Numerous Wrecks Accompany Storm

A spectacular two vehicle accident at 10:06 p.m. Friday left a portion of Muleshoe in darkness for some six hours. Following a collision with a pickup in the 600 block of West American Boulevard, a large truck skidded out of control and overturned at Ladd Implement Co., wiping out electricity to a portion of Muleshoe for some

six hours. All of Muleshoe was out of electricity from 2:23 a.m. to 3:53 a.m. At 8 a.m., workmen were still at the accident site attempting to set the truck upright and working on the power lines.

Shortly before 8 a.m., it was announced that electric power would be turned off for up to two hours while a power pole was replaced.

No one was injured in the accident on West American Blvd.

Nearly all Muleshoe City Police officers were at the accident site, along with the DPS, officers from the Bailey County Sheriff's office and the Muleshoe Fire Department.

Firemen set up their emergency vehicle and made coffee for the workers who spent the night at the accident, directing traffic to detour on West Avenue B and keeping the surprisingly large number of onlookers away from live wires which were left dangling following the accident.

A rash of accidents on the highways around Muleshoe Friday afternoon kept DPS Trooper Lacie Kirk, the local wrecker driver and the ambulance crews busy.

A woman and her small daughter were the first victims reported. The first accident was reported eight miles east of Muleshoe on Highway 70. The accident was a one vehicle rollover.

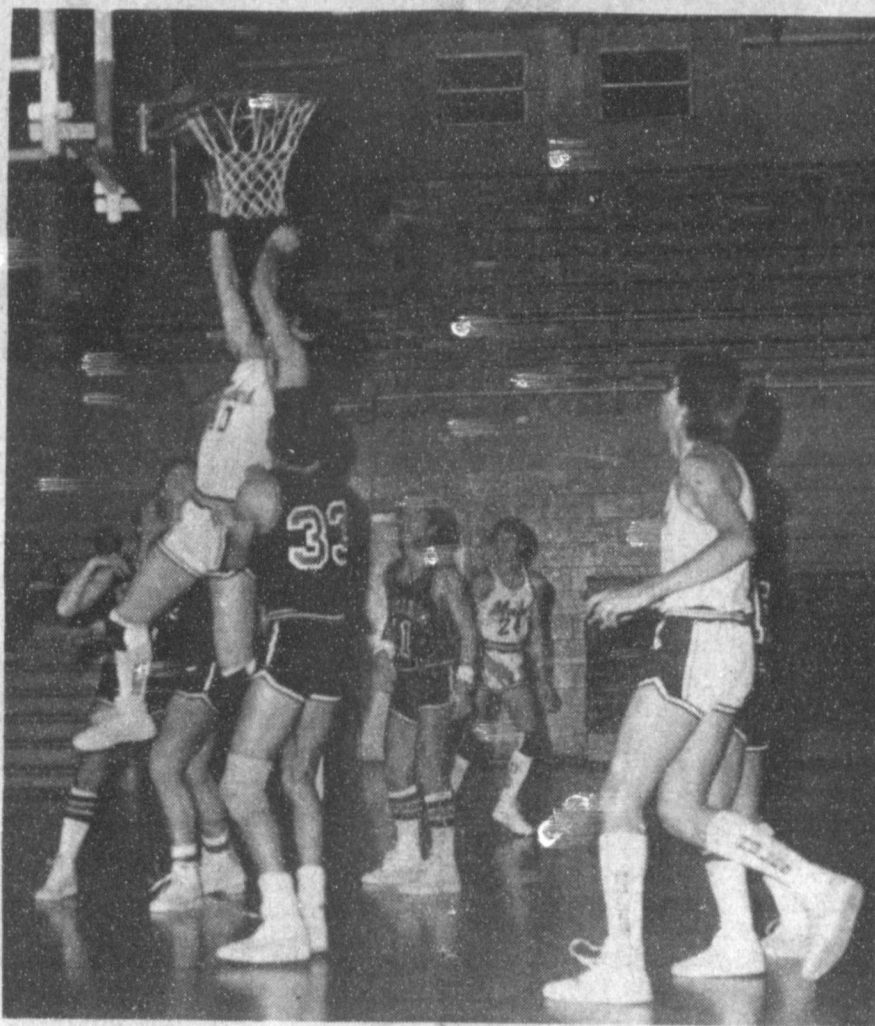
The woman was treated and released, but the small girl was hospitalized at West Plains Medical Center.

Between 2:30-3 p.m., an ambulance was sent to the intersection of FM746 and FM1731 where a woman was injured in a one vehicle rollover.

She was brought to Muleshoe for emergency treatment before being transferred to a hospital in Lubbock.

This was followed by an accident between 4:30-5 p.m.

School Board Hears '84 Athletic Report

During the regular monthly meeting of the board of trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District Monday night, several informational reports were given, including a report on library circulation.

