Tidmore pursues film dream

Pampa's Travis Tidmore may be a lawyer, but his first love is film. Along with Shea Weaver and Jonathan Grubbs, both of Austin, Tidmore has begun work on a documentary called "String Theory," which follows Levi Weaver on his adventures as a musician. As a producer on the film, Tidmore mostly handles the business and legal side of things.



"Right now I'm also working on talking to some different artists we might want to do interviews with for the documentary and some music executives as well," he said. "Levi Weaver, the artist that the documentary is about, started out his career opening up for Imogen Heap, who has a decent-sized following here in America, but she's really big in Europe, where she's from," added Tidmore.

Pampa's Smith announces 'Gray County leadership team'

If Pampa's Mac Smith is counting on heavy hometown support in the race for District 88 House representative, he's building a solid foundation. Smith this week announced the names involved in his Gray County leadership team, which currently consists of almost 250 prominent Pampans who have pledged their support behind the Smith campaign. The list includes several elected officials within the city and county, including Susan Winborne, county clerk; Scott Hahn, county treasurer; Josh Seabourn, county attorney; and all four members of the Pampa City Commission. Also present on Smith's leadership team are Gray County GOP chairman Doug Ware and area Republican Party precinct chairs Harold Price,

John Triplehorn and Nell Bailey. "I'm incredibly humbled and definitely overwhelmed by the support here in Gray County," said Smith. "We've got great support all over the district, but this is home. ... It means a lot, because when you grow in a place, if you know so many people there and you're asked to do something like run (for office), in a lot of ways, you think, 'Maybe they'll get on board because they've known me forever.' In a lot of cases, that's exactly what happens, but here, we're not taking anything for granted. "I'm working hard here in Pampa," Smith continued, "and people are responding to that. They see me out knocking on doors. They see me out putting up signs.

They see me doing the hard work and putting effort into it. They don't want somebody to come in and just say, 'Well, I'm from Pampa, so obviously, everyone's going to vote for me.' ... We're really working hard here, like we're working hard all over the district." Smith interpreted the outflow of local supporters as a timely boost to his campaign in the wake of Rick Perry's endorsement of rival and incumbent Jim Landroop at M.K. Brown Civic Center on Tuesday. "I think it shows that people in this district and the people in Gray County care a lot less about endorsements than they do about getting to know the candidate," Smith said. "I think that the people here do what I do when they're looking for who to vote for. They look at the issues. They look at the individual. They make a decision about who they feel can best represent them." **SMITH** cont. on page 5A

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New strategy targets repeat border crossers

SAN DIEGO (AP) — With border crossings at a 40-year low, the U.S. Border Patrol announced a new strategy Tuesday that targets repeat crossers and tries to find out why they're keeping coming.

For nearly two decades, the Border Patrol has relied on a strategy that blanketed heavily trafficked corridors for illegal immigrants with agents, pushing migrants to more remote areas where they would presumably be easier to capture and discouraged from trying again.

"The jury, for me at least, is out on whether that's a solid strategy," Chief Mike Fisher told The Associated Press.

The new approach is more nuanced. Outlined in a 32-page document that took more than two years to develop, agents will now draw on intelligence to identify repeat crossers and others perceived as security threats, said Fisher.

"This whole risk-based approach is trying to figure out who are these people? What risk do they pose from a national security standpoint? The more we know, the better informed we are about identifying the threat and potential risk," he said in a recent interview.

During testimony before a House Homeland Security subcommittee Tuesday, Fisher was repeatedly asked why the new strategy didn't include any specific "metrics" that could help members of Congress and the public better understand if the border is secure.

"How can you possibly measure if the border is secure at all?" asked Texas Republican Michael McCaul.

Fisher defended the strategy, saying it will help agents use the resources at the border to better understand what is really happening.

Conditions on the border have changed dramatically since the last national strategy, putting pressure on the agency to adapt to a new landscape. An unprecedented hiring boom more than doubled the number of agents to 21,000 since 2004, accompanied by heavy spending on fencing, cameras, sensors and other gizmos.

At the same time, migration from Mexico has slowed significantly. Last year, the Border Patrol made 327,577 apprehensions on the Mexican border, down 80 percent from more than 1.6 million in 2000. It was the slowest year since 1971.

The Pew Hispanic Center reported last month that the largest wave of migrants from a single country in U.S. history had stopped increasing and may have reversed.

Douglas Massey, a Princeton University sociology professor who studies Mexican immigration trends, said

those who enter the United States illegally now have often been deported recently, are seeking to reunite with family, or are experienced at evading capture.

"There are no new migrants coming to the U.S. The people who are coming all have some prior experience in the U.S.," he said.

The new strategy moves to halt a revolving-door policy of sending migrants back to Mexico without any punishment. It is the Border Patrol's third strategy since 1994 and its first in eight years. Previous efforts poured resources into the nation's busiest corridors for illegal crossings.

