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

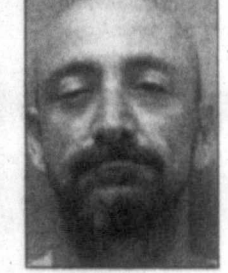

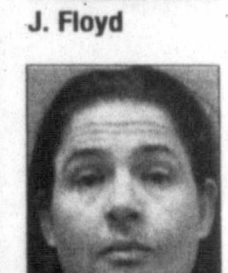
Two nabbed for illegal substances

A Pampa couple was arrested early today on drug-related charges as they sat in a vehicle arguing on the west side of town.



Jack Alexander Floyd, 39, was arrested on charges of possession of a controlled substance.

Officials said that deputies found the couple arguing in a vehicle in front of a business on Texas 152 west of Pampa shortly before 1 a.m., today.

Deputies questioned the couple and, after receiving permission to search the couple's vehicle, found a small amount of what they believed to be cocaine and a small **DRUGS** cont. on page 6

City to hold public hearings for zoning

The Pampa City Commission will hold two public hearings concerning zoning when the commission meets in regular session on Tuesday.

The first public hearing will be in connection with a request by Martha Mackay.

The second is at the request of Roberto L. Vizcaino. Mackay wants to change the zoning in Tract Z-F of Section No. 116, Block 3, I&GN RY Company survey from Single Family 2 District to Commercial District.

Vizcaino wants to change the zoning of Tract Z-A, Tract Z-B and Tract Z-E of Section No. 116, Block 3, I&GN RY Company survey from Single Family 2 District to Commercial District.

The change of zoning of the Vizcaino would allow the building of a utility trailer sales facility, a service facility for Recreational Vehicles and a boat storage facility.

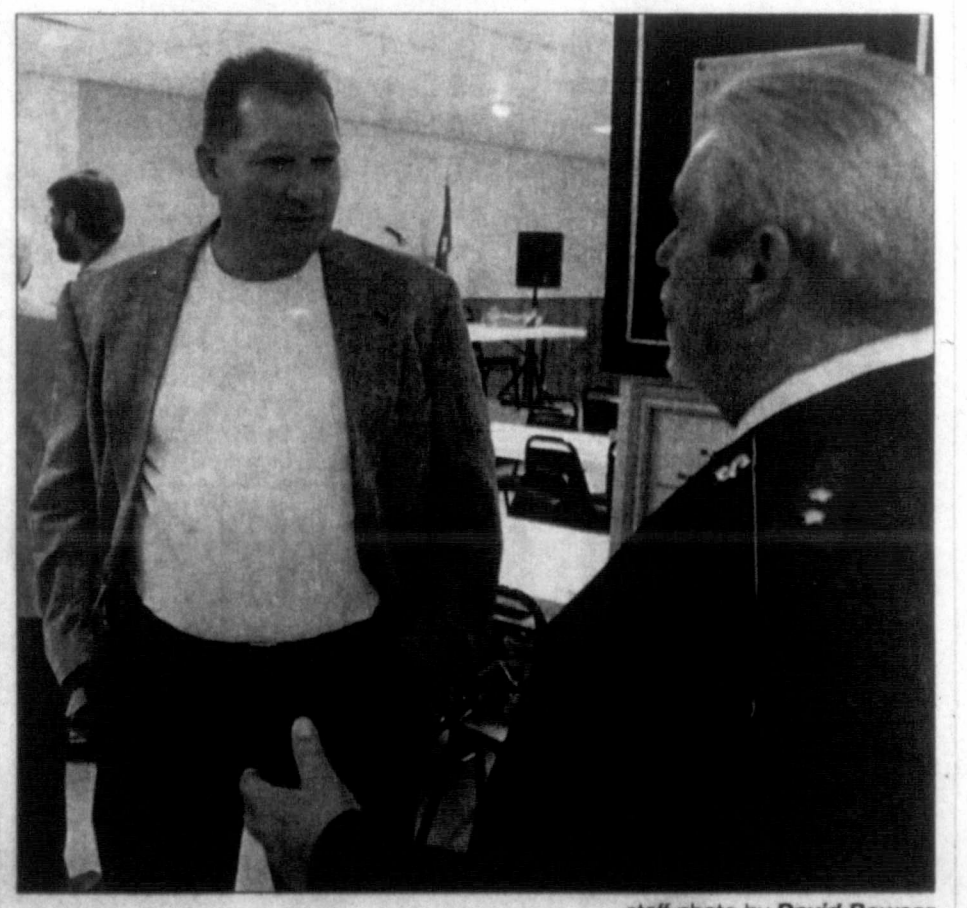
The city commission will vote on the changes following the public hearing.

