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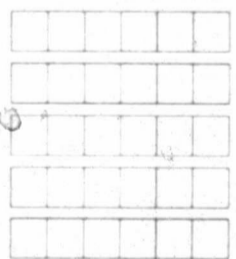

Cavalier

The principal put Cavalier on an emergency certificate for one year — a year, as it turned out, that ignited Cavalier's fire for the job she still holds today.

"At the end of that first year, he called me in to talk to me about the job," she said. "I really loved the job, and I've been there now for 20 years in that same position."

Cavalier, now 63, remains a teacher in the Redirect program at Pampa High School, specializing in one-on-one special education working with emotionally challenged kids. Her students have faced a gamut of personal tragedies, from family issues to behavioral disorders to drug problems, all of which have impacted their ability to enjoy a normal high school education.

The job is by no means an easy one ("If my salary would be determined off my success stories, I would qualify for food stamps," Cavalier quipped), but Cavalier said that she is driven by two things in her work: the children and the challenge.

"It's the challenge that the students bring with their behaviors," Cavalier said. "Trying to find strategies that work to help them be successful at the high school level. Every day is a new day. It's not like laying out your lesson plan and following through every day, because depending on

the mood that walked in the door, what had happened the night before, what had gone on in their homes through the night — you just never know what that day is going to be like."

The day-to-day victories she sees as her students work towards their long-term goals can be priceless, Cavalier said.

"The goal is to see them graduate from high school and then become productive. But sometimes, it's more just the little everyday things that you see along the way... I had a student, a senior, this last semester who had always maxed out his days of attendance. That's something we have worked on and talked about. This year, for the first time, he qualified to be exempt from his finals because all of his grades were above 80 and he had not missed more than twice. That was huge for him. Those are the kinds of things that make you proud."

The connection that she makes with her students on a personal level is as important as the one she makes from an educational standpoint, said Cavalier.

"Discipline is different for all of them, and motivation is different for all of them," she said. "That's where the personal connection comes in — finding out what makes them tick, finding ways to push them to reach the potential that you see and know they have

inside them."

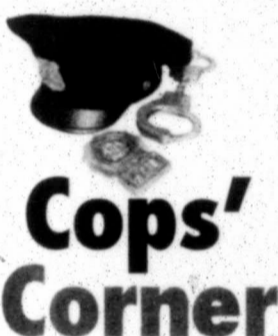
Cavalier said that, in forging such bonds with her students, she and her husband have shared much together in the way of interacting with kids.

"I know that he used to say how he learned things from me in dealing with kids," Cavalier said. "One of the things you have to learn immediately is that your emotions cannot be in control. A lot of times, when a kid mouths back, you have to look past that and ask, 'Where did that come from? What is he trying to accomplish with that?'"

"I've learned not to be shocked by anything. You have to try to let calm and reason reign rather than emotion. These kids operate with emotion and they're used to controlling their environment with emotion, and in order to correct that, I've had to learn that I can't let them affect me."

If there is anything that does affect Cavalier on the job, she said, it's that she looks upon her students almost as her own children, which motivates her daily to do her best to help them find their way.

"I've always called my students my kids," she said. "I look on them that way. I care about them so much, and I see the potential that they have. You connect on that personal level, and it makes you want to see them succeed that much more."

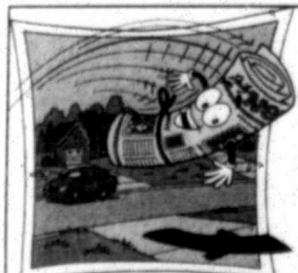

Clemency petition rejected

HOUSTON (AP) — The Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles has unanimously rejected a clemency petition from a convicted killer set to die next week for the shooting death of his 19-month-old son.

More than 90 clergy members from around the state had signed a letter to Gov. Rick Perry and the parole board, appealing for clemency for Timothy Wayne Adams.

The seven-member board Friday voted 7-0 twice first against a 120-day reprieve and then against a recommendation to commute the 42-year-old Adams' sentence to life.

Adams is set to die Tuesday evening in Huntsville for the slaying of his son, Timothy Adams Jr., at the family's southwest Houston apartment in 2002. Evidence showed the shooting was in retaliation for Adams' wife leaving him. His lawyer planned a late court appeal.

Houston PD announces panels

HOUSTON (AP) — City officials announced Friday that two new independent panels will be reviewing Houston's police department, which has come under fierce criticism after a video surfaced this month that appears to show officers kicking and stomping a black teenage burglary suspect.

Mayor Annise Parker said the new oversight panels are part of an effort to restore the public's trust in police, and will review policies and procedures at the department.

"If a culture exists within (the Houston Police Department) that continue the behavior that was displayed on the video, we will root it out and we will put in place best practices that will prevent it from reoccurring," Parker said.

The surveillance video appears to show several officers kicking, punching and stomping on 15-year-old Chad Holley during his arrest last year at a self-storage business in southwest Houston. Four officers have since been fired and Holley's family has sued the city, and although a judge barred the video's release, a community activist showed footage to media outlets this month.

Wildfire warning issued

COLLEGE STATION (AP) — The Texas Forest Service is staging aircraft and other emergency resources over the potential for weekend wildfires in north and west parts of the state.

The agency on Friday reported it's responded, in the past week, to 47 fires that covered more than 30,000 acres. Sunday is forecast to be a potentially critical day for wildfires, as is Wednesday.

The National Weather Service and the agency are warning that wind speeds could pick up and relative humidity levels could drop.

Meteorologist Greg Murdoch says the Texas Panhandle and the area west of a line from Wichita Falls to Abilene to Del Rio are of particular concern.

House votes to block EPA

The Republican-controlled House has voted to block the Environmental Protection Agency from regulating greenhouse gases that scientists say cause global warming.

