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

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# ConocoPhillips turnaround paying regional dividends

Project bringing money to Panhandle area

Borger's ConocoPhillips refinery may be 30 miles away, but work being done at the plant is reaping benefits for Pampa as well as the rest of the Panhandle region.

According to media ConocoPhillips Borger Refinery Human Resources Manager Terrie Rogers, the plant is currently undergoing a turnaround to comply with the Gasoline Benzene Reduction Project. Doing so will enable the refinery to produce cleaner gasoline, reducing benzene content and reducing CO2 emissions in line with federal regulations.


Per ConocoPhillips' statement, the refinery is under temporary maintenance shutdown and the company has brought in approximately 2,000 contract employees to make the conversion possible.

In effect, the turnaround has injected 2,000 new consumers into the area's economic base, with the effects already being felt in areas such as hotel occu-

pancy and revenue. "People were looking for places to stay, and my understanding is that we're pretty much full," said Chamber of Commerce Director Joe Weaver. "I wouldn't be surprised if places like Dumas and even Amarillo were in the

The problem is my mom, who is divorced, is unemployed and a social phobic, with few friends. We provide her with financial support by paying several hundred dollars a month in rent, in addition to other bills. She helps me with a loan when the rare emergency arises. Every time I mention moving

out, she becomes angry with me. She cries that she'll be left alone with no money -- and it makes me feel so guilty I relent. I have no idea what to do. My older sister, who is married with two children, might be able to help me out, but we have never been close and I'm reluctant to ask for her advice. Please help, Abby. — MA-MA'S GIRL IN ROSWELL, GA.

DEAR MAMA'S GIRL: You are not the solution to your mother's problems. The time has come for you to spread your wings and fly the nest. Before you leave, be sure the apartment is in the freshest condition possible so it can be rented and your mother will have some income. She will probably need professional help to overcome her ingrained social insecurities -so encourage her to get it. (Some licensed psychotherapists specialize in phobic disorders.) It will change her life -- and yours -- for the better.

DEAR ABBY: If a girl ever needed advice, it's me. My father walked out 20 years ago, leaving four children and a disabled wife. He just vanished. We grew up and I searched for him. Because of the power of the Internet, I was contacted by his family, and Dad was found. He had reunited with his sister, who updated me.

Now I'm faced with the dilemma of how to speak to him for the first time since I was in diapers, and I am angry. My aunt advises me not to ask for answers to questions like "why" because I may not get them. Of the things he did say to her, not once did he express remorse.

I guess what I'm asking is how to talk to this stranger who altered my life. Most of what I have are questions. How am I not entitled to answers? Abby, this has been a long search and now that I have succeeded, I don't know what to do. -STRESSED IN TEXAS

DEAR STRESSED: Your anger is justified. Unless he was locked in a mental ward, a man who would leave a disabled wife and four small children and "just vanish" is someone with no concern for anyone other than himself. Approach him with the same caution you would any other stranger, because that's what he is. Because this is stressful, list your questions in advance so you won't forget any. But I'm warning you: Do not allow him to make you feel sorry for him.



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
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

## Weakened Bonnie still packs punch

BELLE CHASSE, La. (AP) — Bonnie was downgraded to a depression Friday, but still packed enough kick to prompt emergency declarations along Louisiana's coast and make officials begin the tedious preparation for tropical storm-force wind and rain bearing down on the shore.

"We always prepare for one category stronger than the projections, so we think it's prudent to plan for a Category 1 hurricane," Gov. Bobby Jindal said during a news conference flanked by Plaquemines Parish President Billy Nungesser and other officials.

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Jindal said coastal parishes and some as far inland as East Baton Rouge Parish have issued emergency declarations that allow local governments to take actions such as arranging for debris removal or stockpiling supplies.

Plaquemines and Lafourche parishes were calling for voluntary evacuations of low-lying areas and St. Bernard Parish President Craig Taffaro issued a similar order for those living outside the hurricane levee protection system.

## Inmate freed after 19 years

HOUSTON (AP) — A Houston man was released from prison Friday after an investigation by the district attorney's office found he was locked up 19 years for a rape he didn't commit.

Allen Wayne Porter's attorney, Casey Garrett, said Porter was released Friday afternoon on a recognizance bond awaiting a final decision in the case by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

Members of the 39-year-old's family joyfully jumped from their seats after a teary-eyed judge recommended on Thursday that he be released.

If the court accepts the recommendation of state District Judge Joan Campbell, it will order a new trial. But Bob Loper, the special prosecutor, told the Houston Chronicle on Friday that he will move to dismiss the case, so Porter will not be retried.

"He is very happy and he's very grateful," Garrett told The Associated Press. "And the thing about him that's interesting is he's not angry and bitter and he's just ready to start a new life."

