City gives preliminary OK to airport grant

 City commissioners took the county a step closer to rebuilding the Pampa Area Airport Aviation Administrative Building by giving preliminary approval to a \$300,000 grant from the Pampa Economic Development Corporation to Gray County for the project.

Advocates of the building's construction believe it will build a positive impression of Pampa for visitors.
 "When we build this new facility, we want people to see us as a progressive community, not as a stagnant community, (but) a community that's looking forward to the future," said Judge Richard Peet of Gray County. "And because this facility is so old, and because of the high traffic that we do have, I want them

to have an impression that Pampa and Gray County is a place to be, a place with a future."
 The new terminal will cost an estimated \$629,000, receiving \$300,000 from the Aviation Division of the Texas Department of Transportation in addition to the PEDC grant. The county will cover the additional cost of the project, including removing the current building.
 If the project receives a second

favorable vote from the commission, construction will begin in March, with completion of the building expected in nine months.
 The larger facility will include a private lounge, conference room and a larger area for flight planning.
 In other business, the commission:

Superintendent Haenisch to retire after year

Pampa Independent School District Superintendent Barry Haenisch will retire at the end of the 2011-2012 school year.

 Haenisch, 62, has presided as superintendent over the PISD for the last nine years. His 41-year educational career began in 1971 as a sixth grade social studies teacher in Van Horn, and included stops as a teacher in Menard, McCamey and Gruver.
 In Gruver, he became a high school principal in 1987 and a superintendent in 1992. After a seven-year stint as Gruver's superintendent, he moved on to Merkel for four years before coming to Gray County and taking over at the PISD.
 The decision to retire, Haenisch said, was not a sudden one.
 "The board and I started planning four years ago for this," Haenisch said. "I had a four-year contract, and four years ago, I told the board not to extend the contract. I wanted **HAENISCH cont. on page 2**

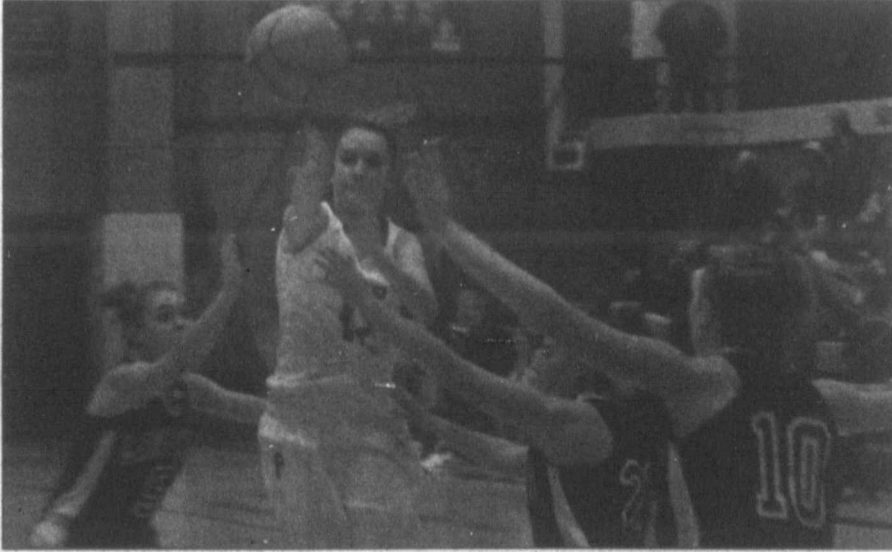

Commission lets workers carry

AUSTIN (AP) — The Railroad Commission of Texas has voted to allow employees to pack a weapon while carrying out agency business.

Spokesman Casey Haney said the commission on Tuesday approved a policy change that will allow workers who can legally carry a concealed handgun in Texas to have their weapons on the job.

Commissioner Barry Smitherman says employees often work alone in desolate areas where they could encounter criminals or dangerous wild animals.

