

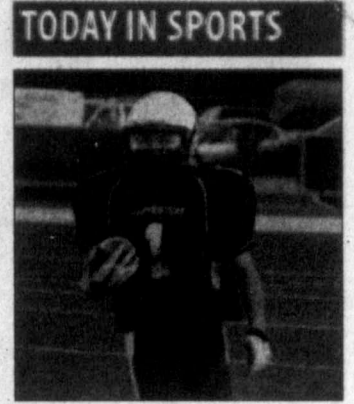
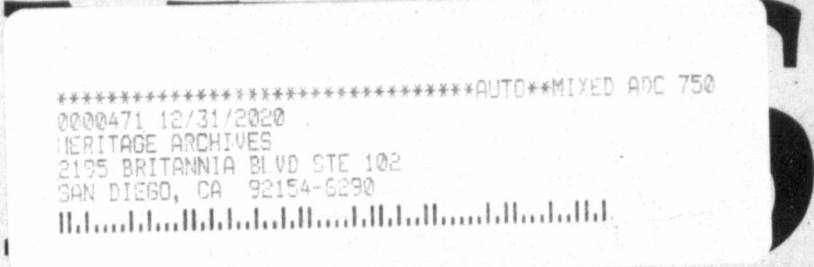

## Jobless rate falls in most battleground states

**CLEVELAND (AP)** — Unemployment rates fell last month in nearly all of the battleground states that will determine the presidential winner, giving President Barack Obama fresh fodder to argue that voters should stick with him in an election focused squarely on the economy.

The declines, however, were modest. It's unknown whether they will do much to sway undecided voters who are considering whether to back Republican Mitt Romney or give the Democratic president four more years.

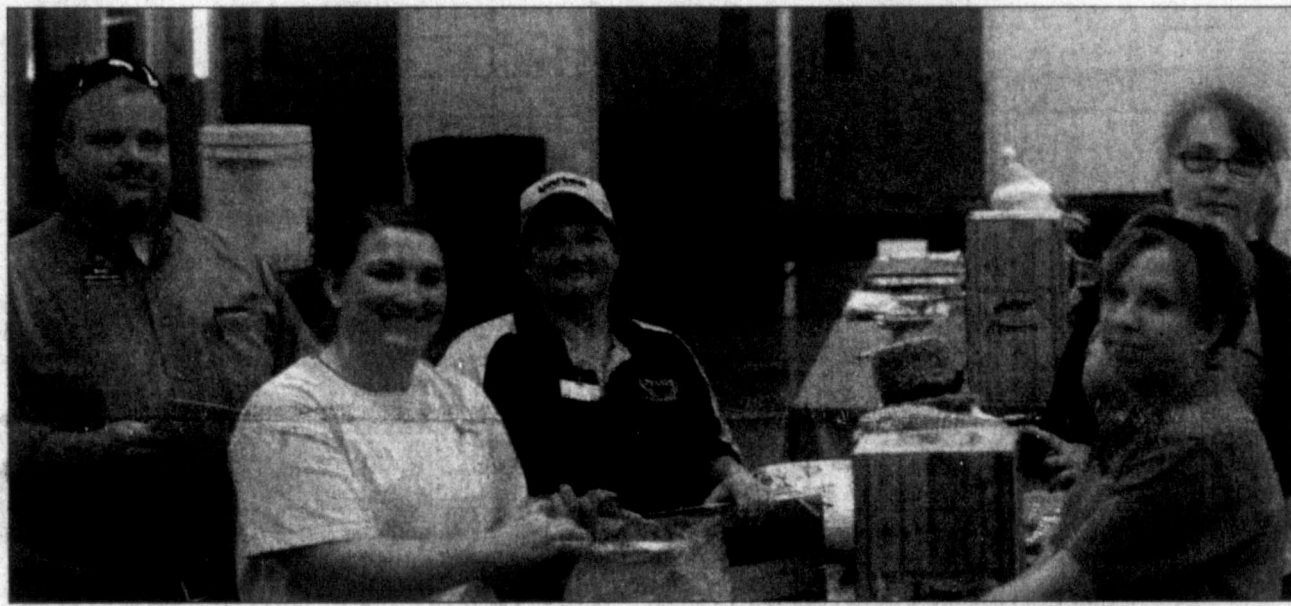
The statewide data released by the Labor Department on Friday provide one of the last comprehensive looks at the health of the U.S. economy ahead of Election Day, now a little more than two weeks away. Voters will get one more update on the

national unemployment rate just days before the election. But the state reports matter greatly to the Obama and Romney campaigns, which believe the public's impressions of the economy are shaped mostly by local conditions rather than national ones. In Ohio, perhaps the most crucial battleground state for both Obama and Romney, the unemployment rate ticked down last month to 7 percent from 7.2 percent, below the national average

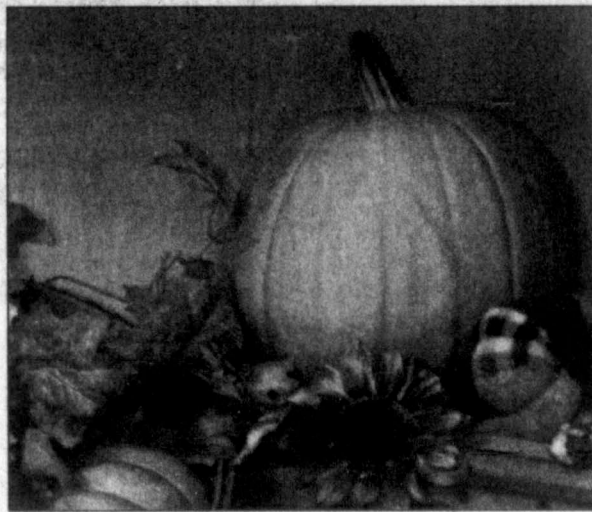
of 7.8 percent. "I knew a lot of people who were laid off and now they're working," said firefighter Matt Sparling, an Obama supporter from Parma Heights, Ohio. "So something good is happening here." Obama's team is banking on the president getting credit for improvements in Ohio's economy, particularly for the bailout

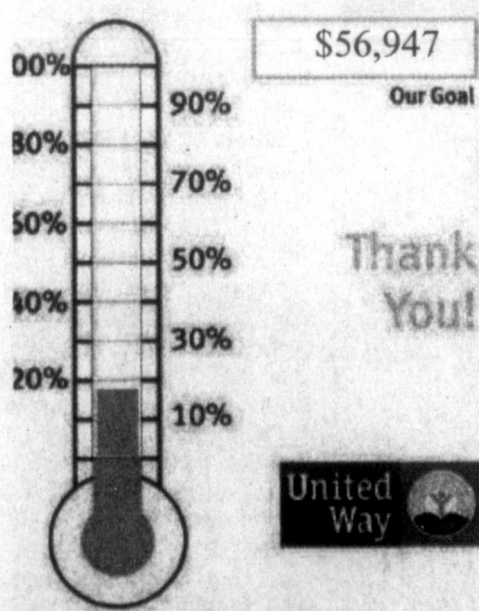

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### Fire destroys iconic 'Big Tex'

DALLAS (AP) — Big Tex, the metal cowboy whose slow drawl of "Howdy, folks!" made him an icon of the State Fair of Texas for 60 years, was destroyed Friday when flames engulfed his 52-foot-tall frame.

