PRMC parent company to close operations

Signature Hospital Houston-based Corporation, the parent company of Pampa

Regional Medical Center, is closing.

The company announced earlier this week that it is taking steps to divest its remaining hospitals and close down operations. The company still owns two facilities, both in Texas: PRMC and Gulf Coast Medical Center in Wharton, roughly 60 miles southwest of Houston.

Signature sold its other hospital, St. Joseph's Hospital in Parkersburg, W. Va., in September. The decision to fully pursue the

sales of PRMC and GCMC followed in late December, according to Signature CFO Steve Peterson.

"Our decision follows months of careful deliberation on the future of our hospitals and the company," Peterson said.

"Based on current economic conditions and the impending healthcare reform, we believe Signature does not have the scale to continue to ensure long-term financial stability for Pampa Regional Medical Center and Gulf Coast Medical Center."

Peterson said that the economic crisis of the last few years, coupled with the ensuing sale of Signature's West Virginia hospital, made SIGNATURE cont. on page 3





EPA: Dallas violates standards

DALLAS (AP) - The Environmental Protection Agency says the Dallas-Fort Worth area has some of the nation's most polluted air.

EPA says the area on Tuesday will be designated a "serious" violator of federal air-quality standards.

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The Dallas Morning News reports that Ventura, Calif., is just as bad although five other regions are even worse, including the Houston metro area, which is a "severe" offender.

EPA spokesman David Bary says the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality will be required to develop a new clean-air plan for DFW by July 2012

David Brymer, the state's air quality division director, says the new EPA label will probably have little effect on North Texas since a plan to clean the air is already underway because of previous orders by the federal government to do so.

Amarillo woman settles lawsuit

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) - An Amarillo woman who says her breasts were exposed during a search by a female Transportation Safety Administration agent has settled her lawsuit against the agency.

The Amarillo Globe-News reported Friday that attorneys for 24-year-old Lynsie Murley and the TSA declined to disclose the settlement amount.

The negligence lawsuit claimed Murley on May 29, 2008, was singled out at Corpus Christi International Airport, before a flight home.

One male TSA agent allegedly said he wished he would have been there when Murley was being searched and later told Murley "he would just have to watch the video."

Assistant U.S. Attorney Gordon Bryant Jr. declined

TSA spokesman Luis Casanova says there is no disciplinary action when a settlement is reached. Casanova says TSA regrets that Murley had an unpleasant experience.

\$15K bid for 'FERRARI'

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - A custom Texas license plate bearing the word FERRARI drew the biggest bid at an auction of vanity plates.

The plate drew a \$15,000 bid at an auction at Cowboys Stadium in Arlington on Thursday.

My Plates is the private vendor Texas has chosen to market the specialty plates. It auctioned 33 plates in all - the first auction in which Texans could get a license plate with a full seven-character personalization. Other big winners were plates bearing the words "COWBOYS," "GO HORNS" and "RANGERS."

The plates bought at the auction are good for 25 years - a first in the state - and can be renewed after that. They can also be re-sold by the winning bidder. Auction proceeds will be shared by the state and My Plates.

Texas burial for 2 Vietnam vets

DALLAS (AP) - Two Vietnam War veterans whose remains were identified decades after their **Signature** plane was shot down will be laid to rest in Texas

A funeral with full military honors was scheduled Friday at Dallas-Fort Worth National Cemetery.

Air Force Col. James Dennany was 34 when his plane was shot down over Laos in November 1969. The Defense Department's POW/Missing Personnel Office on Wednesday also announced positive identification of the remains of 27-year-old

Maj. Robert Tucci of Detroit. Tucci was the pilot. Dennany, who was born in Mattawan, Mich., was the weapons system officer. A search team in 1999 discovered wreckage and some human remains in the area.

GOP seeks Latino outreach

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) - Republicans gathering in South Florida to improve the party's outreach to Hispanic voters will tackle trade, education - and the elephant in the room, immigration - at a conference organized by the new Hispanic Action Network.

