## City honors Allison, considers CRMWA move

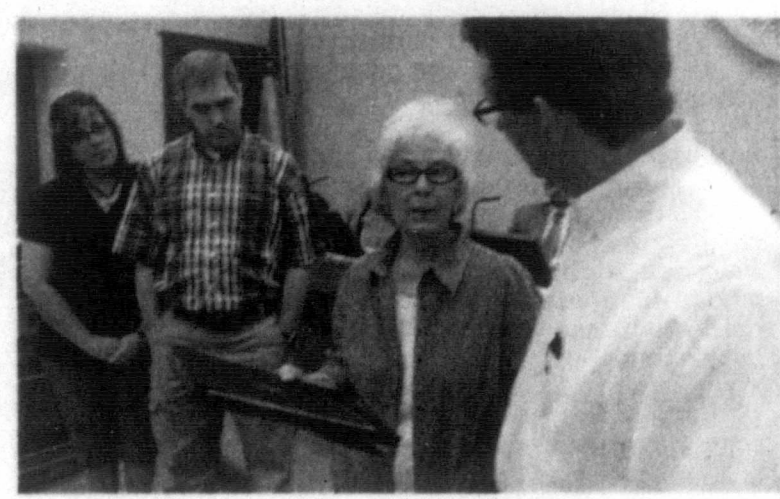

The Pampa City Commission took the first steps toward approving the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority's purchase of water rights from Roberts County rancher and Dallas businessman T. Boone Pickens this week (see related story, "CRMWA to sell bonds, buy rights," page 1).

During their commission meeting Tuesday afternoon, commissioners authorized City Manager Richard Morris to sign participation documents with the water

## CRMWA to sell bonds, buy rights

The Canadian River Municipal Water Authority hopes to sell some \$94 million in revenue bonds next fall to raise money to buy approximately 200,000 acres of water rights from Roberts County Rancher and Dallas businessman T. Boone Pickens.

The Pampa City Commission, during their regularly scheduled meeting Tuesday afternoon, tentatively approved the idea.

Pampa is one of 11 cities that make up the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority.

Kent Satterwhite, general manager of the water authority, said that Slaton, Tahoka and Levelland this week approved participation in the purchase of the water rights.

Plainview officials were meeting Tuesday evening. Borger and Brownfield are to meet next week to discuss the proposition.

Satterwhite indicated that, while they have not taken any official action, Amarillo and Lubbock have also indicated agreement to the purchase of the water rights.

Pampa will participate in 3.6 percent of the total cost of the \$94,275,000 bond issue.

## Final early voting turnout numbers in for county

The final turnout numbers for the early voting period are in, according to Gray County Elections Administrator Linda Lewis.

Through the close of Tuesday — the last day of early voting — 566 people took advantage of the early voting process, Lewis said. That includes a spike of 128 voters on Tuesday.

The late influx of voters mirrors the surge the election office saw during the first days of early voting. Gray County Courthouse took in 160 voters through the close of the day of the first two days of the polls.

Two of the 566 early voters were from Lefors, Lewis said, with another two coming from Grandview Hopkins. The other 562 were city of Pampa voters.

Lewis looked positively clairvoyant when, on Monday, she said that voting usually picks up on the last day.

"I think the turnout was a respectable showing," Lewis said. "Pretty good numbers for a city (and) ISD election."

Election Day for local elections is Saturday, with voting at M.K. Brown Auditorium for all wards in the city.

This is an at large election. While candidates must live within the ward that they wish to represent, anyone in Pampa can vote for any candidate.

In addition to the city elections, Grandview-Hopkins Independent School District voters are also voting on a million dollar bond issue to renovate their school building and levy a tax for the bond payment.

Voters in Lefors and McLean Independent School Districts will be electing trustees for their respective school boards.

## Jobs at highest level since 2008

WASHINGTON (AP) - Companies in March advertised the most jobs since the peak of the 2008 financial crisis, a sign that hiring is likely to remain healthy in the months ahead.

The Labor Department says job openings rose by 99,000 to 3.1 million in March. That's the highest level of openings since September 2008 and the second straight monthly increase.

The number of available jobs plummeted to 2.1 million in July 2009, one month after the recession ended. But March's total is still significantly below the 4.4 million openings recorded in December 2007, when the recession began.

Even with the increase, there were 4.3 unemployed people, on average, competing for each available job in March.