However, one of the major reports was probably the athletic report for the 1984-85 school year. It was pointed out by Athletic Director, Windy Williams, that though the win-loss record for the varsity football team this year was not what was anticipated earlier in the year, the overall athletic program shows several promising aspects.

He said the second place finish at the state competition in

Boys' Cross Country and the very successful beginning of the 1984-85 basketball season were indications of good examples.

There was a lengthy discussion between trustees and Coach Williams on the level of participation. It was concluded that the over-all program is not down significantly from previous years percentage-wise. The 161 athletes currently enrolled in the program includes 38 percent of the student body. Also mentioned were several reasons contributing to the decrease in the number of young men in the football program.

Efforts to improve recruitment and retention of athletes are currently being studied by the athletic director, coaching staff, and school board. The trustees expressed satisfaction with the over-all athletic report.

An attendance report was presented to the trustees showing the average daily attendance for Muleshoe since 1968. Along with the report, the superintendent reported that the entire panhandle area of Texas has showed a decline in student population since 1968. Very little comment has been received by Dave Marr, Muleshoe city manager, about the proposed new convenience store to be located at the Crossroads.

Giese Investment Co. of Clovis has asked the city for a letter of approval for the developers of the convenience store to purchase a portion of the land leased to the city by AT&SF Railway for the Mule Memorial location.

The city manager explained that as the city does not own the land where the Mule Memorial is located, the lease can be terminated by either party on 30 days written notice.

Also, the Mule Memorial would be located some 98 feet from the store building and slightly to the northwest as the company also plans to purchase an additional 50 feet to the north of the present service station building, as well as the 50 feet to the east of the service station building.

Marr said the city cannot refuse to release the land to be sold for the store, but the investment company has asked for a letter from the city indicating their approval of the releasing of the land.

Solar Power Irrigation Introduced

Patricia and Robert Bruno of P&R Surge Systems, Inc., of Lubbock, were in Muleshoe Monday evening to introduce their newest surge irrigation system to current users.

They were introducing a solar powered surge unit, programmable, and designed to replace the battery operated units now in use.

Arnold Price of Pivot Products, explained to the group at K-Bob's Steak House, "What farmers are doing is mining water. We are constantly looking at ways to boost water efficiency and cut power costs.

"With our new system, open ditches, which formerly lost one half of the water in the ditch before it gets to the row, are replaced by gated pipe or underground tile.

"Surge irrigation allows a farmer to put on a little less water, and put that water on more economically, as well as more uniformly. We have found in most instances that we can produce more in the same length of time, and cover more land, without tailwater," he added.

Robert Bruno told the group of farmers, and soil specialists, that P&R first produced a surge unit with two programs, and now, they have come up with the solar powered unit, which will operate perpetually on three hours or less of sunshine per day.

This will help eliminate expensive battery replacement, he added.

The developers also said the new unit does not make existing units obsolete, as it is designed to be interchangeable, either

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ice glaze on streets and sidewalks had reduced motorized traffic, as well as foot traffic and persons who did not have to be out mostly stayed inside, while the sleet turned to freezing rain.

Anyone who had a vehicle parked outside had to spend some time scraping the nearly one-quarter inch layer of ice from windows before the vehicle could be moved.

Saturday morning, more rain, freezing rain, sleet and snow had been forecast for the entire area.

Very cold temperatures also accompanied the storm on Friday, although streets were beginning to thaw by Saturday morning as warmer weather was moving in.

National Weather Service said there was little chance for an accumulation of snow, although both snow and freezing rain were staying in the forecast through Sunday.

Light snow fell throughout the night on Friday in far west Texas, including El Paso, and blowing snow was creating driving hazards in most of New Mexico.

Thursday night, snow packed streets in and around Clovis and schools did not open for Friday in that city some 30 miles to the west of Muleshoe.

Warmer weather was in the forecast for Sunday afternoon and Monday, with wet, winter weather again in the forecast for Tuesday and Wednesday of this week, according to the National Weather Service.

Travelers warnings, and hazardous driving conditions were being given.

Shortly before 8:30 a.m. Saturday, heavy snow started falling in Muleshoe.

"Richard Barnett, vice president for development for Westworld, said the agreement is expected to be executed today. The hospital board will still have to approve the contract.

"I don't see any reason why it won't be executed," said Barnett. If the agreement is signed, Barnett said his company would begin an interim management relationship with the hospital Jan. 1, 1985. The 30-year lease would go into effect June 1, 1985.

"Haralson said West Plains Medical Center has been financially troubled for quite some time and has failed to show a profit recently. He said the board felt the hospital "had reached a point to where we had to have some kind of outside assistance."

"Haralson said the board examined 15 hospital management companies before selecting Westworld. He said the

Shoplifting Seminar Held Here Thursday

A whopping 15 percent of the price you pay for an item has been 'tacked on' to take care of the cost of shoplifted items. This enlightening figure was released by Sgt. Wayne Holmes, of the Muleshoe City Police Department during shoplifting seminars conducted on Thursday.

