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
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City seeks grant for park cameras

for camera surveillance, according the Pampa's police chief. The Pampa City

funding from the state Commission approved cameras in the city's parks. a resolution Tuesday for Police Chief Kelly Rushing to apply for a grant from the governor's office for



The governor's office is offering \$21,208 in criminal justice grants to cities in the state. Rushing is hoping to get \$21,208 in matching funds from the Pampa Economic **Development** Corporation for a total of \$42,416. He said the grant for which he's applying requires a 50

percent match of funding. "We had been talking before this about some ways to enhance the safety and security in our parks," Rushing said.

He said there have been problems in specific places in the city parks with vandalism, disorderly conduct and suspicious activity.

"We had suspected sex offenders, predators, in the park area," Rushing said.

He also pointed to a drowning and a near drowning at Recreation Park.

We've been discussing ways we could enhance the security out there," he said.

Rushing said he hopes to use a criminal justice grant available from the governor's office to install cameras in at least three of the city's parks.

"After speaking with rep-

Montgomery named rabies

resentatives of the PRPC (Panhandle Regional Planning Commission)," Rushing said, "they thought we should go ahead and apply for grant funding in order to place some surveillance cameras in certain areas.'

He said the city was considering placing the cameras at Recreation Park, Central Park around the skateboard area and at the Super Playground.

If the city is able to get the grant, Rushing said he would like to have enough money to also install cameras at the new aquatic center when it's built.

Rushing explained that the cameras would be set up with an internet connection that would allow officers to keep an eye on the parks from the police station at city hall.

"It would provide a valuable resource in the event of any kind of an incident," he said.

The police department could record video footage of any problems.

The grants for which the city is applying will be awarded in July or August for Fiscal Year 2011.

Continental will cancel flights before fines

DALLAS (AP) - Continental Airlines plans to cancel flights rather than risk stiff fines under new federal rules designed to punish carriers for delaying passengers. CEO Jeff Smisek said Tuesday the result will be that passengers will have more trouble getting to their destinations. Under a federal rule taking effect next

month, airlines can be fined up to \$27,500 per passenger if planes are delayed three hours and passengers can't get off.

Pampa City The Commission amended two ordinances, authorized a submission for a governor's grant, tasked a city employee with more responsibility and approved the sale of 10 tax delinquent properties.

The commission named Monty Montgomery the local rabies control officer during their first meeting of the month Tuesday afternoon. There have been several outbreaks of rabies across the state in the last few months, including a recent report of rabies in a domestic cat in Lubbock.

Montgomery, the city's

animal control executive, said his department is already taking steps in controlling the disease.

The city commission also adopted a resolution supporting a grant proposal by Police Chief Kelly Rushing for Pampa parks. The grant through the governor's office would be used for surveillance cameras. The funding would come from a \$21,208 state grant and a matching \$21,208 from the City of Pampa or the Pampa Economic Development Corporation.

HOUSTON (AP) - A Texas judge who came under criticism for his ruling declaring the death penalty unconstitutional took back his controversial decision on Tuesday.

However, Judge Kevin Fine said he still wants more information on whether the state's death penalty statute is unconstitutional because it allows for the possible execution of an innocent person. The Democrat who is heavily tattooed and says he's a recovering alcoholic and former cocaine user, is a state district judge in the county that sends more inmates to death row than any other in the nation.

An attorney for Green did not immediately return a telephone call seeking comment.

A court hearing in the case had been set for Wednesday, when Fine was expected to rule on prosecutors' motions to have him reconsider his decision or to still proceed with the trial as a death

penalty case. Tuesday's hearing was called at the last minute.

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott last week called Fine's ruling one of "unabashed judicial activism." Perry also slammed it, saying he supports the death penalty as do the majority of people in Texas.


Last year, the state executed 24 people, including six cases from Harris County. Three people have been executed so far this year, none from Harris County.