In other business:

- The commission will consider on second and final reading an ordinance amending the Pampa Economic Development Corporation's budget to provide for the purchase of the Pampa Energy Center, LLC (the old Celanese plant).
- The purchase was originally budgeted for \$2,109,570. The budget amendment increases that amount by \$3.6 million to \$5,751,570.
- The city commission will also consider a \$154,608 bid for the construction of a Recycling Center Building at the city landfill. The project will be funded in part through a Regional Solid Waste Grant administered by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

Jildardo Arias, the city's engineer-in-training, said **CITY** cont. on page 6

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Drug cartel lawyer caught in Mexico

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Federal police have arrested a lawyer who allegedly helped the Zetas drug cartel manage ransom and extortion payments, which were sometimes handed over in the form of property deeds, Mexican authorities said Thursday.

Suspect Marco Antonio Gomez was detained in the Caribbean coast resort of Cancun on Wednesday, the Public Safety Department said in a statement.

Gomez allegedly participated as a go-between in negotiating ransom payments from relatives of businessmen who had been kidnapped in the Cancun area.

In a sign of the gang's sophistication, the federal police said the Zetas had professionals who worked to legally transfer property titles handed over to the cartel.

Nine more suspected Zetas members were arrested in the border state of Tamaulipas on Wednesday as part of a general crackdown on the gang after it was implicated in the abduction and killing of at least 145 people whose bodies were exhumed from mass graves in the town of San Fernando earlier this month.

Also Thursday, a Mexican official confirmed that President Felipe Calderon's government has hired a U.S. law firm to investigate possible civil lawsuits against U.S. gun manufacturers or dealers, for what Mexican officials consider the companies' responsibility for guns that are smuggled to Mexico's drug war.

The government has long demanded the United States crack down on cross-border arms smuggling amid drug violence in Mexico that has killed more than 34,000 people over the last four years.

According to the official, who agreed to speak about the legal action only if granted anonymity, the government hired a New York-based law firm late last year to explore possible suits against U.S. gun manufacturers that may have knowingly or imprudently produced or distributed weapons that wound up in the hands of Mexican drug cartel gunmen.

Calls to the New York law firm seeking to confirm

the contract went unanswered. The U.S. National Rifle Association did not immediately return calls seeking comment on Mexico's action.

Many guns used to kill in Mexico never have their origins traced. But U.S. officials say that of the weapons discovered at Mexican crime scenes that authorities do choose to trace, nearly 90 percent are eventually found to have been purchased in the U.S. Critics of that estimate contend Mexican authorities focus on U.S.-made guns to trace.

A November 2008 study by the Brookings Institution, a Washington-based think tank, estimated 2,000 U.S. guns are smuggled into Mexico each day. A new U.S. effort to increase inspections of travelers crossing the border has netted just 386 guns in two years.

In the northern state of Durango, prosecutors reported Thursday that further excavations at a vacant lot in the state capital yielded 11 more bodies — 10 men and one woman — in addition to 26 badly decomposed bodies found a day earlier.

The grisly Holy Week discovery came just days after police found 10 complete bodies, three headless bodies and four severed heads in a pit in Durango, a state that has become a battleground between the Zetas and Sinaloa drug cartels.

Prosecutors did not say whether the bodies were found in multiple-burial pits, like the 145 bodies that have been pulled from mass graves in the border state of Tamaulipas.

While Mexican drug cartels frequently use such pits to dispose of the remains of executed rivals, many of those buried in the Tamaulipas mass graves are believed to have been passengers kidnapped from passing buses.

In Tamaulipas on Wednesday, authorities reported they had rescued 68 people, including 12 Central American migrants, allegedly kidnapped by a drug cartel.

Soccer death identified

LEAGUE CITY (AP) — Police in Southeast Texas have released the name of a 4-year-old boy who collapsed during soccer practice and later died.

League City police say a cause of death is pending for Cade Carpenter. A police report says an X-ray indicated the boy had swelling around his heart.

Lt. Bruce Whitten says the child was not breathing when emergency responders arrived Wednesday night. He was transported to a hospital and later pronounced dead.

Whitten says the boy was running around just minutes before he collapsed.

Court workers plead to bribery

EDINBURG (AP) — Two South Texas court employees who accepted bribes to fix misdemeanor cases will be sentenced in June.