"Courteous, helpful, well-trained, watchful sales clerks are a businesses best bet in

preventing shoplifting," said Sgt. Holmes. "Shoplifters need privacy, and can't operate if they are assisted by a good sales clerk."

The sergeant told of a trio of shoplifters who were arrested in Muleshoe who had 'shopping lists' including what item they wanted, sizes, the value of the item, along with the re-sale price.

Each of the three women arrested wore two complete sets of underwear, he added, as this method was used apparently to be sure one set did not 'give away' as they added their chosen items, without benefit of paying for them.

Another problem shoplifter is the 'thrill' stealer, who a lot of the time is a teenager, or younger person, who is dared by his peers, just to see if he or she can get away with it. "They do not need the item, or items, but just want to see what they can get away with," he added, "and very often have enough money with them to pay for the particular item they took several times over."

The officer said the average theft is \$15, but the fine for taking that \$15 worth of merchandise is \$200.

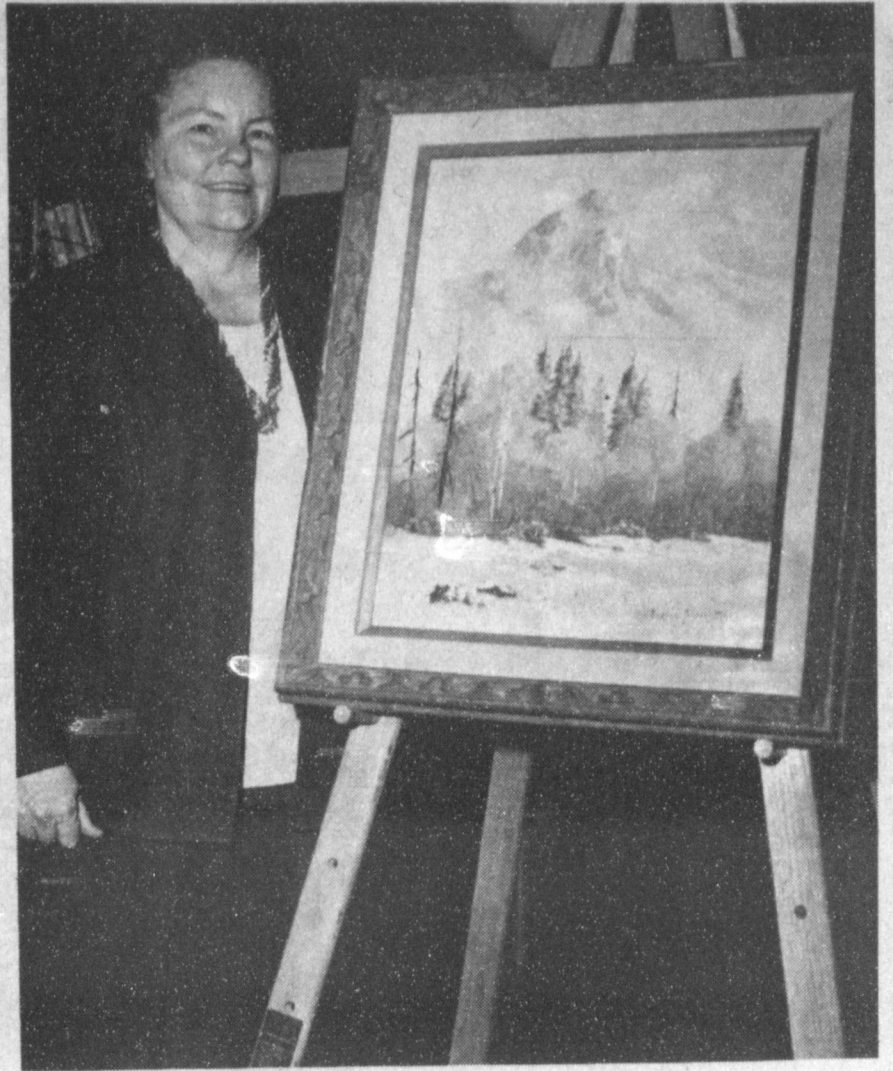
She is a member of the Muleshoe Art Association and the Littlefield First Baptist Church.

Christmas Sugar Cookies
2 cups sifted all purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup granulated sugar
1 egg
1/4 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract

Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt; set aside. In a mixing bowl blend the shortening and granulated sugar and mix in the egg. Add dry ingredients alternately with milk and lemon extract and blend thoroughly. Chill dough overnight.

Preheat oven to 400° F. Roll dough to 1/4" thickness on floured pastry cloth. Cut out shapes with knife or cookie cutters. Transfer to greased

cookie sheet and bake 7 to 10 minutes. Yields about 4 dozen cookies.