## Mountain lion killed in El Paso

EL PASO (AP) - A downtown walkabout proved fatal for a mountain lion killed by police in a West Texas city. An El Paso police statement issued Monday says the cougar was reported wandering around a downtown intersection just before 8:30 a.m. Tuesday.

An animal control officer and El Paso police trailed the big puma through a school yard, neighborhoods and business areas before cornering him at a business. Two tranquilizer darts failed to subdue the animal, so two El Paso police officers and a state alcohol control agent opened fire.

According to the statement, the shooting will receive an El Paso police review.

Such mountain lion sightings in El Paso are rare but not unheard of because of the proximity of the Franklin Mountains.

## Judge orders action on permits

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - A federal judge has given the Obama administration 30 days to act on six permits for deepwater drilling in the Gulf of Mexico.

U.S. District Judge Martin Feldman issued the order Tuesday in a lawsuit filed by Enco Offshore Co. and others. He rejected Interior Department arguments that the issue was moot because it already has resumed issuing permits following the moratorium that was imposed last year after the BP oil spill.

Three permit applications at issue in the original lawsuit have been granted. But Feldman said the government's issuing of what he called "a scant few applications" does not provide the certainty Enco needs to conduct its business in the Gulf. He said the law required the six remaining Enco-related applications to be acted on within a reasonable period.

## Laredo welcomes book store

LAREDO (AP) - No longer is Laredo the nation's largest city without a bookstore.

The Texas border city of 250,000 people Thursday will celebrate the opening of a Books-a-Million, more than a year after losing its only bookstore and giving Laredo the dubious distinction of being the largest city in the U.S. without a single bookseller.

A spokeswoman for the city says the new store will occupy the same space abandoned last year when Barnes & Noble Inc. acquired B. Dalton Bookseller and closed 49 stores nationally.

## House says no insurance reforms

AUSTIN (AP) - Republicans easily swatted down major changes to insurance regulation in a Texas House bill that would keep the current rules and bureaucracy in place.

The bill continuing the functions of the Texas Department of Insurance passed Tuesday night on a 96-46 vote. The legislation, part of a regular review of state agencies, faces a final procedural hurdle before it can move to the Senate. Democrats offered up a variety of pro-consumer amendments.

Among them were provisions such as prior approval of rate increases, a ban on credit scoring in the underwriting of home and auto insurance and the creation of an elected insurance commissioner post. The Republican-led House shot down those proposals and kept a pro-business approach in the insurance legislation.

## State seeks Medicaid 'flexibility'

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas would ask for more flexibility to pay for its share of federal health care programs for the poor and disabled under a proposal that has won approval in the state House.

Under the bill approved by the House Tuesday night, the state would ask for a waiver from the requirements of the fast-growing Medicaid program. Texas pays a portion of the federal program, which guarantees benefits to people who meet low-income requirements. The legislation envisions a block grant program that would allow the state to spend the money with more flexibility.

Supporters say the bill would create more market-based solutions to health care. Critics say it would remove a key safety net. The bill faces a final procedural hurdle before it can move to the Senate.

The Presbyterian Church is based in Louisville, Ky., and has about 2 million members.

Satterwhite said the purchase of the additional water rights should ensure a water supply for the area for the rest of this century.

Once all 11 member cities have reviewed the purchase and made their wishes known, Satterwhite said he would return with contracts for the cities to examine.

"It looks to me like all the member cities are going to participate," Satterwhite told the commission.

He explained that he is talking to all the member cities concerning what they want to do so he can draw up contracts and the water authority's financial advisor can start processing the bonds.

Satterwhite said he hoped to come back to the Pampa City Commission with a contract amendment for their approval.

AUSTIN, (AP) - As President Barack Obama prepared to speak Tuesday in Texas about America's "broken immigration system," lawmakers in Austin moved forward with a measure that would force local police to give federal immigration offenses the same priority as other crimes.

The proposed law, which now goes to the state Senate, does not go as far as Arizona's requirement that police check people's immigration status. But it bans cities or police departments from telling officers not to actively enforce immigration laws.

The approach reflects the careful path Republicans in Texas must take between meeting conservative demands for tougher immigration measures and alienating a growing Hispanic population. Democrats Monday night reminded Republicans that Hispanics were watching such bills closely.

