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A GHOST RETURNED

After 24 years, Fields helps 'Swamp Ghost' home

June 11, 2010 had been a long time coming for Pampa's Ken Fields. Almost two and a half decades, in fact, if you're counting.

"Twenty-four years," said Fields, an attorney with the Underwood Law Firm. "Twenty-four long years of waiting and work."

June 11 marked the unveiling in Long Beach, Calif., of the "Swamp Ghost," a B-17E Flying Fortress that was once flown by a crew of Americans in the Pacific Theater of World War II.

It was a historic day in American aviation, as it punctuated an improbable return for a craft that had been lost for more than 60 years. It was no less historic for Fields, who had spent most of his adult life trying to make the Ghost's return to America a reality.

The bomber, which flew in the same squadron as that of Fields' own father, Lt. Col. John Wallace Fields, had been shot down by a Japanese anti-

aircraft shell on Feb. 23, 1942.

That connection with his father, Fields said, made him want to know everything about the downed bomber.

As a child, he was told stories of the plane's emergency landing in Papua New Guinea's remote Agaiambo Swamp. He

learned about the Ghost's nine-man crew, many of whom he grew to know personally, and their six-week jungle trek to return to civilization.

The Ghost, meanwhile, was left submerged in water six feet deep, sleeping amongst the **FIELDS** cont. on page 5

DPS confirms six more drug bust arrests

According to a Friday news release from the Texas Department of Public Safety, the list of Thursday's drug related arrests has grown by six, bringing the total to 17.

The Pampa News reported on Friday that a drug raid yielded 11 arrests, all on Randall County warrants.

The latest report from the DPS adds the names of Angela Brown, 40; Gregory Randall Edmondson, 31; Gretchen Osborne, 44; Juan Carlos Silva, 35; Terry Wayne Stroud, 39; and Daniel Jay Whitley, 39.

All are listed as Pampa residents, and all were arrested on Randall county warrants for possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute, a 2nd degree felony.

Randall County Criminal District Attorney James Farren had said Friday that the arrests were part of an ongoing investigation by his office, the same push that resulted in the arrest of 10 other people in Pampa in **ARRESTS** cont. on page 3

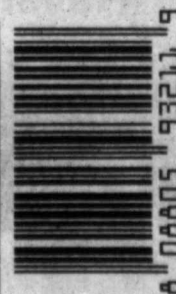

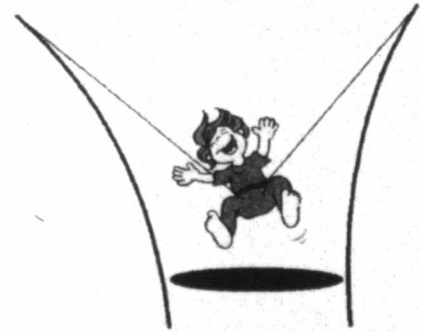

Texas gives IBM 30-day warning

AUSTIN (AP) - IBM Corp.'s big data center consolidation contract with Texas is close to collapsing. State officials warned IBM on Friday that it has 30 days to fix problems with its effort to merge the data centers of 28 state agencies into two facilities.

If it doesn't, the \$863-million contract could be terminated.

The project has been plagued by delays, equipment failures, data losses and frustration among the state agencies.

Karen Robinson, who's the executive director of the Texas Department of Information Resources, says IBM has failed to deliver on its promises. But Jeff Tieszen, a spokesman for IBM, told the Austin American-Statesman that the company has fulfilled its obligations. He said Friday's action was unnecessary and unjustified.

Perry campaign settles lawsuit

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Rick Perry's campaign has paid \$426,000 to former Democratic opponent Chris Bell to settle a campaign funding lawsuit.

Bell's lawsuit accused the governor of trying to hide a \$1 million contribution from Houston homebuilder Bob Perry. Bell claimed the money was illegally funneled through the Republican Governors Association in the final days of the 2006 campaign.

Perry's latest campaign finance report shows the payment to Bell occurred on March 3, the day after this year's primary. The money went to Bell personally, not to a political campaign.

Perry spokesman Mark Miner said both parties decided to settle because of the unnecessary time and cost of a lawsuit.

Disbarred lawyer sentenced

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A disbarred Texas lawyer has been sentenced to 4½ years in federal prison for stealing funds intended to help indigent veterans with their legal needs.

U.S. District Judge Fred Biery also entered a monetary judgment against Alvarado for \$134,350.35 on Friday.

Court records state that Alvarado was a team manager for the Texas Rio Grande Legal Aid who was paid to travel across Texas helping low-income veterans and widows file Veterans Administration claims.

Prosecutors say from Nov. 2003 to Feb. 2006 he submitted over 500 fraudulent vouchers totaling \$134,350.35 for purported business trips from his San Antonio home. Investigators say he faked client names and social security numbers to get travel pay.

Alvarado pleaded guilty to four counts of mail fraud last October.

BLM offers mineral rights

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) - The Bureau of Land Management says it will offer oil and gas leasing mineral rights on parcels totaling more than 42,000 acres in New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas and Kansas at its next lease sale.

The oral auction will be Wednesday in Santa Fe. Parcels will be awarded to qualified bidders offering the highest acceptable bid. The minimum acceptable bid is \$2 per acre.

Most of the parcels are in New Mexico. Texas and Oklahoma each have five parcels and Kansas has one.

The federal government receives more than 12 percent royalties on production on the leases. The state in which the leasing occurs receives 48 percent of royalties collected.

Officer appeals suspension

DALLAS (AP) — A white east Texas police officer shown on dashboard camera video slamming a black handcuffed suspect face first onto the hood of a squad car has appealed his two-day unpaid suspension, officials said Friday.

The arrest was the latest incident to spark outrage in racially charged Paris, about 90 miles northeast of Dallas, where the Nation of Islam and the New Black Panther Party led protests last year after murder charges were dropped against two white defendants accused of fatally striking a black man with a pickup truck.

The video shows a squad car pulling up to the site of a Nov. 10 roadside arrest. Paris Police Officer Jeremy Massey stands alongside his unmarked pickup truck holding a handcuffed suspect, 18-year-old Cornelius Gill. The instant the squad car pulls to a stop, Massey slams Gill, who is 5-foot-4 and weighs 136 pounds, into the hood.

"We believe the use of force is reasonable," said Chris Barrett, Massey's attorney. "I know it's easier to look at the three seconds where Jeremy puts Gill on the car, but that would be grossly unfair to Officer Massey."

US rig count increases by 4

HOUSTON (AP) - The number of rigs actively exploring for oil and natural gas in the U.S. increased by four this week to 1,571.

Houston-based Baker Hughes Inc. said Friday that 979 rigs were exploring for natural gas and 580 for oil. Twelve were listed as miscellaneous. A year ago this week, the rig count stood at 920.

Of the major oil- and gas-producing states, Oklahoma gained five, Colorado gained three and North Dakota gained one. California, Pennsylvania and New Mexico each gained two. Texas lost five, Alaska lost four and Arkansas and Wyoming each lost two. Louisiana and West Virginia remained unchanged.

