## PD's McCullar: Nine burglaries since start of 2012

Many recent break-ins involve forced entry into homes

Since the beginning of the new year, Pampa has had nine burglaries, according to Crime Prevention Officer Stormy McCullar of Pampa PD.

"We've been telling people for a while that they need

to secure their homes, but citizens need to start watching their neighbors' houses," she said.

Burglaries were on an upswing during 2011, but many of the break-ins were crimes of opportunity, where suspects gained entry via unlocked doors or windows. Most of the recent burglaries involved forced entry, and most through the back of the home. The crimes have been

scattered across town, with no particular area targeted. "If you're driving down the street and see someone in

## Emergency alert system to launch

On Monday, a new emergency alert system that incorporates mobile phones will be unveiled across the Panhandle.

The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) developed the notification system with assistance from a grant for more than \$600,000 from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and \$100,000 from the Amarillo Area Foundation. PRPC covered \$24,000 of the cost associated with the alert system.

"It's been a long time coming," said Emily Nolte, Regional Emergency Preparedness Planner of PRPC. "We needed an additional method of notification. Some jurisdictions didn't even have sirens. We also saw that mobile communication needed to be the way to go from a technological standpoint."

Residents can sign up to receive emergency alerts for their area by text, email or text-to-voice, with text-tovoice being the only option associated with a fee. The messages will cover emergencies like fire evacuation, but also include missing children or elderly

option to fill their burrito fix. Chubby's Burrito Co., owned by Jason and April Dyer, held its grand opening Thursday evening, offering burritos, tacos, salads and more to a crowd of hungry Pampans. According to April, it

was a big first night. "We had a wonderful turnout," April said. "We had a lot of people. We were real proud to see everybody."

The Dyers bought the Chubby's building, located at 1328 N. Hobart (the former Consuelo's), last June, and the family has spent the last few months conceptual-

izing for and renovating the space.


"We'd just been working on concepts and trying to figure out what the best thing for Pampa would be," April said. "That's when we came up with the burrito concept and ran with it. We've just been doing construction and making it as perfect as we can and getting the food ready. We decided to get past the holidays - Jason does a lot of catering during the holidays - and so we got that behind us, and January was just the right

So far, April said, the restaurant is employing a team of 16 people of all age groups, reflective of the idea that Chubby's is a place

where everyone can eat. "Chubby's is perfect for any age group, whether you're an older person who doesn't like to eat a lot or whether you're a child, there's something for everybody there," April said. "It's a fun environment. There's fun people. It's a fun place, and there's great food.





#### Boehner pressed on trafficking

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Mexican President Felipe Calderon has asked U.S. House Speaker John Boehner to crack down on weapons trafficking that has fueled drug yiolence in Mexico.

Calderon's office says the president stressed the importance of stopping illegal trafficking of weapons and cash

The government says Mexico's drug cartels import ahead of the state's primuch of their weaponry from the United States.

Boehner and Michigan Rep. Dave Camp visited Mexico on Friday along with other members of Congress to discuss security and economic and political issues with Mexican officials.

Calderon's office says the U.S. delegation praised Mexico's five-year offensive against drug cartels.

#### Woman dies after break-in

HOUSTON (AP) - Police are looking for a male suspect after a break-in at a house in southwest Houston that left an 82-year-old woman dead.

Police say the intruder beat Margaret Marie Gage with his hands after she tried to intervene as the intruder was kicking her husband in the head. Police Sgt. C.E. Elliott says the 84-year-old husband was treated at the scene. Elliott says the couple's dog began to bark just before 9 p.m. Thursday and the husband went to open the back

door to let it out when the man forced his way in. The couple's daughter, Loa Glenn, tells KPRC-TV of Everything's made fresh, Houston that the intruder went straight to her mother so we don't keep a lot jewelry and made off with it.

#### Transgender widow jailed

HOUSTON (AP) — A Houston judge has jailed the transgender widow of a fallen firefighter after she was late for a scheduled court date.

