11 — The Pampa News promotes, hires new staff

The Pampa News welcomed new faces this past year who bring a wealth of talent and experience to our community paper. ReDonn Woods took over publisher duties in April after serving as an advertising representative for 15 years.

Editor Timothy Howsare stepped in to direct news operations in October. Zachary Green filled the vacant sports editor position in November and reporter Sasha Heller joined the news staff in December.

Ad rep Kristina Liberty also joined The Pampa News in December.

10 — Major meth bust

While Pampa can feel a bit like Mayberry, with its community spirit and small-town charm, the city must at times deal with social issues like drug abuse. In February, the Gray County Sheriff's Office arrested 20-year-old Benjiman Griffin for possession of 15 grams of methamphetamine. Deputies had initially pulled Griffin over on a routine traffic stop and, upon searching him, discovered more than a half-ounce of crystal meth on his person.

9 — Top Rodeo honors


The Top O' Texas Rodeo, a local favor-



The popular rodeo event was held from Aug. 9-12 at the Top O' Texas Bowers Arena and drew record crowds, eclipsing 2011's attendance totals by almost 800 people. The Top O' Texas Rodeo also earned top honors in 2010 and was named Newcomer of the Year in 2008.

Making the committment: Pampa resident loses 230 pounds

Fad diets and exercise programs that promise spectacular results always get a lot of attention at the beginning of a new year as people make resolutions to lose weight and get in shape.

Monica Velasquez, club manager at Anytime Fitness in Pampa, is all too familiar with the hype. Two years ago, Velasquez, who is only 5 feet tall, weighed 445 pounds.

"I always struggled back and forth — I lost and I gained," said the 36-yearold. "But in the last couple of years I decided to make health a lifestyle and not a just diet."

In the past two years she has lost almost 230 pounds, and, according to her coworker, Monty DeMaroney, easily can do 60 minutes at "level 20" on the club's elliptical machines.

"The first time I got on an elliptical machine I could only do five minutes and I was crying," she said.

Velasquez now does cardio "seven days a week."

Kristin Scotten, warnings coordinator with the National Weather Service in Amarillo, said the best shot for more winter weather is from Sunday night through Monday evening.

"Last week the question was about how much snowfall we will receive," she said. "This week the question is about what type of precipitation it will be. It does look like that Monday could be a hazardous travel day."

Scotten said we probably won't get as much snow this time because of warmer temperatures.

"It looks like it will start as rain then change to freezing rain and then finally change to snow," Scotten added.

Scotten said the farther west you go, the less likely you will see snow. "The southeastern and eastern Texas Panhandle, Oklahoma and North Texas look like they will have the highest snowfall amounts," she said.

The good news is that any snow that will fall will be the wet, heavy, pretty stuff and not the blowing snow like we saw on Christmas Day, Scotten said.

"It looks like a pretty brief shot," she said. "We are still in the phase where we are five days out and the models haven't gotten into complete agreement yet to determine precipitation types and precipitation amounts. However, models are in good agreement an the track."

The NWS' current forecast for Pampa is for a 30 percent chance of freezing rain on Sunday night with a low of 25 **WEATHER** cont. on page 3

Texas builds hurricane safety domes

EDNA, Texas (AP) - Most of the time, the windowless building with the dome-shaped roof will be a typical high school gymnasium filled with cheering fans watching basketball and volleyball games.

But come hurricane season, the structure that resembles a miniature version of the famed Astrodome will double as a hurricane shelter, part of an ambitious storm-defense system that is taking shape along hundreds of miles of the Texas Gulf Coast.

Its brawny design - including double-layer cinderblock walls reinforced by heavy duty steel bars and cement piers that plunge 30 feet into the ground - should allow it to withstand winds up to 200 mph.

"There is nothing standard" about the building, said Bob Wells, superintendent of the Edna school district, as he stood inside the \$2.5 million gym, which is set to be completed by March. "The only standard stuff is going to be the stuff we do inside."

The Edna dome is one of 28 such buildings planned to protect sick, elderly and special-needs residents who might be unable to evacuate ahead of a hurricane. Firstresponders and local leaders will also be able to take refuge in the domes, allowing them to begin recovery efforts faster after a storm has passed.

Storm-defense structures are getting increased attention in the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy, which inflicted heavy damage on the East Coast in October. The city of New York, for instance, is considering a multi-billiondollar system of sea barriers.

