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"Freedom, though a great privilege, is an awesome responsibility," said Rev. Paul Nachtigall, addressing the crowd gathered in Freedom Park for a Memorial Day Service yesterday evening.

Rev. Nachtigall, pastor of the Highland Baptist Church in Pampa, was the main speaker for the service, which culminated with a candlelight memorial service, a largely silent, somber time punctuated by the sound of names called out softly by people in attendance. Those names sailors, now gone, but not forgotten.

Nachtigall evoked the words of founding father John Adams, who said, "I am well aware of the toil, and blood, and treasure, that it will cost to maintain this declaration, and support and defend these states; yet, through all the gloom I can see the rays of light and glory. Today is Tuesday, June 1, the 152nd day of 2010. There are 213 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On June 1, 1813, the mortally wounded commander of the U.S. frigate Chesapeake, Capt. James Lawrence, said, "Don't give up the ship" during a losing battle with a British frigate, the HMS Shannon, during the War of 1812.

On this date:

In 1533, Anne Boleyn, the second wife of King Henry VIII, was crowned as Queen Consort of England.

In 1792, Kentucky became the 15th state of the union.

In 1796, Tennessee became the 16th state.

In 1909, the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition opened in Seattle.

In 1958, Charles de Gaulle became premier of France, marking the beginning of the end of the Fourth Republic.

In 1967, the Beatles released their album, "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band."

In 1980, Cable News Network made its debut.

Ten years ago: With about half an hour to spare, Texas Governor George W. Bush blocked the scheduled execution of convicted killer Ricky McGinn so that possibly exculpatory DNA evidence could be reviewed. (The DNA tests failed to establish McGinn's innocence, and he was put to death by injection in Sept. 2000.)

Five years ago: Paul Wolfowitz began a fiveyear term as head of the 184-nation World Bank. (Wolfowitz resigned the post in 2007 amid controversy over the generous compensation he'd arranged for his girlfriend, bank employee Shaha Riza.)

One year ago: Air France Flight 447, an Airbus A330 carrying 228 people from Rio de Janeiro to Paris, crashed into the Atlantic Ocean with the loss of everyone on board. General Motors filed for Chapter 11, becoming the largest U.S. industrial company to enter bankruptcy protection. A gunman shot and killed Pvt. William Andrew Long outside of an Army recruiting center in Little Rock, Ark.; another soldier, Pvt. Quinton I. Ezeagwula, was wounded. (Suspect Abdulhakim Muhammad, a Muslim convert, is awaiting trial.)

Nachtigall honors America's veterans

Editor's note: The following is the prepared text for Rev. Paul Nachtigall's Memorial Day address. We asked him to share it with our readers. The following text contains some addition material not delivered during the speech and it has been edited for space limitations.)

This evening we honor those who have given their lives in defense of the freedoms that we all enjoy. When we look upon their sacrifice so that our nation, and the world, could experience the ability to be free, we are so very thankful for each one who served in any of our armed forces. We owe such a great debt to those who died so that you and I can be here right now. The sacrifices of these soldiers, and of those who are still fighting today, should never be forgotten.

From the battlefields that began the American Revolution, to the Civil War, to the Spanish American War, to WWI and II, to Korea, to Vietnam, to Desert Storm, to Iraq and Afghanistan, American soldiers have paid, and will continue to pay, the price for our freedom and safety.

Men and women have given of themselves to protect the freedoms we enjoy in our nation today. We have been able to experience it because all that has taken place before and those who have given of themselves to protect the freedoms set forth by our forefathers. When you look at our nation, we have been blessed, truly blessed. From the beginning our nation has struggled because of the direction our founding fathers chose to go. They chose to walk the path of obedience to God.

I can say with almost absolute certainty that not every soldier who fought for our country in any war was a Christian. Yet I am confident that each one was fighting for the principles and beliefs on which this country was founded. While I do want to remember the men from my own family who fought and the ones from my church family, I certainly want to remember that young man who gave his life during the Revolutionary War because he wanted freedom for his family.

1863, Abraham Lincoln said, "We have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of heaven. We have been preserved, these many years, in peace and prosperity. We have grown in numbers, wealth and power, as no other nation has ever grown. But we have forgotten God. We have forgotten the gracious hand which preserved us in peace, and multiplied and enriched and strengthened us; and we have vainly imagined, in the deceitfulness of our hearts, that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own. Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us! It behooves us, then to humble ourselves before the offended Power, to confess our national sins, and to pray for clemency and forgiveness."

