It was water that brought Joe Dooley to Pampa. It was good Texas beef that kept him here.

Dooley, 49, came to Pampa from his native Montana to work for OMI, which operates the water plant for the city where he became project manager, but his first love is cooking.

That led to developing J. Dogg's Meat Sauce, displaying his culinary talents at Weldon Black's OCB (Other Corner Bar) on Alcock and finally to Smokin' Joe's Grill on East Frederic, which is having its grand opening on Saturday.

Dooley credits Black with getting him started in the restaurant business.

If all began, Dooley said, when another friend told him that he should create a burger called the "Double-Dogg Dare Ya."

"I just went from there and created a burger," Dooley said, "but it was missing something, so I created the sauce."

He said now they go through a bunch of the sauce.

Dooley and Crystal Brown joined together to open the new restaurant just before Thanksgiving, although their official opening is this week.

"We've celebrated the whole week," Dooley said.

"It's all-around family-style restaurant," Brown said. "We have a variety that appeals to everyone. It's fresh home

Fort Worth 'gunman' not found

FORT WORTH (AP) — Police had surrounded a Texas clinic after receiving reports of a man with a gun walking around inside the complex, but the lockdown has been lifted after authorities found no gunman.

Dozens of police officers and fire department trucks responded to the clinic in Fort Worth on Friday after witnesses reported seeing a gunman. A SWAT team and hostage negotiators were dispatched as a precaution because clinic workers were inside.

Police Lt. Paul Henderson says no injuries have been reported and doctors, nurses and other employees were locked in their offices until the alert was lifted. There were no reports of a shooting.

Several roads around the clinic had been blocked off.

Shortly before noon, police entered the clinic and found no gunman.

Police were interviewing potential witnesses.



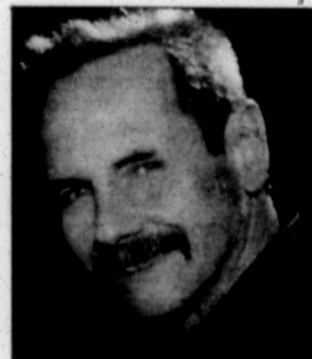

Judge sides with illegals

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - A federal judge says Indiana cannot deny paternity documents for children born in the U.S. just because their parents are illegal immigrants and don't have Social Security numbers.

U.S. District Judge Tanya Walton Pratt issued the ruling Thursday in a lawsuit filed by parents who say a state policy requiring the numbers violates their children's rights.

Under the policy, paternity affidavits filed by unmarried parents must contain both parents' Social Security numbers or be sent back to county health offices unrecorded.

The judge says denying parents the ability to establish legal paternity amounts to discrimination against children who are American citizens. Pratt issued a preliminary injunction barring the policy.

State health officials say the policy was meant to reflect state and federal law. State attorneys haven't decided whether they'll appeal.

Panel urges more TX rail projects

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A report on how Texas could improve the Interstate 35 corridor recommends passenger rail projects to shift travelers from congested roads.

The report, released Thursday to the Texas Transportation Commission, says many of the recommendations would involve expanding I-35 or nearby existing highways.

The so-called My 35 Plan recommends more managed lanes, plus real-time traffic information systems that alert drivers to delays and provide alternate routes.

The citizen-led Interstate 35 Corridor Advisory Committee recommends redesignating and renaming parts of I-35 in Central Texas to divert traffic away from metropolitan areas.

The report, which says legislative action may be needed, says many of the recommended projects "were needed yesterday."

Probation deems no more tattoos

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) - A judge in Beaumont has barred a woman from getting more tattoos or plastic surgery until she repays \$15,000 to the government.

Tamraka McGriff in September pleaded guilty to theft of public money. McGriff, who was sentenced Wednesday, faced up to a year in prison.

Investigators say the case involved Social Security funds that McGriff no longer was eligible to get for her disabled son after he was enrolled in a state-funded residential program.

The Beaumont Enterprise reports McGriff also must do 240 hours of community service and cannot handle public money in her job as the Beaumont Independent School District's transportation coordinator. BISD spokeswoman Jessie Hays says McGriff is not allowed to sign purchase orders.

Further details on McGriff's tattoos and plastic surgery were not immediately available.

Barnett Shale used to test rules

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality will use the Barnett Shale area to try out proposed tougher regulations on natural gas drillers.

The rules, meant to limit toxic chemicals released into the air, will take effect April 1 in the 23-county Barnett Shale region of North Texas.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram reports the TCEQ expects to apply the rules to the rest of Texas in early 2012.

TCEQ commissioners voted Wednesday to beef up air emission limits on toxic chemicals associated with natural gas drilling and required producers to do expanded testing of their drilling sites.

Celina Romero of the Texas Pipeline Association told commissioners that testing the rules in one area will allow the agency to make changes if they prove too complicated or burdensome.

TX gas prices decline 1 cent

IRVING, Texas (AP) - Gasoline prices slipped by a penny this week in the AAA Texas survey of the cost at the pump.

The association on Thursday reported the average price for a gallon of regular unleaded gas declined 1 cent, to reach \$2.95.

The national average also is down a penny, to \$3.10. San Antonio and Fort Worth had the cheapest gasoline this week, at an average \$2.92 a gallon.

AAA Texas says the most expensive gasoline is in Texarkana at \$2.97 per gallon.

Bristol Palin won't be on panel

ST. LOUIS (AP) - Washington University in St. Louis says Bristol Palin won't be speaking there next month after all.

The decision comes after some students expressed outrage over Palin being paid with student-generated funds.