3 3/4 cups Powdered Sugar (1-lb carton)
4 tablespoons milk (approx.)
Food colorings

Combine powdered sugar with milk; stir until smooth. Add more milk, 1 teaspoon at a time, to achieve desired spreading consistency. Divide icing into several small bowls and tint with several drops of food coloring. Trim with colored decorator sprinkles, cinnamon red hots and candies.

partially or totally.

Various timed cycles are available on the new surge power unit, said Bruno, as he explained how the system operates.

He said the unit is programmed, and breaks into cycles, choosing the cycles, with four programs available.

"Last year's unit was smart, but it took a lot of energy to operate," said Bruno. "The new unit will cut energy consumption to one-twentieth of last year's cost. The self-perpetuating solar panel will keep the unit going indefinitely. A battery will last approximately two weeks in a unit without the solar panel, while three hours of sunshine will keep the new unit fully charged."

The P&R Surge System operator also explained that re-conditioned units will be available.

In a time when energy costs are high, and water is being depleted and not replaced, the new solar powered units are expected to be a boon to the area farmers and ranchers, according to the developers.

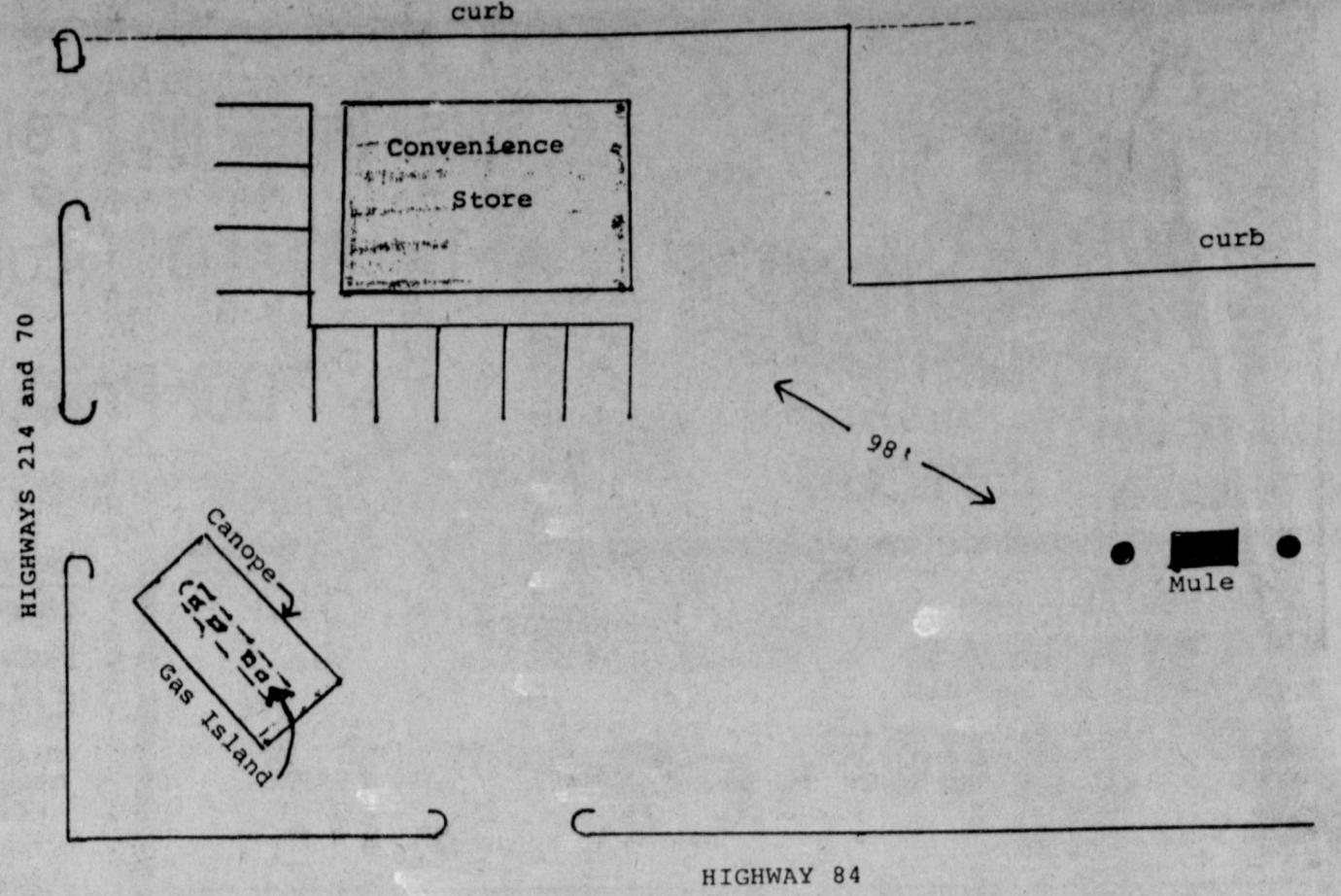

Sgt. Holmes told the business people what to particularly watch for in attempting to spot potential shoplifters, and methods shoplifters use, including professional shoplifters.

located some two miles south of Muleshoe on SH214. No injury was reported in the accident.

