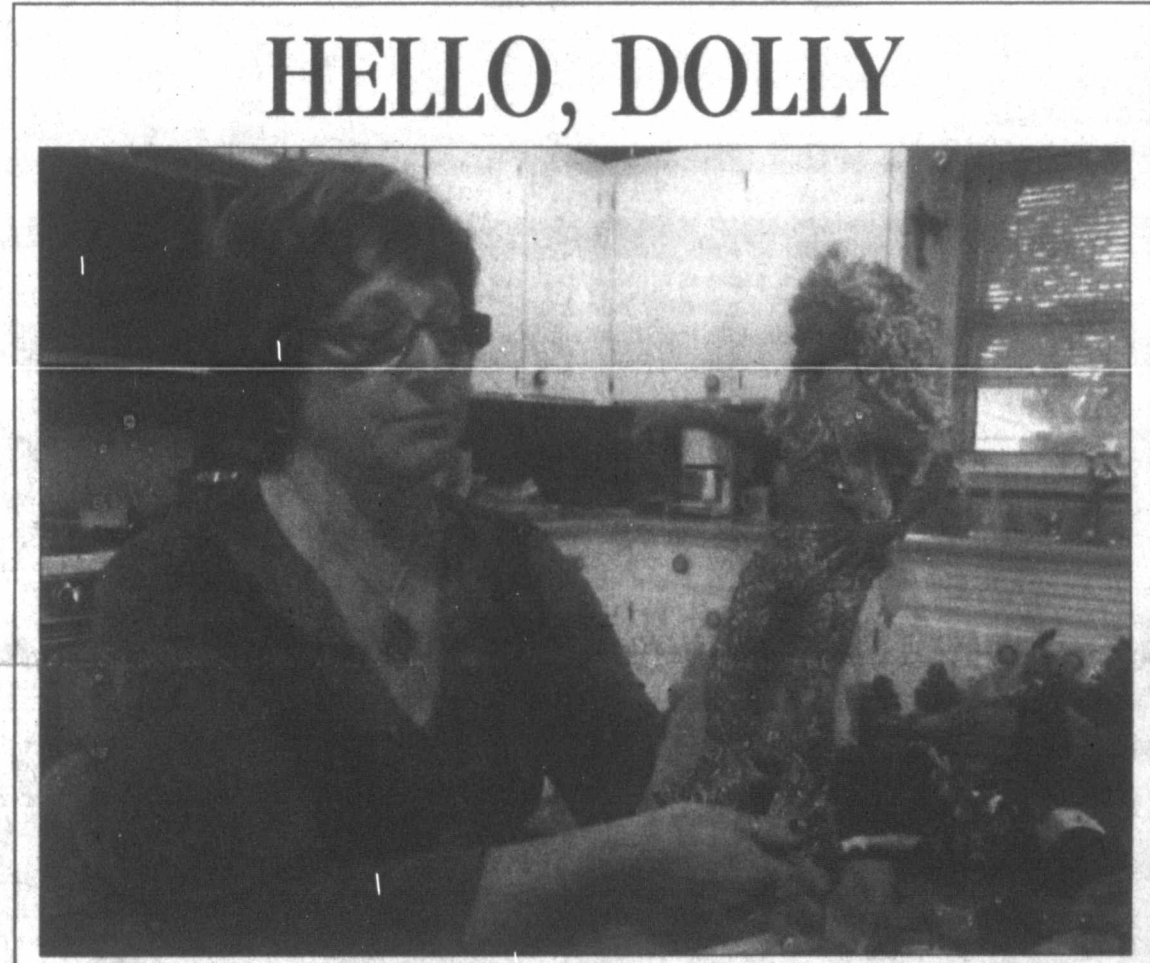
City discontinues tax on goods in transit

 Following a public hearing, the Pampa City Commission passed on an ordinance that would have continued the practice of taxing goods-in-transit when stored within the

city limits. Recent Texas legislation removes this tax provision starting in 2012 unless cities or counties vote to continue it. Previously, businesses, including manufacturers, had to apply for this tax exemption, which applies to goods stored

in public warehouses. Tyson Paronto, Gray County Chief Appraiser, recommended to continue the tax, saying, "That way, you're covered if we do have someone that comes into our jurisdiction wanting to store these products as long as they're not at their

facility." In other business, the Commission: approved minutes from the previous City Commission meeting; passed an ordinance that allowed for the issuance of **CITY** cont. on page 6