For Texas, a state always in danger during hurricane season, the domes offer the extra benefit of serving as recreation or community centers when not needed as shelters. They are being erected with help from the federal Emergency Management Agency.

"I think it's good for FEMA, and I think it's good for us. And I think it's good for the taxpayers," Wells said.

The gym in Edna, a town of 5,500 people about 100 miles southwest of Houston, is the second hurricane dome in Texas. The first was built in 2011 in Woodsboro, near Corpus Christi. Most of the domes will be around 20,000 square feet.

The plan calls for structures in 11 counties in the Rio Grande Valley, around Corpus Christi and along the coast from Victoria to Newton counties, said Tom Vinger, a spokesman for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

So far, \$34.5 million has been awarded. This month, FEMA approved funds for a hurricane dome that will serve as a community center in Brownsville, one that will serve as a wellness center and physical rehabilitation facility in Bay City and two that will serve as multipurpose training centers in Kingsville.

Inside the gym in Edna, Wells' voice echoed as he pointed to the ceiling, which has layers of sprayed-on concrete, insulation and rebar, all of which are under a heavy duty fabric that gives the structure its distinctive wind-resistant shape.

The doorways are covered by awnings of heavy gauge metal and supported by concrete girders that go 15 feet into the ground.

FEMA is paying for 75 percent of the dome structures, with local communities picking up the remaining cost.

The funding is part of the agency's initiative to help homeowners and communities build hardened shelters that provide protection from extreme weather.

Nationwide, more than \$683 million has been awarded in 18 states, including Texas, Alabama, Michigan and South Carolina.

Walking around the gym, Wells said it reminded him of when, as a teenager, he first walked into the Astrodome after it opened in 1965 in Houston.

"It was like, 'Oh, wow, this is so cool," he said. "I'm still kind of in the 'oh, wow' stage with this.'

Hazing rules ignored before college student's death

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A blistering state report released Friday contends that Florida A&M University officials failed to follow state laws and regulations on hazing in the years leading up to the death of a FAMU drum major.

A 32-page report from the Florida Board of Governors inspector general's office concludes that the school lacked internal controls to prevent or detect hazing, citing a lack of communication among top university officials, the police department and the office responsible for disciplining students.

there was insufficient evidence to conclude whether university officials ignored allegations of hazing given to them by the former director of The Marching 100 band shortly before the November 2011 death of Robert Champion.

FAMU has 15 business days to officially respond to the report. University officials on Friday did not immediately respond to request from comment. The report comes at a

critical time for FAMU. Earlier this month a regional accrediting organization placed the school on probation for 12 months.

The university has one But investigators said year to prove it is turning

itself around or its accreditation could be revoked. FAMU officials say they have already made sweeping changes in the aftermath of Champion's death, which also resulted in the retirement of the band director and the resignation of the university president. But State University System Chancellor Frank Brogan stated in a memo sent out Friday that a series of problems detailed in recent months at the university "did not happen simply by accident, nor did they result from benign neglect."

"The problems that have permeated FAMU for more than a year were

a direct result of action or inaction by FAMU personnel, who either had not developed adequate policies or simply did not enforce policies that were in place," Brogan wrote.

Friday's report comes from the Florida Board of Governors, which oversees the state university system. conducted more than 35 interviews and reviewed more than 7,000 pages of documents.

Champion's family has filed a lawsuit contending that the school failed to take action to stop hazing. That lawsuit cites the Nov. 2011 meeting as an example of inaction by top FAMU officials.

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7 arrested in \$11.5M gold heist

WILLEMSTAD, Curacao (AP) — Police in the Dutch Caribbean island of Curacao have arrested seven suspects in connection with the recent heist of 70 gold bars worth an estimated \$11.5 million.

Police spokesman Reginald Huggins said Friday that one of the men is from Bonaire, three are from Venezuela and the remainder from Curacao. One of the suspects was later released while the others are still being interrogated, Huggins said.

Authorities have not said where the gold was being delivered, but one of the ship's crew members said they were delivering the gold to an unidentified company in Curacao.

7 — Coronado Center facelift

The Pampa Economic **Development** Corporation (PEDC) in June announced its acquisition of Coronado Center for \$1.7 million. The PEDC intends to rebrand the center as Las Pampas Square and will remodel the square to attract new businesses.

"In the months to come, you will see changes at the square that will upgrade the condition of the buildings and surroundings, and increase the appeal to the area," PEDC board President Gary Sutherland said in a June interview.