The Border Patrol now feels it has enough of a handle to begin imposing more serious consequences on almost everyone it catches from Texas' Rio Grande Valley to San Diego. In January, it expanded its "Consequence Delivery System" to the entire border, dividing border crossers into seven categories, ranging from first-time offenders to people with criminal records.

Punishments vary by region but there is a common thread: Simply turning people around after taking their fingerprints is the choice of last resort. Some, including children and the medically ill, will still get a free pass by being turned around at the nearest border crossing, but they will be few and far between.

The new strategy makes no mention of expanding fences and other physical barriers, a departure from the administration of President George W. Bush. Fisher said he would not rule out more fences but, "It's not going to be part of our mantra."

The strategy makes only brief mention of technology in the wake of a failed \$1 billion program that was supposed to put a network of cameras, ground sensors and radars along the entire border. Fisher said the agency is moving more toward mobile surveillance like unmanned aerial vehicles and helicopters.

"We're still trying to understand what the capabilities are with all the technologies and the platforms," Fisher said. "I'm just trying to figure out what is the best suite on all this stuff."

The strategy makes it a top priority to ferret out corrupt agents, which has emerged as a growing threat as the agency has expanded.

The Border Patrol's first national strategy was produced in 1994 as agency poured resources into the San Diego and El Paso, Texas, areas. That effort pushed migrants to remote mountains and deserts and made Arizona the nation's busiest crossing for illegal crossings.

Bodies found near Mexico tourist lake

MEXICO CITY (AP) — At least 15 dismembered bodies were found stuffed inside two vans near Lake Chapala, an area frequented by tourists just south of the city of Guadalajara in western Mexico, police said Wednesday.

Jalisco state Prosecutor Tomas Coronado said the count is preliminary, because 15 severed human heads were found, meaning that at least that many people, but possibly more, had been cut up and put in the vans.

"The bodies are dismembered," Coronado said in an interview transcript provided by his office. He said authorities received a phone call alerting them to the pres-

ence of the vehicles on a dirt access road just a few miles from Lake Chapala, which is popular with tourists and American retirees.

The two vehicles were found by the side of a highway early Wednesday; the vehicles were towed to government offices to unload the bodies.


The area has been the scene of bloody turf battles between the Jalisco New Generation gang, allied with the Sinaloa cartel, and the Zetas drug cartel.

Mexican drug cartels frequently dismember the bodies of their victims or leave them stuffed into vehicles. The gangs also frequently leave hand-written messages alongside their victims' bodies, and Coronado said that such messages were found in the vans.

"They are clearly messages between rival groups that are in conflict," Coronado said.



Small town disbands police force

KEMP (AP) — A small East Texas town near Dallas has disbanded its police force because of budget woes.

The Kemp City Council voted Tuesday night to lay off the town's police chief and four police officers, along with the police department's part-time secretary. The Dallas Morning News reports the department officially ceased to exist Wednesday morning.

Chief Richard Clemmo said he and his force had no warning that the force was to be disbanded. Clemmo is now running for sheriff of Kaufman County, where Kemp is located. The town will now depend on the sheriff's department for law enforcement.

Kemp is a town of about 1,200 residents 40 miles southeast of Dallas.

Occidental to buy station in Texas

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) — A unit of oil producer Occidental Petroleum Corp. has reached an \$82 million deal to buy the South Texas site of former Naval Station Ingleside.

Port of Corpus Christi commissioners on Tuesday approved a contract with Oxy Ingleside Property Holdings for 815 acres.

The Corpus Christi Caller-Times reports Oxy has about 90 days to close the sale.

Spokesman Mark Evans says Oxy filed a permit application last week with Texas environmental regulators to build a fractionator at a nearby Oxy Chemicals unit. The new property would be used to help support the chemical plant's natural gas operations and exports.

Houston-based Canyon Supply and Logistics earlier this year failed to make a \$19 million down payment for 187 acres of the former naval facility, which closed in 2010.

Ban on hiring smokers fizzles

FORT WORTH (AP) — A North Texas city's proposed ban on hiring city workers who smoke has been abandoned.

The measure failed to reach the Fort Worth City Council.

Human resources officials on Tuesday declined to recommend the ban, following weeks of reviewing public and private tobacco-use policies. Fort Worth, starting in 2014, will instead use incentives to encourage municipal employees who light up to stop smoking.

Medical concerns had been raised about workers who smoke and supporters of a hiring ban said the move could safe health-related costs.

Chesapeake sued on jet policy

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Oklahoma City-based Chesapeake Energy Corp. is being sued by a shareholder over the company's corporate jet policy.

The lawsuit filed under seal Tuesday in Oklahoma County District Court by Gilberta Norris of Virginia claims Chesapeake has wasted millions of dollars by allowing senior executives and board members to use the jets for personal trips.

Chesapeake spokesman Jim Gipson said Wednesday the company is aware of the lawsuit but is reserving comment.

Norris' attorney — Hung Ta — told The Oklahoman the lawsuit is sealed because of a confidentiality agreement Norris agreed to in order to obtain internal company documents.

