New PRMC owners in media spotlight over 'upcoding'

Groups allege Prime Healthcare guilty of false diagnoses; Prime denies claims

(Editor's note: The following story is first in a series on accusations surrounding the business practices of Prime Healthcare Services, which acquired the Pampa Regional Medical Center last week.)

 California-based Prime Healthcare Services, the company which acquired the Pampa Regional Medical Center

last week, has been accused of a trio of questionable business practices. The allegations include refusing to transfer patients and a violation of patient privacy confirmed by the California Department of Public Health. The company, however, has received most of its media attention on a practice called "upcoding," which involves a hospital exaggerating or falsely reporting diagnoses for higher payout from Medicare. About 85 percent of Prime's

California patients rely on Medicare, MediCal, indigent care or self-pay for health care coverage, according to testimony from Michael Sarrao, Prime's Vice President and general counsel, during a February hearing in California. Over the last few years, SEIU United Healthcare Workers-West (SEIU-UHW), a union based in the western United States, has raised concerns about the hospital chains' rates of a severe **PRIME** cont. on page 6A

June 30 fundraiser in Lefors for 11-year-old girl with epilepsy

Event to include poker run, pancakes, live music

"Help Get a Dog for Kat," a benefit pancake breakfast and poker run, is set for Saturday, June 30, at the Lefors Civic Center, 103 N. Court.

The event is a fundraiser to help defray the costs of treatment and a seizure therapy dog for Kathryn Campbell, an 11-year-old suffering from epilepsy.

"On July 3 of last summer, Kathryn had four seizures," said her mother, Kim Hanover Campbell, originally of Skellytown. "She'd had never seizures before,

so that's where everything started. They put her on medication, and they explained to us that where her seizures are (in the brain), they're very resistant to medication. We've gone through five or six medicines."

At the time, Kathryn's seizures were isolated to the right side of her brain. Doctors at Cook Children's Hospital in Fort Worth, where the Campbells now live, decided that the best way to control Kathryn's seizures was to perform a frontal and temporal lobe resection -- a surgical procedure to remove parts of those sections of her brain.

Despite Kathryn's May 8 surgery, however, the seizures have increased and spread to the left side of her brain, and medications have still had little effect.

"We're on three seizure meds right now, and she's

still having seizures daily," said Kim. "We're just trying to figure out how to keep her safe and get the seizures under control."

To that end, a seizure dog would help reduce the risks during Kathryn's epileptic episodes.

"It will hopefully be able to tell us when she has a seizure so that we can make sure and we know that we can get there and that she'll be safe," Kim said. "A lot of the time, she produces a lot of saliva when she has her seizures. If she falls, you have to get her turned on her side to make sure she doesn't choke. The therapy dog is trained to be with her to help break her fall, to let us know when it happens, things like that."

The Campbells also need financial assistance for Kathryn's medical bills and are facing a move to a house without stairs, which pose a danger to Kathryn.

Kim's family came up with the June 30 benefit to help **CAMPBELL** cont. on page 6A

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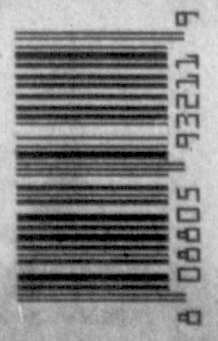

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Texas' ninth grade STAAR results 'sobering'

DALLAS (AP) — If the final standards were already in place, more than half of Texas high school freshmen would have failed the new, more rigorous end-of-course standardized tests in five key areas, figures released Friday by the state education agency show.

The new State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness, or STAAR, end-of-course tests are gradually replacing the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills or TAKS. This spring, more than 319,000 ninth-grade students took the STAAR exams for the first time in biology, world geography, algebra 1, and English 1 — writing and reading.

When their scores were judged against the state's final standards, which will be used in 2016, the passing rate in biology was 41 percent. In English writing, it was 34 percent.

"I think those numbers are very sobering," Debbie Ratcliffe, a Texas Education Agency spokeswoman said. "We wanted to present them

and make them available to districts so that they would realize we all have a lot of work to do if we're going to keep these students on track to graduate on time."

But not all is as it appears, as the first passing standard is the easiest. Measured against the current standard, the ninth-graders' scores ranged from 87 percent passing biology to 55 percent passing English writing.

The tougher passing standards are gradually being phased in to give students time to adjust. Standards will rise in both 2014 and 2016. State law now requires students to pass 15 of the tests throughout high school to graduate. And those who failed them this year can take them again in July.

"While we know there is always an adjustment period for students and teachers in a new testing program, results from the first STAAR assessments are encouraging overall, showing that students generally performed as expected or better,"

Texas Commissioner of Education Robert Scott said in a statement.

State education officials say school districts and teachers will need to adjust their lesson plans to insure students in elementary and middle school will be prepared for the high school end-of-course exams. The education agency will make STAAR training available for teachers this summer — much of it online — and predicts that more children will enroll in summer school than ever before.

The Houston school district, the largest in Texas, posted a message on its website Friday saying its board will hire 228 additional summer school teachers. The district's summer session begins Monday.

"I think it's safe to say we were all hoping for higher scores," said Bill Hammond, President and CEO of the Texas Association of Business. "While the results are disappointing, and in some cases surprising, this also shows us why we need a strong STAAR cont. on page 6A

Vet believes he was injured in war

DALLAS (AP) — A soldier-turned-TV contestant whose claims of being injured in battle were dismissed by military officials says he believed he was telling the truth, but he doesn't know what is real.