This years National Day of Prayer was threatened by the ruling of a judge in Wisconsin. How appropriate it was that the theme this year was "FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS". Our theme verse was from Nahum 1:7 which says, "The Lord is good, a refuge in times of trouble. He cares for those who trust in Him." Now, as much as ever, it is important for us to be in urgent prayer for our nation. We must be willing to humble ourselves before Almighty God, confess our sin which we have so blatantly reveled in, and seek forgiveness for our wanton unfaithfulness.

This evening we are gathered at this place to remember. We look at our veterans and give thanks for those who served in a branch of our Armed Forces and who have now returned to take up the banner of freedom through the VFW and other community groups. We want to honor you for giving of yourselves. May God richly bless you. We also seek to honor those who gave their lives protecting the freedoms we have in this great land. Those who have died in service for our nation did so with the full knowledge that even in the midst of the wars that tore at the very fiber of our nation, freedom is not just a way of life, it is life. They died so that we might live free.

Freedom, though a great privilege, is an awesome responsibility. Our nation was founded on principles that were based not up on legalities, but upon Christian principles designed to perpetuate a Christian order. The freedom of the first amendment from federal interference is not from religion but for religion in the constituent states. The American system is the political expression of Christian ideas, a nation founded upon the rock of religion and rooted in the love of man.

Our early Presidents knew without reservation that the only way our nation could stand is by standing on God's Word. The statement/question of Thomas Jefferson needs to be heard across our land today. "God who gave us life gave us liberty. Can the liberties of a nation be secure when we have removed a conviction that these liberties are the gift of God? Indeed I tremble for my country when I reflect that God is just, that his justice cannot sleep forever.'

The direction our nation is moving at the present time is frightening.

Our nation today has moved in a direction that has seen special interest groups move into power, usurping the authority given to us by our founding fathers. The separation of church and state was intended to keep the state out of the church not the church out of the state. Our Congress was elected by us to represent us, not pass legislation that tells us how we are to live. As citizens of the United States of America we have some 'inalienable rights' (not to be transferred to another) that ensure that we will have a voice in what takes place in our nation.

It is imperative that we determine the steps we will take for the reclaiming of America. Psalms 133:1 says, "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord." We cannot stand for Biblical principles to be maligned or we will find ourselves ruled by every twisted doctrine dreamed up in the hearts of man.

For several years I have shared this quote at various times, including at this place. Yet never before have I felt it to be as prophetic as it is at this time. On April 30,

While we honor those who gave their lives for this great nation, we must be diligent in honoring our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ. We cannot turn a deaf ear to the cries of all those who have given their lives to preserve our freedom to stand strong upon the foundation laid by Christ Himself. Those that come after us cry out as well. Our children are the living messages we send to a time we will not see.

I feel that Robert E. Lee had something very appropriate for us to hear at this time. "Knowing that intercessory prayer is our mightiest weapon and the supreme call for all Christians today, I pleadingly urge our people everywhere to pray. Believing that prayer is the greatest contribution that our people can make in this critical hour, I humbly urge that we take time to pray – to really pray. ---- Let there be prayer at sunup, at noonday, at sundown, at midnight - all through the day. Let us all pray for our children, our youth, our aged, our pastors, our homes. Let us pray for our churches. ----- Let us pray for ourselves, that we may not lose the word 'concern' out of our Christian vocabulary. Let us pray for our nation. Let us pray for those who have never known Jesus Christ and redeeming love, for moral forces everywhere, for our national leaders. ----- Let prayer be our passion. Let prayer be our practice."

For each of us here we chose to be at this place, to honor those who gave their lives in defense of our nation and the principles on which it was founded. We chose to stand and pledge our allegiance to the flag of the United States. I believe it is now time we choose to stand in allegiance first and foremost to our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ. I believe that prayer for all and at all times must be the call of this time. Then will we truly be the people we should be --- "FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS".

Because of this, I believe it is important that we hear the words of Peter Marshall, "The choice before us is plain, Christ or Chaos, Conviction or Compromise, Discipline or Disintegration. I am rather tired of hearing about our rights and privileges as American citizens. The time is come, it now is, when we ought to hear about the duties and responsibilities of our citizenship. American's future depends upon her accepting and demonstrating God's government. (Page 205, Rebirth of America, © Arthur S. DeMoss Foundation)

Let me just say - may we not just be a nation blessed by God, but a nation who blesses God. May God bless America.


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Lee drove in Kade Winkler and Radke tie the game at four in the bottom of the third.