Hand-sewn dolls a hobby for White

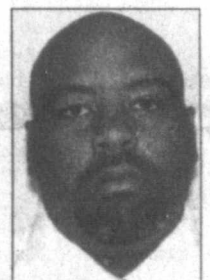

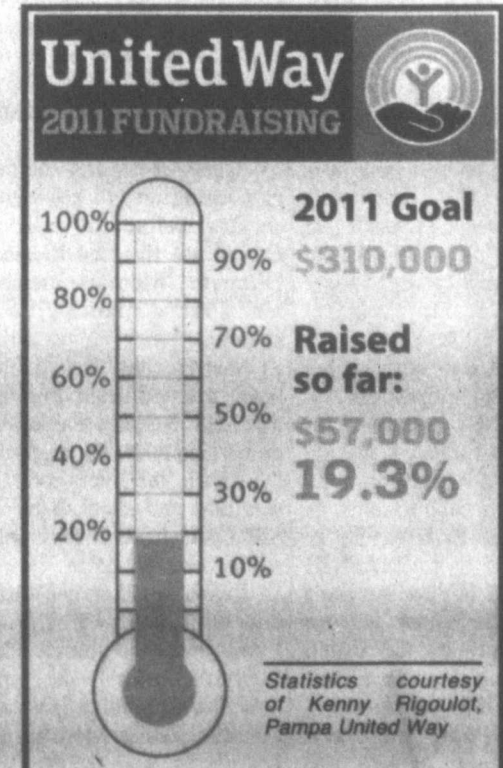

Pampa FD touts fire prevention

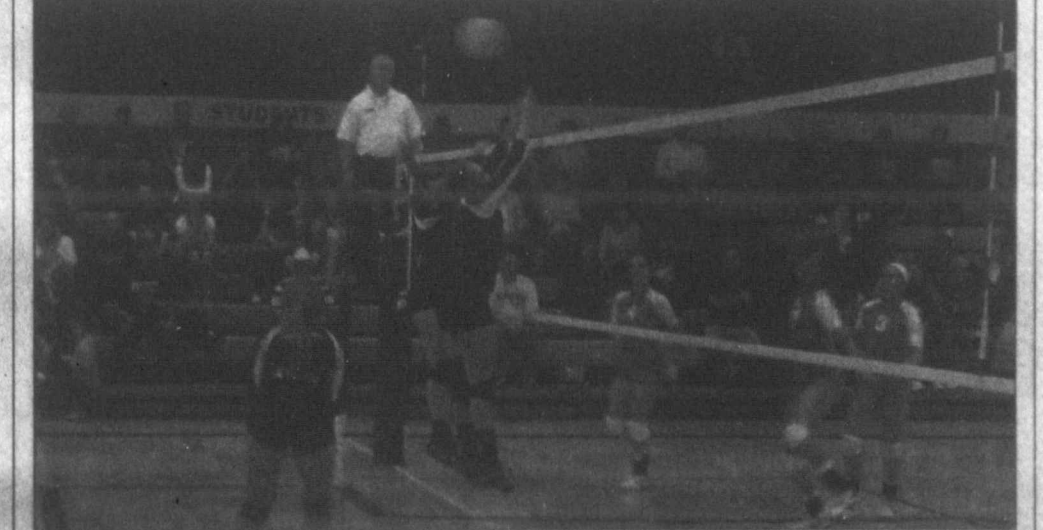

 This week is National Fire Prevention Week, and the Pampa Fire Department is busy making presentations around town on fire safety.

 "This week we're taking our engines to local schools, talking about fire prevention and showing the kids the equipment we use," said Michael Ryan, Fire Marshal with the Pampa Fire Department. Ryan said they will talk about fire safety around the house, including cooking safety and the stop, drop, and roll method. "They hear this program each year, but parents also should teach fire safety to their children," said Ryan. "The biggest thing we stress is if you have a fire in your home, get out and don't go back in. Have a fire escape plan and a meeting place," he added. Fire Prevention Week has been observed nationally since 1922 to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, which killed over 250 people, burned more than 2,000 acres and destroyed more than 17,400 structures over the course **PREVENTION** cont. on page 6

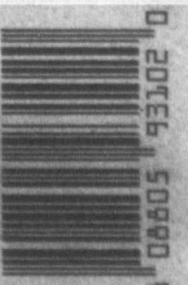



Kevin Lee Braddock, 49

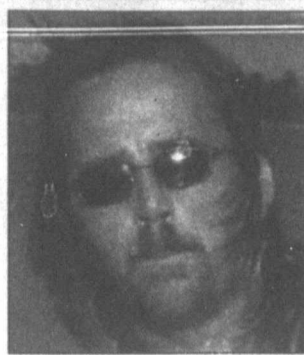
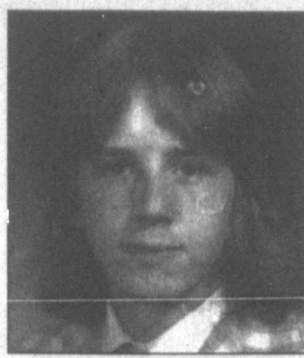
AMARILLO—Kevin Lee Braddock, 49, died October 8, 2011.

Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: I have always felt proud that I have never had any racist thoughts. Since the births of my three children, I have tried to instill in them that we are all God's children, no matter the color of our skin.

The problem is, my husband is a racist. He doesn't like anyone who isn't just like him. He makes rude and crude remarks in front of our kids, and I'm always trying to discredit his remarks so the kids won't end up with his bigoted way of thinking.

I have tried talking to my husband about it, but he doesn't seem to get it. How can I get through to him? — UNBIASED IN IDAHO

DEAR UNBIASED: You can't. His racism isn't rational. He learned it from the environment in which he was raised, as your children may if he continues.

In the time you knew your husband before you married him, I'm surprised that you didn't notice his racist beliefs. If you are truly as unbiased as you say, it seems to me that a couple of uncensored remarks from him would have killed the romance.

However, please don't give up the fight. Your children need to hear consistently that not all people feel

as your husband does.

DEAR ABBY: My father passed away six weeks ago. He and Mom were married 42 years. After his death, because my living situation was unhealthy, I moved back home with Mom.

Three weeks ago she began seeing an old boyfriend she had before she married Dad. I am the first to meet "Warren." Mom is keeping him a secret from my three siblings.

Warren has visited the house a few times during the day. He recently came for dinner and spent the night on the sofa in the living room. I was hurt and shocked by it. She could have at least told me he'd be staying.

I want to talk to her about this, but I don't know how. I want her to be happy, but Warren's here all the time now. Isn't it a little too soon? I miss my father. Mom hasn't considered my feelings or asked how I feel about this. I realize it's her house and she's an adult, but I can't help feeling disappointed and disrespected. — STILL MOURNING IN PENNSYLVANIA

DEAR STILL MOURNING:

Talk to your mother as one adult to another. Tell her you were shocked when Warren spent the night, and that his being there "all the

time" seems rushed so soon after your father's death. Tell her, too, that you feel that hiding him from your siblings is a mistake.

Then hear her out. This isn't about you. Your mother is an adult. She and Warren have some shared history, so it's not as if he's a complete stranger out of nowhere. While I agree that she would be wise to take things more slowly, this isn't our decision to make.

Sooner or later you may have to make some living arrangements of your own, so you can both move on with your lives. Start thinking about it now.

No appeal for 2 on death row

HOUSTON (AP) - The U.S. Supreme Court has refused appeals from two Texas death row inmates, including a Mexican national condemned for fatally shooting a security guard outside a Houston nightclub in 1994.

The high court, without comment Tuesday, declined to review the case of 35-year-old Felix Rocha. The Mexican man was 18 when he was arrested for the slaying of 32-year-old Raphael Fuentes. Rocha confessed to police that he was seeking revenge because of a previous fight with Fuentes.

The justices also have turned down the appeal of 28-year-old Beunka Adams. He was sentenced to die for fatally shooting a disabled man, Kenneth Vandever, in 2002 during a convenience store robbery in Rusk, in East Texas. Two women working at the store were abducted and shot. One was raped.

Company fined in tower deaths

COLBURN, Ind. (AP) - Indiana officials have fined a company \$91,500 for an April accident that killed two Texas men who were installing a radio tower in Tippecanoe County.

Twenty-nine-year-old Ernesto Garcia of Laredo, Texas, and 32-year-old Paul Aliff III of Mesquite, Texas, fell about 340 feet while working on a 500-foot-tall radio tower near Colburn. Both were working for ERI Inc.

The Indiana Occupational Safety and Health Administration says the workers weren't provided adequate fall protection, that a basket used to hoist personnel wasn't designed by a qualified person and that equipment load limits weren't properly marked.

ERI President Tom Silliman tells the Journal & Courier that some of the findings are incorrect. He declined comment until a revised report is issued.

The tower for WASK radio group has since been completed.

Some Texas lake levels up

BROWNWOOD (AP) - Recent rain has raised some Texas lake levels as the state still deals with drought.

Lake Brownwood on Tuesday was 1,410 feet above mean sea level.

The Brown County Water Improvement District this week was prepared to consider tighter water-use restrictions, but general manager Dennis Spinks says the action has been postponed.

Spinks says weekend rain, about 5 inches, raised Lake Brownwood by more than a foot and increased the area's water supply by several months.

