Afternoon drug bust results in 11 arrests

Three people were in the Gray County jail today in connection with a drug raid Thursday.

Eight others arrested in Pampa Thursday were transferred to the Randall County jail on drug charges.

Randall County Criminal District Attorney James Farren said today that the arrests were part of an ongoing investigation by his office.

The 11 people in jail today were arrested in Pampa on Randall County warrants Thursday.

Farren indicated that the current investigation is part of the same initiative that also resulted in the arrest of 10 other people in Pampa in early May on Randall County warrants.

Chris Lee Broadbent, 35; Robert Lee Sanderson, 38, and Leonardo Alonzo, 32, were in Gray County jail this morning on charges of possession and transportation of chemicals with the intent to manufacture a controlled substance.

The rest of the people arrested Thursday, Kenneth Loren Cargal, 33; Rebecca Ann Moore, 26; Amy Lynn Woodruff, 29; Kimberly Michelle Newman, 29; Hugh Jackson Parman, 22; Katina Ann Atchley,

31; John Edward Shackelford, 46; and Howard Ray Vance, 28, were all in Randall County jail today on charges of possession and transportation of chemicals with the intent to manufacture a controlled substance.

Shackelford was additionally charged with theft of property.

Pampa police officers, Gray County deputies and Texas Department of Public Safety troopers made the arrests in Pampa Thursday.

A call to Texas Department of Public Safety Narcotics Officer Lucinda Russell in Amarillo went unanswered this morning.

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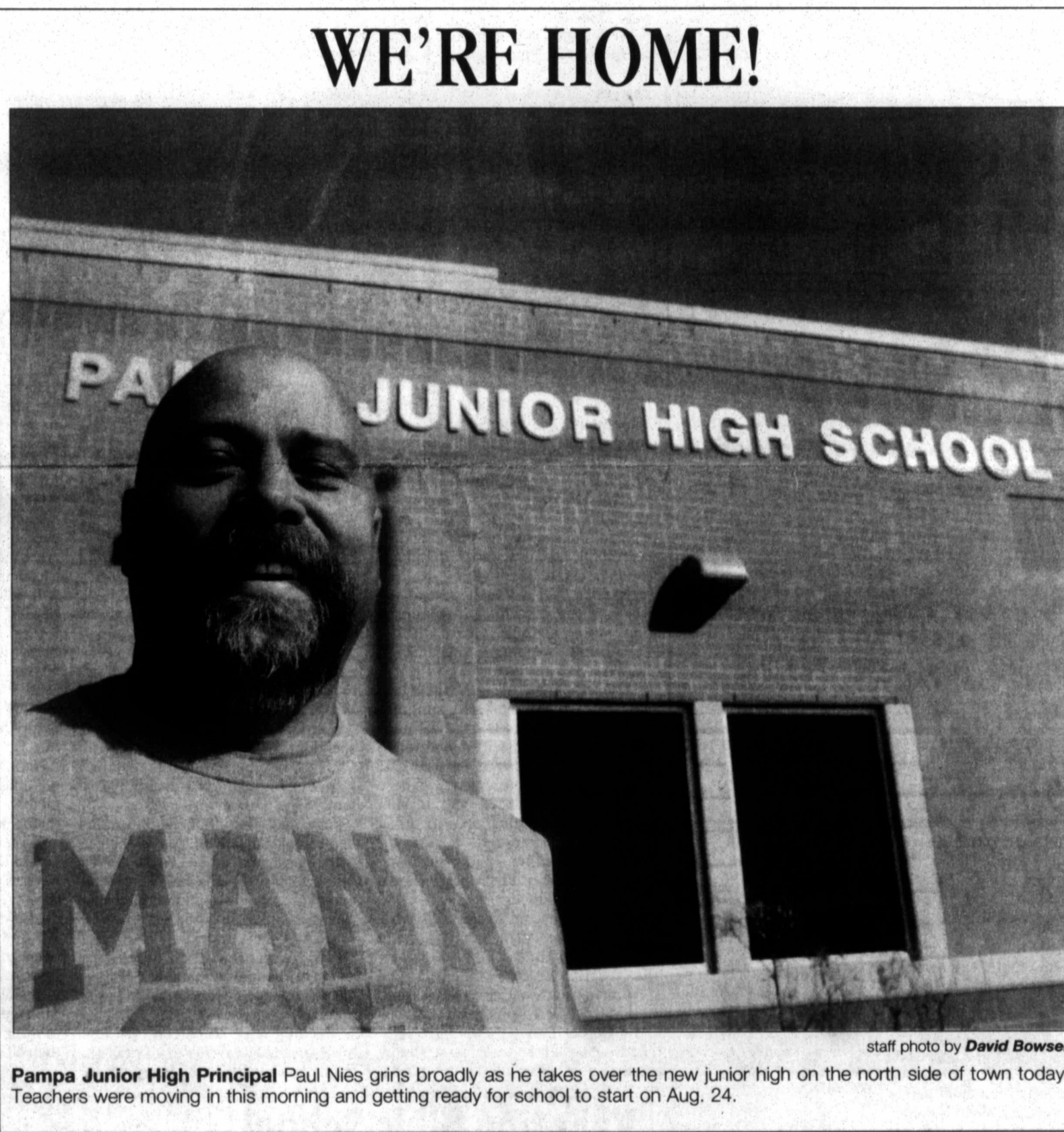

