## Opinions mixed on mixed drinks

**Petition circulating for special election to change liquor law.**

In a democracy, we can agree to disagree. Presently in Pampa, restaurants that serve alcohol can only sell beer and wine, but that could change if a signature drive

to place a special election on the ballot during the May 11 city elections succeeds. Right now, a petition is circulating for a local option election to legalize the sale of mixed drinks in restaurants that hold food and beverage certificates. Even if there is an election and mixed drinks are allowed in restaurants, the law would remain the same for establishments that only hold a license to sell beer and wine.

In order for the special election to go on the May ballot, 1,300 signatures must be obtained by Dec. 26. Only registered voters in Gray County who live within city limits can sign the petition. The special election would be similar to the one held in May to use bond money to build a new animal shelter. Businesses with copies of the mixed drink petition include Open Range, the Coffee Shop, the Plaza Restaurant, the Dixie

Cafe, Waynes Western Wear, One Stop Flooring and The Pampa News. While many in the business community are in favor of changing the long-standing liquor law as way to attract new businesses, two pastors interviewed by The Pampa News are against changing the law on religious grounds. Phone messages left at two churches were not returned. "I'm against it for two rea-

sons," said Pastor Micah Meurer of the Cornerstone Baptist Church. "I don't think Pampa needs anymore alcohol than what it's already got." Meurer's second reason is that if allowing restaurants to serve mixed drinks attracts a national chain like Bennigan's, which operates a restaurant in nearby Borger, then it could hurt, not help, the local economy. "We have many viable local

### Citigroup to cut 11,000 jobs — 4% of workers

NEW YORK (AP) — Citigroup said Wednesday that it will cut 11,000 jobs, a bold early move by new CEO Michael Corbat. The cuts amount to about 4 percent of Citi's workforce. The bulk of them, about 6,200 jobs, will come from Citi's consumer banking unit, which handles everyday functions like branches and checking accounts. Citi said that it will sell or scale back consumer operations in Pakistan, Paraguay, Romania, Turkey and Uruguay and focus on 150 cities around the world "that have the highest growth potential in consumer banking." The bank, the third-largest in the country by assets, did not say how many jobs it will cut in the United States. About 1,900 job cuts will come from the institutional clients group, which includes the investment bank. The company will also cut jobs in technology and operations by using more automation and moving jobs to "lower-cost locations." Investors appeared to like the move. They sent Citi stock up \$2.17, or 6.3 percent, to close at \$36.46 Wednesday. Job cuts are a familiar template in a banking industry still under the long shadow of the 2008 financial crisis. Banks are searching for ways to make money as new regulations crimp some of their former revenue streams, like trading for their own profit or marketing credit cards to college students. Customers are still nervous about borrowing money in an uncertain economy. And they are still filing lawsuits over industry practices like risky mortgage lending that helped cause the crisis.

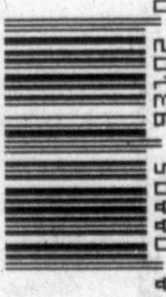

### Residents put ribbon on burned house

PENN HILLS, Pa. (AP) — Some residents of a Pittsburgh suburb have gift-wrapped something they hope will be gone by Christmas: a charred and abandoned house that burned nine months ago. Amy Davis says that residents put a big red bow on the house next door to hers, so officials will get moving on tearing it down. Residents say it's unsafe

and an eyesore. They fear it could harm their property values.

Davis says gift-wrapping the house "was in jest to bring light to a situation where there's no humor at all." She says the fire frightened her and caused \$8,000 worth of damage to her 100-year-old home.

Municipal code enforcement officer John McCafferty says he just got approval to tear down the home.

### French chateau razed 'by mistake'

PARIS (AP) — Residents of a sleepy French village in Bordeaux have been left dumbfounded after discovering their local 18th-century chateau was completely bulldozed "by mistake."

The mayor's office in Yvrac said Wednesday that workers who were hired to renovate the grand 13,000-square-meter (140,000-square-foot) manor and raze a small building on the same estate in southwest France mixed them up. "The Chateau de Bellevue was Yvrac's pride and joy," said former owner Juliette Marmie. "The whole village is in shock. How can this construction firm make such a mistake?"