Nikki Araguz has been waging a court fight for the death benefits of firefighter Thomas Araguz III, who died in July 2010 while battling an egg farm fire near Wharton.

The Houston Chronicle reports she was to appear in court at 8:30 a.m. Friday to plead to a \$2,800 wristwatch theft from an acquaintance. She didn't arrive until 9:10 a.m., however, and state District Judge Vanessa Velasquez ordered her jailed

Araguz's attorney, Jeff Downing, said his client was planning to plead guilty to theft in exchange for a 30-day jail sentence and \$2,800 in restitution. Now, she could remain jailed for two weeks before entering a plea.

#### Court tosses convoy death suits

HOUSTON (AP) — A federal appeals court has ruled that long-running lawsuits over insurgent ambushes that killed civilian truck drivers in Iraq won't go before a jury.

The lawsuits had been filed in Houston federal court by truckers and their families. They accused Houston-based Halliburton and former subsidiary KBR Inc. of knowingly sending supply convoys into a dangerous area. Six KBR drivers were killed and several others were wounded in that area on April 8 and 9, 2004.

Halliburton and KBR had argued the claims couldn't be litigated. Instead, they said the claims are covered by a law that provides workers' compensation to civilian employees injured while under contract with defense agencies.

In a Thursday ruling, the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals agreed with the companies and ordered the lawsuits dismissed.

#### Man dead after ski slope fall

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — A Texas man is dead after a fall while riding down a slope at Ski Apache near Ruidoso

Authorities say 29-year-old Robert Kieschnick died Wednesday shortly after the spill on the Capitan Slope intermediate trail.

The medical investigator says Kieschnick might have hit his head on a rock. He wasn't wearing a helmet at the

KOB-TV says Kieschnick's wife is a registered nurse and witnessed the accident and was the first responder.

#### Toddler found in stolen SUV

HOUSTON (AP) — Terron Henry was busily preparing food for his Jamaican restaurant Friday morning when he was told an SUV was mysteriously parked behind his Houston business. He walked to the vehicle along a concrete path behind the strip mall where his restaurant is located and peeked into a window. There he saw a toddler strapped to a car seat, bundled in a gray sweat shirt and apparently sleeping.

It turned out to be 17-month-old Evan Montgomery Lamar Miller, the subject of a frantic search that began 14 hours earlier when the vehicle - with the baby inside was stolen from a Walmart parking lot about three blocks

Henry brought the toddler into the restaurant, wrapped him in a shirt and waited for paramedics, who arrived about five minutes later. The boy was taken to Texas Children's Hospital, where he was treated and released.

Houston police were still looking Friday evening for the suspect who stole the vehicle. Police believe he probably left the SUV shortly after he stole it and Evan was in the vehicle overnight.

#### Abortion law cleared to go

AUSTIN (AP) — A federal appeals court cleared the way Friday for Texas to immediately being enforcing a new law requiring doctors to conduct a sonogram before performing an abortion.

The three-judge panel agreed to a request by the state's Attorney General Greg Abbott to cut short the typical threeweek waiting period between a ruling and its implementation. Earlier in the week, the judges had lifted a temporary stay issued by a district court judge who found the new law potentially unconstitutional, but did not at that point issue a legal mandate that would make the law enforceable.

Texas' new law requires doctors to conduct a sonogram before performing an abortion, to show the woman the image, to play the fetal heartbeat aloud and describe the features of the fetus, at least 24 hours before the abortion. There are exceptions in the case of rape, incest, fetal deformities and for women who have to travel great distances to reach a doctor.

## MORNINGRUSH In S.C., Perry treads lightly on GOP rivals

(AP) — Texas Gov. Rick Perry aimed his sharpest criticism at President Barack Obama rather than his GOP rivals as he campaigned Friday in coastal South Carolina, eight days

Perry, using a light touch as he spoke to people in crowded restaurants in Bluffton and Charleston, mostly stuck with the campaign speech he used in Iowa and elsewhere. He mentioned front-runner Mitt Romney by name only when a Charleston

CHARLESTON, S.C. man said he feared Perry has a poorer chance of beating Obama this fall.