PISD board named 'School Board of the Year'

The Pampa Independent School District board of trustees has been named the School Board of the Year for the State of Texas.

John Bass, executive director of Region XVI Education Service Center in Amarillo, made the announcement at the school board meeting Thursday evening.

In other business, the school board met with its attorney concerning the value and possible exchange of the former Pampa Junior High School campus for other property.

Pampa Junior High School Principal Paul Nies took possession of the new junior high this morning on behalf of the school district.

The school board also reviewed construction progress of the dis-

trict's Ag Barn and tennis building.

Haenisch said it was complete except for sidewalks.

He said plans for the tennis building called for a prefabricated building to be moved in next to the tennis courts at the corner of Duncan and Randy Matson. The 2,080 square foot building would be bricked with the same brick used on the high school.

The school board committed about \$4 million to technology, transportation, construction and instruction. The remaining \$4 million in the school district's funds would be held in reserve, said Haenisch.

The board of trustees also approved the appointment of representatives for the district's banking, investments and credit card accounts. They also approved the 2010-2011 Student Code of Conduct.

Jennifer Adams was hired as the Family and Consumer Science instructor at the high school. Cassandra Cambern was hired to teach English as a second language and Rachel Parker was hired as a junior high English teacher.

Steven Parker, formerly the high school principal at Farwell, was hired as assistant principal for Pampa Junior High.

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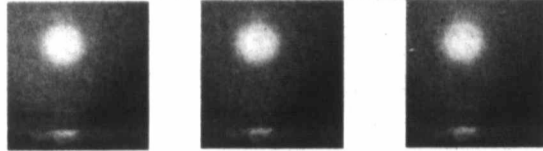

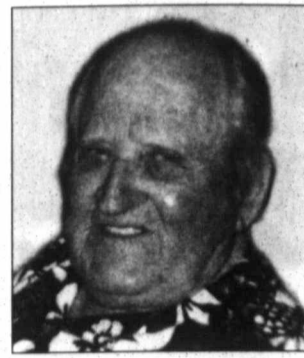

Napolitano: I wasn't 'testy,' I was 'firm'

LAREDO, Texas (AP) — Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano said Thursday she was being "firm" rather than testy with Gov. Rick Perry recently while he was again hammering the federal government over security along the Texas border.

Napolitano spoke with Perry late last month as Hurricane Alex threatened Texas before making landfall in Mexico. When Perry steered the call over storm readiness toward getting more National Guard troops, Perry said Napolitano became "a little testy."

"He said I was testy. I thought I was firm," Napolitano said, smiling.

The quip got laughs from an auditorium of border sheriff deputies and Border Patrol agents at Texas A&M International University, where Napolitano announced \$60 million in grants to strengthen security along the southwest border. Texas will receive \$17 million, more than any other state, under the program known as Operation Stonegarden.

The money is part of what Napolitano called a record amount of resources the southwest border has received since President Barack Obama took office. Napolitano reminded law enforcement officials how Border Patrol troops have doubled since 2004, and said illegal weapons seizures along the border

"Furthermore, when you take into account the ramp-up and ramp-down times associated with a military action of this kind, this deployment would support sustained operations for only an estimated four months."