"When you cast this vote, I hope you realize, it will be a vote that 9 million Hispanics will take personally," state Rep. Jose Menendez said during debate.

The House approved the measure 100-47 after Republicans moved to cut off all debate on the issue, using a parliamentary maneuver that allows the majority to ram through bills. Gov. Rick Perry declared the measure to be emergency legislation. He said local law enforcement agencies were not doing enough to catch and deport illegal immigrants.

Perry praised the House for passing the bill saying "will strengthen the discretion our law enforcement officers need to effectively protect Texans."

The vote came on the eve of Obama's first trip as president to the U.S.-Mexico border. He planned to use the setting to sharpen his call for a remake of the nation's immigration laws and try to cast the GOP as the obstacle standing in the way. The president's speech in El Paso and his visit to a border crossing are the latest of Obama's high-profile immigration events, which have included hosting recent meetings at the White House with Latino lawmakers, movie stars and others.

In heavily Republican Texas, federal immigration law has been a key part of the debate over whether local police should start checking the immigration status of people they

encounter while investigating crimes. Rep. Leo Berman, R-Tyler, called federal immigration policy a complete failure and said it justified states taking a more active role in fighting illegal immigration.

Berman and other Republican lawmakers rejected arguments that the bill would result in racial profiling.

State Rep. Burt Solomons, author of the bill, said it would only prohibit communities and law enforcement entities from adopting policies that keep police and criminal investigators from providing immigration enforcement assistance. He helped tack on softening amendments that would provide a limited exemp-

tion for police officers who work for hospitals or school districts.

Many sheriffs and city police chiefs have criticized the bill, saying they already are helping officials prosecute and deport illegal immigrants, but don't want more mandates from the state. Other critics said the bill could allow local police agencies to become de-facto immigration enforcement agents and let rank-and-file officers spend all the time they want enforcing immigration laws no matter what managers want.

Police chiefs testifying on the legislation said it would take resources away from fighting violent crime and sow distrust in minority communities.

Democrats said racial profiling was inevitable.

"The bill doesn't say they have to do it, but the bill provides the cover, the license, (for racial profiling)," Menendez said.

An estimated 1.6 million illegal immigrants are in Texas, according to the Pew Hispanic Center in Washington. Nationwide, their numbers declined between 2007 and 2009, from 12 million to 11.1 million, the first significant drop after two decades of growth. But their combined population in Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana went up by a statistically significant 240,000, the center reported last month.

Immigration curbs have caught fire nationwide.

## Where dogs come from

Where do dogs come from? I'm not talking about storks here. I'm talking about the people and places we turn to in our quest to find the dog of our dreams.

The great majority of dogs come from one of four places:

- 1) Breeders
- 2) Local shelters
- 3) Humane societies
- 4) Rescues

Of course, sometimes getting a dog isn't so much planned as it is organic. A friend of mine glows when telling the story of how she stalked a gorgeous brindle pit bull mix through her neighborhood, where he lived as a stray, until she got close enough to lasso him with her H&M scarf. He went home with her. She fed him a steak. They've been together for six happy years.

And sometimes the family dog comes out of extraordinary circumstances. Such was the case when Zak Anderegg discovered an abandoned puppy left to starve in a 350-foot canyon at the Arizona-Utah border. Anderegg rappelled into the canyon two more times — once to deliver food and water to the weak and dehydrated pup and once more with supplies to lift him up and out of the canyon for good. Riley is now a permanent member of the Anderegg family.

The whims of fate and the workings of miracles notwithstanding, most of us, when looking for our next dog, will turn to one of the Big Four.

Over the next few weeks, I'll lay

out the differences between the four and answer some of the more frequently asked questions about each one. Questions like:

- What's the difference between a humane society and an SPCA?
- What does a breeder actually do?
- What are the pros and cons of adopting a dog from a rescue group?

• How do I find the right dog for me in a shelter full of noisy, needy dogs?

I always say that getting a dog is a chance to choose your relative. And there is no "one size fits all" in deciding how to go about that.

For some, a trip to their local shelter is the only way to go. They will be satisfied with their decision because they know they saved a life, and that's a wonderful thing for all involved.

Still others need a dog to fulfill a very specific purpose. This person might best be served by a breeder or a breed-specific rescue group.

And then there's the prescription dog. I know of a woman whose 20-year-old son has severe epilepsy. Doc says both the woman and her son would benefit from a therapy dog of sorts — a dog that will keep them calm. Clearly, this relative should be carefully selected.

