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

Martindale honored by CASA

Family has always been important to J.A. "Gene" Martindale. Last week he was recognized for his concern.

The Pampa lawyer was recognized last week by CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) for his work representing children in court with difficult fam-

ily situations.

CASA officials reported that there are about 780,000 children across the nation that are caught up in court and child welfare cases each year because they are unable to live safely at home.

Martindale was given an award from the Amarillo Area CASA Program for the Ad-litem of the Year.

PIPELINE PROGRESS City crews lay down pipe for new water park

City of Pampa crews were busy this week on what will become the city's new aquatic park.

As Lee Bolton, the city's water department foreman, and his crews proceeded with laying underground pipe at the cite, contractors across the nation were busy readying their bids for the project.

"We'd gone out for bids for the pool contract," said Shane Stokes, assistant city manager.

The bids, he said, are expected to be opened May 4 and awarded by the Pampa City Commission at their May 11 meeting.

In the meantime, the city's water department is laying water lines into the vacant field that will house the park. Existing water lines in the area, said Jildardo Arias of Pampa's engineering department, will be upgraded from four-inch mains to six-inch mains.

Six-inch water mains will also be installed around the park, he said, along Randy Matson on the north, Somerville on the west and Harvester on the south.

Stokes said the contracts to begin work on the aquatic center should be let by the end of May.

The target date for completion of the project is April, 2011, with a grand opening scheduled for May, 2011.

"One thing for sure," said Pampa City Manager Richard Morris, "it's a major project."

Arias said the project has drawn the interest from contractors across the nation. "It's a pretty good sized public works project," Morris said.

It will be the biggest water park in the area, he added.

"It will be a showcase park," Stokes said.

Anne Davidson and Deborah Chambers of the White Deer Land Museum will have a new book out next week.

"Pampa," part of the "Images of America" series, is a 132page book published by Arcadia Publishing showing a history of the city

The pictorial history of the city begins with Red River Indian War of 1874, which effectively ended the reign of the Native American tribes on the Southern Plains and opened the Texas Panhandle to settlement. This led to the railroad coming through in 1888 and the establishment of the White Deer Land Company by an English syndicate. There office building at 116 South Cuyler now serve at the county's museum.

The new book traces the founding of Pampa and the changes in the area economy from cattle to wheat to oil.

The book features historical photos of Gray County, many from the archives of *The*



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



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## Mayor designates April as 'Sexual Assault Awareness Month' in Pampa

Last week, Pampa Mayor Lonny Robbins signed a proclamation observing April Sexual Assault Awareness and Prevention Month, a practice that has become an annual tradition for the city.


The proclamation signing was done in conjunction with the Tralee Crisis Center and witnessed by Tralee volunteer coordinator Cinthia Cordova.

According to the Crisis Center's Dee Dee Laramore, the yearly proclamation is a sign that the city of Pampa recognizes the ongoing need to bring the issue of sexual assault further into light.

"We've had wonderful cooperation with the city on it every year," said Laramore. "The mayor has been especially helpful. I think that he's a strong believer in the cause of sexual assault awareness and he understands the importance of what we're doing."

While Sexual Assault Awareness Month is a national observance, Laramore said that the purpose of the annual proclamation in Pampa is to underscore that sexual assault is a local as well as a national issue. Last year, in its eight-county service area — Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley, Gray, Hemphill, Roberts and Wheeler — Tralee provided services to 453 sexual assault victims. Of that total, 110 were new clients.

"The whole purpose (of the proclamation) is to help people understand that it is a problem," she said. "Awareness brings change. We need to educate more people so that, if we can't end the issue (of sexual assault), we can at least make it less of a problem by not standing by and letting it happen."



Highlights in history on this date:

1521 - Spanish rebels are defeated at Villalar, Spain, and leaders of anti-Hapsburg movement are

1617 - Concino Concini, Marquis d'Angre, is assassinated by order of France's King Louis XIII, and Charles d'Albert, Duke of Luynes, takes charge of government of France.

1671 - Defeated Cossack rebel leader Stenka Razin is captured by loyalist Cossacks in Russia and turned over to the czar's forces.

1704 - The first regularly issued American newspaper starts publication.

1792 - Claude-Joseph Rouget de Lisle composes France's national anthem, La Marseillaise.

1990 - The U.S. space shuttle Discovery takes the Hubble Space Telescope into orbit.

1991 - South African government announces it will uphold agreement with African National Congress to free all political prisoners by April 30.