The rig count tally peaked at 4,530 in 1981, during the height of the oil boom. The industry posted a record low of 488 in 1999.

Teen questioned over stabbing

GALVESTON (AP) — Police are questioning an 18-year-old man about the fatal stabbing of another teen after both were found bleeding on a Galveston beach.

Seventeen-year-old Daniel Polk, of Galveston, died soon after being taken to a local hospital Friday morning with several serious knife wounds, including one to the neck.

Galveston Police Department Capt. Thom Karlok says the 18-year-old, who had cuts on his hands, is accused of stabbing Polk.

Police believe the man, who is also from Galveston, was injured when the weapon he held in his hands slipped, Karlok said.

The Houston Chronicle reports that they were questioning the man but had not yet charged him.

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Mexico (AP) — A drug cartel has used a car bomb for the first time in Mexico's decades-long fight against traffickers, setting a deadly trap against federal police in a city across the border from Texas, the mayor of Ciudad Juarez said Friday.

Mayor Jose Reyes said federal police have confirmed to him that a car bomb was used in the attack that killed three people Thursday.

It was the first time a drug cartel has used a bomb to attack Mexican security forces, marking an escalation in a raging drug war that already is extremely deadly: On Friday alone, a dozen people were killed and 21 wounded in a series of gun battles between soldiers and cartel gunmen in the Mexican border city of Nuevo Laredo, the federal Interior Department said.

In Thursday's bombing, federal police and paramedics were lured to the scene by a phone call reporting that shots were fired at a major intersection and a municipal police officer lay wounded, Reyes told The Associated Press.

As the paramedics were working on the wounded man, a parked car exploded, he said.

Reyes said authorities later determined that the wounded man was not a policeman, although he was wearing a fake uniform. The man was among the three people who died in the attack. The others were a federal police officer and a medical technician.

Brig. Gen. Eduardo Zarate, the commander of the regional military zone, told reporters that up to 22 pounds (10 kilograms) of explosives might have been used, although investigators were still trying to determine what type.

He said the bomb might have been detonated remotely with a cell phone, adding that burned batteries connecting to a mobile phone were found at the scene.

"From what distance? We don't know. But we think it was a distance that allowed (the assailants) to watch the area, waiting for the police to get out of their vehicle," Zarate said.

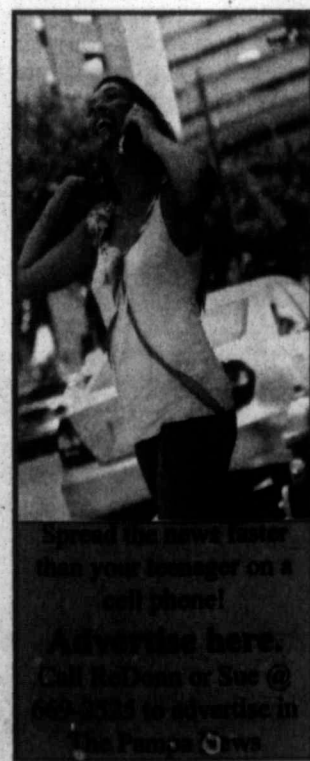
The car bomb demonstrates the growing boldness and military sophistication of Mexico's drug traffickers, who have dramatically stepped up attacks against security forces and government officials since President Felipe Calderon deployed thousands of troops and federal police to crush the cartels in their strongholds.

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 17, 1918, Russia's Czar Nicholas II and his family were executed by the Bolsheviks.

On this date:

In 1821, Spain ceded Florida to the United States.
In 1936, the Spanish Civil War began as right-wing army generals launched a coup attempt against the Second Spanish Republic.

In 1935, the entertainment trade publication Variety ran its legendary headline, "Sticks Nix Hick Pix" (which might be translated as, "Rural audiences reject rural-themed movies").

In 1944, during World War II, 320 men, two-thirds of them African-Americans, were killed when a pair of ammunition ships exploded at the Port Chicago Naval Magazine in California.

In 1955, Disneyland had its opening day in Anaheim, Calif.

In 1959, influential jazz vocalist Billie Holiday, known to her fans as "Lady Day," died in a New York City hospital at age 44.

In 1968, a coup in Iraq returned the Baath Party to power, five years after it was ousted.

In 1975, an Apollo spaceship docked with a Soyuz spacecraft in orbit in the first superpower link-up of its kind.

In 1981, 114 people were killed when a pair of walkways above the lobby of the Kansas City Hyatt Regency Hotel collapsed, one atop the other, during a tea dance.

In 1996, TWA Flight 800, a Paris-bound Boeing 747, exploded and crashed off Long Island, N.Y., shortly after leaving John F. Kennedy International Airport, killing all 230 people aboard.

Ten years ago: Bashar Assad, son of Hafez Assad, began a seven-year term as Syria's 16th head of state. A jet smashed into two homes in Patna, India, killing a total of 60 people on board and on the ground (three passengers survived).

Five years ago: The Iraqi Special Tribunal filed its first criminal case against Saddam Hussein for a 1982 massacre of Shiites. Tiger Woods closed with a 2-under 70 to win the British Open for his tenth career major. Sir Edward Heath, former British prime minister, died in Salisbury, Wiltshire, England, at age 89. Actress Geraldine Fitzgerald died in New York City at age 91.

One year ago: Former CBS anchorman Walter Cronkite died in New York at 92. Bombs ripped through two luxury hotels in Jakarta, Indonesia, killing seven and wounding at least 50 more. The space shuttle Endeavour arrived at the international space station to deliver the third and final component of a billion-dollar Japanese lab. Gordon Waller, of the pop duo Peter and Gordon, died in Norwich, Conn. at 64.

