## Services set for men killed in explosion

Services for two Pampa men killed in a pipeline explosion will be on Friday and Saturday.

Memorial services for Steven Douglas "Doug" Odell, 32, will be at 2 p.m. Friday, at Carmichael-Whatley Colonial Chapel, with Leonard Cummings of the Seventh Day Adventist Church of Santa Fe, N.M., officiating.

Services for Johnnie Mike Renner, 44, will be at 2 p.m., Saturday, at the Soldiers for Christ Fellowship in Skellytown, with Howard "Duck" Wright, national vice president of for Soldiers for Christ Fellowship, officiating.

Cremation and arrangements for both men are under the direction of Carmichael-Whatley Funeral Directors.

The two Pampa men were killed as they stood 200 to 300 yards away from the bulldozer Tuesday afternoon waiting for a truck to be loaded with caliche when a ruptured natural gas line exploded.

Authorities said a bulldozer digging caliche struck a natural gas pipeline about two-and-half miles northeast of Darrouzett, sparking the explosion. The bulldozer opera-

tor, Dwayne Wood, 32, of Fritch, was airlifted to Baptist Medical Center in Oklahoma City where he is listed in fair condition. Two other men were treated at the Hemphill County Hospital. A sixth man was uninjured.

Lipscomb County Sheriff James Robertson said the men worked for Nick Thomas Inc. of Canadian, an oilfield service company. Robertson credited the company's training for saving Wood's life.

Robertson said apparently Wood came off the bulldozer and rolled on the ground to extinguish the flames. He said when his deputies arrived on the site of the explosion, they found Wood lying at the foot of the hill, his clothes still smoldering.

Officials said Josh Jackson of Pampa and Ben Martinez of Canadian were taken to Hemphill County Hospital Tuesday after



### Community's 'wild pet' hit by a car this morning

no more. The turkey was killed shortly before 7 a.m. today, when it was struck by a passing vehicle in the 900 block of Wilks. Wanda, named by southwest Pampa residents, was actually a male.

"It was an immature male," said Pampa Animal Control supervisor Monty Montgomery today. "They're known as Jakes." The bird had alternately angered and amused

motorists and residents for more than six months as it wandered the neighborhoods. Shortly before being hit in the humid gray dawn today, the turkey snarled morning traffic on Wilks (U.S. Highway 60) east of Hobart (Texas Highway 70), bringing morning commuters to a halt several times. Teresa Dalrymple, who lives in the 1000 block of South Nelson, said everybody she had talked with about the bird said there's nothing that could be done.

Dalrymple and her neighbor,

Robyn Sanders, were worried about the wild turkey that had been roaming Pampa for the last six months. It was first noticed in the downtown area in January. In the last few months, it had moved to southwest Pampa. "She's been around long enough now that we kind of adopted her," Dalrymple said. There are people that would stop and feed the bird, Sanders said. Dalrymple and her neighbors talked with police, animal control officials and even the state game warden about the situa-

### Commision hears first reading of parked car ordinance

All Types Of Fencing mercial • Residential • Oil Field The Pampa Serving the Entire High Plains & High Panhandle Commission passed the first reading of a new Wendell Shults + 806-663-1842 city ordinance concerning parked cars in front yards.

During Tuesday afternoon's city commission meeting, the Pampa City Commission split 3-2 to support the ordinance. Pampa lawyer Ken Fields spoke in favor of the ordinance that would prevent parking cars in front yards. City Commissioners Neil Fulton and Robert Dixon

City opposed the measure.

Commissioners also approved supporting a group of panhandle cities in suspending the effective date for Southwestern Public Services rate increase for 90 days while the cities reviews the massive amount of data in the rate increase request.

The electric utility that serves Pampa filed for an increase of its base rate of \$62 million across their service area. It would mean

base rate of about \$9.31 in the summer and \$11.71 in the winter over current base rates. That's a 16 percent increase in the summer and a 24 percent increase in the winter.

SPS officials said that would translate into an increase of about \$5.60 to \$7.00 per month in residential rates.

City officials said that the extra time is needed because of the voluminous

a monthly increase in the amount of material that must be reviewed by city staff.

> The commission also approved a lease agreement with New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC, for a communication antenna atop the Foster Street water tower.

The lease is for five years at \$900 per month.

The commission approved a move to expand the city's seal coating project.

In May, the commission awarded the seal coating bid to Lewis Construction, Inc., of Dumas for the amount of \$242,440.05. That was \$47,559.95 less than the amount the city had budgeted for the project.





## Rains flood central Texas

NEW BRAUNFELS, Texas (AP) Heavy overnight rains flooded parts of central Texas on Wednesday, leaving at least one dead while forcing dozens of high-water rescues and swamping a popular water park, officials said.

New Braunfels police spokesman Lt. John Wells said the body of 65-year-old Norman Walker of Iowa Park was recovered Wednesday morning from the swollen cies have arrested more Guadalupe River in Gruene, about 30 miles northeast of San Antonio.

A slow-moving storm dumped nearly 12 inches of rain starting Tuesday night in areas northwest of New Braunfels, said Joe Baskin, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service.