The 249-177 vote added the regulation ban to a sweeping spending bill that would fund the government through Sept. 30. The restriction is opposed by the Obama administration, which is using its regulatory powers to curb greenhouse gases after global warming legislation collapsed last year. The administration also says the ban would cost thousands of construction jobs.

EPA has already taken steps to regulate global warming pollution from vehicles and the largest factories and industrial plants. It is expected to soon roll out rules that target refineries and power plants.

Texas Republican Ted Poe pressed the anti-EPA measure. His Texas district is home to many oil refineries.

Memphis Mafia member passes

DALLAS (AP) — Lamar Fike, a member of Elvis Presley's famed group of friends and employees called the "Memphis Mafia," has died. He was 75.

His son, James Fike, says that his father, who was suffering from non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, died Jan. 21 at a hospital in Arlington.

James Fike says his father held various roles with Presley, including as a lighting director, bodyguard and managing Presley's music publishing group.

Fike was among five members of the group dubbed the "Memphis Mafia" who incorporated the name in the early 1990s.

Lamar Fike was born in Cleveland, Miss., moved to Texas in 2006.

A memorial service for Fike, who was born in Cleveland, Miss., is set for Feb. 26 in Mart, a town about 25 miles east of Waco.

US Airlines finally add jobs

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government says employment rose in December at U.S. passenger airlines for the first time in more than two years, led by gains at low-cost carriers.

However, the overall increase was tiny - just 0.2 percent, compared with December 2009. And several of the biggest airlines continued to cut jobs.

The U.S. Transportation Department said Friday that airlines employed the equivalent of 379,651 full-time workers in December - part-timers count half. That was 698 more jobs than in December 2009.

The increase followed a break-even month in November and 28 straight months of decline when compared with year-earlier numbers.

Most major U.S. airlines made money in 2010 after losing billions in the previous two years. Some, such as Southwest Airlines, are adding back flights after cutting them during the airline industry slump, and the extra flying means more jobs.

American Airlines said Friday it would recall 200 furloughed flight attendants on top of 368 recalls announced last week, with many of the jobs related to a pickup in international flying. Southwest Airlines posted openings for flight attendants this week for the first time in more than two years, and the crush of applicants overloaded part of the company's website.

"He went in before Pearl Harbor," Jack Seals said. "We were recovering from the Depression then."

When war broke out, Dee Seals was sent to the Pacific.

Assigned to the Second Battalion, Company D, 25th Regiment of the 4th Marine Division, Dee Seals was in the invasion force that landed in February, 1944, on the Kwajalein Atoll of the Marshall Islands.

It was the first time that a Marine division went directly into combat from the states, said Jack Seals, sitting in his home on Wells Street more than half a century later.

In June, 1944, Dee Seals and the 4th Marines landed on Saipan in the Marianas Islands. Less than 1,500 miles from Tokyo, Saipan was a staging ground for bombers in their raids on the Japanese homeland.

More than a quarter of Dee Seals' division were killed, wounded or reported missing.

Two weeks later, the 4th Marine Division would land at the beachhead on Tinian Island. It was from Tinian that a B-29 would leave carrying the first atomic bomb to be used in combat. Two nuclear bombing missions were flown from the Tinian airfield in August, 1945, that would bring World War II to a close and usher in the Atomic Age.

Sgt. Dee Seals was wounded on Tinian and was awarded a Purple Heart. He was also awarded the Silver Star.

According to the citation for the Silver Star, four Marines were seriously wounded on the front lines of the battle and their evacuation was impossible because of heavy enemy fire.

Guiding them on foot, Sgt. Seals led two medium tanks to the wounded men. Wounded by bursting shellfire and because of his daring initiative, dauntless perseverance and self-sacrifice for others, he was awarded the Silver Star, the nation's second-highest award.

Jack Seals had his brother's medals framed, including the Silver Star. Dee Seals was awarded on Tinian.

The 4th Marine Division was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation for Saipan and Tinian.

It was Feb. 19, 1945, that Seals waded ashore on Iwo Jima, a volcanic island only 758 miles south of Japan.

The tiny triangular-shaped island was 4.5 miles long and at its broadest point only 2.5 miles wide. It covered only about eight square miles.

Iwo Jima began.

It was during this action that Dee Seals was killed by shrapnel from a mortar, but for years that is all that Jack Seals knew about his brother's death.

But several years ago while looking through a book on the Fifth Marine Division, Jack Seals found a picture of an unidentified wounded Marine on Iwo Jima, holding up a piece of shrapnel. It was his brother.

"He was in the Fourth Marine Division," Jack Seals said of his brother Dee.

Jack Seals had followed his brother into the Marine Corps and was a member of a Marine aircrew when word came of Dee Seals' death.

Jack Seals was going through training in California.

"We'd been dropping bombs and practicing out in the Mojave Desert with our torpedo bombers," Jack Seals said.

He said he was sitting at his base playing pinochle with friends when the sergeant told him to go get the mail.

"I went over and got the mail and started to walk out the door," Seals said, "and this woman Marine that was running the post office said, 'Wait a minute. I've got a dispatch for someone over there in your squadron.'"

She said it was for C.J. Seals.

"I liked to have fallen through the floor," Seals said.

It was the only day he'd gone after the mail.

"That was a bad day," he said.

With tears in his eyes, Jack Seals recalled the return of his brother's body to Pampa after the war.

Initially, Dee Seals had been interred on Iwo Jima, but his family brought him back to be buried in Fairview Cemetery.

"When they brought his body back, they brought it back to Pampa on the train," Jack Seals said.

He said he still remembers the flag-draped coffin arriving at the depot and the sound of the metal wheels of railway carriage on the bricks.

"To this day," Jack Seals said, "I can hear that."

He said it was devastating.

Last fall, Jack Seals went to Washington, D.C., and visited Arlington National Cemetery across the Potomac River from the nation's Capitol.

A statue modeled after

AP photographer Joe Rosenthal's picture of the Marines raising the flag on Mount Suribachi at the southern end of Iwo Jima guards the entrance to the cemetery.