About a dozen lawsuits have been filed against Chesapeake since revelations that Chairman Aubrey McClendon obtained loans that were secured with his share of ownership in company wells.

Child brings loaded gun to school

RICHLAND HILLS (AP) — A suburban North Texas couple are under investigation after an 8-year-old second-grader brought a loaded handgun to school.

A police statement says the boy tried to put the gun on his classroom desk when it fell to the floor at Richland Elementary School in the Fort Worth suburb of Richland Hills. His classmates told the teacher, who teacher confiscated the gun and took the child to the office to await police.

Police Sgt. Nathan Stringer says it's a miracle the gun didn't discharge, and that the boy told officers he had no reason to bring the gun to school.

The boy wasn't charged because of his age, but Stringer says his mother and her boyfriend may be charged with allowing the child access to a firearm. No names were released.

Purple Heart proposed for victims

FORT HOOD (AP) — Federal lawmakers have proposed making the victims of the 2009 Fort Hood shooting rampage eligible for the Purple Heart.

A bill introduced in Congress would remove the distinction between international and domestic terrorism, making any military victims of terrorist attacks in the U.S. eligible for the Purple Heart. It's now awarded only to troops attacked in a combat zone.

The bill is sponsored by Connecticut Sen. Joe Lieberman, an independent, and Republican Rep. Peter King of New York.

Some members of Texas' delegation already proposed allowing Fort Hood victims to receive the same benefits as those killed or wounded in combat.

Thirteen people were killed and more than two dozen wounded in the rampage. Army psychiatrist Maj. Nidal Hasan faces the death penalty if convicted at his August trial.

Minister gets probation

CUERO (AP) — A South Texas minister must serve probation for shooting another preacher in an alleged construction dispute.

A judge in Cuero on Tuesday sentenced Mark Stewart of Corpus Christi to 10 years of deferred adjudication probation. Stewart also must spend 90 days in jail, pay a \$5,000 fine and pay the victim's medical bills.

Stewart pleaded guilty to aggravated assault for the 2010 shooting of lay pastor and contractor John Jackson of Cuero.

A message left with Rising Star Baptist Church in Corpus Christi was not immediately returned Wednesday. A prosecutor could not immediately provide details on Jackson's church affiliation.

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (AP) — As he tells it, Keith Russell Judd is a Harvard-educated musician and activist whose mother was a 1920s actress and father a designer of the first atomic bomb. He is also inmate No. 11593-051 at the Texarkana Federal Correctional Institute.

And from that cell in northeast Texas, without any organized support, he gave President Barack Obama a run for his money in West Virginia's primary, winning four of every 10 votes Democrats cast Tuesday.

Voters were not swayed by claims that Lillian Russell was his mother (even though she died before he was born), that he's a Rastafarian-Christian or that he attended the non-existent University of California at Los Alamos. They likely didn't know he's a fan of Mozart and Stephen King, that he belonged to Federation of Super Heroes from 1976 to 1982, or that he's doing 17 years for making threats.

They just know he's not

Obama.

Obama lost West Virginia to Republican John McCain in 2008 and has been to the state only once since he was elected — for a memorial service for 29 coal miners killed in the 2010 Upper Big Branch mine disaster.

West Virginians haven't seen him since.

What they believe — what they are repeatedly told — is that he's waging a war on coal mining. They know that top Democrats including Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin and U.S. Sen. Joe Manchin talk about that war all the time — and won't talk about whether they voted for Obama themselves.

They know, 31-year-old Morgantown chef Jonathan Dower said Wednesday, that the president's policies hurt the fossil fuel industries that support some of the state's most stable and best-paying jobs.

"When you have a president who's trying to be as environmentally conscious as he can but hurts the peo-

ple that he serves," Dower says, "you're going to have some sort of retaliation."

And retaliation there was: Obama carried 59 percent of the vote to Judd's 41 percent — more than 72,400 votes. But nearly 25,000 voters failed to even bother with the presidential race, a resounding condemnation by silence.

Unofficial results show Judd outpolled Obama in 10 coal-producing counties.

Judd's colorful resume and claims — from being

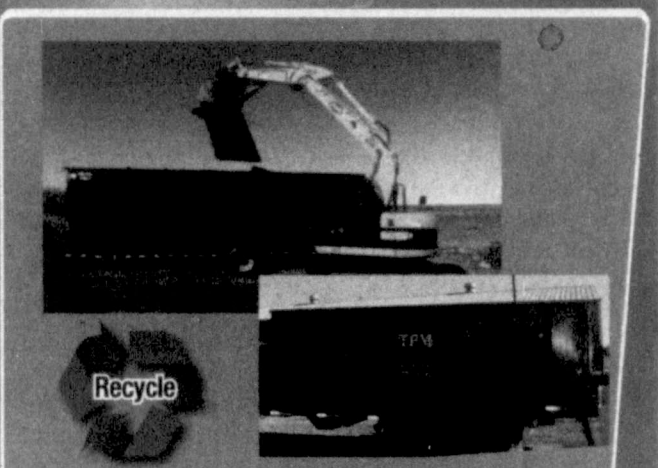
a fortune teller, to founding an organization when he was 5 years old, to bowling a perfect game — are detailed in a biography on Project Vote Smart, a non-partisan watchdog group. Research director Chris Lynn said the group currently has information on 10,335 candidates nationwide, including 339 presidential candidates.