A wastewater plant was shut down after sewage began flowing into the Guadalupe River, said New Braunfels Utilities spokeswoman Gretchen Reuwer. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control warned residents to wear protective clothing while cleaning homes and to boil their water.

Comal County dispatchers received more than 800 calls starting late Tuesday night and ended up making 89 high-water rescues from rooftops and trees, Wells told the Herald-Zeitung newspaper in New Braunfels.

Gov. Rick Perry activated state search and rescue operations and warned residents to be aware of forecasts that called for continuing rain.

### Gov. Rick Perry to Bill White: Quit race

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Republican Gov. Rick Perry accused Democratic challenger Bill White Wednesday of "profiteering" from Hurricane Rita and said White should drop out of the race if he can't clear up the allegations.

Perry said White should "immediately resign from the race for governor" if he can't better explain an investment he made months after the storm. The Associated Press reported Tuesday that White put \$1 million into an energy company that he had enlisted for help after the 2005 hurricane.

White's campaign said the former Houston mayor had done nothing wrong. White spokeswoman Katy Bacon said Perry had "sunk to new lows" by urging White to get out of the race, calling the attacks "absolutely appalling."

White acknowledged Tuesday that he made money by investing in a company, BTEC Turbines, hired to help the region recover from the storm. White also had served on BTEC's board of directors.

As the storm was walloping parts of Houston, White said he asked BTEC to help provide power generators to ensure the Houston-area refineries and the adjoining city of Baytown could maintain their water supply during the power outages.

The company ended up getting a \$1.8 million contract from the regional Coastal Water Authority to provide the generators, the White campaign said. White explained BTEC's role in the hurricane recovery efforts Tuesday after releasing his tax returns dating back to 2004.

About a year after Rita, White invested about \$1 million in the privately held BTEC, and reported more than \$500,000 in profits from the investment. White says he took a personal financial stake in BTEC for

the same reason he called them during a crisis: because the company performed well.

## AFTERNOONRUSH US arrests 2,200 in 22-month Mexican drug trafficking probe

WASHINGTON (AP) - Law enforcement agenthan 2,200 people in a 22-month investigation targeting Mexican drug trafficking organizations in the United States, the Justice Department announced Thursday.

The probe, called Project Deliverance, focused on the transportation networks that carry methamphetamine, cocaine, heroin and marijuana into the United States, with return trips of drug proceeds and weapons

Attorney General Eric Holder told a news conference the initiative struck a significant blow against the cartels, but called it "just one battle in what is an ongoing war."

Over 400 of the more than 2,200 arrests were made Wednesday.

The Justice Department says the nearly-two-year probe has led to the seizure of \$154 million in currency, over 1,200 pounds of methamphetamine, 2.5 tons of cocaine, over 1,400 pounds of heroin and 69 tons of marijuana.

The Drug Enforcement Administration, the FBI, and Immigration and Customs Enforcement worked on the effort with state and local law enforcement agencies.

Among those arrested in recent days was Carlos

Ramon Castro-Rocha, believed by law enforcement agencies to be among the leaders of organizations importing narcotics to the U.S.

Ramon In Mexico, Pequeno, head of the anti-narcotics division of Mexico's federal police, said that U.S.-Mexico cooperation has been key in arresting traffickers.

People like Carlos Ramon Castro-Rocha "keep a low profile, manage significant amounts of drugs and money, are little known and don't belong to any traditional drug trafficking organization, which makes it difficult to identify and capture them," Pequeno said. "It is at this stage that the exchange of information and the collaboration with authorities from other countries is heightened."

At the news conference in Washington, Michele Leonhart, acting administrator of the Drug Enforcement Administration, described the law enforcement strategy as an effort to cut off and shut down the supply of drugs headed northward and the flow of drug profits and guns southward into Mexico.

Violent drug distribution networks in the Southwest pose a threat to U.S. border security, said assistant FBI director Kevin Perkins of the bureau's criminal investigative division.



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Texas gov's mansion


AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A new exhibit at the Bob Bullock Texas State History Museum chronicles the more than 150-year-old governor's mansion leading up to the 2008 fire ruled arson.

"Texas Treasure: Inside Our Governor's Mansion" runs through Aug. 1 at the museum in Austin.

The exhibit is billed as a chronicle of the "ongoing life and history of the state landmark from the time of Sam Houston to the devastating arson fire." The exhibit opened earlier this month.

No arrests have been made over the June 2008 fire as the historic structure was vacant and being renovated. Gov. Rick Perry and his wife, Anita, are living in a rental house during the mansion overhaul.

Texas Historical Commission officials last month approved a modified plan for an addition to the firedamaged mansion.

### Today in History

Today is Thursday, June 10, the 161st day of 2010. There are 204 days left in the year.

#### **Today's Highlight in History:**

On June 10, 1935, Alcoholics Anonymous was founded in Akron, Ohio by Dr. Robert Holbrook Smith and William Griffith Wilson.

#### On this date:

In 1610, Englishman Lord De La Warr arrived at the Jamestown settlement to take charge of the Virginia Colony.