Local media reported that the construction company misunderstood the renovation plans of the current owner, Russian businessman Dmitry Stroskin, to clean up the manor and restore it to its former baroque glory.

Stroskin was away when the calamity occurred and returned home to discover his chateau, a local treasure boasting a grand hall that could host some 200 people, as well as a sweeping stone staircase — was nothing but rubble.

"I'm in shock ...I understand the turmoil of the community," local media quoted Stroskin as saying.

He told them he plans to build an exact replica of lost manor on the site.

restaurants and chain restaurants are going to hurt them," he said. "This will be at a cost to our local economy and our small businesses."

Stephanie Nelson of Open Range supports the petition along with at least two other businesses located on Cuyler Street, The Coffee Shop and Rheams Diamond Shop.

She said she understands the concerns that go along with legalizing hard liquor. "Our main goal is to promote more business in Pampa and help the community," Nelson said. "Gray County was once a dry county but it's time to update a little."

Nelson said she's aware of businesses that have not come to Pampa because of the licensing laws. "I feel like it's hurting business, even businesses who are here are hurt by this," said Nelson, who is helping Dave Carter of Carter Sand and Gravel, who applied for the petition.

Ken Rheams owns Rheams Diamond Shop on Cuyler Street and is active with the Pampa Downtown Business Association. Rheams said he can't speak for the DBA as a group, but that he and his wife Stephane have signed the petition. "It will bring different businesses that we never had; it's the only way to get a chain," he said.

He said the way the law is now, Pampa residents who like mixed drinks instead of beer or wine with their meals must patronize restaurants in Amarillo. "You can buy liquor by the drink in Amarillo," he said, adding that if the law changes no one will be forced to drink.

"If you want a drink, you'll buy one. If you don't want to drink, you don't have to," he said.

Pastor Mike Sublett of Hi-Land Christian Church calls himself a teetotaler, an individual who completely abstains from alcohol. "Here is the issue to me on this deal. Most of the churches are going to take a hardline stance on this," he said. "But anybody who would go to Amarillo to a restaurant that serves mixed drinks and vote against it is being inconsistent. If you go to Amarillo to eat then don't go to a place that has alcohol (hard liquor). Every restaurant in Amarillo serves mixed drinks."

Joe Maybry, pastor of First Baptist Church, said he saw the petition at Dixie Cafe. "From our church's perspective I would not be in favor of it at all," he said. "I would not be in favor of it as a way for city to get more revenue."

He said it's a good idea to have more

restaurants in town, and can see where those who support the petition are coming from.

"But as a Christian and as a Southern Baptist I can't go along with it," he said. But not all churches in town are against selling mixed drinks.

Linda Kelly, pastor of St. Matthews Episcopal Church, said, "Most of my church members wouldn't be bothered by that."

Dixie Cafe, which has a copy of petition for patrons to sign, sells beer and wine.

General Manager Mari Martinez said giving customers the option to buy mixed drinks would be good for business.

"In talking to other employees it would bring a whole lot more business in," she said.

Asked if a chain restaurant opening in Pampa would pose a threat to the Dixie Cafe, Martinez said, "I don't see it as a threat. There would be a change in business at first but Pampa is a close-knit community and people will come back. I'm not scared by this all at."

But Brent Dyer, owner of Dyer's Bar-B-Que, does see a chain restaurant as a threat. "Most definitely," he answered.

He added that because Dyer's is more of a family restaurant, he doesn't want to "get into the mixed drink thing."

Clay Rice, executive director of Pampa Economic Development Corp., said his organization hasn't taken a stand yet one way or the other.

"We haven't addressed it at a board meeting so we can't comment on it."

Likewise, the Pampa Chamber of Commerce, would not comment, believing the organization should remain neutral on what could become a political issue.

Mayor Brad Pingel also has chosen to stay neutral.

"I want to remain impartial," he said.

The Pampa News asked its Facebook followers what they thought and nearly all were in favor of allowing mixed drinks.

