# Pampa H20 to be open for Memorial Day Weekend

Park will then close and reopen for summer season on Monday, June 4

Get it while it's hot, because the Pampa H2O Aquatic Center will be open just in time for the Memorial Day weekend on Saturday through Monday. The park will

then reopen for its summer season on Monday, June 4.

According to assistant city manager Shane Stokes, the city's target season is Memorial Day through Labor Day. However, since much of the park's 60-member staff is made up of high

school students, there had to be some flexible scheduling.

"Since school's going a week longer this year, that meant we weren't going to be able to open Memorial Day weekend, so I started talking to (recreation director) Dustin Miller, and it looked like we were going to have enough staff on board to open Memorial Day weekend," said Stokes. # County's vote totals solid in down year

Gray County's voter turnout numbers may have been lower than expected, but with early voting coming to a close today, the county's poll attendance holds up well next to other areas in the

"Compared to other counties percent wise, Gray County is doing well," said Linda Lewis, Gray County election administrator. "We have voted almost as many voters as Potter County and they have over 50,000 registered voters compared to our 13,000."

Gray County ended Wednesday with 1,167 in-person votes, just under 9 percent of registered voters. In comparison, Potter County saw 1,323 inperson votes by the end of Tuesday, a registered voter turnout of just under 3 percent.

Other counties posted similarly low numbers. Denton County, which has 365,000 registered voters, also came in under 3 percent, with 9,476 turning out to vote early as of the end of Tuesday. VOTE cont. on page 2

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# Soldier guilty in Fort Hood bomb plot

WACO (AP) — A federal jury on Thursday convicted a Muslim soldier on six charges in connection with a failed plot to blow up a Texas restaurant full of Fort Hood troops, his religious mission to get "justice" for the people of Iraq and Afghani-

Jurors in U.S. District Court in Waco deliberated a little more than an hour before finding Pfc. Naser Jason Abdo guilty of attempting to use a weapon of mass destruction, attempted murder of U.S. officers or employees, and four counts of possessing a weapon in furtherance of a federal crime of violence.

Abdo, 22, did not stand with his attorneys when jurors and the judge entered the room, and he showed no emotion when each of the six guilty verdicts was read by the court clerk. Abdo, who's been accused of spitting blood on authorities escorting him and a jailer, wore a mask covering his nose and mouth throughout the trial.

He faces up to life in prison. U.S. District Judge Walter Smith is set to sentence Abdo in July.

Prosecutors said Abdo had already started making a bomb when he was detained at a Killeen motel last July after going AWOL from Fort Campbell, Ky. Authorities also found numerous bomb-making components, a loaded gun, 143 rounds of ammunition, a stun gun and other items in his backpack and motel room.

In a recorded police interview, Abdo said he was planning to pull off an attack in the Fort Hood area "because I don't appreciate what my unit did in Afghanistan."

He told authorities he planned to put the bomb in a busy restaurant filled with soldiers, wait outside and shoot anyone who survived — and become a martyr after police killed him. Abdo told an investigator that he didn't plan an attack inside Fort Hood because he didn't believe he would be able to get through security at the gates, according to testimony.

During the four-day trial, a recorded jail conversation was played for jurors in which Abdo told his mother his religion inspired his actions and he was seeking "justice" for the people of Iraq and Afghanistan.

"Their suffering is my suffering,"

he said.

Abdo's lead attorney, Zach Boyd, told jurors during closing arguments; that Abdo should be acquitted because his plan never progressed beyond preparation.

Killeen police began investigating-Abdo on July 26 after a gun store employee reported a young manbought 6 pounds of smokeless gunpowder, shotgun ammunition and a magazine for a semiautomatic pistol, while behaving in an odd manner; and seeming to know little about his purchases.

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Officers also learned that Abdo bought a U.S. Army uniform and a "Smith" name patch from another, store, and jurors saw surveillance footage showing him leaving the store wearing the uniform he just bought. He was detained July 27 after police tracked him to the motel in Killeen, about 150 miles southwestof Dallas.

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#### Temps hired at Lockheed Martin

FORT WORTH (AP) - Lockheed Martin is putting temporary workers on its Fort Worth aircraft assembly plant to replace striking Machinists' union members.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram reports the announcement came in a memo from Larry Lawson, Lockheed's aeronautics division executive vice president. He says Lockheed must, in his words, "sustain our business rhythm and continue to meet our commitments.

