Pampa's Williams sentenced 50 months

A Pampa man was on his way to prison today after pleading guilty to drug charges. Reggie Eugene Williams, 39, of Pampa, was sentenced Monday by visiting Judge David Gleason in 223rd District Court to three years on a charge of delivery of a controlled substance in a drug free zone and 14 months on charges of possession of a controlled substance. The terms are to be served consecutively. Williams pleaded guilty to the charges Monday morning.

Monday afternoon, during the punishment phase of the case, Texas Department of Public Safety Lt. Lucinda Russell testified that she had bought \$60 worth of crack cocaine from Williams on Jan. 12, 2006, at a house at 1040 Huff.

After Assistant 31st District Attorney Jeromie Oney played a recording of that transaction, he called Pampa Police Officer Toby Bias to the witness stand.

Perry's spending gets complaints

AUSTIN (AP) — A government watchdog group is filing a complaint against GOP Gov. Rick Perry's campaign for failing to disclose how it spends money at the governor's mansion and at his interim residence.

Since 2001, Perry's campaign has spent more than \$800,000 on "mansion expenditures."

Texas for Public Justice said in a complaint Tuesday that Perry's campaign violated disclosure laws by failing to itemize the spending.

Records obtained this year by The Associated Press show Perry has used campaign money to throw parties, buy food and drink, and pay for cable TV and other services at his official residence.

Perry and his wife, Anita, were in a rental property in 2008 when an arsonist set fire to the under-renovation governor's mansion. Nobody has been arrested. The Perrys are still in a rental house.

Bexar Co. commish to sue AG

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A Bexar County commissioner cast the deciding vote in favor of suing the Texas attorney general's office to overturn its order that he make public some e-mails from his personal account.

The San Antonio Express-News sought the release of Commissioner Tommy Adkisson's e-mails under an open records request to determine if he had discussed public business such as transportation issues via private correspondence. The attorney general's office said in May he must disclose the e-mails.

Adkisson has argued that complying would "intrude into personal privacy and free-speech rights" and that the open-records request was filed "under the guise of open government."

He cast the tie-breaking vote Monday in the 3-2 commissioner's court decision authorizing the lawsuit. The deadline to file the lawsuit is later this week.

Big oil slams Obama drilling ban

LONDON (AP) — Oil executives sharply criticized President Barack Obama's six-month ban on deepwater drilling at a major industry conference Tuesday, saying the world did not have enough other sources of oil to eliminate using deepsea rigs.

The massive oil slick in the Gulf of Mexico and the moratorium imposed by Obama dominated discussions at the World National Oil Companies Congress in the British capital, and a BP executive standing in for embattled BP CEO Tony Hayward was heckled by protesters.

Transocean Ltd. president and CEO Steven Newman, owner of the destroyed Deepwater Horizon rig involved in sending millions of gallons of oil into the Gulf, said Obama's ban, which is currently being reviewed by a U.S. federal judge, was unnecessary.

"There are things the administration could implement today that would allow the industry to go back to work tomorrow without an arbitrary six-month time limit," Newman told reporters on the sidelines of the meeting.

Deliberations in polygamist trial

ELDORADO (AP) — The West Texas jury in the sexual abuse trial of a man from a polygamist group raided by authorities in 2008 is set to begin deliberations.

Both sides wrapped up presentation of evidence late Monday in the Eldorado trial of Abram Harker Jeffs. Deliberations were expected to begin Tuesday.

The 39-year-old Jeffs has been accused of sexually assaulting a 15-year-old he allegedly married in a Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints ceremony when he was 34. He faces up to life in prison if convicted.

Jeffs is the sixth FLDS man to answer charges since the April 2008 raid on the group's compound. The five others have all been convicted or pleaded guilty and were sentenced to prison.

Stadium's lid blown

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — The arched roof of Memorial Coliseum in Corpus Christi is no more.

The roof collapsed late Monday as part of the demolition process of the venue that opened in 1954 as the city's main event center.

A&R Demolition project manager Vernon Carr says the collapse went great. Demolition began in early May.

Memorial Coliseum, with about 5,000 seats, was replaced in 2004 by the larger American Bank Center.

Dallas unfit for major disaster

DALLAS (AP) — An emergency preparedness task force found that Dallas is not equipped to handle a major disaster.

The city only has 26 percent of the supplies and volunteers it would need according to a report released by the Mass Care Task Force.

Michele Matthews, DFW Metroplex area commander with the Salvation Army, said the task force has raised \$2.2 million of the \$26 million it would need to handle a situation like Hurricane Katrina. Raising the funds is part of a five-year goal.

"We are in year two of raising the funds and we are starting to see some positive results despite the economy," Matthews said, adding that the task force doesn't want to alarm people.

