
REUNITED Searching for Sgt. Sanh

The last person in the world Army Specialist Four E-4 Rick Organ expected to run into over Thanksgiving was a Vietnamese man he nearly killed 46 years ago. But that's exactly what happened to the veteran after a chance encounter with a lawyer from Chicago, Ill. who taped a conversation he had with Organ and later posted the video on YouTube.

Organ was only 21 years old on the fateful day when he nearly killed Sgt. Sanh Van Nguyen, who was servingas an interpreter alongside Organ's squadron. Organ reported that Sanh would regularly interrogate Vietcong that Organ's squad had captured.

Organ and Sanh had developed a solid rapport while ghting next to each other the thick Vietnamese jungle. However, Organ had been given a directive to search and destroy as he entered a small Vietnamese village. "I was on high alert," he said. Organ stormed onto the scene and spotted a Vietnamese man out of the corner of. his eye but did not recognize the man as Sanh, his squad's friendly interpreter. So he fired multiple shots in Sanh's direction, narrowly missing him.



Thornberry's thoughts on the 'fiscal cliff'

Supports spending cuts over raising taxes.

U.S. Rep. William "Mac" Thornberry recently shared his thoughts on the nation's economy as the country prepares itself to sail over the much-ballyhooed fiscal cliff. "The details are changing rapidly," Thornberry said in a phone interview Tuesday.



Thornberry, Republican who serves Texas' 13th Congressional District, stressed that he is not in favor of the federal government raising taxes to help balance the budget. "I think the most

Congress does not act, Thornberry

taxes are going to go up on everybody," he said. "Trying to prevent a big tax on everybody is what I'm trying to do."

Thornberry continued about how raising taxes could affect all residents.

"If all these taxes do go up, it will affect everybody," he said. "But, at the same time, we can reduce the debt that we are

Babe Ruth car takes trek to Scottish Rite

Owner Lonnie Shelton said he has several plans to use famous car to raise money for sick children.

After debuting it to the public in October at Amarillo National Bank Sox Stadium, Lonnie Shelton has shown off his prize possession, a blue 1948 Lincoln Continental owned by baseball legend Babe Ruth, here in Pampa recently during the Christmas parade.

Because it is so valuable and in mint condition, the car was not driven in the parade; it was towed in a glass-enclosed trailer to keep it protected from the elements while spectators admired it.

But for Shelton, who has an extensive collection of '60s and '70s muscle cars, the purpose behind using the special Lincoln to draw the public's attention has.



racking up for our children.

Instead of raising taxes, Thornberry said he would support spending cuts.

"The importance of acting is very high for me," he said. "But I would prefer not to have any taxes. I would like to cut spending to certain programs."

Thornberry singled out Medicaid as an entitlement program he'd like to see cut.

"We have to begin to reform entitlements or they will consume the entire budget," he said, referring to social welfare programs like Medicaid and Medicare.

"The plan right now is to have a vote in the House (of Representatives)," he said, adding that he expects the House to pass legislation Republicans would favor but that the Senate would do no such thing.


"I just think they're going to have to stay tuned to see what happens," he said.

a higher purpose - raising money to help sick children.

Shelton said there's natural connection between the Lincoln's place in American history and its newly ordained purpose as a money raiser to help kids.

Babe Ruth drove across the country in cars donated by the Ford Motor Company, including Shelton's blue Lincoln, to tirelessly promote Little League and baseball in general.

On Monday, Shelton had the Lincoln in Dallas at the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Children. About a dozen Dallas Cowboys football players and a half dozen cheerleaders were there to visit with the patients.

The trip to Dallas may have been a bit of a homecoming for the Lincoln, because Shelton bought it from a man who had it on display at a car museum in the city.

Shelton said his wife, Marilyn, two daughters and five grandchildren accompanied him on the trip.

"It was a rare opportunity to take it to the Scottish Rite hospital," he said. "While there we spent time with the Dallas Cowboys and cheerleaders and met with the hospital administration. It was a fun, constructive day."

Shelton said he wants to develop marketing plans with both Scottish Rite in Dallas and St. Jude Children's Hospital in Memphis to feature the car in some of their fundraising events.



gaze from impending fiscal crises. They are working to change policies that put state governments on an unsustainable trajectory.

The most obvious example was the passage of a right-to-work law last week in Michigan, the

Republican measures, opposed by all local Democrats. Republicans have leverage elsewhere, as well.

They hold the governorships and legislative majorities in 24 states with 52 percent of the nation's population (25 states with 53 percent if you count Nebraska with its nonpartisan single-chamber legislature).

They also hold governorships but not legislative majorities in five more states with 6 percent of the nation's population. In contrast, only 13 states with 30 percent of the nation's people have Democratic governors and legislatures. But even where Democrats are dominant there are stirrings of reform.

birthplace of the United Auto Workers union.

This was retaliation for a failed power grab by both the UAW and public sector unions - Proposition 2, which would have enshrined collective bargaining in the state constitution.

Michigan voters defeated Prop 2 last month by a 58 to 42 percent margin. It won in the two counties that include the effectively bankrupt cities of Detroit and Flint. It lost in the other 81 counties.

Right-to-work means that no one can be forced to join a union. The law also stops the automatic deduction of union dues from public employees' paychecks - which is to say, taxpayer funding of the public employee unions that have driven costs and pensions on an unsustainable path.

