






ONE STEP AHEAD

Preparedness essential during tornado season

A tornado is sighted nearing the Pampa city limits. Do you know what to do and where to go?

City of Pampa Emergency Coordinator Fred Courtney said the safest shelter is underground and below ground level, but if you don't have a storm shelter, find an interior room.

"You need to put as many walls around you as possible," Courtney said. "If you have a closet that's close to the bathroom plumbing, it works well. Where the pipes and stuff are is a strong part of the house."

Courtney said that if you live in a second story apartment, you need to go downstairs and find a sturdy interior room. He emphasized the importance of having shelter pre-planned.

"When a tornado warning goes out, you may not have much time to get in a safe place," Courtney said.

Jana Gregory, executive director of the Eastern Texas Panhandle Chapter of the Red Cross, agreed.

"Be prepared and know a plan on where to go," Gregory said. "Let family know where you are going. Have a tornado kit with communications and a flashlight." If you don't need it that's fine but if you need it you have it.

Steve Drillette, meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Amarillo, said that you should have a basic survival kit with you in your shelter.

"Have water, non perishable foods and a weather radio," Drillette said. "Also have pillows and blankets to cover yourself to protect you in case a wall collapses."

A tornado warning is issued when a tornado has been sighted by spotters or indicated on the radar and is occurring or imminent in the warning area.

If a tornado is seen by a spotter approaching the city or confirmed by the National Weather Service, Courtney said the city will then activate the tornado sirens located throughout Pampa.

In that case, Courtney said, it is important that people seek proper shelter, if they haven't already.

First Baptist Church on the 200 block of West Street is the only shelter recognized by the city and the Red Cross because of its basement.

"Other buildings have basements, but they are older buildings," Courtney said. "The structure above is not strong enough. You need a shelter where the building won't collapse on you."

Gregory said they look at several criteria in approving a place for a shelter.

"We look at space, bathroom accessibility and a central location that's easy for people to get to," Gregory said.

Carl Novian, minister to families and administration at First Baptist, said the church opens as a shelter when a tornado warning is issued specifically for Pampa and can hold about 400 people.

"If it is affecting another part of Gray County like Groom, we won't open," Novian said. "We will stay open as long as a threat is there."

Novian said they discourage pets since they want the shelter primarily to be for people, but will allow people to bring their pets.

"If they have a small lap dog they can bring that with them," Novian said. "If they have bigger dogs we prefer them in

Memorial Day services set for this weekend

Three separate public Memorial Day services are planned in Pampa during the upcoming weekend.

The first remembrance service will be held at 6:30 p.m., Saturday at Fairview Cemetery (1500 Duncan Street).

"We will have a presentation by the VFW Post 1657 Honor Guard and a 21 gun salute," said Lance DeFever. "And we will lay a wreath at the Tribute to the Poppy Field monument."

The Pampa Lions Club will be providing free hamburgers to the attendees.

LaFevre said tables and chairs will be available, but people are also welcome to bring lawn chairs. The service will include patriotic music and presentations on the history of Memorial Day, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the cemetery.

"We will have people on hand to direct parking and to help locate loved ones in the cemetery," LeFever said.

Another service is planned for 10 a.m. Monday morning at Memory Gardens Cemetery (2215 North Price Road).

"We will have a memorial service in our Veteran's Garden and the public is invited," said Daniel Zuniga. "Danny Martin (VFW 1657 post commander) will be our guest speaker this year."

Zuniga said the short program will also include some patriotic music.

Although some chairs will be available, he invited the public to bring lawn chairs to the event.

The third program, at 8 p.m. on Monday, will be a candle-light service hosted by Pampa's Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 1657. It will be held at Memorial Park behind the Freedom Museum (600 North Hobart Street).

The Rev. Paul Nachtigall, pastor of Highland Baptist Church in Pampa, will be the guest speaker.

VFW Post Commander Danny Martin said the service will include the organization's Memorial Day ritual of laying a

PISD summer lunch program seeking volunteers

A program designed to provide nutritious meals to needy local children during the summer months is in need of some volunteers.

The Summer Nutrition Program is a project of the Pampa Independent School District that provides a free breakfast and lunch for community children, ages 1 through 18 years of age. The program, funded through the United States Department of Agriculture, is intended to meet the continuing needs of schoolchildren who participate in the free and reduced meal program offered at public school cafeterias through the school year.

"If I have hungry kids during the school year, I have hungry

kids during the summer," said Debbie Middleton, PISD director of Child Nutrition.

Middleton said that the summer program has been a federal requirement for only the last couple of years, although the Pampa school district has been offering it to the community for 15 years.