Spinks on Monday told the Brownwood Bulletin that it "is a dent in the drought, but it is not a drought-breaker."

The Lower Colorado River Authority says the Lake Travis level rose by about a foot after the Austin area received more than 2 inches of rain last weekend.

County initiates dust control

LUBBOCK (AP) - Leaders of a West Texas county have agreed to spend up to \$12,000 to control dusty roads made worse by the lingering drought.

Nick Olenik, who's director of public works for Lubbock County, says it's the area's first effort in about 20 years to try to control road dust. Olenik on Monday provided details to commissioners, who approved the funds for dust control on two county roads.

Olenik told the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal that a water and magnesium chloride mixture will be applied to the roads. He says the goal is to prevent and reduce the release of airborne fine road material from the surface.

SA school employees resign

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Two top San Antonio school district employees have resigned after an internal investigation determined that they funneled about \$800,000 in federal funds to family members and others over at least three years.

Superintendent Robert Duron told the San Antonio Express-News Monday that Eduardo Elizondo, the senior director of federal programs for the district, and another employee guided professional development work to companies owned by their wives.

Duron said the payments in question didn't reach the threshold that would have required school board approval.

School board president James Howard told the newspaper that the district has notified the Texas Education Agency. He said the agency will guide the district in determining which vendor payments are legitimate and which may need to be paid back to the U.S. Department of Education.

Mexican Marines kill 11 in raids

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Mexican marines say they seized more than 4 tons of marijuana, arrested 36 cartel members and killed 11 others during five days of raids through the violent border state of Tamaulipas.

Those arrested include the alleged head of the Gulf Cartel in the town of Miguel Aleman, who was captured after a gunfight in which 10 cartel members died. The marijuana was found in two locations.

Marine spokesman Jose Luis Vergara said in a news conference Monday in Matamoros that marines also seized 251 hand grenades and 35 grenade launchers.

Teacher collapses at school, dies

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Administrators say a 23-year-old teacher in San Antonio has died after collapsing at school before classes began on Tuesday.

Counselors were on hand Tuesday at East Central High School following the death of Melinda Villegas. An autopsy has been ordered.

Officials say Villegas, who taught math, was with colleagues Monday morning in a work room when she collapsed.

A spokeswoman for the East Central Independent School District says Villegas was transported to a hospital, where she was declared dead. Stevie Gonzales says district officials had no information on whether Villegas had any medical issues.

Victorian chairs made in Boston

Q: Last December, you answered my question regarding the antique balloon back Victorian side chairs seen in this photo. When I wrote you, I failed to provide the name of the manufacturer of my chairs. Each has a label with the words "P. F. Packard & Sons -- Boston." You told me the estimated value would be around \$400 to \$500 each. I would like to know if being able to identify who and where my chairs were made would make them more valuable. Also, do you have any information on P.F. Packard & Sons?

A: The furniture factory of P.F. Packard & Sons was located at 56 Union and 43 Friend Street in Boston, around 1870. They are not a well-known furniture maker. Just about any antique that has a label or is marked can make a piece more valuable. Having said that, a piece of furniture marked and made by a relatively unknown manufacturer raises the value only modestly.

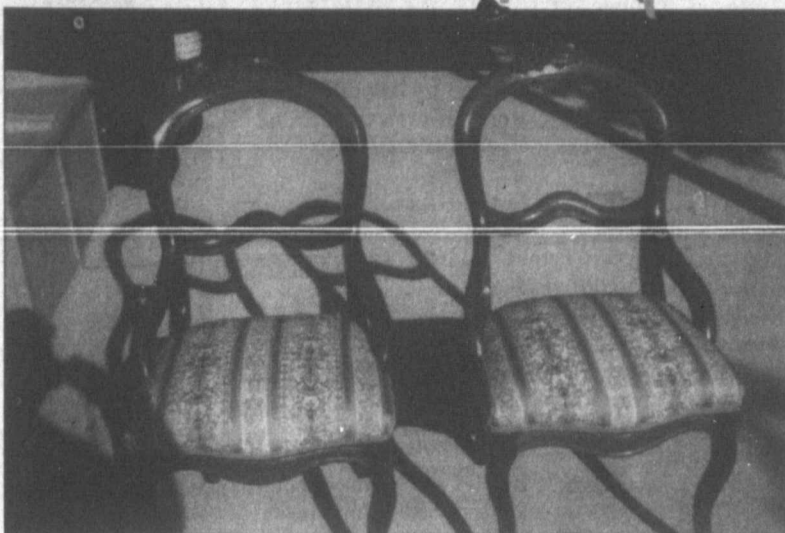

found on the bottom of a porcelain pitcher that I received from a friend. The pitcher stands around 8 inches tall and is decorated with multi-colored flowers. The handle and edge are embellished in gold.