AP-GfK Poll: Obama more popular than Congr

WASHINGTON (AP) -Americans have come to detest Congress ever more deeply as it nears the end of a nasty fight over health care. But more than half still back President Barack Obama, a bright spot for a Democratic Party counting on its leader to help stave off expected losses in elections this fall.

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The latest Associated Press-GfK poll found that fewer people approve of Congress than at any point in Obama's presidency. Support has dropped significantly since January to; a dismal 22 percent as the health care debate has roiled Capitol Hill. Neither Republicans nor Democrats are safe; half of all people say they want to fire their congressman.

Conversely, Obama's job-performance standing is holding fairly steady at 53 percent. And over the past two months, the Democrat has gained ground on national security issues, specifically the subsiding Iraq war and the escalating Afghanistan war, as he has spent most of his time - at least publicly - on domestic matters like the economy and health care. On those issues, he still has the support of about half the people.

"I agree with what Obama is trying to do, but nobody is listening to him," said Grace Pope of Waterville, Maine. But this 75-year-old Democrat added, "I don't think that the Congress is doing anything.'

Such sentiments and the survey's results make clear that Obama remains far more popular than House and Senate members as he leads a Democratic Party facing a volatile electionyear environment that, so

far, seems to be trending in Republicans' favor. Judging by his standing at this point, Obama seems to be an asset for his rank and file.

But, given the fickleness of this electorate, the uncertainty of the health care debate and the stubbornly high unemployment rate, the president could just as quickly turn into a liability. His own clout will be on the line in the first midterm elections of his presidency. And the outcome is certain to shape the remainder of his first term, if not his likely re-election bid in 2012.

For now, it's unclear just how much Obama can do to prevent midterm election shellackings. Democrats lost recent statewide elections in Massachusetts, New Jersey and Virginia even though he campaigned for them. Presidents typically lose House and Senate seats in their first midterm elections. And the party in power usually bears the brunt of voters' ire when the country is in turmoil.

Thus, another of the poll's findings may not bode well for Obama and his Democrats: A clear majority of Americans -56 percent - now say the country is headed in the wrong direction.

Benny Democrat Newman of Tulsa, Okla., laid the blame for the nation's ills on both Obama and the Democraticcontrolled Congress.

"Just bundle them in the same bag," said Newman, who at 79 just lost a job with a local public school district because of budget woes. "I don't think either one of them is interested in the general public. ... They're always stalling,

playing politics, trying to jockey for a better position for their own re-election."

In recent weeks, Obama has increasingly blamed the ways of Washington for a lack of progress on his agenda - even though he's in the White House and his party is leading Congress. The disparity between his popularity and Congress' shows his pitch may just be working.

Obama's overall standing hasn't really moved since January. Neither have his ratings on health care and the economy.

But his marks have jumped on Iraq and Afghanistan. More than half of people approve of how he's handling the wars, with 55 percent backing him on Iraq and 57 percent supporting him on Afghanistan. That's compared with 49 percent for each two months ago. The new poll was taken during weekend elections in Iraq, where a U.S. troop drawdown is under way, and in the midst of a buildup in Afghanistan, as the U.S. notches victories in rooting out suspected terrorists.

By comparison, Congress' approval rating has dropped 10 percentage points since January, perhaps an indication that people are blaming lawmakers more than the president for gridlock that has paralyzed Washington on a host of fronts.

Half said they wanted to elect someone other than their current congressman; only 40 percent wanted to re-elect their lawmaker.

"I don't think anybody up there is doing a good job. ... We need to get rid of them all and institute term limits," said Republican John Campbell, 52, of Del Rio, Texas, a warden at a federal detention center. He castigated Washington as full of "cronies" and Congress as a "bunch of entitled prima donnas."

"Washington," he said, "is broke."

As poor as the ratings are for Congress in general, people seem slightly more unhappy with Republicans than Democrats - another bit of potentially good news for Obama's party.


Just 30 percent approve of how Republicans in Congress are doing their jobs compared with 36 percent for Democrats.