Timothy Michael Poe appeared on Monday's episode of the NBC show "America's Got Talent," claiming he was injured by a grenade in Afghanistan in 2009, though Minnesota National Guard records don't support his claims.

Poe, who now lives in Texas, cried in portions of an interview aired Friday on WFAA-TV in Dallas. He told the station he doesn't know why he "believed things that happened to me, and they might not have?"

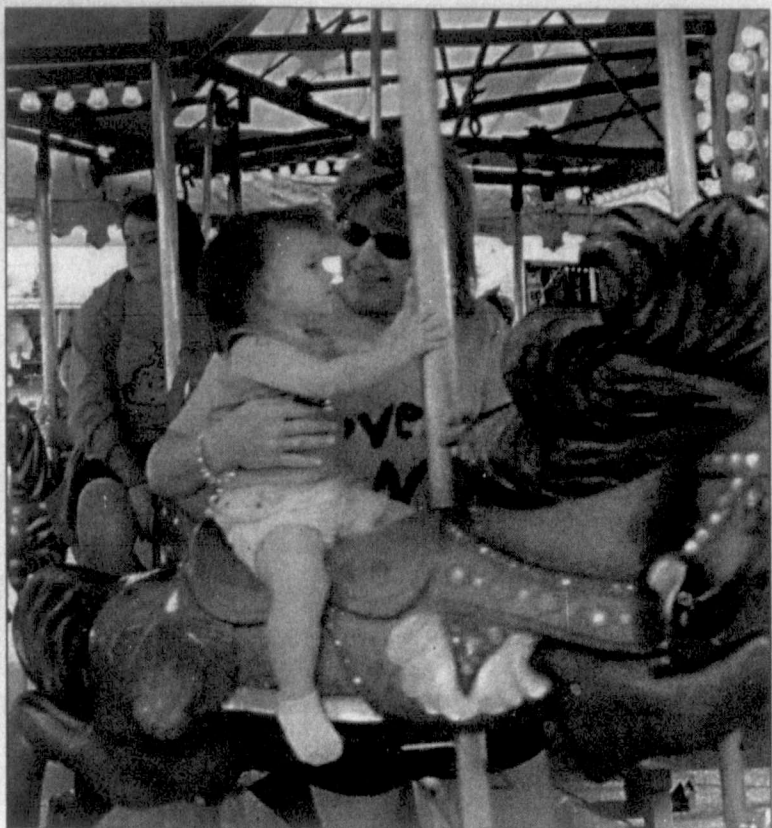
Poe won over the crowd and celebrity judges on the talent show with a moving story about how he blocked a grenade blast to save his buddies. He said the blast broke his back and left him with a brain injury.

The National Guard has said military records show Poe wasn't injured in combat in Afghanistan, and he has been criticized — especially by veterans — since he made his injury claims.

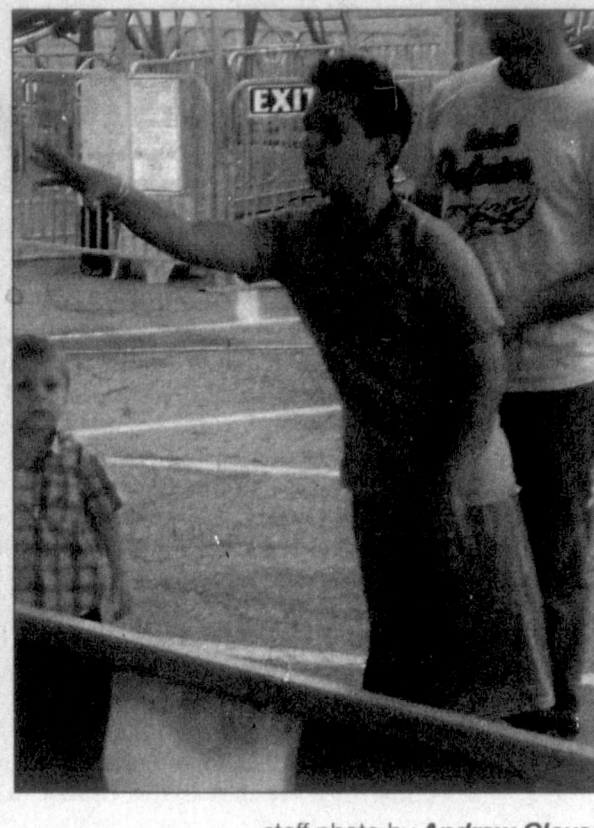
Poe also provided a photo to the NBC talent show of a soldier he passed off as himself, though the photo actually shows Staff Sgt. Norman Bone in Afghanistan in 2006. Bone said Friday that Poe's alleged lies disrespect all men and women who've served in the military, and he called Poe's actions "completely wrong."

Poe's fiancée, Carrie Morris, has said Poe accidentally submitted the photo because he was rushed. Poe has declined requests for interviews from The Associated Press.

Court overturns drug judgment

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Supreme Court has reversed a nearly \$5 million judgment against prescription drug maker Centocor Inc., that blamed the company for a Corpus Christi woman's illness after she took medication to treat an existing condition.

A Texas appeals court had upheld a jury's findings that the Johnson & Johnson subsidiary was liable for fraud for misrepresenting its drug Remicade as a treatment in 2001 for Crohn's disease, a bowel condition. The woman, Patricia Hamilton, contended an instructional video she saw about the drug emphasized its benefits but not possible adverse reactions.

Centocor appealed to the high court, which unanimously ruled Friday that existing case law shows it's up to the prescribing physician and not the drug manufacturer to discuss side effects with the patient.