## Panel seeks documents on rig

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House committee investigating the Gulf oil spill has asked Transocean Ltd. for documents concerning safety and the condition of equipment on the company's ill-fated oil rig Deepwater Horizon.

The House Energy and Commerce Committee made the request in a letter Friday. The committee cited testimony that day by an electronics technician on the rig that an alarm system was partially shut down the day the rig

Mike Williams told an investigative panel that the system was turned on to monitor for fire, explosive gas and toxic gas but that its sound and light alarms had been

The committee also cited a New York Times story this week which reported rig workers' concerns prior to the explosion about safety and the condition of some equipment on board.

## Plumes definitely from BP well

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) - Researchers in Florida say they first scientific proof that two plumes of beneath the surface of the Gulf of Mexico came from BP's broken well.

University of South Florida scientists said Friday they linked the oil to BP's well based on chemical tests of two plumes discovered in late May. BP initially denied the plumes even existed.

Federal researchers say concentrations of underwater oil doubled last month over what they were in May.

Figuring out the oil's source is pivotal as the government assesses the environmental damage caused by the massive spill and how much BP will have to pay for it.

## Find detained immigrants online

WASHINGTON (AP) - Federal officials say they are making it easier for families and attorneys to find people held in 250 immigration detention facilities around the

Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency has created a search tool on its Web site similar to one used by the Federal Bureau of Prisons. Searchers can look by name or so-called "alien" numbers given to people who immigrate to the U.S. or end up in immigration custody. The detainee locator was to be running beginning at midday Friday.

Some 30,000 people a day are in immigration custody. ICE has its own facilities but also contracts with local law enforcement agencies for bed space in local and state jails and prisons.

Obama administration proposed to make the detention system more humane and transparent.





Today is Saturday, July 24, the 205th day of 2010. There are 160 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 24th, 1959, during a visit to Moscow, Vice President Richard Nixon engaged in his famous "Kitchen Debate" with Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev.

On this date:

In 1847, Mormon leader Brigham Young and his followers arrived in the Great Salt Lake Valley in present-day Utah.

In 1866, Tennessee became the first state to be readmitted to the Union after the Civil War.

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## Steered wrong: Arnie goes to the rodeo, Part I

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Dallam Clemens grunted as he crashed against the dirt, his arms wrapped around the head and horns of the steer as he wrestled it to


His boots kicked up tiny clouds of dust as they slid against the dry earth, and he smiled as he picked himself up, leaving the "animal" curled at

'That was real nice," yelled Billy Billingsley from the back of a pickup

"You see how he leaned back as he jumped from the horse to the steer there?" he said to me. "That's what you've got to do. You just have to shift your weight on the saddle to the stirrups, and then you pick a spot on the steer's back and jump to grab his head. Got it?"

Billy, you see, was an instructor at the Texas Rodeo Bible Camp that wrapped up at the Rodeo Grounds just last week. A longtime contributor to the camp, Billy has been teaching kids how to bulldog, or steer wrestle, since the program's inception in 2001. He just watched Dallam jump from a makeshift horse, a saddle mounted on a pipe contraption pulled by a truck, onto a padded "practice steer," complete with a plastic head and a pair of big orange horns. The steer was being pulled by another truck, and Dallam just leaped onto it, held on and forced its weight down until it buckled.

Pretty simple rodeo stuff, right? For many of the kids, yes. Several of them have been coming back to the camp year after year, bitten by the rodeo bug and drawn by the camaraderie and life lessons imparted by the camp through its cowboy lessons. Dallam himself, like many of the campers, had been working on

I was born in England and raised in Indianapolis. I have never been to a rodeo. I've never been within five, 10 — might even be a safe bet to say 50 — miles of a rodeo. I think the closest thing that qualifies is the 4H Fair I covered at the last newspaper I worked; I took a walk around the stables and a cow peed on my shoe.

Frankly, I've never ever even ridden a horse. I've been on a burro (at the Grand Canyon), an elephant (in India), an ostrich (in South Africa), a camel (at the circus) and a llama (quite a few times, actually). No

horses, though. Not yet, anyway. I'm also not what you'd call a physically-oriented person. I played soccer and ran track in high school, but that was a 20-foot fall off of a ladder and two knee surgeries ago. I was a Boy Scout for exactly half an hour, after which I got tired of walking around outside, called my dad, and went home to watch "G.I. Joe."

So when Jamie Greene, co-organizer of the camp, spoke to me early last week about paying the camp a visit, naturally, I was just a little skeptical.

"I think it would be fun for you," said Greene. "When I look at you, I think bull rider."