The property as a whole will also see improvement to the vacant Albertson's grocery store as the Pampa Independent School District plans to move its administration facility into the square in 2013.

6 — Heliport at the hospital

Gray County spent most of 2012 constructing a heliport behind Pampa **Regional Medical Center** to serve as housing for an emergency medical helicopter and three ambulances. The \$1.3 million facility will help the hospital treat patients requiring trauma services who must be flown to hospitals in Amarillo.

4 — Shooting in front of Subway

In November, the city suffered its first officerinvolved fatal shooting in 18 years as 45-year-old David Scott was shot in front of the Subway restaurant on North Hobart Street. The shooting occurred around 4:30 p.m.,

scene and Mr. Scott pointed a handgun at them," Department of Public Safety Trooper Daniel Hawthorne said in a November interview. "Officers fired and Mr. Scott was killed."

3 — Puppy dog eyes

The City of Pampa held its election in May in which 71 percent of voters supported a bond issue to build a new animal shelter. The nearly \$3 million facility will serve the city's less fortunate pets who are resigned to a life on the streets before being picked up by the city's animal control officers and ultimately placed into the pound. Voters also approved a measure, with 68 percent voting in favor, to lengthen the terms of city officials from two years to four years.

2 — End of an era

Pampans experienced the end of an era in December when the former Celanese Chemical Plant was destroyed with explosives. More than 100 community members attended the demolition and watched from their vehicles as the structures were razed. Community members took to The Pampa News' Facebook page to share their memories of the plant, which once served as one of Pampa's largest and highest-paying employers. Energy company Enbridge has moved in on the north side of the property and Pampa Fuels plans to utilize the remaining space to construct a new methanol plant.

1 — 100 years young

2012 was a big year for the City of Pampa as the municipality celebrated its centennial anniversary. On the Fourth of July, the city hosted a public celebration at Recreation



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

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Charity begins with wealth creation

Charity - helping people who have trouble helping themselves — is a good thing two times over. It's good for the beneficiary and good for the donor, too. Stephen Post's fine book, "The Hidden Gifts of Help-

happy. Giving money makes us feel good, and helping face-to-face is even better. People say it makes them feel physically healthier. They sleep better.

Private charity is unquestioningly better than government efforts to help people. Government squanders money. Charities sometime squander money, too, but they usually don't. Proof of the superiority of private over government efforts is everywhere. Catholic charities do a better job educating children than government — for much less money. New York City's government left Central Park a dangerous mess. Then a private charity rescued it. But while charity is important, let's not overlook something more important: Before we can help anyone, we first need something to give. Production precedes donation. Advocates of big government forget this. We can't give unless we (or someone) first creates. Yet wealth creators are encouraged to feel guilf. "Bill Gates, or any billionaire, for that matter," Yaron Brook, author of "Free Market Revolution" and president of the Ayn Rand Institute, said on my TV show, "how did they become a billionaire? By creating a product or great service that benefits everybody. And we know it benefits us because we pay for it. We pay less than what it's worth to us. That's why we trade we get more value than what we give up. So, our lives are better off. Bill Gates improved hundreds of millions of lives around the world.

That's how he became a billionaire.

Gates walks in the footprints of earlier creators, like John D. Rockefeller, who got rich by lowering the price of oil products, and Cornelius Vanderbilt, who did the same for transportation. The clueless media called them robber barons, but they were neither robbers nor barons. They and other cre-

ators didn't just give us products to improve our lives, they also employed people.

That's charity that keeps on giving, because employees keep working and keep supporting their families. "That's not charity," Brook said. "(It's) another trade. You pay your employees and get something in return. But the employee is better off, and you are better off.

Pampa's motel situation is bleak

As a new resident to Pampa, I have experienced firsthand how bleak the motel situation in town is. It's not that there aren't enough rooms to go around - seven motels and hotels are enough to serve the community and transient oil workers. It's the fact that these motels and hotels are gouging their customers with inflated prices based on perceived demand.

It starts with the three motels: Black Gold, Star and Western. These motels offer one-star, barely economy rooms and charge \$50 per night or more. Equivalent, one-star motels in Amarillo charge \$30 for the same services. It's despicable how the motel owners have set their rates so high — it's essentially price gouging, similar to how OPEC can dictate the oil market.