In the past, the program has served up to 300 children per day. The meals are served in various locations in town, chosen to make it easy to children to walk to the serving areas — public parks or other public facilities (see box).

While the meals are also available to adults in the community at a reduced rate (\$3.50), Middleton said that few adults take part in the program.



Conservator assigned after beating

HOUSTON (AP) — The Texas Education Agency has assigned a conservator to a Houston charter school after a teacher was captured on cell phone video beating a student.

TEA spokeswoman Suzanne Marchman on Friday said that veteran administrator Shirley Johnson will help Jamie's House Charter School review safety, discipline and teacher training and help with updates.

Marchman says Johnson has been with districts in Houston, Willis, Somerset, Katy and Seguin.

Science teacher Sheri Lynn Davis was fired May 10 after video of the April beating of a 13-year-old boy, taped by a fellow student, aired on television.

Davis has apologized. The Harris County Sheriff's Office is investigating.

Friday was the last day of classes at the charter school before the summer break.

Teacher gets 20 for sexual assault

DALLAS (AP) — A teacher has been sentenced to two 10-year prison terms for sexually assaulting two boys he was instructing in the Dallas County jail.

A judge imposed the sentences Thursday after a jury found 38-year-old Luis Enrique de los Santos guilty of two counts of sexual assault of a child.

The Dallas Morning News reported Friday that the boys, ages 15 and 16, were in jail because they had been ordered to stand trial as adults — one for murder and one for aggravated assault of a police officer. Investigators say the boys were assaulted in a bathroom next to the jailhouse classroom. The victims are juveniles and their names were not made public.

Fort Worth toddler found dead

FORT WORTH (AP) — Fort Worth police say a toddler who apparently wandered from his house on a hot afternoon died after being located in a neighbor's car.

Police say a step stool near the vehicle led to the discovery of the 18-month-old boy Thursday afternoon. The child was transported to a hospital and pronounced dead. His name was not immediately released.

The National Weather Service says temperatures were in the 90s Thursday afternoon in Fort Worth.

Sgt. Chad Mahaffey says an officer had been dispatched to the residence after the boy's parents, who work night shifts and had been asleep, awoke and realized the toddler was gone.

Today is Friday, May 28, the 148th day of 2010. There are 217 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:
On May 28, 1863, the 54th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry, made up of freed blacks, left Boston to fight for the Union in the Civil War.

On this date:
In 1533, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Thomas Cranmer, declared the marriage of England's King Henry VIII to Anne Boleyn valid.

In 1892, the Sierra Club was organized in San Francisco.

In 1929, the first all-color talking picture, "On with the Show," opened in New York.

In 1934, the Dionne quintuplets — Annette, Cecile, Emilie, Marie and Yvonne — were born to Elzire Dionne at the family farm in Ontario, Canada.

To fix immigration woes, look north

Ripped from the news: Haitians are illegally crossing into Vermont from Canada, looking for work.

Why didn't the Haitians stay in Canada, where the social safety net is far cushier? Because, as the head of a Haitian radio station in Montreal told The New York Times, "they saw that they had no chance to become Canadian permanent residents." And, he added, "people thought that the United States were going to receive all the Haitians."

What do we take home from this? First off, porous borders are not the biggest reason that illegal immigration has become such a huge problem in the United States. Note that while President Obama is sending up to 1,200 National Guard troops to secure the border with Mexico, there are no troops, rivers or even fences along most of the U.S.-Canadian border. Some country roads mark the boundary with a simple stone.

True, illegal aliens can walk into the United States from Mexico. The logistics are easier in the American Southwest. But there are plenty of illegal workers in Washington state, Michigan and Maine — and little stopping them from going on to Canada.

Our northern neighbor has a large immigration program but little illegal immigration, because Ottawa won't tolerate it. No country with generous entitlements can afford a growing population of low-income workers.

Canada tweaks its immigration program to meet economic needs. It favors entrants with highly desirable skills. And when the economy

recently turned sour, it stopped renewing many temporary work permits.

Should America do as Canada does? Should it stringently enforce its ban on hiring illegal workers? Yes. And should it stop fretting

over what happens to undocumented people already in the country? Yes, but not yet.

What separates the United States from Canada on illegal immigration is a consistent message.

America's landmark 1986 immigration reform law banned the hiring of illegal workers while granting amnesty to several million already here. But it was purposely rendered toothless at the last minute, when saboteurs yanked out a provision requiring a secure check of job applicants' identities.

Talk about messages. Suppose you're an impoverished Mexican. You know that the United States has offered several amnesties to illegal workers, and in any case, hasn't much enforced the law. You heard President George W. Bush announce that he was going to "match any willing worker with any willing employer." And you know that the conservative Wall Street Journal has called for open borders, while the liberal New York Times runs editorials on immigration that refuse to distinguish

between legal and illegal.