Trooper Kirk investigated the next accident some eight miles east of Muleshoe on Highway 84, which involved a one vehicle rollover. No injury was sustained by the two occupants of the vehicle.

Another one vehicle rollover was reported between 6:30 p.m. near the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge. Again no one was injured in the rollover.

Wednesday afternoon, around 12:38 p.m., a grinding, two vehicle crash at the intersection of West Sixth Street and Avenue J, sent four persons to the hospital.

Steven Ehrhridge, 16, was transferred to Lubbock where he was listed in serious condition at presstime with head injuries. He was a passenger in an eastbound pickup on Avenue J, which was involved in an accident with a car southbound on West Sixth street.

Joe Bob Newman, driver of the pickup, was taken to West Plains Medical Center as were Lupe Villegas, driver of the car, and his passenger Fernando Rincones. They were all treated and released at WPMC.

According to investigating officers, there was a delay in transporting the victims to the hospital as two ambulance drivers showed up at the accident but did not bring an ambulance, and one driver had to return to the hospital to bring an ambulance to the accident scene.

Steven was given emergency treatment before being transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

By Friday, he had been upgraded from critical to serious with a fractured skull, but is still in the surgical intensive care unit.

Early Thursday morning, with rain falling, a small car slammed into county heavy equipment approximately seven miles west of Muleshoe on FM 1760. White DPS Trooper Lacie Kirk was investigating that accident, an accident with injuries was reported at 8:39 a.m., approximately six miles southeast of Muleshoe on Highway 84.

An ambulance was dispatched to the second accident, but did not ever get to the wreck as they drove by the accident, then tried to cross over in the wet median and bogged down until their ambulance was pulled out later by a wrecker. Sheriff Bob Henderson took one man to the hospital in his patrol car, then returned to the accident to wait for trooper Kirk to arrive from the first of three accidents checked before 1 p.m. Thursday.

The third accident, around noon, was one vehicle accident just west of the intersection of Highway 84 on FM1760. There were no injuries reported in the accident.

As the winter weather continued, and highways to the west of Muleshoe became icy, and snowpacked toward Clovis, DPS troopers from Farwell investigated at least two accidents, both involving single vehicle rollovers on Thursday night.

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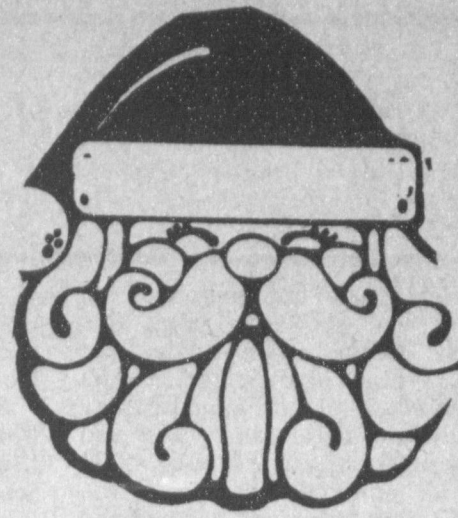

Sudan Basketball News

Basketball got underway in full force at Sudan High this week as the varsity teams won 100 percent of their games. The Hornets defeated Farwell Friday night in a close game 49-45 and Springlake-Earth Tuesday 43-36 in an emotional game for the fans. The Hornets downed the feds from Farwell 65-17 and followed that with a sound defeat of 63-30 to Springlake-Earth.

The Hornets got off to a slow start against Farwell lagging behind 12-9 at the end of the first quarter but surged ahead behind the shooting of Jeff Kinnie and tied the score 21-21 at the halftime whistle.

Farwell went ahead and maintained a slim lead throughout the third quarter although Jerry Dodson began connecting with the basket for Sudan. Going into the final period down 35-30 did not hamper the Hornets as they continued struggling and edged ahead of the Steers in the final minutes of the game. Jerry Dodson led the scoring for Sudan with 18 points, 16 of these in the second half. Kinnie was close with 16,

12 of these in the first half. Others adding points for Sudan were Charlie Fisher, 6; Jeff Dodson, 4; David Wood, 5.

Sudan got the tip-off in the Springlake-Earth game but the first shot didn't go and S-E scored on a rebound shot. Kinnie wasted no time in putting Sudan on the board with a net-ripper from outside. Then seconds later added another long shot to put Sudan ahead 4-2. Sudan maintained the lead throughout the game although S-E came close several times. S-E went into bonus early in the game as Sudan received 10 fouls in the first half compared to 2 for the Wolverines. S-E scored 7 of their 11 first half points from the free throw line although they went to the line 16 times while Sudan shot 2 FT in the first half.