Men sentenced, stole from army

EL PASO (AP) — Authorities say three West Texas men have received federal prison sentences and another is on probation for stealing \$290,000 worth of aviation fuel from the Army.

Tomas Quintero and Luis Campos were employed by a contractor that supplied fuel to military aircraft at Biggs Army Airfield in El Paso. They would steal the fuel and sell it to Fernando and Richard Baca, who used it on their gravel trucks, the office of the Comptrollers Criminal Investigation Division said in a statement Friday.

All four have pleaded guilty to conspiracy to commit theft. Quintero received a 30-month sentence while Campos got four months in prison. Fernando Baca, also pleaded guilty to IRS-related charges and received a 15-month sentence while Ricardo Baca is on five years' probation.

Man guilty in health care fraud

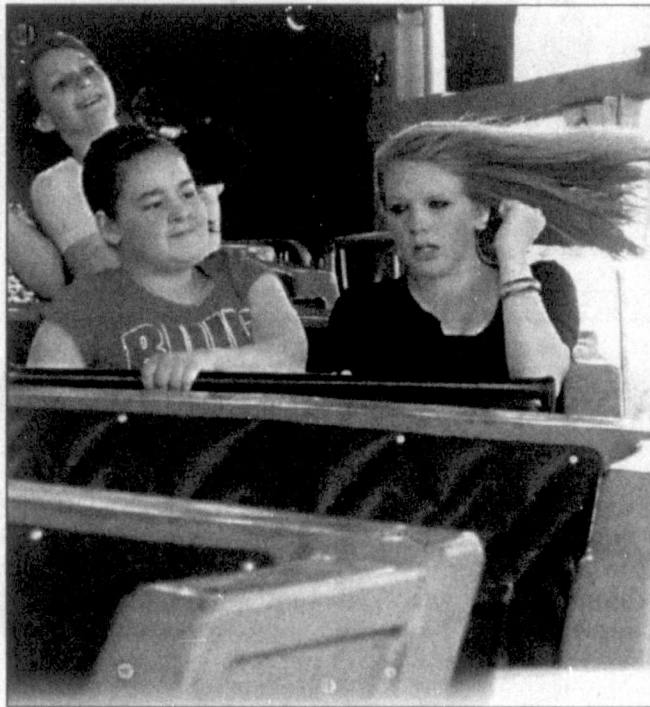
HOUSTON (AP) — Prosecutors say a 45-year-old Houston man has pleaded guilty to participating in a massive health care fraud conspiracy.

U.S. Attorney Kenneth Magidson said Friday that Floyd Leslie Brooks admitted he referred Medicare beneficiaries to City Nursing Services of Texas Inc. in exchange for illegal kickbacks.

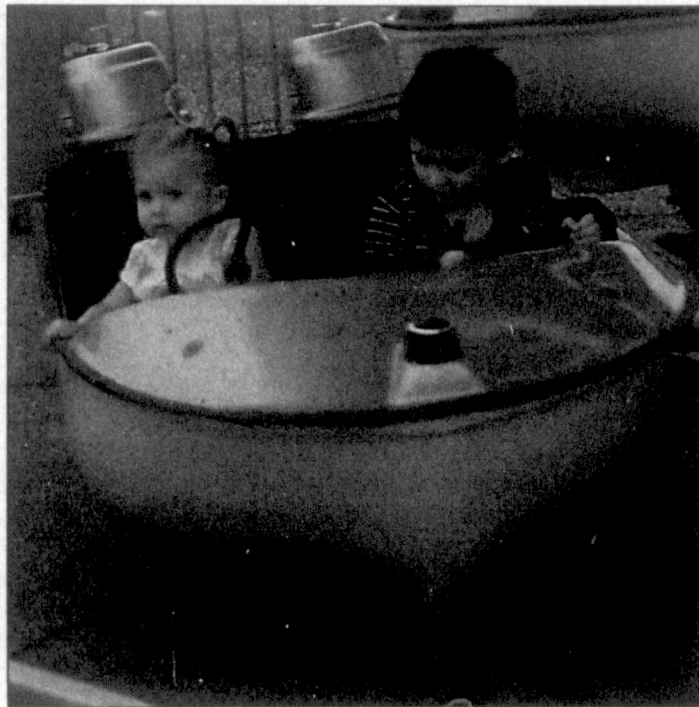
The plea agreement states that Brooks received 32 checks totaling \$13,700 for referring beneficiaries to City Nursing's owner, Umawa Oke Imo.

Imo was sentenced to more than 27 years in prison last year for his main role in the conspiracy. Imo billed Medicare and Medicaid more than \$45 million for physical therapy services at City Nursing that never occurred.

Brooks was allowed to remain on bond pending sentencing Sept. 20. He faces up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.

Today is Saturday, June 9, the 161st day of 2012. There are 205 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 9, 1972, heavy rains triggered record flooding in the Black Hills of South Dakota; the resulting disaster left at least 238 people dead and \$164 million in damage.

On this date:

In A.D. 68, the Roman Emperor Nero committed suicide, ending a 13-year reign.

In 1870, author Charles Dickens died in Gad's Hill Place, England.

In 1909, Alice Huyler Ramsey, 22, set out from New York in a Maxwell DA on a journey to become the first woman to drive across the United States. (Ramsey and three female companions arrived in San Francisco on Aug. 7.)

In 1911, Carrie (sometimes spelled "Carry") A. Nation, the hatchet-wielding temperance crusader, died in Leavenworth, Kan., at age 64.

In 1940, during World War II, Norway decided to surrender to the Nazis, effective at midnight.