"I got to lay the memorial wreath at the Iwo Jima Monument," Seals said.

To Jack Seals, the monument had special meaning.

"He was a good one," Jack Seals said of his big brother.

Joseph Vizcaino, was headed east on Randy Matson and stopped at the stop sign at the Duncan intersection. The car turned left and collided with the motorcycle driven by Austin Starbuck, which was traveling on Duncan in the southbound lane. No other passengers were involved.

The accident scene attracted a crowd of concerned onlookers, who watched as Vizcaino and Starbuck were removed from the vehicles and tended to by medical personnel.

Vizcaino was transported by Pampa EMS to PRMC for medical attention and later released. Starbuck was transported by EMS to Lifestar, who then moved him to Amarillo. His condition is unknown as of press time.

Vizcaino was issued a citation for failing to yield the right of way.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Feb. 19, 1945, during World War II, some 30,000 U.S. Marines began landing on Iwo Jima, where they commenced a successful month-long battle to seize control of the island from Japanese forces.

On this date:

In 1473, astronomer Nicolaus Copernicus was born in Torun, Poland.

In 1803, Congress voted to accept Ohio's borders and constitution.

In 1846, the Texas state government was formally installed in Austin, with J. Pinckney Henderson taking the oath of office as governor.

In 1881, Kansas prohibited the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages.

In 1911, actress Merle Oberon was born in Bombay, India.

In 1942, President Franklin D. Roosevelt authorized the military to relocate and intern U.S. residents, including native-born Americans, of Japanese ancestry. Japanese warplanes raided the Australian city of Darwin; at least 243 people were killed.

In 1959, an agreement was signed by Britain, Turkey and Greece granting Cyprus its independence.

In 1983, 13 people were found shot to death at a gambling club in Seattle's Chinatown in what became known as the "Wah-Mee Massacre." Two Chinese immigrants were convicted of the killings and sentenced to life in prison.

In 1997, Deng Xiaoping, the last of China's major Communist revolutionaries, died at age 92.

In 2008, an ailing Fidel Castro resigned the Cuban presidency after nearly a half-century in power; his brother Raul was later named to succeed him.

Gender should not count in risk-taking

Yes, Lara Logan was sexually assaulted and badly beaten. Yes, that is a terrible thing. She is, however, reported to be in "remarkably good spirits." Indeed, she is alive, not beheaded, not held hostage, not any number of terrible things. Being raped is bad, but it isn't the worst thing. Not getting out alive is the worst thing.

In the 30 years since I first dared raise the issue as a young Senate staffer, I cannot begin to count the number of times that people have tried to explain to me that women cannot be on the front lines because this country could not tolerate the prospect of our women being sexually assaulted by the other side.

"You gotta be kidding." I was told by some otherwise very liberal people.

Look at the polls. The selective service legislation doesn't even require women to register. The man who sued to try to get it overturned on that basis lost; discrimination justified. No Lara Logans.

But I never got it. I know how bad rape is. But what I don't know is why the possibility, and sometimes

the reality, that a woman could be raped, should count for more than the fact that she is willing, able and oftentimes eager to face danger.

"I don't know why getting killed isn't the real thing everybody has to face. And I then wonder whether it is something more than women being vulnerable to rape that creates a double standard in law and in fact."

Being CBS' chief foreign correspondent, in this world, is a dangerous job. Logan has two small children. When I had two small children, I was nervous about flying. Heck, I was nervous about going any farther than the San Fernando Valley.

I'm not sure how many other young mothers would want Logan's career: for all its glory, or would want to be on the front lines of combat, or would want to conquer space or mountains.

But more power to those who do. The last thing anyone should do is judge their choices in light of the ones we make.

Everybody is trying to be careful given that

much less joking about sexual assault can get you in trouble. (I think people should get in trouble for committing sexual assault, not for talking about it. Sadly, the opposite is more often the case.)

Even so, does anyone doubt that gender counts when it comes to how we view risk taking and risk takers?

Imagine if the genders were reversed, and she was the astronaut (and mother of two) and he was the handsome congressman lying in a rehab hospital trying to learn to talk and move after being gunned down.

Would America applaud her decision to return to her training in preparation for space flight in April? You think Cairo is dangerous. Space is really dangerous. I'm not saying he's wrong — only that women should be respected when they make that

same choice.

I don't know whether or not Logan will go back to war zones. That's a very personal choice that doesn't just involve one person, not at this point. She's still a hero for doing it in the first place, and she's an example to others, not only of a woman's strength, but also of her survival.

The fact that Logan is doing so "remarkably" well should not be taken to mean that you recover from rape in two days. (You don't. You just, if you're lucky, go home from the hospital.)

But it might help those who still are held back by the horrible prospect that our young women might be raped if allowed to fight wars or cover them.

Hopefully, they'll realize that, as awful as that risk is, young women are facing it and worse every day — and not just in Cairo. We should salute their courage in doing so.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Feb. 20, 1962, astronaut John Glenn became the first American to orbit the Earth as he flew aboard the Mercury spacecraft Friendship 7.

On this date:

In 1790, Holy Roman Emperor Joseph II died.

In 1792, President George Washington signed an act creating the U.S. Post Office.

In 1809, the Supreme Court ruled that no state legislature could annul the judgments or determine the jurisdictions of federal courts.

In 1811, Austria declared state bankruptcy.

In 1839, Congress prohibited dueling in the District of Columbia.

In 1938, Anthony Eden resigned as British foreign secretary following Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain's decision to negotiate with Italian dictator Benito Mussolini.

In 1944, during World War II, U.S. bombers began raiding German aircraft manufacturing centers in a series of attacks that became known as "Big Week."

In 1950, the U.S. Supreme Court, in United States v. Rabinowitz, ruled 5-3 that authorities making a lawful arrest did not need a warrant to search and seize evidence in an area that was in the "immediate and complete control" of the suspect.