Perry cited Texas' record of job creation during his 11 years as governor, and said it is far better than Obama's national record. "Romney cannot make that contrast," he said.

In one of his rare lighthearted moments, Perry said anyone seeking higher taxes and mandated health insurance coverage "can move to Massachusetts." It was another jab at Romney's four-year record as Massachusetts governor.

In Bluffton, Perry said his GOP opponents are "all either Wall Street insiders or Washington insiders" and called himself the genuine outsider who can change Washington.

Of the president, he said: "Our country is in trouble, and Obama is mortgaging our children's future" by running up a huge debt.

Perry made no mention of Romney's record at the private equity firm Bain. Capital. Several party officials and conservative spokesmen chastised him earlier this week for tying Romney to instances in which Bain investments worked out badly and resulted in job losses.

Perry has gotten off fairly easy thus far in the political ads swamping South Carolina TV stations, especially during local news hours. The main targets of the harshest ads have been former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, former Sen. Rick Santorum and Romney. Perry, like the others, is airing positive ads about himself.

Today is Saturday, Jan. 14, the 14th day of 2012. There are 352 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 14, 1952, NBC's "Today" show premiered, with Dave Garroway as the host, or "communicator," as he was called.

On this date:

In 1784, the United States ratified a peace treaty with England, ending the Revolutionary War.

In 1858, Napoleon III, Emperor of the French, and his wife, Empress Eugenie, escaped an assassination attempt led by Italian revolutionary Felice Orsini, who was later captured and executed.

In 1943, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill and French General Charles de Gaulle opened a wartime conference in Casablanca.

In 1953, Josip Broz Tito was elected president of Yugoslavia by the country's Parliament. In 1963, George C. Wallace was sworn in as

governor of Alabama with a pledge of "segregation forever." In 1968, the Green Bay Packers of the NFL

defeated the AFL's Oakland Raiders, 33-14, in Super Bowl II. In 1969, 27 people aboard the aircraft carrier USS Enterprise, off Hawaii, were killed when a

rocket warhead exploded, setting off a fire and additional explosions. In 1994, President Bill Clinton and Russian

President Boris Yeltsin signed an accord to stop aiming missiles at any nation; the leaders joined Ukrainian President Leonid Kravchuk in signing an accord to dismantle the nuclear arsenal of Ukraine.

Ten years ago: Two members of Congress released excerpts of a letter sent to Enron Chairman Kenneth Lay the previous August in which company executive Sherron Watkins warned of the reckless practices that eventually brought down the energy-trading giant.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush, facing opposition from both parties over his plan to send more troops to Iraq, said on CBS' "60 Minutes" that he had the authority to act no matter what Congress wanted.

One year ago: The national Republican Party ousted chairman Michael Steele and chose Wisconsin party chief Reince Priebus to lead in the run-up to the 2012 presidential race.

## Conservatives torn over defending, opposing Romney

WASHINGTON (AP) - Torn between reality and their political dreams, leading conservatives are defending Mitt Romney's private sector success and acknowledging that his presidential nomination may be inevitable even as they search for a more palatable candidate.

Romney, meanwhile, is marching steadily through South Carolina, unveiling a prominent endorsement and sending a message to his party: It's time to stop bickering.

Not just yet, some conservative leaders say.

"Honestly, it looks like Gov. Romney's nomination is inevitable." said the Rev. Robert Jeffress, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Dallas and a supporter of Texas Gov. Rick Perry. "Evangelicals, come November, might have to hold their noses and vote for the lesser of two evils. But it's not November yet."