The daughter of former GOP vice presidential candidate Sarah Palin had been invited by the university's Student Health Advisory Committee to be part of a panel discussion on abstinence on Feb. 7. Bristol Palin became pregnant at 17 and is a single mom to a 2-year-old son.

It's not clear exactly how much she was to receive, but student leaders had approved spending \$20,000 for the panel.

The St. Louis Post-Dispatch reports that the university issued a statement Thursday night saying the advisory committee and Palin decided "the message that they intended on sharing would be overshadowed by controversy."

Repairing holes in drywall

Dear Pat: I just bought an older house, and it seems the previous owner used the walls for target practice. What is the best method to repair small and large holes in the drywall? — Judy K.

Dear Judy: Drywall is a wonderful material for finishing interior walls, but as you have found, it is not particularly resistant to abuse. Once it gets damaged and the surface is deformed, it does not take much to poke a hole all the way through it.

Luckily, most damaged drywall material is not difficult to repair. The key to a professional-looking job is to take your time and plan on taking several steps to get a smooth surface. If you rush and eliminate steps, the drywall compound or spackling compound will shrink as it dries thoroughly, and you may see a recessed area.

Plan on painting all the walls with flat wall paint when the repairs are completed. Flat wall paint hides many surface imperfections. If you are going to use semigloss paint for easier cleaning or where moisture is present, as in a kitchen or bathroom, the surface imperfections will be much more apparent.

Let's start with the small holes in the drywall first. If the edge of the hole is in pretty good condition (no cracks running out from it), you should be able to fill it with spackling compound. Force the spackling compound into the hole with a putty knife.

Give it plenty of time to dry (the packaging should list approximate drying times). DAP makes a good lightweight spackling compound that changes color to indicate when it is dry. Lightly sand the repair and then apply another coat of spackling or drywall compound. When this is dry, sand it again until it is smooth.

If the edges of the holes are not in good condition, use a peel-and-stick patch over the area. These patches have a metal mesh center for strength. Sand down the area that the patch will cover. Apply the patch over the damaged spot and finish it with drywall or spackling compound.

Repairing larger holes in the wall requires a few more steps. Using a

framing square, draw a rectangular outline around the area on the drywall to be repaired. Make sure to inspect around the hole for any less apparent, weak or damaged areas. Cut through the drywall along the outline with a drywall knife or jigsaw and remove the damaged piece.

Cut two or three furring strips to a length several inches longer than the width of the hole in the wall. Place the strips through the hole and screw them to the backside of

the drywall. These will support the patch that will be inserted.

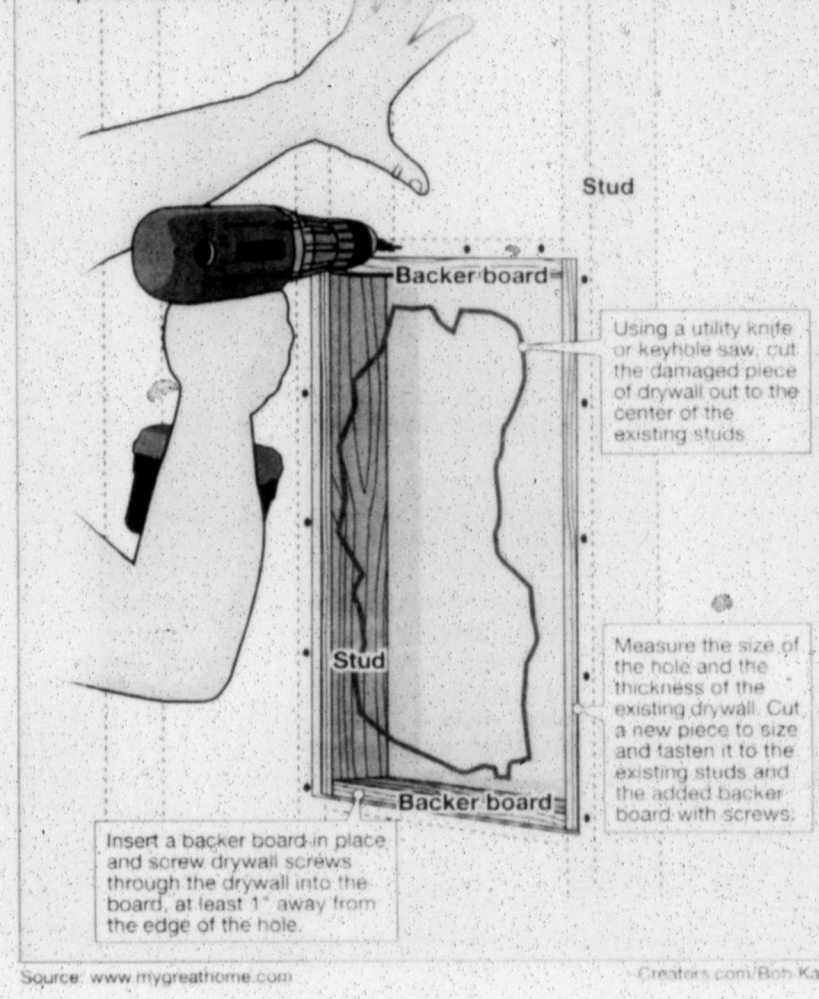
Use the damaged piece you removed as a template to cut a patch from new drywall. Place it in the hole against the furring strips and screw it to the strips with drywall screws. Always make sure the screw heads are recessed slightly so the drywall compound will cover them. Place adhesive-backed fiberglass drywall tape over the joints and finish it with several coats of drywall compound.