Lockheed spokesman Joe Stout wouldn't say how many replacement workers were brought in Thursday but says it's a small group that will likely increase. He added that they aren't viewed as permanent replacements.

The strike by about 3,600 machinists is in its fifth week. A statement from the International Association of Machinists Local 776 says the move reflects its members' resolve in fighting company proposals that would weaken pension and health care benefits.

#### Cartels making fake uniforms

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Mexican marines say they have found a clandestine workshop in northern Mexico where presumed drug traffickers made copies of military

The navy says hundreds of camouflage pants, shirts and vests were found at the workshop in the northern border city of Piedras Negras, across the border from

The uniforms are part of an effort by criminal gangs to damage the reputation of the marine corps, the navy said Thursday.

Drug gangs in Mexico have also used fake military uniforms to set up road blocks and carry out kidnappings. Marines acting on an anonymous tip also found sewing machines and other supplies when they raided the workshop Monday.

- In related raids, marines found drugs, guns and money at other locations in Piedras Negras.

#### Accused woman details problems

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — A Texas woman charged with killing a South Dakota man a year and a half ago says she has mental problems and is a victim of a life of prostitution and drugs.

Thirty-four-year-old Letisha Morgan is jailed in Dallas in the death of her boyfriend in Texas and in the death of 52-year-old Howard Allen in his Sioux Falls apartment in October 2010. She tells KSFY-TV in a telephone interview she has been diagnosed with depression, schizophrenia and bipolar disorder, and that sometimes "I blank out and I can't remember anything.'

Morgan says she was working as a prostitute and met Allen at a soup kitchen. She tells KSFY that she stabbed him 13 or 14 times.

Authorities allege that Morgan stabbed Allen 37 times with three different knives.

#### Drugs a factor in Dallas crash

... DALLAS (AP) — A 20-year-old man has been charged with driving while impaired after the cattle truck he was driving overturned, closing a major Dallas freeway for about nine hours.

Dallas County Sheriff's spokeswoman Carmen Castro says Marcus Melvin Brownlow of Palestine was booked into the Dallas County jail after the 1:30 a.m. Thursday crash of his truck on Interstate 35E northbound at the Trinity River bridge.

Castro says deputies suspect amphetamines were a factor in the crash.

Jail records show no attorney listed for Brownlow, who is held on \$500 bond.

Dr. Tim Holt was a veterinarian called to the scene. He says 16 of the 89 cows in the trailer died in the accident or had to be euthanized, and the others were captured.

#### No foreign law in Okla. courts

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — The Oklahoma Senate has approved legislation to prohibit the use of foreign law in state courts.

Senators voted 40-3 for the measure Thursday and sent it to the House.

The measure prohibits state courts from using foreign

law if the law provides a defense for a crime. Sen. Dan Newberry of Tulsa says state laws reflect the values and ideals of its people and the bill he authored ensures state law will not be compromised by a judge

who is influenced by foreign law. A proposed constitutional amendment that would ban Oklahoma courts from considering international or Islamic Sharia law was overwhelmingly approved by Oklahoma voters in 2010. But its implementation was blocked by a federal judge after a Muslim community leader alleged it discriminates against his religion.

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## Improve the storage capacity of cabinets

Dear Pat: My house has just an average-size kitchen, and I am totally remodeling it. Do you have any guidelines for selecting or designing kitchen cabinets or counter areas for the most usable space? — Jennifer F.

Dear Jennifer: Your question is an interesting one because the storage in 95 percent of new and remodeled kitchens is very poorly designed. The cabinets and drawers may be high quality and well-made, but the storage basics are just not well thought

A typical example is having a knife drawer or a compartment in a kitchen drawer for knives, forks, spoons, etc. This might sound like a wise plan because you always know where the knives are, at least until your children put them in the wrong place.

Actually, a much better way to store cooking utensils is by their specific function and where they are used more often. If you use a paring knife most often by the sink and the bread knife on another countertop, store each closer to where it is usually used. The paring knife can be stored in a slot in the countertop, and the bread knife can be stored in the breadbox.

This one item might save only a few steps and a few extra motions, but when you sum up all these extra motions for a large meal preparation, the time saved can be significant. It is not unlike how an industrial engineer lays out a workspace for a worker in a factory. The goal is to minimize the extra motions that just waste time.