Going into the second half a four-point lead, 15-11, Sudan pulled further ahead when Jerry Dodson sank a turn-around bullet. David Wood received a hand-off under the basket and added two points before Sudan hit a dry spell plagued by turnovers. Kinnie started the scoring again as he laid one up for two points from the center of the lane. Fisher added two points from underneath and Jerry Dodson made the score 25-19 on a turn-around shot with 2 minutes left in the third

period. S-E got two free shots when Sudan was called for fouling on a blocked shot and drew within four points 25-21. Sudan missed six shots before S-E got the rebound and ran the clock down but missed the final shot.

Brent Kirkland put Sudan ahead 27-21 on a long jumper and Fisher added four points on rebound shots. Sudan maintained at least a five point lead then the rest of the game with most of the last points coming from the free shot line. Jerry Dodson sank four and Kirkland two in the final two minutes.

Jerry Dodson led the scoring with 16, hitting 50% of the field goals and 100% of his free shots. Jeff Kinnie had 12 points hitting 6 of 12 from the floor. Charlie Fisher hit 3 of 4 from the floor for 6 points, Kirkland hit both of his long shots from the floor for 100% shooting and 2 of from the line for a total of 6 points. Wood had 3 points. The Hornets shot 52.9% from the floor Tuesday night making their season shooting record 40.2%. They are hitting a total of 57.4% of their shots from the line and are averaging 29 rebounds per game. Jeff Kinnie is leading the team in points scored this season with 59. Fisher led the team in rebounds Tuesday with 14 although Jerry Dodson is leading the season with 48.

Sharla Harrison led the scoring for Sudan in the first period against Farwell when the Hornets took an overwhelming 17-0 lead. Farwell managed 2 points in the second period when Sudan added 24 points for

a 41-2 lead at halftime. Jeannia Nix scored 10 points in the second quarter. Fouls hurt Farwell as they had 12 the first half while Sudan never committed the bonus applying fifth foul.

Sudan added 24 points in the last half while Farwell hit four from the floor and seven free throws for a game total of 17 points compared to 65 for the Hornets. Jeannia Nix was high point with 17, followed by Harrison with 12, Wooley had 13; Melissa Nix and Keitha Scott each hit 2 field goals and 2 FT for 6 points; Sherrie Powell and Shawnda Masten both had 2 FG for 4 points, Kim Crowson scored 3.

In Tuesday's game against Springlake-Earth, Sudan made a fast start and scored six points in the first minute. Sudan got the tip-off and Masten hit the first basket. Sudan got the ball on turnover and Harrison put it through the hoop for two points. Then Sherrie Powell hit an outside shot after another S-E turnover. S-E did not manage to score until after 4 minutes of play and Sudan has a 10-0 lead. Wooley hit a jumper and Jeannia added a baseline shot before S-E added their second score. Wooley hit an under-the-basket shot to make the score 16-4. Sudan got the ball back with 6 seconds to go and Jeannia sank a long shot at the buzzer which was disallowed by the referee, making the first quarter score 16-4. Sudan added fifteen points during the second period while their opponents hit for 10, thus bringing the score to 31-14 at halftime.

The Hornets continued to add points in the third period as Wooley hit from underneath and Jeannia from the baseline before S-E scored four unanswered points, 35-18. Shawnda Masten added two on a drive and Nix sank a basket on a fast break. Wooley added another two points under the basket on a good pass from J. Nix with four minutes to play. Good defense caused S-E turnovers and J. Nix hit on a jumper from the line and Wooley added two on a rebound shot bringing the third quarter score to 47-22. Sudan scored 16 points in the final period compared to 8 for S-E making the score 63-30. Wooley was high point with 19, sinking 8 of 12 FG and 3 for 3 at the FT line. J. Nix had 16 points hitting 8 of 13 from the floor. Harrison scored 10 points hitting 5 of 10 FG while Sherrie Powell hit 2 of 5 FG and 1 of 2 FT for 5 points. Keitha Scott has 1 of 2 FT. For the season the girls have a 6-1 record. Jeannia Nix leads the scoring with 91 points. She is hitting 50% of her FG and 82% FT. JoAnn Wooley is shooting 65%

from the floor and Harrison is hitting 61% from the floor. Harrison and Wooley are neck and neck on rebounds with 52 and 51. The team is hitting 46% of their shots from the floor and 51% from the line. They have scored 337 points in seven games while allowing their opponents 214.

Both the Hornets and the Hornets will be engaged in tournament play this week at the local gyms.

All 10 players on the Junior Varsity team saw action against the Farwell team and took a big 16-6 halftime lead. The Hornets put 11 more points on the board during the third period while Farwell only managed to score twice for four points. Sudan did not falter as they continued in the final period with 13 points holding Farwell to six.