These cheap motels can get away with inflated rates because they know the rooms will book

- as long as the oil keeps pumping. As soon as the oil dries up, and the transient workers move on to the next boom town, the prices will drop to more reasonable rates. Trust me. No one's going to pay \$50 a night for a room at the Star - unless they have to.

And so the hotels in town that offer nicer rooms and more amenities - Best Western, Holiday Inn Express, Hampton Inn and AmericInn Lodge — set their rates accordingly, based on the one-star motels' inflated prices.

Just last week, I called the Best Western to inquire about renting a room for the week. They wanted \$550. That's obscene.

That's more than \$85 a night for a room at a Best Western, which would normally cost between \$60 and \$70 in any other town. A room at the Hampton Inn for a week would run more than \$800. Outrageous.

Many community members who don't normally rent rooms in town may not be aware of the situation. But I am here to tell

you just how bleak the situation is. The prices are so inflated that they can serve as a deterrent to tourists looking to make their dollars stretch. By doing so, tourists may end up spending their money elsewhere which can affect the city coffers.

These are tough economic times and people are looking to save money wherever they can.

I am set to move into an apartment here in Pampa on Jan. 1 so I am still renting motel rooms locally. I decided to rent a room at the Budget Inn in Panhandle because it costs \$10 less per night than a similar room here in town. Of course, I have to eat as well

so I spent even more money in Panhandle to keep my belly full. If the motel rates in Pampa were more reasonable, I would have chosen to stay in town and would have spent even more money at local restaurants.

But I didn't. Because I am not an idiot. These motel owners are gouging the public because they can and it's a shame.

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Democracy a notable success in 2012

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"And when you start thinking about the multiplier effect, \$50 billion for Bill Gates? That's nothing compared to the value he added to the world. That is much greater than the value he'll ever add in any kind of charitable activity." Gates now donates billions and applies his critical thinking skills to charity.

He tested ideas in education, like small high schools, and dumped them when they didn't work. Good. But if he reinvested his charity money in Microsoft, might he have helped more people? Maybe.

Brook points out that Gates gets credit for his charity, but little credit for having created wealth. "Quite the contrary," Brook said. "We sent the Justice Department to go after him. He's considered greedy, in spite of all the hundreds of millions of people he's helped, because he benefited at the same time. (When) he shifted to charity, suddenly he's a good guy. My complaint is not that he's doing the charity. It's that we as a society value not the creation, not the building, not the accumulation of wealth.

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This being the season of giving, it's worth looking back at some special gifts from November's election that received little acknowledgement at the time.

These victories came in campaigns that had no candidates --- no Demo-crats, Republicans or other

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democracy that was first proposed by the historic Populist movement of the 1870s. It's presently available to citizens in 26 states and hundreds of cities — and in this past year, it produced some serious progressive wins.

Unfortunately, corporations and super-wealthy individuals have now glommed onto this democratic innovation with deep-pocket vengeance, using their silos of money and expertise in PR deceit to pass some awful proposals and kill some great ones. Still, though, progressives are making good use of the initiative alternative to build winning coalitions around many big issues that the power structure refuses to address.

They achieved several important public policy victories in November, even in red and purple states, showing again that populist issues can open minds, shove aside rightwing orthodoxy and overcome corporate money.

Many of these came in grassroots efforts to overturn Citizens United. This Supreme Court-sanctioned daylight robbery of the people's democratic authority should have been at the center of Barack Obama's campaign against Mr. "Corporations-Are-People" Romney.

It certainly warranted a presidential push, and it would have been a winning issue, even among rank-and-file tea partiers but, zilch.

Beneath the national radar, however, democracy organizers in two states and dozens of cities built formidable campaigns this year to pass initiatives that say "no" to the court's edict allowing a tidal wave of corporate cash to engulf our elections. Here are just a few of the successes:

- A whopping 72 percent of Colorado voters approved Amendment 65, directing their legislature to demand that Congress draft a constitutional amendment overturning Citizens United and send it to the states for ratification.

- An even-morewhopping 76 percent of Montanans said "yes" to Initiative 166, declaring that corporations do not have constitutional rights.

- Seventy-four percent of Chicago voters (including 73 percent of Republicans) approved a local initiative demanding that Congress propose an amendment reversing Citizens United.

- Citizens of the burg of Brecksville, Ohio, had to battle their own city hall just to get Issue 25 on the ballot. Theirs was a unique proposal, requiring that city officials convene a biennial "Democracy Day" for residents to express themselves on the impact of corporate cash in their elections.

It then required the mayor to send a letter to Congress detailing the people's objections.

