Shooting sends man to hospital

A Pampa man was brought to an Amarillo hospital after sustaining an injury from a gunshot wound late Saturday evening.

Ernesto Portillo, 23, was taken by ambulance to Northwest Texas Hospital due to an incident that occurred shortly before midnight, according to Pampa Police Department Crime Prevention Officer Stormy McCullar.

Pampa PD officers responded to a call to the 1100 block of Kingsmill at about 11:13 p.m. Saturday and found an injured Portillo. The police are currently looking at a suspect, McCullar said, but no arrest has been made

McCullar said that, as of 12:50 a.m. Sunday, Portillo was still in the hospital and was conscious, talking and in stable condition.

Brian Scifres, 25, has been a part of volunteer fire departments since he was fresh out of high school.

"I joined the fire department when I turned 18 in Stamford, (and was) there about a year and a half," he said.

In 2005, Scifres moved to Haskell and joined the volunteer fire department there. He was there about five years before coming to Pampa.

"I moved to Pampa in 2009, and was on the (Hoover Volunteer) Fire Department ever since," he said. Scifres works with his father, Claude,

who is also a firefighter, serving with the Pampa Fire Department. "My dad owns Pampa Fire

Extinguisher Service, and I work for him. We just go out and service the fire extinguishers everywhere," he said. Scifres has been working on develop-



ing his firefighting skills for the past seven years.

"(At first), I didn't get to do a lot, because when I first started, I was the new one, but as I grew older with the fire department, I got to do more and


more," he said. Training classes with the Hoover Fire Department have been helpful for Scifres in gaining his firefighting certi-

Quake strikes near San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — An earthquake with a magnitude of 3.3 struck a rural area south of San Antonio. No one was injured.

The San Antonio Express-News, citing the U.S. Geological Survey, reported that the quake hit about 4:35 a.m. Saturday. Its epicenter was about 33 miles southeast of the city.

Last month, a record-breaking earthquake of 4.8 magnitude shook South Texas and became the largest earthquake on record for the area, surpassing a magnitude-4.3 shock recorded in 1993.

A September earthquake in West Texas had a 4.4 magnitude and was centered just north of Abilene.

The largest Texas quake occurred in 1931 when a magnitude-5.8 temblor struck near Big Bend. Adobe buildings were severely damaged and brick chimneys toppled, but there were no deaths.

2 more aftershocks in Okla.

MEEKER, Okla. (AP) — The U.S. Geological Survey has recorded two more aftershocks following a 5.6 magnitude earthquake that struck central Oklahoma

Geophysicist Paul Caruso says a 3.0 magnitude quake was recorded near Meeker at 3:49 a.m. Sunday. That came after a 2.2 magnitude quake that was recorded in the same area at 3:01 a.m. Sunday.

No injuries or significant damage was reported. The quakes are among several aftershocks recorded by the U.S.G.S. following a 5.6 magnitude earthquake that struck on Nov. 5 and was centered near Sparks about 10 miles north of Sunday's quakes.

The Nov. 5 quake damaged dozens of homes and toppled a tower at a building on the campus of St. Gregory's University in Shawnee — but no serious injuries were reported.

Ex-mayor moves to Dallas

DETROIT (AP) — Former Detroit Mayor Kwame Kilpatrick has moved into a \$309,950 home in Texas, raising questions about the small restitution payments he's making to the city.

Kilpatrick pleaded guilty to obstruction of justice and resigned from office as part of a plea deal in 2008. A judge found he had lied at a civil trial in a lawsuit that cost Detroit \$8.4 million.

The former mayor has been ordered to pay the city \$1 million and still owes more than \$860,000. He went to jail in May 2010 for failing to disclose assets that could have reduced that amount.

The Detroit News says Kilpatrick is now making restitution payments of \$160 a month.

A Kilpatrick attorney, Daniel Hajji, says it's not clear how much the ex-mayor is paying in rent. .

Southwest opens new routes

DALLAS (AP) — Southwest Airlines Co. and its AirTran subsidiary are adding new routes next year including additional foreign destinations.

The airline said Sunday that AirTran Airways will add nonstop flights between Fort Lauderdale, Fla., and San Juan, Puerto Rico, and will add routes to Mexico from has heavily reduced its have a regulatory structure both San Antonio, Texas, and Orange County, Calif.

Southwest still needs to get government approvals for the routes, so it can't sell tickets yet.

Dallas-based Southwest bought AirTran this year to give it an opening in Atlanta - the biggest U.S. city it es and inspectors being didn't already serve - and add AirTran's international service. Southwest itself does not fly beyond U.S. borders.