Gov. Rick Snyder was initially reluctant to push right-to-work. But he saw that neighboring Indiana was attracting new jobs after it passed right-towork last winter, while Michigan was losing jobs.

Michigan's law is similar to Wisconsin Gov. Scott Walker's law limiting public employee unions' bargaining powers and stopping the automatic flow of taxpayer money to union treasuries. Unions there protested, but Walker prevailed in a June 2012 recall election.

The Michigan and Wisconsin laws were partisan

Treasurer Gina Raimondo has worked to limit the state's unsustainable pension obligations. The state pension fund is currently paying out more to retirees than it's taking in from current employees, and instead of getting an 8.25 percent return on investments, it has been getting 2.5 percent.

Rhode Island has hired Democrat super-lawyer David Boies to bring a lawsuit to reduce the state's pension obligations. "There's no contract," Boies said. "Even if there was a contract, the state, pursuing the public interest, has the right to modify contracts.

Or consider New Jersey, where Republican Gov. Chris Christie has famously opposed the public employee unions. He has formed a coalition with Democratic legislators with roots in privatesector unions.

Those Democrats, like Christie, argue that public employees should not get far more generous benefits and pensions than the taxpayers who are paying for them.

The Attorney General's Child Support Division extends a heartfelt thank you to those parents who regularly pay their child support in full and on time. In the fiscal year that ended August 31, parents paid more than \$3.48 billion in child support, and since Attorney General Greg

Abbott took office in December 2002, more than \$24 billion in child support has been collected.

Sometimes circumstances arise, such as losing a job, that make it difficult to meet one's child support obligation. For parents who are in a situation like this, contact the Child Support Division so we can work together to determine a course of action. In partnership with the Texas Workforce Com-mission, the Child Support Division began the NCP Choices project that allows local judges to order unemployed and underemployed parents who are behind on their payments to receive employment services in order to help avoid jail time.

The project operates in 18 locations across the state. Since 2005, NCP Choices has collected more than \$70 million from parents who were neither working nor paying child support when ordered into the program.

The Attorney General's Office strives to be accessible to all of its customers, who often need upto-date information about their child support case. The Child Support Division provides 24-hour access to parents who are seeking information about their child support case. The agency's toll-free automated phone line is 800-

252-8014. Child Support Interactive, accessed from the main Attorney General website at www.texasattorneygeneral.gov, gives visitors another avenue for obtaining general information about the child support program and applying for services.

Ultimately, what children need most is to know their parents care about them. The Office of the Attorney General helps parents who are having trouble getting access to their children. We awarded a grant to Legal Aid of Northwest Texas, which operates a statewide Access and Visitation Hotline. The hotline is staffed by attorneys who provide legal information and assistance about child custody, along with information about visitation, paternity and child support matters. The hotline's toll-free number, 866- 292-4636, is available Monday through Friday from 1 to 7 p.m.

Please help create joyful memories for your children this holiday season by being there for them and paying your child support. Your faithfulness will reap great rewards as you help your children remember the holidays as a time of provision rather than hardship.



The lawsuit says the July 13 search of 38-year-old Angel Dobbs and her 24-yearold niece, Ashley Dobbs, was unlawful. The Irving women complained to DPS.

DPS spokeswoman Katherine Cesinger on Tuesday

declined comment on the lawsuit.

Cesinger says results of a Texas Rangers inquiry were sent to the Dallas County district attorney's office. The dispute is expected to reach a grand jury next month.

The women say a male trooper told them he saw them throwing cigarette butts out a car window, questioned them about drugs and summoned a female trooper for a search.

The two women say no drugs were found.

Haddad informed Sanh of his encounter with Organ and relayed Organ's contact info to him.

Once a world apart, Sanh and Organ had been living just a few hours away

After all these years, the two friends now stay in regular contact.

There's no way Organ would let another 46 years pass before he spoke with Sanh again.

ABC News vet Donaldson charged with DUI

LEWES, Del. (AP) - Former ABC News veteran Sam Donaldson is facing a drunken driving charge in Delaware.

Police in the southern coastal town of Lewes say the 78-year-old Donaldson was stopped on Dec. 1 for a traffic violation. Police say the officer determined Donaldson had been drinking and gave him field sobriety tests. Donaldson was arrested for driving under the influence and later released.

A phone call to his home in McLean, Va., was not immediately returned. McLean is about 110 miles west of Lewes.

Donaldson was twice chief White House correspondent for ABC News, covering Presidents Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan and Bill Clinton. He also co-hosted "PrimeTime Live" with Diane Sawyer and the ABC News Sunday morning broadcast "This Week with Sam Donaldson and Cokie Roberts."

43-foot beached whale found dead on Texas beach

MATAGORDA, Texas (AP) - Animal rescuers say a 43-foot whale has been found dead on a Texas beach. The Victoria Advocate reports the baleen whale was discovered Tuesday on Matagorda Beach. 
Further details on the animal weren't immediately available. Matagorda is about 90 miles southwest of Houston.

Take the time to determine whether the wish is real or a whim, and be prepared to be the dog's primary caregiver regardless. 
magazines and Pez, a dog isn't a whim to satisfy a momentary urge. Dogs have feelings and needs that must be met over the course of 10 to 20 years.


-Christmastime means wintertime. Consider the climate in which the dog and his new person or family lives. Unforgiving winter weather will make multiple trips out-

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