Some material that made up Big Tex's hands and sleeves could still be seen as firefighters gathered around the scorched area. This year's fair, which closes Sunday and had been celebrating the towering structure's birthday, went on despite the fire — just as Big Tex would want it.

"Big Tex is a symbol of everything the state fair stands for," fair spokeswoman Sue Gooding said. "Big Tex is where my par-

ents told me, 'If you get lost, meet at Big Tex.'"

The cowboy always was easy to spot, with his 75-gallon hat and 50-pound belt buckle.

Gooding said she didn't know what caused the fire, but noted that electrical controls move Big Tex's mouth and head.

Bill Bragg, the voice of Big Tex who read scripts from a nearby trailer while the giant cowboy's mouth moved, said someone came in and told him the structure was on fire. He stepped outside the trailer and watched Big Tex burn.

"It was a quick end," said Bragg, who is a radioc engineer outside the three weeks a year that he works at the fair.

The funds are earmarked to upgrade the audio and visual equipment to digital format.

Digital format is currently replacing the 35mm film currently used in Pampa and other theaters. Without the upgrade, Cinema 4 in Las Pampas Square will not be able to compete with larger theaters in Amarillo.

The motion was opened for discussion, and with no objections, the motion will be sent to the City Commission for its consideration next week.

The second item for discussion was a \$50,000 grant to the Hidden Hills Golf Course for an additional two miles of golf cart paths. This will complete the paths around all 18 holes, except a small portion of hole No. 3.

The motion was introduced to the public, and, with no objections, will be sent to the City Commission for consideration next Tuesday.

"Any expenditures over \$10,000 dollars must go through the city council twice," said Executive Director Clay Rice about the approval process.

Following the public hearing, Rice gave his report to the board, which included scheduled trips to the Specialty Equipment Market Association conference in Las Vegas and a trade show in Dallas sponsored by the International Council of Shopping Centers.

SEMA is a trade association that consists of a diverse group of manufacturers, distributors and retailers, and ICSC is a trade organization for the shopping center industry.

Board Treasurer Glennette Goode gave the treasurer's report, noting that income is up 3 percent, and gave the statement of EDC bank accounts and CDs.

Final discussion was about the expansion of the PEDC's offices before the board retired into executive session.

### Colorado fans upset after Madonna uses guns in show

DENVER (AP) — Some Colorado fans are upset after music superstar Madonna used guns during a performance.

Madonna started her show Thursday night at the Pepsi Center in Denver with a gun scene, which she has used in previous performances.

According to KUSA-TV (<http://tinyurl.com/8kr7gdq>), the station received several calls Friday from concert-goers saying they were offended she used guns and violence as part of her show in light of recent events in the state that included a mass shooting at a theater during a Batman movie on July 20 that left 12 people dead.

In a statement before beginning the tour, Madonna said she does not condone the use of guns. She said she is using

the guns as symbols of intolerance and "the pain I have felt from having my heart broken."

A viewer wrote on the TV station's Facebook page: "It was insensitive of her not to omit that act from her show given all the shootings and lives lost here in Colorado. I respect artistry but it was just too much especially after we waited 2 hours and 45 mins to have her come out on stage with such a violent set. We left early and will not go to another one of her concerts. No respect..."

Another viewer wrote: "One of the best concerts ever!!!!"

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### Bomb treat prompts 5-hour evacuation at Texas A&M

Texas A&M University's campus was shut down for about five hours Friday after an emailed bomb threat prompted an evacuation of more than 50,000 people and a building-by-building search.

A&M Police Lt. Allan Baron said officials were still searching some buildings late Friday afternoon, but no bombs had been found and people were being allowed to come back on campus to retrieve personal belongings and their cars. Evening activities campus, about 100 miles northwest of Houston, were set to go on as planned.

The threat also would not prompt extra security for Saturday's football game between sixth-ranked LSU and No. 20 A&M.

"We're not preparing for a high influx of problems. We're treating it like any other game that is sold out," Baron said.

High-traffic buildings and facilities, including dining and residence halls, had been cleared by police, Baron said, adding

that he didn't know how many more buildings still needed to be searched.

Baron said the bomb-threat email was sent around 11 a.m. Friday to the university's computing information services center. Campus police were notified 15 minutes later and officials made the decision to evacuate by 11:30 a.m.

The threat indicated there was a bomb on campus but did not specify where it was located, he said.

The evacuation order, posted on the university's website as a "Code Maroon" warning, directed those on campus to immediately evacuate by foot and not to use a vehicle.

Bus service on the sprawling campus in College Station was rerouted during the evacuation, but it had resumed by late Friday afternoon.

After the evacuation, the campus seemed like a ghost town. People could be seen off-campus, sitting under trees or waiting at the local restaurants.

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## Will Obama paint Romney as warmonger?

Usually, not always, the peace party wins.

Gen. Sherman's burning of Atlanta and March to the Sea ensured Abraham Lincoln's re-election in 1864.

William McKinley, with his triumph over Spain and determination to pacify and hold the Philippines, easily held off William Jennings Bryan in 1900. Yet Woodrow Wilson won in 1916 on the slogan, "He Kept Us Out of War!" And Dwight Eisenhower won a landslide with his declaration about the stalemate in Harry Truman's war: "I shall go to Korea." Richard Nixon pledged in 1968 that "new leadership will end the war and win the peace." Vice President Hubert Humphrey, behind by double digits on Oct. 1, promised to halt the bombing of North Vietnam. He united his party and closed the gap to less than a point by Election Day.

George McGovern ran as an antiwar candidate in 1972. By November, almost all U.S. troops were home from Vietnam, however, and in late October Henry Kissinger had announced, "Peace is at hand." Nixon had expropriated the peace issue. Result: 49 states.

Today, after the longest wars in our history in Afghanistan and Iraq, Americans are sick over the 6,500 dead and 40,000 wounded, fed up with the \$2 trillion in costs, and disillusioned with the results that a decade of sacrifice has produced in Baghdad and Kabul.

Aware of this war weariness, especially among women, President Obama and Vice President Biden seem intent on appearing before the nation on Election Day as the sole peace party. This fact leaps out of a close read of Biden's debate tran-

script.

Lost in his manic grinning and mocking laughter at Paul Ryan's points and rude interruptions was a recurring theme: President Obama ended the war in Iraq and is dialing back the war in Afghanistan, but Ryan and Romney seem to be looking to new military interventions in Syria and Iran.