Friday's conference is part of a growing number of Republican efforts to reach out to Latinos in advance of next year's election. Former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush, who supports comprehensive immigration reform, is co-chairing the conference at the Biltmore Hotel in the Miami suburb of Coral Gables. Among the featured speakers is Texas Sen. John

EPA seeks input on Texas rules

DALLAS (AP) - The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency says it wants input from industries and the public before finalizing regulations on greenhouse gas

Environmental groups and others are expected to speak at an EPA hearing in Dallas on Friday.

A federal appeals court's ruling this week allows the EPA to issue permits directly to Texas industries. The EPA made that decision after Texas refused to comply with the new Clean Air Act regulations.

Until the final rules are in place, the EPA will issue permits using interim regulations based on its guidelines issued to states last year.

Texas is suing to stop the EPA from implementing the plan, which requires the nation's largest industries to meet more stringent greenhouse gas emissions standards in new facilities or ones undergoing major modifica-

Shooter fires across border

HOUSTON (AP) - A group of workers repairing an isolated rural road near the Mexican border in West Texas escaped injury on Thursday after an unknown gunman fired at them from Mexico, authorities said.

A crew of four county employees was working on the county road late Thursday morning when they heard around eight rounds fired from across the Rio Grande, said Hudspeth County Sheriff's Department Chief Deputy Mike Doyal.

"They were shooting in the direction of the workers,"

The workers, who were less than a mile away from the border, quickly fled the area after several of the rounds hit the ground near them.

Install garage-door opener properly

Dear Pat: I want to install a quiet, yet fast garage-door opener. I am not sure what type to get and I want to install it myself. I need some installation tips and advice on the best types for a two-ear garage. -Candi H.

Dear Candi: Having a garagedoor opener is almost a necessity in most homes today. It is not only convenient and a time-saver, but it is a security item. You are much safer staying inside your car until it is in the garage with the door closed than to have to get out at night and open the door manually.

The three primary options you have in garage-door opener designs are in the drive mechanisms: chain, screw and belt. Chain drives are usually the least expensive, but also the noisiest. Screw drives are middle of the road, and the belt drives are the quietest. A one-half horsepower motor would be best for fast speed with any garage door.

For the greatest security, at only slightly higher initial cost, select a garage-door opener with a randomly revolving access code. Each time you enter your garage, the electronic code automatically changes. This keeps a would-be thief from electronically capturing the access code and using it to enter your garage when you are away.

Before installing your garagedoor opener, check your local building codes. Most openers come with a 40-inch cord, and the electrical outlet that it plugs into must be within 36 inches of the opener. Also, some areas require a garagedoor opener be wired to its own circuit breaker, so make sure you have the electrical outlet positioned and wired properly.

One of the most common problems resulting from do-it-yourself installation is the opener motor and track are not securely attached to the ceiling. The motor assembly can weigh 50 pounds, not including the forces of opening a door, so secure installation is necessary for quiet operation.

Make sure the motor housing or mounting brackets are screwed securely into the lumber framing in

the ceiling, not just into the drywall with anchors. You may have to go into your garage attic and nail a 2-by-6 piece of lumber across several joists for support.

The next step is to assemble the opener. This varies depending on the design. But the instructions included with it should detail this operation well. Getting the track set up is probably the most timeconsuming part of the installation.

All openers will have a headermounting bracket that attaches to the garage wall, typically several inches above the track section. As

with the motor, it is important to securely fasten the bracket to the wall. Ideally, you will be able to screw it into the 2-by-6 header above the garage-door opening. Next, secure the motor to the ceil-

The final step is to install the infrared safety controls. A beam of light energy shines from one side of the garage-door opening to a sensor on the other side. It is usually located 6 inches above the ground. If the beam of light gets broken, a closing door should stop or reverse and open.



the company reevaluate its business plan and come to the decision to wind

down. 'We bought our first hospital in 2006... but unfortunately, not too long after that, the economy went into its meltdown," said Peterson. "That kind of put the growth of the hospitals on hold.