I treasure my gift and would like to learn more about it.

A: Reinhold Schegelmilch used this mark around 1900. His factory was located in Suhl, Germany. R. S. Prussia porcelain has been sought by collectors for years. Schegelmilch produced porcelain in several areas, including Poland, Germany and Silesia.

Your pitcher would probably be worth \$350 to \$425.

Q: I have a question about a Red Wing pottery vase my mother found in an old house in 1934. It was dirty, but in perfect condi-

tion. It stands 12 inches tall, 6 inches wide and is decorated with a branch that has 7 leaves against a white glazed background. The inside is blue-green.

How much is it worth?

A: Red Wing Pottery was founded in Red Wing, Minn., in 1878. In the beginning, they made utilitarian ware that included crocks, stoneware jugs and canning jars. In the 1920s they introduced their art pottery lines. They also produced dinnerware. Red Wing Pottery closed operations in 1967.

Your vase would probably be worth \$75 to \$125.

Texas schools sue state over fairness of funding

AUSTIN (AP) - A coalition of Texas school districts have sued the state, arguing the school finance system is unfair, inefficient and unconstitutional, according to the filing announced Tuesday.

Plaintiffs say a "patchwork" funding system that has been cobbled together over the last several years doesn't treat Texas school children or taxpayers fairly.

The lawsuit, which is expected to be the first of many, was filed by the Texas Taxpayer and Student Fairness Coalition, which represents more than 150 Texas school districts. The suit also names seven school districts as plaintiffs.

It's the first lawsuit since lawmakers slashed \$4 billion in public school funding over the summer.

"Succeeding in this lawsuit and attaining an equitable school finance system would enhance our ability to close the achievement gap and offer more educational opportunities for our students," said Robert Duron, San Antonio superintendent. "There is still debate about how to measure the adequacy of the system, but I have no doubt that our current funding system is inequitable."

The lawsuit asks the court to declare that the state's school finance system violates the Texas Constitution.

The lawsuit has been brewing for months. Plaintiffs had hoped the Legislature would address the school funding system during its most recent legislative session. But facing a \$27 billion budget shortfall, the Republican-controlled Legislature approved \$4 billion in cuts to schools in June, the first decrease in per-

student spending in Texas since World War II.

Lauren Cook, a spokeswoman for the Equity Center, which is organizing the coalition, said plaintiffs hope a trial court rules in time to give guidance to lawmakers before they meet for the next regular legislative session in 2013.

The school districts selected to file the suit were Hillsboro, Hutto, Nacogdoches, Pflugerville, San Antonio, Taylor and Van.

Among the defendants named in the suit is Texas Education Agency Commissioner Robert Scott. A spokeswoman for the TEA did not immediately return calls seeking comment.

Today is Wednesday, Oct. 12, the 285th day of 2011. There are 80 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Oct. 12, 1492 (according to the Old Style calendar), Christopher Columbus arrived with his expedition in the present-day Bahamas.

On this date:

In 1810, the German festival Oktoberfest was first held in Munich to celebrate the wedding of Bavarian Crown Prince Ludwig and Princess Therese of Saxe-Hildburghausen.

In 1861, the Confederate ironclad Manassas attacked the northern ship Richmond on the Mississippi River. (Both ships were badly damaged, but survived the battle.)

In 1870, General Robert E. Lee died in Lexington, Va., at age 63.

In 1915, English nurse Edith Cavell was executed by the Germans in occupied Belgium during World War I.

In 1933, bank robber John Dillinger escaped from a jail in Allen County, Ohio, with the help of his gang, who killed the sheriff, Jess Sarber.

In 1942, during World War II, American naval forces defeated the Japanese in the Battle of Cape Esperance.

In 1971, the rock opera "Jesus Christ Superstar" opened at the Mark Hellinger Theatre on Broadway.

In 1986, the superpower meeting in Reykjavik, Iceland, ended in stalemate, with President Ronald Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev unable to agree on arms control or a date for a full-fledged summit in the United States.

In 2000, 17 sailors were killed in a suicide bomb attack on the destroyer USS Cole in Yemen.

In 2002, a bomb blamed on Islamic militants destroyed a nightclub on the Indonesian island of Bali, killing 202 people, many of them foreign tourists.