Consider but a few Biden comments nestled in the transcript of his half of that 90-minute debate.

"The last thing we need now is another war."

"Are you (Ryan) ... going to go to war?"

"We will not let them (the Iranians) acquire a nuclear weapon, period, unless he's (Ryan) talking about going to war."

"War should always be the absolute last resort." "He (Ryan) voted to put two wars on a credit card."

"We've been in this war (Afghanistan) for over a decade. ... We are leaving in 2014, period."

About intervention in Syria, Biden said: "The last thing America needs is to get into another ground war in the Middle East, requiring tens of thousands if not well over a hundred thousand American forces."

This drumbeat, implying Romney and Ryan are champing at the bit to get into the war in Syria or into a new war with Iran, was deliberate.

Biden's words almost surely reflect what Democratic focus groups, pollsters, political analysts and pundits are advising the party to say and do: Play the peace card Monday night in Boca Raton, Fla., and tag Romney-Ryan as a trigger-happy ticket of the war party.

The charges Romney is likely to hear from the president and the questions he is likely to face from the moderator, pushing him toward bellicosity, are not that difficult to discern.

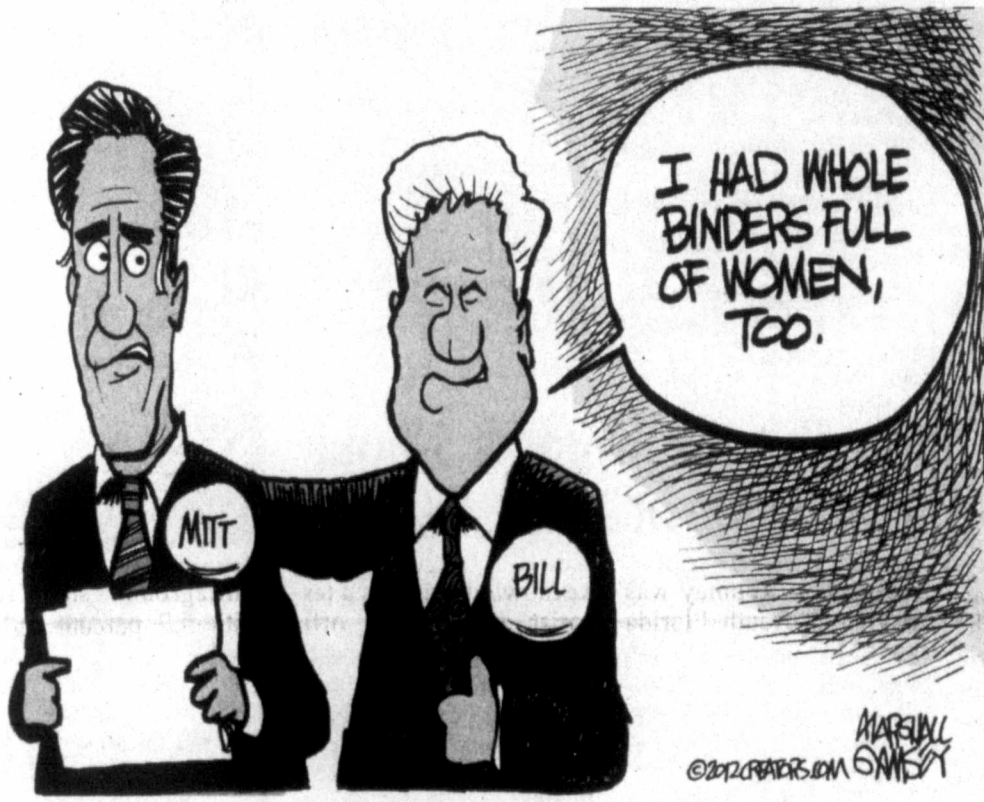

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## A right to choose single-sex education

Education proponents across the political spectrum were dismayed by recent attempts to eradicate the single-gender options in public schools in Virginia, West Virginia, Alabama, Mississippi, Maine and Florida. We were particularly troubled at efforts to thwart education choice for American students and their families because it is a cause we have worked hard to advance.

Studies have shown that some students learn better in a single-gender environment, particularly in math and science. But federal regulations used to prevent public schools from offering that option. So in 2001 we joined with then-Sen. Hillary Clinton and Sen. Susan Collins to author legislation that allowed public schools to offer single-sex education. It was an epic bipartisan battle against entrenched bureaucracy, but well worth the fight.

Since our amendment passed, thousands of American children have benefited. Now, though, some civil libertarians are claiming that single-sex public-school programs are discriminatory and thus illegal.

To be clear: The 2001 law did not require that children be educated in single-gender programs or schools. It simply allowed schools and districts to offer the choice of

single-sex schools or classrooms, as long as opportunities were equally available to boys and girls. In the vast and growing realm of education research, one central tenet has been confirmed repeatedly: Children learn in different ways. For some, single-sex classrooms make all the difference.

Critics argue that these programs promote harmful gender stereotypes. Ironically, it is exactly these stereotypes that the single-sex programs seek to eradicate. As studies have confirmed—and as any parent can tell you—negative gender roles are often sharpened in coeducational environments. Boys are more likely, for instance, to buy into the notion that reading isn't masculine when they're surrounded by (and showing off for) girls.

Girls, meanwhile, have made so much progress in educational achievement that women are overrepresented in postgraduate education. But they still lag in the acquisition of bachelor's and graduate degrees in math and the sciences. It has been demonstrated time and again that young girls are more willing to ask and answer questions in classrooms without boys.

A 2008 Department of

Education study found that "both principals and teachers believed that the main benefits of single-sex schooling are decreasing distractions to learning and improving student achievement." The gender slant—the math-is-for-boys, home-EC-is-for-girls trope—is eliminated.

In a three-year study in the mid-2000s, researchers at Florida's Stetson University compared the performance of single-gender and mixed-gender classes at an elementary school, controlling for the likes of class sizes, demographics and teacher training. When the children took the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test (which measures achievement in math and literacy, for instance), the results were striking: Only 59 percent of girls in mixed classes were scored as proficient, while 75 percent of girls in single-sex ones achieved proficiency. Similarly, 37 percent of boys in coeducational classes scored proficient, compared with 86 percent of boys in the all-boys classes.

Booker T. Washington High School in Memphis, Tenn., the winner of the 2011 Race to the Top High School Commencement Challenge, went to a 81.6

percent graduation rate in 2010 from a graduation rate of 55 percent in 2007. Among the changes at the school? Implementing all-girls and all-boys freshman academies.

In Dallas, the all-boys Barack Obama Leadership Academy opened its doors last year. There is every reason to believe it will follow the success of the first all-girls public school, Irma Rangel Young Women's Leadership School, which started in 2004. Irma Rangel, which has been a Texas Education Agency Exemplary School since 2006, also took sixth place at the Dallas Independent School District's 30th Annual Mathematics Olympiad that year.