1992 - OPEC nations reject a demand by Iran for increased production. 1993 - Commandos break into a cockpit of a com-

mandeered Indian Airlines plane in Amritsar, India, shoot dead the lone hijacker and free all 141 people

1994 - Cuban exiles are received by President Fidel Castro, the man some have long wanted to overthrow.

1997 - Islamist militants armed with sabers and axes strike two villages in Algeria, butchering 47 people in a pre-election terror wave that leaves an estimated 420 dead in a few weeks. 1998 - In front of a cheering crowd, 22 Rwandans

convicted of genocide are executed by firing squad 1999 - A car bomb explodes in one of London's

biggest Bangladeshi communities, injuring seven people. A racist group claims responsibility. 2001 - A jury is chosen in the murder trial of a former Ku Klux Klansman charged 38 years after

## Blue ribbons symbolize Child Abuse Awareness Month

Ribbons are no longer just for decorative trim on clothing. They have become one way to symbolize an event or group.

There are the original cloth ribbons, cut into appropriate lengths and looped over once, that can be pinned to clothing. Then someone came up with the idea of magnetized ribbons that can be placed on vehicles. Ribbon stickers and decals became available.

Along with the growing popularity of ribbons as emblems came the color choices. Each event or group chose a particular color of ribbon for their purposes. Pink, red and yellow were some of the first colors to be chosen.

Blue became the color of choice for Child Abuse Why Awareness Month. blue?

"Blue serves as a constant reminder to me to fight for protection for our children," said Bonnie Finney, a Virginia grandmother who in 1989 tied a blue ribbon to the antenna of her van "to make people wonder."

"It had been so long since I sat by my grandson's side in the hospital," Finney said. "Of course, I knew something was wrong as I sat there. I saw fear on his face, the bruises on his body, and the healing cigarette burns on his hands. His doctor did not believe my daughter's story that he fell in slippery water in the

After his release from the hospital, Finney's grandson was placed in foster care for three weeks. He was then returned to his mother, at which point he cried, Finney said.

"I ached for this dilemma, but I was not physically able to care for him," she said.

The ordeal was not over. "I never saw him again," Finney said of her grandson. "My 16-month-old granddaughter was hospitalized after being beaten severely. Her leg was broken in four places and her hand was burned from the tip of her little fingers to her wrist.

candidates from the party, how can it attract moderates and independents? Do those voters, already the most likely to be turned off by politics, simply stay home? Or do they turn out for independent candidates, making the two-party structure less relevant?

Neither result would be good for the Republicans.

Still, party politics is hardly the only issue likely to sway votes in the fall. The economy is at the top of most voters' lists.

And the Democrats face their own nasty Senate primary in Arkansas, where moderate Sen. Blanche Lincoln is trying to fend off union-backed Lt. Gov. Bill Halter. And in North Carolina, a labor group angry at moderate House Democrats over their health care votes has formed a third party although they are struggling to get candidates on the ballot.

But those largely are isolated cases.

The Republican moderate-conservative feuds have been fierce for quite a while, long before the emergence of the tea party movement. Last spring, moderate Sen. Arlen Specter bolted from the party as he faced a conservative challenge in Pennsylvania.

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"I have found myself increasingly at odds with the Republican philosophy and more in line with the philosophy of the Democratic Party," Specter

"I have found myself spectrum. Right now, this party is very conservative. And there's good reasons for this party to be conservative," said Sen. George LeMieux, Crist's former

said when he switched. Joe Sestak is opposing him for the Democratic nomination in the May 18 primary.

No race epitomizes the Republican fracture more than the ugly Florida contest between Rubio, who has been embraced by conservatives and tea party activists, and Crist, a moderate considered for the party presidential ticket in 2008.

Crist has dropped from favored Republican with a hefty lead in polls to Republican outcast in a race that shows no signs of tightening. Polls suggest Crist could win as an independent in a three-way race. Rep. Kendrick Meek is the likely Democratic nominee.

Now Crist says he's being "very, very thoughtful and deliberate" as he considers an independent run.

National Republicans are pressuring him to quit rather than run as an independent: Rep. Eric Cantor, the second-ranking Republican in the House, said Tuesday: "Marco Rubio is just the type of leader our country needs."

"The Republican Party, like the Democratic Party, goes through phases where it re-identifies itself and repositions itself somewhere on the conservative spectrum. Right now, this party is very conservative. And there's good reasons for this party to be conservative," said Sen. George Lewiseux, Crist's former

chief of staff. LeMieux was appointed by Crist to fill the seat until a successor was chosen.