It relies on information submitted by candidates and doesn't verify information in profiles.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 10, 1869, a golden spike was driven in Promontory, Utah, marking the completion of the first transcontinental railroad in the United States.

On this date:

In 1611, Sir Thomas Dale arrived in the Virginia Colony, where, as deputy governor, he instituted harsh measures to restore order.

In 1774, Louis XVI acceded to the throne of France.

In 1775, Ethan Allen and his Green Mountain Boys, along with Col. Benedict Arnold, captured the British-held fortress at Ticonderoga, N.Y.

In 1865, Union forces captured Confederate President Jefferson Davis in Irwinville, Ga.

In 1924, J. Edgar Hoover was given the job of FBI director.

In 1933, the Nazis staged massive public book burnings in Germany.

In 1940, during World War II, German forces began invading the Netherlands, Luxembourg, Belgium and France. The same day, British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain resigned, and Winston Churchill formed a new government.

In 1941, Adolf Hitler's deputy, Rudolf Hess, parachuted into Scotland on what he claimed was a peace mission. (Hess ended up serving a life sentence at Spandau prison until 1987, when he apparently committed suicide.)

In 1960, the nuclear-powered submarine USS Triton completed its submerged navigation of the globe.

In 1977, actress Joan Crawford, 72, died in New York.

In 1981, Socialist Francois Mitterrand defeated incumbent Valery Giscard d'Estaing in the second round of France's presidential election.

In 1994, Nelson Mandela took the oath of office to become South Africa's first black president.

Ten years ago: A tense 39-day-old standoff between Israeli troops and Palestinian gunmen at the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem ended with 13 suspected militants flown into European exile and 26 released into the Gaza Strip. Cuban activists delivered more than 11,000 signatures to the National Assembly demanding a referendum on broad changes in the socialist system, an unprecedented challenge to Fidel Castro's 43-year rule. Former FBI agent Robert Hanssen was sentenced by a federal judge to life in prison without parole for spying for Moscow. NBA owners approved the Hornets' move to New Orleans, ending the team's 14-year era in Charlotte.

Five years ago: British Prime Minister Tony Blair announced he would step down June 27. (Blair was succeeded by Gordon Brown.) The Democratic-controlled House, by a vote of 255-171, defeated legislation to require the withdrawal of U.S. combat troops from Iraq within nine months. A federal jury in Santa Ana, Calif., convicted Chinese-born engineer Chi Mak of conspiring to export U.S. defense technology to China. (Mak was later sentenced to 24½ years in federal prison.)

One year ago: The bulging Mississippi River rolled into the Mississippi Delta after cresting before daybreak at Memphis, Tenn., causing widespread damage. In a one-two punch against Moammar Gadhafi's forces, NATO war planes struck a command center in Tripoli and pounded targets around the besieged port of Misrata. Burt Reinhardt, one of CNN's first presidents, died in Marietta, Ga., at age 91.

Obama gambles with gay marriage move

WASHINGTON (AP) — Public opinion about gay marriage has changed so rapidly that President Barack Obama's historic embrace of it may pose as many political risks to Republicans as to the president and his fellow Democrats.

The president's dramatic shift on the issue — a watershed moment in U.S. politics, even if many people felt it was inevitable — is the latest sign that Democratic hopes increasingly rest on younger, college-educated and largely urban voters, whose lifestyles are shaped by social mobility more than religious and community traditions. Many young adults find the notion of discriminating against gays and lesbians as incomprehensible as their parents' and grandparents' accounts of living through racial segregation.

Yet same-sex marriage remains provocative in some places, including once-reliably Republican states such as North Carolina, where Obama won a narrow but stunning victory in 2008. Only hours before his Wednesday announcement on ABC News, North Carolina voters turned out in huge numbers to approve a constitutional ban on gay marriage.

The immediate reactions to Obama's statement on gay marriage weighed the political tradeoffs between embracing a social trend that's important to Democrats' liberal base, and risking potentially intense opposition from social conservatives in battleground states.

Mainstream Republicans, for the most part, moved warily. They focused their comment on the political calculations involved, not on the actual substance of letting same-sex couples marry.

Democrats, meanwhile, said Obama at last had found a cause that could begin to recapture some of the excitement of his barrier-breaking 2008 "hope and change" campaign.

"This gives the Democrats a fresh chance to mobilize young people and other base voters they need to turn out in November," said Democratic strategist Doug Hattaway, who worked for Hillary Rodham Clinton in the 2008 presidential primaries. "Many of them turned out to make history in 2008, and they will find this leadership from the president inspiring."