No one is arguing that single-sex education is the best option for every student. But it is preferable for some students and families, and no one has the right to deny them an option that may work best for a particular child. Attempts to eliminate single-sex education are equivalent to taking away students' and parents' choice about one of the most fundamentally important aspects of childhood and future indicators of success—a child's education.

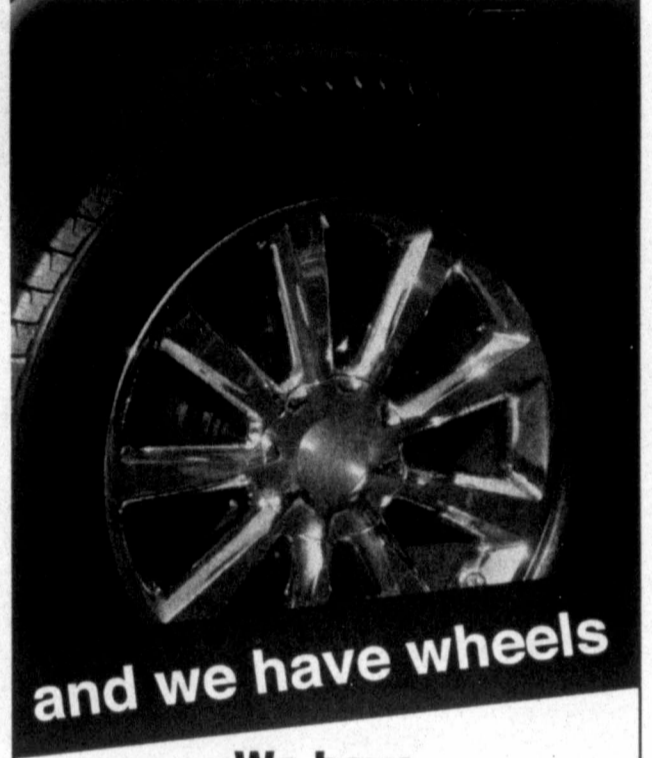

of the auto industry, which has deep roots in the Midwestern swing state. But Romney has opportunities to run on the economy in Ohio, too. The state actually lost nearly 13,000 jobs in September and the drop in the unemployment rate was probably due in part to people dropping out of the job market.

The president didn't mention the state jobless numbers during a campaign stop Friday in Virginia, one of two battleground states where the rate didn't drop. It held steady at the relatively low level of 5.9 percent.

Spirited on other topics, Obama quipped in a raucous rally at George Mason University that a case of "Romnesia" was preventing his opponent from remembering his own stances on health care, energy and a slate of

policies.

"He's forgetting what his own positions are — and he's betting that you will, too," Obama said. "We've got to name this condition that he's going through. I think it's called Romnesia."

Romney was headlining a rally in Florida Friday evening after spending much of the day in New York meeting with advisers.

The candidates were stepping off the campaign trail this weekend for debate preparations ahead of Monday's third and final face-off in Boca Raton, Fla. Romney was staying in South Florida to practice, while Obama and top aides headed to Camp David, the presidential retreat in Maryland, to prepare for the foreign policy-focused debate.

International issues competed with the economy for voters' attention Friday, as fresh questions arose over what the

White House knew when about the deadly attack on Americans in Libya.

Republican vice presidential candidate Paul Ryan accused Obama of stonewalling, telling Milwaukee radio station WTMJ that the president was refusing to answer even basic questions.

"His response has been inconsistent, it's been misleading," Ryan said.

Romney and Ryan have criticized the administration for saying at first that the attack was a spontaneous mob reaction to an anti-Muslim video on YouTube when they now acknowledge it was a terrorist attack. U.S. officials told The Associated Press that the CIA station chief in Libya reported to Washington within 24 hours of the attack to say there was evidence it was carried out by militants, although it's unclear who received that information right away.

Despite increased focus on Libya, the economy

remains the No. 1 election issue for most voters.

Friday's jobs report showed the unemployment rate falling slightly in seven battleground states: Colorado, Florida, Iowa, Nevada, North Carolina, Ohio and Wisconsin. Rates held steady at 5.7 percent in New Hampshire and 5.9 percent in Virginia. Unemployment in both states has long been well below the national average.

Nevada's 11.8 percent rate is the highest nationally. Iowa has the lowest battleground state rate, with 5.2 percent out of work.

Obama has staked his re-election prospects on the notion that the economic crisis he inherited is easing. He's been backed by positive trends for a handful of recent economic indicators, as well as polls showing the public's view of the economy is improving.

will not be allowed to get a nuclear weapon. You have said Iran will not be allowed to have a 'nuclear weapons capability.'

What is the difference? Doesn't Iran already have the capability to produce a nuclear weapon? What will you do about it?"

"Governor, Paul Ryan said in his debate Iran 'is racing toward a nuclear weapon.' But 16 U.S. intelligence agencies said in 2007 and reaffirmed in 2011 that Iran has no nuclear weapons program. What is your evidence that Iran is 'racing toward a nuclear weapon?'"

"Governor, you have said of America and Israel, 'The world must never see daylight between our two nations.' Does that mean if Israel attacks Iran, you would take us to war on Israel's side?"

"Governor, at VMI you said, 'In Syria, I will work ... to identify and organize those members of the opposition who share our values and ensure they obtain the arms they need to defeat Assad's tanks, helicopters and fighter jets.' Would you give surface-to-air missiles to the Syrian rebels?"

The Republican peril in Boca Raton is that headlines the next day will have Romney, consciously or inadvertently, laying down some marker

for a new war.

"Peace through strength," the Eisenhower-Reagan slogan, is the GOP slogan that still resonates with American voters.

Even in 1940, FDR, though plotting war, ran as a peace candidate:

"I have said this before, but I shall say it again and again: Your boys are not going to be sent into any foreign wars."

Hopefully, Gov. Romney will say something like this, and mean it.

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# Bacon, maple sugar and butter make perfect pizza

Until recently, I was convinced the triumvirate of perfect pizza toppings was tomato sauce, mozzarella and basil. Simple. Classic. Delicious.

Then I encountered a maple-bacon-butter pizza and discovered new depths of pizza perfection and appreciation. But first, a disclaimer seems warranted. If this pizza was on a menu, it most certainly would not have one of those happy little heart icons next to it. Digest at your own risk.

I was attending an outdoor festival being catered by a pizza food truck, Mountain Fire Pizza based in Gorham, N.H. Their menu listed the maple-bacon pizza, and it held no appeal to me. My bacon-loving 8-year-old, however, had other ideas. So we ordered one.

The sauce-free pizza arrived sprinkled with bacon and dripping with butter. It was, simply put, breathtakingly delicious. And I knew I had to recreate it.

