An autopsy was scheduled Thursday in Lubbock. The preliminary report this morning showed that French had previous heart attacks but that there was metham-

phetamine in his system. Judge Martinez said he would delay a ruling in the case until the

complete autopsy was reported. A full report that would include analysis of blood and organs could

take several weeks. Police officers said French's body was discovered by a person walking along the hiking trail on the north side of Red Deer Creek before dawn Wednesday.

In an effort to motivate kids to cut back from cavity-producing sweets this Halloween, Dr. Jay A. Johnson is encouraging trickor-treaters to bring their excess candy to his office at 2427 N. Hobart. Johnson will buy back

the candy for \$1 a pound. "Ditch the candy, that's what we're saying," said Johnson. "Visiting your dentist twice a year and brushing daily are great preventive measures, but doing away with excess sweets altogether would really give your

teeth a healthy boost. "Kids can still have all of the fun of trick-or-treating, and now their piggy banks will benefit as

well.' All the Halloween candy collected by Dr. Johnson's office will be shipped to troops over-

seas. Johnson is also giving away glow-in-the-dark electric tooth-

brushes as part of the promotion. "These glowing toothbrushes we're giving out are really cool," Johnson said. "They're like light

The festival will be conducted in the library auditorium, while the library itself will be converted into a haunted house.

The attraction is an expansion on last

Misty Guy.

"The 2010 haunted house is greatly expanded and ramped up from last year,' echoed Children's Librarian Marsha Rollins, "so we want to get the word out to all the community and surrounding towns.

Rooms in the Haunted Library include a haunted study and maze, a mad scientist's lab of horrors, a cemetery haunted by Count Dracula and a "spider room,"

presided over by a "Spider Lady." "Costumes are welcome but not



SAN ANTONIO (AP) - A Texas food processing plant arrested in August on warrants out of shuttered over allegations of tainted celery says they are Randall County as part of an on-going awaiting a separate analysis from the Food and Drug Administration.

Attorneys for SanGar Produce & Processing Co. said Friday the company also had an independent lab retesting its San Antonio facility for listeria. Texas health officials have linked the plant to contaminated celery that sickened at least six people this year, four of whom died.

Jason Galvan, an attorney for SanGar, says the state has provided the company no proof linking the cases to the plant. He said SanGar is hoping to receive the FDA results as early as Friday.

The state ordered a recall of all produce from the plant. An FDA official has told The Associated Press the recall could be expanded as the agency learns more.

More of Gulf opened to fishing

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — More than 7,000 square miles of the Gulf of Mexico south of the Florida Panhandle were reopened Friday to fishing after federal officials declared the area safe from oil.

Now, 96 percent of the Gulf is open to fishing, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric

The remaining closed area, which covers 9,444 square miles, is in the vicinity of where the Deepwater Horizon drilling rig exploded on April 20 off the Louisiana coast.

No oil or sheen had been found in the newly reopened area since July 19, NOAA said. At its closest point, the area reopened is about 60 miles east of the BP well that spewed more than 170 million

DALLAS (AP) — A Dallas minister who's running for Congress says violence against the government is possible if leadership changes do not happen following the Nov. 2 ing to the library staff. elections.

Republican Stephen Broden, according to his website, founded Fair Park Bible Fellowship Church in 1987. Broden is challenging Democratic U.S. Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson in District 30.

Broden, in an interview Thursday with WFAA-TV, said he would not rule out violent overthrow of the government if the elections did not produce a change in leadership. The tea party supporter said a violent uprising "is not night. the first option," but it is "on the table.

Johnson declined comment on Broden's remarks. Dallas County GOP chairman Jonathan Neerman called

Broden's remarks "inappropriate" and said he would discuss the comments with the pastor.

Texas jobless rate posts drop

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas unemployment rate dropped slightly to 8.1 percent in September, fueled by modest job growth.

Numbers released by the Texas Workforce Commission on Thursday indicate the latest unemployment figure, down from 8.3 percent in August, is the lowest rate for the state so far in 2010.

Texas added 3,700 new jobs in September and most state has gained a total of 152,800 jobs since September

Texas Workforce Commissioner Andres Alcantar calls the job growth in manufacturing and other industries encouraging.

The state's lowest metro unemployment rate last month was 5.1 percent in the Midland area. The highest unemployment rate in Texas was in the McAllen-Edinburg-Mission region, at 11.2 percent.

First whooping crane arrives

AUSTWELL (AP) - The first migrating whooping crane of the season has arrived at a wildlife refuge in south-

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service on Thursday confirmed one of the rare birds has been spotted at the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge.

Coordinator Tom Stehn (sten) says the rest of the expected whooping cranes are still in Canada, where the weather has stayed unseasonably warm. The Victoria Advocate reports the birds usually begin

arriving at the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge around Stehn says 74 nests and 46 fledglings were recorded in

August in Canada. Stehn says there were 263 birds in the flock when they migrated north last spring. Biologists at the refuge in Texas

expect 285 to 290 cranes this fall.

