

Part of the problem is that the support for the sport of team sports is not as strong as it should be. "I have a physical disability," states the group's president, "and I have a hard time seeing the struggle."

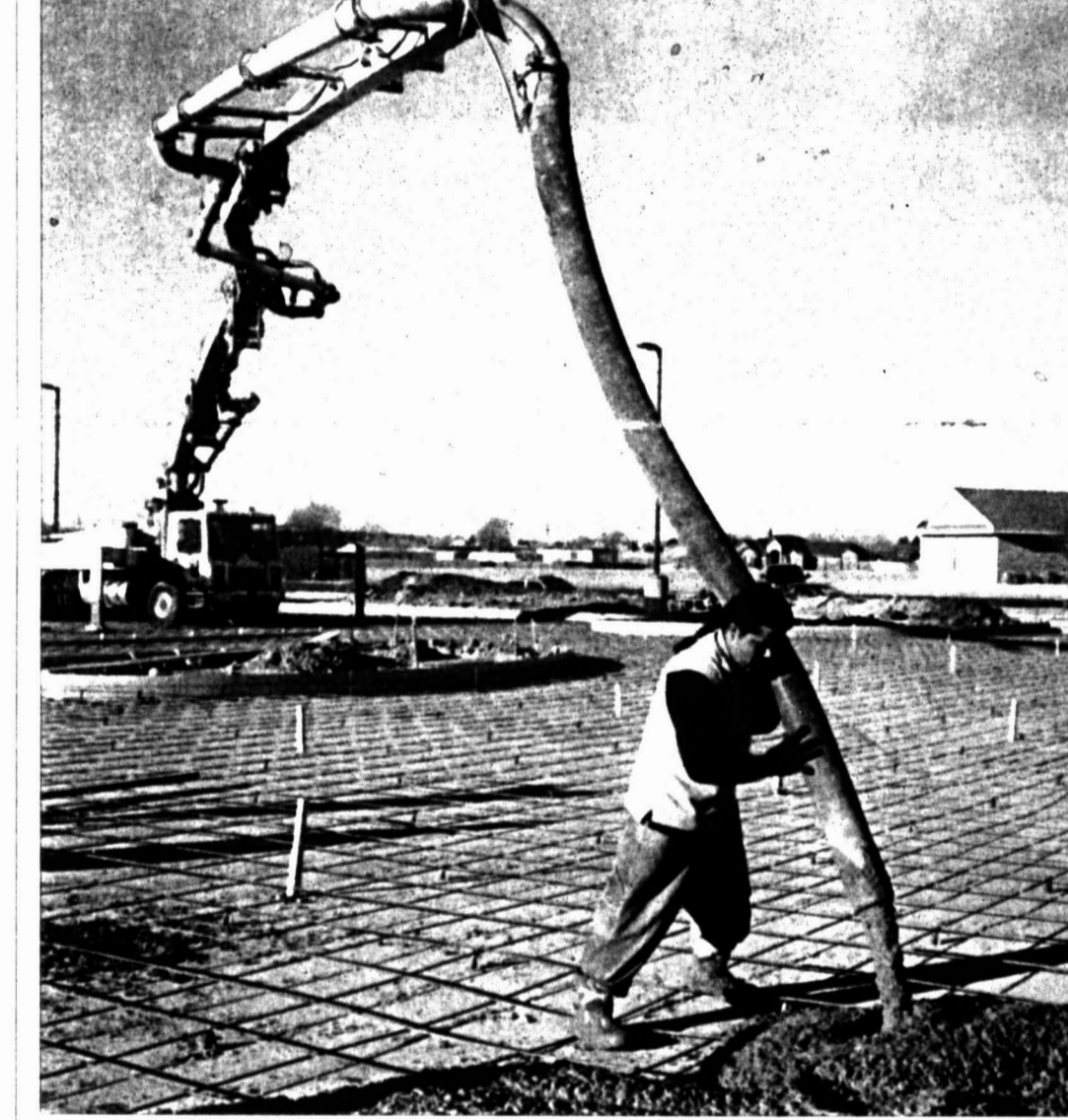

"We were on standby," Gregory said. "We knew that the conditions were right and we were going to be on high alert, so we had people ready Sunday morning."

With Sunday's blazes coming two weeks before the anniversary of the big 2006 wildfires, Gregory said that the Red Cross placed emphasis on preparation in fire-likely conditions like the weekend.

"That's the main thing," Gregory said. "To be prepared. We don't just want to push preparation out there for the community. We want to be prepared ourselves, to set that example. We had the shelter of

the ready. We had the shelter on standby."

"We did learn quite a bit (from 2006). You never want to go through that again, but you never know around here, so it pays to learn."

Gregory said that the Red Cross is currently seeking financial contributions to help defray the cost of Sunday's emergency outreach.

"Unfortunately, all that work costs money," Gregory said. "We'll gladly take any donations to help us out."

Because of the extent of the fires and the continuing likelihood of wildfire danger, the Eastern Tex-

He said that a phone cable was cut recently because it was buried too shallow and the prison east of town was without phone service until crews could repair the line.

"These are the issues I'm having in my precinct," Willoughby said.

In other business: The commission extended the countywide burn ban, noting that Gov. Rick Perry first put it into place in December and renewed it in January and February.

Wildfires, fanned by high winds, spread across Potter and Hutchinson Counties over the weekend.

Judge Richard Peet said that the National Weather Service projected dry weather and high winds this week and requested that burn bans be implemented across the Panhandle.

County Emergency Coordinator Joe Milligan reported that another grass fire had already been reported this morning on the Campbell Ranch north of Pampa.

Commissioner Jeff Haley reported the pastures in the southeastern quadrant of the county had a high fuel load.

The commission approved road crossings at Boydston and Deep Lake Road, Gray 1 and Gray 5, and County Road 2.

The commission also recognized Veteran Service Officer Robert Dixon for his continuing education hours.