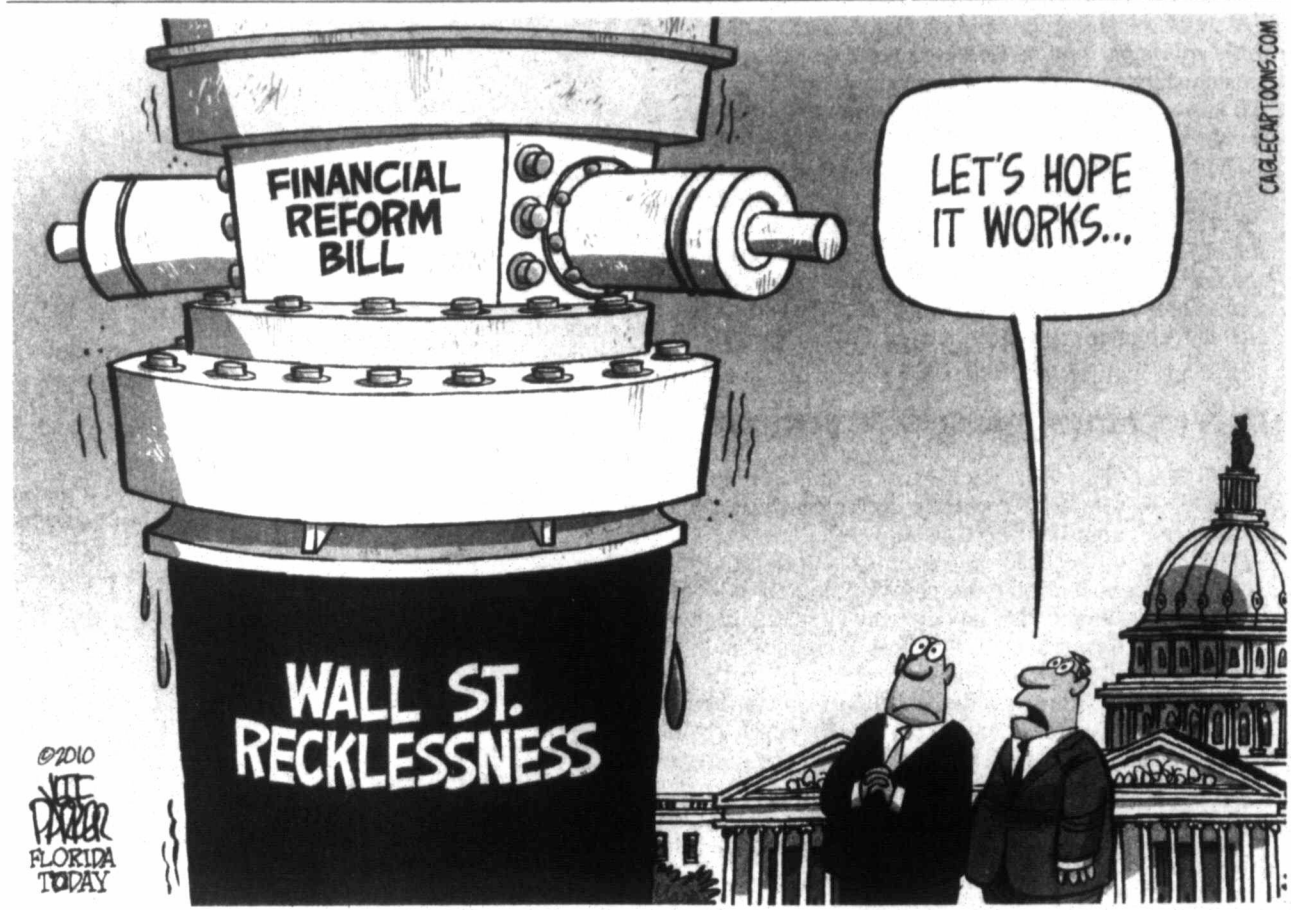

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Dems enacted much of Obama's agenda

WASHINGTON (AP) - Far-reaching legislation aimed at reining in Wall Street marks the latest and likely the last major achievement by President Barack Obama and the Democratic-controlled Congress, an 18-month partnership that strove simultaneously to fix a battered economy and enact sweeping changes to health care, education and more.

Whatever the longer term impact - the most far-reaching changes in the health care legislation won't start until 2014 - the immediate aftermath is unemployment that scrapes double digits and deficits far deeper than Obama and his allies inherited in January 2009.

The Republicans who worked ceaselessly to thwart the president's agenda are emboldened, while Democrats who voted it into law brace for majority-threatening election losses.

"Did they do the right thing for the public interest? I think so, but that depends on your values," said James Thurber, professor and director of the Center for Congressional & Presidential Studies at American University. "You are elected, you get power, you govern and you change things the way you said you would."

That doesn't mean you'll be rewarded.

"They're going to get punished for it," Thurber said, in part because the economy has not responded strongly, but also because midterm elections are rarely kind to the party in control of the White House.

That's the long view - the political pendulum swings - a perspective rarely if ever in fashion in Congress and certainly not in the run-up to an election. It also masks a perennial debate about the proper role of government in the economy, in health care, in the auto industry, in energy policy and other areas.

"If we had health care sooner, if we had energy sooner, if we had the education bill sooner, they were all three pillars of job creation, and that would have resulted in more jobs created by now," Speaker Nancy Pelosi said at a news conference on Thursday. The 2009 economic stimulus legislation has created or saved 3.6 million jobs, she added, using an estimate that Republicans challenge.

"Without it, we would never have dug out of the deep recession that the Bush Administration had taken us in," Pelosi said.

It was anything but an apology for the policies she, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid and others have pursued relentlessly, but something of a lament that the Senate can't act as quickly as the House. Frustrated, House Democrats compiled a list of bills that they have cleared but still await action in the Senate. It runs to 345 items.

Not surprisingly, there are far fewer if-onlys at the moment among Republicans, politically ascendant after losing seats in two straight elections.

"In every case, the administration saw a crisis and used it to achieve some other long-desired goal of the left. And the crisis remained," Sen. Mitch McConnell of Kentucky said in a speech a few hours before the financial regulation bill won final approval.

"The trillion dollar stimulus that promised to keep unemployment at 8 percent didn't prevent 9.5 percent unemployment and a loss of nearly 3 million more American jobs," he told the Young Republican Leadership Conference. "The new health care law, according to the administration's own actuary, will bring us higher, not lower health care costs. The financial regulation bill doesn't do a thing to reform the two institutions that played what may have been the leading role in creating the financial mess in the first place," a reference to housing giants Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac.

McConnell, Boehner and nearly all fellow Republicans voted against that bill, as well as the other major measures that Obama, Pelosi and Reid pushed to passage: The \$787 billion economic stimulus bill; the \$1 trillion health care measure designed to extend coverage to millions who now lack it; the more generous student loans made possible by stripping banks of their lucrative role as lending middlemen.

A separate measure, passed in 2009, expanded health care for children of lower and middle-income families.

After eight years of a Republican presidency, the Democrats pursued numerous other priorities over 18 months.

Obama signed legislation giving the Food and Drug Administration authority to regulate advertising, marketing, and manufacturing of tobacco products. Another bill overrode a Supreme Court ruling, strengthening the rights of women and others who

allege they were victims of discrimination on the job. Democrats also enacted hate crime legislation.

With less than four months remaining until the elections and a lame-duck session of Congress likely this fall, Obama is on track to win confirmation for Elena Kagan to the Supreme Court, his second pick in two years. An extension of unemployment benefits is all but certain. Democrats hope to overturn the Pentagon policy against homosexuals serving openly in the military.

Reid intends to seek passage of a slimmed-down energy bill that includes greater liability for BP in the oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico. But even if it passes, it will fall far short of the sweeping plan Obama outlined to control carbon emissions. That's one of the 345 stalled measures on the House list, and

one that some rank and file moderates would like to have back.

Democrats may also yet attempt to roll back tax cuts from the Bush era that benefit those at the highest income levels.

For the most part, though, the major legislative record is complete for Democrats who took office 18 months ago.

But not the argument. "I think it ought to be repealed," House Republican Leader John Boehner of Ohio said of the financial legislation, even before it had cleared. The bill "gives far too much authority to federal bureaucrats to bail out virtually any company in America they decide ought to be bailed out," he added. Obama rebutted from the White House. "We can't afford another financial crisis, just as we're digging out from the last one."

