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

Grace Baptist readies for facility additions

In November, Rev. Kyle Ohsfeldt will have been at the Grace Baptist Church at 824 South Barnes for ten years.

During that time, the church has tried repeatedly to buy the two empty buildings on Cuyler Street that back up to the

hurch. Last month, it got the chance Ohsfeldt said they had approached the owner again and asked him if he would like to sell the land where the buildings stood.

PISD announces free, reduced meal policy

The Pampa Independent School District this week announced its policy for providing kids with free and reduced price meals served under the National School

Lunch and School Breakfast Programs. Regular school lunches are priced at \$2 at the elementary schools and \$2.50 for the secondary schools, while breakfast costs are \$1.50 throughout the district. The reduced price program lowers the prices to 40 cents for

lunch and 30 cents for breakfast, Children in households receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly the Food Stamp Program) or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) benefits can receive free meals regardless of family income. The benefit letter from the Texas Health and Human Services Commission serves as each

family's documentation for the free meal program. Reduced price meal eligibility is determined by household income. For the federal income eligibility chart for the 2010-2011 school year, visit http://squaremeals. org, click on "2010-11 School Meal Applications" in the left-hand navigation pane and select "2010-11 Income Eligibility Guidelines.

Families receiving WIC benefits may be eligible for free or MEALS cont. on page 3



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

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AFTERNOONRUSH Soldiers plotted to kill Afghan civilians

Perry, state obscure Rangers' work

McALLEN (AP) - Gov. Rick Perry has told just about anyone who will listen about his plan to dispatch elite teams of Texas Rangers to the border to do what he says the federal government won't - keep Texans safe from encroaching Mexican drug violence.

Just don't ask him for specifics.

Pampa

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While the Ranger Recon initiative has served as a strong rhetorical counterpoint when Perry slams the federal government, details about what the taxpayer-funded teams actually accomplish remain a secret.

State officials insist they do not tally arrests or drug and property seizures under the program, which they say doesn't have its own budget after more than a year in operation. They say the Ranger Recon teams are paid out of the state's larger border security initiative, but decline to put a dollar figure on the program's costs. Nor will they say how many of the state's 144 Rangers, the top criminal investigators in Texas, participate or where the teams have been active.

The Department of Public Safety, which oversees the program, said in response to an Associated Press public records request that the Rangers do no investigative work as part of the teams, but have engaged in about 10 "mis-

Fruit bars recalled for typhoid

SANTA FE SPRINGS, Calif. (AP) — Fruiti Pops, Inc. of Santa Fe Springs has recalled its mamey frozen fruit bars because of a possible link to a rare U.S. outbreak of

The company said Thursday that the fruit bars were distributed in California, Arizona and Texas since May 2009. Fruiti Pops says retail stores, ice cream trucks and vending machines sold the frozen fruit bars, which have the UPC number 763734000097.

The company says the frozen fruit bars were made from contaminated mamey pulp that Goya Foods, Inc. voluntarily recalled on Aug. 12, after it was linked to a typhoid fever outbreak in California and Nevada. So far no illnesses have been reported from the mamey fruit bars.

Mamey or zapote is a fruit popular in Latin America and the Carribean.

Woman's body found in home

LAS VEGAS (AP) — A four-month search for a missing Las Vegas woman came to a ghastly end this week when her husband found her corpse in their home amid a labyrinth of squalor that had been impassable even to

Bill James apparently had no idea that the body of his pack-rat wife, Billie Jean, was under the same roof as he helped police scour the home and the Nevada desert for any sign of her. Then he spotted the feet of the body poking out of a floor-to-ceiling pile of junk Wednesday, revealing in shocking detail the woman's penchant for

Police say they searched the home several times — even using dogs from a unit that helped locate bodies at ground zero after Sept. 11 and Hurricane Katrina. But they were unable to find the body of amid the piles of clothes, knickknacks, trash and other junk.

