan and Bill Clinton, did it for most of their terms. President George W. Bush convinced voters he was a regular Joe rather than the privileged son of a former president — George H.W. Bush — who served for years in Washington.

Voters despise the place. Almost nine out of 10 Americans say officials in Washington are heavily influenced by special interests and only care about getting re-elected, according to a recent CNN/Opinion Research poll. Nearly as many say Washington politicians are out of touch. "Honest" is a word that only 22 percent of Americans would use to describe their national leaders.

A CBS News/New York Times poll in early February found 81 percent saying it's time to elect new people to Congress, with just 8 percent saying most members deserve reelection.

These are anemic numbers, even for Washington. The antiestablishment fervor has many consequenc-

es: —The once-dismissed loose confederation of "tea party" activists opposed to big government, bailouts and higher taxes is causing heartburn for establishment candidates across the country.

—Republican Scott Brown won the seat long held by Sen. Ted Kennedy after promising to change Washington's ways.

—Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison lost a GOP primary fight to Texas Gov. Rick Perry. Forced to choose between two incumbents, Texas voters sided heavily against the one who works in Washington.

No stranger to the politics of change, Obama is trying to find his footing in an unfriendly landscape. And so there he was Wednesday, spinning his White House service into an anti-Washington crusade.

Obama said: "I spent seven hours at a summit where Democrats and Republicans engaged the public in substantive discussion about health care."

The spin: He is uniting a divided capital.

Obama said: "So now is the time to make a decision about how to finally reform health care so that it works, not just for the insurance companies, but for America's families and businesses."

The spin: He's not beholden to special interest groups like the rest of Washington.

Obama said: "I'll leave it to others to sift through the politics. Because that's not what this is about. That's not why we're here."

The spin: He's above politics. He's not part of that mess in Washington.

And, finally, Obama said his health care plan "incorporates the best ideas from Democrats and Republicans — including some of the ideas that Republicans offered during the health care summit."

The spin: He's a get-it-done public servant, not a Washington ideologue.

It wasn't always this

way. For many decades, Washington was a town politicians proudly called their own — the pinnacle of their profession. But as the public's faith in government started its long decline in the 1960s, presidents and other politicians began distancing themselves from the nation's capital. Reagan's election in 1980 made anti-Washington rhetoric a cliché for future presidents.

Indeed, the cornerstone of Obama's campaign was his promise to make Washington work for the public. But the burdens of governing have largely stifled his "change we can believe in" agenda.

A month ago, while scrambling to recover from Brown's election, Obama warned lawmakers that voters will punish them in November if they fail to fix health care.

"If Congress decides we're not going to do it, even after all the facts are laid out, all the options are clear, then the American people can make a judgment as to whether this Congress has done the right thing for them or not," he said.

Note that Obama referred to the Democratic-led Congress as "this Congress" as if it weren't part of the political structure that he's leading. Was he distancing himself from a Democratic Congress? It seemed so.

"They are waiting for us to act," Obama said Wednesday. "They are waiting for us to lead. And as long as I hold this office, I intend to provide that leadership."

And as long as he lives in Washington, Obama is likely to run against it.

Harvesters split Friday's games in Snyder Tourney