The commission's primary purpose is to approve and oversee the permitting of oil and gas wells. It has no oversight of railroads.

Texas has one of the more liberal concealed handgun laws in the country. Residents who carry a license are also allowed to bring weapons into the state Capitol. License carriers can bypass metal detectors at the entrance.

Seven hospitalized after crash

CORSICANA (AP) — Authorities say a collision between a small school bus and an SUV has sent seven people to a hospital and left the district vehicle on its side.

Corsicana police Chief Randy Bratton says the school bus failed to yield the right of way Tuesday morning.

A Corsicana Independent School District spokesman told The Associated Press that all five special-needs students and the bus driver were transported to a hospital, as a precaution.

Authorities say the SUV driver later complained of pain and also went to the hospital.

Police say the injuries are not believed to be life-threatening.

The accident happened around 7:15 a.m. Tuesday as the students were being transported to school in Corsicana, located 50 miles southeast of Dallas.

Voters to decide on can ban

NEW BRAUNFELS (AP) — Ban the can, or can the ban?

That's what New Braunfels voters were deciding Tuesday after a new ordinance prohibiting beer cans and other disposable containers on the Guadalupe and Comal rivers — two popular Texas getaways during the scorching summers — riled partygoers and set off a backlash led by local businesses.

The ballot referendum will either uphold or reject a ban passed in August by the New Braunfels City Council. Supporters say the ban is needed to protect the rivers from trash, while opponents argue the measure will drive away tourists and be a drag on the local economy.

The issue has divided New Braunfels and attracted unusually high voter turnout. More than 5,000 residents cast their ballot in early voting — double the votes cast in May when three city council seats were up for grabs.

The ban would take effect Jan. 1. Under the ordinance, violators could be fined upward of \$500 for having disposable containers on the river.

Second brother jailed for fraud

TYLER, Texas (AP) — An East Texas man will follow his brother to prison over credit card fraud involving numbers stolen online and from a restaurant.

Federal prosecutors in Tyler on Tuesday announced Nathan Michael of Malakoff has been sentenced to more than four years in prison.

Michael in May pleaded guilty to access device fraud. He also was ordered Monday to repay more than \$95,000.

His brother, Christopher Michael, pleaded guilty in May to access device fraud and was later sentenced to four years in prison, plus must make restitution.

Elizabeth Pickrell, who worked at a Chicken Express in Tyler, pleaded guilty in April to access device fraud and was later sentenced to two years in prison. Charge card numbers were stolen from the restaurant.

A fourth person in the scam awaits sentencing.

Cycle failure led to rider's death

FORT WORTH (AP) — An organizer has blamed mechanical failure for a wreck that led to a motorcycle stunt rider's death after a crash during practice for an exhibition at Texas Motor Speedway.

Jim McNeil of Phoenix died Sunday at a Fort Worth hospital.

Tour manager Cory Stem with Freestylemx.com said Monday that the company determined unknown mechanical failure caused the accident.

Stem told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram that McNeil came up short on the landing. Witnesses had heard the engine running poorly.