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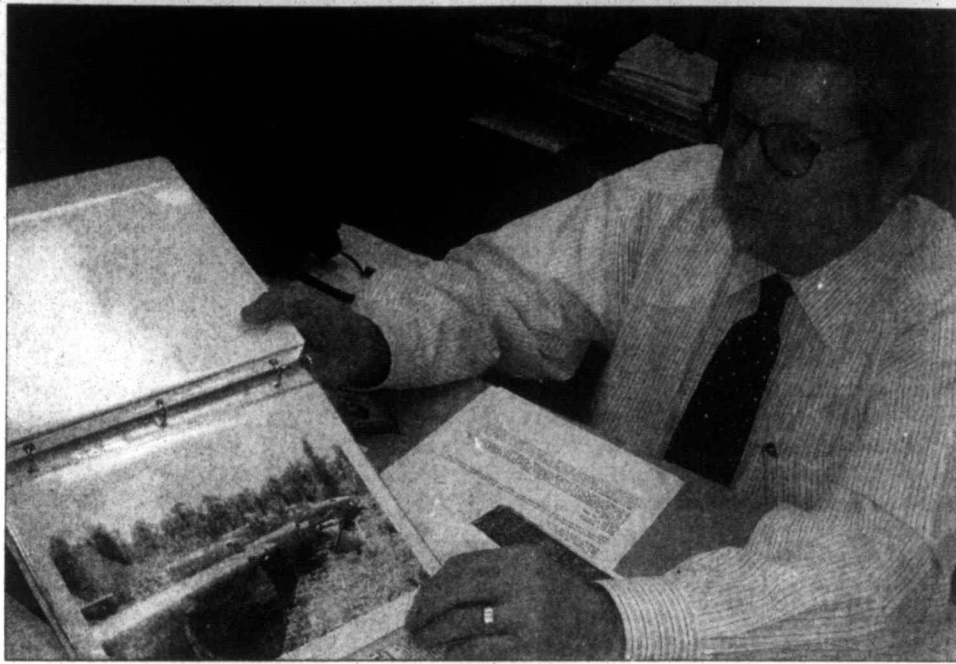

kunai grass and crocodiles until its rediscovery in 1972 by a passing helicopter.

"This plane was found in remarkable condition," Fields said. "I mean, the machine guns were still there and operable. Most of the body was, for the most part, intact.

"It had just literally been preserved and hidden in the swamp for so long," continued Fields. "Experts couldn't believe how well-preserved it was."

Fields first laid his own eyes on the Ghost in March of 1986, when he and a reconnaissance team ventured out to Agaiambo to see the downed plane for themselves. He returned in 1999, this time in conjunction with David Tallichet, a California restaurateur and noted Warbird collector, and Alfred Hagen, a Philadelphia contractor with knowledge of New Guinea.

At the time, Fields and company had every intention of salvaging the craft and bringing it home to the States. Those efforts, however, were stalled when the Papuan government refused to grant visas to the recovery crew.

Fields returned to New Guinea again in 2006, this time with Hagen spearheading the effort under the umbrella of his own company, Aero Archaeology. With a multinational crew of Americans and Australians, Aero Archaeology was successful in raising the plane from the mud, inflating air bags under its wings to lift the plane out of the water.

"That spot in the world (where the plane sat) hadn't seen daylight for about 64 years," Fields said. "That whole (process) took days for us to figure out. We were there day after day, not knowing what was in that swamp with us most of the time. We were chest deep in brown, murky water, flicking scorpions off of each other. "The Australians couldn't believe a lawyer would get so dirty," added Fields with a grin.

Cutting torches were used to separate the plane into pieces — fuselage, wings, engine mounts — which were then transported by helicopter and barge to a port for transfer back to the States. The Papuan media, however, soon got hold of the story, leaving the Swamp Ghost's return in question once again.

"There was this huge flapdoodle about it," laughed Fields. "People were saying, 'Oh no, you can't take the Swamp Ghost out of the country,' even though I had carefully drafted an aircraft recovery agreement that the government signed.

"From May of '06 until Jan. 28 of this year, they would not give us an export permit to take the airplane out of New Guinea."

Fortunately, though, the Papuan government eventually gave in, agreeing to let Aero Archaeology bring the Swamp Ghost back stateside. The aircraft's parts were exported by freighter across the Pacific, taking Fields' crusade to finally return the

bomber back to the United States to its long-awaited end last month.

"You almost don't believe it, after so long," said Fields of the plane's California unveiling. "They had the plane's fuselage draped in white, which was fitting for a plane that had come to be nicknamed the 'Swamp Ghost.'"

The moment those sheets were lifted, Fields said, was an intense one, not just because of all the effort he'd invested in the plane's recovery, but also because of his personal connection to the plane's history.

"It was an emotional moment, because I was thinking of my dad," recalled Fields. "I was thinking of him and of the 18- and 19-year-old boys who were crewing that airplane against the might of the empire of Japan.

"They were outnumbered, halfway across the world, and getting pelted with shots on all sides. I got to know many of the men who crewed this airplane as a kid since it was in my dad's squadron, and it came to represent to me the courage that my father and those men showed during a time that many of us couldn't ever imagine."

Now, the airplane is in a hangar in Chino, Calif., near Long Beach. It is currently waiting on a final decision regarding its ultimate fate; several museums are in line to receive it, including the Nimitz Museum of the Pacific War in Fredericksburg.

Its story might also be making its way into your living room sometime soon. A documentary crew accompanied Fields and his team during the 2006 recovery mission, and the film they took will be used in a proposed five-part series, entitled "Broken Wings," to air on the Discovery Channel.

For Fields, however, no museum visit or TV documentary will ever match the memories he gathered over his 24-year campaign to return the Swamp Ghost home. He'll look back fondly, he said, on every minute he spent waiting and working towards the moment he saw the Swamp Ghost's fuselage on American soil.

"For me, it all comes back to my dad," Fields said. "When I think about that plane, I think about how my dad was born in 1917 in a little house on a ranch in Wheeler County. It's just always amazed me that a baby that came into the world in that little old place ended up flying a bomber against the Japanese on the other side of the world."

"My respect for him led me to be interested in that airplane. I spent almost 25 years trying to get it back to America. I like to think that my father would have been very, very proud of that. In a big way, I did it for him, and for all of the men who fought for our freedom.

"We did it. We got it back here, finally, and that is a great feeling."

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Illegal immigrant death toll soars along Arizona border

PHOENIX (AP) — The number of deaths among illegal immigrants crossing the Arizona desert from Mexico is soaring so high this month that the medical examiner's office that handles the bodies is using a refrigerated truck to store some of them, the chief examiner said Friday.

The bodies of 40 illegal immigrants have been brought to the office of Pima County Medical Examiner Dr. Bruce Parks since July 1. At that rate, Parks said the deaths could top the single-month record of 68 in July 2005 since his office began tracking them in 2000.

"Right now, at the halfway point of the month, to have so many is just a very bad sign," he said. "It's definitely on course to perhaps be the deadliest month of all time."