In 1949, Georgia Neese Clark was unanimously confirmed by the U.S. Senate to be the first female Treasurer of the United States.

In 1954, during the Senate-Army Hearings, Army special counsel Joseph N. Welch berated Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy for verbally attacking a member of Welch's law firm, Fred Fisher, asking McCarthy, "Have you no sense of decency, sir? At long last, have you left no sense of decency?"

In 1969, the Senate confirmed Warren Burger to be the new chief justice of the United States, succeeding Earl Warren.

In 1973, Secretariat became horse racing's first Triple Crown winner in 25 years by winning the Belmont Stakes.

In 1978, leaders of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints struck down a 148-year-old policy of excluding black men from the Mormon priesthood.

In 1985, American educator Thomas Sutherland was kidnapped in Lebanon; he was released in November 1991 along with fellow hostage Terry Waite.

In 1986, the Rogers Commission released its report on the Challenger disaster, criticizing NASA and rocket-builder Morton Thiokol for management problems leading to the explosion that claimed the lives of seven astronauts.

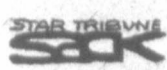
Ten years ago: President Jacques Chirac's mainstream right prevailed in a first round of elections for France's 577-seat National Assembly. Thousands of Russian soccer fans rioted in Moscow after their country's loss to Japan in the World Cup. Albert Costa won the French Open over fellow Spaniard Juan Carlos Ferrero, 6-1, 6-0, 4-6, 6-3. Se Ri Pak won the LPGA Championship to become the youngest woman to claim four major championships.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush, denounced by anti-American protesters on the streets of Rome, defended his humanitarian record as he met at the Vatican with Pope Benedict XVI, who expressed concern about "the worrisome situation in Iraq." A day after being ordered back to jail, Paris Hilton said she wouldn't appeal her sentence for a probation violation. Rags to Riches became the first filly to win the Belmont Stakes since 1905. Justine Henin claimed her third consecutive French Open title with a 6-1, 6-2 victory over Ana Ivanovic.

One year ago: The entire top echelon of Newt Gingrich's presidential campaign resigned in a mass exodus that left his bid for the Republican nomination in tatters; the former House speaker vowed defiantly to remain a candidate. Alabama passed a tough law against illegal immigration, requiring schools to find out if students were in the country lawfully and making it a crime to knowingly give an illegal immigrant a ride. (Federal courts have since blocked parts of the law.)

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 10, 1942, during World War II, German forces massacred 173 male residents of Lidice (LIH'-dyiht-zeh), Czechoslovakia, in retaliation for the killing of Nazi official Reinhard Heydrich.

Add remaining ingredients to make a thin consistency (add more water if necessary). Simmer for 20 minutes.

Taste and adjust seasoning if necessary. Serve hot or cold.

them, too." Although the conference brings together people from around the world, Larkin was struck by the similarities in the things they dealt with as educators.

"We have a different culture of students in the digital age," she said. "There's higher engagement, and they are inundated with information, and they use it differently. It's the culture of the generation. Some information is so easily accessible,

and they know what to do with it and how to use it."

"We have to come to terms with the fact that we can't keep educating students as we always have," she added. "We have to prepare students to be flexible and adaptable."

Larkin added that students today think of themselves as global citizens. "They don't see the walls of the community the way we do with social networks and technology," she said. "There are no walls or limits,

and the world is smaller to them. It's all in their fingertips."

Larkin said she was honored to be considered to attend, and she hopes to represent Pampa and Texas well.

"The experience puts me back in the position as a learner, and it's where I need to be to be focused here," she said. "I hope to come back and communicate my vision to the staff and community."

bloodstream infection called septicemia, as well as a group of other illnesses including kwashiorkor, a rare form of malnutrition associated with famine. Prime is currently involved in a lawsuit with SEIU-UHW that alleges the union and Kaiser Permanente, a non-profit managed-care consortium, were conspiring to drive Prime out of the market. Representatives from Kaiser Permanente declined to comment on this story.

Rare diseases like kwashiorkor can significantly raise Medicare payments, in some cases, by about \$6,000 per patient. During 2009, Prime operated 7 of the 12 hospitals with the highest septicemia rates in the country, and after Prime acquired the Shasta Regional Medical Center in Redding, California in 2009, its septicemia rate almost doubled.

Adam Weisberg, a data analyst with SEIU-UHW, was struck by Prime's rates for about 10 severe diseases while working on a data project for the union.

"When we started working on this, we had no idea whether we were looking at upcoding or extremely high rates of infection," said Weisberg. "But when you see 1,000 kwashiorkor patients, it's impossible that those patients really had what Prime was billing for."

Critics of the company have alleged that its abnormally high rates for diseases like septicemia don't jibe with its hospital stays, which are shorter than average. During testimony at the recent hearing, Jonathan Gluck, a senior executive and counsel at Heritage, noted that 64 percent of the provider's patients who are admitted to a Prime emergency room have a one or two-day stay, compared with about 36 percent of one or two-day stays at other facilities.

Weisberg interpreted short hospital stays as not reflecting quality health care, given Prime's rates for diseases like septicemia and malnutrition.

"If they're really treating the most severe cases in America by leaps and bounds, you would expect for them to have a lot of long stays and not a lot of short stays," he said. "And nobody is in their universe on the severity they are reporting; they are the highest in America. So, it looks like great quality, because their hospital bills report these incredibly sick patients who are surviving and getting out so quickly."

Brad Morse, the recently named CEO of PRMC, denies any wrongdoing by Prime.

"More than anything else, I don't want this to be a distraction to what we're trying to do or what we are doing, because it truly is false allegations," he said.