Sometimes you can win on your own initiatives, and sometimes by not losing on theirs. Progressives were engaged in both kinds of big fights in this election.

A terrific victory for union rights and political fairness was scored this go 'round on California's Proposition 32 - a wad of ugliness put forth by the Koch boys and their malicious cadre of bigmoney, anti-union ideologues. Gussied up as a good government reform, the proposition essentially would have gutted labor's participation in political campaigns. It cost unions and their grassroots allies

tens of millions of dollars, but they effectively exposed Prop 32 as a right-wing corporate sham and voters rejected it

with a solid 56 percent. And in the "red" states of Idaho and South Dakota, teachers came out on top. In Idaho, teachers won big with three initiatives to boost teacher rights and education funding, and South Dakota voters repealed an antiteacher state law that GOP legislators had passed earlier in a burst of ideological idiocy. Likewise, marriage equality for gays and lesbians gained landmark victories, with wins on all four proposals put on the ballot (Maine, Maryland, Minnesota and Washington). Also, the nation's absurdly expensive and ineffective "war on drugs" took a drubbing, with voters OK'ing medical use of cannabis in Massachusetts and Montana, and with Colorado and Washington becoming the first states to legalize marijuana for personal recreational con-

sumption. An old bumper sticker declares, "If the people lead, the leaders will follow." In 2012, the people were way ahead of the "leaders."

Texas school board facing cheating names new head

Activists say airstrike in north Syria kills 14

BEIRUT (AP) - Anti-regime activists say a government airstrike on a town in north Syria has killed 14 people, including two women and eight children.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said the 14 were killed in a strike Friday on the town of al-Safira, south of the northern city of Aleppo.

An activist who spoke anonymously because of security reasons gave the names of the dead and said the government often strikes the town because rebels are attacking a large military complex on its outskirts.

Rebels clashed with soldiers there on Friday, he said. Activists say the regime often takes revenge for rebel advances by bombing residential areas.

They say more than 40,000 have been killed in Syria since the start of the uprising against President Bashar Assad in March 2011.

Houston man charged with shooting girlfriend, teen

HOUSTON (AP) - Houston police have charged a 44-year-old man with capital murder after his girlfriend and her daughter were found fatally shot on Christmas Eve. Curtis James Adams has been charged with the deaths of

Latasha Jones and her 13-year-old daughter. Investigators believe Adams shot Jones and her daughter,

then left with his 7-year-old son.

Police say the boy saw one of the shootings. Police say

Adams went to a family member's home, where he said things that eventually led relatives to go to Jones' home.

Adams was arrested by Missouri City police after allegedly threatening a family member with a pistol.

He remains held in Fort Bend County jail on aggravated assault and firearm possession charges.

An attorney has not been appointed to represent him.



Video released of NYC suspect in fatal subway push

NEW YORK (AP) ---Police searched for a woman who killed a man by pushing him in front of a subway train and released surveillance video Friday of her running away from the station.

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Commuters, meanwhile, absorbed the news of the second fatal subway shove in the city this month.

"It's just a really sad commentary on the world and on human beings, period," said Howard Roth, who takes the subway daily.

He said the deadly push was food for thought about subway safety, "but I guess the best thing is what they tell you - don't stand near the edge, and keep your eyes open."

The suspect in Thursday night's killing had been following the man closely on a Queens platform and mumbling to herself, witnesses told police.

She got up from a nearby bench and shoved the man. who was standing with his back to her, as the train pulled into the platform. He was pinned under the train as it pulled to a stop, police said.

It did not appear the man noticed her before he was shoved onto the tracks, police said, adding that the condition of the man's body was making it difficult to identify him.

The woman was described as Hispanic, in her 20s, heavyset and about 5-foot-5, wearing a blue, white and gray ski jacket and Nike sneakers with gray on top and red on the bottom.

It was unclear whether the man and the woman knew each other.

And it's also unclear whether anyone tried to help the man up before he was struck — or whether there was enough time for anyone to do anything.

The surveillance video was taken at a nearby intersection.

On Dec. 3, 58-year-old Ki-Suck Han was pushed in front of a train in Times Square. Apparently no other passenger tried to. help Han.

A photograph of him on the tracks a split second before he was killed was published on the front of the New York Post the next day, causing an uproar and debate over whether the photographer, who had been waiting for a train, should have tried to help him and whether the newspaper should have run the image.