Getting a dog is an important decision, and the good news is you have choices — choices in the kind of dog and choices in where he comes from. If you educate yourself and make a decision based on your values, your convictions, your objective and the dog's purpose, you really can't go wrong.

### Today's Highlight in History:

On May 11, 1981, legendary reggae artist Bob Marley died in a Miami hospital at age 36.

### On this date:

In 1647, Peter Stuyvesant arrived in New Amsterdam to become governor of New Netherland.

In 1811, conjoined twins Chang and Eng Bunker were born in Siam (now Thailand), giving rise to the term "Siamese twins."

In 1858, Minnesota became the 32nd state of the Union.

In 1911, actor-comedian Phil Silvers was born in New York City.

In 1946, the first CARE packages arrived in Europe, at Le Havre, France.

In 1950, President Harry S. Truman formally dedicated the Grand Coulee Dam in Washington state.

In 1960, Israeli agents captured Nazi war criminal Adolf Eichmann in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

In 1973, charges against Daniel Ellsberg for his role in the "Pentagon Papers" case were dismissed by Judge William M. Byrne, who cited government misconduct.

In 1981, the Andrew Lloyd Webber musical "Cats," based on T.S. Eliot's "Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats," opened in London.

In 1996, an Atlanta-bound ValuJet DC-9 caught fire shortly after takeoff from Miami and crashed into the Florida Everglades, killing all 110 people on board.

**Ten years ago:** A jury in Pittsburgh sentenced Richard Baumhammers to death for killing five people in a racially motivated shooting rampage. (Baumhammers is appealing his sentence.)

**Five years ago:** Lawmakers demanded answers after a USA Today report that the National Security Agency was secretly collecting records of millions of ordinary Americans' phone calls; President George W. Bush sought to assure Americans their civil liberties were being "fiercely protected." A priest was convicted in Toledo, Ohio, of murdering a nun, the Rev. Gerald Robinson was immediately sentenced to 15 years in life in prison for the 1980 death of Sister Margaret Ann Pahl.

**One year ago:** British Prime Minister Gordon Brown resigned, ending 13 years of the Labour Party government and paving the way for Conservative David Cameron to become Britain's next leader. Italian designer Giuliana Coen Camerino, credited with making handbags a fashion item, died in Venice at age 90.

If you asked an educator today why they decided to make a career in public education I would be willing to bet the answer would not be "to get rich."

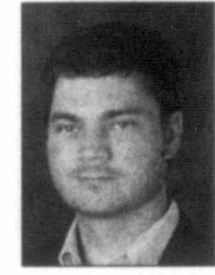
I use that same line when talking to students who want to get degrees in education; I tell them that they should not expect to graduate with a degree in education and make some huge sum of money. That is the tough reality.

## Restraint can be consistent with resolve

It is always a happy moment when Americans are reminded of our country's greatness, especially when we are so often warned about its imminent decline -- and the elimination of Osama bin Laden, fanatical murderer of thousands of Christians, Jews and Muslims, was certainly such a moment.

Especially for those of us who were living in New York City on Sept. 11, 2001, as well as those who died and their families, justice was finally done. From now on, the heroic pantheon associated with that infamous date will include not only the police officers, firefighters and rescue workers of 9/11, but the Navy SEALs and the military and intelligence officers who avenged them.

Everyone who feels pride and satisfaction in bin Laden's fate must also acknowledge the bold action and sound priorities of President Obama, who has coolly and cleanly fulfilled a promise he made during his campaign. Maintaining the nation's dignity and his own, he has handled the aftermath of the mission with precise correctness and stayed focused on the policy goals that guide his administration.

Getting rid of bin Laden won't mean the instant disappearance of terrorism or the alienation that its perpetrators always exploit -- the issues that he sought to symbolize will remain. But in this country, the performance of the president and those around him should permanently dispel the perennial right-wing slur against Democratic leaders

as deficient in the strength and courage to defend our security.

A standard-issue weapon in the Republican political arsenal, that canard was an artifact of the Vietnam War era, when progressives led a protest movement against a war that is now broadly acknowledged to have been an enormous waste of lives and money. Bush White House political adviser Karl Rove revived the idea that Democrats were less tough and less patriotic for strictly partisan purposes in the wake of 9/11, even as the nation yearned for unity.