The new AirTran flights to Mexico include San Antonio to Mexico City and Cancun beginning next May 2012, and Orange County, Calif., to Mexico City and Cabo San Lucas beginning in June.

The company said it would announce prices once it gets regulatory approvals.

Southwest said it will add three new nonstop flights from Houston to Seattle, Kansas City and Raleigh-Durham, N.C., and one between Chicago and Oklahoma

The company said AirTran will add seven new routes, including Denver-New York, Baltimore-Los Angeles and Baltimore-San Francisco.

A Southwest representative said AirTran started selling those seats Sunday.

Chandler opens Rt. 66 center

CHANDLER, Okla. (AP) - A former National Guard armory built during the Great Depression is now an interpretive center in Chandler that marks the path of former Route 66.

The structure was built by the WPA in 1937 and was abandoned by the National Guard when a new armory was built in the 1970s.

Oklahoma City television station KWTV reports that a proposal to turn the structure down resulted in a preservation effort, and the center now tells the story of Route 66 and Chandler's military history.

Route 66 was the gateway from the northeast to the west, running through Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, boggling." Arizona and California.

Attorney, fiancee sue Air Tran

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) - A North Carolina couple is suing Air Tran Airways, alleging they were sickened by cockroaches coming out of air vents and storage areas on a recent flight. They say flight attendants ignored their concerns.

WCNC-TV reports that Charlotte attorney Harry Marsh and his fiancee Kaitlin Rush, saw the cockroaches soon after takeoff on a Sept. 15 flight from Charlotte to Houston with a stop-over in Atlanta.

Korea vet's remains buried after decades

ATHENS (AP) - The remains of a Korean War veteran were finally laid to rest in his East Texas hometown, more than 60 years after he was declared missing in action.

The Tyler Morning Telegraph reported that Cpl. Benny Rogers was buried Saturday amid a sea of flag-waving veterans, supporters and family members, some of whom recalled his mother's anguish over not knowing her son's whereabouts.

Rogers' remains were recently found in North Korea and confirmed through enhanced DNA testing.

He received full military honors when he was buried next to his parents in Willow Springs Cemetery, near Athens.

His family last heard from Rogers in a letter he sent to them on Oct. 30, 1950. In the letter, Rogers told his parents he's been recently promoted to staff sergeant, and he's sitting in a "fresh dug" hole, about 60 miles north of Pyongyang, the capital of North Korea.

Three days later, the 20-year-old soldier was caught in the Battle of Unsan, in which more than 1,000 soldiers died.

Both of Rogers' parents have died, but relatives expressed happiness that his remains finally made

Niece Ruth Davis said she grew up hearing about "Uncle Benny.

"We as children, we heard what happened," she said. "We understood the look of sadness on our grandmother's face.'

Paula Dellinger, another niece, said in the months and years that followed his disappearance, her grandmother developed a strong faith that carried her through the tough times.

Rogers was born in 1930. He grew up on a small farm outside Athens with his parents, Charles and Katie Rogers, his brother, Gerald Jack Rogers, and sister, June Rogers Wherley. None of them are still

Rogers was reported missing in action on Nov. 2, 1950, but his mother never gave up hope that he somehow survived, relatives said.

The family home was adorned with his photos, American flags and Purple Heart medal, his mother always hoping that they would reunite one day.

"It's wonderful closure for the family," said C. J. "Jackie" McGee, 59, a Vietnam War and Desert Storm veteran who was at the cemetery.

The Dallas Morning News reported Saturday that Texas has all but stopped imposing the most severe penalties, such as revoking a home's license and government contracts, or seeking a court-appointed overseer against nursing homes in violation.

Four employees who performed inspections for the state in recent months said that their superiors often resist letting themcite homes for possible life-threatening abuse and neglect, the newspaper

reported. "They'll say, 'You just don't have it,'" said a highly experienced inspector, who still works for the state and asked not to be identified out of fear of retaliation. "You feel it's to the point of immediate jeopardy, and to be told 'no' is quite mind-

But Chris Traylor, commissioner for the Texas Department of Aging and Disability Services, said the agency's nursinghome enforcement leaders aren't impeding tough enforcement.

"That's nonsense," Traylor said in a statement. "Our message to staff consistently has been, 'Call it like you see it, and do whatever is necessary to protect the health and safety of residents."

Tim Graves, head of resents for-profit nursing homes, said the enforcement system is working.

"I'm at a comfort level with where we are," said

Today is Monday, Nov. 14, the 318th day of 2011. There are 47 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 14, 1851, Herman Melville's novel "Moby-Dick; Or, The Whale" was first published in the United States.

On this date:

In 1881, Charles J. Guiteau went on trial for assassinating President James A. Garfield. (Guiteau was convicted and hanged the following year.)