Napolitano phoned Perry, a Republican running for an unprecedented third term as governor, before Alex made landfall June 30 to ask if Texas had all the help it needed.

"I said 'yes, I have all the help I need, but I don't have all the help I need along the border of Texas,'" Perry told reporters the next day. "I said 'The idea that you would send 250 National Guard troops to a 1,200-mile border and think that is anything but an affront is beyond me.'"

Napolitano, who was a Democratic governor of Arizona before joining Obama's cabinet, said troop deployments don't tell the whole story.

"You can't just look at the National Guard alone," Napolitano said. "You have to look at the entire universe of resources that are being deployed to the border, and into Texas specifically. And those resources have never been greater."

Arizona will get the second-biggest slice of funding under Operation Stonegarden for 2010 at nearly \$14 million. California will receive more than \$12 million.

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Worries for Texas shrimpers

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas shrimpers concerned about what the BP oil spill means for them are preparing for what could be a shaky season and watching the horizon for longer term changes.

The commercial brown shrimp season opened Thursday night, but state waters could close if oily water spreads to Texas. There's more competition in a smaller area this year because the Gulf's fishable waters are closed in other states. Shrimpers also face nervous customers who wonder about the safety of Gulf seafood.

For the time being, fewer out-of-state boats will likely be joining the Texas shrimp fleet, but that could change. Officials have been fielding calls from fishermen asking about state laws, apparently looking for options if the Louisiana oil spill closures turn out to be long-term.

No charges in golf cart death

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission says no charges will be filed over the death of a 17-year-old girl following a May 1 golf cart accident in Kingsland.

A TABC statement Friday said the investigation has concluded into the death of Alyssa Bargsley of Kyle. She fell off the golf cart, driven by another juvenile, and hit her head on the pavement.

TABC says the investigation, which included the Llano County Sheriff's Office and Department of Public Safety, found that Bargsley and two other minors, ages 17 and 15, consumed alcohol at a residence before the accident. The agency says the teens obtained the beverages without the knowledge of any adults.

TABC does not charge minors with the possession or consumption of alcohol when someone has called 911 because of a medical emergency.

36 arrested in Medicare scam

MIAMI (AP) — Federal authorities said Friday they are conducting the largest Medicare fraud bust ever in five different states and arrested dozens of suspects accused in scams totaling \$251 million.

Several doctors and nurses were among those arrested in Miami, New York City, Detroit, Houston and Baton Rouge, La., accused of billing Medicare for unnecessary equipment, physical therapy and HIV treatments that patients typically never received. Ninety-four suspects were indicted, and authorities said 36 people had been arrested as of Friday morning.

More than 360 agents participated in Friday's raids, announced by Attorney General Eric Holder and Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius at a health care fraud prevention summit in Miami. Officials said they chose Miami because it is ground zero for Medicare fraud. Authorities indicted 33 suspects in the Miami area, accused of charging Medicare for about \$140 million in various scams.

"With today's arrests we're putting would-be criminals on notice: health care fraud is no longer a safe bet," Holder said Friday.

State unemployment down

AUSTIN (AP) — The unemployment rate in Texas dropped to 8.2 percent in June, a one-tenth point decline from May.

The Texas Workforce Commission says the unemployment rate remained well below the national seasonally adjusted rate of 9.6 percent for June in the report released Friday.

The jobless rate had risen to 8.3 percent in April and May after holding steady at 8.2 percent in the first three months of 2010.

Workforce commission Chairman Tom Pauken says Texas employment has grown every month this year with the highest gains in the education and health services industry.

Coppell mayor faced investigation

COPELL (AP) — A suburban Dallas mayor who killed herself and apparently her daughter had been at risk of losing her home, and a city manager said he repeated a request for documents related to questionable charges on her city-issued credit card just hours before she fired the fatal shots.

Investigators found the bodies of Coppell Mayor Jayne Peters, 55, and 19-year-old Corinne Peters at their home Tuesday night. The Medical Examiners Office said the mayor committed suicide and that her daughter's death was a homicide.

City Manager Clay Phillips said he had been trying for months to get receipts from the mayor that would prove the legitimacy of several charges on her city-issued credit card. The Dallas Morning News reported Friday.

Phillips told the newspaper that he had asked Peters again on Tuesday to document the charges, and that he then asked the city attorney to investigate the mayor's credit card use.