In a post-9/11 speech delivered to the Republican National Committee in January 2002, while Democrats in Congress and across the country were giving full support to President Bush's declaration of war against al-Qaida and the Taliban, Rove said: "We can go to the country on this issue, because they trust the Republican Party to do a better job of protecting and strengthening America's military might and thereby protecting America."

Rove used that theme to win a smashing victory in the midterm elections that year and amplified the accusation to maximum shrillness when he addressed a conservative group in New Jersey following the president's re-election -- a victory achieved at the cost of defaming a Democratic war hero, Sen. John Kerry, during the 2004 campaign.

"Conservatives saw the savagery of the 9/11 attacks and prepared for war; liberals saw the savagery of the 9/11 attacks and wanted to prepare indictments and offer therapy and understanding for our attackers," he said. "In the wake of 9/11, conservatives believed it was time to unleash the might

and power of the United States military against the Taliban; in the wake of 9/11, liberals believed it was time to ... submit a petition.

"I don't know about you," he continued, "but moderation and restraint is not what I felt -- and moderation and restraint is not what was called for. It was a moment to summon our national will -- and to brandish steel."

Never mind that the only steel Rove has ever brandished is a dinner fork. The overheated rhetoric, faked intelligence, "enhanced interrogations" and mindless militarism of the Bush administration never produced bin Laden dead or alive, as promised back then, and instead misled us into the trillion-dollar quagmire of Iraq, from which President Obama is still extracting us.

What we ought to learn from these painful years is that restraint can indeed be consistent with resolve -- and that the loudmouths of the right have no monopoly on toughness.

Roberts, Ochiltree, Hutchinson and Lipscomb Counties.

The Canadian River Municipal Water Authority is proposing to issue \$94 million in revenue bonds next October. Pampa's participation in the project will be 3.6 percent of the total cost.

Satterwhite said that as soon as all 11 member cities in the water authority vote on the issue, he will return with specific contracts for the commission to examine.

**In other business:**

The commission also approved on first reading a city ordinance amending Pampa's budget for Fiscal Year 2011 that will allow the city to expand its annual sealcoating project this summer.

Revenue from the city's sales taxes in the amount of \$93,000 will be added to the bud-

get for the sealcoating project and allow a total of 10 miles to be covered this summer.

The commission also awarded the bid for the project to G.W. James, Inc., of Pampa for \$341,538.20.

It also approved a change in the city ordinances that would allow four-way stop signs to be put at Sumner and Randy Matson and Sumner and Harvester to help control traffic around the new Pampa Aquatic Park scheduled to open this summer.

Commissioners authorized the Pampa Economic Development Corporation to amend a loan to Tumbleweed Services due to the economic downturn the last couple of years. The original loan was for \$60,000. The remaining balance of \$48,000 is to be paid with 5 percent interest in monthly installments of \$500.

The commission also approved on second and final reading the rezoning of properties near 23rd and Price Road from single family to commercial.

Commissioners also called a Special City Commission meeting at 4 p.m., May 17, to canvass the city election results.

City elections are scheduled for Saturday, May 15.

Gray County Agent Brandon McGinty made a presentation to the commission concerning the Hereford Breeders Barn at Recreation Park. The barn, next to the Clyde Carruth Pavilion, belongs to the city and is

being used for storage. McGinty indicated he would like to use it for the Gray County 4-H Club.

Faustina Curry with the PAWS animal welfare group told the commission that while the number of adoptions at the city animal shelter are up, so is the need for more adoptive homes.

The city commission also recognized one of its own. Mayor Lonny Robbins presented a proclamation honoring Commissioner Bill Allison, who died in office last fall, to his widow, Helen, and his children, Tyler Allison and Stephanie Downs.

1 (15-ounce) can kidney beans, rinsed and drained

1 (10-ounce) package sharp cheddar cheese, cubed  
1 cup ketchup  
3/4 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar  
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce  
Heat oven to 325 degrees. Butter a 1 1/2-quart casserole. In a small skillet, saute the bacon and onions until the bacon is crisp and onions are lightly browned; drain well. In a large bowl, combine the remaining ingredients. Add bacon-onion mixture; mix well. Pour bean mixture into prepared casserole. Bake uncovered at 325 degrees for 1 1/2 hours. Enjoy!