What would you do? You would come to the United States, papers be damned.

We've had several decades of a two-faced immigration policy during which millions have come to this country illegally, taken jobs, started families and become part of the American scene. They are mostly good people who have been integrated into our economy and communities. There must be a last amnesty to cover them.

And it will be the last one if two things happen: One, we pass immigration reform that requires every new hire to present counterfeit-proof ID. Two, the public demands that their government go after law-breaking employers.

After virtually no enforcement in the Bush years, the Obama administration has begun to cite and fine employers who break the law. This is needed to move public opinion toward an immigration package that includes legalizing many already here. Sending troops to the border may also boost confidence.

But as Canada shows us, it's not the ease of crossing the border that encourages illegal immigration, but the ease of getting a job once in. The United States needs to get its act together and its message straight on immigration.

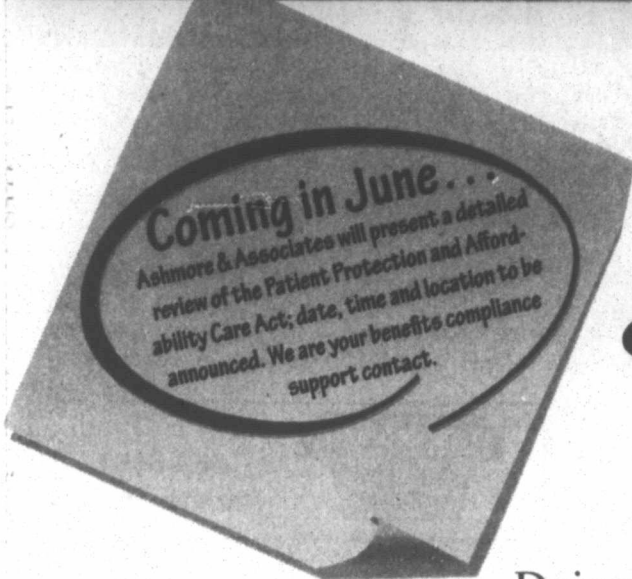

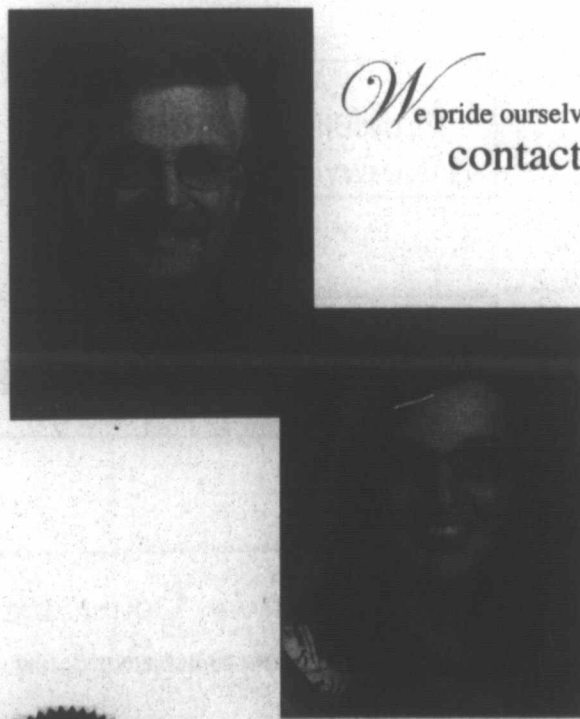

a cage.”

The administration pastor mentioned they have several volunteers that help out during disasters.

“Look for someone in a blue shirt with a badge on the front,” Novian said. “They will tell you where you need to go.”

Drillette said that going to a shelter is not advisable if outside conditions are imminently severe.

“It can be dangerous trying to get to the shelter,” Drillette said. “Just find an interior room in your house and put as many walls around you as you can.”

Courtney said that, if you are in a stable indoor structure, don't leave if

the tornado sirens sound, because you will be safer where you are than inside your car.

“When we had the tornado in 1995, cars were flying 200 feet in the air,” Courtney said.

According to the Online Tornado FAQ Web site, tornado sirens are not a nationwide requirement and it's up to the local government to have a community readiness system. Drillette said the sirens are made to alert people outdoors.

“If you live right underneath a siren you may hear it,” Drillette said. “For different people the loudness is going to be different.”