Arizona Sen. John McCain, a four-term senator with an independent streak who was the party's presidential nominee just two years ago, is in a tough primary battle against former Rep. J.D. Hayworth, a conservative talk-radio host embraced by Tea Party activists.

And one of the most conservative members of Congress, Sen. Robert Bennett of Utah, is facing a serious challenge from his right. His vote for President George W. Bush's bank bailout drawing the wrath of conservatives.

Republicans succeeded when they backed a moderate in Massachusetts earlier this year as Scott Brown captured Sen. Edward M. Kennedy's Senate seat.

But last November the intraparty split cost the party a House seat in New York that it had held for decades.

In New York's 23rd congressional district, the nominee hand-picked by party leaders, Dede Scozzafava, dropped out of the race after a fierce challenge by conservative Doug Hoffman. Both remained on the ballot and split the Republican vote, which allowed Democrat Bill Owens to narrowly win the upstate New York seat Republicans had held for decades.

Democrats, too, have battle scars from past ideological party fights and years in the political wilderness, reflected by liberal George McGovern's failed presidential bid in 1972.

The 2006 elections were a high-water mark for the Democrats' recognition of big tent politics. The party recruited conservative and moderate Democrats who better fit their constituents' viewpoints in conservative-leaning states.

Still, Connecticut Sen. Joe Lieberman was re-elected that year as an independent after losing the Democratic primary to liberal Ned Lamont. The race showed that the Democratic Party tug-of-war still can flare up, but it was largely an aberration.

Democrats seized control of the House and Senate, and in 2008, they added to their numbers for comfortable majorities.

This year, despite attempts by some liberals to challenge moderate Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand in New York, Democratic Party leaders and the White House successfully cleared the field to ensure the vulnerable senator wouldn't face a primary challenge.

ODESSA, Texas (AP) - A former youth jail administrator convicted of sexually abusing a teenage inmate faces up to 20 years in prison in a case that ignited a statewide scandal over the treatment of young offenders.

Ray Edward Brookins was convicted Thursday of two counts each of having an improper sexual activity with a person in custody and having an improper relationship between an educator and student.

Brookins, a former assistant superintendent of the Texas Youth Commission's West Texas State School in Pyote, was accused of having a sexual relationship in 2005 with a then-18-year-old inmate.

Brookins is one of two former school administrators accused of sexually abusing teenage inmates. Several top agency officials have resigned, and former principal John Paul Hernandez awaits trial.

In all, authorities believe at least 13 boys were sexually abused. The case led to accusations of a cover-up and reports exposing lax medical care, youth beatings and a culture of retaliation against whistle blowers, and eventually law-makers ordered an overhaul of the system.

Following the verdict, the sentencing phase of the trial began. A former state inmate testified that Brookins had a sexual relationship with him at a state prison in the 1990s. The inmate, who was 28 at the time, told jurors he felt coerced to have oral and anal sex with Brookins

because Brookins was a captain at the prison and could provide him with protection from other inmates.

A former TYC inmate from Pyote testified that Brookins made sexual advances toward him while he was an inmate at the Pyote jail.

Testimony was expected to continue Friday.

The former inmate Brookins' was accused of abusing testified earlier in the week that Brookins sexually molested him at night in his office. He said Brookins performed sexual acts on him while displaying pornography. He isn't being named because The Associated Press generally does not identify victims of sexual abuse.

Defense attorney Rick Navarrete told jurors the former inmate has two robbery convictions on his record and continues to have trouble with the law.

## Pampa's Warner earns coveted 'Life Master' bridge honor

Not many people can say that they've ever made it to the top of their game. John Warner has just joined the exclusive club.

Warner, a Pampa attorney, was recently recognized by the Pampa Duplicate Bridge Club for achieving the rank of Life Master, a high honor in the world of bridge.

"It feels good to be (a Life Master)," said Warner. "If I remember right, there are only two other people in Pampa who are Life Masters (Gloria Casey and Mary Smith). There aren't many people who ever achieve it."

To become a Life Master of the American Contract Bridge League, a player must accumulate a minimum of 300 master points, including 25 gold points, 25 red points, 50 silver points and 200 black points. Gold, red and silver points are generally earned in sectional, regional or national tournaments.

Warner, whose mother, Janet, teamed with Clarice Holt to become a United States Women's Pairs Champion in 1962, began playing bridge in college. While Warner often played with his mother in the 1980s (during which he earned his first 50 master points), he did not play duplicate bridge again until the fall of 2007.

