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

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Federal lawsuit for firing dwarf

EL PASO (AP) - The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission is suing Starbucks for firing a dwarf who asked for a stool to perform her job as a barista at an El Paso shop

The EEOC said in a statement released after the federal lawsuit was filed Monday in El Paso that Elsa Sallard was terminated after three days of training because Starbucks deemed she would pose a danger to customers and coworkers.

The EEOC believes Starbucks violated the Americans With Disabilities Act by refusing to provide the stool or a small stepladder as reasonable accommodation to Sallard and then firing her.

The agency also seeks lost wages and compensatory damages for Sallard and a court order that Starbucks adopt policies to correct and prevent disability discrimination

Starbucks didn't reply to an email Monday.

Stumped on education

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas House and Senate negotiators have reached a compromise on almost all parts of the next two-year state budget, leaving the biggest chunk of spending - education - left to be solved.

Lawmakers need to reach an agreement on the spending plan before the session adjourns on May 30. The votes late Monday showed significant progress, though much work remains. Spending on education, particularly public school funding formulas, could push the Legislature into a special session over the PIN works perfectly, and the money is summer.

Sen. Steve Ogden, the Senate's lead budget writer, said he hopes an agreement on education can be reached by the end of the week. But legislation on how to rework the funding formulas appears to have stalled. Other legislation that could impact the amount of money available to spend is scheduled for consideration this week.

Budget analysts said the agreement reached Monday makes improvements to Medicaid provider reimbursements, including those to nursing homes, but is short by almost \$5 billion to fund projected growth in Medicaid.

The compromise covered dozens of aspects of state government, including funding for roads, courts, prisons and foster care.

It was unclear how much would be spent in the agreement because, "we haven't added it up yet," Rep. Jim Pitts, the House budget leader, said shortly after the committee adjourned.

Monday's meeting was the first public meeting of the 10-member panel, which includes two Democrats.

Q: I am going to Europe next month with a group. We were discussing the best and least expensive way to change our dollars into euros. Any advice would be appreciated.

A. That's a very timely question! As you know, the relationship between the U.S. dollar and the euro changes on a daily basis and can have big swings even within one day. The latest headlines are about new problems with Greece, which weakens the euro and means your dollar can buy slightly more of their currency.

But I assume you're not trying to become a currency speculator, merely seeking the least expensive and safest way to handle your travel expenses. For that purpose, the easiest and safest way to convert currency is to use your debit card at any in-network bank ATM in Europe.

You'll find plenty of bank ATMs in major cities. Although Europe is ahead of us in using microchips instead of magnetic strips on their debit cards, I had no trouble using my magnetic strip debit card on a recent trip. Your withdrawn in euros (or the currency of any country you're visiting).

But when you get your bank statement or view it online, you might be in for a surprise. First, you'll note the exchange rate will vary. I was in Europe in early April when the dollar was falling. I tested the system, taking the same amount of cash out, several days apart, and had the sad experience of seeing the impact of the falling dol-



lar. My statement reflected that it took more dollars to buy the same amount of Euros a few days later!

The second surprise is the fee that will be attached to your withdrawal. Whether you use a credit card or withdraw cash using your debit card, there will be a fee for the service typically about 3 percent of the amount withdrawn. And most banks will also charge a fee for using an ATM that isn't owned by the bank

Those costs can add up, so plan to make fewer withdrawals and take more cash out each time. Then, of course, guard that cash in a wallet that you carry in a front pocket (not back pocket of jeans for men) or in a tightly guarded purse -- or wear a money belt. Because most bank ATMs are on the street, pickpockets can easily target a cash-rich tourist

Also, check with your credit-card issuer about their fees. In some cases, with gold or platinum cards, they may charge lower fees than bank ATMs. But you're subject to their calculation of the currency exchange rate at the time the transaction is posted. In times of a falling dollar, that could add to your costs, and rarely does it work to your benefit

Here are a few more tips:

Beware of currency conversion machines in hotel lobbies or stores. Use only ATMs associated with a

bank

· Don't bother with traveler's checks, because bank ATMs are everywhere.

· Don't expect to convert cash dollars to a foreign currency. Banks charge extra for converting paper money, since there is a huge cost to handle foreign cash.

 Avoid airport currency changing booths. Get some cash in Euros, or the currency of the country you're visiting, by visiting a major bank in your town. In Chicago, Chase has foreign currencies at its Chase Tower main branch.

· Notify your bank or credit-card issuer that you'll be traveling, so they don't block your transactions because they suspect fraud. (To reach a person, keep saying "Operator.")

Keep a separate record of your credit-card numbers and the toll-free international numbers to call in case your card is lost or stolen. And, while you're at it, make a copy of the front page of your passport in case you lose that, too. Leave those stashed safely back in your hotel room, not in your purse

Travel safely, and enjoy your trip. Remember, the U.S. dollar may be falling in value, but it is still a tempting target in crowds of tourists. And that's The Savage Truth



Today in History

Today is Tuesday, May 17, the 137th day of 2011. There are 228 days left in the year. **Today's Highlight in History:**

On May 17, 1954, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka, unanimously struck down racially segregated public schools.