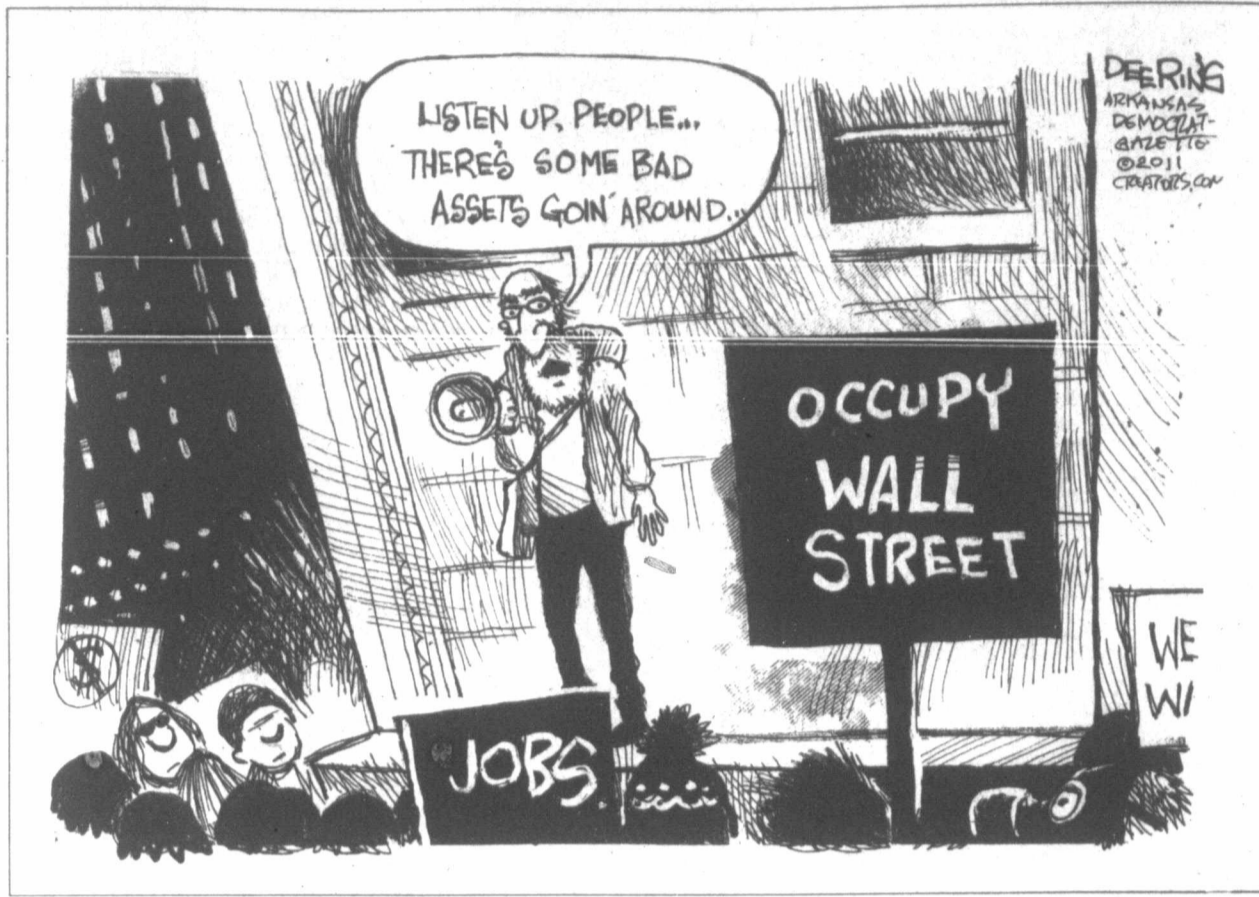

It's downright disgusting to listen to conservative and Republican lawmakers, presidential candidates, business owners and media commentators use such vitriol to describe the Occupy Wall Street protesters as being un-American individuals hell-bent on destroying America.

How in the world can anyone even form his lips to say such a thing when this very country was founded on the basis of dissent? Self-appointed rodeo clown Glenn Beck castigates the Occupy Wall Street protesters, but he's always running off at the mouth about the Founding Fathers and how brilliant they were.

Without dissent and protest, there is no United States of America! It's as if these folks never picked up a history book to understand how this nation was formed. The very notion of a United States started with someone saying, writing and screaming, "Enough is enough!" More and more early settlers became enraged with the heavy-handed actions of the British, and that's what put us on the path to the American Revolution.

Do any of these so-called strict constructionists even read the very U.S. Constitution they love to wave in the faces of their critics? Remember all of those political voices that championed the people of Iran taking to the streets to protest? How about Tunisia? Egypt? Libya? Bahrain? What would this world be without protest?