Before you buy any of the base cabinets (under the countertop) and upper cabinets (on the walls over the countertop), make a list of the items you want to store in them. Categorize them by how often they are used and where they are used in the kitchen.

For example, there really is no need to store all your spices in the same location. You may have some spices that you use almost every time you cook and others you seldom use. Store the frequently used ones near the front at eye level in prime storage area. The others can be put in a harder-to-reach location.

Many seldom-used items can be stored on top shelves in the back of the cabinets to free up the more



easily accessible areas. In most kitchens, the backs of many of the upper cabinets are never used and the front areas are cluttered with these items.

Next, subcategorize the items by their height because this will determine the required height of the drawers and cabinet shelves. Some short items can be placed on tilted (staircase) racks inside a drawer to reduce the drawer height. One inch clearance above the items is all that is required. With this planning, you can now have the cabinets designed with the proper-height drawers and

Keep in mind the easy-access zone for most people is a height from the floor of about 22 inches to 55 inches. This area is easy to reach and see without bending or stretching. For handicapped or elderly people in wheelchairs, the upper range for easy access is about 46 inches. Some other storage tips to consider are storing larger plates vertically in racks in the upper cabinets. When stacked one on top of another, the top one many be difficult to reach.



# Today in History

Today is Friday, May 25, the 146th day of 2012. There are 220 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 25, 1787, the Constitutional Convention began at the Pennsylvania State House (Independence Hall) in Philadelphia after enough delegates had shown up for a quorum. (The Convention ended four months later with the delegates adopting the Constitution of the United States.)

On this date:

In 1810, Argentina began its revolt against Spanish rule with the forming of the Primera Junta in Buenos Aires.

In 1895, playwright Oscar Wilde was convicted of a morals charge in London; he was sentenced to two years in prison.

In 1916, the Chicago Tribune published an interview with Henry Ford in which the automobile industrialist was quoted as saying, "History is more or less bunk. It's tradition. We don't want tradition. We want to live in the present and the only history that is worth a tinker's dam is the history we make today.'

In 1935, Babe Ruth hit the 714th and final home run of his career, for the Boston Braves, in a game against the Pittsburgh Pirates.

In 1946, Transjordan (now Jordan) became a kingdom as it proclaimed its new monarch, Abdullah I.

In 1961, President John F. Kennedy told Congress, "I believe that this nation should commit itself to achieving the goal, before this decade is out, of landing a man on the moon and returning him safely to the earth."

In 1968, the Gateway Arch in St. Louis was dedicated by Vice President Hubert Humphrey and Interior Secretary Stewart Udall.

# Want to eat safe? Then buy American

The globalists and the lobbyists are lining up to promote another so-called free-trade agreement that gives favors to foreigners while discriminating against American products, jobs and consumers. The mainstream media are allowing the deal, called the Trans-Pacific Partnership, to be negotiated in typically secretive closed-door sessions.

The globalists don't want public debate to reveal that the TPP's fine print will ban the "Buy American" provisions of current U.S. law. Since the 1930s, the U.S. government has offered preferential treatment to American producers in the awarding of federal contracts, and many states have similar preference policies.

This is a popular law because Americans believe U.S. taxpayers' money should be spent on U.S. products made by U.S. workers. If a domestic producer's products or services are more expensive than a foreign producer, the U.S. bidder can still be awarded the contract.

Some recent trade agreements have been adopted that give some other nations the same negotiating status as U.S. firms. Now the Obama administration also wants to grant that privilege to Vietnam, Singapore, Malaysia, Brunei, Peru, Chile, Australia and New Zealand.

Although the text of the TPP deal is available to all those countries and to corporate "trade advisors," it has not been released to the American public. Yet, the TPP deal will allow large sums of U.S. tax dollars to be used to strengthen other countries' manufacturing sectors instead of ours.

China is expecting to join the deal soon, but meanwhile, China will get TPP's benefits anyway by shipping from its plants located in Vietnam and Malaysia. China, which grows its shrimp in sewage and then doctors it with chemicals, is already transshipping 66 million pounds of its shrimp annually through Malaysia in order to avoid U.S. antidumping duties

and the FDA's import alert. The seafood

consumed by Americans is 84 percent imported, including a large amount from TPP countries. The question the lobbyists don't want us to ask about TPP is: Do you

think foods sold to American consumers should be required to meet U.S. safety standards?