Kim Crowson received the scoring honors at 13 with six FG and 1 FT. Darnette Provence sank 4 FG and 1 FT for 9 points. Keitha Scott added 4 FG for 8. Cindy Brotherton, S. Peck and Kathy Powell each hit for 2 points. Melissa Nix had 2 FG for four points.

Springlake-Earth scored first but Kathy Powell hit the bottom of 2 FT to start the scoring for Sudan before S-E added another 2 points. However, Sudan took an early lead as Powell hit a jumper for a 4-3 score. Sudan was in the bonus midway first period when Kim Crowson hit 2 FT and then put in a rebound shot for another 2. Powell scored on a good pass from Crowson to give Sudan a 10-6 lead at the end of the first quarter. S-E only got off one shot in the last 6 minutes of the first period and that was fast break after intercepting a Hornette pass.

Sudan had several turnovers beginning the second period before Cindy Brotherton hit for 2 FT and Crowson added 1 from the line to give them a 13-10 halftime lead.

S-E pulled to within one point, 15-14 midway third quarter before Brotherton hit a long shot with 58 seconds to give Sudan a three-point lead

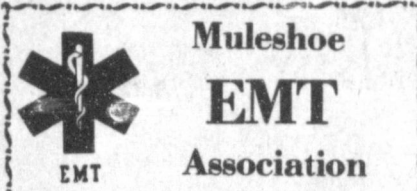
going into the final period. Sudan more than doubled their score in the fourth period, scoring 19 points, while S-E hit 2 FG and 4 of 12 FT for 8 points to give the Hornets a 36-22 victory. Crowson was high point with 12, followed by Brotherton with 11, Powell had 7 and Provence 6.

The Junior Varsity boys had a big fourth quarter against Farwell but came out one point short on the scoreboard 35-36. Farwell took a first quarter lead 12-8 and upped that to 22-16 by halftime. Springlake-Earth JV boys came out running and put 20 points on the board during the first period while Sudan managed 3 FG for 6 points. The scoring was even in the second quarter with 9 each but Sudan went to the locker room trailing 29-15. The Hornets lost 4 more points during the third period as S-E added 12 points to the scoreboard while Sudan had 8. Sudan came back in the final period and outscored S-E 17-14, but lost the contest 55-42.

Donnell again led the scoring with 5 FG and 2 of 2 FT for 12 points. Gardner had 4 FG and 1 FT for 9 points, Bartley sank three FG and 1 FT for 7. A. Williams hit 2 FG for 4 points. Conley, Griggs, Gunn, Boyless added 2 points each. Again FT hurt the Hornets as they hit 4 of 17 from the line.

WHAT IS AN EMT? WHY HE CAN HELP YOU!
You've been in a serious accident. The first person to approach you tells you he is an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT).

Your first response might be "what's that to me?" They make up fancy names for anything these days.

To you, it may be life or death; EMT's prevent a large percentage of pre-hospital deaths from medical emergencies in our country.

An EMT may be a fireman, ambulance driver, law enforcement officer, or a nurse or just an average citizen. But, he or she is certified with the highest level of emergency training. All have completed a 120-140 hour course in advanced emergency care and are certified by the Texas Department of Health.

EMTs are prepared to meet emergencies including heart attacks (through the use of cardio-pulmonary resuscitation), emergency childbirth, the techniques of extrication (removing victims from wrecked vehicles) and advanced back injuries with the use of a backboard.

The EMT course also includes treatment of all types of fractures, other bodily injuries, problems of the newborn patient, and environmental emergencies.

The EMT spends 40 hours of his course doing in-hospital emergency room training.

EMTs then keep abreast of medical advances through an Emergency Medical Services continuing education program.

Emergency care attendants, ECA, CPR, certified individuals and firstaiders are among lower levels of trained volunteers in the area.

The members of the Muleshoe EMT Association are very proud and excited to be EMTs, and in a position to serve their community.

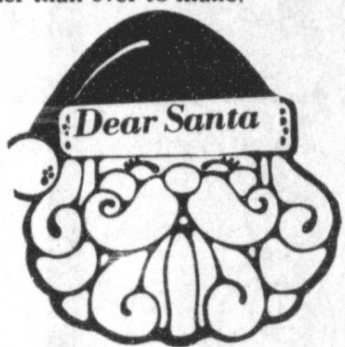

New Fashioned Christmas Fudge

- 1 cup walnuts
- 1 cup figs
- 1 package (12 oz.) semisweet chocolate bits
- 1 jar (7 oz.) marshmallow creme
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3 cups sugar
- 1 1/3 cups evaporated milk

Position multi-purpose blade in work bowl. Add walnuts and pulse 3 to 4 times to coarsely chop. Remove from bowl and set aside. Add figs to bowl. Pulse 5 to 6 times to coarsely chop. Remove from bowl and set aside.

Add chocolate, marshmallow creme, butter, and vanilla to bowl.

In a 3-quart saucepan, combine sugar and evaporated milk. Cook mixture over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a full rolling boil. Continue to cook, stirring constantly, until mixture reaches the soft ball stage (236°F).