"For our dogs to go through that house and not find something should be indicative of the tremendous environmental challenges they faced," police spokesman Bill do not receive such ben-

Montana wildfires cause evac

CANYON CREEK, Mont. (AP) - Authorities in western Montana roused people from their beds early Friday to flee an approaching wildfire, as thunderstorms sparked dozens more in blazes across the West in Idaho

Cooler temperatures and calmer winds helped firefighters control wildfires that flared up Thursday across eastern Washington in hot, gusty winds.

But in Montana, a cold front brought lightning and new fires on forest service and private land.

Ravalli County authorities began knocking on doors at 3 a.m. Friday, warning residents about three miles west of Hamilton that a fire in the Bitterroot National Forest was threatening their homes.

The Downing Mountain fire was reported at 8 p.m. Thursday and grew to 300 acres by Friday morning.

About 70 homes in the Blodgett and Canyon Creek areas were evacuated and fire officials said residents of another 100 homes were warned they may have to leave.

Ghost train hunter hit by real train

STATESVILLE, N.C. -- A man who was among amateur ghost hunters standing on an Iredell County trestle early Friday waiting for a "ghost train" was killed by a real train

that apparently surprised the group, authorities say.

The group had gathered on the 119th anniversary of the Bostian Bridge train wreck -- an accident that sparked one of the Carolinas' best-known ghost stories.

Christopher Kaiser, 29, was killed when he was struck about 3 a.m. by a Norfolk Southern train, Iredell County Sheriff Phil Redmond said.

A woman who was with the group was seriously injured and airlifted to Carolinas Medical Center after being treated initially at a Statesville hospital. Several reports indicate Kaiser pushed the woman out of the way before he was hit by the train.

The incident happened on a trestle near the site of the old Bostian Bridge, off Buffalo Shoals Road, about 2 miles west of Statesville. They apparently did not hear the eastbound train coming until too late.

Buddy Holly statue moved

LUBBOCK (AP) — A life-size bronze statue of famed rock and roller Buddy Holly is being moved at his hometown of Lubbock.

The transfer process began Friday as workers renovate a nearby broken fountain and prepare to open a new city park named for Holly, who died in a 1959 plane crash in

Randy Truesdell with the Parks and Recreation Department told KCBD-TV that the statue and plaques will be taken to Texas Bronze, a company run by Steve

Truesdell says Teeters will be cleaning and refurbishing the statue and will house it at his business before the items, part of the West Texas Walk of Fame, are installed at the park. Truesdell says the city does not want to risk any damage because of multiple moves.

The original plan was to store the items at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

SEATTLE - Five soldiers accused of killing civilians in Afghanistan are now facing additional charges of conspiracy to commit premeditated murder — a plot that allegedly began when one soldier discussed how easy it would be to "toss a grenade" at Afghan civilians, The Seattle Times reported Wednesday.

The five soldiers were charged with murder in June for the deaths of three Afghan civilians in Kandahar Province this year. According to charging summaries newly released by the Army, additional allegations of conspiracy have since been filed against those soldiers, and seven others have been charged in connection with the conspiracy or with attempting to cover it up.

The new charges arose from the investigations into the killings and into a brutal assault on an enlisted man who had informed on soldiers smoking hashish, The Times reported. The informant reported hearing soldiers talk about killing civilians.

The Army told The Associated Press Wednesday that it is redacting charging documents that detail the new allegations and expects to release them next

As part of the widening probe, investigators have

interviewed platoon mates and defendants, The Times reported, citing documents that defense attorneys filed with an Army magistrate judge, as well as interviews with defense attorneys. Two of the defense lawyers did not immediately respond to e-mails from the AP

Some platoon members told investigators that Army Staff Sgt. Calvin Gibbs began joking with other soldiers last December about how easy it would be to "toss a grenade" at Afghan civilians and kill them, the newspaper said. One soldier responded that it was a stupid idea, and another believed Gibbs was "feeling out the platoon."

But eventually, Gibbs formed what one called a "kill team" to randomly execute Afghan civilians while on patrol, the documents said. No motive was discussed. Gibbs has denied any involvement in the killings.