Hattaway noted that polls show substantial public support for same-sex marriage. "Mainstream

Republicans aren't likely to make too much hay out of this," he said. "The smart ones realize that the GOP's gay-baiting threatens to alienate a whole generation of voters."

Initial reaction to Obama's announcement on ABC News suggests Hattaway is right.

"The president's position on gay marriage has been one of cold political calculation," said Terry Holt, one of several Republican consultants who steered clear of the issue's moral and religious implications. He said Obama seeks to "win over a group of voters that he absolutely has to have to get re-elected."

House Speaker John Boehner, arguably the nation's highest-ranking Republican, told Fox Business Network: "I have always believed that marriage was between a man and a woman. But Republicans here on Capitol Hill are focused in on the economy."

Mitt Romney, the party's presumptive nominee for president, on Wednesday restated his opposition to same-sex marriage, which he called "a very tender and sensitive topic."

That's not to say Obama's move is risk-free. It could energize social conservatives in North Carolina, Virginia, Florida and other states that Obama carried four years ago.

It's hard to say how the dynamic might play out. A minority of Americans care intensely about gun ownership rights, but the highly organized National Rifle Association has played a disproportionately powerful role in that area for years — so much so that Democrats including Obama rarely talk about gun control any more.

For now, few veteran Republican operatives seem to see a similar dynamic for gay marriage. Brian Nick, a North Carolina-based GOP consultant who closely followed the state's referendum banning same-sex marriage, played down the notion that Obama's move could cost him a chance to win the state again.

"I think the economy is going to be the issue that's voted on" in November, Nick said. "President Obama is clearly a liberal's liberal, and this is just another example."

But the embrace of gay marriage is likely to inspire the Democratic base as much as it might turn off persuadable centrists, Nick said. He called the issue "sort of a net wash" in North Carolina.

Some gay-rights advocates said Obama's move wasn't particularly

courageous or pioneering. Former Vice President Dick Cheney and former first lady Laura Bush are among prominent Republicans who have endorsed same-sex marriage.

A new AP-GfK poll of adult Americans showed Obama with a 21 percentage point lead over Romney on the question of who is most trusted to handle "social issues such as abortion and same-sex marriage."

Starting last year, small majorities of Americans told the Gallup poll that gay marriage should be legal.

Republican consultant Matt Mackowiak said Obama needs to fire up liberal potential donors and seems willing to worry about blue-collar workers in swing states later.

"Obama's decision will hurt him in Indiana, Virginia, North Carolina, rural Pennsylvania, northern Florida, rural Missouri, lots of places that he needs," Mackowiak said. "The map just improved for Mitt Romney."

Perhaps. But few Democrats expect Obama to try hard in Indiana and Missouri. And he can easily win re-election without North Carolina and Virginia, provided he carries Ohio or Florida and doesn't lose states such as Michigan, Wisconsin and Pennsylvania.

Ben Psaki, a former Obama aide, said Democrats might be able to turn the issue against Romney.

"In his pursuit of acceptance by conservatives," she said, "Mitt Romney's support for a federal marriage amendment would be the first time we amended the Constitution to deny Americans equal rights, which is alarming to most people."

It seems highly unlikely that the U.S. Constitution will be amended to ban or safeguard same-sex marriage. Obama's comments Wednesday were more symbolic than substantive. But symbols matter when they come from the White House.

Democrats believe the president has his finger on the pulse of a fast-changing society. From a presidential election standpoint, opposition to same-sex marriage will matter only in the handful of states truly up for grabs on Nov. 6. If that opposition is sufficiently intense and organized, it could deal a surprising blow to the president.

For now, Romney, Boehner and mainstream GOP strategists seem more willing to focus on the struggling economy.

The only honest character in this tale is the one with the tail. In no uncertain terms, the dog warned the woman to keep her distance. For whatever reason, he was not in the mood to be

charmed. He had no interest in joining the popular club of dogs who love her.

And, for whatever reason, neither human paid heed.

No, the bipeds were too busy weaving a web, a tangled web, a web that got one of them bit and left the other vulnerable to a lawsuit and in danger of losing his dog.

Any storyteller worth their salt will tell you that a good yarn needs a hero, someone to root for, someone who is overcoming obstacles in a Herculean attempt to become a better person.

Who's the hero here?

No one — at least not yet.

If I were writing this story, I'd place this scene at the end of Act Two, the point at which everything falls apart and just before everyone — or at least the hero — gets their act together for the happy ending at the tail end of Act Three.

The happy ending is what we — the readers, the hero, everyone — want. But another truth in storytelling is that the hero has to make it happen, has to take some strong action to turn fate in his favor.

Sometimes that strong action is a very simple act. Tell the truth.

In this case, telling the truth won't solve the aggression problem, but it will prevent that larger web from forming, that web that involves injuries and lawsuits, lost relationships and regret.

Telling the truth won't cure aggression, but it will open the door to change.