In 1889, inspired by Jules Verne, New York World reporter Nellie Bly (Elizabeth Cochrane) set out to travel around the world in less than 80 days. (She made the trip in 72 days.)

In 1910, Eugene B. Ely became the first aviator to take off from a ship as his Curtiss pusher rolled off a sloping platform on the deck of the scout cruiser USS Birmingham off Hampton Roads, Va. In 1922, the British Broadcasting Corporation

began its domestic radio service. In 1940, during World War II, German planes destroyed most of the English town of Coventry. In 1944, Tommy Dorsey and his orchestra

An old friend donates \$1 billion to charity

With a swoosh, the Gulfstream 550 is effortlessly launched into the heavens for the hour-long slingshot from Dallas to Stillwater, the sleek jet headed for Oklahoma State University and the football field bearing the name of our host -- Boone Pickens Stadium. The game against Kansas State University is spectacular, a record 58,750 fans roaring their (now) No. 2-rated Cowboys to an explosive 52-45 victory.

It's hard to believe this stadium was the scene of the crime five years

In 2005, T. Boone Pickens, the energy billionaire tycoon, made a \$165 million gift to his alma mater, and in some media circles, believe it or not, people were fit to be tied. "ABC World News Tonight," with Elizabeth Vargas playing Concerned Anchor and Brian Ross in the role of Intrepid Gum-Shoe Investigative Reporter breathlessly disclosed to the nation that this gift was an "audacious" abuse of a "loophole" in that year's Katrina Relief Act. It was an 'apparently legal" maneuver to reap an unfair tax benefit.

The New York Times had different reasons to be upset. When OSU reinvested Pickens' gift into Pickens' hedge fund, this was wrong, wrong, wrong. The Times found one lawyer to say Pickens was "a rich man manipulating charity for his own benefit," and another to ask, "Is it a conflict of interest? Well, probably." This after being told Pickens had waived all fees and commissions.

Boone and I chatted about this at the time. "If only I'd used the money to build a couple of yachts instead," he'd sighed sardonically. Boone responded to critics his way: he increased his giving. Reportedly, his donations to OSU have hit the \$500 million mark.

So anyway, five years later, we're

in Boone Pickens Stadium, in Boone's box -- yep, he has one of those, too -- and there's controlled pandemonium, with family, staff, university officials, friends (including a couple of octogenarian childhood mates), alumni and students swarming. The school is electrified. Boone's money has brought real talent, both in coaching and players, with state-of-the-art facilities that

are taken for granted at Ivy League schools, but heretofore unknown to rural communities like Stillwater. It's paying off. OSU is in the hunt for a national championship. Through all the commotion, I spy

a young black man in a wheelchair, clearly crippled. I watch as Boone's wife Madeleine tenderly takes his hand in greeting and they chat: There's a connection there. I make my way over to him to get his story It's both tragic and beautiful. Nate

Waters, 33, was 19 when he got into a fight with his mother's boyfriend. That monster broke his neck. The doctors told him he'd never regain the use of any limbs, but Waters disagreed. Waters is brimming as he recounts this. This is a man who does not accept defeat.

But to do the proper rehab, required regular visits to a clinic in St. Louis and a financial investment far beyond his means. So he reached out to others, over a hundred others. One by one, all turned him down. Discouraged and admittedly intimidated, he wrote "Mr. Pickens." Who came through, assuming all rehab and equipment costs -- over \$80,000 to date. Waters is now Boone's guest in Boone's suite.

"Hope," Waters says emphatically. "Boone gave me hope. I was on 'E when Boone came into my life. For a

búsiness maven like Boone to identify with an inner city kid from Chicago like me, that was inspiration." Waters proudly waves the arms he was told he'd never move. "And I'm not done yet!" he beams.

I ask Boone if there are others. He shrugs. In fact, there are others -- an endless list of others. There are medical institutions nationwide funded by him. Brain centers. Cancer centers. Eye centers.

Hospitals. For youngsters, there are educational programs; for the elderly there are retirement communities; and in between, for those in-need, there are all manner of shelters, mentoring programs, activity centers, meals-on-wheels and the like.

Museums have benefited, so have public policy groups and botanical gardens, too. And there is money -- lots of money -- for dozens of military groups, especially for wounded warriors. That one tugs fiercely at this man.

How much in all? I ask. Boone smiles and answers quietly, "This year we'll hit the billion mark." Yes, as in \$1 billion in gifting. "And since I turned 70, I've paid \$700 million more in taxes." Then he adds almost in disbelief: "And they're saying I haven't done my fair share?"