Just over a week before South Carolina's first-in-the-South vote, there are signs that conservatives are struggling with their goal of finding what some would call "the anti-Romney." They appear no more organized in their search for a credible challenger than they were before former Sen. Rick Santorum raised their hopes

with his second-place finish in Iowa. More than 100 conservative leaders, many of them evangelical in their faiths, were set to converge this weekend at the Texas ranch of former state appeals court Judge Paul Pressler to consider their options, if any. One subtext of the discussion could be the terms of any eventual endorsement of the former Massachusetts governor.

Surrogates for each campaign were expected to make presentations and answer questions.

In spite of their reluctance to embrace Romney as the GOP nominee, some conservatives have been drawn into defending him against charges of "vulture" capitalism from rivals Newt Gingrich and Perry. Both are potential recipients of conservative backing in the effort to oppose Romney.

Trying to tap into populist sentiment, Gingrich and Perry accused Romney of being a fat-cat venture

capitalist during his days running the private equity firm Bain Capital, saying he laid off workers as he restructured companies and filled his own pockets.

That strategy boomeranged. A long list of conservative leaders who have not endorsed Romney are nonetheless sticking up for his success - former Bush adviser Karl Rove, former presidential candidate Mike Huckabee, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, the Club for Growth, an array of conservative talk show hosts and even Santorum. Conservative leaders say the attack amounts to an assault on capitalism and the free market system at the heart of their movement.

'It's a sad day in South Carolina and across this country if Republicans are talking against the free market, let me tell you that," said South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley, a tea party star who has endorsed Romney

"It's just been foolish," said Thomas Donohue, president of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, which does not endorse presidential candidates. "They're not doing anything other than setting up the ad base for their (Democratic) opponents."

On that point, the anti-Romney conservatives agree.

"I've not talked to many conservatives that support these attacks on Romney," said Family Research Council President Tony Perkins. Evangelicals, he pointed out, support a free market with moral restraints and generally wouldn't object to Romney's success at Bain. "I don't think they see that as the real issue. It sounds more like something the Democrats might bring up."

It's a stark turnabout from last week, when speculation crackled through conservative ranks over whether Santorum could capture support from the large chunk of Republicans who aren't behind Romney.

Post-Iowa, things went sour for this group. Romney's second-in-a-row win in New Hampshire on Tuesday solidified his standing atop the GOP field. He was followed in that race not by Santorum but by Texas Rep. Ron Paul and former Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman. Gingrich and Perry also drew only tepid support in the opening contests.

Now, everyone's looking to South Carolina's Jan. 21 primary as potentially the last stand for the anti-Romney crowd.

"He is not anything near conservative enough," said Rock Hill, S.C., resident Carlene Madison, 54, shaking her head and making an unpleasant

Polling shows Romney gaining ground in South Carolina. A poll conducted Jan. 4-5 by CNN/Time/ORC International showed Romney with the support of 37 percent of the state's likely Republican primary voters, up from 20 percent a month earlier. He won Iowa with only 25 percent of the vote and New Hampshire with a more robust 38 percent.

Romney also won the endorsement this week of former U.N. Ambassador John Bolton, a favorite of conservatives for his consistent criticism of President Barack Obama's foreign

Romney has a difficult history with South Carolina's Republican voters, who are some of the nation's most conservative. In exit polling from the 2008 Republican presidential contest there, 60 percent of primary voters said they were born-again Christians. Romney, whose Mormon faith is not considered a Christian denomination by some, carried just 11 percent of their votes, fewer than his 15 percent tally overall. Mormons consider themselves Christians.

Conservatives looking to back someone else have a heavy workload in a compressed period of time. Romney's closest rival, Santorum, is 18 points behind in South Carolina, followed by Gingrich, Paul, Perry and Huntsman, according to the CNN/ Time/ORC International poll. Six percent are undecided, the survey found.

Jeffress, the Baptist minister, who once called the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints a cult and doesn't consider it a Christian faith, said he is skipping the Texas conference of conservatives but might eventually recommend voting for the former Massachusetts governor.