Plea deals have been accepted by now-former Hidalgo County Court-at-Law No. 5 coordinator Daniel Vega and his assistant, Javier Mireles.

Vega on Tuesday pleaded guilty to accepting a bribe. Mireles pleaded guilty April 14. Prosecutors recommend that each man spend five years in prison.

The McAllen Monitor reports an informant contacted the FBI in 2008 after witnessing Vega guarantee probation in a DWI case. Vega was offered \$500. The driver received 90 days of probation.

An affidavit says Vega, during the sting, asked for more than \$4,000 to get a case thrown out, then accepted some cash.

Investigators have said there's no evidence that Judge Arnoldo Cantu was involved in the bribery scheme.

Homicide suspect says not guilty

MINOT, N.D. (AP) — A Texas man accused of killing a fellow oil field worker at a North Dakota hotel has pleaded not guilty to murder.

Thirty-two-year-old Charles Davis II of Trinity, Texas, is accused of stabbing to death 48-year-old Donald Flowers of Wichita Falls, Texas, in Minot on March 12. Authorities say the two men were employed by the Halliburton company and were working in a hotel conference room when they got into a fight.

Davis also is accused of stealing a vehicle and trying to flee. Police Sgt. David Goodman testified in court Thursday that Davis had Flowers' blood on his clothing and a knife in his possession when he was arrested near Bismarck.

Goodman says Flowers was stabbed six times in the neck area.

More public records released

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Austin has made public dozens of new records that computer technicians found within the city's email system.

The original public information request was received by the city three months ago. The Austin American-Statesman reported Friday that an attorney for the investigative website, the Austin Bulldog, is not certain that the city has fully complied with the law.

City officials say Thursday's release concludes their open records request for emails sent last year among council members.

The Bulldog last month sued. The Austin American-Statesman also sought the records on what information is being shared by elected officials.

Bulldog attorney Bill Aleshire says the city's open records system is "horribly deficient" and who knows what other records have been withheld.

Robbers caught on Facebook

HOUSTON (AP) — Some Facebook bragging about bucks has led to four suspects accused of holding up a Houston bank.

The postings about the March 23 robbery of International Bank of Commerce were included in a criminal complaint unsealed this week. The arrests, including two bank employees, were announced Thursday.

Security video shows two armed, masked suspects robbing the bank and fleeing with about \$62,000.

A tip directed law officers to a pair of Facebook pages. Federal investigators say one suspect's Facebook page boasted: "IM RICH."

Another said: "WIPE MY TEETH WITH HUNDREDS." Nobody was injured in the robbery.

New general at Fort Hood

FORT HOOD (AP) — Fort Hood has a new commanding general.

Lt. Gen. Donald Campbell took command of the Texas Army post at a ceremony Thursday.

Lt. Gen. Robert Cone, the departing commanding general, will become a four-star general and take command of the Army's Training and Doctrine Command at Fort Monroe, Va.

With Cone's departure, now Campbell will decide whether Maj. Nidal Hasan will be court-martialed and face the death penalty in the 2009 shootings at Fort Hood.

Two Army colonels have already made that recommendation. The final decision is made by a commanding general.

Last month Cone granted a request by Hasan's attorney to delay proceedings until Campbell's arrival.

Hasan, an Army psychiatrist, is charged with 13 counts of premeditated murder and 32 counts of attempted premeditated murder.

Family caught in drug ring

DALLAS (AP) — Nine people have been arrested over an alleged Dallas-area cocaine distribution ring involving several relatives.

Federal prosecutors say the defendants in the Terrell (TER-el) drug investigation faced initial court appearances Friday in Dallas.

All of the suspects arrested Thursday are from Terrell, located about 30 miles east of Dallas. Each is charged with one count of conspiracy to possess with the intent to distribute crack cocaine.

Investigators say four of the nine suspects are related, two sisters, a man identified as their uncle and a son of one of the women. The uncle is also charged with maintaining a drug-involved business.

Inspecting houses during construction

HOME HOW-TO

Dear Pat: I am having a house built. The contractor assures me everything will be built properly to code. Is it important to visit and check on it often? What are some specific areas to check? — Jen L.

Dear Jen: Having everything built to code is comforting, but it really only ensures that the house will not collapse around you a year or two from now. The code requirements are the basic minimum for sound construction, and you will most probably want to have some design upgrades from strictly a code-built house.

The details in your building contract are probably your first stage of the inspection process. Instead of just including a phrase such as "acceptable material," your plans and contract should include as many specifics in areas that are most concern to you.