Morse maintains that the company is not engaging in upcoding, but rather, participating in "physician-to-physician interaction and documentation."

"It's a peer-to-peer review system," he said. "The doctors are dealing with the doctors on making sure that care is appropriate, that the patient is actually getting what they need, that the documentation of what we're doing is actually correct. That's the model as far as the medicine goes. It just works better. Now that we've started doing it, most of the hospitals that I know of out there are doing it."

During the recent hearing in California, Prime's Sarrao spoke to the company's malnutrition rates, adding that he believes the company is "ahead of the curve" in its documentation practices.

"Because at some hospitals, including Shasta (Regional Medical Center), we don't contract with a lot of the health plans, the patients that end up in our ER are acutely ill, and that acute illness also causes that malnutrition," he said. "So you have to realize that patients that end up at our hospital are more acutely ill because a lot of times they're in nursing homes, skilled nursing facilities. ...So, by the time they arrive at the ER, they're acutely ill, and those acute illnesses that brought them to the ER also affect their malnutrition status."

The Office of the Inspector General and MediCal were unable to confirm or deny any investigations of Prime within their agencies, but according to a California Watch report, the company has been the subject of an FBI probe.

Morse maintains that the company's coding practices are on the up-and-up.

"Are we progressive?" he said. "Absolutely. Do we change things on a regular basis? Yes. Do other hospital systems follow us? Yes, they do. That's one way we got part of the (Thomson Reuters) Top 15 (health) systems in the United States. You wouldn't get that if there was something wrong."

accountability system in Texas."

But state Rep. Mike Villarreal, a Democrat from San Antonio, saw it differently, saying test results alone are not an adequate measure for evaluating schools or stu-



dents.

"We need to tone down the obsession with test scores and test preparation," said Villarreal, adding that the Legislature needs to bring balance to the state testing system during the next session.

"It's hard to know if a low score is the result of a student having a bad day or if a high score is the result of a teacher putting aside enriching lessons and just teaching to the test."

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Boos more scarce, but GOP convention still has division

FORT WORTH (AP) — Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst addressed the Texas Republican Convention largely without boos Friday — a sign of unity in a powerful party still struggling with deep internal divisions between traditional conservatives and tea party activists.

The U.S. Senate candidate took the podium to warm applause and a partial standing ovation one day after some delegates launched into loud and prolonged boos as Gov. Rick Perry endorsed Dewhurst on the convention floor.

When the crowd quieted, a few people booed or yelled "Cruz!" in support of Dewhurst's opponent Ted Cruz, but they were quickly and forcefully shushed.

Dewhurst is competing with Cruz, a former state solicitor general and tea party favorite, for the Republican nomination to replace retiring Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison. They face a runoff July 31 after no one in a crowded GOP field won a majority of the votes cast in last month's primary.

Lieutenant governor since 2003, Dewhurst is the mainstream Republican choice. He says he has helped make Texas one of the most conservative states in the country, but also doesn't apologize for sometimes working with Democrats to ensure key bills are approved by the Texas Legislature.

Tea party groups have branded Dewhurst as too moderate. Ex-Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin and South Carolina Sen. Jim DeMint have endorsed Cruz, as has former presidential candidate Rick Santorum.

Dewhurst trumpeted his conservative accomplishments in his speech at the Fort Worth Convention Center, saying he helped Texas defund groups affiliated with abortion providers, such as Planned Parenthood, while also helping pass 51 tax cuts.

He added that his record has even impressed hard-core conservatives, saying, "Tea party leaders know because last year, I helped cut \$14 billion dollars out of our state spending."

Dewhurst also stressed the importance of religion: "We know that whatever success that we've had in Texas is due to our deeply held conservative principles and the will to implement them and by the grace of the good Lord."

Cruz is set to address the convention this weekend, but as he headed to a Texas Republican Women's gathering nearby on Friday, he stopped to argue with Tarrant County delegate Sherri Heinzman and her 17-year-old daughter Sara. The two were waving Dewhurst signs and claimed Cruz was soft on opposing gay marriage.

Cruz responded that Palin and Santorum would not have endorsed someone who wasn't a true conservative — and he looked ready to keep talking, but was pulled away by an aide.

The intraparty senatorial fight has laid bare divisions within the Texas GOP — but it's not the only example. State House Speaker Joe Straus took the stage later Friday to sporadic cries of "Oust Straus!" Some delegates even walked out.

Straus took power in 2009 after forming a coalition between moderate Republicans and Democrats when the Texas House was almost evenly divided. After tea party members helped form a 101-49 supermajority two years later, conservative Republicans tried to depose Straus but failed.

Since then, grassroots groups have spent hundreds of thousands of dollars to oppose Straus, and Republican state Rep. Brian Hughes of Marshall has announced his intent to challenge the speaker for the House leadership.

Still more discord was on display when Hutchison gave a speech that endorsed ex-Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney's presidential bid.

"We have got a job to do. We have the job of electing Mitt Romney," Hutchison said, drawing boos from Ron Paul supporters.

"The Democrats are trying to divide us. They are saying we're not united behind Mitt Romney," Hutchison continued.

"We're not!" yelled a few dissenters.

Hutchison garnered cheers from most of the hall when she said, "It is time for us to rally around Mitt Romney!"

"We're not distracted and we're not divided," Hutchison added. As she said that, a small group chanted, "Ron Paul!" But a larger chant of "Romney! Romney!" drowned it out.

Paul addressed the convention Thursday and called for party unity — but only behind defending the values of the U.S. Constitution.