"Last year, we got an offer we couldn't refuse, you could say, on (St. Joseph's Hospital). At that point, the hospital in West Virginia was one-half of our company. Having not acquired anything in three years, we started to talk about if we could grow this thing and what our options might be. We decided that (selling and winding down) was the best thing for us to do."

Signature has partnered with FTI Consulting to help find a buyer and assist in the day-to-day operations of the hospitals during the sales process. As for PRMC itself, Peterson said that he believed that the facility's 'sellability" is high.

"We've had people approach us about it even before we made our decision to sell," Peterson said. "We've had a lot of calls since we issued the press release.

'I can easily think of a half-dozen companies who are interested, and another half-dozen that called us before we made the announcement.'

There is currently no timetable for the sale, though Peterson said that the company hopes to have the sale of both Texas hospitals finalized before the end of 2011.

As for the interim, Peterson said that neither the staffing nor the quality of care at PRMC will not be affected by the impend-



Obama departed Arizona to address the nation on the Tucson massacre. Washington was abuzz.

"If this tragedy prompts reflection and debate ... let's make sure ... it's not on the usual plane of politics and point-scoring and pettiness." No "lack of civility caused this tragedy."

ground out from under those exploiting the massacre and attempted murder of Rep. Gabrielle Giffords to smear and exact retribution for the crushing repudiation

they suffered on Nov. 2. In one of the finer speeches of his career, Obama realized that, at this hour and in this tragedy, his country yearned to come together on the higher ground of grief for the fallen, celebration of those who behaved bravely and prayerful hope





I can still remember the excitement I felt reading "The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe" for the first time. I was in third grade. And today I would like to discuss two of them; "The Problem of Pain," written in 1940, and "A Grief Observed"



If it is consistent with hurting us, then He may hurt us after death as unendurably as before it. Sometimes it is hard not to say, "God forgive God." Sometimes it is hard to say so much. But if our faith is true, He didn't. He crucified Him." (31). Lewis questions how God can allow bad things

to happen to good people, but also recognizes that God knows what it is like to suffer. While we may not be able to explain why bad things happen to good people, we can trust that we do not suffer alone. Our God knows what it is like to suffer. Through the power of the Holy Spirit we are not alone in our suffering. Christ came to live with us, die for us and he rose again so that we might be with God both now and forever. We have hope because someday, "God will wipe away every tear, from [our] eyes, and death shall be no more, neise ther shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away' (Revelation 21:4).

Toward the end of the book, Lewis says, "I have gradually been coming to feel that the door is no longer shut and bolted. Was it my own frantic need that slammed it in my face? The time when there is nothing at all in you call cry for help may be just the time when God ca give it: you are like the drowning man who can't be helped because he clutches and grabs. Perhaps your own reiterated cries deafen you to the voice you hoped to hear" (53-54).

Psalm 13 says it this way, "But I have trusted in your steadfast love; my heart shall rejoice in your salvation. I will sing to the Lord, because he has dealt bountifully with me."After all is said and done, there is no adequate answer for all of the pain we are experiencing. It is good for us to try to wrap our heads around the "Problem of Pain," but it is more important for us to open our hearts to "A Grief Observed."

Please pray with me: Gracious God,

We do not always understand your ways, but we trust in you. We do not always know why certain things happen, but we trust that you are with us. God, help us when we are unable to trust. Help us when answers do not come. When we are in pain, we ask that you would surround us with those who love us and care for us. Make your? presence known to us, especially when we suffer. God, we ask that you would ease the pain of those who are suffering this day. Comfort those who are mourning. Support those who are caring for others. Bless us all and help us to be a blessing to others. Amen.

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Pampa High School senior Cori Cook has been involved with basketball for a while, starting when she was in third grade.

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"My dad and Taryn Eubank's mom started up a team when we were in third grade," Cook said. 'So, we've all been playing together for a while.

After her first varsity season last season where she played a key role, Cook is one of two seniors looking to lead the Lady Harvesters back to the postseason and beyond.

Cook has been playing with her senior teammate Kayla Hughes since they were in third grade. The senior guard says it's nice they've played that long because they are familiar with each other.