Predictably, the Inter-

net abounds with recipes for pizza made with maple-cured bacon. But the pizza I'd had went well beyond that. There clearly was maple syrup or sugar involved, as well as an ample helping of butter to keep things interesting. So I started playing.

In the end, the pizza I created was refreshingly simple. A basic crust topped first with mozzarella, then cooked bacon, and finally dollops of maple compound butter (made by blending softened butter with granulated maple sugar). It's as good — and unhealthy — as it sounds.

## MAPLE-BACON-BUTTER PIZZA

Start to finish: 30 minutes  
Servings: 4  
3 tablespoons butter, softened  
3 tablespoons granulated maple sugar  
20-ounce ball prepared pizza dough, room temperature  
1 cup grated mozzarella cheese  
12 ounces bacon, cooked

and crumbled  
8-ounce ball fresh mozzarella, sliced

Heat the oven to 500 F. Lightly coat a baking sheet with cooking spray.

In a small bowl, mix together the butter and maple sugar until well blended. Set aside.

On a lightly floured surface, carefully roll out the pizza dough to about a 14-inch circle. You may need to use your hands to stretch the dough if rolling alone doesn't work. Transfer the dough to the prepared baking sheet.

Sprinkle the grated mozzarella cheese evenly over the dough. Top the mozzarella with the bacon, distributing it evenly over the pizza. Arrange the slices of fresh mozzarella over the bacon. Using 2 spoons, scoop and dollop the maple sugar butter evenly over the pizza. The dollops do not need to be spread; they will melt in the oven.

Bake for 12 to 15 minutes, or until the crust is

puffed and browned and the cheese at the center of the pizza is lightly browned. Let the pizza rest for 5 minutes before slicing.

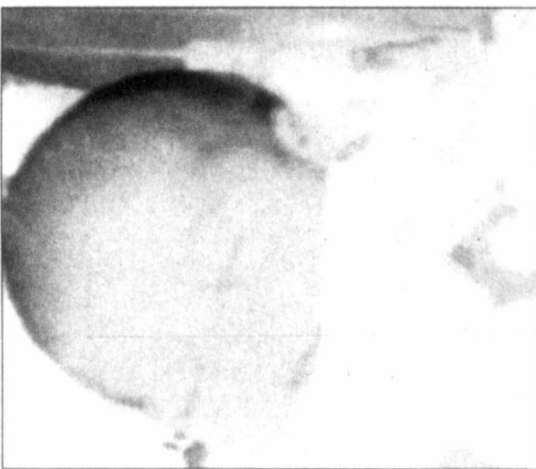

## Pampa rolls over Wildcats

The Pampa Harvesters traveled to Amarillo River Road and dominated the Wildcats 21-6 in their second district game, matching the score they beat Perryton with last week in a rain-delayed game at Harvester Field.

Pampa was picked by many to lose by up to 14 points against River Road. However, deferring the kickoff, the Pampa defense immediately jumped on the Wildcats, and on fourth down and five on the Pampa 42 in River Road's opening drive, Larry Ragan stuffed the opposing running back for a 2-yard loss and gave the ball back to the Pampa offense. The Harvester offense moved the ball up and down the field all night.

During the first drive by the Harvesters, quarterback Ryan Smith connected with passes on consecutive plays with Tanner Logan and Trey Wiggins. Sammy Smith added 2 runs of over 10 yards, but the Harvesters were forced to punt with Miguel Blanco booming a drive that forced the Wildcat returner to his own 5-yard line.

Ninety yards later, the Harvesters managed to run him out of bounds at their own five-yard line. Back down the field two flags were on the field, a block in the back on the Wildcats and a horse collar tackle on the Harvesters. The ball was then placed back at the 15 yard line of the Wildcats.

The defense rose to the occasion and forced River Road to punt, and Pampa quickly went to work. Ryan Smith hit Tyler Powell for a first down at the River Road 25-yard line, and with a penalty on the Wildcats, Pampa was looking at a first down at the 14 of River Road.

First play from scrimmage, Ryan Smith found Chris Howard across the middle for 14-yards and a Harvester score. With the extra point by Alan Stovall, Pampa led 7-0 with 9:24 left in the first quarter.

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River Road got the ball back and drove the ball to the Harvesters 32 but on fourth down and 5 attempted a 42 yard field goal too was short.

After several punts by each side, Taylor Woods intercepted a River Road pass with 48 seconds left in the half, and Sammy Smith's 10 yard run ran out the clock.

Half time the Harvesters led the Wildcats 7-0.

The Harvesters received the second half kick, but were unable to move the ball and after trading punts. River Road scored on a short run, but were unable to convert the extra point and with 5:49 left in the third quarter trailer the Harvesters 7-6.

This would be the last of the scoring on the night for the Wildcats. However, the Harvesters closed the door, adding touchdowns by Sammy Smith and Ryan Smith to run the score to 21-6.

The Harvester offense kept the ball away from the Wildcats in the final minutes, and ran out the clock giving the Harvesters the

win. The Harvester defense led by Woods, Powell, Ragan, Chris Rivera and Sheldon Reeve have held the opposing offenses

under their average the last four weeks, and will try to continue this next week at Harvester Field.

The final score was River Road 20, and the Pampa JV Harvesters 6. The Harvester JV travel next week to Borger and will begin play at 6:30 pm.