Santorum endorses Romney

FORT WORTH (AP) — Unsuccessful presidential candidate Rick Santorum says he loves the tea party for "resurrecting" the U.S. Constitution — but that the document itself "is insufficient."

The former Pennsylvania senator said Friday that America thrives on life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness and that, "True happiness comes from doing God's will."

Santorum addressed a gala dinner at the Texas Republican Convention and said

that "the left tries to drive faith out of the public square."

He called this year's election the most important in American history, adding that no one would be asked to risk their lives but "we are asking you to put your honor on the line."

Santorum also endorsed his former presidential rival, ex-Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney, drawing strong applause. He said "you need to help this man."

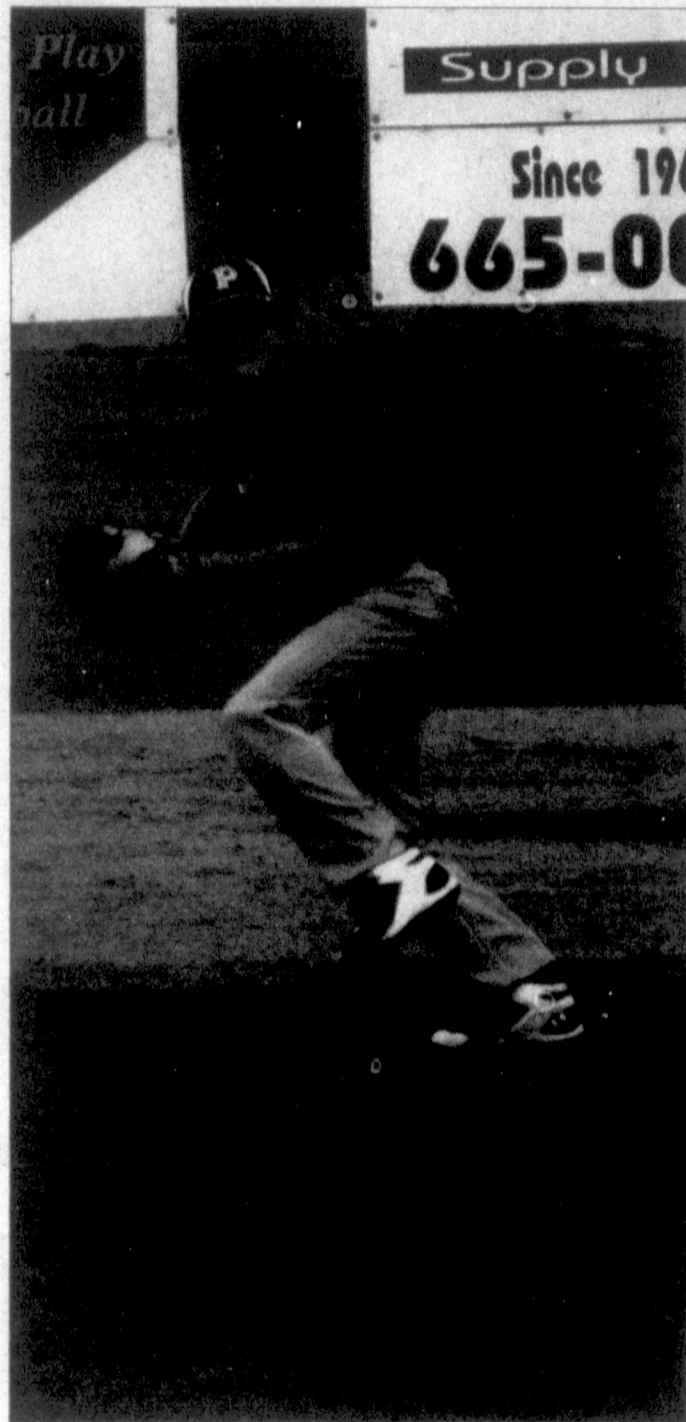
graduated.

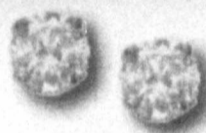
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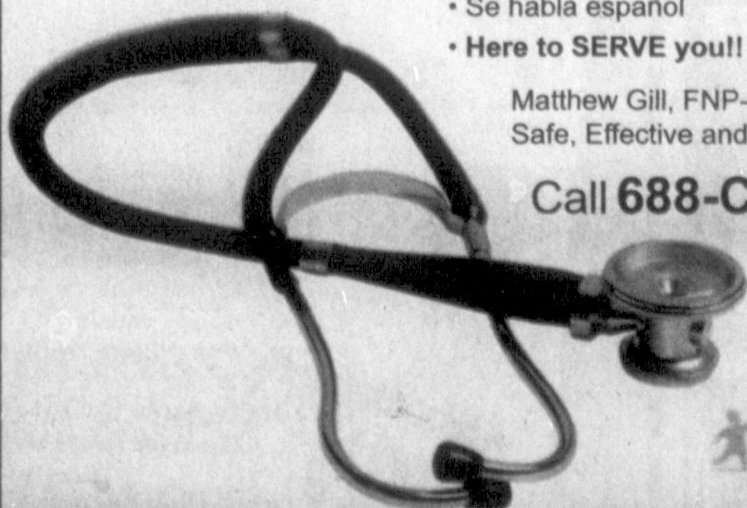

Challenger Sports soccer camp returns to Pampa

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After a successful camp last year, Challenger Sports sent two more British soccer players to run another camp in Pampa that lasted from Monday to Friday at the Pampa Soccer Association Fields.

"We've been dribbling, shooting, defending and shielding," Declan O'Sha, from Montessori, England, said. "We've had matches and scrimmages. We are trying to develop play in the whole game."