Gang attack leaves three dead

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Mexico (AP) — Members of a northern Mexico drug gang rammed a car that may have been packed with explosives or inflammable material into two police patrol trucks in the border city of Ciudad Juarez, killing two officers and a medical technician and wounding nine people.

Federal police said Thursday's attack — which may be one of the first uses of an explosive-packed car in Mexico — was in retaliation for the arrest of a top leader of the La Linea drug gang, Jesus Acosta Guerrero, earlier in the day.

Seven officers and two civilians were wounded, said a state police source who was not authorized to be quoted by name. He said the compact passenger car had apparently been carrying some kind of explosive or flammable device when it rammed the police pickup trucks. The crash left charred wreckage.

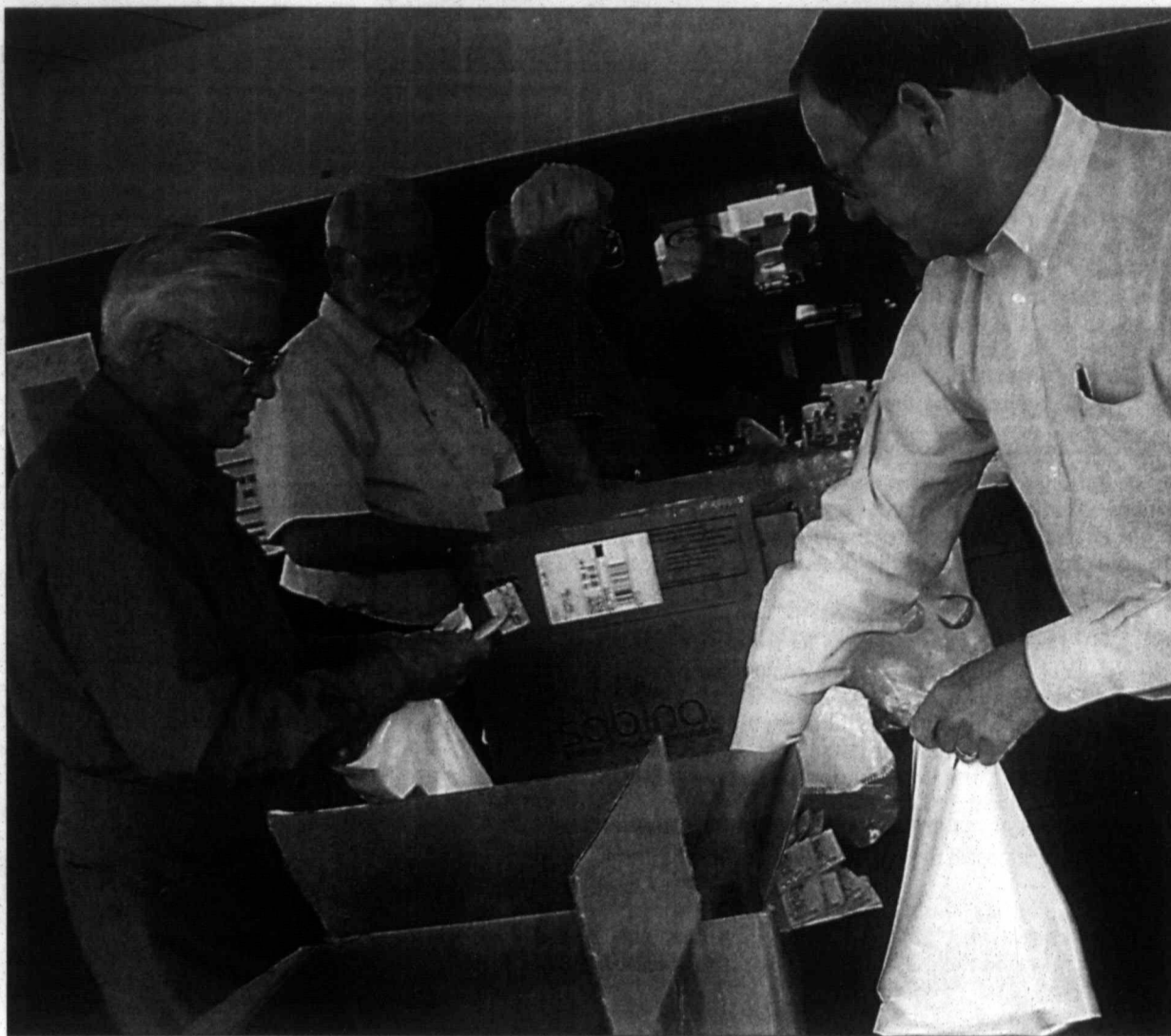
Hunter's body found in Rio Grande

EL PASO (AP) — Mexican authorities have recovered the body of a Las Cruces, N.M.,-area man from the Rio Grande after he had been hunting and went into the water to retrieve a duck.