Jessica Stanhope wrote, "I see no problem with the selling of mixed drinks in town. I actually think it would raise business for the restaurants. Local bars only serve beer and not everybody likes beer."

"Most people would love to have a nice drink after a long day. As far as the people who are against it, well, nobody is forcing them to order a drink."

But Stanley Gray had these words of caution for changing the law: "I for one do not have a problem with new restaurants coming in. But I do have a problem with more drinking and driving. We already have enough of that."

## California kids study scat as inspiration for ornaments

The Irvine Ranch Conservancy and Orange County Parks sponsor the free craft-hikes.

Conservancy spokeswoman Jenn Starnes says scat is educational. It is a great way to identify animals.

She says California mule deer leave pellets in piles, coyote scat depends on whether the cat ate a plant or an animal, and mountain lion scat often contains small bones and fur from prey.

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## Think twice before giving pets as holiday gifts

Many people consider pets great holiday gifts. But in spite of their popularity as presents, pets do not always make the most appropriate holiday gift.

Giving a pet as a present seems like a great idea, but shoppers might want to give it more consideration before giving a gift that is such a considerable responsibility. A puppy at Christmas or a bunny at Easter may be given with good intentions, but that well-meaning sentiment can easily backfire, ending with the pet being given up for adoption when recipients don't feel up to the task of raising a pet. In such instances, the companion animal pays the steepest price.

Though it often is, buying a pet should not be an impulse purchase. You see sad eyes looking back at you from behind a cage door and want to give that animal a new home. However, introducing an animal into a family is not a decision to take lightly. You must factor how well the pet will fit in with the family dynamic. Do schedules allow for quality time spent with the animal? Is it a financially good time to care for an animal that will cost money? Are you aware of how long the pet will live? Making those big decisions for a person on the receiving end of your well-intentioned gift may be crossing a line. Would you want to have such a life-changing decision made for you?

Furthermore, the holiday season is not one ideally suited for making careful decisions. People are often swept up in emotions and even stress, and shoppers may not be thinking rationally.

child. Adults busy with holiday obligations may be easily distracted and miss how their child is interacting with the new pet.

Once the glow of the holidays wear off, children may be disillusioned with the new responsibility that has fallen into their hands. They may not like the responsibility that comes with being a good pet owner.

Reputable pet breeders and animal shelters often discourage individuals from adopting or purchasing pets as holiday gifts. Many organizations and animal businesses require a careful vetting of potential pet parents to ensure the animal will be placed with a family and in a home that is suitable.

Animal welfare groups warn that an estimated 50 percent of pets adopted during the holidays end up right back at shelters. This can scar the pet. Avoid the temptation of giving a companion animal as a present. If it is your intention to gift an animal, talk to the gift recipient and discuss the pros and cons beforehand. Then you can work together and make the right decision for all parties involved, including the pet.

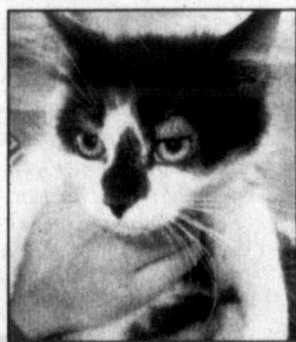

Also, we don't want to forget Pam Dalton and Shepherd's Helping Hands who planned