All of the three who were killed were shot. Two were also hit with grenades in what has proved to be one of the most serious war-crimes cases to emerge from the Afghan war.

Anyone who dared to report the events was threatened with violence, investigators were told.

Meals

reduced price meals and must fill out an application.

Child Nutrition Director Debbie Middleton said that not much has changed from last year's eligibility guidelines.

"Last year we printed out our qualifying guidelines and sent them out," she said. "This year, we haven't done that because our guidelines haven't turned over very much."

To apply for free and reduced price meals, families must fill out an application and return it to either the school or the Child Nutrition Office at 2401 Charles any time during the school year.

Application forms for the meal programs are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced price meals for their children. Applications are also available at each school's principal's office.

Households receiving SNAP or TANF benefits need only to list their child's name and food stamp or TANF case number on the application. Families who efits must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of

income for each member and the Social Security Number of the adult household member who signs the application.

The applications will be reviewed by the Child Nutrition Office.

Middleton said that the free and reduced meal programs have become a crucial resource for many families in the Pampa area.

"Out of our district, between 52 and 54 percent (of children) have free or







Today in History

Today is Saturday, Aug. 28, the 240th day of 2010. There are 125 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Aug. 28, 1963, 200,000 people participated in a peaceful civil rights rally in Washington, D.C., where Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. delivered his "I Have a Dream" speech in front of the Lincoln Memorial.

On this date:

In 1609, English sea explorer Henry Hudson and his ship, the Half Moon, reached present-day Delaware Bay

In 1774, Mother Elizabeth Ann Seton, the first American-born saint, was born in New York City. In 1910, the Kingdom of Montenegro was pro-

In 1947, legendary bullfighter Manolete died after being gored during a fight in Linares, Spain; he was

In 1955, Emmett Till, a black teen-ager from Chicago, was abducted from his uncle's home in Money, Miss. by two white men after he had supposedly whistled at a white woman; he was found brutally slain three days later.

In 1968, police and anti-war demonstrators clashed in the streets of Chicago as the Democratic national convention nominated Hubert H. Humphrey for

In 1973, more than 600 people died as an earthquake shook central Mexico.

In 1988, 70 people were killed when three Italian stunt planes collided during an air show at the U.S. Air Base in Ramstein (RAHM'-shtyn), West Germany.

In 1990, an F5 tornado struck the Chicago area, killing 29 people.

In 1995, a mortar shell tore through a crowded market in Sarajevo, Bosnia-Herzegovina, killing some three dozen people and triggering NATO airstrikes against the Bosnian Serbs.

Ten vears ago: Authorities in Peru announced that four years after military judges convicted American Lori Berenson of planning a rebel attack, the military had overturned her life sentence, clearing the way for a new civilian trial. (Berenson was later convicted of "terrorist collaboration" and sentenced to 20 years; she was paroled on May 27, 2010, but must remain in Peru until the sentence ends in Nov.

Five years ago: New Orleans Mayor Ray Nagin ordered everyone in the city to evacuate after Hurricane Katrina grew to a monster storm. Iraqi negotiators finished a new constitution but without the endorsement of Sunni Arabs. West Oahu of Ewa Beach, Hawaii, won the Little League World Series title with a 7-6 win over the defending champions from Willemstad, Curacao.

One year ago: The Los Angeles County coroner's office announced that Michael Jackson's death was a homicide caused primarily by the powerful anesthetic propofol and another sedative. Celebrity disc jockey Adam Goldstein, known as DJ AM, was found dead in his New York apartment from an accidental drug overdose; he was 36. Space shuttle Discovery and seven astronauts blazed into orbit on a flight to the international space station.

Memo to Dems — it's the economy

WASHINGTON — The economy is tanking. Economists say it has slowed to a near comatose 1.5 percent growth rate, unemployment claims were at a nine-month high and jobs are scarce, vet President Obama is focusing on corporate campaign donations.