If you can get out to your house almost every day, on a random schedule, this would be advisable. The general contractor is supposed to keep an eye on his subcontractors, but he probably has several construction projects going on simultaneously in various stages of progress to monitor.

You cannot rely totally on the building inspectors, either. They will catch many of the key areas where flaws such as wiring, plumbing, roofing, etc., can result in catastrophic problems, but you cannot expect them to find all the minor material and workmanship flaws.

If you do make your inspections during working hours, be gentle with your questions and concerns about the materials, and especially workmanship. Just like any professional, the subcontractors will not like to be overly criticized. Keep in mind that most subcontractors are conscientious about doing an acceptable job.

The first key area to inspect, or at least question, is the foundation. Check to see if the footings are continuous under the foundation walls and that there are reinforcing steel bars in them. Have one of the workers help you check if the foundation walls are square and plumb. Stretch a line across the diagonals to measure squareness.

Proper drainage and insect control are two other areas to consider in the initial foundation stage of construction. Generally, perforated

drainage tiles are used and then covered by several feet of washed gravel. Have the contractor check the slope so the water naturally flows away from the foundation or slab.

All staircases should be 36 inches wide, and the stair risers should all be the same height. If several of the stairs are just slightly taller than others, it will be very noticeable, and someone may stumble.

If you are building a brick house, check on the spacing of the weep holes. They should be either 24 or 32 inches on center. There should also be flashing at the bottom of

each wall, and above and below all the windows and doors.

Plumbing is a key area to check. Ball valves are only slightly more expensive than common valves, and they are best to use in the supply side. They don't use washers, and when in the open position, they allow for unobstructed water flow. Three-quarter-inch-diameter water supply lines provide more water flow and produce less noise.

All vents, from exhaust fans to the clothes dryer, should vent outdoors, not just into the attic area. While you are in the attic, check the depth of the insulation and look for any uninsulated spots.

AREAS TO INSPECT:

BATHROOMS AND KITCHENS

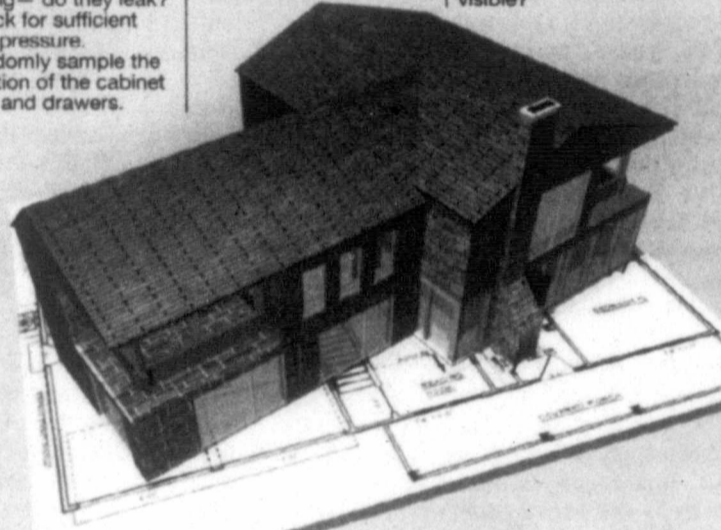
- Check that all fixtures are secure.
- Are there any cracks in the fixtures?
- Are the faucets working — do they leak?
- Check for sufficient water pressure.
- Randomly sample the operation of the cabinet doors and drawers.

GUTTERS AND DOWNSPOUTS

- Ensure gutters slope down toward downspouts.
- Are the downspouts extended away from the foundations?

ROOF

- Is the peak showing a sag, or is it straight and level?
- Any loose flashing, at the chimney, roof-to-wall connection or elsewhere?
- Are there any roof vents visible?



FOUNDATIONS

- Check for cracks, bowing, bulging or other irregularities.
- Check for soft mortar.

LOT LANDSCAPE

- Does the grade slope away from the house?
- Any settled or low areas next to the foundation?

WALLS

- Randomly sample windows and doors for proper function.
- Are the walls straight vertically and horizontally?

Pope does televised Q&A on Good Friday

VATICAN CITY (AP) — In an unprecedented move, Pope Benedict XVI held a televised question-and-answer session to mark Good Friday, fielding queries from as far away as Japan, Iraq and the Ivory Coast on topics as wide-ranging as death, violence, intimidation and suffering.

Benedict told a Japanese girl frightened by the devastating quake and tsunami in her homeland that her suffering isn't in vain and assured a Muslim woman in violence-racked Ivory Coast of the Vatican's peace efforts there.