Parents are not 'mooching' Social Securit

Q: In a recent column, you categorically stated that people cannot bring their foreign-born parents to this country and then put them on their Social Security account. You said the only way that could happen is if someone died. In other words, you claim that benefits to parents can be paid only after the death of one of that parent's grown children

But I know for a fact that this is untrue. My ex-husband brought his parents to this country in the 1980s and immediately put them on his Social Security. And they got those Social Security benefits for the rest of their lives. How could you print such a big lie?

A: I didn't lie. The problem is that you are confusing one government program with another one. However, you are not alone in that confusion. I got emails from dozens of readers challenging me on my facts or accusing me of lying. And every one of those readers made the same mistake you are making. I'll explain in a minute, but first I will review the facts.

In that prior column, I took on a ubiquitous rumor that Social Security is going broke because retirees are bringing their elderly parents to the U.S. from foreign countries and then putting those parents on their Social Security account. People claimed that these parents were "mooching" undeserved benefits off the system benefits financed by over-burdened American taxpayers.

I correctly pointed out in that column that the only way a parent could claim benefits off an adult child's Social Security record is if the adult child died. And then benefits could be paid only if the adult son or daughter was supporting his or her parent before the son or daughter's death.

Finally, I made clear that out of roughly 50 million Social Security beneficiaries, only about 2,000 people get benefits as dependent Social Security & and you

parents on a deceased son or daughter's Social Security record. And the vast majority of those parents are U.S. citizens. So even if they were all "mooching" benefits from the taxpayers (which they are not because they are getting paid legally), they are certainly not bankrupting the Social Security system.

All the readers who claimed they had personal knowledge of a foreign-born parent getting Social Security benefits were actually referring to folks getting Supplemental Security Income payments.

As I've pointed out so often in this column, far too many people confuse SSI with Social Security. SSI is a federal welfare program that pays a very meager monthly check to about 6 million elderly and disabled poor people in this country. Even though the program is managed by the Social Security Administration, SSI is not a Social Security benefit, and SSI checks are not funded by Social Security

Up until about 20 years ago, it was possible for an elderly person who moved to this country legally to qualify for SSI benefits after they arrived - assuming they met all the eligibility requirements. So, many people, like your ex-husband, brought their parents over here and then took them down to the Social Security office to help them file for Supplemental Security Income payments.

Because they went to a Social Security office to do this and because the name of the program makes it seem to be a Social Security supplement, many folks mistakenly believed their parents were getting some kind of Social Security benefit. But again, they were not. Those foreign-born par-

ents were getting monthly SSI checks.

And they didn't get the checks for long. Sometime during the early 1990s, Congress changed the law to say that, with only very few exceptions, only U.S. citizens could qualify for Supplemental Security Income payments.

So foreign-born parents have never "mooched" benefits from the Social Security program, and for the past two decades, they haven't "mooched" benefits from the Supplemental Security Income program either.

Q: My dad is 104 years old. He lives in a nursing home. A Social Security representative recently visited him and asked to see some form of identification. What was that all about?

A: Gosh. Ldidn't know the Social Security Administration was still doing those ID checks on centenarians! It's an anti-fraud measure to make sure people that old who are getting Social Security benefits are really still alive.

As I recall, the project started 30 or more years ago following a spate of news stories about grown children cashing their deceased parents' Social Security checks. During my career with SSA, I visited hundreds of centenarians and essentially asked them: "Are you still alive?" I always found that so embarrassing! And in all the cases I was involved in, there never was even a hint of fraud.

Frankly, I'm not sure how effective or necessary that program is anymore. Today, are all kinds of other anti-fraud measures are built into the system, such as computermatching operations with banks and state bureaus of vital statistics. With only a few rare (and thus newsworthy) exceptions, if you're old and you die, Social Security is going to find out about it.



"We weren't playing very good in the first half," Rodriguez said. "It was more like we needed to do something. We didn't want to lose.

McLean entered the fourth quarter trailing 28-19. The Lady Tigers opened the quarter with a 10-0 run. Junior Miranda McMordie capped off the run, hitting two free throws putting the Lady Tigers ahead at 29-28 their first lead since leading 6-4 in the first quarter.

The lead switched hands five times in the final four minutes. With less than a minute left, sophomore Justana Tate hit a layup with a Lady Jaguar draped allover her to put McLean in front 34-33.

The Lady Tigers' sideline erupted. Tate very calmly nailed the free throw.

Rodriguez said getting inside was key to the comeback.

"We ran a zone motion," Rodriguez said. "We got some shots inside and got it in to the post."

McLean made it to the line only six times in the first half. In the second half, the Lady Tigers earned 10 trips to the charity stripe, converting seven.

Prescott said he had several players step up and hit shots in the fourth.