Woof!

said Tidmore. "Everything has gone digital and everything has changed completely. Levi is not famous, by any means, but he counts himself as a success, because he goes on tours. He's constantly booking shows and playing music. So part of the documentary is redefining success in the digital age of music."

The team is also planning to speak with music executives on the industry's evolution.

"Hopefully (we'll speak with) ones that have been in the industry quite some time that can discuss the changes from the days of vinyl to going to tape to CD and now to digital, and how that's changed not only how people get the music they're buying, but how it's changed the definition of success, because not everyone now is making a ton of money off of record sales or booking huge stadiums, but there are still artists out there that are booking shows and successful in making a living doing that," said Tidmore.

About 70 percent of the footage for the film is ready to go.

"For the last few years, Levi's concerts have been recorded by various people, but he's also done video diaries that he's recorded himself," said Tidmore. "It's more about him and his journey, so it will probably be more interviews and a look at his life than concert footage, but there will be some concert footage in there."

Being involved with the film has been a happy surprise for Tidmore.

"It's definitely not what I expected," he said. "I had several ideas I'd been working on for years, and slowly getting them on the page. Honestly, I just assumed those would be dreams I'd have, and nothing would ever happen, so I'm excited to be a part of a movie at all, but I never would have dreamed it would be a documentary."

"As it's started, I'm really enjoying the process, and I'm glad to be a part of it," he added.

The filmmakers are also making use of Indiegogo, a crowd-sourcing site that allows people to contribute to projects they support. Depending on how much

they contribute, people can score a poster, a vinyl copy of the soundtrack or an executive producer title on the film. And people who attend Levi Weaver's upcoming tour, which is being filmed, will become a part of the documentary.

"Our goal is to make the fans really feel connected to this project from the beginning," said Tidmore. "We want them to know that they're the driving force behind this documentary and their role is not just on the sidelines."

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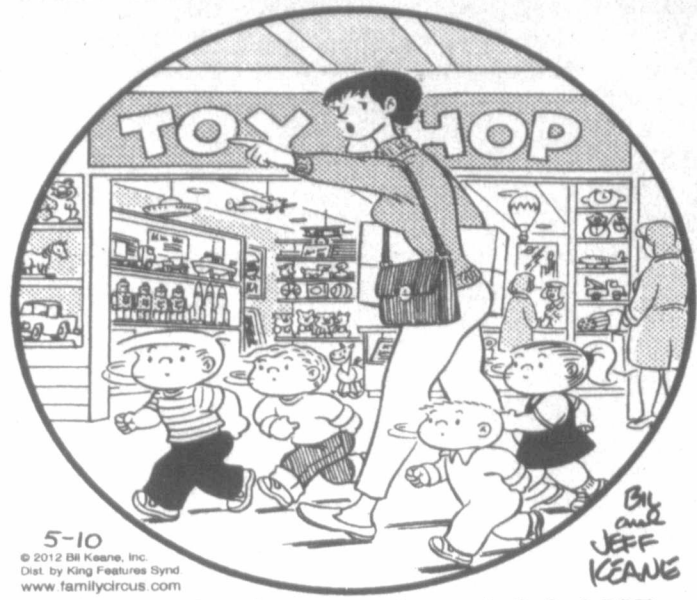

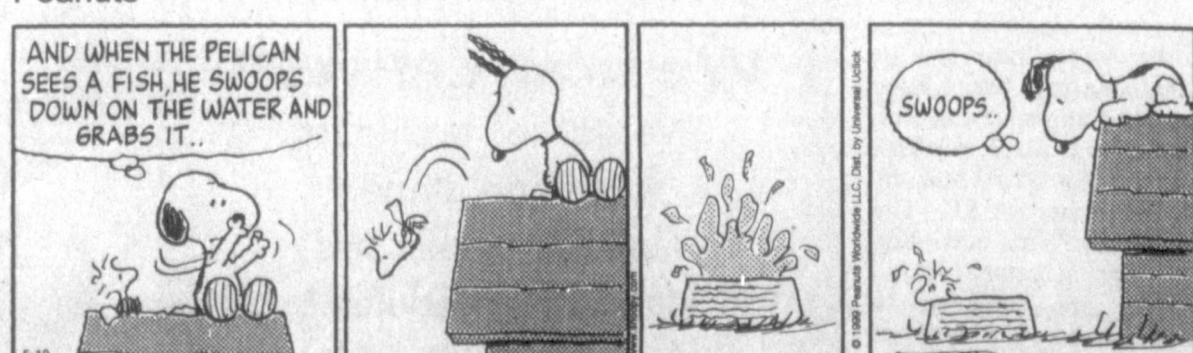

Rangers' Hamilton thankful for four HRs

BALTIMORE (AP) — Josh Hamilton expects it will take some time before he realizes the significance of becoming the 16th player in baseball history to hit four home runs in a game.

He does, however, appreciate how fortunate he was to be playing baseball at Camden Yards on Tuesday night as a member of the Texas Rangers. Because, before his epic performance against the Baltimore Orioles, Hamilton had to do something even harder than launching a quartet of two-run homers.