Warner said that, after bridge colleague Joe Davis talked him into picking the cards back up that year, earning the Life Master honor surfaced as a goal.

"It was on the back of my mind," Warner said. "Joe Davis talked me back into it. He got me involved, and you could say that I became hooked. The rest is history."

Since bridge is a team game, Warner thanked all of his partners over the years to help him achieve the Life Master rank.

"I have been fortunate to have had many good partners help me achieve this goal," Warner said. "Joe Davis, Gloria Casey and Mary Smith of Pampa all partnered with me to earn silver points in tournaments in Amarillo.

"Tommy Burch of Borger helped me fulfill my gold point requirements in Ruidoso. Mark Pederson of Canyon played with me in tournaments in Lubbock and Amarillo, and then put me over the top with the remaining red points I needed in a tournament in Alburquerque. I could not have achieved this honor without their help."

### Forensic panel to review arson case

IRVING (AP) - A state forensics panel on Friday assigned four of its members to review the arson case that resulted in the execution of Cameron Todd Willingham, who was convicted of killing his three children.

In a report prepared last year for the Texas Forensic Science Commission, fire expert Craig Beyler found fault in the investigation that led to Willingham's conviction. But in September, two days before the commission was to discuss the report and question Beyler, Gov. Rick Perry replaced three of its members, including its chairman.

The new chairman, John Bradley, the Williamson County district attorney, canceled that meeting.

Without Beyler's finding, prosecutors have admitted it would have been hard to win a death sentence against Willingham.

The investigative panel was confirmed Friday at a commission meeting in Irving. It will include Bradley, Fort Worth defense attorney Lance Evans, Tarrant County Medical Examiner Nizam Peerwani and Sarah Kerrigan, a forensic toxicologist and director of a crime lab at Sam Houston State University.

Like Bradley, Evans and Peerwani were appointed to the commission late last year. Kerrigan has been on the commission since 2007.

Although the Willingham case has been under consideration by the commission since 2006, members of the new investigative panel said the inquiry is far from being completed.

Kerrigan said little has been done besides soliciting Beyler's report.

'We've only just begun to put together the pieces we will need to investigate properly," she said.

During Friday's meeting, Bradley initially said Kerrigan would not be serving on the investigative panel because of personal issues and appointed Evans to replace her. However, at Evans' suggestion, the panel was expanded to four members and Kerrigan agreed to stay on.

But there is little out there for men who have been or are being abused. — MINNESOTA READER

And while male victims may be embarrassed to disclose it, men can be victims of domestic violence,

Snelgrooes said the Longhorns were able to get extra base hits and his team's play on defense didn't help.



#### Arizona governor signs immigration enforcement bill Earlier Friday, Obama in late July or early August.

PHOENIX (AP) Gov. Jan Brewer ignored criticism from President Barack Obama on Friday and signed into law a bill supporters said would take handcuffs off police in dealing with illegal immigration in Arizona, the nation's gateway for human and drug smuggling.

With hundreds of protesters outside the state Capitol shouting that the bill would lead to civil rights abuses, Brewer said critics were "overreacting" and that she wouldn't tolerate racial profiling.

"We in Arizona have been more than patient waiting for Washington to act," Brewer said after signing the law. "But decades of inaction and misguided policy have created a dangerous and unacceptable

called the Arizona bill "misguided" and instructed the Justice Department to examine it to see if it's legal. He also said the federal government must enact immigration reform at the national level — or leave the door open to "irresponsibility by others.' "That includes, for exam-

ple, the recent efforts in Arizona, which threaten to undermine basic notions of fairness that we cherish as Americans, as well as the trust between police and their communities that is so crucial to keeping us safe," Obama said.

The legislation, sent to the Republican governor by the GOP-led Legislature, makes it a crime under state law to be in the country illegally. It also requires local police officers to question

people about their immigration status if there is reason to suspect they are illegal immigrants, allows lawsuits against government agencies that hinder enforcement of immigration laws, and make it illegal to hire illegal immigrants for day labor or knowingly transport them.

The Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund said it plans a legal challenge to the law, arguing it "launches Arizona into a spiral of pervasive fear, community distrust, increased crime and costly litigation, with nationwide repercussions."

Brewer ordered the state's law enforcement licensing agency to develop a training course on how to implement the law while respecting civil rights.

Anti-immigrant anger has swelled in the past month, after rancher Rob Krentz was found dead on his land north of Douglas, near the Mexico border. Authorities believe he was fatally shot by an illegal immigrant possibly connected to a drug smuggling cartel.