In a prerecorded appearance on Italian state TV, the pope replied to some of a few thousand questions submitted online by Catholics and non-Catholics alike on the solemn day when Christians reflect on the suffering and crucifixion of Christ.

The unusual TV appearance was broadcast a few hours before Benedict was due at a service of prayer and meditation in St. Peter's Basilica. Later, he was expected at the Colosseum in Rome for the traditional Way of the Cross procession.

Dressed in white robes during the Q&A, Benedict sat at a desk and spoke softly in Italian.

The first question came from Elena, a 7-year-old Japanese girl who told the pope that many children her age were killed in the March 11 disaster and asked why children have to be so sad.

"I also have the same

questions: Why is it this way? Why do you have to suffer so much while others live in ease?" Benedict said. "And we do not have the answers but we know that Jesus suffered as you do, an innocent."

Trying for words of comfort, the pope told her that "even if we are still sad, God is by your side."

He said Elena should tell herself: "One day, I will understand that this suffering was not empty, it wasn't in vain, but behind it was a good plan, a plan of love."

Today is Good Friday, April 22, the 112th day of 2011. There are 253 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:
On April 22, 1864, Congress authorized the use of the phrase "In God We Trust" on U.S. coins.

On this date:
In 1889, the Oklahoma Land Rush began at noon as thousands of homesteaders staked claims.

In 1898, with the United States and Spain on the verge of war, the U.S. Navy began blockading Cuban ports. Congress authorized creation of the 1st U.S. Volunteer Cavalry, also known as the "Rough Riders."

In 1930, the United States, Britain and Japan signed the London Naval Treaty, which regulated submarine warfare and limited shipbuilding.

In 1938, 45 workers were killed in a coal mine explosion at Keen Mountain in Buchanan County, Va.

In 1944, during World War II, U.S. forces began invading Japanese-held New Guinea with amphibious landings at Hollandia and Aitape.

In 1954, the publicly televised sessions of the Senate Army-McCarthy hearings began.

In 1990, pro-Iranian kidnappers in Lebanon freed American hostage Robert Polhill after nearly 39 months of captivity.

In 1994, Richard M. Nixon, the 37th president of the United States, died at a New York hospital four days after suffering a stroke; he was 81.

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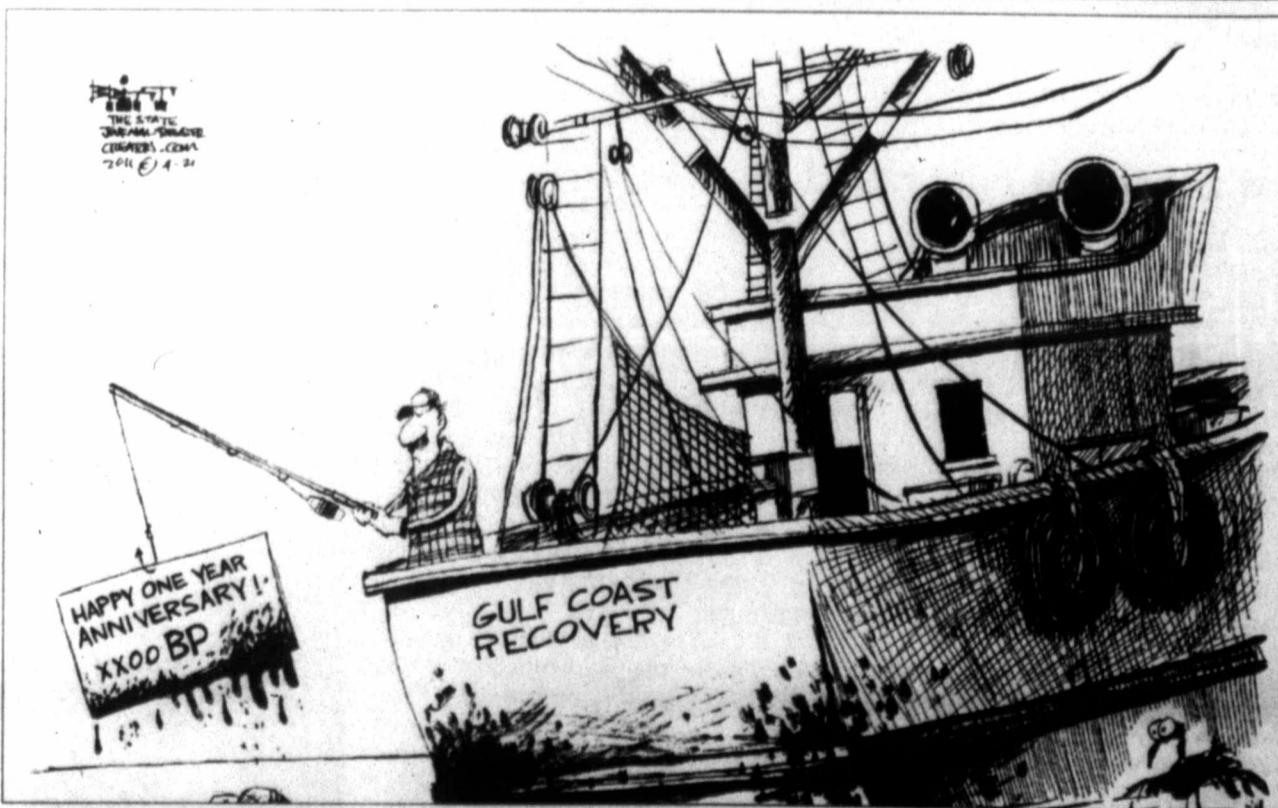