Antique mugs still stir up a lather

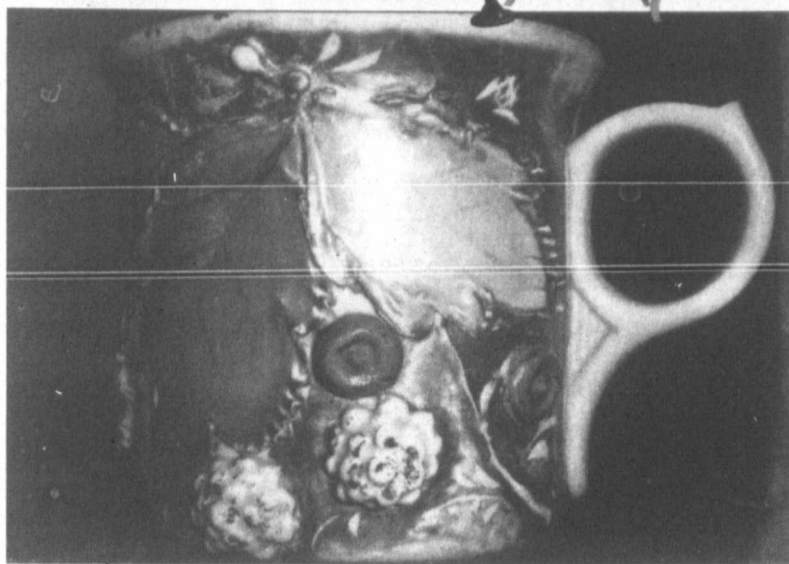
Q: This shaving mug has been in our family since the early 1950s. It is marked on the bottom with the word and number "Germany — 99." The multi-colored flowers are in relief against a heavily embellished gold background. We also still have the shaving brush that came with it. The mug was given to my dad, who was a painter and paperhanger, by the owners of a home he was working in.

Any information you can provide on the history of our mug will be appreciated.

A: Shaving mugs were used in the 1800s and early 1900s. Many were made in Germany and exported to the United States. Without a manufacturer's mark, it can be impossible to identify the actual maker. "Ninety-nine" is a design number. Both antique shaving mugs and brushes are very popular collectibles.

Your vintage shaving mug and brush can be seen selling in antiques shops in the range of \$50 to \$75.

What can you tell me about my pitcher?

A: Homer Laughlin China Co. made your pitcher. The company was founded in East Liverpool, Ohio, in 1877 and continues today to successfully produce china. Semi vitreous china is ironstone and used for dinnerware and wash sets. Although the mark you enclosed is blurry, it is an eagle attacking a lion. It was used from 1897 to 1905. "Colonial" is the name of the pattern.

Your pitcher would probably be worth \$25 to \$35.

Q: I have two Ted Kennedy stuffed bears that were made for his 1980 presidential campaign. Each bear is approximately 18 inches tall, stuffed with plush fabric and

has a life-like, soft vinyl face. It is in mint condition. The bears have tags with the words "Teddy Bears — 1980 — A Unique Collectible." California Stuffed Toys made them.

What are they worth?

A: The bears were marketed during Ted Kennedy's unsuccessful, 1980 campaign for the Democratic nomination for president, when he ran against Jimmy Carter. In the past few years, their value has skyrocketed and then plummeted. At one point, the value was in the upper hundreds. Currently, they are available on the Internet for \$75 to \$100.

Today is Wednesday, Nov. 9, the 313th day of 2011. There are 52 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 9, 1965, the great Northeast blackout occurred as a series of power failures lasting up to 13½ hours left 30 million people in seven states and part of Canada without electricity.

On this date:

In 1872, fire destroyed nearly 800 buildings in Boston.

In 1918, it was announced that Germany's Kaiser Wilhelm II would abdicate. He then fled to the Netherlands.

In 1938, Nazis looted and burned synagogues as well as Jewish-owned stores and houses in Germany and Austria in a pogrom that became known as "Kristallnacht."

In 1953, Welsh author-poet Dylan Thomas died in New York at age 39.

In 1961, U.S. Air Force Maj. Robert M. White became the first pilot to fly an X-15 rocket plane at six times the speed of sound. The Beatles' future manager, Brian Epstein, first saw the group perform at The Cavern Club in Liverpool, England.

In 1963, twin disasters struck Japan as some 450 miners were killed in a coal-dust explosion, and about 160 people died in a train crash.

In 1967, a Saturn V rocket carrying an unmanned Apollo spacecraft blasted off from Cape Kennedy on a successful test flight.

In 1970, former French President Charles de Gaulle died at age 79.

In 1989, communist East Germany threw open its borders, allowing citizens to travel freely to the West; joyous Germans danced atop the Berlin Wall.