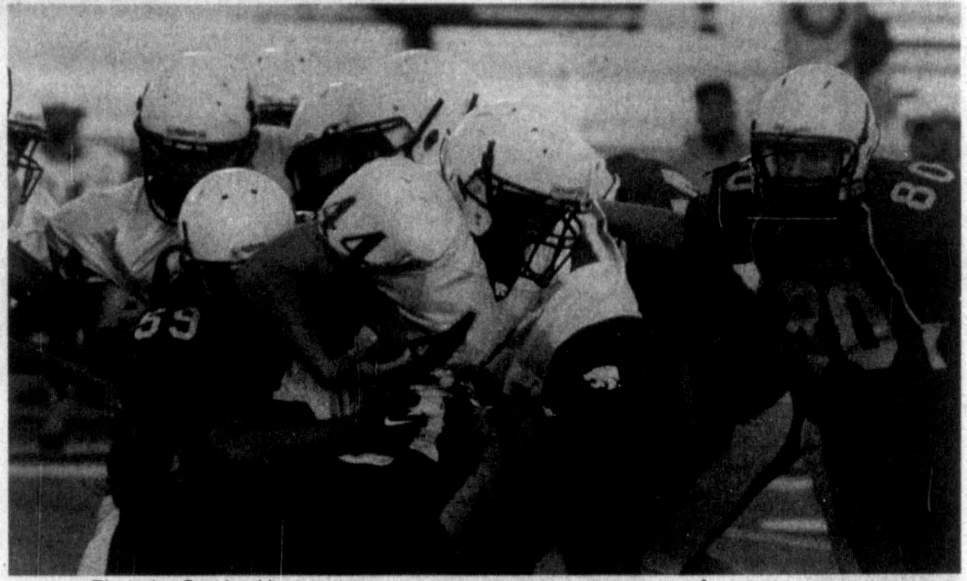

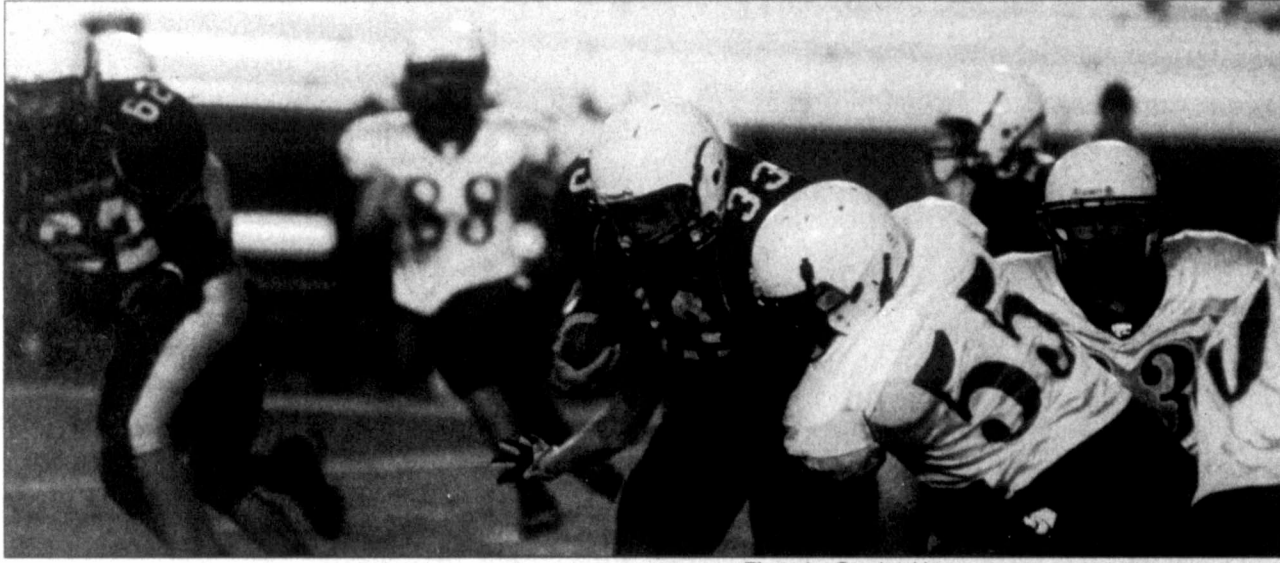

**ADRIAN ELAM** avoids a tackler on his way to 125 yards rushing against River Road.

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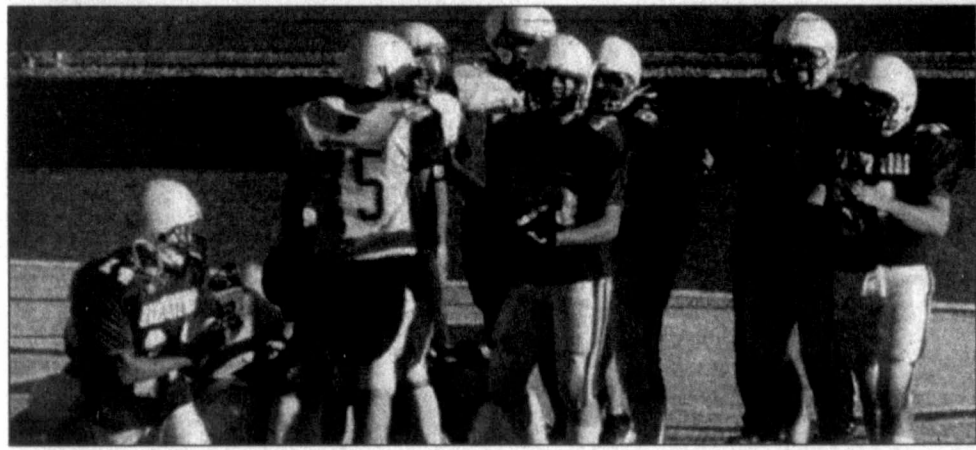

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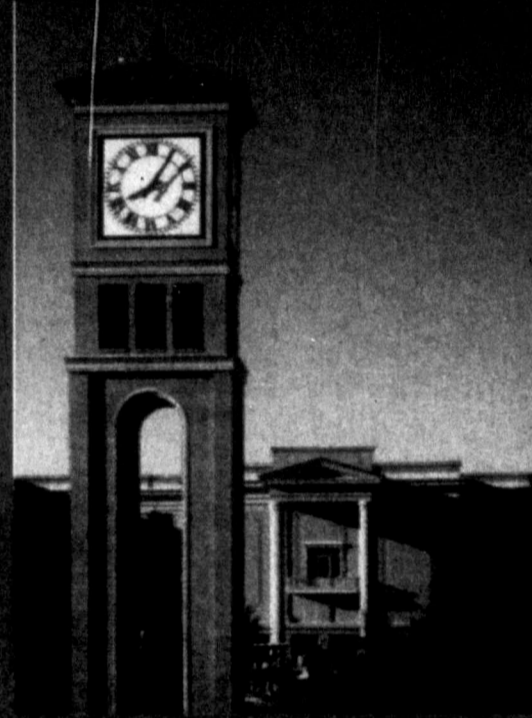
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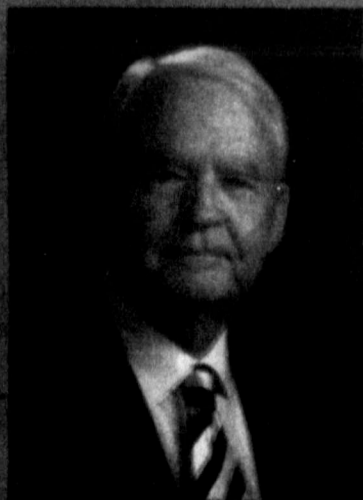
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# Mich. 'Batman' says he has good intentions

**PETOSKEY, Mich. (AP)** — A Michigan man whose efforts to keep an eye on his community while wearing a Batman outfit landed him in court said he has good intentions with his crime-fighting work.

State troopers arrested Mark Wayne Williams, 33, on Sept. 29 because they said he refused to leave them alone while they searched for a driver who fled an accident. Williams was charged with resisting and obstructing police in an investigation.

"I don't want to be a police officer. I think what police officers do is great, but it's up to each person to take a stand and do something to make things better," Williams told the Petoskey News-Review (<http://bit.ly/T8i0ax>). "A lot of times, what I've seen from situations I've been in, people see something going on and think the police will handle it, but if nobody calls the police or takes a stand, it's not going to help."

"Dressing up in my costume, as Batman, is my way of saying that it's not up to the government to save us."