The FDA has already issued 25 import alerts for Vietnam this year, with Vietnamese seafood detained for misbranding, E. coli, unusually high levels of antibiotic residues, microbian contamination, and other serious safety concerns. Vietnamese exporters readily concede that banned antibiotics are used in their aquaculture, and Japan is requesting enrofloxacin tests for 100 percent of shrimp from Vietnam.

According to a statement of the Southern Shrimp Alliance, "the presence of banned antibiotics and herbicides in shrimp imports reflects an intentional decision to use these harmful chemicals. Their presence is the product of a calculation to reduce the costs of producing aquaculture shrimp at the risk of the health and safety of American consumers."

The U.S. International Trade Commission projects that U.S. imports of Peruvian food will increase if TPP is implemented. The increase in beef imports is expected to be substantial.

Peru also has a major export fishing sector. FDA inspectors have rejected Peru's seafood for numerous reasons including filth, adulteration, misbranding and various dangerous food-borne pathogens.

"Equivalence determinations" is a devious bit of language in these free-trade agreements. Those words mean requiring the United States to permit imports of meat and poultry products that meet only the safety standards of the exporting country, not the standards of the importing

country, i.e., the U.S. The United States used to be known as the world's bread basket, and surely nothing is so important as a country's ability to feed its own people. We became a net-food importer for the first time in 2005.

The United States now imports \$65 billion in food annually, and the vast majority is unexamined and untested. The FDA estimates that it conducts border inspections on only .6 of 1 percent of these foods at the border (vegetables, fruit, seafood, grains, dairy, animal feed).

The FDA inspects only 1.93 percent of seafood imports, and the inspection is mostly only visual. Only 11 percent of imported beef, pork and chicken is inspected at our border by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Our COOL law, or Country of Origin Labeling, passed in 2002, requires country-of-origin labeling on beef, pork, lamb, fresh fruits, vegetables, seafood and peanuts, but enforcement has been delayed again and again by intense industry lobbying. A study by Consumer Reports says that 92 percent of U.S. consumers support this law.

However, our busybody nonfriends in the World Trade Organization ruled that this law violates free trade and must be repealed. In April, the WTO and communist China blasted the U.S. for our noncompliance with WTO rulings, and Antigua and China launched criticism of the U.S. for failing to obey WTO's demand that we repeal our law against Internet gambling.

To know it, after the fashion of Facebook - right now, this second! — is to feel the words forming in the brain and the throat: Who cares?

In life we need to choose carefully the things we care about: spouse, children, church, bridge partners, bowling league, judges and congressmen — the "little platoons" to which we belong, as Edmund Burke so wonderfully put it.

Try caring about everything. It can't be done. We get "cared out" sooner than we get carried out. Or maybe the latter is in part a consequence of the former.

I leave Facebook to those who care with enormous intensity concerning ... whatever. My sole admonition, all I ask in return, is when you do find out, kindly neglect to tell me.



# Tea Party darling Cruz gets endorsement from Santorum

AUSTIN (AP) — Former presidential candidate Rick Santorum endorsed Ted Cruz on Thursday in Texas' crowded U.S. Senate race, saying the firebrand attorney and Tea Party favorite "has the wow factor." Cruz's opponents shot back that he is too beholden to out-of-state interests.

Cruz, the former state solicitor general, is thought to be trailing Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst in the Republican primary to replace retiring Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison. Also seeking the party's nomination are ex-Dallas Mayor Tom Leppert and Craig James, a former running back for Southern Methodist University and the New England Patriots and EPSN announcer. If no candidate wins a majority in Tuesday's primary, a runoff will be held July 31.

Santorum made the announcement on conservative Glenn Beck's radio show and then explained it on a Houston station.

"What we really need, and what we don't have, are people who strongly can communicate and passionately deliver the message on a variety of different fronts, not just on taxes and spending but on the culture and on national security," Santorum told KTRH.

Santorum's presidential bid had enjoyed strong support in Texas, but he abandoned it before the state's primary, which was originally set for Super Tuesday but delayed due to a legal battle over redistricting maps drawn by the Republicandominated state Legislature.

Santorum said he probably wouldn't have time to campaign with Cruz but that he'd be "on the phone and doing whatever I can to influence the election from outside the state."

Appearing later at the Houston high school where he launched his football career, James responded, "This is Texas, not Pennsylvania."