O'Sha said he was impressed with how the children developed during the camp.

"We've been teaching them to pass with the side of their foot," O'Sha said. "Some of them are getting it. They just need more power and accuracy."

Owen Davies from London helped with the camp last year and said he noticed improvement.

"We did freestyle soccer," Davies said. "Trying to balance the soccer ball and keep control of it. One of the kids couldn't

balance it on his neck last year. He was a lot smaller. This year he is doing it while messing around. ... The kids have definitely improved from last year. The older they get, the stronger they get. It's easier to do more things with them."

The campers were divided into popular soccer countries and competed against each other in the "World Cup." Davies said the numbers were a little down but expects bigger numbers when the camp returns in August.

"A lot of people were doing it in August because it's near the season," Davies said. "We will have lot more numbers for that camp. We had about 60 percent of the numbers from last year."

At the end of the camp, participants received evaluation cards. Davies said the children can expand their skills by continuing to work at home.

"They can dribble around the house," Davies said. "They can practice their freestyle in the garden and the yard."

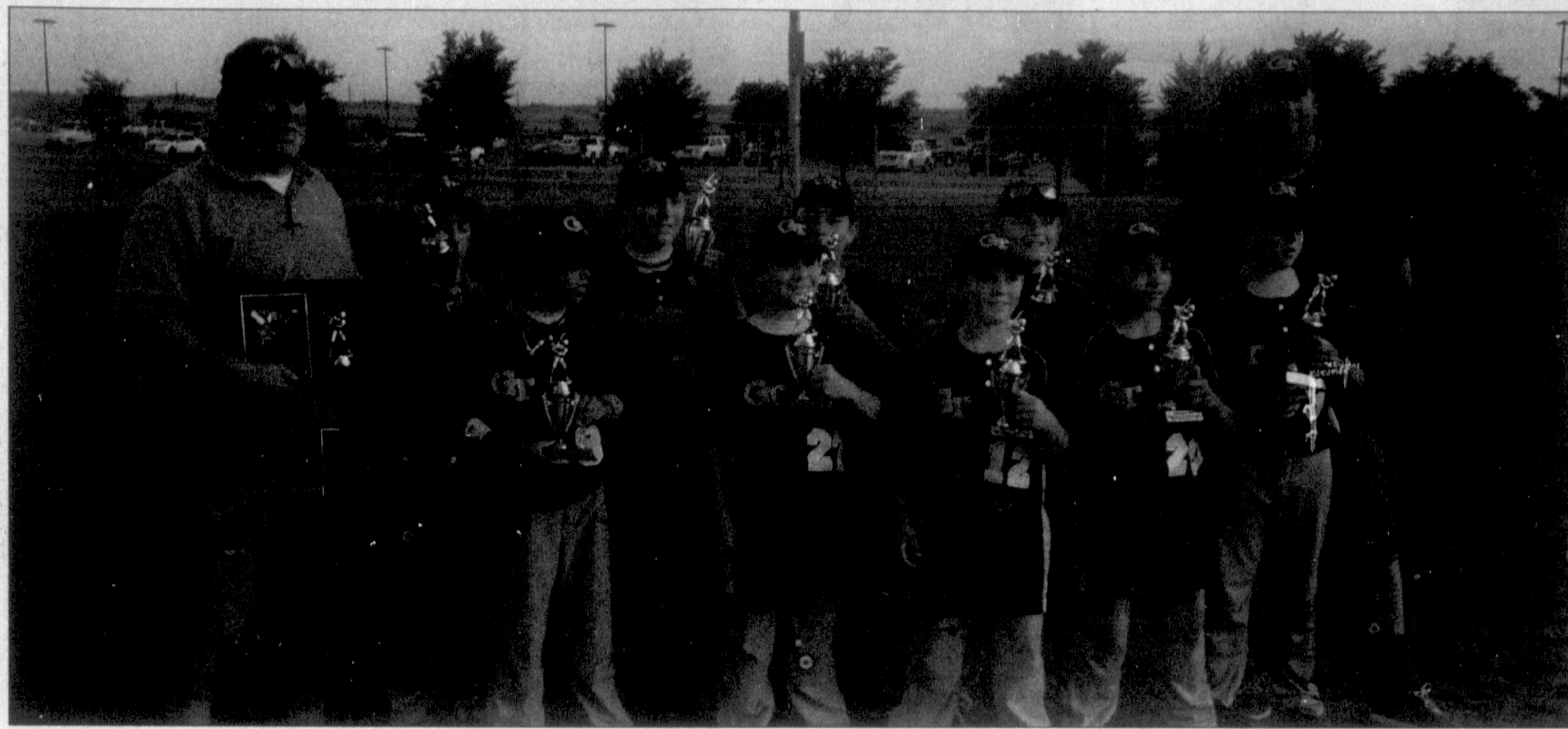
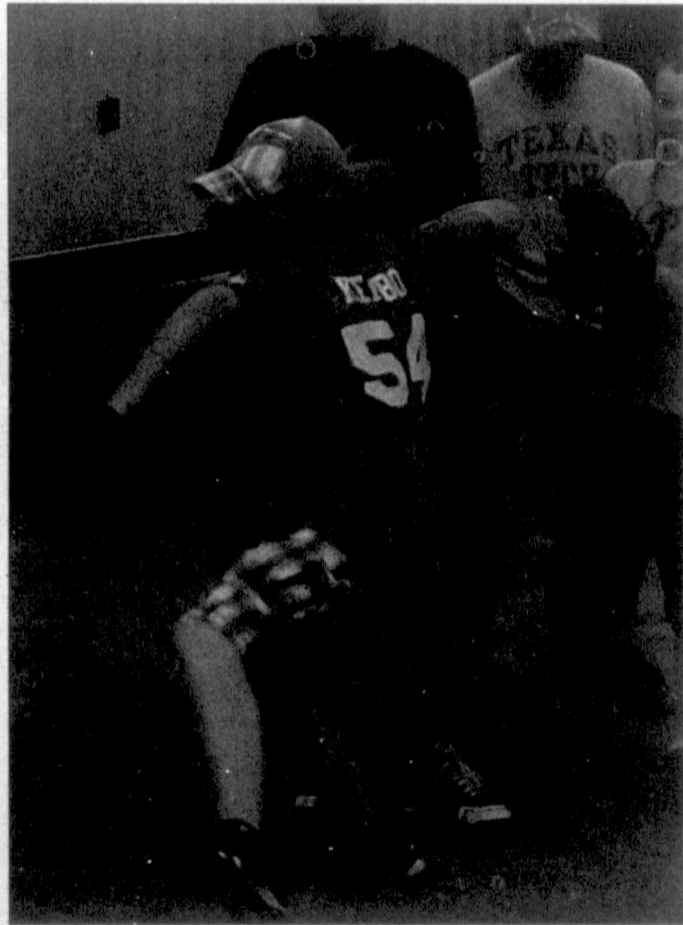