On this date:

In 1792, the New York Stock Exchange had its origins as a group of brokers met under a tree on Wall Street

In 1849, fire erupted in St. Louis, Mo., resulting in the loss of three lives, more than 400 buildings and some two dozen steamships.

In 1939, Britain's King George VI and Queen Elizabeth arrived in Quebec on the first visit to Canada by reigning British sovereigns.

In 1961, Cuban leader Fidel Castro offered to release prisoners captured in the Bay of Pigs invasion in exchange for 500 bulldozers. (The prisoners were eventually freed in exchange for medical supplies.)

In 1980, rioting that claimed 18 lives erupted in Miami's Liberty City after an all-white jury in Tampa acquitted four former Miami police officers of fatally beating black insurance executive Arthur McDuffie

In 1987, 37 American sailors were killed when an Iraqi warplane attacked the U.S. Navy frigate Stark in the Persian Gulf. (Iraq and the U.S. called the attack a mistake.)

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush unveiled his energy plan, bracing Americans for a summer of blackouts, layoffs, business closings and skyrocketing fuel costs and warning of "a darker future" without his aggressive plans to drill for more oil and gas and rejuvenate nuclear power.

Five years ago: The FBI began digging at a Michigan horse farm in search of the remains of former Teamsters leader Jimmy Hoffa; the twoweek search yielded no evidence.

One year ago: The Supreme Court ruled, 5-4, that young people serving life prison terms must have "a meaningful opportunity to obtain release" if they haven't killed their victims.







Texas Senate approves nearly \$4 billion from Rainy Day

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Senate overwhelmingly voted on Monday to spend nearly \$4 billion from the state's Rainy Day Fund to close gaps in the current state budget.

Spending money from the state's savings account has been one of the most divisive issues of the session, with fiscal conservatives - backed by Gov. Rick Perry - reluctant to withdraw any of the money, while Democrats have urged budget writers to spend more to help fund public education and health care needs, both of which took huge hits in initial budget proposals.

The chamber's chief budget writer said the 30-1 vote makes a strong statement at a point when lawmakers are running out of time and are still divided on how to hash out a state budget that sends shock waves through all sectors of government.

The Senate spoke today with almost total unanimity," said Sen. Steve Ogden, R-Bryan.

It hasn't always worked that way. The Senate version of the budget was stalled for about a week before it was brought to the floor for debate because Ogden couldn't muster the votes he needed. Democrats opposed a budget that didn't spend more of the Rainy Day Fund while making devastating cuts to schools and health and human services programs.

The Senate moved to add the extra Rainy Day Fund money late last week. The idea behind spending the extra

\$800 million is to free up that amount of money in the spending plan lawmakers are writing for the next two years. An earlier deal struck between lawmakers and Perry would spend about \$3.2 billion for the current budget.

Democrats are still fighting for the Senate to spend even more of the fund as the end of the session draws near and the realities of what some estimate to be a \$27 billion state deficit become more real. Those efforts were rejected by the Senate's Republican majority who, while more cooperative than the GOP supermajority in the House, still want the majority of the Rainy Day Fund left untouched.

Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, proposed an amendment to draw an additional \$1.1 billion from the savings account to increase public school allocations. But Ogden rebuffed his amendment, saying proposals like that would be better suited for another budget bill that deals with supplemental appropriations.

Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, also wanted to spend more money - about \$3 billion - to avoid such drastic cuts.

It was also rejected, largely on a party line vote.

House and Senate negotiators have begun working to find a compromise between the chambers' budgets, but it's been a slow process. If major spending disagreements aren't smoothed over soon, it could force a special session during the summer - a possibility Ogden describes as more of a certainty. Lawmakers on the budget conference committee have enough agreement to pass every article of the budget except the article dealing with education, he said.

The Senate budget underfunds public schools by about \$4 billion while the House underfunds by nearly \$8 billion.

Ogden said he can't foresee a breakthrough for education funding coming before May 30, the last day of the legislative session. He wants lawmakers to pass what they can agree on and work out differences in education funding in the special session.

"Both the House and Senate are attempting in good faith to pass a good budget," Ogden said.

DEAR DOUBTING MOM: Before you second-guess yourself any further, check with Renee's school counselor to make certain he or she was quoted correctly. Does your daughter know how to save money? Balance a checkbook? Hold a job? Does she know right from wrong and how to assert herself?

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

"We just do the best we can," Cabrales said.


Cabrales said he enjoys playing because it's fun.

The season started five weeks ago and currently the Bumble Bee's are 1-10.





Tanya Diaz kicks the ball against All About You. Diaz came up with their nickname Bumble Bee's to match her favorite color yellow.