Mark's last words a perfect ending

We don't really know who wrote the Gospel of Mark. The book never says who wrote it. Some claim that it was written by the same John Mark that travels with the Apostle Paul as recorded in the Book of Acts. Others suggest that it could be the young man who was in the Garden of Gethsemane when Jesus is arrested — you know — the one who manages to slip away from the soldiers by slipping out of his linen garment and running away as naked as a jaybird! Mark is the only gospel writer who mentions this strange incident, so many believe that since this is the kind of thing you'd most likely remember if it happened to you, it could well be autobiographical. Who knows?

One thing we know for sure; whoever Mark was, he wrote his gospel as if he was in a hurry to get the story down as quickly as possible. Some have suggested that Mark gives us the Reader's Digest version of the gospel because he leaves out all sorts of things. Notice that he says nothing about Jesus' birth, for example — no angel Gabriel, no startled shepherds, no wise men, no Herod, no star. There's no Sermon on the Mount or on the Plain for that matter. There's no mention of the Lord's Prayer. Mark records only four of the parables. One thing there is a lot of in Mark's gospel is the word "immediately." He uses it three times more than Matthew or Luke, and fifteen times more than John!

But as rushed as Mark seems to be, when it comes to Holy Week, even he has to slow down. Almost half of his gospel is devoted to the final week of Jesus' life. And when Jesus is nailed to the cross, Mark actually takes the time to share with us both his last words, and the language in which he spoke them — "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani" — which Mark translates, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Only Matthew has the stomach to corroborate this part of the crucifixion story. Luke and John either didn't recall our Lord saying those words, or what is more likely, couldn't quite bring themselves to report it.

Still, if you ask me, the most intriguing aspect of Mark's Gospel is where he chooses to finish his gospel. Three women go the tomb first thing Easter morning and find it empty. A young man, dressed in white, informs them

rather matter-of-factly, "Jesus is not here. He has been raised. Go tell the disciples that he will meet them in Galilee." At which point, the women run from the tomb as if the place had been set on fire—and, in a sense, I

suppose it had been. Like the burning bush of old, or the pillar of fire that guided the Israelites through the wilderness, the world was now ablaze with the glory of God!

However, as Mark makes clear, these women are not running out of excitement or amazement, or even because "good news travels fast." Mark tells us that the reason for this early, Easter morning sprint is because the women are scared; and as a result, "they said nothing to anyone." End of the story. End of the gospel. That's all he wrote.

Many Bibles choose to print the next dozen or so verses in italics because it appears that after Mark wrote his gospel someone else came along and added the following verses. And it's easy to see why. The ending seems a bit abrupt, perhaps even anticlimactic. However, I prefer to end the story exactly where Mark intended to end it.

Sure, the women may have run off, filled with fear; but the point is—Fear doesn't have the last word; God does! "Jesus of Nazareth has been raised from the dead," says the young man in dazzling white. That's the last word; and when you think about it, what more really needs to be said? So Mark put down his pen, then and there, and stopped writing—almost as if he was subtly saying to all of us, "Okay, enough reading ... now it's time for you to respond!" Will you share the good news that Jesus Christ has been raised from the dead or will you say nothing to anyone?

McCain: Increase military aid to anti-Gadhafi rebels in Libya

BENGHAZI, Libya (AP) — U.S. Sen. John McCain called for increased military support Friday for Libya's rebels, including providing weapons, training and giving close air support to the opposition in the battle to oust Moammar Gadhafi.