With machine running, add milk mixture through feed tube in a steady stream, about 25 seconds. Continue processing until chocolate mixture has melted, an additional 5 to 10 seconds.

Add walnuts and figs. Pulse 5 to 6 times to combine.

Spread fudge into a 9 x 13-inch

buttered baking dish. Cool completely. Cut into squares. Wrap and store in a cool place.
Yield: 3 pounds

Apricot Bon Bon Lollipops

- 1/2 cup walnuts
- 1 package (6 oz.) dried apricot halves
- 1/2 cup powdered sugar
- 2 teaspoons light corn syrup
- 1 package (6 oz.) semisweet chocolate bits

1/2 teaspoon shortening
1/4 cup chopped walnuts or toasted shredded coconut

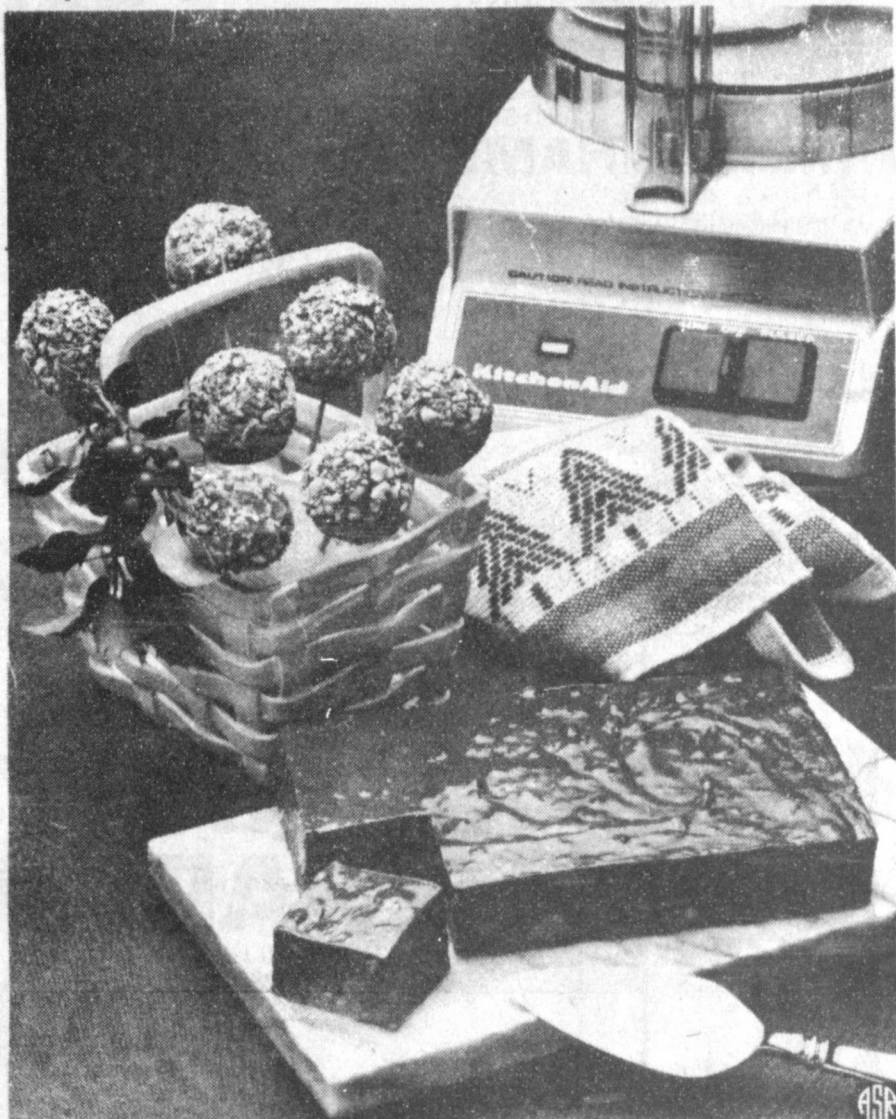
Position multi-purpose blade in work bowl. Add walnuts to bowl. Pulse 3 to 4 times to coarsely chop. Remove from bowl and set aside.

Add apricots, powdered sugar, and corn syrup to bowl. Process until mixture forms a ball, about 25 seconds. Add walnuts and pulse 3 to 4 times to combine.

Shape mixture into 12 balls and chill.

Melt chocolate and shortening in double boiler. Insert a bamboo skewer into each chilled ball. Rotate each in chocolate to coat. Dip lightly into chopped nuts or toasted coconut. Place on baking sheet lined with waxed paper. Chill to set chocolate.

Yield: 12 lollipops

excess perspiration and moisture.

- If linings become damp, sprinkle a little baking soda, borax or corn starch inside and let it sit overnight.

- Wipe shoes with a soft cloth after each wearing and before polishing.