The body of Ezequiel Roman Lesa was located Thursday. Bernardo Escudero Ortega, director of Ciudad, Mexico, Juarez Ecology and Civil Protection, says the body was recovered near the Bridge of the America. The cause of death is pending, but rescue crews believe Lesa drowned.

The *El Paso Times* reports that Lesa was hunting in Juarez on Monday night when he apparently went into the river to try to retrieve a duck, but was carried away by the strong current.

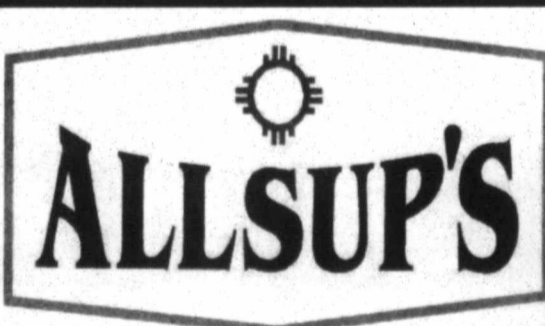


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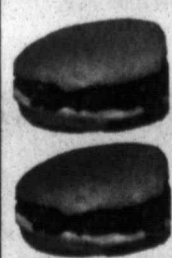

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 16, 1980, former California Gov. Ronald Reagan won the Republican presidential nomination at the party's convention in Detroit.

On this date:

In 1790, a site along the Potomac River was designated the permanent seat of the United States government; the area became Washington, D.C.

In 1862, David G. Farragut became the first rear admiral in the United States Navy.

In 1945, the United States exploded its first experimental atomic bomb, in the desert of Alamogordo, N.M.

In 1957, Marine Maj. John Glenn set a transcontinental speed record by flying a jet from California to New York in 3 hours, 23 minutes and 8 seconds.

In 1964, as he accepted the Republican presidential nomination in San Francisco, Barry M. Goldwater said "extremism in the defense of liberty is no vice" and that "moderation in the pursuit of justice is no virtue."

In 1969, Apollo 11, blasted off from Cape Kennedy on the first manned mission to the surface of the moon.

In 1973, during the Senate Watergate hearings, former White House aide Alexander P. Butterfield publicly revealed the existence of President Richard Nixon's secret taping system.

In 1999, John F. Kennedy Jr., his wife, Carolyn, and her sister, Lauren Bessette, died when their single-engine plane, piloted by Kennedy, plunged into the Atlantic Ocean near Martha's Vineyard, Mass.

Ten years ago: Families and friends of the victims of the TWA Flight 800 explosion broke ground for a new memorial on the Long Island shore not far from where the plane went down, killing all 230 people on board.

Five years ago: A suicide bomber blew up a fuel tanker near a Shiite mosque in Musayyib, Iraq, killing nearly 100 people.

One year ago: Saying that civil rights leaders from decades past had paved the way for his election as the nation's first black commander in chief, President Barack Obama paid homage to the NAACP during a convention in New York, and advised members that their work remained unfinished.

Casting call for 'Liberty Valance 2010'

Some movie remakes are good, most are bad, though it might depend on which you see first. The original "Stagecoach" with John Wayne as The Ringo Kid is far superior to later versions — especially the one with Kris Kristofferson and Willie Nelson. I have no intention of seeing "The Karate Kid."

Speaking of remakes, if they ever re-do "The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance" for modern audiences, it will go something like this: Liberty Valance (originally played by Lee Marvin, but the new one would have Leonardo DiCaprio) is a vicious villain with "small man's syndrome", who has finally been run to the ground and arrested. In a nod to the original, Stoddard is elected to congress as a champion of the "little man", and sets out to line his pockets with every nefarious deal he can work from lobbyists. Valance is hired as a "consultant" (body guard and arm-

twister). Hattie Stoddard, the female lead (Vera Miles) could be played by just about any current actress, as she is the doting wife left behind in Shinbone while Rance plays it up with his office staff in Washington (for a really modern look, she would pity Tom Doniphan and take him in as her "boy toy"). its corporate limits. "I don't know if legal access is the right term," said Hooper on Thursday, "But what it's going to do is set them up to use things like sanitation, water, the police — things like that."