His rationale: "It's probably better to embrace a non-Christian like Romney, who embraces biblical values like the sanctity of life and the sanctity of marriage, rather than a professing Christian like President Obama, who embraces unbiblical positions."

On Jan. 15, 1862, the U.S. Senate confirmed President Abraham Lincoln's choice of Edwin M. Stanton to be secretary of war, replacing Simon Cameron.

On this date:

In 1559, England's Queen Elizabeth I was crowned in Westminster Abbey.

In 1777, the people of New Connecticut declared their independence. (The republic later

became the state of Vermont.)

In 1929, civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. was born in Atlanta.

In 1943, work was completed on the Pentagon, headquarters of the U.S. Department of War (now Defense).

In 1947, the mutilated remains of 22-year-old Elizabeth Short, who came to be known as the "Black Dahlia," were found in a vacant Los Angeles lot; her slaying remains unsolved.

In 1954, Marilyn Monroe and Joe DiMaggio got married at San Francisco City Hall. (The marriage, however, lasted only about nine months.)

In 1961, a U.S. Air Force radar tower off the New Jersey coast collapsed into the Atlantic Ocean during a severe storm, killing all 28 men aboard.

In 1967, the Green Bay Packers of the National Football League defeated the Kansas City Chiefs of the American Football League 35-10 in the first AFL-NFL World Championship Game, retroactively known as Super Bowl I.

In 1971, the recently completed Aswan High Dam in Egypt was dedicated during a ceremony attended by President Anwar Sadat and Soviet President Nikolai Podgorny.

In 1987, entertainer Ray Bolger, perhaps best known for playing the Scarecrow in the 1939 MGM musical "The Wizard of Oz," died in Los Angeles at age 83.



persons in the area and information on recovery assistance after an emergency. You can also sign up for alerts in multiple areas in the Panhandle region. Nolte said this could be an advantage for people with family that live nearby in the Panhandle.

"I can register in Dumas, where my parents live, and I can be an additional source of information for my parents," she said.

Previous to the new alert system, Emergency Management Coordinator of the City of Pampa, Fred Courtney, relied on the outdoor warning system, television, radio or land line telephones for emergency notifications

to residents.

"It's taken between two or three years to get it all together," he said. "It's a good experiment to do it as a region, rather than through individual jurisdictions.

He said that the system will be used to supplement communication methods like the siren system.

"We're excited about it coming into being, and I hope people with cellphones register, so we can reach more people when we have an emergency," said Courtney. 'Registration in the system is purely voluntary, but we hope people will realize the value of it and

**Both Nolte and Courtney** emphasized that the notification system is not intended to be a the primary communication method for emergency preparedness, and continue to encourage people to take note of their surroundings and to use traditional media like radio and television.

# Weekly US oil, gas rig count drops 20 to 1,987

HOUSTON (AP) - The number of rigs actively exploring for oil and natural gas in the U.S. is down by 20 this week to 1,987.

The Houston oilfield services company Baker Hughes Inc. reported Friday that 1,191 rigs were exploring for oil and 791 for natural gas. Five were listed as miscellaneous. A year ago this week Baker Hughes reported 1,700 active rigs, 187 fewer than this year.

Of the major oil- and gas-producing states, Pennsylvania gained three rigs and Alaska gained two. Arkansas and North Dakota picked up one apiece.

Wyoming lost eight rigs, Colorado lost six and Oklahoma dropped four. Louisiana, Texas and West Virginia dropped two apiece, and New Mexico lost one. California was unchanged.

The rig count peaked at 4,530 in 1981. A low of 488 was recorded in 1999.

# FDA unveils user fee program for generic drugs

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Food and Drug Administration would collect hundreds of millions of dollars in new fees from pharmaceutical companies to help speed up the review of generic drugs, under an agreement with industry released by the agency.

The FDA has used industry fees to hire extra staff to review regular prescription drugs since 1992. The proposal unveiled Friday would extend that approach to generic drugs, which have long had slower review times.