Dallas woman insane, not guilty

DALLAS (AP) - A woman accused of throwing her two children from an Interstate 30 overpass in Dallas and then jumping off the 20-foot-high span has been found not guilty by reason of insanity.

A judge in Dallas ruled Thursday in the trial of Khandi Busby, who was charged with attempted murder and injury to a child. Then judge then ordered her to a state mental institution.

Investigators say the boys were ages 6 and 8 when they were injured after being thrown from the highway overpass on March 12, 2008. They were treated and placed in foster care, where they remain. Defense attorney David Pire says Busby felt God had

told her to throw her sons off the bridge to protect them from Satan. Relatives say Busby is bipolar and had stopped taking

her medication.

Fired cop reinstated

AUSTIN (AP) - An Austin police officer who fatally shot a man in 2009 then was fired this year for alleged drunken driving has been reinstated.

An arbitrator on Thursday ruled in favor of Senior

Officer Leonardo Quintana. A grand jury declined to indict Quintana over the fatal shooting of Nathaniel Sanders II during a struggle.

Ouintana was fired in May, four months after his DWI arrest hours after he was questioned as part of a federal civil rights lawsuit into the shooting. The drunken driving case is pending.

Arbitrator Louise Wolitz, ruling that Quintana should get back pay, also ordered him to serve a 15-day suspension for the drunken driving charge.

Today in History

Today is Friday, Oct. 22, the 295th day of 2010. There are 70 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Oct. 22, 1962, President John F. Kennedy announced a quarantine of all offensive military equipment shipped to Cuba, following the discovery of Soviet-built missile bases on the island.

On this date:

In 1746, Princeton University was first chartered

as the College of New Jersey.

In 1797, French balloonist Andre-Jacques Garnerin (gahr-nayr-AN') made the first parachute descent, landing safely from a height of about 3,000 feet

In 1836, Sam Houston was inaugurated as the first constitutionally elected president of the Republic of

In 1883, the original Metropolitan Opera House in New York held its grand opening with a performance of Gounod's "Faust."

In 1928, Republican presidential nominee Herbert Hoover spoke of the "American system of rugged individualism" in a speech at New York's Madison Square Garden.

In 1934, bank robber Charles "Pretty Boy" Floyd was shot to death by federal agents at a farm in East Liverpool, Ohio.

In 1968, Apollo 7 returned safely from Earth orbit, splashing down in the Atlantic Ocean.

In 1979, the U.S. government allowed the deposed Shah of Iran to travel to New York for medical treatment — a decision that precipitated the Iran hostage

In 1981, the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization was decertified by the federal government for its strike the previous August.


In 1986, President Ronald Reagan signed into law sweeping tax-overhaul legislation.

Ten years ago: Arab leaders meeting in Egypt wrapped up a two-day summit on Israeli-Palestinian violence with a declaration that stopped short of an outright call for cutting ties with Israel.

Five years ago: Hurricane Wilma punished Mexico's Caribbean coastline for a second day. Meanwhile, a record 22nd tropical storm of the season formed about 125 miles off the Dominican Republic; because the annual list of storm names had already been exhausted, forecasters called the new system Tropical Storm Alpha. A Nigerian Boeing 737 passenger jet crashed after leaving Lagos, killing all 117 on board. The Chicago White Sox defeated the Houston Astros, 5-3, in Game 1 of the World Series.

One year ago: Mortars fired by Islamic militants slammed into Somalia's airport as President Sheik Sharif Sheik Ahmed boarded a plane, sparking battles that killed at least 24 people; the president was unhurt. Gunmen kidnapped Gauthier Lefevre, a French staff member working for the International Committee of the Red Cross, in Sudan's western Darfur region. (Lefevre was released in March 2010.) Comedian Soupy Sales died in New York at

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
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Parents need to teach kids against bullying

If you think I'm one of those folks upset with James Jones -- the Florida father who jumped on his daughter's bus to confront the bullies who were terrorizing his daughter -- you've got another thing coming. In fact, we should recommend Jones as Father of the Year.

Caught on tape, Jones angrily yelled at the children that were bullying his 13-year-old daughter, who has cerebral palsy. He later issued a tearful apology saying he was wrong. No, James, you weren't wrong; the punk children who bullied your daughter were wrong. And the punk parents who didn't discipline their own children are wrong, too.

I can sympathize with James because I witnessed my dad do the same exact thing when I was in middle school.