Nursing homes, advocates warn of mass closures

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - In the tiny town of Schertz, Darlene Evans is worriedly watching Medicaid cuts being considered by the Legislature.

It's not the impact that budget proposals would have on her own salary that concerns her most. Or even the 95 employees at her Autumn Winds Retirement Lodge that could be left unemployed. Rather, she's most scared for the 92 elderly residents that she says would be left homeless if current budget proposals to cut funding for Medicaid are signed into law.

"We've had our ups and downs in terms of funding," Evans said of the 15 years she and her husband have owned the nursing home, about 60 miles south of the Capitol. "This by far is the most scary for me in all the years I've been in this profession."

"I feel like I'm in a fight of my life, not only for our residents but for my staff as well."

Autumn Winds is one of hundreds of nursing homes in Texas that largely

depend on Medicaid for funding. As the Legislature grapples with a revenue shortfall of at least \$15 billion - \$27 billion by some estimates - one of the most agonizing cuts being proposed is slashed reimbursement rates for nursing homes, hospitals and physicians that offer Medicaid. Advocates say about 550 nursing homes in Texas, serving about 45,000 patients, depend on Medicaid.

"We are not crying wolf. Pieces of the sky are falling," said Tim Graves, president and CEO of the Texas Health Care Association. "There's no way the major nursing home stream in Texas can be cut by a third and not cause significant bankruptcies, closures, widespread displacement of patients and frontline health care workers will just be going to unemployment lines in local communities."

"The real concern for us is where do the patients go? Where do the residents go? These are the most frail, fragile Texans that the health care system takes

care of. That's our main concern. How is this going to work out?"

Early budget proposals have cut Medicaid reimbursement rates by 10 percent, in addition to a three percent rate reduction that state leaders requested in the current budget.

But Graves and other advocates say the true cut is closer to 33 percent because of changes in the federal-state share formula that resulted from the economic stimulus package. The state's funding share has increased, but budget proposals are not paying for that increase.

For Evans, each percent is the equivalent of about \$25,000.

"Do the math of a 33 percent cut. That's absolutely devastating," she said. "It's impossible to continue the operation of the business with that size of cut."

House and Senate budget

leaders have released their proposals for the 2012-13 state budgets, but the budget still has far to go before being finalized next summer.

A spokeswoman for House Speaker Joe Straus did not immediately respond to requests for comment Thursday. House budget writer Rep. Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie, has said finding ways to save in an already lean budget is a difficult but necessary process.

The nursing homes in Texas that depend on Medicaid as a major funding stream employ about 62,000 people.

House and Senate budget leaders have released their proposals for the 2012-13 state budgets, but the document still has far to go before being finalized next summer.



In 1980, six U.S. diplomats who had avoided being taken hostage at their embassy in Tehran flew out of Iran with the help of Canadian diplomats.