"I continue to churn away," James said, alongside his high school football coach, Oscar Cripps, who he credited with teaching him to "keep on churning, the cream will rise to the top." Nearby were about two dozen supporters who had been carefully instructed where to stand before the event began.

Cruz is backed by several national tea party groups, including the anti-tax Club for Growth. It has pledged to spend \$2 million to defeat Dewhurst, contending he has been too moderate during his nearly

nine years as lieutenant governor. Former Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin also has recorded a phone message on Cruz's behalf.

Dewhurst called the national interests influencing the Texas race "a campaign ploy."

"I just laugh it off," Dewhurst told The Associated Press in an interview. "Cruz, this is someone who is desperately trying to make things up to be relevant."

Dewhurst dismissed Cruz as just a former staffer for the Texas Attorney General's Office, saying "there's a big difference between having the luxury of sitting as a staffer ... and having to stand on the ground when, proverbially, gunfire is going on around you, and make decisions on a real-time basis to move this state forward."

Many have speculated that voting the day after Memorial Day will mean low statewide turnout. Speaking Thursday at an event in Lubbock, Dewhurst noted that only about 4,000 people in Abilene, which he visited earlier in the day, had cast early voting ballots compared with 28,000 in 2008. The two-week early voting period ends Friday.

"We're trying to remind people that there's an election out there and it is so important that everybody vote," he said.

Dewhurst has been endorsed by his own pair of unsuccessful Republican presidential candidates, Texas Gov. Rick Perry and former Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee — both featured in television ads prais-

both featured in television ads praising the lieutenant governor's conservative principles.

Developed his campaign nearly

Dewhurst loaned his campaign nearly \$1.2 million last week and has now spent more than \$9 million out of his own pocket on the race, while Cruz recently gave his campaign \$400,000 after only contributing \$70,000 previously.

Asked about complaints he's spending too much of his own money, Dewhurst again chided the national groups backing Cruz.

"Mr. Cruz has had his new bosses spend \$6 million on negative, untrue advertising against me and I have to defend myself," Dewhurst said. He also wouldn't rule out spending even more, joking "I'd have to ask my wife."

Leppert has donated about \$3.6 million to his campaign but told the AP on Thursday that he has no plans to contribute more.

# Mexican drug cartel ignites car bomb near U.S. border

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Suspected drug cartel gunmen opened fire on a hotel being used as a police dormitory then attacked it with a car bomb Thursday, wounding seven officers less than 4 miles (6.5 kilometers) from the U.S. border, Mexican officials said.

A Tamaulipas state official said authorities believe the Zetas, one of Mexico's two most powerful criminal organizations, carried out the attack on the Hotel Santa Cecilia in Nuevo Laredo, a city ácross the border from Laredo, Texas.

The Zetas, founded by Mexican special forces defectors, have carried out a number of sophisticated attacks, but Thursday's assault appears to be one of the most elaborate. It also appeared to be the first attack directed at Tamaulipas' new state police force, which took over a year ago from a municipal police force in Nuevo Laredo that was accused of ineffectiveness and corruption.

The attack on the hotel took place around 7:15 a.m. on one of the main streets in Nuevo Laredo, less than four hours after unknown gunmen hurled gasoline bombs at

the Maranho, one of the city's most popular nightclubs. The club was badly damaged by fire but there were no injuries, authorities said.

Minutes after the hotel attack, gunmen opened fire on the Nuevo Laredo Institute of Technology, a science-focused university

Nuevo Laredo is a stronghold of the Zetas cartel. It has been the scene of vicious turf battles between the Zetas and its former ally, the Gulf cartel, which is now allied to the Zetas' strongest rival, the Sinaloa cartel led by Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman.

The border city has seen a series of gruesome mass killings in recent week. Fourteen bodies were found in a van in downtown Nuevo Laredo on April 17, and 23 people found hanged or decapitated in the border city on May 4.

Thursday's attack came less than a week after a high-ranking member of the Zetas was arrested and accused of orchestrating the dumping of 49 mutilated bodies in a northern Mexico town square in order to create terror and confusion as part of the battle with the Gulf and Sinaloa cartels.



He enlisted in the military in 2009, thinking that the service wouldn't conflict with his religious beliefs. But according to his essay that was part of his conscientious objector status application, Abdo reconsidered as he explored Islam further.