While the economy is the clear overriding issue in the midterm elections, threatening to topple Democrats from power in Congress, Obama was devoting his weekly radio address last Saturday to an issue far from the real concerns of workers, families and

employers struggling to survive. If anyone is looking for signs Obama is completely disconnected from the failing economy, his radio address blaming Republicans for blocking his legislation to place restrictions on corporate campaign donations delivered that

With polls showing Obama's job approval rating slipping to 43 percent last week because of the economy, Democratic strategists grumble privately that the White House has a "tin ear." Republicans said Obama's focus on campaign politics instead of policies to get the economy growing again showed how much he wanted to change the subject in this year's elections.

"Americans want us to focus on jobs, but by focusing on an election bill, Democrats are sending a clear message to the American people that their jobs aren't as important as the jobs of embattled Democrat politicians," said Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell in response to Obama's remarks.

But the Obama administration remained in deep denial about the declining health of the U.S. economy, insisting that it was "moving in the right direction," dubbing it the "Recovery Summer" and declaring that economic growth was "growing at a good clip."

A few weeks ago, Vice President Joe Biden predicted the creation of between 250,000 to 500,000 jobs was just around the corner.

But as the summer draws to a close, and with the elections a little more than two months away, those jobs are nowhere to be seen. If anything, the economy's health was worsening, and this administration didn't seem to have a viable plan to pull the country out of its economic decline. Among recent developments:

·Last week the government reported that more American workers had filed for jobless benefits than at anytime since last November. Unemployment-benefit claims rose by 12,000 to 500,000 for the third straight weekly increase the first time claims had hit the half-million mark in nine

•While the official unemployment rate stood at 9.5 percent in July, the real jobless rate is much higher than that. Factor in the 1.2 million unemployed who have given up looking for work and have dropped out of the labor force, plus those who want full-time work but can only find part-time jobs, and the national unemployment rate is 16.5 percent.

•The housing industry has sunk into a deeper slump, with nearly half of homeowners who enrolled in Obama's mortgage relief plan dropping out — raising fears that foreclosures may increase in the second half of the year.

 Other troubling signs point to growing economic desperation in the workforce. Longterm unemployed Americans are forced to apply earlier than they planned for Social Security benefits in an attempt to make ends meet. And a record number of workers are withdrawing funds from their 401(k) retirement accounts to pay their household bills and put food on the table.

Meantime, the Obama administration is planning to slam the U.S. economy with the largest tax increase in American history by letting President Bush's 2001 and 2003 top

income tax rate cuts expire at the end of this year. Beleagured businesses, both large and small, have been

saying all year that this will deeply hurt the economy, risktaking investors and job creation, but the White House and Democratic leaders are stubbornly determined to go ahead with their big-spending tax-hike plan. It isn't just the business community saying higher taxes

will weaken the economy: the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office is saing it, too.

A CBO analysis released last week said permanently extending the Bush tax cuts would give the country a "considerable" economic boost over the next few years.





No. TX0027618) to authorize the discharge of treated wastewater at a volume not to exceed an annual average flow of 3,000,000 gallons per day. The domestic wastewater treatment facility is located on the north bank of Red Deer Creek, at a point 3,400 feet northeast of State Highway Loop 171, approximately 3.5 miles northeast of the intersection of U.S. Highway 60 and State Highway 273 in Gray County, Texas 79065. The discharge route is from the plant site to Red Deer Creek; thence to Canadian River Below Lake Meredith. TCEQ received this application on June 18, 2010. The permit application is available for viewing and copying at Pampa City Hall, 201 West Foster Street, Pampa, Texas.

ADDITIONAL NOTICE. TCEQ's Executive Director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. After technical review of the application is complete, the Executive Director may prepare a draft permit and will issue a preliminary decision on the application. Notice of the Application and Preliminary Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the county-wide mailing list and to those who are on the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the deadline for submitting public comments.

PUBLIC COMMENT / PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting on this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. TCEQ will hold a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting

public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Unless the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments, and the Executive Director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision and for requesting a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOW-ING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and proposed permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the proposed facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; and, the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission will only grant a contested case hearing on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised in timely filed comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. TCEQ may act on an application to renew a permit for discharge of wastewater without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

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
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
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OWA PARK Hawks

Hawks upend Harvesters; Carter, Bradley, Miller down

Football season was in the air at Harvester Field Friday night. Barbecue grills were smoking, kids were getting their faces painted and just about every parking space at the high school was filled. The entire town was pumped.