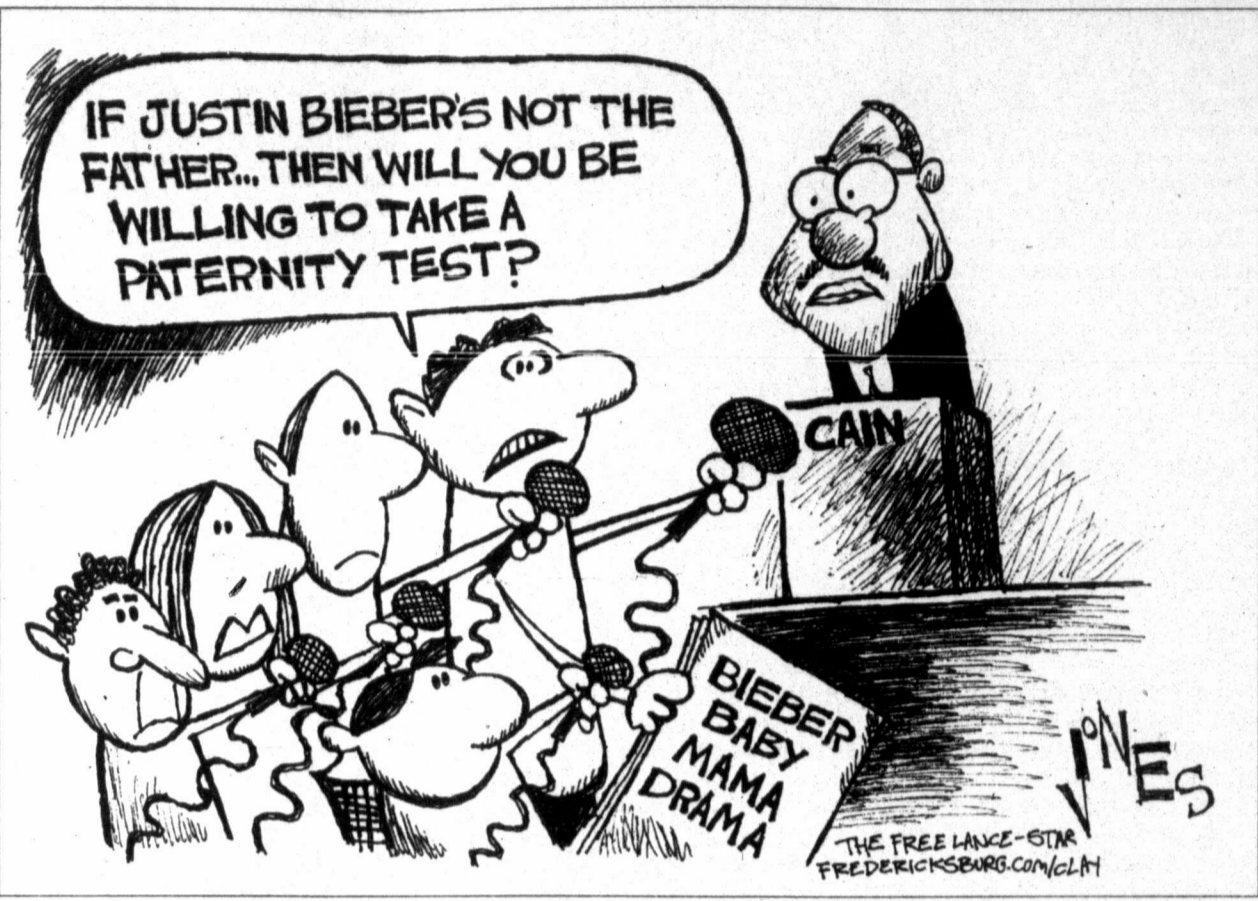
Ten years ago: The northern alliance proclaimed victory over the Taliban in the city of Mazar-e-Sharif, the most significant prize in northern Afghanistan.