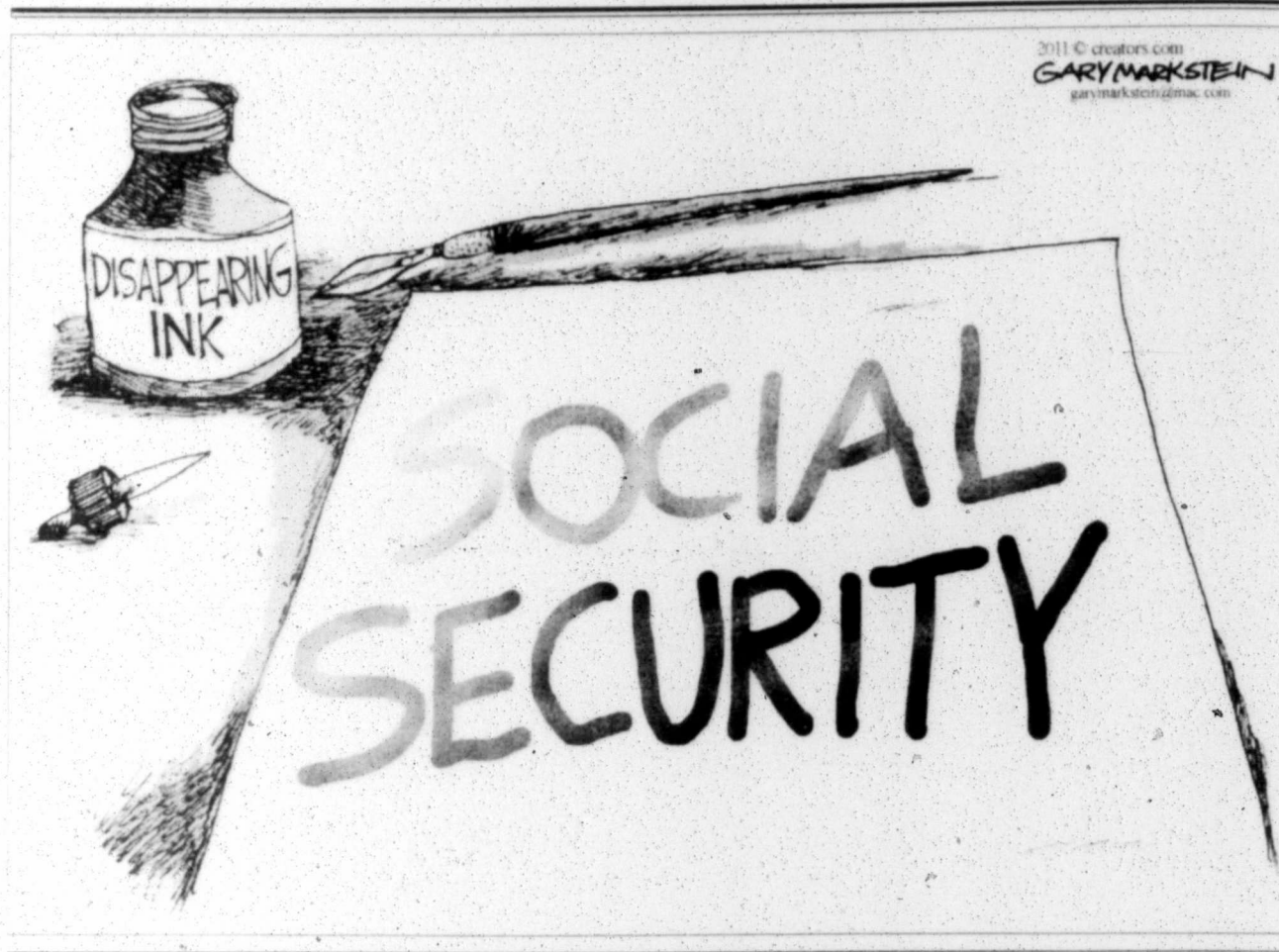

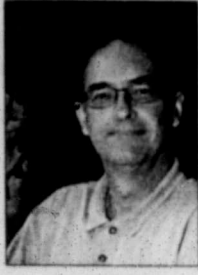

NASA marks 25th anniversary of Challenger with ceremony

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Hundreds gathered at NASA's launch site Friday to mark the 25th anniversary of the Challenger disaster, receiving words of hope from the widow of space shuttle's commander.

The chilly outdoor ceremony drew space agency managers, former astronauts, past and present launch directors, family and friends of the fallen crew and schoolchildren who weren't yet born when the space shuttle carrying a high school teacher from Concord, N.H., erupted in the sky.

The accident on Jan. 28, 1986 — just 53 seconds into flight — killed all seven on board, including schoolteacher Christa McAuliffe.

June Scobee Rodgers, the widow of Challenger's commander, Dick Scobee, urged the crowd to "boldly look to the future" not only in space travel, but in space and science education. She was instrumental in establishing the Challenger Center for Space Science Education.

"The entire world knew how the Challenger crew died," she said. "We wanted the world to know how they lived and for what they were risking their lives."

Rodgers and NASA's space operations chief, Bill Gerstenmaier, placed

a memorial wreath of red, white and blue-tinted carnations at the base of the Space Mirror Memorial.

The 42-foot-tall gleaming mirrored slab of granite bears the names of all 24 astronauts killed in the line of duty over the years — 17 of those in U.S. spacecraft.

Dennis and Pat Cassidy of Franklin, N.H., blinked back tears as Rodgers spoke.

Mrs. Cassidy recalled the joy she felt when McAuliffe was named as NASA's teacher in space — she screamed she was so excited. When Challenger was lost, she couldn't stop crying.

"Geez. You never expected it to happen. We never expect these kinds of things to happen, I guess," she said, clutching a red rose.

Her husband recalled after the initial shock, feeling so badly for McAuliffe's family, all present at the launch: her husband, two children and her parents. "All I could do was say a prayer for the family. And that's what they should do today, say a prayer for the families."

The crew included commander Scobee; co-pilot Michael Smith; Ellison Onizuka, the first Asian-American in space; Resnik; Ronald McNair, the second African-American in space; McAuliffe; and Gregory Jarvis.

DEAR ABBY: How do I cope with the ending of a very long friendship? I saw warning signs for a couple of years, and tried many times to talk to my best friend about what seemed to be happening. Her values and priorities are moving in other directions now. I no longer feel appreciated as her friend.

My heart is breaking. We have been friends for half our lives. This is more devastating than any divorce, death or hurricane I have ever experienced. She is how I have gotten through my life this far.

There are support groups out there for everything under the sun, except for losing a best friend due to indifference and lack of caring. Please advise me.

THROWN AWAY IN PASADENA, TEXAS

DEAR THROWN AWAY: I know you are hurting, and I am sorry. But friendships are not just made up of helping each other through the hard times; there is also a component of celebrating the good ones. While she may have been your leaning post, you need to examine what you were to her. If the load became too much to carry, it's understandable that she would need to back off.

While there are no support groups for people in your situation, there are counselors who can help you sort through your feelings -- and, because this experience has been devastating, you should talk with one.

DEAR ABBY: I'm a 16-year-old girl from a religious home. When I was 7, my father got very drunk and molested me. It had a terrible impact on me.

He has apologized for what happened and knows I hate him for it and can't forgive him. It hasn't happened since, and I know he's telling the truth. I feel the next step in my healing is to confide in my friends and ask them to pray for me. But if I do, I know they won't look at me the same. I'm afraid they'll get their parents to intervene and something will happen to Dad. That's the last thing I want. Should I tell?

NEEDS SUPPORT IN PHILLY

DEAR NEEDS SUPPORT: You appear to be an idealistic, intelligent young woman. But it's important you understand that apologizing for committing a crime against someone is not enough. The person must also be willing to accept the consequences of his actions. Drop by an elementary school and look at the 7-year-olds on the playground. That's how small and vulnerable you were when your father molested you.

Ask yourself: Did he quit drinking and get help for his alcohol problem? Did he talk to his minister and confess what he did? Did he seek professional help of any kind? Are there little girls in your extended family?