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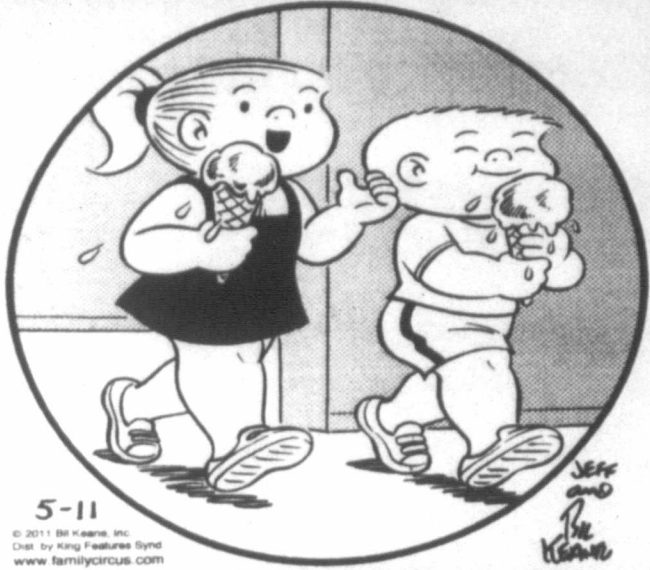

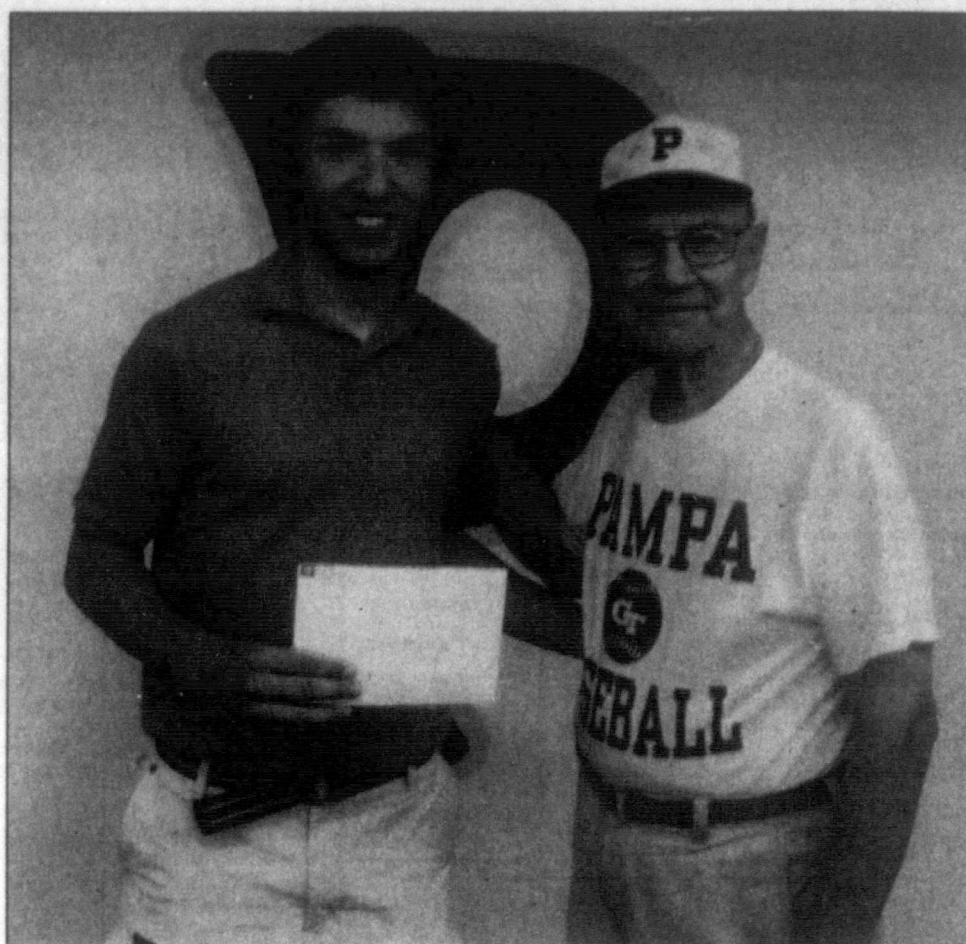
Applications for the scholarship are reviewed by Woldt. The scholarship has been given out since 2002.