He needed to save himself from personal ruin. Hamilton went from first-round draft pick by Tampa Bay in 1999 to out of baseball altogether because of drug and alcohol addiction.

He recovered and returned to the majors in 2007 with Cincinnati, and was traded to the Texas, where he has become a star — the AL MVP in 2010 — while still battling his addiction. He had a relapse before this season, but is off to a torrid start.

After going 5 for 5 with a career-high eight RBIs and setting an AL record with 18 total bases in the Rangers' 10-3 win, Hamilton reflected on what his life was like before this unforgettable night.

"I think about what God's done in my life, everything I did to mess it up," he said. "To finally surrender everything and pursue that relationship with Christ on a daily basis and understanding when I don't pursue it, I end up messing up. Understanding that what I'm doing and what God's allowed me to do, coming back from everything I went through and allowing me to play the game at the level I play it, it's pretty amazing to think about."

Few players in the game today are playing at Hamilton's level. He's batting .406 and leads the majors with 13 homers and 36 RBIs.

That's impressive, but not as mind-blowing as his heroics against the Orioles.

Hamilton homered off Jake Arrieta in the first and third innings, added another off Zach Phillips in the seventh and topped it off with a one-for-the-books shot against Darren O'Day. During the last at-bat, Hamilton took a mighty hack and missed, lined a foul into right-field seats and then sent an 0-2 pitch over the center-field wall.

"Amazing," Texas manager Ron Washington said. "Josh came out tonight, and he wasn't going to be denied. I know he can't do it every night, but what you saw tonight, he's capable of it."

As he spoke to the media afterward, Hamilton wore a blue T-shirt emblazoned with "BEAST MODE."

On this night, he was a beast with the bat. "It's like anything else — you do something good or something incredible happens, it takes a little bit for it to sink in," Hamilton said. "I think when I get away from everybody and I have some time to myself, I think it might then."

The last player to hit four home runs in a game was Carlos Delgado on Sept. 25, 2003, for Toronto against Tampa Bay. Two of the 16 players to hit four homers in a game did it before 1900.

"History was witnessed tonight," Washington said.

As he walked to the plate in the eighth inning, Hamilton felt a sense of calm. He had never hit more than two home runs in a game, and he already had three.