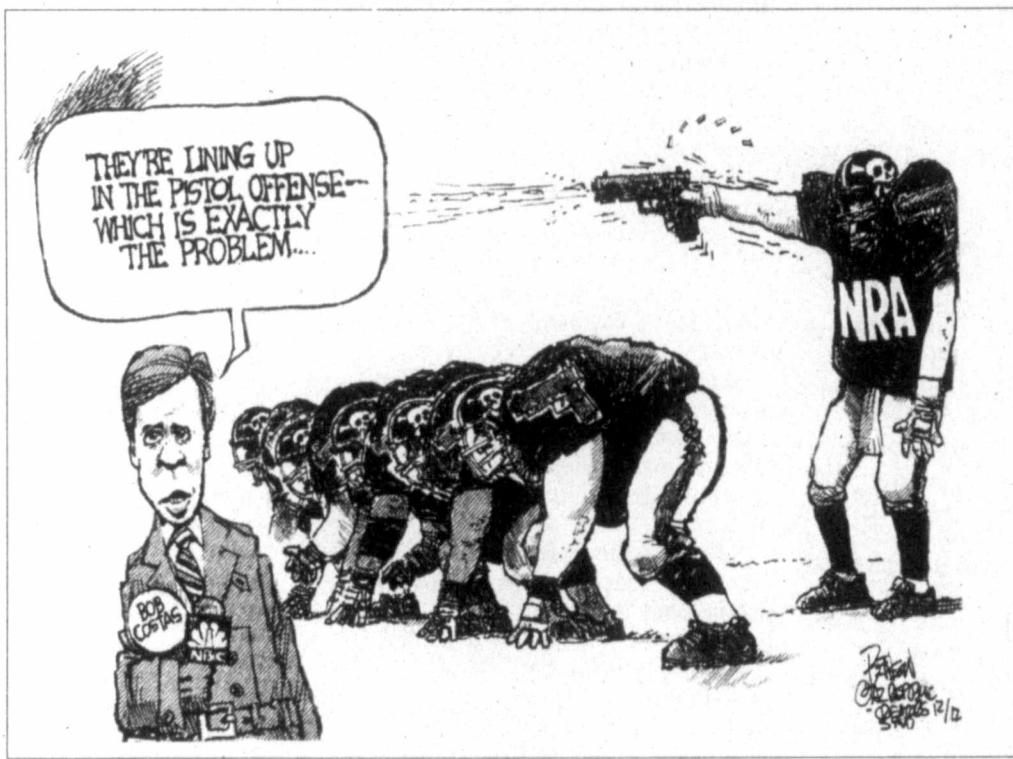

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## Obama's 2nd inaugural seems almost an afterthought

WASHINGTON (AP) — Four years ago, Barack Obama's swearing-in drew a record crowd to the National Mall. There were 1.8 million people eager to witness history: the country's first black president taking the oath of office.

Now, as Obama prepares for his second-term kickoff, the capital is pre-occupied with a looming economic crisis, exit from war and a reshuffling in Congress. Ticket demand is lower. Hotels are far from booked. And from Capitol Hill to the White House, the upcoming festivities seem to be barely on anyone's radar.

More muted inaugural celebrations are typical with every second presidential term. But it's almost as if Obama's swearing-in, on the Martin Luther King Jr. holiday, is a been-there-done-that afterthought around town.

Perhaps Obama is a victim of his own historical significance. Perhaps it's a sign of how far the nation has come, some 50 years after the March on Washington that drew a multitude of people calling for civil and economic rights for African-Americans.

Although inaugural planning and preparations are well under way, Obama's advisers say they aren't yet focusing on the swearing-in as they negotiate over the "fiscal cliff" automatic tax increases and budget cuts that will occur in January unless the White House reaches a compromise with Congress. Party planners haven't made even the most basic of announcements yet, such as who will serve on Obama's inaugural committee and how they will raise money. No plans are in the works for a star-studded concert like the one four years ago that kicked off the inaugural festivities.

The inauguration is thought of so little these days that there was even some confusion around the White House about when it would be held. Some aides said it would be Tuesday, Jan. 22, after the federal holiday observing King's birthday.

In fact, the public ceremony will be on the holiday, Monday, Jan. 21 — a day set by a joint resolution of Congress months ago, before it was known who would be taking the oath. Obama's second term automatically begins at noon on Jan. 20 under the 20th Amendment to the Constitution, and he's planning a private swearing-in at the White House.

There's precedent for the two-pronged approach: The public ceremony in the past has been postponed for a day when Jan. 20 fell on a Sunday, such as the second inaugurations for Presidents Ronald Reagan and Dwight Eisenhower.