The festive pre-game, however, didn't carry over into the game for the Pampa Harvesters, as they lost to the Iowa Park Hawks 31-14.

To add to the Harvesters' troubles, the game wasn't the only thing the they lost Friday night. Senior starting running back and linebacker Trent Carter and senior center Reid Bradley went down with injuries in the first quarter. Junior starting quarterback Reid Miller was also injured in the fourth quarter trying to make a tackle after an interception. Carter and Bradley were on crutches for the rest of the game.

Head coach Heath Parker said it was a very emotional game.

"It was a bizarre game," Parker said. "All throughout two-a-days and our two scrimmages, we had no injuries. Our two starters are out in the first quarter. We had to reorganize our rotation. We had three or four players take over a starter's spot."

Trevor Smith took over the snaps at center and Parker thought he did well for the situation.

"He had to come in during the heat of the game," Parker said. "He has to tell the line what the defense is doing. We had a couple of snap issues, but we didn't have a problem with it."

The first quarter belonged to the Hawks. On second and ten, Pampa's Trace Carter fumbled and Iowa Park's Mario Fleck recovered. The Hawks needed only six plays to take advantage. Lee Clubb threw a 24-yard pass to Kris Tucker on third down and eleven to give the Hawks a 7-0 lead with 8:17 remaining in the quarter. Iowa Park then stopped the Harvesters on fourth down near midfield, and Clubb capped off a six-play 52-yard drive with a 31-yard touchdown and increased the Hawks lead to 14-0.

In the second quarter, Pampa got back in the game. With a drive that started in the first quarter, the Harvesters drove 80 yards on 13 plays. Junior Reid Miller and junior Latigo Collins gained most of the yards on the drive. Miller ran in from a yard out and cut Iowa Park's lead to **PAMPA** cont. on page 6B



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

worse, starting center Reid Bradley is helped off the field only minutes after starting LB/RB Trent Carter was injured. 8:23 p.m. — The Hawks convert their second third down of their drive. The Harvesters need to stop them and keep the

game from getting out of control. 8:28 p.m. — Pampa's defense tightens up and only gives up three points but trails 17-7 with 3:28 left in the second.

8:41 p.m. — Miller finds Collins wide open and gives him the ball for a 19-yard touchdown. Pampa is only down 17-14 with 33.2 seconds left in the quarter.

9:15 p.m. — The second half begins with Pampa's kickoff. I'm still hopeful to see my first win on the Harvester sidelines. 9:29 p.m. — Pampa's punter Colten Adams receives a low snap, but thankfully, disaster is avoided as his punt under pressure lands in the end zone for a touchback.

able to run well. "They were a good run defense," Collins said. "Most of our plays we were able to get more than five

yards on a run. The Hawks responded with a field goal and looked like they were going to take a commanding lead. Clubb returned a Colten Adams' punt 35 yards and gave the Hawks the ball at the Harvesters' 15. Iowa Park couldn't add to their lead as they picked up 15 yards in penalties. Matt Rodgers missed a 42-yard field goal and that gave the Pampa

sideline a boost. Miller connected with Garrett Ericson for a 51-yard pass to the Hawks' 25. Two plays later, Miller found Latigo Collins for a 19-yard touchdown and the Harvesters trailed by three with 33.2 seconds left in the first half. That score would remain the same until early in the fourth quarter.

On Pampa's last possession of the third quarter, Miller threw an interception to Chandler Rosinbaum. who returned the ball to Pampa's 30. Garrett Davis scored his first of two touchdowns and increased the Hawks' lead to 24-14. Iowa Park Head Coach Scott Ponder said they made the plays they need to in the fourth.

"I give all credit to the kids," Ponder said. "They did a great job. I just felt if we could hang on we would have a chance to win.'

Parker said his team was disappointed that they didn't win.