Five years ago: Republican Senator George Allen conceded defeat in the Virginia Senate race to Democrat Jim Webb, sealing the Democrats' control of Congress.

One year ago: Continuing his Asia tour, President Barack Obama flew from India to Indonesia, his home for four years of his youth. A special prosecutor cleared the CIA's former top clandestine officer and others of any charges for destroying agency videotapes showing waterboarding of terror suspects, but continued an investigation into whether the harsh questioning went beyond legal boundaries.

The high-tech lynching of Herman Cain

No one who followed politics 20 years ago will forget the night when Clarence Thomas sent an electric charge through a Senate hearing room. As liberal Democrats pushed the unproven sexual harassment charges of Anita Hill, in an attempt to destroy Thomas's chance to serve on the Supreme Court, Thomas called them out for conducting a national disgrace. "This is a high-tech lynching for uppity blacks who in any way deign to think for themselves."

This line packed a wallop because Hill's charges were about as proven as the old charges of perverted indecency against white women that were concocted by racists. Whether her claims were true or not was utterly irrelevant to liberals. All that mattered was that Thomas be ruined and that black conservatives be denied a role model so prominent and so accomplished.

Twenty years later, it sounds like an echo. Once again, the liberal media have provided an unproven charge (of unknown severity) of sexual harassment, filed by two anonymous women who allegedly settled complaints with the National Restaurant Association in 1999. The newspaper Politico offered an incredibly vague story that somehow required four reporters to compile.

This is how vague the claims were, which Politico rushed to publish. They assert there were "conversations allegedly filled with innuendo or personal questions of a sexually suggestive nature," and also, "descriptions of physical gestures that were not overtly sexual" but made women uncomfortable. What does all this mean? At least in Hill's case, she was making wacky but specific charges about Long Dong Silver. But who cares? All that matters is that Cain's presidential campaign is ruined, just as it reached its height. Black conservatives must be denied a

role model this prominent and successful.

Within two days, NBC's Ann Curry was leading off the "Today" show with this thermal question about Cain: "Will the controversy and his reaction to it

derail his presidential campaign?" Is this a high-tech lynching because Cain is a conservative black? Just examine how white liberals are treated. Not only do liberal media outlets fail to break these stories, they refuse even to demand the questions be answered.

Cain is only one contender in the 2012 Republican field. Bill Clinton was president of the United States when he was charged with three separate sexual allegations. But from Monday morning through Thursday morning, ABC, CBS and NBC ran 50 stories on the allegations against Cain. Now, let's compare.

In 1994, when Paula Jones publicly, at a national press conference for God's sakes, accused President Clinton of exposing himself while demanding oral sex — something no one accuses Cain of doing — CBS and NBC completely ignored her press conference. ABC gave it just 16 seconds.

When Kathleen Willey accused Bill Clinton in 1997 of sexually groping her in the Oval Office when he was president — another woman coming forward publicly with a charge far more serious than anything even suggested about Cain — the networks ran a grand total of three stories, the longest of which was just 1 minute.

And in the first five days after the publication of the 1999 Wall Street Journal column in which Juanita Broaddrick reluctantly came for-

ward and charged the President with a bloody rape, the number of news stories totaled to three.

So it's maddening when someone like Tom Brokaw goes on MSNBC and insists that Herman Cain should be laying everything out on the table: "I would think that he would be eager to get the details out as quickly as possible, if he's as innocent as he has described himself in all of this."

That's not how Brokaw felt about Paula Jones's sexual harassment charges against Bill Clinton. On CNBC in 1994, he dismissed that story. "It didn't seem to most people, entirely relevant to what was going on at the time. These are the kind of charges raised about the President before. They had been played out in the Jennifer Flowers episode." Brokaw surely knew the difference between the consensual sex with Flowers and the sexual harassment of Jones.

