

Panhandle officials discuss legislation

AMARILLO Municipal and county government officials from across the Texas Panhandle gathered here this week to discuss local governmental concerns.

At the request of Roberts County Judge Vernon Cook, president of the Texas Association of Counties, and Amarillo Mayor Debra Texas Municipal League, the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission hosted the Panhandle Local

Forum at the Amarillo College Business and Industry Center in downtown Amarillo, the site of the old Amarillo High School on Polk Street according to Gary Pitner executive director of the PRPC.

City and county officials, including Pampa City Commissioners Neil Fultor and Robert Dixon, Pampa City Manager Richard Morris and Public Works Director McCartt, president of the Donny Hooper, heard from Frank Sturzl, executive director of the Texas Municipa League; Gene Terry, executive director of the Texas Government Leadership LEGISLATION cont. on page 7

Mock crash in Lefors

Lefors emergency workers pulled Wakely Pairsh from the top of the hood of a crashed car at Main and Sixth in the quiet Gray County community shortly at 11 a.m. vesterday. It was a grisly scene, with medical technicians moving the unconscious young man onto a gurney and wheeling him into an ambulance, his head and arms

stained red with blood. A few hours later, everyone was talking and laughing about it.

The entire gory episode, it turned out, was staged by Lefors Volunteer Fire and

Rescue Department this morning to remind Lefors High School students the dangers they face when they take to the road.

The scene at times bordered on the surreal, as Mike Ray, dressed as the Grim Reaper, stood atop of one of two wrecked cars. He looked silently down at high school student Trever Czubinski, who was lying on the pavement in the intersection.

Other students, wearing artificial strap-on wounds, were in the two wrecked cars as Lefors firefighters and emergency workers, Gray County deputies and Texas Department of Public Safety CRASH cont. on page 2


Another thing, people

Guess who plays the villain?

The massive oil-rig explosion off the coast of Louisiana has set off the usual round of finger-pointing. It's British Petroleum's fault, President Obama and members of his administration keep repeating, and the oil company will pay. But we need the federal

the oil company will pay. But we need the federal government to help solve the problem, say the governors on the ground, and to make sure that BP delivers on the damages.

There's more than a little irony in the fact that the gulf-state governors—Republicans all—are calling on Washington for help. These are states currently suing the federal government over the healthcare law, claiming that it infringes on states' rights, but when they need the federal government to help pick up the tab for activating the national guard, their own state mili-

tias, that's another story. Eager to show that the administration is doing everything it can in this part of the country that felt so abandoned by the Bush White House in the days after Hurricane Katrina, Secretary of Defense Robert Gates immediately agreed to write the check to the governors without even a snide remark regarding their complaints about Washington spreading its tentacles into their states. The Defense Department expects to send the bill on to BP, which is responsible for the cleanup.

But it's not clear whether BP will be forced to pay for much beyond the cleanup - whether the oil company will be held responsible for the loss of income to the fishing and tourism industries, for example, because of a federal law limiting the oil company's liability to \$75 million in damages, a number likely to be miniscule compared to the hardship suffered along the Gulf Coast. Members of Congress, who have already summoned oil-company execu-

tives for a public grilling, introduced legislation earlier this week to increase the liability amount to \$10 billion, but if it passes, it will come too late for the humans, the wildlife and the wetlands suffering from the gulf disaster.

When we start looking for the villain in this explosion that took the lives of 11 men, and in the one in the West Virginia coal mine that killed 29 more, we find the U.S. Congress firmly in our cross hairs. The laws have simply let the energy companies off the hook. The builder of the rig, for instance, failed to install a remote-control device that may have been able to stop the massive leak. Would BP have insisted on the \$500,000 switch if it knew its liability was unlimited? Instead the company, which has faced a series of other violations and paid minimal fines, has lobbied against stricter safety regulations.

That's hardly unusual; no business wants more rules hampering its operations. But the energy companies have been more successful than most at avoiding them. Look at what happened in West Virginia the owner of the Upper Big Branch mine had been called to task 123 times so far this year by the Mine Safety and Health Administration. But those citations didn't cause the mine to shut down or cleanups to occur. The company can challenge them and keep operating. That's

what Massey Energy did. These companies give millions in campaign contributions and spend many millions more on lobbyists in Washington. But representatives from oil- and gas-producing states and coal-mining states don't even need to be lobbied in order to protect the energy companies. They are the engines that fuel the states' economies, paying taxes that help support public services and providing

well-paid jobs to thousands of people.

Those jobs matter a great deal to the people of West Virginia and Louisiana. But their lives matter more. And the preservation of the environment matters as well. These companies make billions of dollars. Right now, their profits are hitting record highs. They can more than afford to install whatever devices exist that could better protect the people who work for them, instead of spending their money lobbying against safety requirements. Shame on them for not putting their workers' well-being first.

But even more shame on Congress for allowing the energy companies to escape tougher laws. That's the first role of government — to protect the people. Soon we'll see the familiar spectacle of com-

pany executives called to Capitol Hill, facing a series of lectures by lawmakers. And they deserve those lectures. But as the members of Congress look for someone to blame for the explosions that have had such devastating effects, the mirror would be a good place to start.