## Groups lobby on Day of Prayer

To pray or not to pray?

That's the issue government leaders across the country are facing after a federal judge ruled that the National Day of Prayer set for May 6 was unconstitutional.

The ruling can't take effect until all appeals are exhausted, but that's not stopping atheists and prayer advocates from firing off letters, e-mails and even planning to put up billboards to convince state and local leaders across the country to see things their

Nothing's changing in Topeka, Kan., says Mayor Bill Bunten.

"Some of these judges have lost their way," Bunten said. "Every day is a day of prayer in most Kansas lives, whether they are Christian or Muslim or Jewish or whatever, and to say that a prayer day is illegal is just ridiculous. That judge better go back and read some history about how this country was formed. Next thing you know we won't be able to sing 'God Bless America."

The ruling raised a furor among religious advocacy groups, who say the day has become an American tradition. And the announcement this week by President Barack Obama's administration that it would appeal galvanized atheists, who are trying to persuade officials not to attend local events. Their campaigns illustrate the persistent tensions over any combination of religion and government.

Congress established a national prayer day in 1952 and in 1988 set the first Thursday in May as the official day for presidents to issue proclamations asking

Americans to pray. Many state and local officials follow suit on that day. Two years ago, the

Madison-based Freedom From Religion Foundation sued the federal government, alleging the day violated the separation of church and state. U.S. District Judge Barbara Crabb ruled April 15 that the day amounts to a call to religious action. She included a caveat, though, that said her ruling would have no effect until all appeals are exhausted.

A day after Crabb's ruling, the Alliance Defense Fund, an Arizona-based group of Christian lawyers, fired off letters to mayors telling them it has no bearing on prayer day activities.

"Public officials should be able to participate in public prayer activities just as America's founders did, and a recent federal judge's ruling does not prevent America's cities from lawfully observing the National Day of Prayer," ADF Senior Legal Counsel Mike Johnson said in a statement.

On Friday, the Madison offices of the Freedom From Religion Foundation a converted rectory now dubbed "The Freethought Hall" - were bustling.

**Employees** prepared letters to governors and the mayors of more than 1,000 cities urging them not to participate in prayer day. They worked under signs that quoted Richard Dawkins ("The God of the Old Testament is arguably the most unpleasant character in all of fiction") and Mark Twain ("Faith is believing what you know ain't so").

They were drafting an online petition where people could urge Obama to

honor Crabb's ruling and "leave days of prayer to individuals, private groups and churches, synagogues, mosques and temples." Annie Laurie Gaylor, one of the foundation's leaders, was putting the finishing touches on a full-page ad for the New York Times.

The foundation also plans to take out billboards promoting the separation of church and state in Colorado Springs, Co., home of the National Day of Prayer Task Force. The signs will read "God and government: A dangerous

"Whether or not we win in court, I want to win in the court of public opinion," said Gaylor. "This law is based on lies and bad history."

John Bornschein, executive director of the National Day of Prayer Task Force, said atheists try to sway government leaders from participating in the prayer day every year, but are being more aggressive. He called such-efforts a waste of money that could go toward the poor.

"We're an office full of patriots," Bornschein said. "To see bickering over these sorts of things, it's not a positive environment for people who need encouragement now more than

Green Bay Mayor Jim Schmitt said he issues a proclamation every year recognizing the prayer day and attends a prayer breakfast with his name on the invitation. Nothing will change this year, he said.

Carl Brewer, mayor of Wichita, Kan., said the city recognizes prayer day every year. Officials often take prayer breaks and read Bible passages at events. He said this year will be no different.

Prayer, he said, "is the foundation of the Midwest."



## Ex-jail official denies abuse of former juvenile inmates

ODESSA (AP) — A former juvenile jail administrator convicted of sexually abusing a teenage inmate denied the charges Friday, speaking out for the first time during the sentencing phase of his trial.

"I have never sexually abused any inmates," said Ray Edward Brookins, the former assistant superintendent of the Texas Youth Commission's West Texas State School in Pyote. "I have never sexually abused anyone."

His comments came during a heated exchange with Assistant Attorney General Ralph Guerrero.

Brookins faces up to 20 years in prison in a case that ignited a statewide scandal over the treatment of young offenders. He was accused of having a sexual relationship with a then-18-year-old inmate.

On Thursday, jurors convicted him of two counts each of having an improper sexual activity with a person in custody and having an improper relationship between an educator and student.