Killgo said he's looking forward to it. "It's going to be a good experience and fun experience," Killgo said. "I'm

## Former baseball player Segui takes stand in Clemens' trial

WASHINGTON (AP) — The judge in the Roger Clemens perjury case ruled Thursday that the government can call former major leaguer David Segui and another man to testify about conversations they had with Clemens' chief accuser, Brian McNamee.

Prosecutors hope that Segui and Anthony Corso, who was one of tion by federal authorities in 2007. McNamee's private workout clients in New York City, can help rebut defense suggestions that McNamee fabricated allegations and evidence against Clemens to avoid prosecution after being contacted by federal authorities in 2007.

The government wants to question Segui about a conversation from around 2001 in which McNamee is said to have told Segui he had saved "darts" — that is, needles — from his injections of players in order to placate his wife. That would be consistent with McNamee's testimony in the trial that he saved medical waste from the injections because his wife was worried he would end up getting the blame for being involved with drugs in baseball.

Corso is expected to testify that McNamee told him as early as 2002 that Clemens used HGH, and in 2005 that McNamee saved evidence from a 2001 injection.

McNamee, Clemens' former strength and conditioning coach, testified that he injected Clemens with steroids in 1998, 2000 and 2001 and with HGH in 2000. The former pitcher, a seven-time Cy Young Award winner, is accused of lying to Congress in 2008 when he said he never used performance-enhancing drugs.

Defense lawyers, who objected to the additional witnesses' testimony, argued Wednesday that they never contended that McNamee made up the evidence

recently, but that it had been created and saved as a "hole card" — as a way to possibly extort Clemens one day

But U.S. District Judge Reggie Walton said Thursday that the thrust of the defense cross-examination of McNamee was that he was motivated to fabricate the evidence after he came under investiga-


On Wednesday, prosecutors indicated they had encountered some resistance from Segui, who retired in 2004 after 15 major league seasons. That prompted Walton to warn that if Segui defies a prosecution subpoena to testify in the trial: "He better be on the run, because the marshals will be after him."

"If he doesn't show up, he'll be arrested like anyone else," Walton said calmly.


McNamee testified last week that after he injected Clemens with steroids in 2001 he stored the medical waste in a beer can to allay his wife's fears that he would become the fall guy if his involvement with drugs in baseball was ever exposed.


Hardin's zealous cross-examination of McNamee last week has given the government opportunities to seek admission of additional evidence. On Monday, Walton ruled that Hardin had opened the door for McNamee to name other players to whom he had supplied HGH, something the defense had fought vigorously to keep from the jury.

Also Thursday, a forensic examiner with the FBI said that tests on some of the vials, syringes and other items that McNamee handed over to authorities revealed residues of steroids on them. Under cross-examination, the examiner, Pamela Reynolds, said that she could not say how the steroids got there and who, if anyone, used them.

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

# Governor Perry campaigns in heated Texas House race

LUMBERTON (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry stepped Thursday into a contentious primary race where two incumbent Republicans are trying to remain in the state House after redistricting put them both in the same East Texas district.

Perry was campaigning for state Rep. James White, one of only two black Republicans in the Legislature last year. The governor enthusiastically touted his Texas Budget Compact proposal, prompting some of the hundreds in the crowd to shout "Amen" during the afternoon event at a Hardin County restaurant.

White and fellow Republican Rep. Mike Hamilton, who's been in office since 2003. are seeking the GOP nomination for the district that includes Hardin, Jasper, Polk, Newton and Tyler counties. State primary voting wraps up Tuesday.

On Hamilton's campaign web site, he also proclaims his support for the governor's budget compact, which among other things would ensure no new taxes or increases to taxes already on the books.

"I've had to make decisions from time to time and this is a pretty easy one for me," Perry told The Associated Press of his endorsement for White. "James is a solid fiscal conservative and social conservative. He's the easy choice for me."

The race has turned nasty with Hamilton, from Lumberton, releasing records that showed the Livingston school district gave White a warning letter about holding inappropriate sexual discussions while teaching high school in 2007.

"I don't pay a lot of attention to it," Perry insisted. "I don't think most Texans do."

Hamilton spokesman Craig Murphy said he admired the governor for not backing off the endorsement, which came before Hamilton's campaign last week released information they obtained under the Open Records Act.

"I have a feeling obviously he did not know," Murphy said of Perry. "It's the governor's right to make endorsements, but I don't think it's going to have much success in the election.'