"I think I just soiled myself," I

replied. Well, that's not exactly what I said, but this is a family newspaper.

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Still, I'm nothing if not a sucker for a new experience, so I took Jamie up on her gracious offer. After all, with the Top O' Texas Rodeo riding into town in less than a month, I figured it would be worth the time to put in a little journalistic research. At least, that's what I told myself, so that if I broke my neck I could file worker's

I had been watching Dallam and a few other campers go at it for a good 20 minutes, frantically scrawling mental notes in my head on posture, timing and how not to get run over by either truck. With a real steer and horse at full speed, the whole thing happens at about 30 miles an hour, Billy told me; the practice versions only go at about 10. Not that it mattered to me - I try to make it an everyday goal not to jump from moving things onto other moving things, regardless of the speed that I will most likely get injured.

I was so busy trying to keep up in my head that I almost didn't hear Billy speak.


"Well, that's about it," said Billy, patting me on the shoulder. "You've pretty much seen all there is to see without trying it yourself. You ready?' I looked at him blankly for five full

seconds before I said anything.

"I...um...sure," I said. "Where's my helmet?"

# Hay fields respond to moisture, sorghum harvest on the run

COLLEGE STATION -- With few exceptions, hay meadows, rangeland and row crops continued to respond to rain received from tropical storms, according to Texas AgriLife Extension Service

The rains continued to cause flooding

in South Texas, particularly in Hidalgo and Starr counties. The challenge for many farmers in this area was to get sorghum harvested before the next rain, said Brad Cowan, AgriLife Extension agent for Hidalgo County.

"We're harvesting grain sorghum as fast as we can," Cowan said. "Some of the fields are still too wet to get into, and, of course, we've got challenges with long lines at elevators and those sort of things too."

Cowan said he'd only heard limited reports of sprouting in the grain heads, though there had been some quality reduction discounts at the elevators.

"The main thing, is we do have dry weather right now, and we're trying to get the crop out of the field as fast as we can," he said.

While rains were a challenge to South Texas agriculture, hay producers in East and North Texas were particularly thankful for the revitalization of pastures that it brought, AgriLife Extension agents reported. The rain allowed many farmers

to take a second cutting. But when it comes to hay supplies, local producers aren't out of the woods, yet, said Chad Gulley, AgriLife Extension agent for Nacogdoches County.

Like much of East Texas, Gulley said that the rains were hit and miss, and so are the hay stocks.

"Parts of the county received rain, and parts are pretty dry," he said. "Some producers are cutting hay; some of the cuttings are pretty good. Some are pretty

Gulley said many got a first cutting, but the unusually cool weather meant the Bermuda grass was diluted by a lot of ryegrass.

But what's been unusual, this year is the severe infestation of both grasshoppers "Producers who have been in the county for a long time tell me this is the worst

case of grasshoppers they've ever seen," Gulley said. Grasshoppers typically follow dry weather problems, but the armyworms were

"We usually don't get armyworms until late July or August, but we've had them

for a couple of weeks now," Gulley said. AgriLife Extension district reporters compiled the following summaries:

PANHANDLE: Parts of the region received only a trace of rain while others recorded as much as 4 inches. Only a few fields of wheat were yet to be harvested. Producers were irrigating corn where there was no rain, but overall the crop was in good condition. Spider mites were becom-

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
Other corn producers had to apply fungicide because of wet conditions. Where there wasn't rain, cotton received good heat units and progressed well. Sorghum and soybeans were in fair to good condition. Peanuts were in excellent condition. Cattle were in good condition with some problems with horn

flies. Rangeland was in good to excellent condition. ROLLING PLAINS: Hot, humid weather followed the tropical-storm rains. Creeks and stock tanks were full, and a new crop of weeds emerged. Spray planes were flying seven to 10 days behind, and some producers tried to take sprayer rigs into fields, but some areas still remained too wet.

Some cotton stands were discolored due from much water. Other stands were in excellent condition and setting bolls. Some haygrazer fields were cut and baled and were ready for another cutting. Sorghum headed out and was

coloring. Peaches were better than average, and peanut producers expected good yields. Numbers of mosquitoes and flies were up, having been able to rapidly reproduce under perfect conditions of stagnant water and hot weather. Cattle were in excellent condition.

SOUTH PLAINS: Conditions were pleasant with rain followed by warmer temperatures. Soil moisture was adequate to surplus. Corn was in fair to good condition and coming along nicely with over half the crop beginning to tassel. Cotton was in good condition with much blooming. Producers were fertilizing as fast as they could, and many were applying plant-growth regulators. Weed management was ongoing. Sorghum was in good condition and is heading. Pastures and rangeland were in good condition after improving significantly in the past few weeks. Cattle were in excellent condition.