General Tornado Safety Tips

- A tornado typically takes off the roof, then the walls fall down because they have nothing to support.
- Opening windows to equalize pressure is a myth. It's a waste of time and can be very dangerous because of flying glass. The tornado will blast them open anyway if it hits your home.
- Write instructions on how to turn off your home's electricity, water and gas if advised to do so by local authorities.
- Keep your pet on a leash or in a carrier.
- If you are in a car, drive to the closest sturdy shelter or get lower than the level of the roadway.
- If you are outside seek, shelter inside or lie flat in a ditch or low lying area.

Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: I work with a woman who constantly tells me how much she has — a condo in Florida, a timeshare in the Virgin Islands, her portfolio, the expensive ring her husband bought her and what she spends on wedding/holiday gifts. She even told me about how much she used to make at her previous job.

As a struggling single parent, I find it insensitive. How do I deal with this? Is it about my own inadequacies? She is otherwise a seemingly nice lady. My boyfriend says I need to just “get over it.” What do you think? — “PENNY LESS” IN PENNSYLVANIA

DEAR “PENNY LESS”: This woman's constant need to talk about how much she has is less about your “inadequacies” than about her own. People who are happy, secure and socially sensitive don't usually feel a compulsion to brag about what they have. Once you understand that fact, you may feel less inadequate around her. But if that isn't the case, resolve to spend more of your time with people who talk about ideas and things you have in common, and less with her.

DEAR ABBY: My mother was physically and verbally abusive to my sister and me when we were kids and teen-

agers. Mom had a short fuse. She'd slap us if we accidentally dropped a piece of spaghetti or scuffed our shoes. If she thought we were talking back, she'd really lose it and things would get ugly.

My sister is a mother herself now, and her kids are brats. I know it's because she doesn't want to be strict or abusive to them like our mother was to us.

I am engaged and thinking about a family of my own someday. I don't know how to discipline children or how to correct their bad behavior without becoming abusive. How can I treat my children with kindness, but still have them behave well and be respectful? — WANTS TO END THE CYCLE

DEAR WANTS: Contrary to popular belief, not everyone is born with the instinctive ability to be a good parent. Parenting is a skill, and like most skills, effective parenting has to be learned. Because you come from a dysfunctional home, a way to ensure that you won't repeat the pattern of abuse would be to enroll in parenting classes and learn about child development. Contact your state department of education, local junior college or hospital and ask if these courses are offered or if they

know where you can find them.

DEAR ABBY: Last year, when I was a freshman in college, my boyfriend, “Charles,” accidentally broke my laptop by closing it on a little bouncy ball. I paid the \$800 to have it repaired even though he was the one who broke it because I had the money and he had none. He said he'd pay me back, but it has been a year and I have yet to see any of that money. As a German major, I am required to study in Germany next year and I am strapped for cash. I have reminded Charles about my laptop and he says he'll repay me, but I know he's still in a bad place financially.

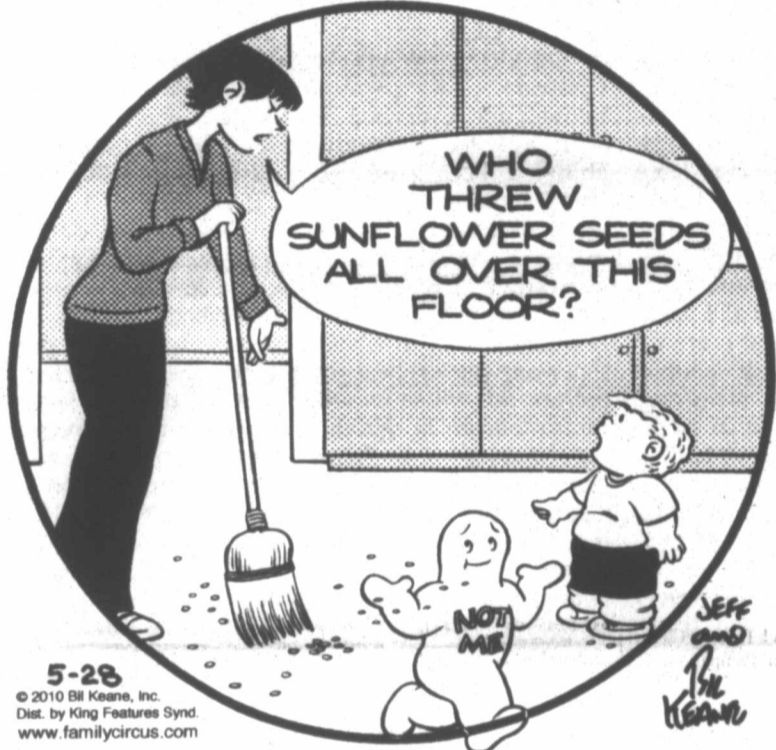