Brokaw didn't demand that Clinton "should be eager to get the details out as quickly as possible" about Jones ... or about Willey ... or even about the rape charges of Broaddrick. Clinton wouldn't even deny the rape charge. He only said he would refer "all future questions to be answered by my attorneys." But Tom Brokaw deliberately never filed a single story on Broaddrick's charges on his "NBC Nightly News" program — even though the break-through interview was broadcast on "Dateline NBC!"

These windbags should spare us the lectures about how Cain really needs to submit to more media interrogations while they have protected white liberals from charges that are much more egregious. Their only interest in this matter is not in creating news, but in destroying Herman Cain.

Early turnovers doom Lady Harvesters against Wildcats

The Pampa Lady Harvesters have had only one practice with their full team, as three of their players who played volleyball returned on Monday. Tuesday night against the 1A Division 1 No. 14 Canadian Lady Wildcats it showed in a 61-43 loss at McNeely Fieldhouse.

Canadian (1-0) was able to take advantage of seven first quarter turnovers that helped it go on an 11-0 run to distance itself from Pampa. Head coach Gene Valentine said his defense wasn't aggressive enough and his team struggled offensively.

"We went straight man (defense) and picked up the game a little bit," Valentine said. "We had a couple of breakdowns in transition here and there."

The loss was Pampa's tenth straight at home. Senior Delaney Clendening said only having one practice with the whole team wasn't an excuse.

"We've been playing together for eight years," Clendening said. "We should have played better together."

Seniors Kirsten Kuhn, Caitlin Sieck and Kailyn Troxell, who returned from volleyball, came off the bench. Sieck said she played OK but had to adjust to the conditioning.

"(Basketball) was way faster and a different kind of in-shape," Sieck said. "It was all right. I didn't feel like I was too far out of shape."

The Lady Wildcats led 23-11 after the first quarter. Marci Merkel helped Canadian pull away with three three-pointers. The Lady Harvesters' only lead was 4-2. Canadian responded with a 10-0 run to take the lead for good.

The Lady Wildcats led by as many as 18 in the first half. Pampa rallied at the end of the half and cut the lead to 31-20 at halftime. Clendening led the Lady Harvesters' offense with 11 points.

Canadian made a Lady Harvester comeback impossible in the third quarter with a 17-2 run. Autumn Chidester paced the Lady Wildcats' offense in the second half scoring 13 of her 24 points. The Lady Wildcats led 48-28 after the third. Pampa didn't get closer than nine. Clendening led the team in points with 13, rebounds with 8 and assists with four. Kuhn contributed 10 points off the bench (with eight coming in the fourth quarter), three rebounds and two assists.

Chidester led the Lady Wildcats in scoring with 24 and in rebounds with six. Chidester and Annie Alexander led the team in assists with four each.

Valentine said he was pleased with the effort.

"We just have to learn what those little mistakes are and we will be fine," Valentine said. "If we play with the same energy and effort, a lot of good things could happen."

Clendening said they have to get off to a better start.

"We have to be patient with our offense," Clendening said. "Our defense was good in the scrimmage. I don't know what happened in the first quarter and last quarter here."

The Lady Harvesters (0-1) travel to Frenship for a tournament starting Thursday and ending Saturday. Sieck said it will help them to prepare for district.

"It will get us back into the swing of things," Sieck said.