We would have never seen freedom in Eastern Europe were it not without the people there, in the words of civil rights activist Fannie Lou Hamer, being "sick and tired of being sick and tired." Praise God that the children of South Africa, led by the African National Congress, didn't ignore the calls of history. If so, Nelson Mandela would be dying in jail and freedom would have never ended Apartheid.

The U.S. would not have been forced to make reality the very principles cited in the Declaration of Independence and treat every human being as equals were it not for the Civil Rights Movement. Those brave men, women and children chose not to accept the status quo, and this nation — and, yes, the world — is much better off because they did.

As a supporter of Occupy Wall Street, I understand fully the sentiment being expressed: Massive corporate greed has devastated the wages of the common worker, and the pay of a horde on Wall Street has gone into the stratosphere while creating nothing tangible. It's immoral and obscene.

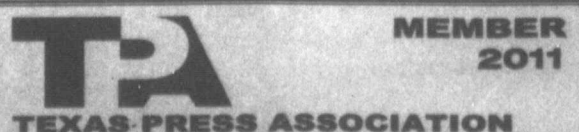

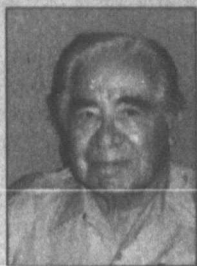

got very excited and got a doll pattern," said White.

Since then, her dolls have toured with traveling "trunk shows," winning her a Curator's Choice award. She has also taught a class on how to make dolls.

White picked up quilting after college, and was also influenced by her mother and aunts' sewing and beadwork, but most of what she does now has been self-taught.

"I tend to pick up books and read, and then when I'm not pleased with how I got it done, I go looking for what I could have done to make it better, (and) if there's a technique out there I don't know about, and I will research it. When something sparks and I get excited about (something), I get a little obsessed with it," she said with a laugh.

The materials White uses play a huge part in leading her to the final result.

"Sometimes the pattern inspires me, but sometimes it's the fabric that does it, because I do love working with the

fabrics. And then sometimes it's the hair, whatever I decide to use for the hair," she said.

"When it's an interesting fabric, there's not a lot else to do. It kind of carries the doll all by itself," White added.

She also tries to go with the flow, and avoids sticking to her initial vision of what she wants the doll to look like if she comes up with a better idea.

"It's kind of like getting dressed in the morning. You put it together and go, that just doesn't work," White said. "So you know when you look at them whether it works or not, whether the hair is too much or too little, or whether it needs earrings."

White recommends beginners check out online classes or books on the subject.

"The more you read up on it and the more doll artists you meet, you learn little tricks about it," she said.

White plans to show some of her dolls and other artwork in an upcoming show in Midland.

Oil workers describe being stranded on Gulf of Mexico

HOUSTON (AP)—When waves as high as 40 feet disabled the 94-foot research vessel Jeremy Parfait and nine other oil workers were on in the Gulf of Mexico last month, he knew there was only one place they could go — into the water.

Their boat, which normally would be elevated above the water by several metal legs, had toppled in the tropical storm and was floating helplessly, beaten by waves and wind. The 10 men jumped into the Gulf and clung to a 6-foot-by-3-foot raft.

"We know we don't want to go in that water. I can see it in their eyes. They are scared to death. They don't want to go in that water. I don't want to go in that water," said Parfait, the boat's captain.

Parfait, 39, and Ted Derise Jr., 32, told The Associated Press on Friday that the ordeal was a nightmare in which they saw friends and co-workers slowly die. The workers abandoned their vessel Sept. 8 about eight miles off shore from Frontera in the southeastern Mexican state of Tabasco. It was nearly four days before they were rescued. Three died in the water, and a fourth died later at a hospital.

As the men floated, Mexico's state oil company, Petroleos Mexicanos, or Pemex, and the Mexican navy mounted a nearly 10,000-square-mile search by air and sea. Most were found just before noon Sept. 11 about 50 miles off the coast of the Mexican state of Campeche.

Derise and Parfait, who are from

Louisiana, said they were pushed to the breaking point but never lost hope they would be rescued.

"When we hit the water, I kept telling them, 'They are going to come find us,'" Parfait said.

Along with Derise and Parfait, four Mexican oil workers and a Bangladeshi were rescued alive. Craig Myers, 32, and Nicholas Reed, 31, both from Louisiana, were found dead. The Bangladeshi man, Nadimuzzman Khan, later died of exposure in a Mexican hospital. The body of another worker, Aaron Houweling of Australia, who had floated away earlier, was found three days later.