In 1971, the National Emergency Warning Center in Colorado erroneously ordered U.S. radio and TV stations off the air; some stations heeded the alert, which was not lifted for about 40 minutes.

In 2003, fire broke out during a rock concert at The Station nightclub in West Warwick, R.I., killing 100 people and injuring about 200 others.

Ten years ago: Space shuttle Atlantis landed in the Mojave Desert after three straight days of bad weather prevented the ship from returning to its Florida home port. Britain's foot-and-mouth livestock crisis began with confirmation of the first case.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush, visiting Milwaukee, outlined his energy proposals to help wean the country off foreign oil. Right-wing British historian David Irving was sentenced to three years in prison after admitting to an Austrian court that he'd denied the Holocaust. (He was released in Dec. 2006.) At the Turin Olympics, Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto

snapped the U.S. men's drought in figure skating with a silver in ice skating; Russians Tatiana Navka and Roman Kostomarov won the gold. Archbishop Paul C. Marcinkus, a former Vatican bank chief linked to a huge Italian banking scandal in the 1980s, was found dead in his home in Sun City, Ariz.; he was 84. Sportscaster Curt Gowdy died in Palm Beach, Fla., at age 86.

One year ago: Alexander Haig, a soldier and statesman who'd held high posts in three Republican administrations and some of the U.S. military's top jobs, died in Baltimore at 85. Floods and mudslides on the Portuguese island of Madeira claimed more than 40 lives.

'Tis the season to start gathering your tax information

Tax season is right around the corner, which can be good news or bad news depending on the individual. For those accustomed to getting a tax return, that annual financial windfall is welcomed with open arms. On the other hand, those used to a tax bill every April are far less enthusiastic when tax time rolls around.

With tax season on the horizon once again, it's time to start preparing to file a return. The following guide can help individuals get their tax materials in order, whether they're filing themselves, or enlisting the help of a tax professional.

Personal Items

To file a tax return, individuals will need their own social security number, as well as that of anyone else

they might be helping or listing on their own return. This includes a spouse and any dependents. If preparing someone else's tax return, be sure to inform them this information will be needed to avoid any unnecessary delays.

For those men and women who will be enlisting a professional to prepare their return, bring all of this information to the meeting. Tax season is especially busy for accountants and tax prep professionals, so it might be difficult to secure another appointment should you forget to bring all of the necessary information.

Income Documents

It's easy to get confused when attempting to file a tax return. For men and women who visit the local library for their filing information, that table full of documents can be intimidating. What's more, the Internal Revenue Service Web site can be difficult to navigate for those who have not visited it in the past.

No document is more necessary than a W-2, which employers must provide by the end of January. Men and women will get one from each of their employers, so those who work multiple jobs, even part-time jobs, will need a W-2 for each job they've worked in the past 12 months. Additional documents that can be necessary might pertain to investment income, business or farming income, alimony received, and forms for state and local income tax refunds.

A good rule of thumb to avoid getting lost in the documents is to start as early as possible the more extensive or complicated the employment and income history may be. For example, men and women with one job and no outside income should be able to file quickly and easily. The more extensive a person's investment portfolio or the more jobs a person has, the more difficult it will likely be to file the return. So start early if things are complicated.

Credits

The government gives men and women all sorts of credits that reduce the amount of the income taxed. These include homebuyer credits, IRA contributions, green energy credits, or student loan interest.

- Homebuyer credits: A properly executed settlement statement must be attached to a return, and men and women should keep in mind the IRS now has greater authority to deny homebuyer credits.

- IRA contributions: A year-end account summary or bank statement is often all that's needed.

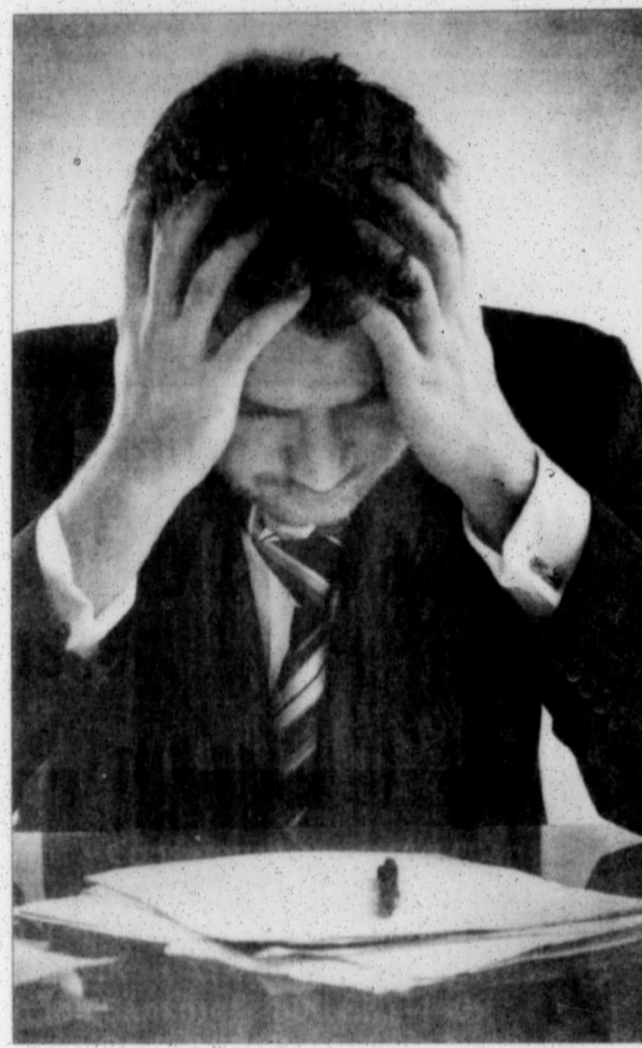

Avoid the stress of tax time by preparing documents well in advance of April 15.