McCain, the top Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee, said at a news conference in the rebels' stronghold of Benghazi in eastern Libya that he did not believe U.S. ground troops are in order.

"We need to urgently step up the NATO air campaign to protect Libyan civilians, especially in Misrata," he said, referring to the besieged rebel-held city in western Libya. "We desperately need more close air support and strike assets."

His visit came a day after the United

States started flying armed drones to bolster NATO firepower and try to break a battlefield stalemate with Gadhafi's forces. McCain said he supported the use of the drones "so we can better identify Gadhafi's forces as they seek to conceal themselves in civilian areas."

U.S. Marine Gen. James Cartwright said the drones "are uniquely suited for urban areas," with their ability to fly lower and counteract the pro-Gadhafi forces' tactic of traveling in civilian vehicles that are difficult to distinguish from those of rebel forces. The first mission was flown Thursday, but the aircraft — armed with Hellfire missiles — turned back due to poor weather conditions without firing any of its munitions, Cartwright said.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Grandview-Hopkins Independent School District (the "District") held a regular meeting on March 8, 2011, and that said meeting was open to the public, and public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given, all as required by the Texas Government Code, Chapter 551, and, WHEREAS, the District deems it advisable to call the Special Bond Election (the "Election") hereinafter ordered; and, WHEREAS, it is hereby officially found and determined that it is in the public's interest for the

1. The statements contained in the preamble of this Order are true and correct and adopted as findings of fact and operative provisions hereof. The District shall hold a special bond election ("Election") between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on May 14, 2011. 2. The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) but no more than five (5) qualified election clerks to serve and assist in conducting the Election; provided that if the Presiding Judge actually serves as expected, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks.

3. Early voting at both locations shall be conducted during the period early voting is required or permitted by law, being May 2, 2011 through May 10, 2011,

4. The Early Voting Clerk for the Election shall be Linda Lewis. The Deputy Early Voting Clerk shall be Amera Sperry.

5. Applications for early voting by mail shall be sent to Linda Lewis, Early Voting Clerk, PO Box 2493, Pampa, TX 79066. Application for ballot by mail must be received no later than

the close of business on May 6, 2011.

6. An Early Voting Ballot Board shall be created to process early voting results of the Election. Linda Lewis is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge of the early voting ballot board, and the Presiding Judge, in turn, shall appoint at least two (2) other members to serve on the Early Voting Ballot Board.

7. All qualified electors of and residing in the District shall be entitled to vote at the Election.

8. At the Election, the following PROPOSITION shall be submitted in accordance with law:

PROPOSITION
Shall the Board of Trustees of Grandview-Hopkins Independent School District be authorized to issue bonds of the District, in one or more series, in the aggregate principal amount of \$1,000,000 for the construction, acquisition, renovation and equipment of school buildings in the Districts, with the bonds to mature, bear interest, and be issued and sold in accordance with the law at the time of issuance; and shall the Board of Trustees be authorized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes, on all taxable property in the District, sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds?

9. The official ballots for the Election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid PROPOSITION with the ballots to contain such provisions, markings and language as required by law, and with such PROPOSITION to be expressed substantially as follows:

PROPOSITION FOR AGAINST
THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,000,000 OF BONDS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION, ACQUISITION, RENOVATION AND EQUIPMENT OF SCHOOL BUILDINGS, IN AND FOR THE GRANDVIEW-HOPKINS INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX FOR PAYMENT THEREOF

10. A substantial copy of this Order, in both English and Spanish, shall serve as proper Notice of the Election (the "Notice"), and the President of the Board of Trustees shall cause the Notice to be published as least one time, not earlier than the 30th day or later than the 10th day prior to the date set for Election, in a newspaper published in the District or, if none is published in the District, in a newspaper of general circulation in the District. In addition, not later than the 22nd day prior to the date set for the Election, or not later than the next business day if the 21st day falls on a Saturday, Sunday or legal state holiday, the President of the Board of Trustees shall cause the Notice, in both English and Spanish, to be posted on the bulletin board used for posting notices of meetings of the Board of Trustees, and at any other location(s) and by any other method as the District deems fit or may be required by law.

11. A substantial copy of this order delivered to the Election Judge(s) and Alternate Election Judge(s) within the time required by law shall be proper notice as required under Texas Election Code, and the President of the Board of Trustees shall cause this order and all other necessary notices to be

posted and delivered to the Election Judges and any Alternates stated herein, as may be required by law.