The Joint Congressional Committee on Inaugural Ceremonies, which stages all activities for the day on the Capitol grounds, has set a theme of "Faith in America's Future" to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the completion of the Capitol Dome during the Civil War. And work has begun on the platform where Obama will deliver his inaugural address. It will be the same design as in 2005 and 2009. It has 1,600 seats for members of Congress, Supreme Court justices, governors, ambassadors representing nations around the world, military leaders and the families of the president and vice president.

Beyond that, the planning is at such a preliminary stage that members of the Presidential Inaugural Committee haven't been

officially announced. They include some of the same staffers who worked on Obama's campaign and his first inauguration. Those involved this year say to expect a similar celebration as 2009, but smaller.

Now like then, it will be up to Obama to set the tone for the day, an important moment for him to capture the world's attention in the midst of a vigorous debate over the country's economic future, a looming fight over immigration and conflicts across the globe.

Congressional offices will distribute roughly 250,000 tickets for people to watch in front of the podium, with members of the public able to attend without tickets down the National Mall.

Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., who oversaw the congressional inaugural committee four years ago, introduced legislation back then trying to prevent scalping of the free tickets online. She said her office received 8,000 requests for tickets the first day after the 2008 election. This time, her spokeswoman said she's received 8,500 a month later.

Last time, the ticketed crowd included scores of celebrities, with Oprah Winfrey, MTV and Nickelodeon holding special broadcasts from the capital city. An inaugural weekend concert at the Lincoln Memorial in 2009 featured appearances by Bruce Springsteen, Bono, Beyonce, Stevie Wonder, Jamie Foxx and Tiger Woods. No such event is planned this time.

Questions remain about how the inaugural committee will handle fundraising to put on the parade, balls and other celebratory

events.

Four years ago, the committee tried to make good on Obama's campaign promise to change the way business is done in Washington by refusing contributions from corporations, unions, political action committees and lobbyists and by limiting individual donations to \$50,000. But some on his team want to lift that self-imposed restriction this year to make fundraising easier at a time when there's less hype to fuel it.

Those who want to attend will find an easier time than those who came four years ago, starting with greater hotel availability.

At this time in 2008, 89 percent of rooms in Washington were rented at an average rate of \$605 a night, according to Smith Travel Research. At least some desperate travelers resorted to camping outside in the winter cold or trying to find a couch for rent. This time, hundreds of ads on Craig's List offered space for rent and hotels were still hawking their rooms, albeit at inflated prices with four-night minimums.

The Ritz Carlton, which sold out within a week of Election Day in 2008, still had nearly half its 300 rooms available a month after Obama's re-election, putting this year on par with typical inaugural bookings.

Guests there will receive special amenities including an edible chocolate photo of the president and commemorative inauguration pillow cases, or for \$100,000, they can buy a package that includes four nights in a luxury suite, a private tour of Washington and other VIP access and a ruby eagle pin that retails for \$35,000.

## Daughter of KC Chiefs' player to receive windfall

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The estate or guardian of the infant of the Chiefs player who killed her mother before turning a gun on himself will receive more than \$1 million under terms of the NFL's collective-bargaining agreement.

Jovan Belcher's 3-month-old daughter, Zoey, stands to receive \$108,000 annually over the next four years, \$48,000 in the fifth year and then \$52,000 each year until

age 18. She'll continue to receive that amount until age 23 if she attends college.

The beneficiary of Belcher, who was in his fourth season, also will receive \$600,000 in life insurance, plus \$200,000 for each credited season.

There is also \$100,000 in a retirement account that will go to his beneficiary or estate.

Players' beneficiaries are kept confidential.

The current collective bargaining agreement was ratified in August 2011.

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Jaye Crockett continued his scoring streak — and remained patient in the process.

Crockett scored 16 points and grabbed eight rebounds to lead Texas Tech to a 75-69 win over Northern Kentucky Tuesday night. It was the fifth game in a row that Crockett led the Red Raiders (5-1) in scoring.

"Jaye's been great," Texas Tech coach Chris Walker said. "I thought he got a little bit antsy to start the game. I told him to relax. Don't forget what got you here, be patient."

Josh Gray added 14 points for Texas Tech. Walker said Gray responded to his coaching after Saturday's loss to No. 8 Arizona, and as a result played better tonight.