Whereas most new drugs are reviewed in 10 months, the typical review time for a generic drug is 30 months. The FDA has a backlog of 2,500 generic drug applications awaiting review.

The FDA proposes collecting \$299 million in fees annually to hire additional generic drug reviewers. The proposal must be approved by Congress to become law.

The Lady Harvesters (11-11, 1-1) host the Dalhart Wolves (14-8, 1-1) 7:30 p.m.







## Texans, Ravens make a run at glory in the playoffs

BALTIMORE (AP) — The Baltimore Ravens and Houston Texans are quite content to run against the grain in the pass-happy NFL.

Baltimore relies heavily on running back Ray Rice and a stingy defensive unit led by Pro Bowl linebackers Ray Lewis and Terrell Suggs. Houston depends on the rushing prowess of Arian Foster and the NFL's second-ranked defense.

Neither team intends to alter that approach in Sunday's playoff game, so the one that stays true to form the longest likely will advance to the AFC championship game.

The Ravens (12-4) respect rookie quarterback T.J. Yates and the breakaway speed of wide receiver Andre Johnson, but they figure their best chance to win is to bottle up Foster and force the Texans to throw.

"The objective, first and foremost, is to stop the run. You can't let him get going," Baltimore defensive end Cory Redding said. "And then No. 2, get guys on No. 80 (Johnson). Then No. 3, get after Yates, period. You have to stop the run, control the pass and get after the passer. That's the formula for winning every single week. That's been our formula from Week One, and it hasn't changed."

When Houston (11-6) came to Baltimore on Oct. 6, the Ravens limited Foster to 49 yards on 15 carries in a 29-14 victory. But Foster rambled for 153 yards and two touchdowns in a 31-10 rout of Cincinnati

last week, leaving little mystery as to what the Texans' game plan will be on Sunday.

"We've got to see how the game goes, but I know that we need to stay committed to running the football," coach Gary Kubiak said. "Hey, we're going to have to run the ball effectively to win this football game. We know that. We know it will be a difficult task, but we're preparing to go do it."

The Ravens have never allowed a runner to amass 100 yards on the ground in a playoff game, and they have every intention of keeping that mark intact.

"Our focus is, No. 1, we've got to stop the run," defensive coordinator Chuck Pagano said. "Their whole idea is to get third-and-manageable. There are a lot of third-and-2s, 3s, 4s and 5s, and then it puts the pressure back on the defense. You're a little bit leery of coming after them in those situations because of the run and the pass. So if we do a great job on first and second down and get them in third-and-long, we'll be able to dial some things up."

The last thing Yates needs is to be dropping back in the pocket with the Baltimore defense looking for him to throw.

"They've seen it all, They've been through it all," Yates said. "We know that they're going to do things to try to trick us and kind of catch us off guard, so we have to do things to counteract that. We've been doing

different things all week long to give us the best chance against an experienced defense like that."

The most effective way to blunt a pass rush is to have an efficient running game. That's where Foster comes in.

"We know that they're going to run the ball," Lewis said. "We know they're very good at running the ball."

So is Baltimore, which plans to feed the Texans plenty of Rice, a double-threat who ran for 1,364 yards and had a team-leading 76 catches for 704 yards. In that earlier Ravens victory over Houston, Rice ran for 101 yards and had five receptions for 60 yards.

Let those other teams throw the ball all they want. Baltimore has plenty of faith in quarterback Joe Flacco, but their main priority is getting the ball in Rice's hands — one way or another.

"It's been a pass-friendly league. Let's just put it out there: There's been a lot of passing going on," Rice said. "There wasn't a 2,000-yard rusher this year; there wasn't even an 1,800-yard rusher this year. But, if you look at where I put myself in the situation, I gave you 13 (hundred yards rushing) and seven (hundred yards receiving) to put myself at 2,000 yards. It might not be 2,000 yards rushing, but me just doing my job this Sunday, whether it's rushing or receiving, I think will be good enough."