- Green energy credits: Among the items potentially eligible for residential energy credits are insulation, energy efficient exterior windows, energy efficient HVAC appliances, and solar hot water heaters. Of course, receipts will be necessary for those attempting to earn a credit for any of these items.

- Student loan interest: A year-end loan statement should be received sometime in January.

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Save on taxes with donations to charity

We've all heard the saying about nothing being certain but death and taxes. As the calendar year comes to a close, many people might be thinking about how to reduce their taxable income from 2010. Charitable giving is one way to pay less in taxes.

In many cases, tax-deductible charitable giving can save a person money in the long run. The added bonus is that it can feel good to give as well. Making charitable donations can save a person thousands in tax dollars, provided the correct steps are taken.

- Ensure the charity is a tax-exempt organization eligible to receive tax-deductible donations.

- Be sure to keep all receipts for charitable giving throughout the year. Generally donations less than \$250 can be recorded with a cancelled check. Other donations will need a written acknowledgment from the charity.

- Itemize donations when filing tax returns. If non-cash donations were given (such as clothing or automobiles) be sure to complete the applicable tax form.

- Figure out the fair market value of items being donated that aren't cash. This will help determine the value of the charitable deduction when it's time to file a tax return.

- Address any questions concerning charitable donations to a knowledgeable tax preparer or accountant.

Getting a good start on financing your child's future

Saving enough money for a child's college education is a concern so great many parents began planning even before their first child was born. The escalating costs of a college education make such concerns wholly understandable.

According to the College Board, a nonprofit aiming to connect students to college success and opportunity, a year of tuition and room and board at a private four-year college in 2010 increased by nearly five percent to \$26,273. Public institutions, where room and board and tuition cost nearly \$7,000 in 2010, increased by nearly six percent.

Those numbers figure to increase dramatically for children born in 2010. While it's impossible to predict exactly what a college education will cost for a child entering school in 2028, the College Board's 2008 "Trends in College Pricing" report estimated the cost of tuition and room and board at a private four year university to be roughly \$85,000 in 2028, a cost that escalates to nearly \$100,000 by the time the student reaches his or her senior year.

Such statistics can be scary, particularly in the current economic climate in which many families find themselves struggling to get by. However, there are ways to save for college that can make the aforementioned figures and predictions far less daunting.

• **Start now.** As previously mentioned, many expecting parents started saving for college even before their first child was born. Such savings don't need to be too complex. For instance, assuming an

eight percent annual return, parents who simply put \$100 month into a savings account for 18 years will earn \$48,000 by the time those 18 years are up.

• **Consider stocks when building a college savings portfolio.** It might seem as though the cost of college is rising faster than inflation. This is actually true. As a result, portfolios that rely on stocks can be an investor's ideal way to build the most savings long term. As a child's first day of college draws closer, shelter any returns with less risky propositions such as bonds.

• **Seek professional assistance.** Television advertisements have increasingly noted the ease with which investors can handle their own portfolios. While portfolios might be more accessible than they once were, for many people the investment game is still as confusing as ever. A mutual fund is managed by a professional in accordance with the fund's investment objective. This allows investors to choose a fund that matches their own goals and objectives while affording them the freedom from watching the markets daily and worrying with each and every dip in the market.

• **Open a 529 savings plan.** A 529 plan is designed to encourage saving for the future higher education expenses of a designated beneficiary. Certain qualified withdrawals are now free of federal tax, and many plans allow account holders to save in excess of \$200,000 per beneficiary. No income or age restrictions apply, so a 529 can start regardless of how much parents earn or how old

their beneficiary is.

• **Don't forget to save for retirement.** As daunting as the cost of a college education 18 years from now might seem, tomorrow's college students will have

far more resources for paying for that education than retirees will have for getting by in their golden years. When saving for the future, parents must remember to save for their own future as well.

A few easy ways to save money

Tax season can often leave people feeling frazzled and disappointed. If you're like most Americans, you probably swore you were going to manage your money better this year...then soon let this promise fall by the wayside.

"If the recession has taught us anything, it's that there's no time to lose in making changes towards financial health. But the trick is to actually follow through and make the hard choices," says Michael McAuliffe, president of Family Credit Management Services, a non-profit consumer credit counseling service providing solutions for those seeking financial assistance.

"You must get to know yourself, your personal weaknesses, and then make the changes needed to protect yourself from, well, you," says McAuliffe.

Here are five easy ways to help you gain better control of your finances:

• **Set goals.** Where do you want to be financially in one, three or five years? Do you want your credit cards paid off? A fat savings account? Or how about a vacation paid with cash, not credit cards? You probably can have any of these things but you must make them a priority.

• **Look at the big picture.** A \$5 latte may not seem much, but it adds up to more than \$1800 a year or more than \$9000 in five years. So ask yourself if that \$5 latte is steering you away from your goals. How many

other unnecessary expenses are keeping you from reaching your financial destination?


• **Spend rationally.** As long as you aren't spending more than you make, you can spend your money on whatever you'd like. The key is to not make impulse or emotional purchases. Put a picture of your goal in your wallet so you are reminded of it each time you are tempted to spend. Another trick is to keep your credit cards in sleeves that remind you to "Stop, Think, Save" before using them. You can get such sleeves for free from the non-profit site, www.stopthinksave.org

• **Evaluate debt.** It's hard to move forward financially when you are still paying off Christmas presents from three years ago. Create a plan to get out of debt as soon as possible. This may include reviewing your interest rates, increasing payments, or consulting an objective credit counselor. Debt-free living is a reality, but it takes hard work.


• **Save.** Don't allow a medical emergency, broken furnace, or car repair to create a financial disaster. Create an emergency fund and add to it each pay period. Direct deposit is also a great way to save. Ask your employer to automatically deposit a small portion of your pay into a savings account so you are not tempted to spend it.