Republicans still trail Democrats on the question of who should win control of Congress come November; 44 percent say Democrats, 38 percent say Republicans.

And the GOP has a slight disadvantage on two issues that voters deem among the most important - the economy and health care.

Still, Democrats are vulnerable, and perhaps nothing illustrates that vulnerability better than this: By 67 percent to 59 percent, more independents disapprove of Democrats in Congress than disapprove of Republicans. This matters because independents usually determine who wins elections. And they have been moving away from Democrats, after heavily supporting them in 2006 and 2008.

The AP-GfK Poll was conducted March 3-8, 2010, by GfK Roper Public Affairs & Media. It involved landline and cell phone interviews with 1,002 adults nationwide, and had a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 4.2 percentage points.

Toyota says sales rise 50 percent from last March

ERLANGER, Ky. (AP) -A high-ranking Toyota executive says the automaker's North American sales spiked around 50 percent the first eight days of March as incentives helped lure customers after a series of embarrassing safety recalls.

Don Esmond, senior vice president of automotive operation for Toyota Motor Sales, says that the early numbers surpassed the company's expectations.

Esmond says there is pentup demand from buyers who didn't shop for cars during last year's economic downturn. He also credits new sales incentives enacted this month, including 0 percent financing offers for eight Toyota models.

Cussing and other legislative issues

"Ah, yes, you speak of a resolution the California State Assembly passed recently to make the first week of March 'Cuss-Free Week.' It embraced the idea from a teenager who had formed a No Cussing Club in 2007 at his school."

"But considering what California's overzealous politicians have done to their state -- spending, high taxes, high unemployment -- cursing is one of the few occupations Californians have left!"

"You make a fair point. With a \$20 billion deficit in the state's budget -- and many of the state's lawmakers still living in denial about cuts that need to be made -- some argue there are more important matters to deal with. The California Senate decided to shelve the resolution until the budget is dealt with." they are stressed, broke and worried about the future. Texas ed board set to take 1st vote since primary

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) Texas' state education board, rocked by primary elections that may push the influential panel's far-right leanings toward the center, is set to take its first vote on a new social studies curriculum that could reverberate in classrooms nationwide.

The board - long led by social conservatives who have advocated for ideas such as teaching Texas children more about the weaknesses of evolutionary theory - has worked on, and squabbled about, the social studies standards for months. The board's ultimate decisions affect the textbook content around the country because Texas is one of publishers' big-

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A three-day meeting beginning today is the first since voters in last week's Republican primary handed defeats to two veteran conservatives, including former board chairman Don McLeroy, who lost to a moderate GOP lobbyist. Two other conservatives - a Republican and a Democrat - did not seek re-election. All four terms end in January.

McLeroy, a 10-year board veteran, has been one of the most prolific and polarizing members. The devout Christian conservative has been adamant on several issues, including that the Christian influences of the nation's Founding Fathers are important to studying American history. "I think there'll be lots

of amendments ... a lot of media attention, and it's important," McLeroy said of the meeting, adding that his 'lame-duck status won't affect his approach. "Our country is divided on how we see things and these things really come into sharp focus, especially with history and how you present it to your children."

The 15-member board is expected this week to finish debating social studies, history and economics curriculum before taking a preliminary vote. The final vote is expected in May. Aside from the Founding Fathers' beliefs, debate could flare over issues such as border security and how much children will study the impact of government regulation on the free enterprise system.

Amendments were debated late into the night during the board's last meeting, in January, when members smoothed over early clashes about how much prominence to give civil rights leader Cesar Chavez and whether Christmas should be in the curriculum.

In Texas alone, the board's decisions will set guideposts for teaching history and social studies to some 4.8 million K-12 students during the next 10 years. The last public meeting drew a long line of personal pleas, including Hispanic activists who asked that more Latinos be in the standards and conservatives who complained of too much emphasis was being given to historic figures' race and ethnicity.