You are exhibiting two classic signs of an abuse

victim. One is thinking that people will regard you differently if you disclose that you were victimized. Another is the impulse to "protect" your abuser.

I'm all for the power of prayer, but rather than tell your girlfriends, is your mother aware of what happened? If she is unavailable to you, then you should talk to your minister or a trusted counselor at school. If you're afraid this will "betray" your father, call the Rape, Abuse and Incest National Network (RAINN) toll-free at (800) 656-4673. You can speak to one of the counselors there in complete confidence. They are experienced and can guide you about what -- or what not -- to do next.

The showcase was also fun for Rodriguez because she got to revisit with some former Lamar Bobcats who have grown into Pampa Harvesters.

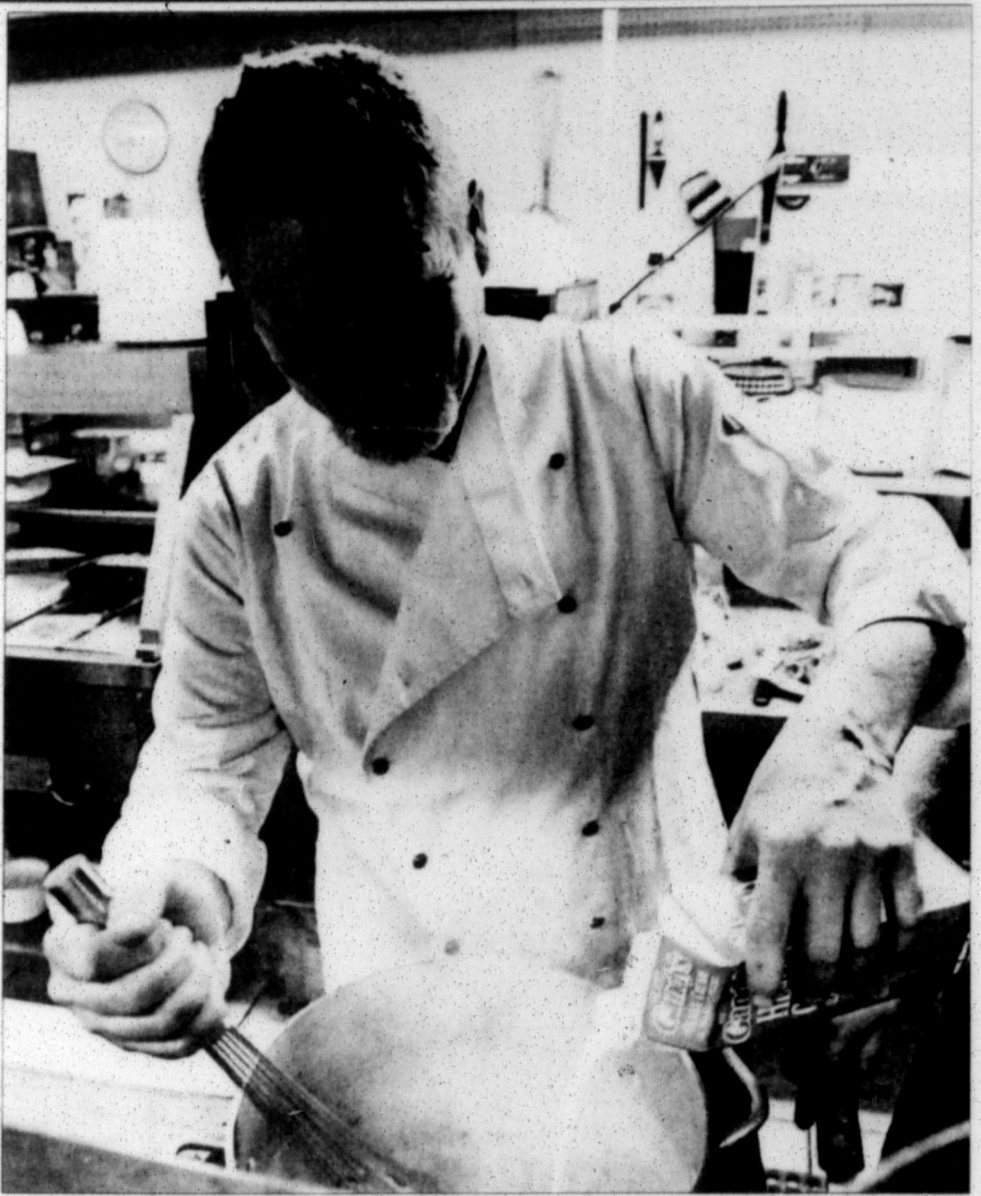

"My father was a chef," he said. "My mom was a chef."