Some students on our bus were roughhousing one day and another kid pulled down the sweater of a girl, exposing her breasts for all to see. This kid's name was "Roland." Now I had nothing to do with it, and the two of us didn't even look alike. Yet when friends and family of the girl heard about it, they assumed it was me. More than 40 kids were on the bus and they all knew that wasn't the

case, but her supporters didn't care. My brother and I were threatened repeatedly with physical harm, so we clearly didn't want to ride the bus home. We made up a reason to not take the bus and begged my dad to pick us up. When he got to the school and demanded to know the truth, he got out of the car, jumped on the bus, and said, "Point out to me who keeps messing with you."

have been scared of the school bullies, but I was more scared of my daddy! So I told him. My dad walked over to a kid and asked him, "Are you messing with my sons?" He made it clear we had

Now I may

nothing to do with it and said he didn't want to hear about this one boy hurting us. So, this kid pulled out a knife on my dad and threatened him.

My dad laughed, snatched the knife from him, and said, "Don't you ever do that again to me or anybody!" He then looked every kid in the eye and made it clear that he didn't want to hear one more story of them bullying his sons or he would be back.

Suffice to say, no one messed with the Martin sons again.

But my dad wasn't the kind of person who would protect his sons like that. He was the kind of person who would travel around our Clinton Park neighborhood and break up kids fighting, even following some home to talk to their parents and grandparents. He was never afraid to go to another parent and hold them accountable for the actions of their child. And more often than not, the parent was stunned to hear about their children being bullies and disciplined them themselves.

Bullying has always been in schools, so that is nothing new. But it's different today because kids are

committing suicide due to the constant taunting. We can have all the town hall meetings about bullying, but what is going to change all of this is to have teachers, administrators and other parents get in the face, of parents and guardians. They need to make it clear to parents that they must discipline their own children

and teach them not to be bullies. A child must understand that there will be repercussions for his or her actions. When I have witnessed one of my nieces hit and push around her sister or one of her cousins, I take immediate action and intervene. Asthe grown-up, I don't even wait for their mother and father to say something. I'm their uncle, and as an adult; won't allow that behavior to set in.

Bullying does not have to go along with reading, writing and arithmetic in our schools. It can end immediately if we are willing to hold parents accountable for their children. And if the parents don't want to step up; then other adults must be willing to

A child has enough on his or her mind in school than to have to deal with being bullied. None of us should pass this off as "what kids do" when it is resulting in the suicide of even one child.

Recess a towel bar into the wall cavity

Dear Pat: We are totally redoing our master bedroom and bath. The bathroom is narrow, and I always bump the towel bar. Is there a good way to redesign this so there is more space and I won't bruise my shoulder? - Pam G.

Dear Pam: It is convenient to have a towel bar extend well out from the wall for hanging towels, especially wet ones after a steamy shower. As you have found, though, this can take its toll on your shoulders and elbows when a narrow bathroom is full

One simple option is to install a towel bar that mounts on the back of the bathroom door. Other designs mount on the door hinge. With either type, the towel bar is out of the way when you enter and exit the bathroom. The primary drawback to these, particularly in a long, narrow bathroom, is the towels are hanging far from the shower door.

Another option is to recess the towel bar into the wall cavity. This not only gets the towel bar out of your path, but it also provides attractive relief to an otherwise long, flat wall. Depending upon the size of the bathroom, the towels may be in easy reach from inside the shower.

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Before you begin this recessed towel bar project, you must find a spot on the wall that does not have any plumbing or electric wiring running up through it. It is fairly easy to check the plumbing fixtures to know if water pipes run through it.

Check for electrical outlets on the opposite side of the wall in the adjacent room. Electric wire sensors, which detect a hot wire in a wall, can be purchased at most home center stores. Also, try to select a spot in the wall that has a closet on the opposite side. Since you will be removing one layer of drywall, there may be more sound transmission into the adjacent room through the wall.

Once you locate a suitable spot on the bathroom wall, determine the width you need for your towels. If you can get by with just 15 inches of width, this simplifies the job. Most homes have the

wall studs on 16-inch centers, so a 15-inch opening will not require you to saw through wall studs.

Locate the wall studs and cut away a section of drywall to expose the wall cavity and sides of the studs. If you decide you need a wider towel bar, you will have to saw through the center stud. Nail a horizontal header between the two studs to support the severed center stud. This will provide about 31 inches of towel bar space. The height of the opening should be about six inches above the towel bar location.

Finish the edges of the wall

opening with drywall and corner bead similarly to how a door opening is done. For a more decorative look, use a fancy molding along the edge. Select one with rounded edge detail; otherwise, you might bump into it or stub

Place a sheet of high-grade plywood against the back of the opening. This will look nice and create a second layer for a better sound barrier between the rooms. Another option is to glue cork tiles against the drywall or plywood. Cork tiles are attractive and they have good soundabsorption qualities.

DEAR PROUD FAM-ILY MEMBER: Your letter is timely and important. Proud Americans who display flags should be aware of a rule of flag etiquette that states that the flag should be in good condition. Sadly, I have seen more than a few that looked like faded red, white and blue rags.