Brookins maintained his innocence Friday, saying on the stand that he resigned from his job shortly after Ranger Brian Burzynski interviewed him in February 2005 only because he had porn on the compound and felt it best to quit.

"I knew there was porn on the facility, I accept that and I resigned," Brookins said.

But Guerrero challenged him and said Brookins left because he knew he had been caught.

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"You knew you had to get the hell out of Dodge, didn't you?" Guerrero said. Brookins replied, "I held myself

accountable by resigning for what I did," referring to the porn he possessed and not any abuse.

Earlier Friday, the former inmate whom Brookins was convicted of abusing said the experience has altered his life forever.

"It's hard for me to open to a woman in a relationship," said the man, now in his 20s and a state prison inmate. "I don't have any friends. I really don't have a relationship with my family, except for my mom."

Another man, also jailed in state prison, told jurors that Brookins masturbated with him after befriending him outside of an Austin mall in 2005. He said he later went to live with Brookins after he was arrested at his school and his drugaddicted mother refused to show up for his juvenile court hearings. The man testified that the abuse continued until he objected to Brookins' request for him to share his bed.

But Brookins dismissed that young man's claims, saying "he's just a real angry kid."

Prosecutors say Brookins abused inmates, adults and juveniles alike, for years. He is one of two former school administrators accused of sexually abusing teenage inmates. Several top agency officials have resigned, and former principal John Paul Hernandez awaits trial.

In all, authorities believe at least 13 boys were sexually abused. The case led to accusations of a cover-up and reports exposing lax medical care, youth beatings and a culture of retaliation against whistle blowers, and eventually lawmakers ordered an overhaul of the system.

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## U.S. Coast Guard suspends search for missing rig workers

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Coast Guard officials on Friday suspended the three-day search for 11 workers missing since an explosion rocked an offshore oil rig, saying they believe the men never made it off the platform that erupted into a giant fireball.

Coast Guard Capt. Peter Troedsson said he spoke with all the workers' families about the decision to suspend the search before announcing it to the media.

"I'm a father and husband, and I have done this a few times before. It's never easy. Your heart goes out to these people," Troedsson said.

The Coast Guard says it will resume the search if any ships in the area see anything, but the workers' chances of survival had seemed slim well before Friday afternoon's announcement. "The time of reasonable expectation of survivability has passed," Rear Adm. Mary Landry said.

What caused Tuesday's massive blast off the Louisiana coast is unknown. As the search was ending, oil company crews were trying to clean up the environmental mess created by the Deepwater Horizon, which finally sank Thursday. The other 115 crew members made it off the platform, though four were critically hurt.

Federal regulators did not need this week's explosion aboard the state-of-the-art rig to know the offshore drilling industry needed new safety rules: Dozens of deaths and hundreds of injuries over the last several years had already convinced them that changes were needed.

The U.S. Minerals and Management Service is developing regulations aimed at preventing human error, which it identified as a factor in many of the more than 1,400 offshore oil drilling accidents between 2001 and 2007.

The Deepwater Horizon was the site of a 2005 fire found to have been caused by human error. An MMS investigation determined that a crane operator on the

rig had become distracted while refueling the crane, allowing diesel fuel to overflow. Records show the fire was quickly contained, but caused \$60,000 in damage to the crane.

An MMS review published last year found 41 deaths and 302 injuries out of 1,443 accidents from 2001 to 2007, the majority of caused by human error and operational and maintenance problems.


As a result of the findings, the MMS is developing new rules that would require rig operators to develop programs focused on preventing human error, an area that hadn't received as much attention in the past. The agency, which has yet to implement the new rules, also proposed audits once every three years.

Environmentalists say that while new technology touted by oil industry executives continues to improve, people still have to oversee those devices and human error remains a widespread problem.

"You can't outlaw human error," Richard Charter, a senior policy adviser with Defenders of Wildlife, who has been involved in drilling issues for 30 years, said of Tuesday's explosion. "It's one of the sidebar issues now emerging for the Horizon incident — these are common incidents and this was just a bigger one."

Opponents of President Barack Obama's plan for more offshore drilling, particularly off the East Coast, say the explosion on the Deepwater Horizon should be taken as a warning to slow the fervor to "drill, baby drill."

"I would hope it would serve as another wake-up call on this issue that there is no such thing as safe oil drilling," said Sara Wan, a member of the California Coastal Commission, a state regulatory agency. "Once that oil starts leaking in the ocean, that damage is irreversible. You just look at what happened with Exxon-Valdez—they're still feeling the effects of it. There's no real way to clean it up."



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