12. In all respects the Election shall be conducted in accordance with the Texas Election Code and any other applicable state or federal law. At least one (1) electronic voting machine, which has been certified by the Texas Secretary of State for use in Texas elections as an accessible voting system, shall be used at each election day polling place and Early Voting polling place.

13. The Election Administration Agreement with the Elections Administrator of Gray County, Texas to perform Election services in connection with the Election in the form and substance presented is hereby approved, and the President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver said contract.

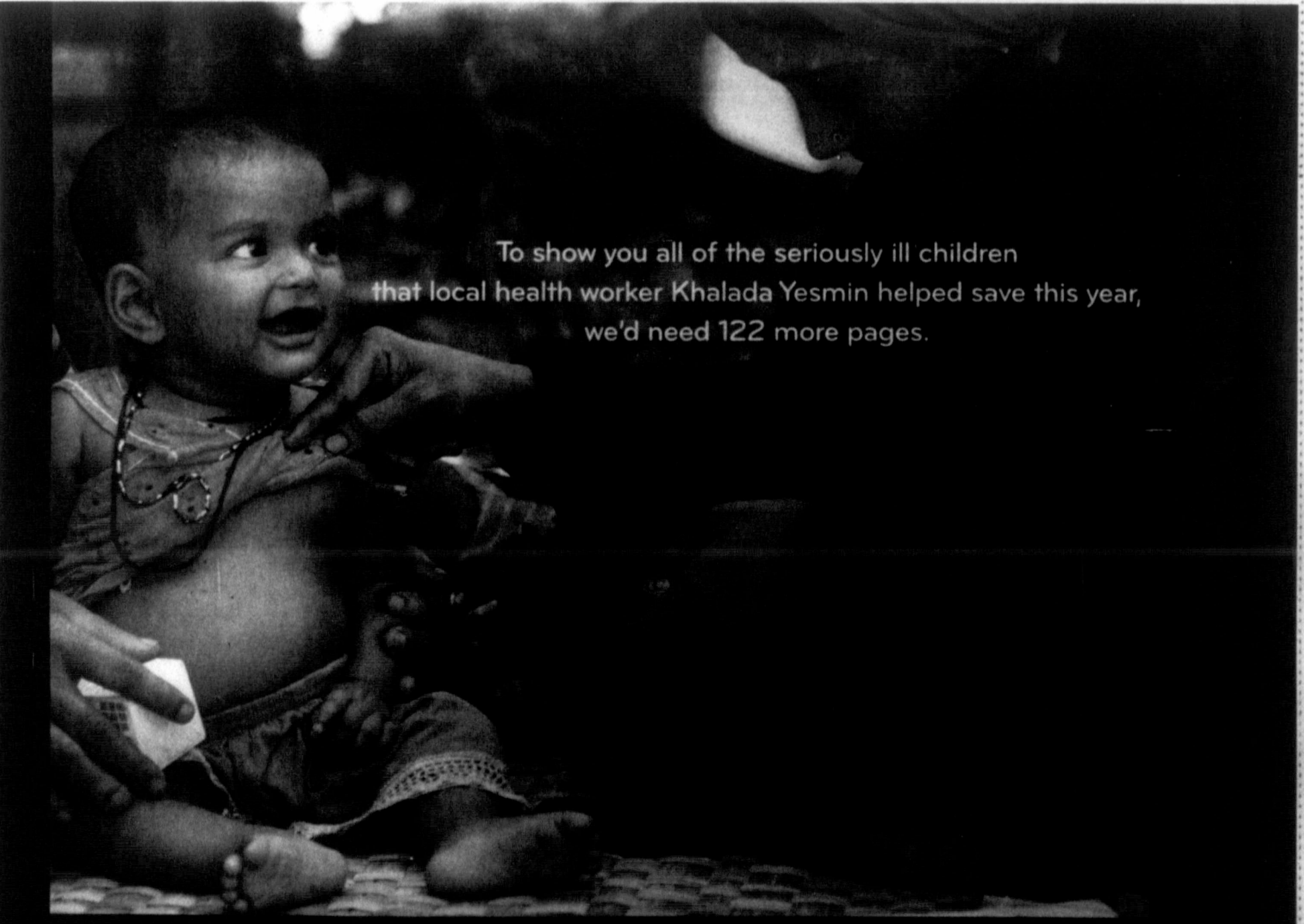

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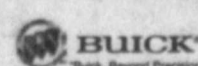
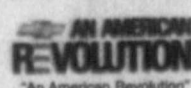
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