From Jan. 1 to July 15, the office has handled the bodies of 134 illegal immi-

grants, up from 93 at the same time last year and 102 in 2008. In 2007, when the office recorded the highest annual deaths of illegal immigrants, 140 bodies had been taken there through July 15.

Parks said his office, which handles immigrant bodies from three counties, is currently storing roughly 250 bodies and had to start using a refrigerated truck because of the increase in immigrant deaths this month.

He said many of the bodies seem to be coming from the desert southwest of Tucson, where it tends to be hotter than eastern parts of the border or the Tucson metro area.

Authorities believe the high number of deaths are likely due to above-average and unrelenting heat in southern Arizona this month and ongoing tighter border security that pushes immigrants to more remote, rugged and dangerous terrain.

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Airlines preparing for cargo-checking deadline

FORT WORTH (AP) — Airlines are buying giant X-ray machines and other machinery to meet an Aug. 1 deadline to begin screening all cargo that goes on passenger planes. Federal officials say the new rules will close a large security gap. Just four years

ago, only half of all cargo was inspected. But the system to guard against terrorists getting a bomb on a plane is far from airtight. Cargo coming into the U.S. from other countries is still often not inspected. In a sweltering warehouse

next to Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport on Friday, American Airlines workers were being trained in the use of a 12-foot-high black box, an X-ray machine that was installed just two weeks ago. Nearby, another airline employee traced a wand

over boxes, looking for traces of explosives. The worker said fertilizer sometimes triggers an alarm.

To reduce the load on airlines, about half of all domestic cargo is being screened at more than 800 facilities run by companies certified by the Transportation Security Administration. The TSA relies on those operators to ensure that cargo isn't opened before reaching the airport.

Without those 800 centers taking half the load, it would take American hours longer to screen each cargo shipment. It also would force shippers to deliver their goods to the airport several hours earlier, defeating the advantage of speedy air freight, said Dave Brooks, president of American's cargo division.

For cargo that American screens, the airline is rais-

ing its charge and forcing shippers to get to the airport two hours earlier, starting Aug. 1.

Douglas Brittin, general manager of the TSA's cargo division, said security of cargo aboard passenger planes - long identified as a threat - has steadily improved. Since the beginning of 2009, the TSA has approved 77 new pieces of equipment to screen cargo for explosives, chemicals and other threats.

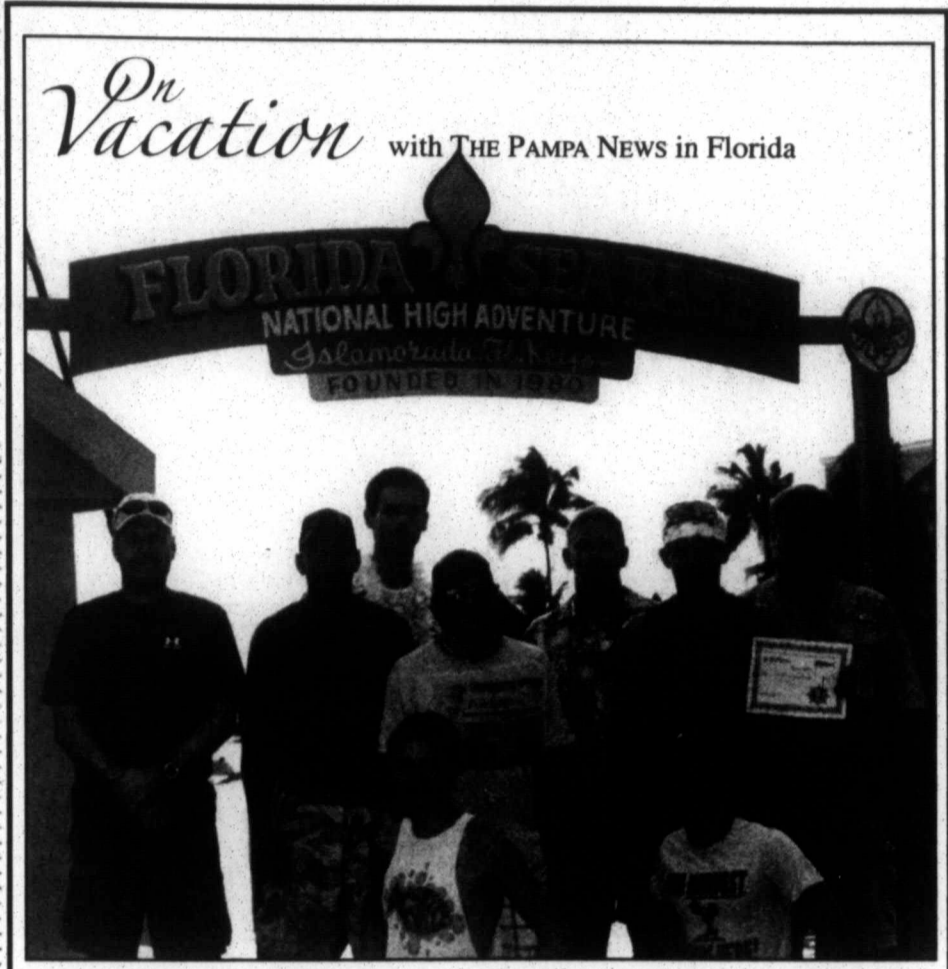
Last month, the Government Accountability Office said the TSA was making progress toward the requirement to screen all cargo on passenger planes. But the GAO said the TSA could lack resources to properly monitor those 800 independent inspection centers, and had no technology for inspecting large shipments consisting of

many packages.

The TSA is talking to aviation officials in other countries to close another gap - cargo on planes arriving in the U.S. from other countries. The TSA's top official told Congress in March that it could be years before all inbound cargo is screened.

Inbound shipments that the TSA deems high risk - officials won't say how they decide - must be screened before the plane heads for the U.S. In other cases, shipments must be inspected after landing in the U.S. before being loaded on another plane.

For example, if the airline can't prove that produce being shipped from South America to Japan through the U.S. has been screened to TSA standards, "they're going to have to take it apart and screen it before it flies to Japan," Brittin said.