"If I tell you to do a certain thing, it's for you to be successful, not to take away from your game," Walker said.

Eshaunte Jones led the Norse (0-6) with 16 points, going 4 of 7 from behind the 3-point line. Tyler White added 14 points, while Jack Flournoy and Chad Jackson added 13.

The Red Raiders built an 11-point lead, with a 14-0 run early in the first half, but allowed the Norse to close it to five just after halftime.

The Red Raiders responded with a 15-0 run early in the second half, which put them ahead by 20 points.

"We got casual," Walker said. "We were up 20, and that's just a young team — we don't know how to play with the lead."

# Child forensic interviewer, Ian Diaz, speaks at Altrusa meeting

ist Church. President Pat Johnson called the guest night meeting to order and members recited the Altrusa grace and Pledge of Allegiance to the flag.

Guests and prospective members introduced were Vicky Halliburton, Amanda Clawson, Nadine Dunaway, Frances Westman, and Janna Bentley. Each was presented a welcome gift.

Past president Rochelle Lacy presented the club with a certificate of appreciation from Travis Elementary School for members assistance with the Veterans' Day Program.

For the Accent, Leona Willis recounted some of the history of Thanksgiving and said Altrusans show thankfulness through service projects.

The program's speaker was Ian Diaz of The Bridge, which gets its name because the orga-

nization advocates with children and families to bridge the gap between them, law enforcement and Child Protective Ser-

vice. Diaz, a child forensic interviewer, interviews children who are victims of sexual or physical abuse or who are witnesses to a crime. Diaz summarized a quote that states humans are the only animals in nature who hurt their offspring.

The Bridge works with children between 2 and 17 years of age, with the median age of Pampa's clients being 9 years old. From January through November 2012, the Amarillo area worked with 941 children, 62 of whom were from Pampa and Gray County. Mr. Diaz said that "strangers" were involved in about one percent of the cases and the other 99 percent involved family members, close friends, or a youth worker who the children should be able to trust. In response to a question, he said that boys were only

one in six of the abuse cases reported. Among the needs that individuals and groups can provide the Bridge are toys, blankets and quilts.

New member, Tamra Giese was initiated by Brenda Tucker, past Governor or Altrusa, District Nine. Her sponsors were Kitty Hall and Leona Willis.

Johnson introduce the members with birthday in November and read a biography of each. They were Debbie Middleton, Mary McDaniel (a member for over 50 years), Brenda Tucker, and Linda Weaver.

Kitty Hall had Janna Bentley do the drawing for the member door prize, which was won by Debbie Middleton. Leona Willis had Mr. Diaz do the drawing of members with perfect attendance for this quarter, and Rochelle Lacy won free meals at the meetings for the next quarter.

Myrna Orr, co-chairman with Brenda Guess, made announcements concerning "Soup with Mrs. Claus" on Dec. 1.

The business meeting will be held Tuesday, Dec. 11. The board of directors will host the President's reception for Pat Johnson on Sunday, Dec. 16 at the home of Brenda Tucker, which replaces the program meeting for the month. For the reception, members are asked to bring a wrapped ornament for the gift exchange, and to turn in their baby photo for a guessing game.

# Man jailed for naked stunt on London statue

LONDON (AP) — A man who climbed naked onto an equestrian statue in London's government district, ripped off its sword and bit it has been sentenced to 12 weeks in jail.

Dan Motrescu brought central London traffic to a standstill when he mounted the bronze statue of the 19th-century Duke of Cambridge on Nov. 23.

Police cordoned off Whitehall, a street

that is home to several government departments, as Motrescu climbed up and down the statue, at one point balancing himself on the duke's head.

It took several hours for officers to talk him down.

Motrescu, a Ukrainian citizen of no fixed address, was convicted Tuesday of possession of an offensive weapon, criminal damage and a public order offense. A magistrate at Westminster Magistrates' Court sentenced him to 12 weeks in jail.