A homeless man, 30-year-old Naeem Davis, was charged with murder in Han's death and was ordered held without bail. He has pleaded not guilty and has said that Han was the aggressor and had attacked him first.

The two men hadn't met before.

Being pushed onto the train tracks is a silent fear for many commuters who ride the city's subway a total of more than 5.2 million times on an average weekday, but deaths are rare.

Among the more highprofile cases was the January 1999 death of aspiring screenwriter Kendra Webdale, who was shoved by a former mental patient.

The man, Andrew Goldstein, was convicted of murder after unsuccessfully arguing he was too mentally ill to understand what he was doing.

The case prompted the state Legislature to pass Kendra's Law, which lets mental health authorities supervise patients who live outside institutions to make, sure they are taking their medications and aren't threats to safety.

Earlier this year, restaurant cook Jose Rojas was convicted of assault for shoving a woman into the side of a moving train in 2010. His lawyers argued he simply stumbled into

Planned Parenthood seeks funding

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) Planned Parenthood has asked a Texas court to order the state to continue funding the organization's preventive health care for poor women.

The judge said he would issue a decision on Monday.

The Republican-controlled Legislature doesn't want any money going to doctors or clinics affiliated with Planned Parenthood, even if all they provide is birth control.

Parenthood Planned complains that the new rule set to take effect on Jan. 1 is unconstitutional.

Federal authorities are cutting off funding effective Dec. 31 because they say the affiliate rule violates federal law by denying a woman the right to choose her doctor.

That forced the Texas Department of Health and Human Services to start a new Women's Health Program on Jan. 1 without federal funding.

Numbers on U.S. bank failures since 2008

The pace of U.S. bank failures has slowed sharply since peaking in 2010 with 157.

Since the start of 2008, the year the financial crisis erupted, 465 banks have failed. But their depositors haven't lost any money. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. insures accounts up to \$250,000 per depositor per bank.

Some numbers related to the bank failures:

From 2008 through 2011, bank failures cost the federal deposit insurance fund an estimated \$88 billion.

The wave of collapses started in 2008 with 25. The number jumped to 140 in 2009. Ninety-two banks failed in 2011. So far this year, 51 have failed.

-Since mid-2010, nearly all the failed banks have been small.

The five biggest banks to fail since 2008 are: Washington Mutual, based in Seattle, September 2008, \$307 billion in assets; IndyMac Bank, Pasadena, Calif., July 2008, \$32 billion; Colonial Bank, Montgomery, Ala., August 2009, \$25 billion; Guaranty Bank, Austin, Texas, August 2009, \$13 billion; and BankUnited, Coral Gables, Fla., May 2009, \$12.8 billion.

-The states with the most bank failures from 2008 through 2012 are Georgia, 84; Florida, 66; Illinois, 55; and California, 39.

-The number of employees at U.S. banks fell to 2,105,833 as of Sept. 30, down from 2,212,766 as of March 31, 2008.



Longshoremen strike averted at East Coast ports after agreement reached

NEW YORK (AP) -The union for longshoremen along the East Coast and Gulf of Mexico has agreed to extend its contract for 30 days, averting a possible strike that could have crippled operations at ports that handle about 40 percent of all U.S. container cargo, a federal mediator announced Friday.

The extension came after the union and an alliance of port operators and shipping lines resolved one of the stickier points in their months-long contract negotiations, involving royalty payments to the longshoremen for each container they unload.

Negotiations will continue until at least midnight Jan. 28.

Some important contract issues remain to be resolved, but the head of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, George' Cohen, said the agreement on royalties was "a major positive step forward."

"While some significant issues remain in contention, I am cautiously optimistic that they can be resolved in the upcoming 30-day extension period," he said.

The terms of the royalty agreement were not announced. The master

contract between the International Longshoremen's Association and the U.S. Maritime Alliance originally expired in September.

The two sides agreed to extend it once before, for 90 days, but it had been set to expire again at 12:01 a.m. Sunday.

As recently as Dec. 19, the president of the longshoremen, Harold Daggett, had said a strike was expected.

A work stoppage would have idled shipments of a vast number of consumer products, from electronics to clothing, and kept U.S. manufacturers from getting parts and raw materials delivered easily.

Business groups expressed relief that the two sides had agreed to keep the ports open.

"A coast-wide port shutdown is not an option. It would have severe economic ramifications for the local, national and even global economies and wreak havoc on the supply chain," said National Retail Federation President Matthew Shav.