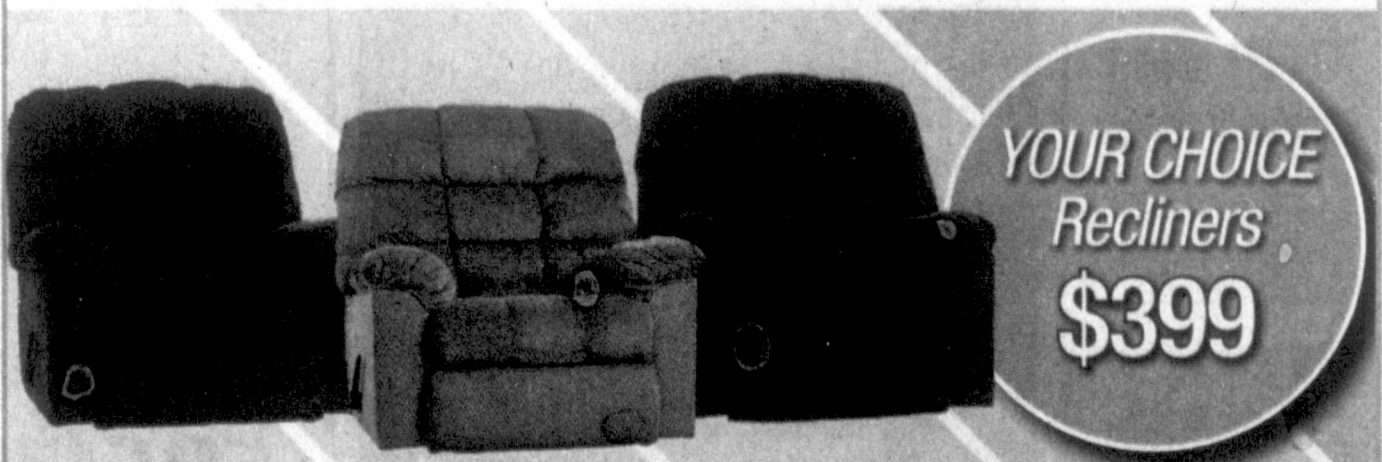

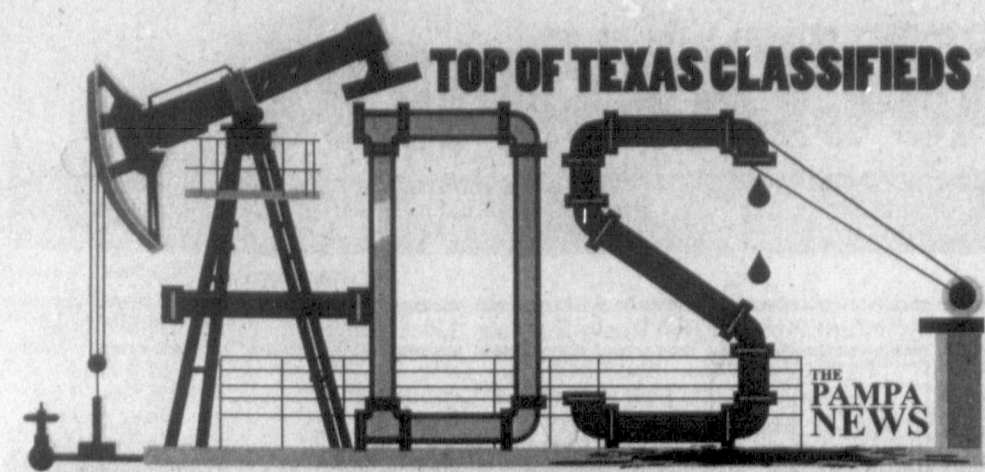

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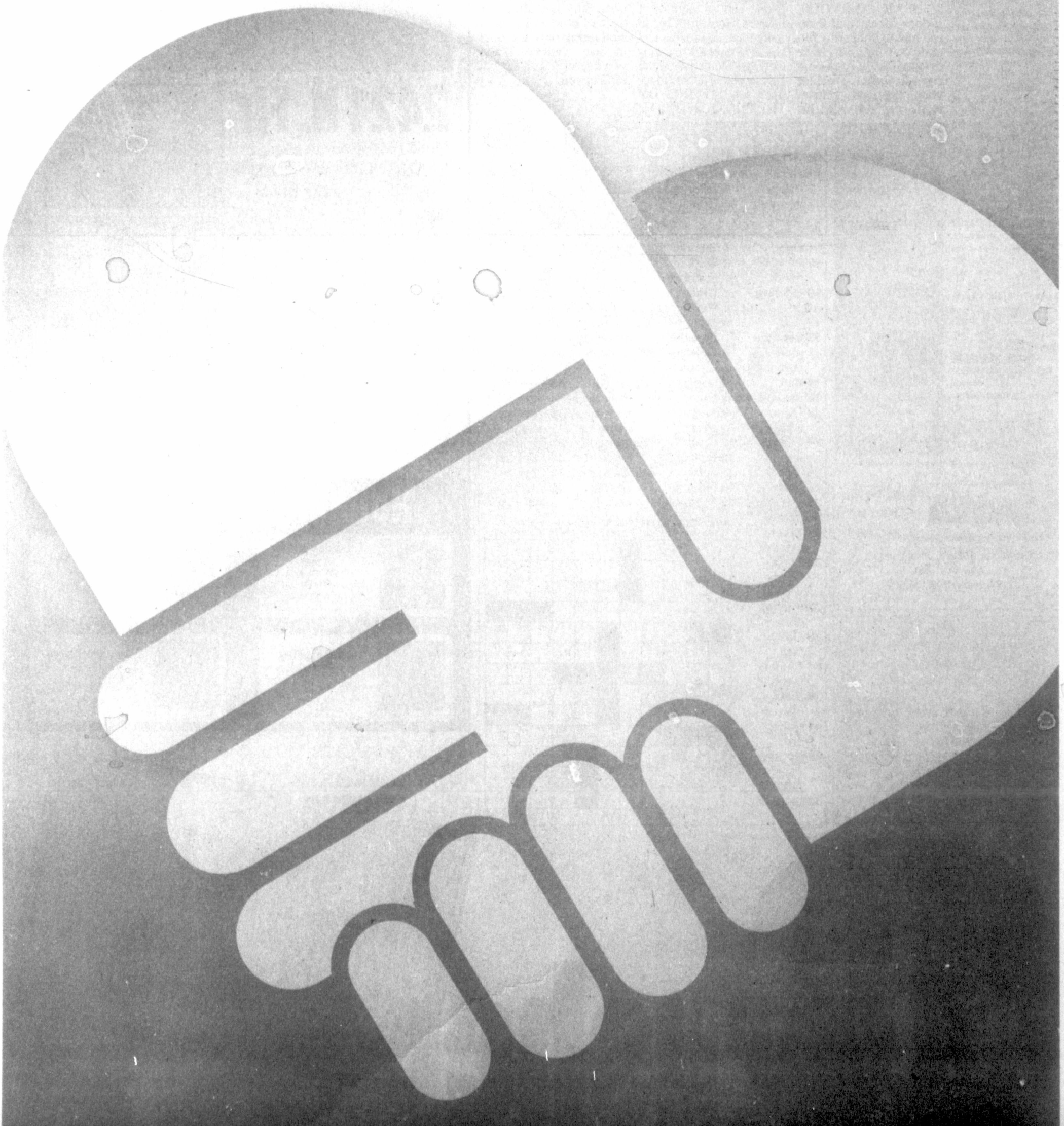
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