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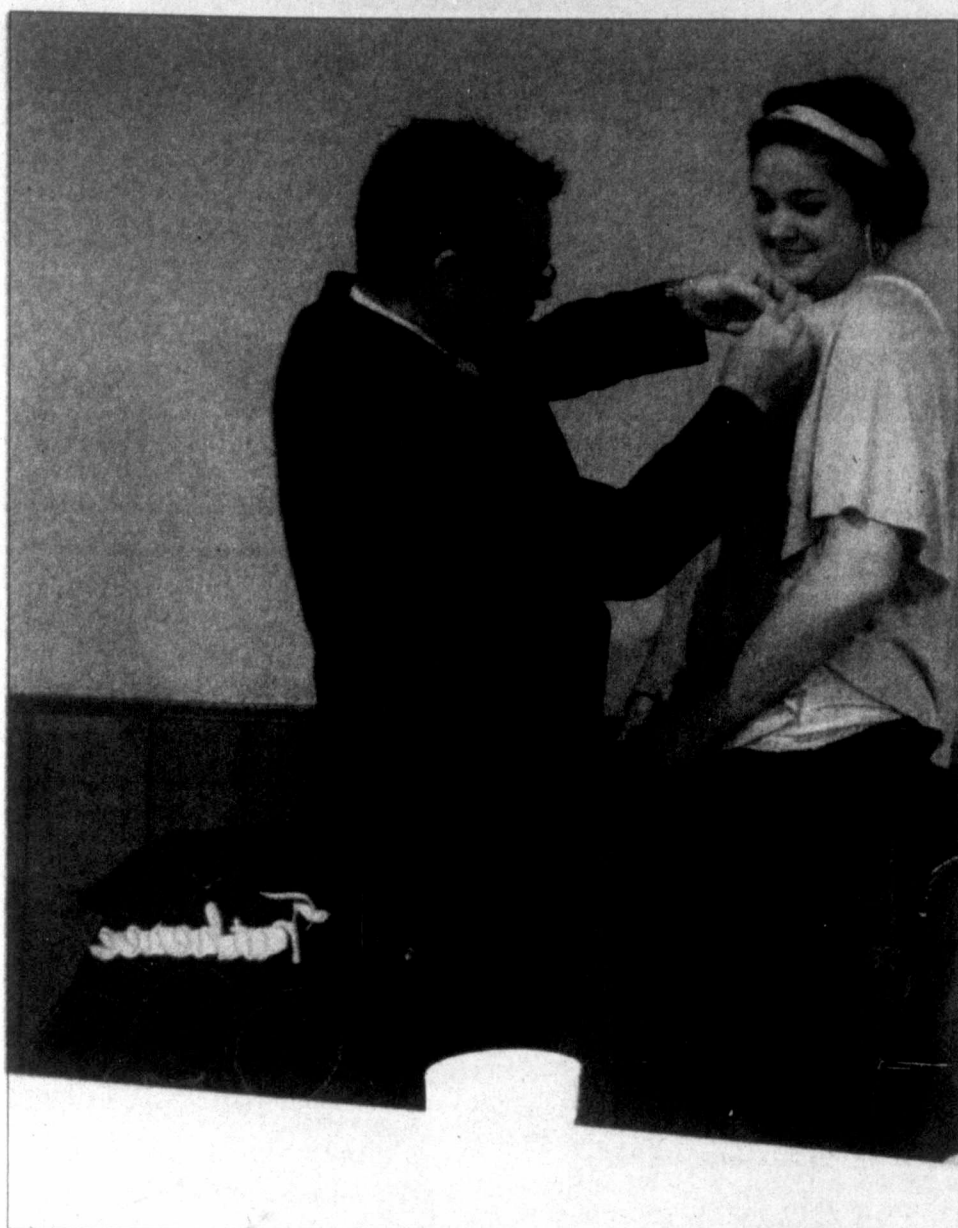