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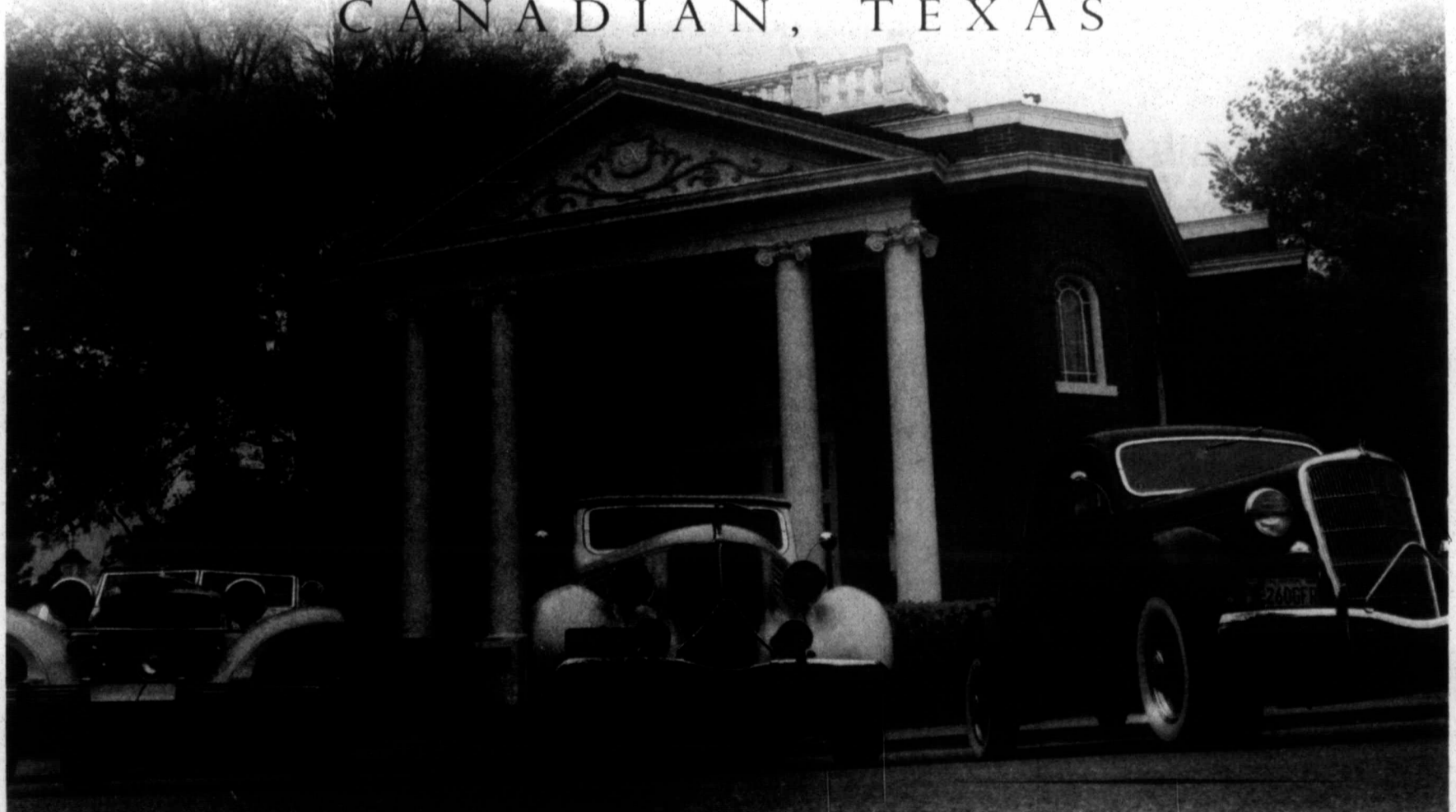

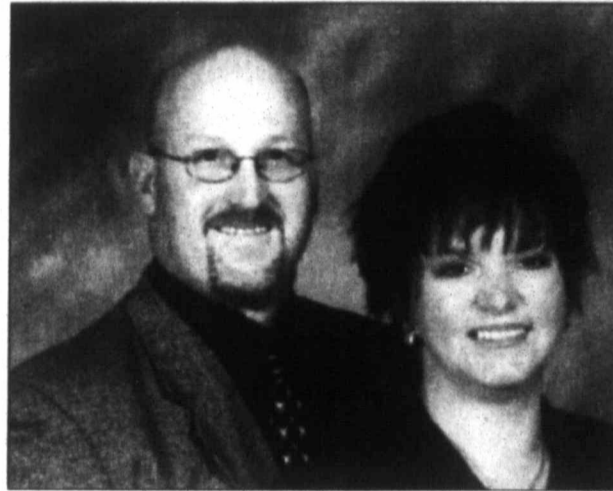

A look back in time: Remembering the Pampa Oilers

Roy "Deck" Woldt was in his college dorm at Southwestern Oklahoma during the 40s, playing for the Double A Oklahoma City Indians, when he received a visit from then-Pampa Oilers owner R.L. Edmonson.

"He knew who I was," Woldt said, "and one day he asked me, 'How'd you like to come down and play for me down in Pampa?'"

Woldt initially turned him down because he thought he would have a chance to play in a higher league. However, when Woldt found out he was going to be optioned back to minor league Wilkes-Barre, he refused the option and decided to call Edmonson back.

In addition to the purchase of his contract, Woldt asked for \$1,000 to buy a car. Edmonson agreed, the deal was sealed, and Woldt was an Oiler.

The Pampa Oilers played from 1939 to 1942 and from 1946 to 1957. Woldt played for the team from 1950 to 1955 and made two All-Star Games, including one in Pampa in 1953.

"It drew 3,000 to 4,000 people," Woldt said. "People were lined up all around the fence."

The Pampa Oilers were started in 1939 by Harold Miller, owner of Pampa Office Supply, and several other businessmen. The team joined the West Texas New Mexico League, a Class D professional league, joining the Borger Gassers, Amarillo Gold Sox, Big Spring Barons, Clovis Pioneers, Lamesa Lobos, Lubbock Hubbers and the Midland Cowboys. Albuquerque would also later join the league, and Plainview added a team called the Ponies.

Woldt said the Oilers got players by either purchasing them or had them optioned from higher levels.

"The team that optioned them would pay half their salary," Woldt said. "So that got them a pretty reasonable ball player for half the salary."

The Oilers played their games at Oiler Park. Bartlett's Lumber and Hardware on Brown Street now stand where home plate once sat. Woldt said the ballpark had strong attendance early in the Oilers' history, and the other teams in the league drew a lot of interest as well.

"The teams grew popular with the fans and actually drew 80 to a hundred fans a year," Woldt said.

The team was successful early on, as they won the pen-

nant in 1940, their second season of existence. Miller operated the team until 1942, when, according to Woldt, the team stopped season play because of the United States' involvement in World War II.

Woldt said the team returned in 1946 at the Class C

level. The Oilers were purchased by Edmonson, a local rancher who owned the team from 1946 to 1949. Under Edmonson's ownership, the team won their second pennant in 1946.

Edmonson sold the team at the beginning of the 1950 season to R. Doug Mills, who was also a rancher and businessman. The Oilers won their third pennant in Mills' first season, and stayed a Class C team until 1957.

Woldt said the Oilers games were broadcast on the radio by Warren Hasse, who was the sports editor at *The Pampa News* at that time.

"Back in those days when the Oilers were on the road, he would do the game with a telegraph," Woldt said. "He had such a good knack at it that he would implement different things like the sound of the bat, the crowd noise, the national anthem. I understand that a lot of people would go to the ballpark and turn on the lights in the grandstand and play the baseball game announced over the radio."

The Oilers won one more pennant in 1954, but unfortunately, Woldt said, the team would have financial problems over the years. Mills sold the club back to a local businessmen's group, The Pampa Baseball Association. Woldt said the popularity of television and the rise of the Pampa Optimist Club ultimately led to the team's downfall.