Major ports that would have been frozen included the massive terminals serving New York City overseen by the Port Authority

sociation President Joseph Curto said avoiding a strike is critical "to thousands of workers who depend on port activities for their livelihood."

Other ports that would have been affected by a strike are in Boston; the Philadelphia area; Baltimore; Wilmington, N.C.; Charleston, S.C.; Jacksonville, Fla.; Port Everglades, Fla.; Miami; Tampa, Fla.; Mobile, Ala.; and New Orleans.

Longshoremen on the West Coast have a separate collective bargaining agreement.

Sheriff considers armed school posse

PHOENIX (AP) - An Arizona sheriff has announced plans to deputy an armed volunteer posse to protect Phoenix-area students in the wake of the mass shooting at a Connecticut elementary school.

Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio says he has the authority to mobilize private citizens to fight crime but hasn't talked to specific districts. He says he doesn't

plan to put posse members inside schools but will have them posted around the perimeters

Arpaio is known as one of the nation's most highprofile supporters of strict U.S.-Mexico border policy. His plan announced Thursday comes after two other Arizona officials released ideas for boosting

school security. Attorney General Tom Horne proposed firearms training for one person in each school. And Pinal County Sheriff

Paul Babeu proposed training multiple educators per school to carry guns.

He says the chicken and a cat also escaped, but another cat died.

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
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Neighbor Brad Krueger says that he raised the chicken on his farm until dogs chased it away.

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Statewide gasoline price average increases 4 cents

Many travelers are still out for the holidays and may be through New Year's Day, Jan. 1, 2013. This week the statewide average for a gallon of regular unleaded in Texas increased four cents and is \$3.07. according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. Motorists in Texarkana are paying the most on average at \$3.12, and drivers in Beaumont are paying the least at \$3.02.

The average price for fuel in the Lone Star State is 19 cents less than the national average of \$3.26. Whether gas prices continue to rise or again turn lower will be impacted by action, or inaction, in Washington surrounding the "fiscal cliff." If a deal is reached before the end-of-year deadline it will likely be seen as positive for the U.S. economy, which could send crude prices and gas prices higher. If a deal is not reached, markets are likely to slump and gas prices could go even lower.

In addition to watching winter gas prices, AAA Texas reminds winter travelers to stay safe on the road. Motorists will encounter a variety of winter road conditions as they make their way home.

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Family quiet on former President George H.W. Bush's condition

HOUSTON (AP) - Former President George H.W. Bush is unlikely to leave the Houston hospital where he's being cared for anytime soon

but would tell wellwishers to "put the harps back in the closet," a longtime aide said. Jean Becker said in a statement Thursday evening that the 88-year-old,

Bush, the oldest living former president, has been in intensive care since Sunday. He was admitted to Methodist Hospital in Houston on Nov. 23 for treatment of what his spokesman Jim McGrath described as a "stubborn" cough. He had spent about a week there earlier in November for treatment of the same condi-

McGrath and a hospital spokesman did not provide any new information on the president's health Friday morning. McGrath said previously that only changes in Bush's condition would prompt updates about his health. Becker, Bush's longtime Houston chief of staff, said "most of the civilized world" contacted her Wednesday after word spread that Bush had been placed in intensive care unit when physicians were having difficulty bringing a fever under control.

"Someday President George H.W. Bush might realize how beloved he is, but of course one of the reasons why he is so beloved is because he has no idea," Becker said in the attimes lighthearted statement that made multiple references to jokes and the former president's sense of humor.

She said updates about Bush's condition have been limited "out of respect for President Bush and the Bush family who, like most of us, prefer to deal with health issues in privacy." She said another factor was "because he is so beloved we knew everyone would overreact."

"I hope you all know how much your love, concern and support are appreciated," Becker said.

While the president's treatment was "unequaled anywhere," she said prayers also were needed and welcomed.

"I am thinking heaven has not seen such a barrage of prayer intentions since 'It's a Wonderful Life,"" she said, referring to the classic


It was hoped Bush would be well enough to spend Christmas at home. But while his cough eased, he developed a persistent fever and his condition was downgraded to "guarded."

The former president has had visits from family and friends, including longtime friend James Baker III, his former Secretary of State. Bush's daughter, Dorothy, arrived Wednesday from her home in Bethesda, Md. Other visitors have included his sons George W. Bush, the 43rd president, and Jeb Bush, the former Florida governor.