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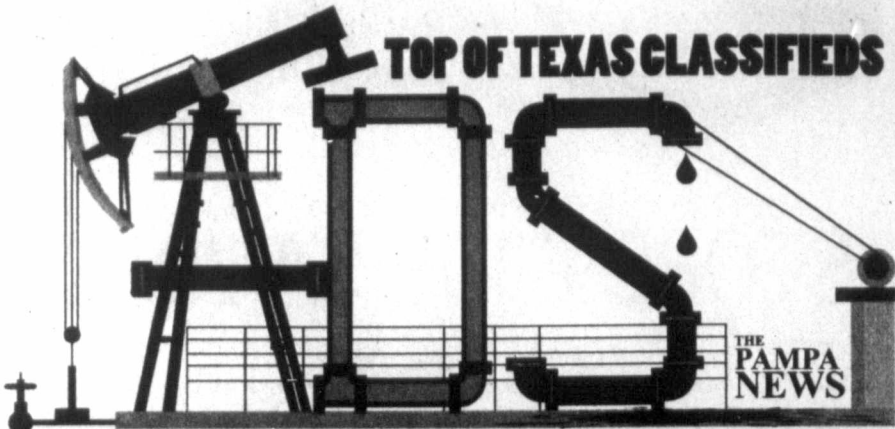

## Georgia town stunned after woman killed at gas station

ATLANTA (AP) — A chance encounter at a Georgia gas station left a 65-year-old woman dead and a 73-year-old man facing a murder charge after authorities say the woman's car and his motorized wheelchair bumped and he opened fire, police said Wednesday.

Linda Hunnicutt, 65, had just pulled into the gas station in Macon shortly after 1 p.m. Tuesday and stepped out of her Buick Lucerne when the man pulled a gun and fatally shot her, city police spokeswoman Jami Gaudet said.

"The whole encounter, I can tell you, was very brief," Gaudet said. "Everybody is just reeling from this."

Hunnicutt had driven onto the gas pump bay when the two vehicles made contact, police say.

Hunnicutt, described as a homemaker who lives a few miles from the station — was shot once in the chest with a 38-caliber handgun, Bibb County Coroner Leon Jones said.

The suspect, Frank Louis Reeves, was apprehended in the gas station parking

lot. He was being held on a murder charge at the Bibb County Jail, Gaudet said. She didn't know whether he has an attorney, and jail records do not list one.

Reeves lives behind the service station in a group of apartments, Jones said. No one answered a phone number listed for the residence on Wednesday.

The station is along busy Gray Highway, and the encounter was so brief that many of the people pumping gas were not immediately aware of what had just happened in one corner of the lot, Gaudet said.

When police arrived, Hunnicutt was in cardiac arrest and officers began performing CPR. She was taken to the Medical Center of Central Georgia, where the trauma team pronounced her dead at 1:25 p.m., less than a half-hour after the shooting, authorities said.

The man gave a statement to detectives, Gaudet said, but authorities are not revealing what he said.

Hunnicutt is married, and her husband was on the road for his job with a dental lab company when the shooting happened, Jones said.

## School records may relate to alleged Colo. gunman

DENVER (AP) — The University of Colorado at Denver on Wednesday released thousands of documents that may relate to the man accused in the Colorado theater shootings, but much of the material appeared to be heavily redacted.

Holmes is charged with multiple first-degree murder and attempted murder counts. He has not entered a plea and won't do so until after a weeklong preliminary hearing in which prosecutors present evidence supporting the charges. That hearing is scheduled to begin Jan. 7. A

motions hearing in the case is set for Monday.

The documents shed little new light on how the school handled Holmes, who, according to his attorneys, suffers from a mental illness.

He allegedly began stockpiling firearms and ammunition while taking classes in the spring. In June, prosecutors say, he made threats to a professor, and he filed withdrawal papers June 10 after failing a year-end final exam. The next day he saw his school psychiatrist, who tried to report him to a campus security committee, according to Holmes' lawyers.

The school has declined to answer

detailed questions about Holmes' behavior, citing a gag order that remains in effect and federal privacy laws that limit the amount of medical and academic information it can disclose.

In the days after the shooting, the Arapahoe County District Attorney's office asked Judge William B. Sylvester to bar the university from releasing records requested by numerous media organizations. Prosecutors argued that the information could jeopardize Holmes' right to a fair trial. Sylvester agreed, but amended his order last month to allow the release after media organizations objected in court.

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