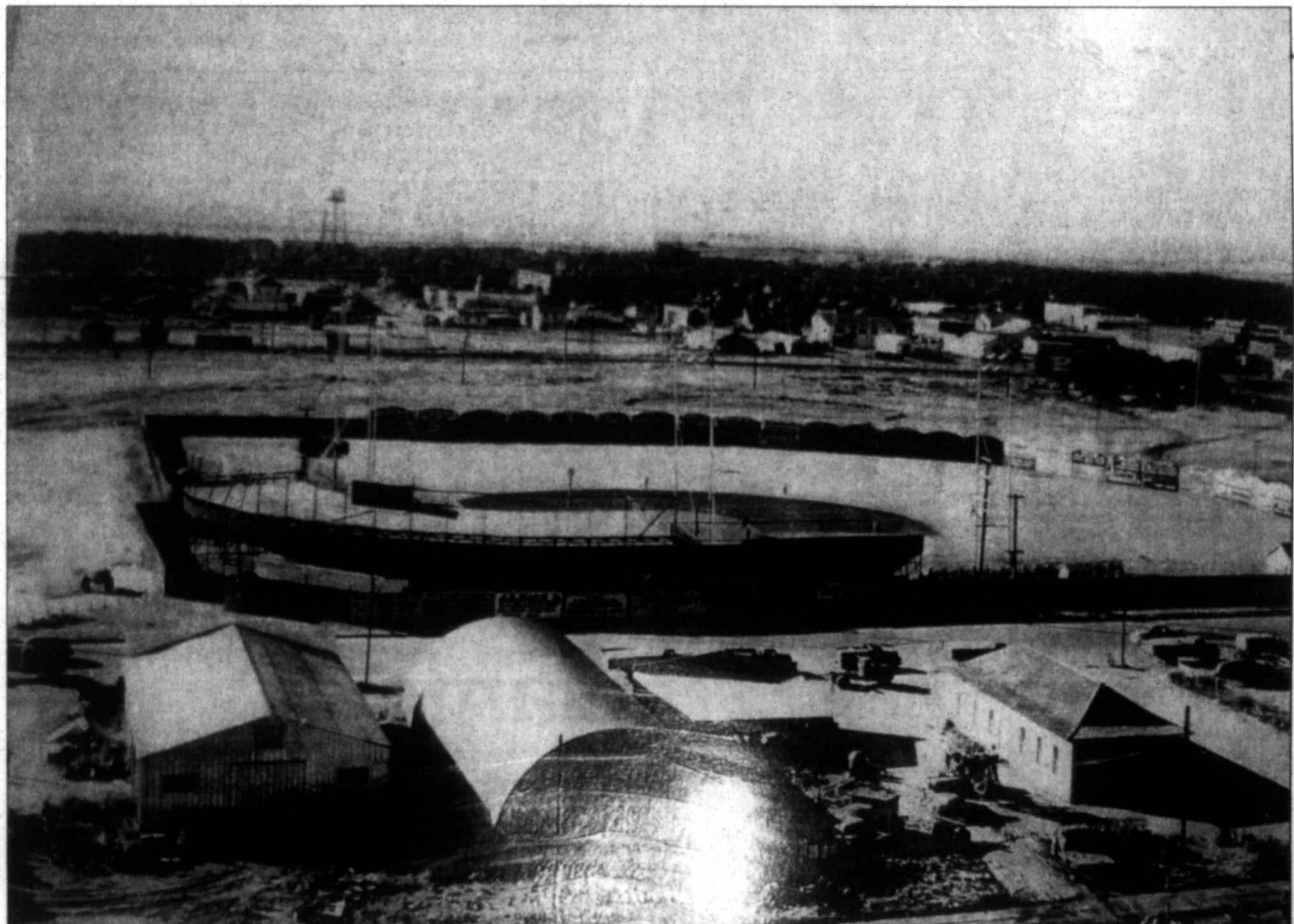

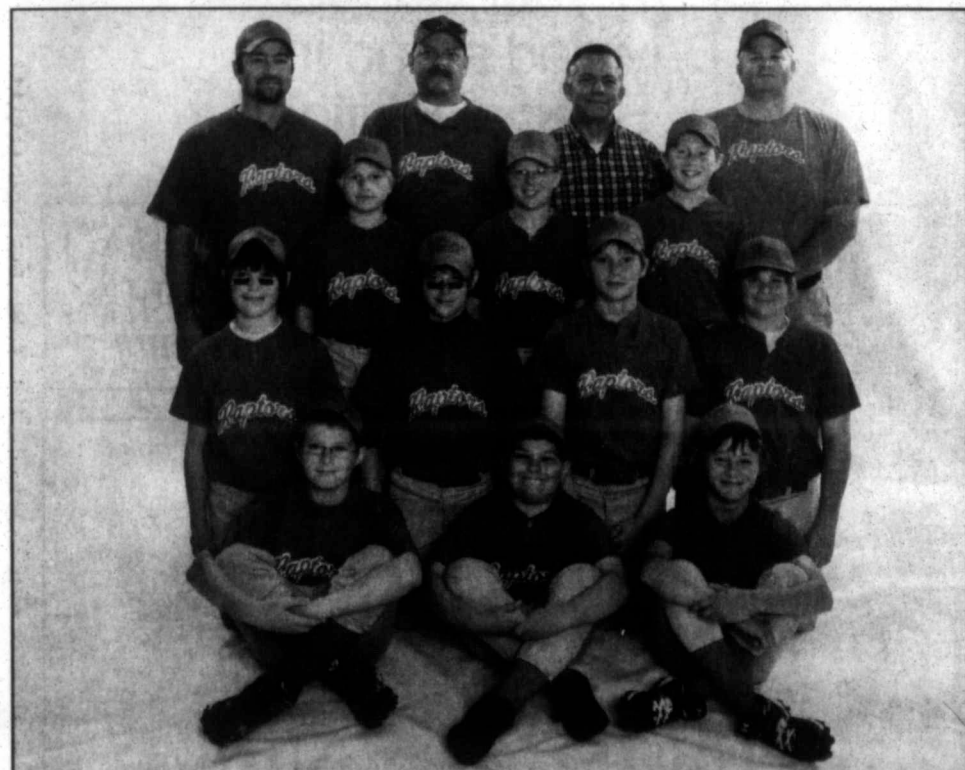

Hunter education courses offered

With the World Cup decided, it is time to think about other sports. Dove hunting, for instance, opens in September, and Hunter Education courses are being offered throughout the state.

Hunting is an ideal sport for the entire family. "It is common to have parents and children taking the same class," said Maria Araujo, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department instructor. She added that over 30,000 Texans take the course annually and

learn hunter ethics and firearm safety.

In Texas, hunters born on or after September 2, 1971 are required to pass Hunter Education. Before age 17, youth are exempt if they are accompanied by a licensed hunter age 17 years of age or older. Minimum age for hunter education certification is nine years old. When a hunter turns 17 years, a one-time deferral is available from license dealers to postpone the Hunter Education requirement for

one license period, but it requires hunting under the supervision of a certified adult hunter or a hunter exempt because of age.