Williams is due in court Thursday. Police said they arrested him in part because they didn't want a tracking dog to follow him. He wasn't carrying any dangerous weapons, but his costume and gear were confiscated, police said.

Williams said he dresses up as Batman and tries to go out every Friday and Saturday, and sometimes on Thursdays, with a partner who dresses up as Batgirl. They patrol from about 10 p.m. to 3:30 a.m., both on foot and in a vehicle.

John Calabrese, director of Petoskey Department of Public Safety, said there have been two occasions when Williams helped his department with information.

"In general, I don't think it's a good idea for someone to get involved unless we request it, but if people do have information, we appreciate it," Calabrese said.

The criminal case isn't Williams' first brush with the law as the caped crusader. He was arrested last year after police received a report of a man dressed as Batman on the roof of a Petoskey business. When officers arrived, they found Williams, dressed as Batman and carrying a baton-type striking weapon, a can of chemical irritant spray and a pair of sand-filled gloves.

He pleaded guilty to one count of attempted resisting and obstructing a police officer and was sentenced to six months of probation during which he was forbidden to wear costumes, including his Batman get-up.

Williams said at the time that he never intended to harm anyone.

## 4 elephants OK after circus truck wrecks

**JACKSON, Miss. (AP)** — A circus official says a truck pulling a trailer full of elephants ran off an interstate in southern Mississippi over the weekend, but the four pachyderms and the driver weren't harmed.

Renee Storey, an executive with Cole Brothers Circus of the Stars, said the elephants were being transported from Alabama to Louisiana on Sunday night when the truck went off Interstate 10 and ran down an embankment.

ny Poulos said the truck driver reported another vehicle forced him off the interstate. The truck was disabled, but the trailer wasn't seriously damaged and later was towed to its intended destination at circus grounds in Hammond, La.

## Smartphone led cops to hot electronics

**LEWISBURG, Pa. (AP)** — There's a reason they're called smartphones.

Police in central Pennsylvania said a man who allegedly was breaking into homes of Bucknell University students was nabbed after the owner of a stolen iPhone used its GPS tracking system to pinpoint the address where the loot was stashed.

Twenty-one-year-old Tristan Swigart of Lewisburg was arrested by Buffalo Valley Regional Police and charged with burglary, criminal trespass, theft and related counts.

Police said students from at least three homes reported burglaries last month, when items from TVs and DVD players to laptops and cellphones were taken.

One of the victims told investigators her stolen iPhone had software installed that tracked it to a nearby home.

Police said they arrived at the address and found a number of the items in Swigart's room.

## N.M. woman burned house over attic noises

**CARLSBAD, N.M. (AP)** — Authorities say a Carlsbad woman burned down her own house after claiming to hear noises in the attic.

The Carlsbad Current-Argus reports (<http://bit.ly/R9Nglg>) that 33-year-old Valerie Hernandez was arrested last week after a nearly six-month investigation.

According to police, Hernandez moved into the home in March and told police she never liked living there because she believed someone was living in the attic and had bugged the house to listen to her conversations.

Hernandez admitted buying lighter fluid but told police she just

dropped the lighter fluid by the front door. Police say she repeatedly asked authorities if the person in the attic had died during the fire, but there was no one was living up there.

## Pa. road reopens after tons of chicken spill

**PORTERSVILLE, Pa. (AP)** — A western Pennsylvania highway has reopened after a tractor-trailer crash caused 37,000 pounds of processed chicken to spill onto the road.

State police in New Castle say the truck crashed shortly before 5 a.m. on U.S. Route 422 near McConnell's Mill State Park. That's about 35 miles north of Pittsburgh.

The eastbound lanes of the highway were closed for more than three hours while crews cleaned up the poultry.

No injuries have been reported.

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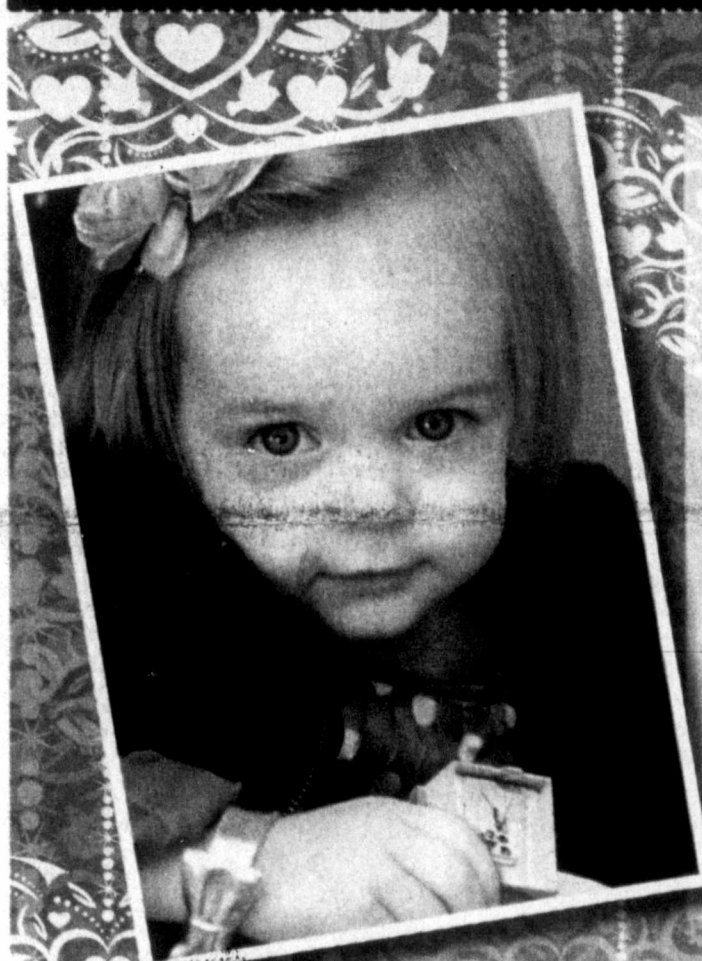
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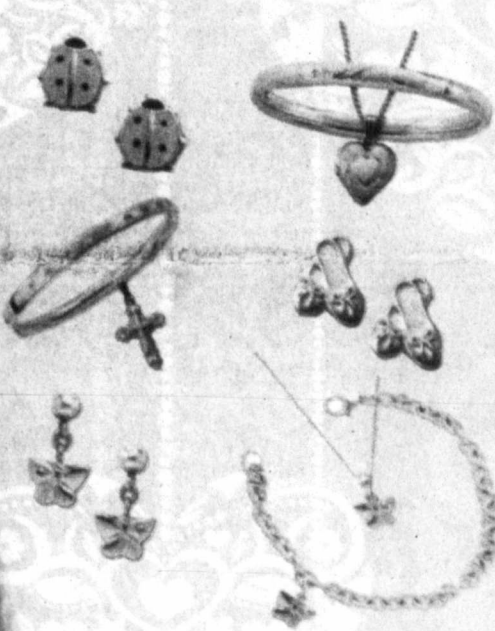
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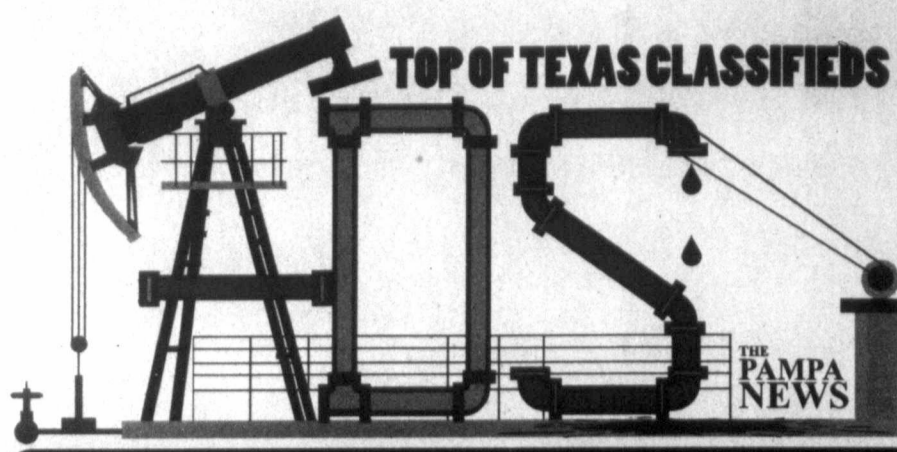