In any case, thanks to Donny for graciously helping to clear that up, and apologies for misunderstanding his original comments. The school board also deserves an apology for the misinformation, so mea culpa on that one, too.

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BP's capped oil well holding nearly a day into new fix

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — BP said its capped-off well appeared to be holding steady Friday morning, almost midway into a white-knuckle waiting period in which engineers watched the pressure gauges for signs of a leak.

Results monitored from control rooms on ships at sea and hundreds of miles away at the company's U.S. headquarters in Houston showed the oil staying inside the cap, rather than escaping through any undiscovered breaches, BP PLC vice president Kent Wells said on a conference call.

Four underwater robots scoured the sea floor but had also found no signs of new leaks.

President Barack Obama said Friday the progress was good news, but cautioned an anxious public not to "get too far ahead of ourselves." Obama said the cap was still being tested and there was still an "enormous clean up job" and ensuring quick compensation for Gulf residents and business in the offing.

There was no evidence of a leak in the pipe under the sea floor, Wells said, one of the main concerns. Wells said the results were encouraging 17 hours after valves were shut to trap oil inside the cap, a test that could last up to 48 hours.

He said pressure continued to rise inside the tight-fighting cap, a good sign that oil was not getting out somewhere else. The pressure was more than 6,700 pounds per square inch, above the minimum they were hoping to see, but not yet in the high range of 8,000 to 9,000 psi they were hoping for.

"The pressures we've seen so far are consistent with the engineering analysis work that BP has done," Wells said. "It's been a very steady build."

Wells also said work would resume on a relief well, the oil giant's more permanent solution meant to plug the leak for good underground to end one of the nation's worst environmental catastrophes.

That's also a sign that things were going well. Engineers had stopped drilling one of the wells Thursday in case that bore hole deep underground could be affected by the oil cap effort.

Engineers and scientists continue to monitor the cap's pressure. When the test is complete, more sea floor mapping will be done to detect any damage or deep-water leaks.

BP finally stopped oil from spewing into the sea Thursday for the first time since an April 20 explosion on the BP-leased Deepwater Horizon oil rig killed 11 workers and unleashed the spill 5,000 feet beneath the water's surface.

The accomplishment was greeted with hope, high expectations — and, in many cases along the beleaguered coastline, disbelief. BP Chief Operating Officer Doug Suttles urged caution and warned the flow could resume, saying it wasn't a time for celebration.

There was no end in sight to cleaning the oil already in the water and on shore. Somewhere between 94 million and 184 million gallons spilled into the Gulf, according to government estimates.

Long strands of white absorbent boom strung along the beach were stained chocolate brown at Orange Beach, Ala., early Friday after a fresh wave of pea-sized tar balls washed ashore. Charter boat captains who can't fish because of the oil spill patrolled the shore looking for more oil slicks.

A few miles away, an oily sheen swirled around a \$4.6

million steel oil barrier erected at the pass into Perdido Bay, located near the Alabama-Florida border.

Orange Beach Mayor Tony Kennon said shutting the well meant a light at the end of the tunnel, but the damage is done.

"The other side is they're not paying claims and I'm watching people moving away, people losing their jobs, everything they've got. How can I be that happy when that's happening to my neighbor?"

The mayor worried that BP would forget its pledges to restore the Gulf when the spotlight moves away.

"Our city has a claim for \$1.9 million, and BP has only paid \$50,000 and it's a simple claim," he said. "That \$20 billion escrow fund is fine, but that's not going to go very far across five states."

On Pensacola Beach in Florida, dozens of BP workers in neon vests operated heavy equipment up and down the beach throughout the night and early morning. Workers used shovels and rakes to comb through the sands for pieces of tar. Other workers then collect the clumps of tar in bags, which are carried by the front-end loaders to dump

trucks and hauled away down the beach.

BP said the decision on whether to reopen the well after the test would be made by the government's national incident command, run by retired Coast Guard Adm. Thad Allen.

