of St. Matthew's Episcopal Church is hoping to help an old musical tradition find new life in the Pampa community.



With the national economy still sluggish, a Pampa girl has decided to serve her country and take advantage of the

schooling it offers. "With the economy right now," said Amanda Harkins, "it's like 'serve your country or die.

Harkins, 19, graduated from Pampa High School in December 2008, a semester early.

"But I still walked across the stage at graduation in May of 2009," she smiled.

She was awarded a scholarship, but is was only for one semester. With few jobs available as the nation works its way through a recession, Harkins turned to the military.

Born in Ada, Okla., Harkins grew up in Pampa, attending Austin Elementary, Wilson Elementary, Pampa Junior High School and Pampa High School.

"I've been here my whole life," she said. "I went to elementary school, middle school and high school here."

Initially, she had talked with a Navy recruiter

"At first, I wanted to go into the Navy," Harkins said, "but they told me it would be a six-month wait before I




University in Springfield, Ohio, with a Bachelor of Arts in Writing. He is an avid reader and writer and a snowboarding enthusiast.



Gangs suspected in consulate killings

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Mexico (AP) Suspected drug gang hit men separately ambushed two cars carrying families with ties to the U.S. consulate in this violent border city, killing an American couple and a Mexican man. Three young children survived, although two suffered wounds.

The slayings came amid a surge in bloodshed along Mexico's border with Texas and drew condemnation from the White House. Mexico's president expressed outrage and promised a fast investigation to find those responsible.

Mexican authorities put suspicion on a gang of hit men allied with the Juarez drug cartel based on "information exchanged with U.S. federal agencies," according to a statement Sunday from the joint mission of soldiers and federal police overseeing security in Ciudad Juarez.

But police offered no information on a possible motive in the slayings. U.S. State Department spokesman Fred Lash said only that the three dead people were at the same party before the attacks that occurred minutes apart Saturday afternoon.

The U.S. consulate in Ciudad Juarez, shut for Monday's Mexican national holiday, also will be closed on Tuesday as "a way for the community to mourn the loss" of the victims, said consulate spokesman Silvio Gonzalez. It was the second U.S. border consulate closed because of violence in the last month. The consular office in Reynosa, across from McAllen, Texas closed for several days in late February because of gun battles in the area.

Several U.S. citizens have been killed in Mexico's drug war, most of them people with family ties to Mexico. It is very rare for American government employees to be targeted, although attackers hurled grenades at the U.S. consulate in the northern city of Monterrey in 2008.

The atmosphere of violence in Juarez had been creeping closer to U.S. offices for some time: on Friday, the consulate put a bar just around the block from its office off limits to U.S. government personnel "due to security concerns."

The State Department authorized U.S. government employees at Ciudad Juarez and five other U.S. consulates in northern Mexico to send family members out of the area because of concerns about rising drug violence. The cities are Tijuana, Nogales, Nuevo Laredo, Monterrey and Matamoros.

exas man held for attempted gun buy

McALLEN, Texas (AP) A south Texas man is in purchase 10 fully automatic machine guns from an undercover federal agent for delivery to Mexico.

Joel Santos, a 23-year-old from Mission, was arrested Thursday and charged with conspiring to receive a firearm not registered to him.

Gustavo Chavez Delamora, a Mexican citizen, was arrested on the same charge.

The U.S. Attorney's Office says Santos delivered federal custody on gun charges after attempting to \$12,000 in exchange for the guns to an undercover agent from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco. Firearms and Explosives. Santos allegedly paid an additional \$6,000 for 15 handguns.

Continental Airlines to charge for meals

Continental Airlines is ending free hamburgers, barbecue and sandwich rolls for many of its passengers in favor of a foodfor-sale program that mirrors what other carriers are already doing.

A spokesman said Monday that the airline, based in Houston, expects a \$35 million annual benefit, from cost savings and added revenue.

Delta Air Lines, American Airlines, US Airways and United Airlines are among carriers that already charge for

food on flights. Continental passengers some international routes, on domestic flights over six hours and those who sit in first or business class on routes worldwide will continue to get free food. Snacks like pretzels and nonalcoholic drinks will continue to be offered for free.

The changes takes effect in the fall. Menu choices and prices will be disclosed later.

Air travelers have seen a steady erosion of ameni-

ATLANTA (AP) ΓÇö ties included in the price of their ticket over the last two years or so, from checked bags to pillows and blankets on board. Airlines call it unbundling the product, allowing them to offer lower base fares and only charge extra for people who want more. But with so many add-on fees these days, a traveler could end up paying more when everything is added together than what they previously paid for an all-inclusive ticket.

Some travelers have been packing lighter or carrying more on board flights to avoid checked bag fees. Likewise, some bring their own food on flights to avoid paying for meals.

Continental, which has about 900 daily mainline flights, said its food-forsale program is about offering passengers more choices.

Currently, Continental flights lasting less than two hours usually have a free beverage service with a small snack like pretzels. Flights of two to three hours offer a small sandwich roll, or a muffin in the morning. Flights over three hours currently offer a free hot sandwich or other hot meal, or cereal in the morning.

While free food was a nice point of distinction for Continental, we could not provide the same caliber of food on that basis that we can under a food-for-sale program, spokesman Dave Messin



State offers assistance to encourage young

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -Texas has added its own grants to an existing federal low-interest loan program to encourage beginning farmers.

The state's Young Farmer Grant program is funded by fees from farm license plates and aims to help farmers from ages 18 to 46 start or expand their agricultural businesses

According to the Sunday edition of the Austin American-Statesman, Agriculture Todd Commissioner Staples issued the first grants from the program last month. A total of \$100,000 in matching grants went to 13 young farmers who put up \$10,000 of their own money. New applications

will be taken next month.

The program aims to encourage more young people to take up farming at a time when more than 80 percent of the state's farmers are older than age 45, Staples said.

The Farm Service Agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture has managed a similar loan program at the federal level since 1992.

High startup costs and few financing options discourage careers in agriculture, he said.

"A safe, abundant and affordable food supply is the foundation of our economic security, and we have a serious issue arising," he said.

Startup costs make it "virtually impossible" for young people to begin a viable farming or ranching operation, said Si Cook, director of organization for the Texas Farm Bureau.

"It's hard to convince a lender that a young person is a good risk," he said.

One of the first to receive the state grants was Brenton Johnson, 37, who used the money to buy seed and fertilizer for his organic farm in Austin.

He said he started the farm five years ago with a 30-by-50-foot "backyard garden," then added 20 acres in 2006 and committed to buy 40 more acres about 15 miles east of downtown Austin last June.He says the growth would have been impos-sible without the federal

grant program, loaned him \$600,000 to buy land and equipment at a low interest rate with no money down.