According to the U.S. Flag Code, "When a flag has served its useful purpose, it should be destroyed, preferably by burning." The pamphlet "Flag Etiquette" published by the American Legion states: "For individual citizens this should be done discreetly so that the act is not perceived as a protest or desecration."

Many American Legion posts conduct Disposal of Unserviceable Flag ceremonies on June 14, Flag Day, each year. The Boy and Girl Scouts of America also are able to conduct these ceremonies. If you're ready to dispose of yours, check with the local Boy or Girl Scout Council - or wait until the Girl Scout cookie sales start locally and offer the flag to a troop during a sale at a small business.

Towel Bar A recessed towel bar is ideal if you have the space between the studs to install one. Most units come with complete instructions that can be installed with basic carpentry skills. **PREPARATION** Check for plumbing First, choose a location and electrical wiring before cutting through for the towel bar. Next, locate the studs with a stud finder and mark where they are located: PLACEMENT Use the template provided with the kit to draw the area on the wall that you will be cutting out. WALLBOARD SAW Cut the hole in the drywall using a utility knife and a wallboard INSTALLATION Apply a bead construction adhesive all the way around the outer edge of the back of the towel bar's frame molding. 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

Discouragement can be overcome Five FBC members go on

Discouragement, what is it? You notice that the word has a prefix and a suffix. When you take away the prefix and suffix, you find the root word, "courage". The suffix is "ment". It means: a condition resulting from an action. The prefix is "dis". It means to take out. By the way, the prefix "en" means to put in. And we can put courage into people or we can take courage out of people. We have the power to encourage or discourage. Have you ever been around someone that was an encourager? Just being around them, makes you feel like you can be victorious no matter what you face. They make you feel like, "I can do this". That's because they encourage you. They put courage in you. On the other hand, have you ever been around someone who was a discourager? You can be having the best day of your life and after being around them, you think, 'i can't do anything". They have drained you of your courage.

Discouragement is something that we all have to battle from time to time. But if we are going to be successful, we must overcome discouragement. God wants our lives to be filled with joy, but discouragement will rob you of joy. It will leave you defeated. And that is not God's plan for any of us.

There are many things that bring about discouragement. One is fatigue (just being tired). Sometimes the best remedy for discouragement is rest. Get out of town for a few days. Go to Dallas or Oklahoma City or Santa Fe or Old Mobeetie. A change of scenery can change your perspective. If your life is in constant chaos and you are not taking time to rest, you are a candidate for discouragement.

Another cause for discouragement can be frustration. Frustration is when you have expectations that are not met. You thought something was going to happen a certain way, but it didn't. It even may be a series of expectations that are not met. And it builds. Maybe it's people who don't meet your expectations, or your marriage isn't meeting your expectations. Maybe your job isn't meeting your expectations. People's words don't meet your expectations. Frustration begins to build and it causes you to become very discouraged.

Another cause of discouragement is failure. In our american culture it is not okay to fail at anything. But failure is a part of the journey to success. Some think that we should always move from success to success to success. And if you ever fail, there's something wrong with you. The fact of the matter is every great success story is filled with failures. We learn a great

Deal from failure. In fact we learn things in failure that we would have never learned. And they

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become stepping stones to our success. Don't let failure rob you of your courage. If you are not successful, have the courage to try again and again and again.

Another thing that causes discouragement is fear. In Isaiah 41:10, God says,

"Fear not for i am with you". In fact, the command that God gives the most in scripture is: "Fear not". He does not want us to be consumed and immobilized by fear. Many people live discouraged, because they are controlled by fear.

We all have things that happen in our lives that will tend to discourage us. However we must be determined to win the battle for our courage. The key is to maintain the right focus. Focus on the good and not the bad. Focus on the positive and not the negative. Focus on God and his word and not the circumstance. In Philippians 4:4-7, Paul says this: "Rejoice in the Lord always. Again i will say rejoice! Let your gentleness be know to all men. The Lord is at hand. Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplications, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God; and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." There are two things in this passage that are key elements in our overcoming discouragement. They are praise and prayer. Praise shifts the focus from you to God. Prayer shifts the burden from you to God. Whenever we go through difficult times, we need to remind ourselves of these two basic things. Praise God. (It shifts the focus from you to God.) Pray to God. (It shifts the burden from you to God.) Then paul says in the very next verse (phil. 4:8), "Finally, brethren, whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy---meditate on these things." In other words paul is saying, "focus on the positive". Paul in essence gives to us three keys in overcoming discouragement: focus on praise. Focus on prayer. Focus on the positive. You can win. You can overcome discouragement.

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

"It was a sloppy mess," Snelgrooes said. "Our defense played well."


Snelgrooes said he was proud of how the freshman performed.