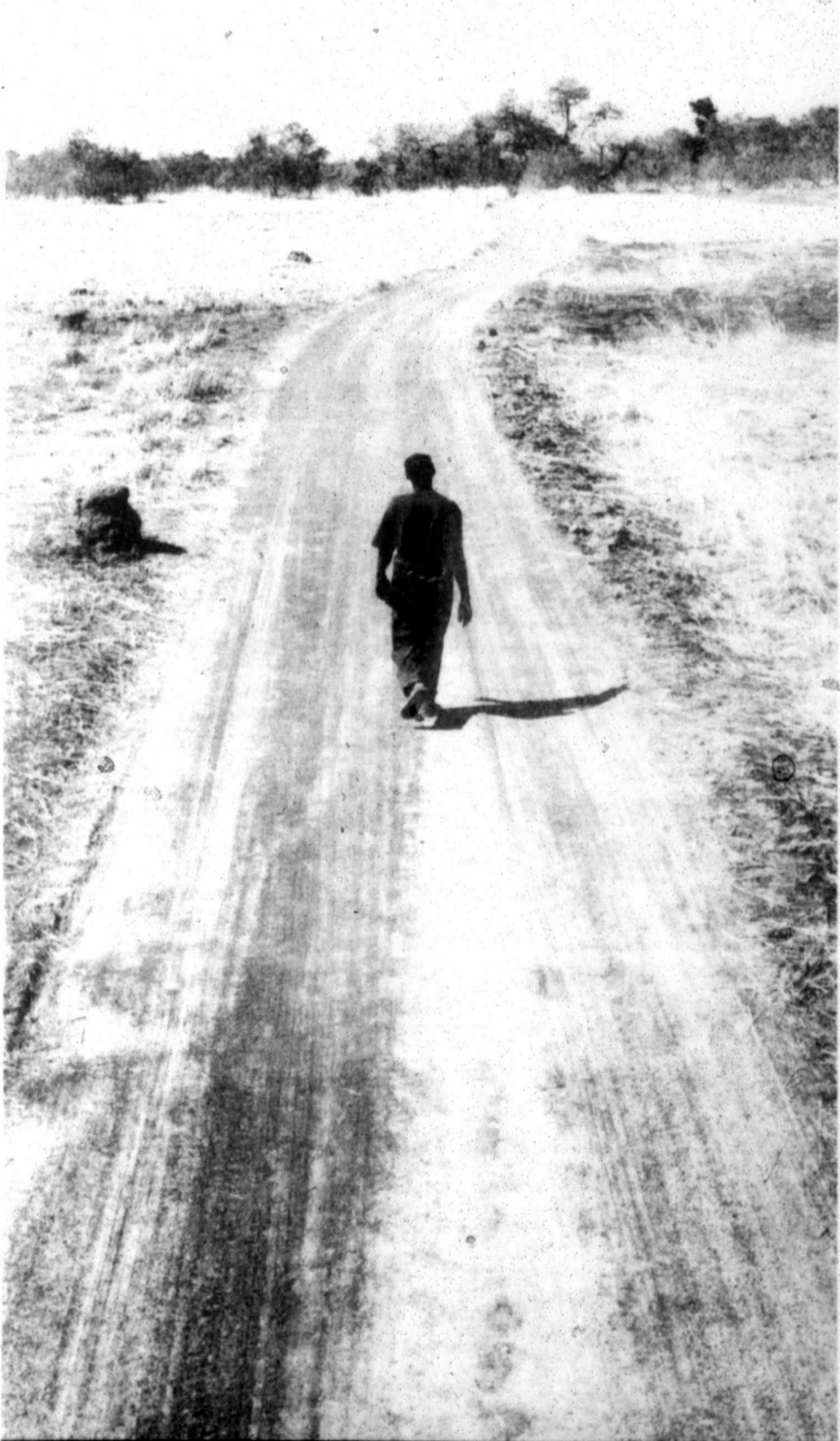
Dooley also cooked in the service.

The Montana native cooked while he was in the Coast Guard.

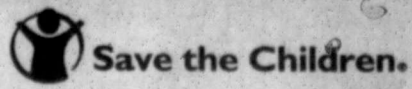

Harvesters must avoid slow starts for district success

The Pampa Harvesters boys basketball team got off to a good start in District 1-3A play, winning two out of three and hold a tie for first. In two of the games, though, the Harvesters started slow. One of them Pampa was fortunate and won; in the other, they were not so lucky. For the Harvesters to build on their start, they need to avoid starting halves slow.

In the district opener at Dalhart January 18, Pampa allowed Dalhart to score the first 11 points of the game and didn't score until 4:11 left in the first. Still the Harvesters recovered quickly and built a nine-point halftime lead. Pampa started the second half slow and allowed the Golden Wolves to regain the lead. Again Pampa recovered and won the game by 13.

Tuesday against Perryton, the Harvesters allowed the Rangers to score the first seven points of the game and

didn't get closer than three. Perryton built a 20-point lead before the Harvesters rallied to get within four.

One thing to remember is those games were on the road. Two out of the next three games for Pampa are at home. Though with that said, the Harvesters

still have to play at Borger twice and Dalhart once.

How does Pampa avoid this the rest of district? For starters, the Harvesters need to protect the ball. A big cause to the slow starts has been turnovers. This has allowed their opponents at times to get easy baskets. More importantly,

turnovers leave points off the board for Pampa. Every possession that results in a turnover leaves a potential one to four points off the scoreboard. When those points swing the other way, that's how you enter the huddle before the second quarter facing a double digit deficit.

The Harvesters can cut back on turnovers by taking what's there and make the simple play. In some of the games I've seen, we've tried to go for a quick score after a miss but overthrew the runner and the ball went out of bounds. Some players will try to make a fancy move to the basket but travel in the process. Fast break scores and highlight reel shots are great but only if they are executed properly. The simple jumper and the fundamental layup may not get you on the news, but it's better ending a possession with points.

The Harvesters just need to execute

the fundamentals of shooting and hope for a little luck. The more people the Harvesters have making shots, the better. It's no secret to Pampa's opponents that senior Garrett Ericson and junior Latigo Collins are the leading scorers, and defenses will try to at least shut down one of them. Against Dalhart, junior Cole Engle stepped up with 11 points and hit two threes that helped Pampa take over the game. Against Borger, Zach Murray stepped up with 10 points.