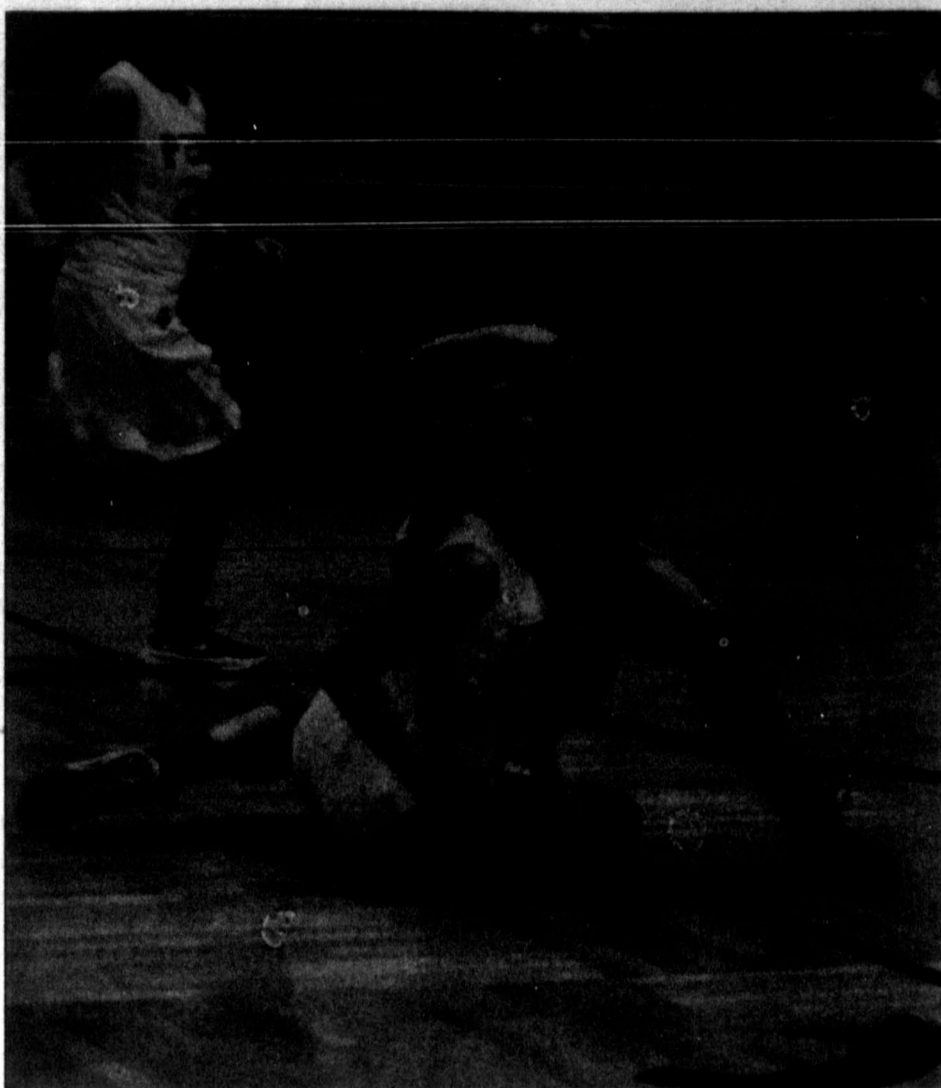

Cowboys' rookie tailback Murray improves running attack

IRVING, Texas (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys like their chances of making a serious run at the playoffs despite their 4-4 record, and that's not just because of how soft their upcoming schedule appears to be.

Some optimism is based on the recent play of running back DeMarco Murray, and how the rookie's success is affecting quarterback Tony Romo.

Murray rushed for 139 yards on 22 carries and caught four passes for 47 more yards in Sunday's 23-13 home win over Seattle.

An improved running game created more offensive balance against

Seattle, helping Romo go 19 for 31 for 279 yards and two touchdowns. What's more, Romo wasn't guilty of an interception and wasn't sacked.

Murray has shown that his club-record 253-yard output in his first extended play against St. Louis was no fluke. When Felix Jones returns from a high ankle sprain, Jones could wind up as Murray's backup.

The news for the Cowboys from Sunday wasn't all good. Wide receiver Miles Austin left in the second quarter with a right hamstring injury and didn't return. Austin is expected to be out for as long as a month.

Missing all of last Sunday's game with injuries were linebacker Sean Lee (left wrist), punter Mat McBriar (left foot), cornerback Mike Jenkins (right hamstring) and Jones.

Coach Jason Garrett said he was "hopeful" McBriar and Jones would be available for Sunday's home game against Buffalo.