The report showed that Dallas can't currently provide adequate food, shelter or volunteers.

"We do not normally have in inventory the food necessary for this type of response," said Jan Pruitt, the North Texas Food Bank's president and chief executive officer.

Williams' aunt, Idray Jones, testified that she found the tape recording of the drug transaction shocking and said that Williams had turned his life around in the four and a half years since the drug buy.

"He's trying to get jobs," she told the court. "I've been trying to help him."

She said she didn't know Williams was involved in drugs and asked to judge to give him a probated sentence.

Williams took the stand

on his own behalf and admitted to previous drug convictions, but he said he was clean now.

"I don't do drugs," Williams told Judge Gleason.

Judge Gleason still found him guilty and sentenced him to four years and two months on the drug charges.

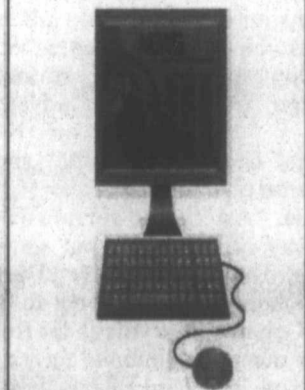
After earning a bachelor's degree in Speech at West Texas A&M in Canyon, he decided he would like to give back some of what he got in the scouts.

One year ago: Nine people were killed when a Washington D.C. commuter train crashed into the rear of another during afternoon rush hour. President Barack Obama signed the nation's toughest anti-smoking law, aiming to keep thousands of teens from getting hooked. Chris Brown pleaded guilty to felony assault of ex-girlfriend Rihanna (he was later sentenced to probation and community labor).

Blueberry pie, with a sprinkling of nostalgia

When our girls were little one of the things we loved to do was to go to a "u-pick" farm where they could eat their weight in fresh fruit why pretending to help mom and dad lay in a supply for jelly and pies.

Red and blue were the primary colors of those outings. Red, when the strawberries were in season and blue, when the blueberries hung plump on the bushes of the Highland Blueberry Farm near Perryville, Mo. Perry County Treasurer Ronnie Hershey and her husband, Bob (Perryville's Municipal Court Judge), owned the farm (still do) and made it kid-friendly (i.e. looked the other way when kids would put one blueberry in their basket and three in their mouth).

We would arrive early on a Saturday, pick until the girls grew bored or were as full as ticks, whichever came first.

Then, we'd pack up the cartons of fresh fruit and head home, Sarah and Rachel in the back seat of the van, faces smudged with blue or red juice.

Over the years, I've tried growing just about everything in my garden — all kinds of fruit, too, but I've always found blueberries daunting, with their love of acidic soils and the extra care that growing fruit entails.

Nope, the u-pick places were a great substitute for having your

The blueberries — if enough were left after everyone ate them as is — would be blueberry pie. And not just any blueberry pie, but blueberry cream pie.

Fresh blueberries are among my favorite things in this world, first because they are blueberries and second, because it brings back memories of little girls with bright blue lips asleep in the back seat.

So, imagine my happiness when my mother- and father-in-law show up yesterday from Missouri for a visit bearing bag (a 15-pound bag!) of freshly harvested blueberries, some as big as the end of your thumb.

As we were preparing them for freezing, as stuffing them in our mouths as fast as we could, we are also talking about making that

own blueberry bushes and a lot less bother. The family bonding could still occur with out the worries over soil additives and bug spray.

Back then we actually home-canned a lot of things from our garden.

pie — the best blueberry pie in the world.

I say it here in print: My mother-in-law is the best!

If you can find some fresh blueberries, here is the recipe for that pie. It is from a booklet that Ronnie and Bob handed out to customers way back when.

I will be having it tonight.

Fresh Blueberry Cream Pie

- 1 cup sour cream
- ¼ cup sugar
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 2 ½ cups fresh blueberries
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 3 tablespoons chopped pecans or walnuts
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 9" unbaked pie crust
- 1 ½ tablespoon butter

Combine sour cream, flour, sugar, vanilla, salt and egg; beat 5 minutes at medium speed or until smooth. Fold in blueberries. Pour filling into pastry shell; bake at 400 degrees for 25 minutes. Remove from oven. Combine remaining ingredients, stirring well. Sprinkle over top of pie. Bake 10 minutes more. Chill before serving.

Continuing spill drama shows leadership gulf

Gulf Coast water may not be clear, but the difference between talk and action, between inexperience disguised in a well-scripted package and actual leadership, is. You can see it in the persons and performances of President Barack Obama and Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal. In the wake of the oil spill, President Obama has been widely considered missing in action, ineffective, and impotent. Jindal, on the other hand, was noticeably and commendably quick on his feet, on-the-scene and effective. It's a tale of two men many a national commentator wouldn't have predicted as recently as last year.