Most Texas cotton could use rain soon

COLLEGE STATION — The drought situation in the western half of Texas remained largely unchanged, but abnormally dry weather reclaimed large parts of the eastern half of the state during the last week of May, according to the U.S. Drought monitor and Texas AgriLife Extension Service reports.

After good rains a few weeks ago, South Texas also turned drier, with moderate drought to abnormally dry weather stretching from the Lower Rio Grande Valley up the Coastal Bend area.

A drier trend is hard on all crops, but it comes at a critical time for cotton in many parts of the state, said Dr. Gaylon Morgan, AgriLife Extension statewide cotton specialist, College Station.

"I was in the Rolling Plains last week," Morgan said. "In the Haskell area planters were really rolling where they have irrigation and received some recent rains in the central section of the Rolling Plains."

It was a different story in the northern and southern portions of the Rolling Plains, he said, where it's mainly dryland farming. The producers he talked to last week were holding back on planting, hoping to get enough moisture to at least get the crop up.

"However, they will soon be up against the planting date deadline and will have to start planting soon," he said.

Morgan noted even where there is irrigation in the Rolling Plains, the producers, like their South Plains counterparts, will need timely rains to supplement irrigation.

"They had some surface moisture to establish the cotton crop, but they didn't have any deep moisture, and their wells don't have a lot of capacity, and they didn't get much aquifer recharge after last year," Morgan said. "I think they're cautiously optimistic that they can make a crop between predicted normal rainfall and supplemental irrigation."

South Texas cotton is starting to flower, but rains have been scanty for the last couple of weeks. Morgan was visiting Jackson County for a field day on June 4, and said the cotton looked great.

"But they had cracks in the ground 2 inches wide and probably several feet deep, so the moisture has to come fairly quickly if the crop is going to maintain its good yield potential," he said.

Though the majority of cotton is grown in the South Plains and Rolling Plains, more than a half million acres are grown between the Coastal Bend and the Lower Rio Grande Valley, according to Morgan.

"Overall the cotton in the Blacklands looks good," he said. "However, the cotton plant is about to reach the stage of high water demand and will need a good rain in the near future to ensure good fruit set. Producers with irrigation capability are irrigating their cotton while some are holding off a week hoping for a rain in the next week."

AgriLife Extension district reporters compiled the following summaries for May 28 — June 4:

PANHANDLE: Most of the region received some rain, from a trace to as much as 2 inches. Hartley County reported hail. Soil-moisture levels were from very short to adequate, with most counties reporting short. Corn was mostly in good condition. Cotton and grain sorghum were mostly in good to fair condition. Wheat was rated mostly fair. Rangeland and pastures were in very poor to good condition, with most reporting poor. Recent rains greened up pastures but soils were moisture deficit, and more rain will be needed to grow grass. Cattle were improving. Producers were preparing to spray for thrips. In some early planted cotton, they had already made applications.

ROLLING PLAINS: Parts of the region saw storms but didn't get much rain. King County reported baseball- and softball-size hail with 100 mph winds. However, only minimal damage was reported. Wise County reported the most rain, from 1 inch to 1.5 inches. Pastures needed



rainfall to keep up with forage demands. Dryland cotton farmers began planting, but expectations were low. Some producers were lucky and had cotton emerged, but with the recent winds and dry weather, the seedlings were not expected to last long without rain soon. Irrigated producers watered plantings to get cotton emerged, but it has taken as long as two weeks in some cases to get stands. Residents were becoming concerned about the danger of wildfire and a repeat of last year's drought. The wheat harvest was complete in most counties. Grasshopper numbers were increasing.

SOUTH PLAINS:

Highs were in the upper 90s to 100s most of the week with days cooling down a little at the end of the week. There were scattered storms in some counties, but most areas did not receive rain. Cotton growers nearly completed planting but did so mostly in an effort to beat crop insurance deadlines. Some producers dry-planted in hope of receiving rain later. Those with irrigation were readying to apply water to emerged cotton. Herbicide applications were being made in some fields. All areas will need timely rains for this year's cotton crop to survive. Pasture and rangeland were mostly in fair to good condition. Cattle were in mostly good condition with little to no supplemental feeding being done.