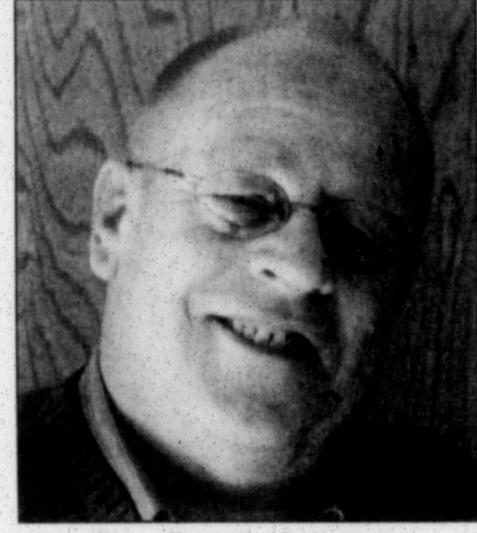

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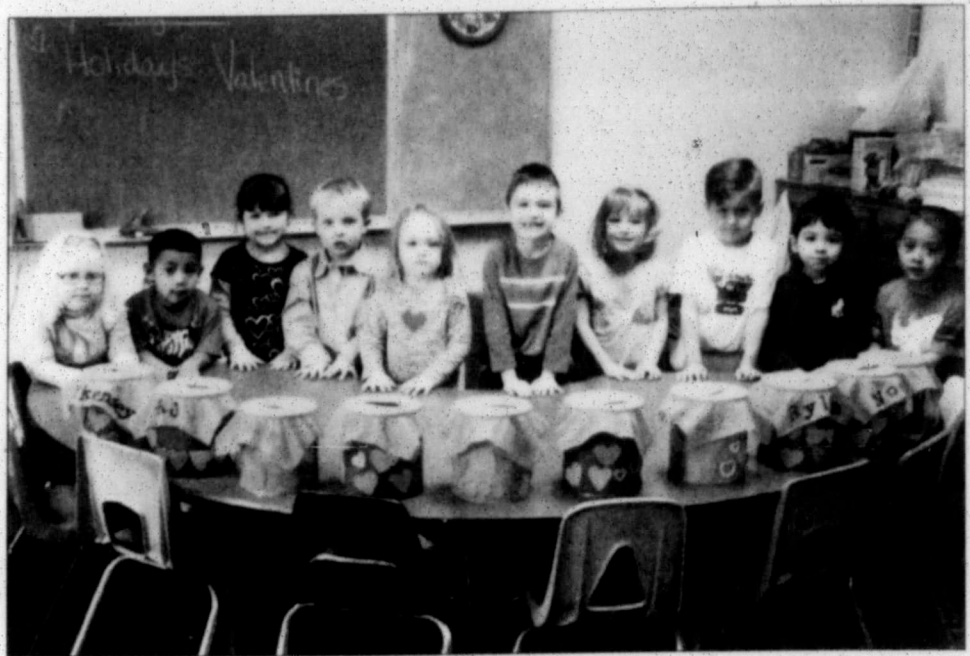

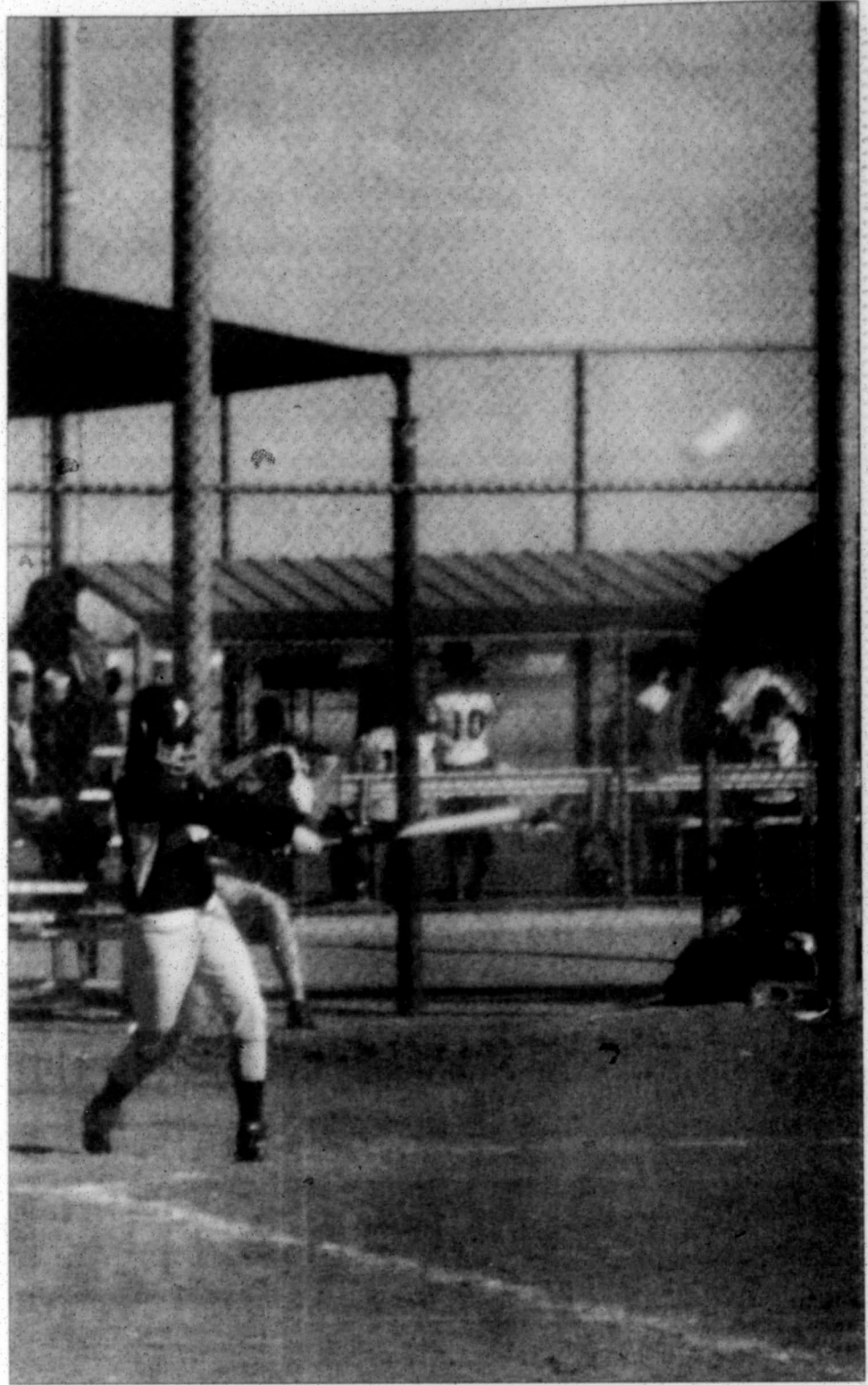
Gill said despite not having many outdoor practices the defense played well.