It's not clear yet whether the oil will remain bottled in the cap after the test, or whether BP will use the device to funnel the crude into four ships on the surface.

The cap is a temporary measure until the gusher can be plugged deep underground, where a seal will hold better than by blocking the powerful gusher from the top. BP plans to shoot cement and heavy drilling mud into the well from one of the two relief it is drilling.

The 48-hour watch period started at 3:25 p.m. EDT when the last of three valves in the 75-ton cap was slowly throttled shut.

It came after repeated attempts to stop the oil — everything from robotics to different capping techniques to stuffing the hole with mud and golf balls. The week leading up to the moment where the oil cloud ended was a fitful series of starts and setbacks.

"My freshman year I didn't know what to expect," Henderson said.

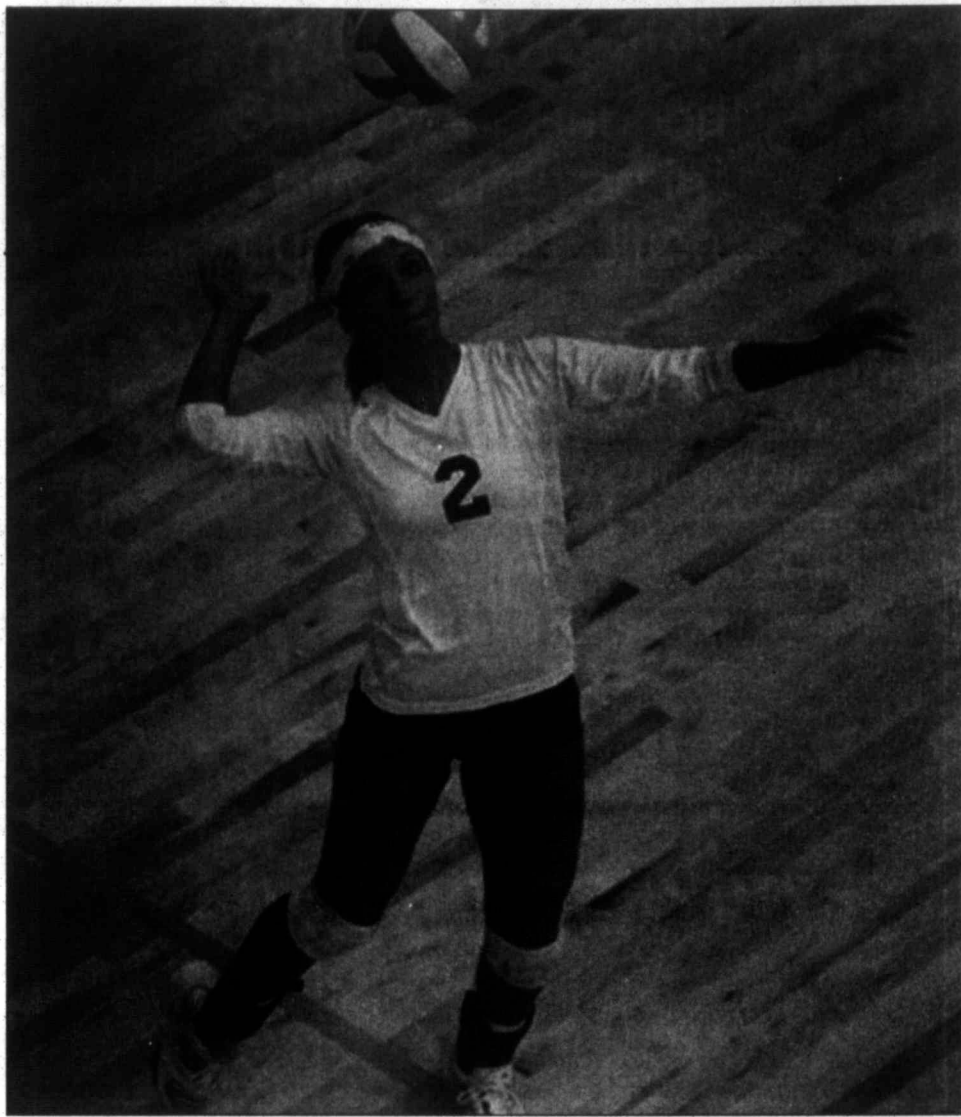
"Last year I knew what to expect. I knew how workouts were and how the coach was going to react."