# Fatal air crash decline presents safety challenge

WASHINGTON (AP) — It's been 43 months since the last deadly airline crash in the United States, the longest period without a fatal domestic accident since commercial aviation expanded after World War II. That sounds like unvarnished good news, but one consequence of having such a remarkable record is that it's difficult to justify imposing costly new safety rules on the economically fragile industry.

In analyzing costs and benefits, federal rules assign a value of \$6.2 million to each life saved. Even modest changes in regulations can cost the industry hundreds of millions of dollars when spread across a number of years.

"The extraordinary safety record that has been achieved in the United States ironically could be the single biggest reason the (Federal Aviation Administration) isn't able to act proactively and ensure safety into the future," said Bill Voss, president of the industry-funded Flight Safety Foundation in Alexandria, Va., which promotes global airline safety. The past decade has been the airline industry's safest ever.

Last year, the FAA revised rules on pilot work schedules and rest periods to address concerns that tired pilots were making mistakes, sometimes with fatal results. But the agency dropped requirements that would have extended the new rules to cargo carriers. FAA officials said the rule changes would have cost the cargo industry as much as \$300 million over 10 years.

Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood has urged cargo executives to voluntarily comply with the new rules, but so far he's had no takers.

"We're doing rulemaking in a system that is very, very safe," LaHood said in an interview. "Sometimes it does get to be difficult to produce the cost justification for the kinds of rules that we're promoting."

Last year, the FAA missed a congressionally mandated deadline for

issuing new regulations on pilot training. Congress ordered the new rules after the nation's last fatal airline crash, on Feb. 12, 2009, when a startled captain overrode a key safety system as his airliner lost lift and began to stall.

An investigation showed the plane would have been able to fly had the captain responded correctly. Instead, it plummeted into a house near Buffalo, N.Y., killing all 49 people aboard and a man in the home. Investigators cited pilot training lapses by the regional airline, Colgan Air, as a factor.

The FAA began work on revamping training rules in 1999. Regulators had proposed new rules just before the Colgan crash but effectively withdrew them for more work after the accident. Final rules aren't scheduled to be issued until next year, and airlines aren't expected to have to meet the new requirements until February 2019 — 20 years after the FAA started work on the rules and 10 years after the Colgan accident.

Training regulations haven't kept pace with changing technology, said John Goglia, a former National Transportation Safety Board member. Planes are far safer than they used to be, he said, "but it's much more difficult to fix the human being, and that's who is responsible for most of the accidents these days."

"There are a lot of things on the table that will help, but they cost money and it's going very slowly," Goglia said.

Scott Maurer, who lost his 30-year-old daughter, Lorin, in the Colgan crash, said that in the past, families of accident victims and others seeking safety improvements have been worn down and outlasted by the glacial pace of the FAA's rulemaking process.

"We understand many are feeling good about the interval without a crash fatality since Colgan (Flight) 3407," said Maurer, of Moore, S.C. "We certainly believe our efforts have helped to keep the focus on doing the right thing in safety. But without rules to sustain this effort, we know

the race to the bottom will continue at regional airlines and the airline industry as a whole as the push for profits becomes ever more important."

The delays are due to complexities involved in drafting such rules and the agency's obligation to carefully respond to objections raised by industry and others, FAA officials said.

There has also been a philosophical shift at the agency over the past decade that emphasizes a collaborative relationship between regulators and airlines. This collaborative approach works just as well as imposing one-size-fits-all regulations on industry, and sometimes it works better, FAA officials said.

Since the late 1990s, airlines and the FAA have

placed a greater emphasis on voluntary data-gathering programs that enable airlines to spot and correct problems before they lead to accidents. Airlines are also pooling information in search of industry-wide trends and disclosing their problems to regulators through a government-industry safety working group without fear of punishment. The data collaboration has moved beyond analyzing past accidents and incidents for safety lessons to searching for clues on emerging vulnerabilities in day-to-day airline operations, FAA and industry officials said.

Such data analysis has the greatest potential to yield future safety improvements, they said.

"We're not waiting for a

rules change to come out. We're out there using our data and making these decisions," said Ken Hylander, senior vice president for safety and security at Delta Air Lines and co-chair of the government-industry working group.

For example, airlines

generally tell pilots not to abort takeoffs after a plane has reached a speed of about 90 mph because in most cases it's safer to continue the takeoff even if there's a safety concern. But occasionally pilots abort takeoffs at high speeds anyway.

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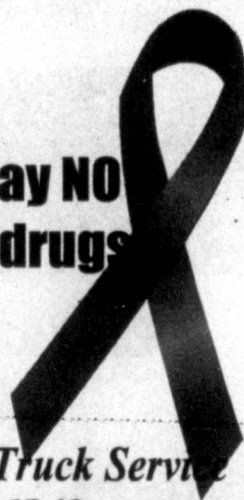

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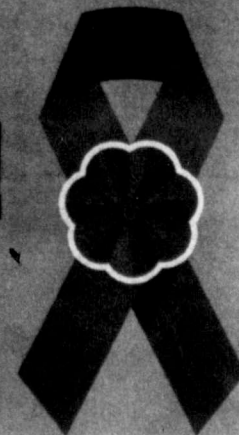
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# Mayor Brad Pingel proclaims Oct. 22-28 Red Ribbon Week