For family fun, Texas offers more than 200 public areas for hunting statewide with an annual \$48 permit. Family members who do not hunt can have access to the same areas with an annual Limited Public Use permit of \$12 and enjoy other recreational activities including fishing, photography, hiking and watching wildlife. Primitive camping

is allowed in some areas. Youth under 17 years of age enter free when accompanying a permit holder. The Annual Public Hunting permit can be purchased at any location that sells hunting licenses.

Hunting preparations begin with Hunter Education. The course costs \$15 and requires reservations. For more information, call 800-792-1112 ext. 4901 or 512-389-4901 or see www.tpwd.state.tx.us/learning/hunter_education/espanol/index.phtml.

"There was a lot of local interest for youth baseball," Woldt said. "There was games of the week on television and along with the Optimist Club program the attendance dropped to where the team could hardly pay their expenses."

The Oilers reached their highest level of classification at the B level in 1957 but the Oilers would stop play that season because they didn't have enough money. Woldt said the Oilers had to make long road trips which was expensive.

"When they were on the road in 1957 the Oilers had to give up," Woldt said. "They were in Abilene or somewhere down South when they absolutely didn't have enough money to play."

During their existence, the Oilers did have several players that played in the Major Leagues.

Infielder Sammy Hale played for Pampa in 1941, but before that, he played for the Detroit Tigers from 1920 to 1921, the Philadelphia Athletics from 1923 to 1929 and the St. Louis Browns in 1930. In Hale's final season with the Athletics, he won the World Series.

Pitcher George Milstead played for the Oilers in 1942 and played for the Chicago Cubs from 1924 to 1926. Warren Hacker, a pitcher for Pampa in 1946, pitched for the Cubs from 1948-1956 and finished 24th in the National League MVP voting in 1952. From 1957 to 1961, Hacker played for the Cincinnati Redlegs, (now the Reds) the Philadelphia Phillies and the Chicago White Sox.

John Bottarini played for the Oilers in 1948. In the major leagues, Bottarini played 26 games for the 1937 Cubs. Luis Suarez played for Pampa in 1951 and played one game with the Washington Senators in 1944. Ted Pawelek played and managed for the Oilers in 1953 and played in four games with the 1946 Cubs. Tommy Thompson played for the Oilers in 1953 and played in the majors with the Boston Braves (1933-1936), the White Sox (1938-1939) and the St. Louis Browns in 1939. Lou Johnson played outfield for the Oilers in 1954 and played in the Major Leagues from 1960-1969. In 1965, Johnson finished 24 in the MVP voting with the Los Angeles Dodgers, who won the World Series that season. Johnson also played

in the World Series in the 1966 season but was on the losing end.

More on Deck and the Oilers:

- Before playing in Pampa, Deck Woldt played for Crookston (1939), Clovis (1946), Oklahoma City (1946; 1948-1949), Jacksonville (1947) and Wilkes-Barre (1948)
- After playing baseball, Woldt coached the sport at Pampa High School. Currently Woldt gives out a scholarship in honor of his late wife Eloise.
- In a spring training game against the Cleveland Indians, Woldt got a base hit off of baseball legend Satchel Paige.
- Former Oiler Lou Johnson played for the 1962 Milwaukee Braves and was teammates with Hank Aaron and Joe Torre.
- Johnson played with Sandy Koufax and Don Drysdale in 1965 with Los Angeles.

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Roy Rogers' stuffed horse 'Trigger' sold to Neb. TV station

NEW YORK (AP) - A Nebraska cable TV network ponied up \$266,500 for Roy Rogers' stuffed and mounted horse, Trigger, at an auction in New York City on Wednesday.

The movie cowboy's faithful companion was bought by the cable company RFD-TV in Omaha, Neb., at a Christie's auction of items from the now-closed Roy Rogers and Dale Evans Museum in Branson, Mo.

Trigger's sale price outpaced the estimated \$100,000 to \$200,000 it was expected to fetch, with many other items also selling far above estimate.

RFD-TV's chief financial officer Steve Campione says Rogers reflects the company's values. The network airs mainly agricultural, equine and country living programming.

The company's owner, Patrick Gottsch, wanted to buy the whole Rogers collection but didn't have time to work out the deal, Campione said.

"It came to our attention a little too late," Campione said. "By the time we lined up the right financing and kind of got our arms around the value of the collection, it was literally 24 hours ago."

Auctioneer Cathy Elkie said it was the "most colorful, emotional and sentimental" sale she had experienced in her 20 years at Christie's. Many of the bidders in the packed hall came in Western attire and cowboy boots, and there were more than a few tears.

Rogers' son Roy Jr. cried at the beginning of the sale as he spoke of the family's decision to auction Roy's belongings.

"We hope you get a piece of Roy and Dale and take it home and you'll get to pass it on to your children," he said.

There also were strong emotions among Jamie Nudie, Mary Lynn Cabral and Julie Ann Ream, who flew in from Los Angeles to reclaim a piece of their personal history.

Nudie's grandfather was the "rodeo tailor" who designed Rogers' colorful Western outfits, as well

as Rogers' silver-dollar encrusted 1964 Bonneville convertible that sold for \$254,500 on the auction block.

The three women have carried on Nudie's Western tailoring business, and they were there to reclaim the Nudie trailer shaped like a covered wagon that the tailor had given to Rogers as a gift in the 1960s. Ream broke down in tears when her paddle went up and she got the trailer for \$3,000 without a fight. The trailer was expected to fetch between \$5,000 and \$8,000.

"For it to come back into our family - it's amazing," she said.

Ream, the niece of another famous singing cowboy, Rex Allen, said her family was close friends with the Rogers' family. She said some of Rogers' children didn't support the auction, and she didn't think Rogers and his wife, Dale Evans, would have wanted the collection dispersed either.

"They are spinning in their graves right now," she said.

Cabral, also a family friend, had another take on Rogers' wishes.

"Roy always said, 'When I'm dead, skin me and put me up on Trigger,'" she said. "It's a famous quote. If he got his wish, he'd be up here for sale today."

Rogers had Trigger preserved with taxidermy and mounted rearing on its hind legs in 1965. The presale estimate for the horse was \$100,000 to \$200,000.

Roy Jr. said it was difficult to put the collection up for auction, but he said Rogers had told the family to sell the museum collection if it stopped making money and became a burden.

"You're smiling out of

one side of the face and crying out of the other," he said.

As for Trigger's new owner, Campione says RFD-TV hopes to start its own Western museum and is looking to buy more Rogers items.

In the meantime, Trigger will be put to pasture at either the network's office lobby or Gottsch's house until final plans are made.

Other items auctioned Wednesday included Roy's first guitar, which sold for \$8,750, compared to an estimated high of \$3,000; his first boots, which sold for \$7,500, compared to an estimate of \$4,000; and a charm bracelet that sold for \$20,000, compared to an estimate of \$9,000.

All sale prices include the buyer's premium of 25 percent for most items, or 20 percent for prices in excess of \$50,000.

The auction was to continue Thursday with more than 1,000 items, including the Rogers' family dinner table, toy six-shooters, Rogers-themed tin lunchboxes and the Jeep "Nellybelle" from the Roy Rogers TV show.