"We know exactly what each other is going to do," Cook said. "We can read each other. I think it helps out on the court to know what you're teammates are going to do.'

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
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Former Panthers coach Fox takes reins in Denver

Fox turned around a floundering fran-Inse before The Denver Broncos are counting on him to do it again.

FAGLEWOOD, Colo. (AP) John together a coaching staff. Speculation centered on Fox keeping Mike McCov as Denver's offensive coordinator and hiring former Seahawks head coach Jim Mora Jr., as his defensive coordinator.

There's been no decisions in that area vet." Fox said.

Fox's task in turning around this team seems as high and steep as the biggest peaks in the Rocky Mountains.

The Broncos are coming off a franchise-worst 4-12 season, own the second overall pick in the draft and are in need of a major overhaul - much like the Panthers were when Fox arrived in 2002 following a 1-15 season.

He led them to a 7-9 mark in his first year before guiding them to the 2004 Super Bowl in his second season.

Fox arrived in Denver on Wednesday to meet with Elway after his flight out of North Carolina was delayed three times by winter weather. He was the fifth and final candidate interviewed, and his sitdown lasted 90 minutes longer than the

Xanders said the interview lasted 51/2 hours, followed by a dinner with he. Flway and Fox that lasted just as long at Hway's Steakhouse.

The more he talked, the more football wisdom came out in terms of different situations," Xanders told The Associated Press. "Running the defense, the offense, the nine years of head coach experience came out in his answers. And then his personality, his energy and positive outlook fit the Broncos model.

In the Broncos' new organizational structure. Elway oversees Xanders, who's in charge of roster-building, and Fox, who's in charge of the team.

We spent some time at dinner, a long dinner after the interview, and the more we talked the more matched up we felt," Xanders said. "We fit in with each other."

Team president Joe Ellis told The AP he couldn't pick one thing he liked most about Fox

"Everything. Energy. Enthusiasm. Wisdom. Tremendous connections throughout the league. He did a great presentation on his whole scheme, his whole plan. He's turned it around before, when he was in Carolina. Great reputation as a head coach. I just think all of his experience. And then you look at where his real background was throughout football: on the defensive side," Ellis said.

"I think we were really pleased that John Elway made a special emphasis to get consistent and good on defense and John Fox is going to help us do that."

A one-time assistant under Chuck Noll, Fox spent 13 years as a defensive coach with the Steelers, Chargers, Raiders, Rams and Giants, including seven seasons as coordinator, before taking over the Panthers, who owned the league's worst defense.

In his first season in Carolina, the Panthers rose all the way to No. 2, the biggest turnaround since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

"It's a good thing that he's a defensiveminded coach; that will really help the defense," linebacker Joe Mays said. "It's also good that he's a proven head coach, as well. I think it's a good hire.

"He's had success in the past," wide receiver Eric Decker said, "so why not here?"

Although fellow coaching candidates Eric Studesville, Perry Fewell and Dirk Koetter had interim head coaching experience and Rick Dennison has been with the Broncos for 24 years as a player and an assistant, none of them had the coaching credentials of Fox.

His Carolina teams posted three 11-win seasons, won two NFC South titles and went 5-3 in the playoffs, appearing in two conference championships and losing to New England in the "04 Super

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But they were inconsistent. Although his teams averaged nearly nine wins, they never posted consecutive winning seasons under Fox.

Still, Fox touted a top-of-the-pile resume that included a road map for leading the Broncos back to respectability after a five-year playoff drought.

"It's not my first rodeo, so to speak," Fox said. "So, I think I do have a blue-

The team's top priority is fixing the last-place defense, which will be the focus of the draft, and Fox said he wouldn't have a problem if the Broncos want to stick with the 3-4 defensive scheme they've employed since 2009 even though he mostly used a 4-3 look

Elway said last week when he was hired as the team's new chief football executive that his new coach should be willing to work with rookie quarterback Tim Tebow. And Fox said he's a big believer in the former Fdorida star who started Denver's last three games.




Fox met with some members of the holdover staff on Thursday after agreeing to take over the Broncos, but there was no announcements on whether any of them would stay.