NFL LABOR TALKS

NFL, union hold first talks with mediator

WASHINGTON (AP) — NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell and union head DeMaurice Smith met in front of a federal mediator for about six hours Friday, a bid to jumpstart contentious and slow-moving labor negotiations two weeks before owners could lock out players and threaten the 2011 season.

Friday's session was the sides' first with George Cohen, the director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, a U.S. government agency.

More than two hours after Goodell and Smith arrived separately, the league and the NFL Players Association released a joint statement saying the mediation had started and that both parties agreed to adhere to Cohen's request that they not speak publicly about the process.

True to their word, Smith and other union representatives, including Pittsburgh Steelers quarterback Charlie Batch, former player

Pete Kendall and NFLPA lawyer Richard Berthelsen — declined to answer questions on their way out of the meeting.

"There's not going to be any comment," Smith said as he walked out at 6:15 p.m., more than seven hours after he arrived.

Goodell and other members of the NFL's bargaining team — including the league's lead labor negotiator, Jeff Pash, and NFL outside counsel Bob Batterman — avoided media members in front of the building entirely. They left via another exit, an FMCS spokesman said.

It wasn't immediately clear when the sides would resume talks, although originally there were plans for several days of negotiations with Cohen present.

Pash did speak briefly when he and other NFL executives showed up Friday morning.

"We're going to participate fully, and we look forward to working with

Mr. Cohen," he told The Associated Press.

Asked what progress he expected to come from mediation, Pash replied: "We don't know."

Cohen announced Thursday that both sides had agreed to have him participate in talks. Mediation is not binding.

The current collective bargaining agreement expires at the end of the day March 3, and the union has said it expects a lockout to come as soon as the next day.

News of the start of mediation could be a positive sign after several months of infrequent negotiations.

The league and union went more than two months without holding any formal bargaining sessions, until a meeting Feb. 5, the day before the Super Bowl. The sides met again once last week but called off a second meeting that had been scheduled for the following day.

Lawrence's 'Big Mommas' misses mark on everything

Big Momma's finally left her house. From where I was sitting, she should have stayed in.

"Big Mommas: Like Father, Like Son" is the latest out of Martin Lawrence's already hackneyed "Big Momma" franchise, and it picks up right where the first two left off — with played-out characters, wooden slapstick, and witless jokes.

The movie picks up the next chapter in Martin's turn as FBI agent Malcolm, who now must conceal his son ("Tropic Thunder's" Brandon T. Jackson) from Eastern European terrorists because he witnessed them murder an informant. Conveniently, the case brings the two to an all-girls school, where Malcolm dons the fat suit once again to investigate a MacGuffin while son Trent hides out from the baddies and ogles the student body while he's at it.

I could go into the plot details further, but there's not much of a point. I could try and explain the whole thing to you over and over again until you're a hundred, and it still won't make an ounce of sense. The script plods along trying to decide if it's a cop drama or a buddy comedy, falling flat on both counts. All the while, Lawrence and Jackson lumber around campus in their fat suits, recycling old humor that went out with the bathwater in "The Nutty Professor" in 1996.

The setting is nothing more than an excuse to have young actresses prance around in skimpy clothes. The supporting cast, which includes neffy security guard Faizon Love and eye candy musician Jessica Lucas, is entirely one-dimensional. The dialogue is littered with racial clichés. Jackson, who supposedly plays a musical prodigy, sings top staccato and off-key.

In short, there's a perfectly good reason to complain about just about everything in this movie.

You almost feel bad for Lawrence, who's now in his third go-round lugging the latex whale suit around for nonexistent laughs. But then you realize that you're the one having to sit through the whole thing, and there's a real big part of you that wishes that he sweats himself into exhaustion so he can never subject anyone else to this again.

Hopkins' 'The Rite' manages to go over bar of expectations

In my experience, there are a number of outside factors that can affect ones movie going experience. I've found that one factor has a bigger effect than all the others: Our expectations. When we initially see a trailer or an ad that gets us interested in a film we automatically assume certain things about the movie and set certain expectations that the film must meet in order to satisfy us. If the ads are misleading we feel let down and it can ruin the movie, even if the movie was great, just different than we expected.