Today is Friday, May 7, the 127th day of 2010. There are 238 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 7, 1945, Germany signed an unconditional surrender at Allied headquarters in Rheims (rams), France, ending its role in World War II.

On this date:

In 1789, the first inaugural ball was held in New York in honor of President George Washington and his wife, Martha.

In 1833, composer Johannes Brahms was born in Hamburg, Germany.
In 1840, composer Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky was

born in Votkinsk, Russia.
In 1915, nearly 1,200 people died when a German

torpedo sank the British liner RMS Lusitania off the Irish coast.

In 1960, Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev announced that the pilot of an American U-2 plane shot down over Sverdlovsk had been captured alive along with proof the aircraft had been on a spy-

announced that the pilot of an American U-2 plane shot down over Sverdlovsk had been captured alive along with proof the aircraft had been on a spying mission. Leonid Brezhnev replaced Marshal Kliment Voroshilov as president of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet

In 1963, the United States launched the Telstar 2 communications satellite.

In 1975, President Gerald R. Ford formally declared an end to the "Vietnam era." In Ho Chi Minh City - formerly Saigon - the Viet Cong celebrated its takeover.

In 1977, Seattle Slew won the Kentucky Derby, the first of his Triple Crown victories. (On this date in 2002, Seattle Slew died.)
In 1984, a \$180 million out-of-court settlement

was announced in the Agent Orange class-action suit brought by Vietnam veterans who charged they'd suffered injury from exposure to the defoliant. Ten years ago: A second fire was set to contain an earlier blaze that was begun to clear brush on

an earlier blaze that was begun to clear brush on the Bandelier National Monument in New Mexico; the second fire blew out of control, destroying more than 200 homes and damaging part of the Los Alamos National Laboratory before it was controlled. President Vladimir Putin took the oath of office in Russia's first democratic transfer of power. Actor-producer-author Douglas Fairbanks Jr. died in New York at age 90.

Five years ago: During a visit to Riga, Latvia,

President George W. Bush said the United States had played a role in Europe's painful division after World War II - a decision that Bush said helped cause "one of the greatest wrongs of history" when the Soviet Union imposed its harsh rule across Central and Eastern Europe. Giacomo, a 50-1 long shot, won the Kentucky Derby. Former congressman Peter W. Rodino Jr., who'd led the House impeachment investigation of President Richard Nixon, died in West Orange, N.J. at age 95.

One year ago: A federal jury in Paducah, Ky.

One year ago: A federal jury in Paducah, Ky. convicted a former soldier, Steven Dale Green, of raping and fatally shooting a 14-year-old girl after killing her parents and younger sister while he was serving in Iraq. (Green was sentenced to life in prison without possibility of parole.) Former Illinois police Sgt. Drew Peterson was indicted for murder in the death of his third wife, Kathleen Savio. Mickey Carroll, one of the last surviving Munchkins from the 1939 film "The Wizard of Oz," died in Greetwood Mo. at age 89

Association of Counties and Paul J. Sugg, legislative liaison for the Texas Association of Counties.

The speakers from Austin laid out the state of local government in Texas and the issues for local government, particularly with regard to the next Texas Legislature due to start in January, 2011.

Sturzl said that despite the fact that next year's legislature will be dealing with redistricting and a sizable budget shortfall, he expects legislators to file thousands of bill before the session starts.

"We've got this song called 'Rockzilla,' and it's about being from the Panhandle and living life. All our songs are about things that we've all lived, so it all means a lot to us







Migrant border deaths rose to 417 in 2009

WASHINGTON (AP) — The number of people who died trying to illegally cross the U.S.-Mexico border last year rose to 417 — the first increase in four years — despite declines in apprehensions, according to an advocacy group.

The number of deaths hit a peak of 492 in 2005, but had fallen every year since then to a low of 390 in 2008, the National Foundation for American Policy said Thursday, citing U.S. Border Patrol statistics.

Meanwhile, apprehensions of illegal immigrants trying to cross the southern border fell to 538,000 last year, down from 705,022 the previous year. Apprehensions peaked at 1.17 million in 2005, according to the foundation, which supports increasing visas for people to legally come to the U.S.

A lack of U.S. jobs and tighter enforcement are thought to be reasons for the steady drops in apprehensions.

Last October, the Border Patrol had reported 378 deaths for 11 months of fiscal year 2009 and warned the final number for the full year was likely to be higher.

Fortification of the nearly 2,000-mile border has forced migrants to enter the U.S. at areas with more difficult terrain, making crossing the border illegally more deadly. Men, women and children are among the dead each year.

Stuart Anderson, the foundation's executive director, said the deaths reflect flawed enforcement policies that don't provide enough opportunity for migrants to enter the country legally.

Anderson was uncertain whether the increase is related to escalating drug-related vio-

lence in Mexico. The Border Patrol was analyzing its own data to determine whether drug violence had an affect on the numbers.

The Border Patrol regularly rescues migrants who are felled by searing heat; swept up in river waters that serve as the international border; perish in attacks by gangs or wildlife, or other scenarios.

The Border Patrol rescued 1,277 people near the Southwestern border last year, the foundation reported.


The city council on May 27 is scheduled to vote on dubbing a stretch of 2nd Street "Willie Nelson Boulevard."