In 1865, the Richard Wagner opera "Tristan und Isolde" premiered in Munich, Germany.

In 1907, eleven men in five cars set out from the French embassy in Beijing on a race to Paris. (Prince Scipione Borghese of Italy was the first to arrive in the French capital two months later.)

In 1940, Italy declared war on France and Britain; Canada declared war on Italy. President Franklin D. Roosevelt, speaking at the University of Virginia, said the U.S. stance toward the conflict was shifting from one of "neutrality" to "non-belligerency." Jamaican-born Pan-African nationalist Marcus Garvey died in London at 52

In 1964, the Senate voted to limit further debate on a proposed civil rights bill, shutting off a filibuster by Southern senators.

In 1967, the Middle East War ended as Israel and Syria agreed to observe a United Nations-mediated cease-fire

In 1977, James Earl Ray, the convicted assassin of civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr., escaped from Brushy Mountain State Prison in Tennessee with six others; he was recaptured June 13.

In 1978, Affirmed won the Belmont Stakes and with it, horse racing's Triple Crown.

Ten years ago: Syrian President Hafez Assad died at age 69; he was succeeded by his son, Bashar. Turkey. "She really lived up to her name," Dalrymple said. "It's become kind of personal," Sanders said, "when you see her every morning.'

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

### Houston jury awards \$82M over 2007 explosion death

HOUSTON (AP) - A Texas jury has awarded \$82.5 million in damages to the family of a Mineral Wells man who died in a 2007 explosion at a natural gas processing plant in Hood County.

According to an Ammons Law Firm news release Houston-based Exterran Energy Solutions L.P., formerly Hanover Compressions L.P., constructed, engineered and installed the natural gas processing plant. The jury found the company grossly negligent in the death of 27-year-old Joshua Wade Petrie.

An Exterran spokeswoman said Thursday that the company is declining comment at this time.

The jury Monday decided that Hanover was 90 percent responsible. Quicksilver Resources was cited for 10 percent responsibility. Petrie had been employed by Fort Worth-based Quicksilver at the time of the explosion.

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

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
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

Blackhawks win in OT to claim first Cup in 49 years

Sticks and helmets were thrown, scattered all over the ice and still no signal for a goal.

After a brief review, there was no dispute — the Chicago Blackhawks were the Stanley Cup champions.

Patrick Kane sneaked the puck past Michael Leighton 4:06 into overtime and stunned Philadelphia to lift the Blackhawks to a 4-3 overtime win in Game 6 on Wednesday night for their first championship since 1961.

one but the No Blackhawks appeared to know what was going on for a few frozen moments. Kane and his linemates seemed the only players on the ice who knew the puck found the side of the net. The goal light never went on, but that didn't stop most of the Blackhawks from storming the ice and mobbing each other in celebration.

Kane will go down as scoring one of the biggest goals in team history.

"I was just hoping to God it was just an actual goal," said captain Jonathan Toews, the Conn Smythe Trophy winner as playoff MVP. "They came back hard in the third and we just stuck with it."

Kane raised his arms right away and skated behind the net, knowing the goal was good. While the Flyers sat on the bench in stunned silence with confused looks, the Blackhawks began to celebrate in their own end around goaltender Antti Niemi.

"I knew it went in right away," Kane said. "What a feeling. I can't believe it. We just won the Stanley Cup. I can't believe this just happened. ... It's something you dream about, scoring the final goal in the Stanley Cup finals."

"There's so many great things about winning a Stanley Cup. This is it," Toews said. "This is the best feeling you can ever get. I just can't believe it's happened."

Toews was first to touch the Cup, taking it from commissioner Gary Bettman and hoisting it above his head in triumph. Marian Hossa, whose last two attempts at a title were denied the last two years with Detroit and Pittsburgh, was next. He lifted it and bench-pressed the big trophy, snapping his head back in exhilaration.

"I'm so happy I finally did it," Hossa said. "We couldn't just put our heads down. We had to work, and we knew we could do it."

The Blackhawks completed their revival from the bottom of the NHL to holding the silver trophy on the strength of rising stars Kane and Toews. They won their first Stanley Cup since Bobby Hull and Stan Mikita led the way 49 years ago.

It ends the longest active championship drought in the NHL. Kane is the first player to score the Stanley Cup clinching goal in overtime since Jason Arnott did it for New Jersey at Dallas in 2000.

"I heard the sound, it was a funny sound," coach Joel Quenneville said of the Cup-winner. "Nobody knew where the puck was. Kaner thought it was in." Leighton stopped 37

The fans politely applauded when the game was over, but the few thousand who stuck around booed as the Blackhawks took their turns hoisting the silver trophy. A few hundred Blackhawks fans went wild as the team took a picture with the Cup.

"It's no consolation," Hartnell said. "The sto-rybook ending ended the wrong way for us. It hurts."

The Blackhawks ruthlessly attacked the Flyers and it paid off with two should-have-been-stopped goals against Leighton.


Leighton, who had been flawless at home this postseason, couldn't come up with two crucial saves and that helped put Chicago in the driver's seat.