Rookie punter Chris Jones was signed off the

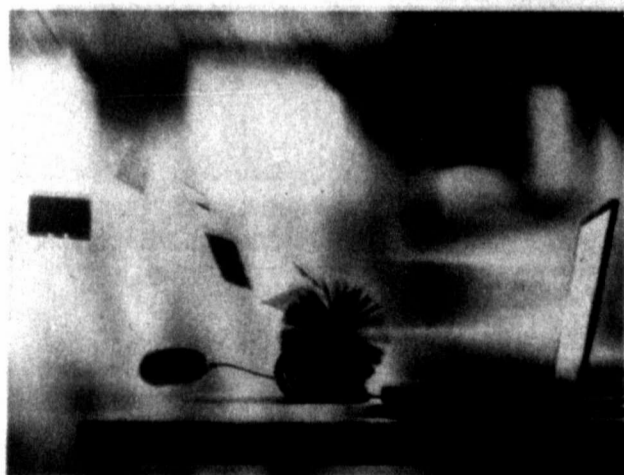
practice squad for the Seattle game, averaging 43 yards on four punts.

Austin won't be back anytime soon, sidelined by the latest in a series of hamstring problems that

have plagued him throughout his six-year career.

With Austin out, more will be expected from wide receivers Dez Bryant, Laurent Robinson and Kevin Ogletree.

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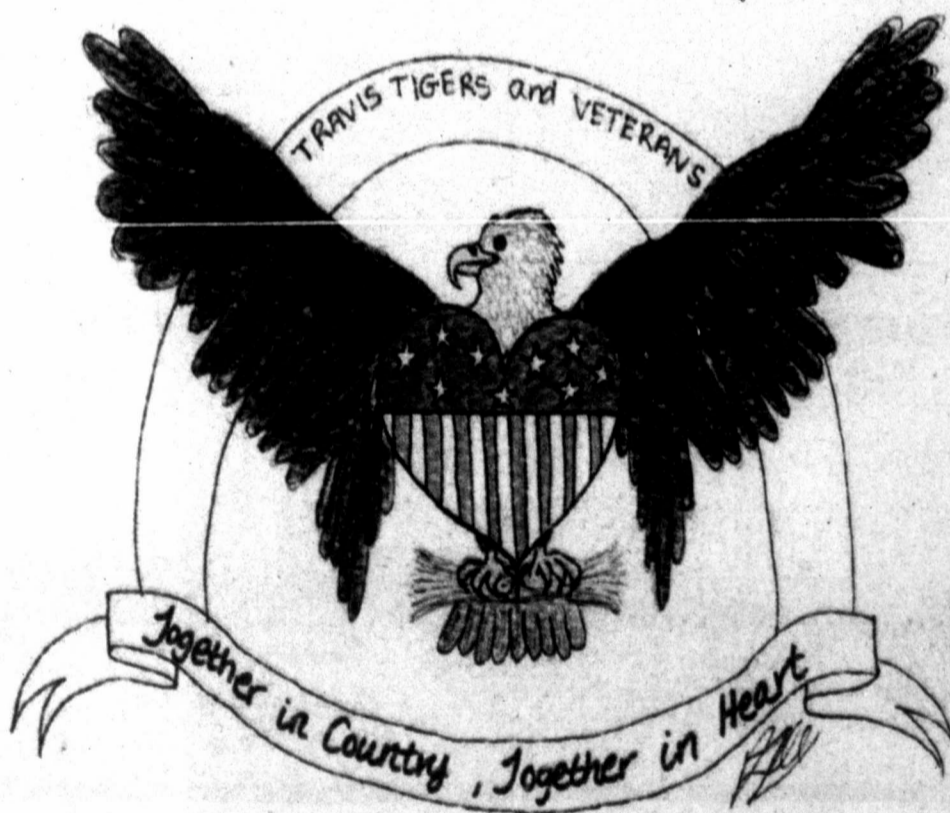