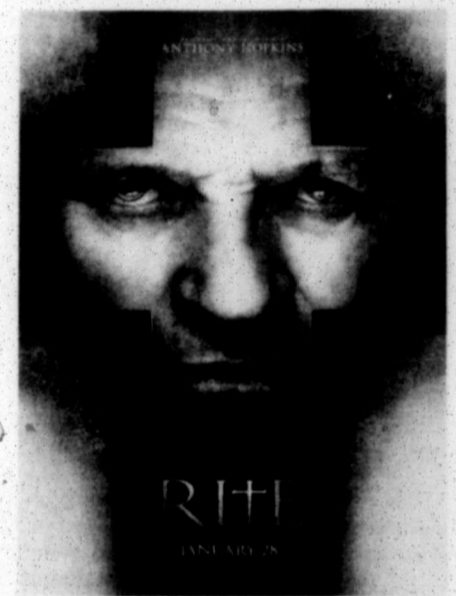
"The Rite" is one of those movies which required me to adjust my expectations. The ads for the film highlight a few scenes in order to advertise the movie as a horror film. Very quickly upon watching

the movie however it becomes clear that this is not a horror movie. Yes, it does have a couple of scenes that are designed to make you jump, and the movie does involve demons, and has a few very intense scenes. But overall the movie is a religious drama about a man trying to find and understand faith.

The man in question is Michael Kovak (Colin O'Donoghue), a man of little to no faith who chooses to go to seminary rather than enter the family business of being an undertaker. After completing seminary he is asked to go to Rome to attend a class on exorcism being taught in the Vatican. Because of his lack of faith Kovak is sent to spend time with an experienced Exorcist, Father Lucas Trevant (Anthony Hopkins), in the hopes that his faith will be deepened. As Kovak witnesses the exorcisms that Father Trevant performs his faith is pushed to its limits. Are these people truly possessed by a demon, or are they simply people with mental disorders who simply need psychiatric help?

Both O'Donoghue and Hopkins give fantastic performances, especially Hopkins whose portrayal of a man of faith who still struggles with the faith part is one of his best performances in years. But the movie is stolen by Marta Gastini as a girl who may or may not be possessed by a demon. She adds a true emotional depth to her too few scenes and are truly haunting.

"The Rite" is, as the credits say, "suggested by the book by Matt Baglio", which to me seems to be a way of saying "this didn't happen, but it could have." In the end, whether it truly happened or not doesn't matter because "The Rite" is one of the few Religious Dramas of the past few years, and does a good job of portraying a man torn between faith and logic. All in all it, exceeded my expectations.



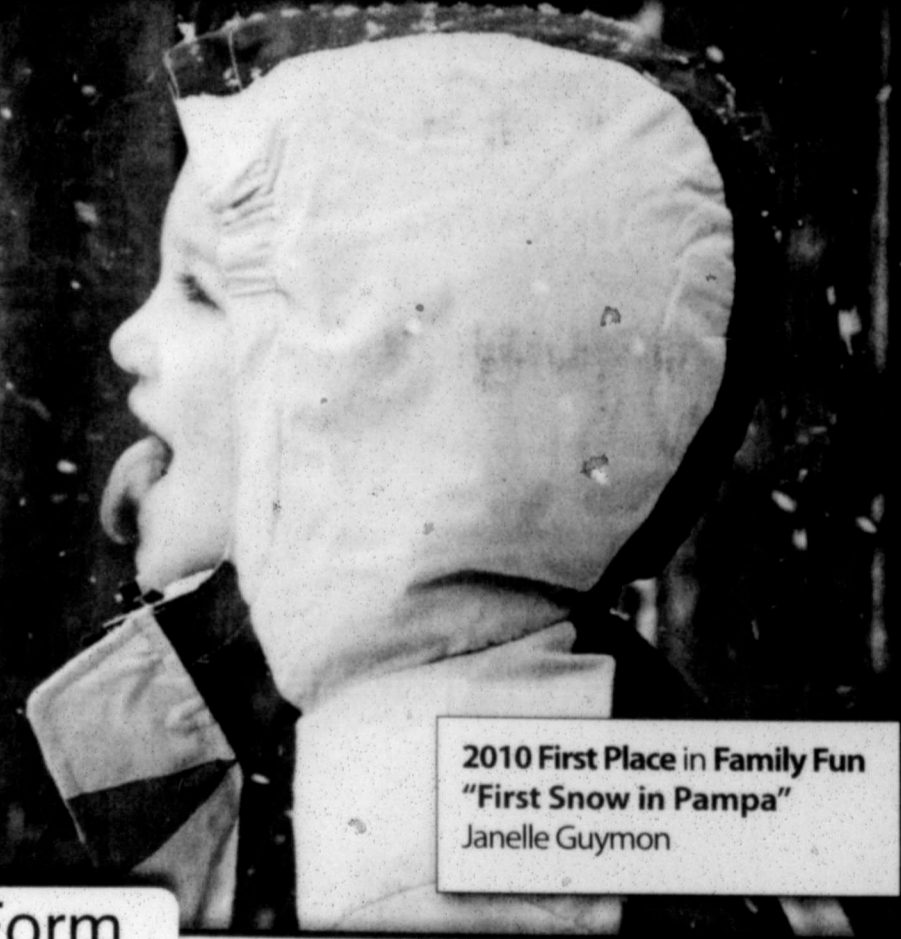

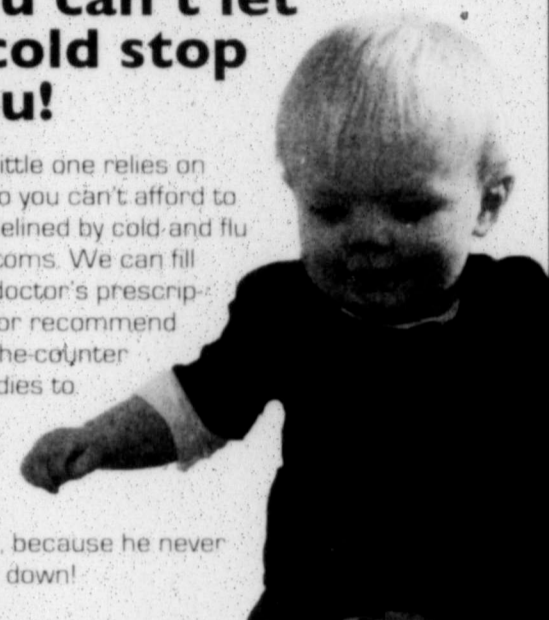