Parfait said that when he realized they would have to abandon their vessel, a liftboat called the Trinity II, he wasn't worried because a standby ship about three miles away could come and get the workers. But he said that ship and another one that was also nearby never came.

Parfait, Derise and the family of Myers have filed a federal lawsuit in Houston against the companies involved in the operation, claiming they were abandoned. The companies being sued, including Geokinetics Inc., a Houston-based company that provides seismic data to the oil and gas industry; Trinity Liftboat Services, a Louisiana-based company that operated the liftboat and that Parfait and Derise work for, did not return telephone calls seeking comment Friday night.

Fatheree said it was exciting to see some of the reserves play.

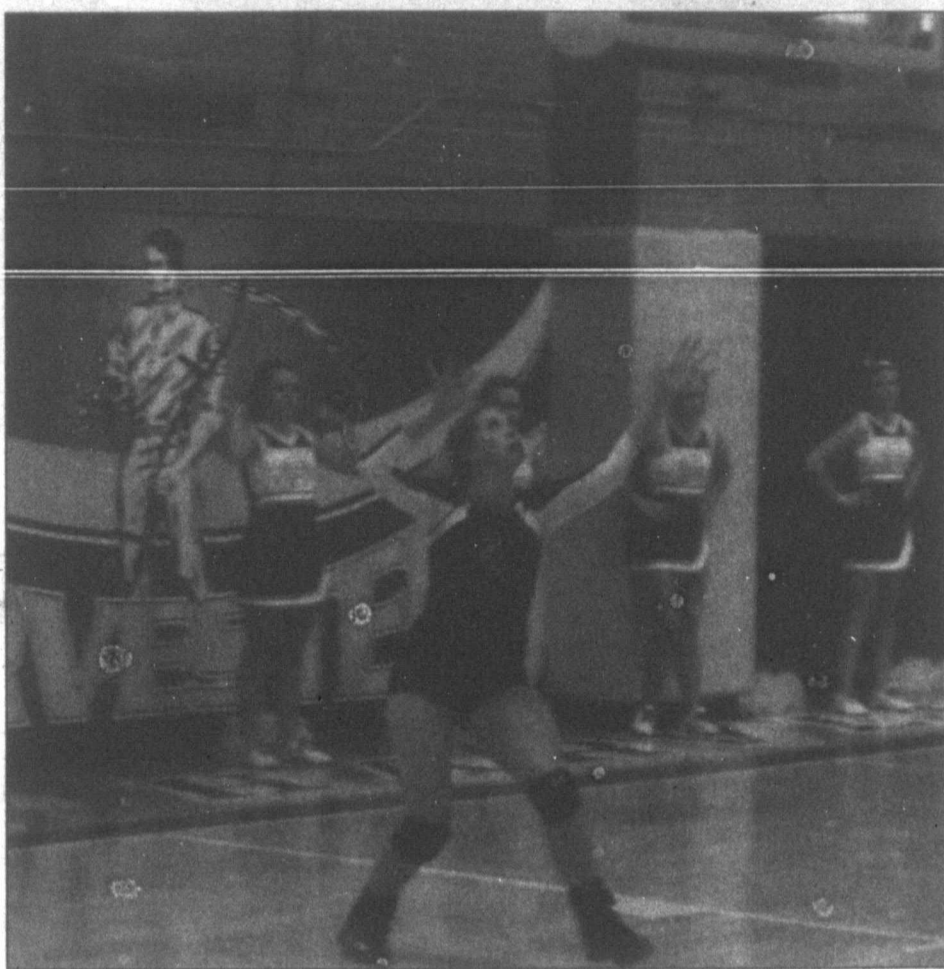
"They like playing and deserve to get in too," Fatheree said.

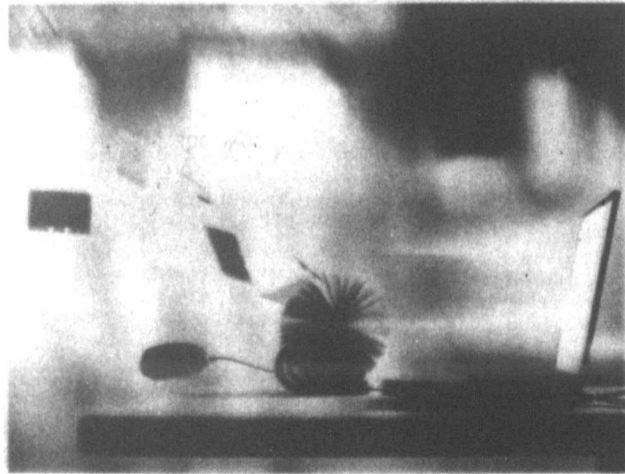