To fully appreciate the contrast, rewind to February 2009, when the president delivered his first State of the Union address. Norman Ornstein of the American Enterprise Institute praised Obama's "effortless eloquence," calling it a "sharp contrast with former president George W. Bush's oratory."

And the commander in chief had the body language and camera-ready moves down perfect, too. "As President Obama made his way off the dais, he stopped to hug Tom Coburn, a senator from Oklahoma and his friend. The same Tom Coburn who is as conservative as any member of Congress," Ornstein wrote in the Washington Post.

(Add "huggability" to "who would you rather have a beer with?" as a completely useless presidential-preference test.)

Bobby Jindal was the Republican tapped to give the traditional opposition-party response that night. Jindal's speech was nearly univer-

sally trashed. So were his future near-term political prospects.

"This was not Bobby Jindal's greatest oratorical moment."

"I think he had a really poor performance tonight ... It just came off as amateurish."

"Even the tempo in which he spoke seemed like sing-song, and he was telling stories that seemed very simplistic and almost childish."

And that was just the response on the Fox News Channel.

The current messages coming in from the Gulf are a testament to the fickleness of political punditry. By now, former Clinton political war-room adviser James Carville's criticism of the White House's "hands-off" approach is the stuff of YouTube legend: "Man, you've got to get down here and take control of this, put somebody in charge of this thing and get this thing moving. We're about to die down here." But Carville is far from alone. His fellow Clintonite turned CNN commentator Paul Begala didn't disagree.

Nor does the general public in Louisiana. A survey by Public Policy Polling, a Democratic outfit, found that Jindal, who has an overall approval rating of 63 percent (vs. 31 percent disapproval), gets a 65-25 score when it comes to his handling of the spill. President Obama, by contrast, has an approval rating of 37

percent (vs. 57 percent disapproval). When it comes to the spill, the president's rating is 32-62.

CNN found similar results, which it took as "evidence that the public's view of Obama's leadership is following the same pattern that George W. Bush experienced after Hurricane Katrina slammed into the Gulf Coast in 2005."

So much for the problem-solving audacity of speechifying.

The leadership gap is not lost on Jindal. In an interview at the end of May, the governor explained that "lines of communication are great" between him and the White House but that talking only goes so far. "Now we need action."

The only real action the president seems to be achieving involves an energy tax. Moving back to his transformational political agenda, the president scattered a recent prime-time speech with not-so-casual warnings about the associated costs of any spill cleanup.

Democrats, too, have inaction in mind: halting offshore drilling. Believe it or not, that same poll that found Louisianians unimpressed with Obama and his BP performance haven't dramatically soured on offshore drilling in their state. Seventy-seven percent of Louisianians polled still support it. We should pay attention to them.

"It's nice to know they have heard the terminology and know what to expect," Gill said.

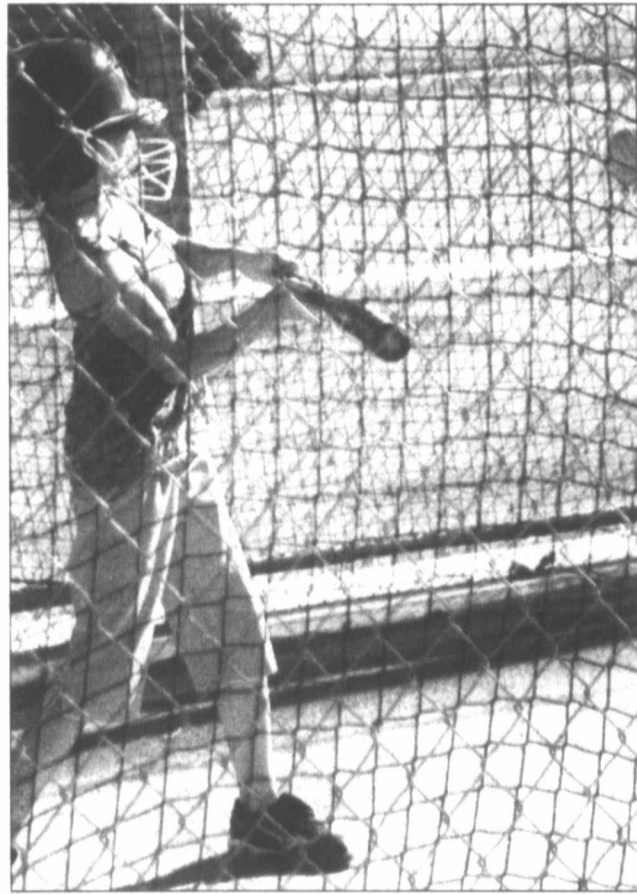
Graduated seniors including Shelbie Watson, Emilie Troxell and Carlyn Teichmann helped with the camp. The camp runs through Wednesday.