The Harvesters are in good position heading into the next three games and by next Friday could have a playoff spot clinched. If Pampa can execute all 32 minutes, it's going to be hard for opponents to stop them.

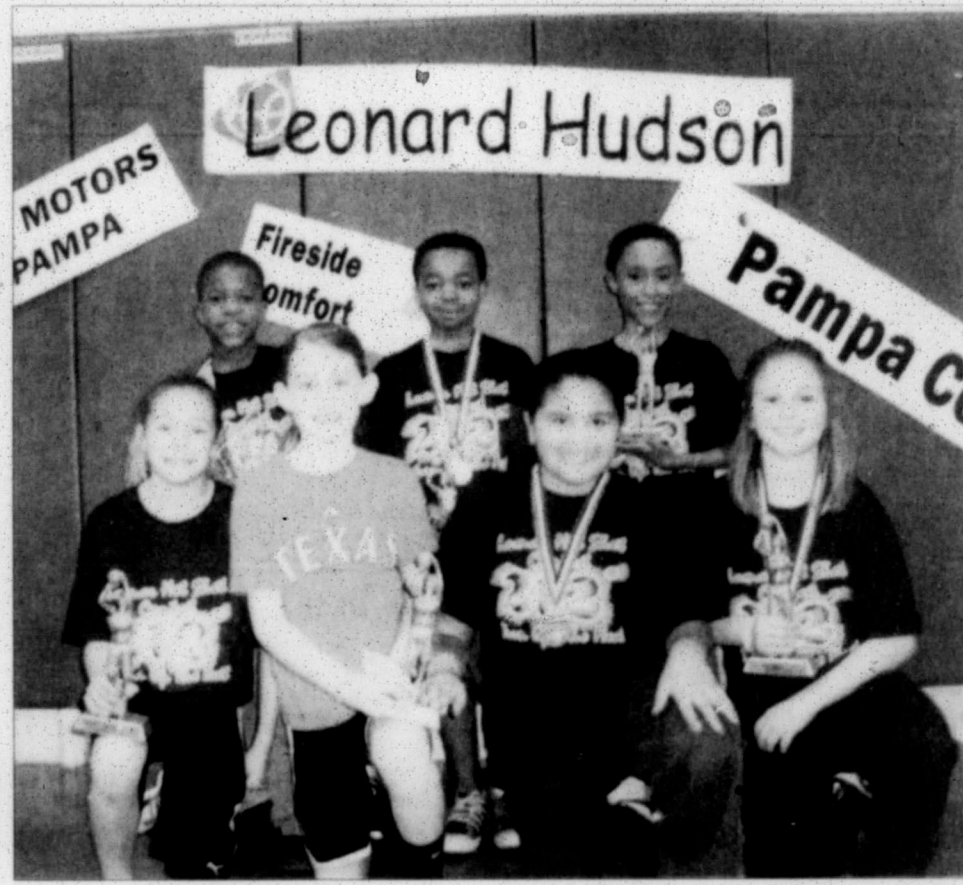

This year's Daytona events

Daytona International Speedway's NASCAR's most significant and historic track. It has hosted the sport's premier race, the Daytona 500, since it opened in 1959. The 2.5-mile track has been repaved recently.

Lee Petty won the first Daytona 500, edging Johnny Beauchamp in what would be a photo finish. Beauchamp was originally declared the winner until photographic evidence caused the outcome to be reversed. Jamie McMurray won the 2010 running of what has been labeled The Great American Race.

Richard Petty won a record seven Daytona 500s, and his total of 10 victories in points races at the track is an all-time record. He won perhaps the most famous 500 in 1979, when a final-lap crash involving Cale Yarborough and Donnie Allison resulted in Petty's victory. Petty didn't come out on top, however, in another classic. David Pearson won the 1976 Daytona 500 after being involved in a crash with Petty

or the final lap. Pearson managed to limp across the line first, with Petty's crumpled Dodge stopped only a few yards shy of the finish line.

Good Times Ahead At Petty

Allmendinger, Ambrose looking for big seasons in 2011

Petty Enterprises won 10 championships in what is now known as the NASCAR Sprint Cup Series, a total matched by the modern dynamo Hendrick Motorsports.

But all 10 of the Petty Enterprises titles came with men named Petty behind the wheel. Richard Petty won seven championships, while his father, Lee, won three. Richard Petty's last championship occurred in 1979.

The team currently known as Richard Petty Motorsports is descended from Petty Enterprises, but is no longer wholly owned by the family. The current team, recently reconfigured once again in terms of ownership, has roots in Petty Enterprises (268 Cup victories), Robert Yates Racing (57) and Gillett Evernham Motorsports (15).

Kasey Kahne won twice in 2009 while employed at the team, but he has moved on to Team Red Bull this year and is headed for Hendrick Motorsports in 2012. A year ago, Richard Petty Motorsports entered four Fords in each Cup race: Kahne, A.J. Allmendinger, Paul Menard and Elliott Sadler. Menard has since moved to

Richard Childress Racing, and Sadler is scheduled to compete in the Camping World Truck Series.

Allmendinger, who finished 19th in the 2010 Sprint Cup standings, is back, along with newcomer Marcos Ambrose, who was 25th. The team no longer associated with previous principal owner George Gillett, will field only two Fords this year.

Petty regained control of the team and managed to acquire new investors. The decline of Gillett's business empire created hardships, particularly during the latter half of the 2010 season.

Allmendinger hopes, and believes, that smaller will be better.

"This team has had a lot of good resources, but it was just spread too thin," he said. "Obviously we went through a rough time at the end of last year that we fought through, and hopefully we are better because of that. We are more funded now, and more money helps."

Ambrose, the Australian driver previously at JTG Daugherty Motorsports, said: "We need to win, no doubt about it. We expect to win... If we can win races and be consistent, then you never know what is possible."

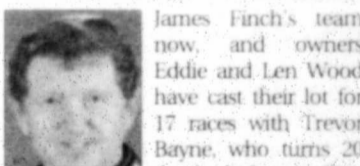
"This is not just another race track," he said. "This is our biggest race. This is what the backbone of our sport is on a week-to-week basis... There's no comparing it to any other race."

Clinging for now — Carl Edwards can't win the Nationwide Series championship, thanks to a new NASCAR rule requiring that drivers be eligible for a championship in only one of the three major series. Edwards insisted, though not with much apparent certainty, that he still intends to compete in every race.

"I am going to start with the No. 60 team, running every race," he said. "We are going to start that way, see how it goes, and we still

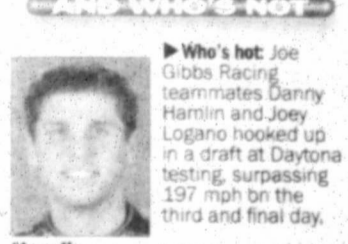

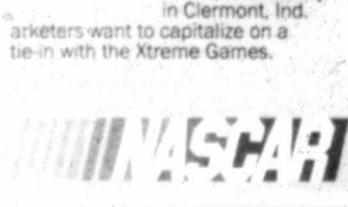

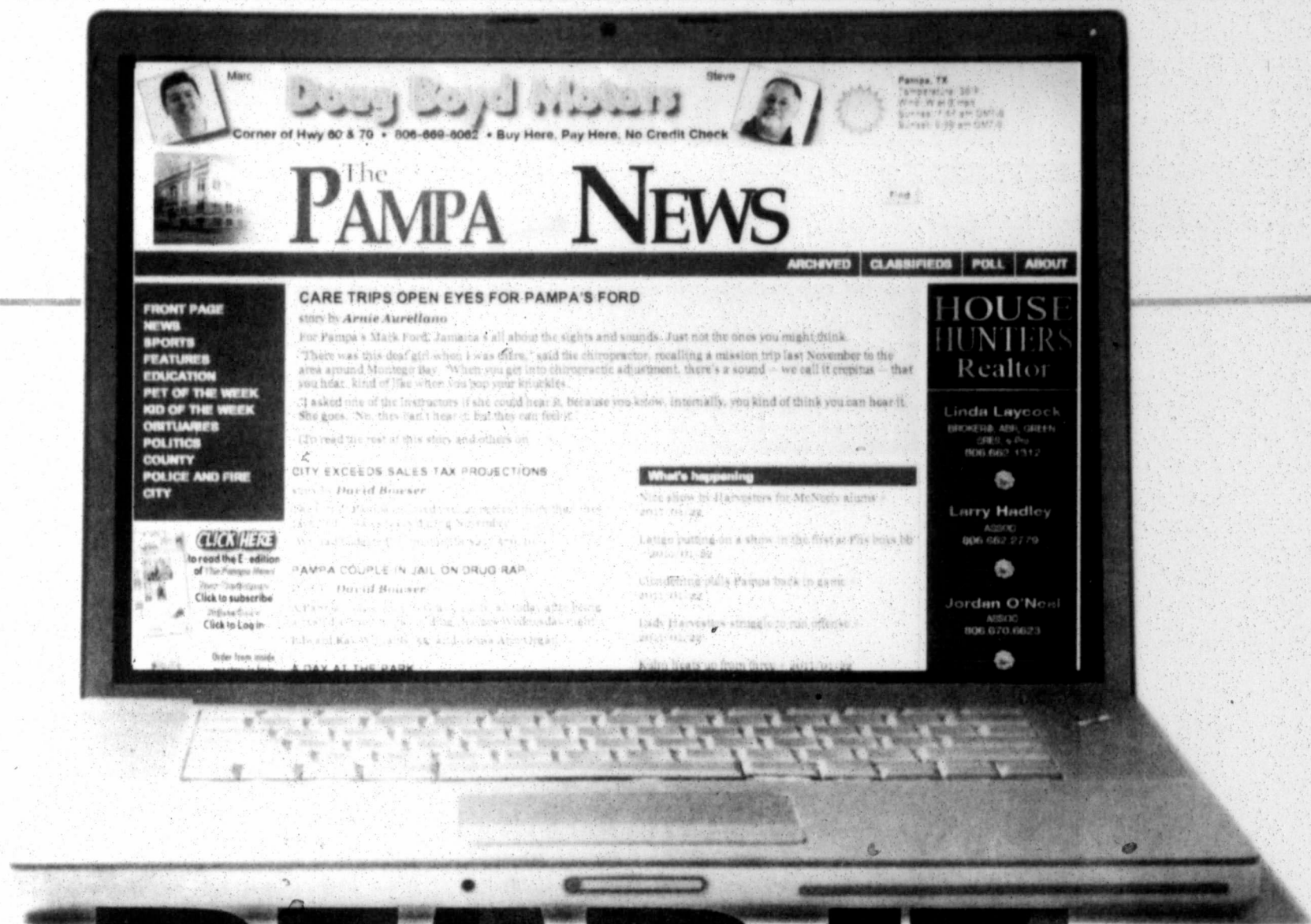