Bush and his wife, Barbara, live in Houston during the winter and spend their summers at a home in Kennebunkport, Maine. Bush, the 41st president, had served two terms as Ronald Reagan's vice president when he was elected in 1988 to succeed Reagan. Four years later, after a term highlighted by the success of the 1991 Gulf War in Kuwait, he lost to Democrat Bill Clinton amid voters' concerns about the economy.

Bush was a naval aviator in World War II — at one point the youngest in the Navy - and was shot down over the Pacific. He's skydived on at least three of his birthdays since leaving the White House, most re-







Desert Storm commander Norman Schwarzkopf dies

WASHINGTON (AP) Truth is, retired Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf didn't care much for his popular "Stormin' Norman" nickname.

The seemingly no-nonsense Desert Storm commander's reputed temper

around the general, who died Thursday in Tampa, Fla., at age 78 of complications from pneumonia, knew him as a friendly, talkative and even jovial figure who preferred the somewhat milder sobriquet given by his troops: "The Bear."

That one perhaps suited him better later in his life, when he supported various national causes and children's charities while eschewing the spotlight and resisting efforts to draft him to run for political office.

He lived out a quiet retirement in Tampa, where he'd served his last military assignment and where an elementary school bearing his name is testament to his standing in the community

Schwarzkopf capped an illustrious military career by commanding the U.S.led international coalition that drove Saddam Hussein's forces out of Kuwait in 1991 — but he'd managed to keep a low profile in the public debate over the second Gulf War against Iraq, saying at one point that he doubted victory would be as easy as the White House and the Pentagon predicted.

Schwarzkopf was named commander in chief of U.S. Central Command at Tampa's MacDill Air Force Base in 1988, overseeing the headquarters for U.S. military and security concerns in nearly two dozen countries stretching across the Middle East to Afghanistan and the rest of central Asia, plus Pakistan. When Saddam invaded Kuwait two years later to punish it for allegedly stealing Iraqi oil reserves, Schwarzkopf commanded Operation Desert Storm, the coalition of some 30 countries organized by President George H.W. Bush that succeeded in driving the Iraqis out. At the peak of his postwar national celebrity, Schwarzkopf — a selfproclaimed political independent — rejected suggestions that he run for office, and remained far more private than other generals, although he did serve briefly as a military commentator for NBC. While focused primarily on charitable enterprises in his later years, he campaigned for President George W. Bush in 2000, but was ambivalent about the 2003 invasion of Iraq. In early 2003 he told The Washington Post that the outcome was an unknown: "What is postwar Iraq going to look like, with the

Kurds and the Sunnis and the Shiites? That's a huge question, to my mind. It really should be part of the overall campaign plan."

Initially Schwarzkopf had endorsed the invasion, saying he was convinced that Secretary of State Colin Powell had given the United Nations powerful evidence of Iraqi weapons of mass destruction. After that proved false, he said decisions to go to war should depend on what U.N. weapons inspectors found.

He seldom spoke up during the conflict, but in late 2004 he sharply criticized Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld and the Pentagon for mistakes that included erroneous judgments about Iraq and inadequate training for Army reservists sent there.

"In the final analysis I think we are behind schedule. ... I don't think we counted on it turning into jihad (holy war)," he said in an NBC interview.

Schwarzkopf was born Aug. 24, 1934, in Trenton, N.J., where his father, Col. H. Norman Schwaszkopf, founder and commander of the New Jersey State Police, was then leading the investigation of the Lindbergh kidnap case. That investigation ended with the arrest and 1936 execution of German-born carpenter Richard Hauptmann for murdering famed aviator Charles Lindbergh's infant son

The elder Schwarzkopf was named Herbert, but when the son was asked what his "H" stood for, he would reply, "H."

As a teenager Norman accompanied his father to Iran, where the elder Schwarzkopf trained the Iran's national police force and was an adviser to Reza Pahlavi, the young Shah of Iran

Young Norman studied there and in Switzerland, Germany and Italy, then followed in his father's footsteps to West Point, graduating in 1956 with an engineering degree. After stints in the U.S. and abroad, he earned a master's degree in engineering at the University of Southern California and later taught missile engineering at West Point. In 1966 he volunteered for Vietnam and served two tours, first as a U.S. adviser to South Vietnamese paratroops and later as a battalion commander in the U.S. Army's Americal Division. He earned three Silver Stars for valor including one for saving troops from a minefield plus a Bronze Star, a Purple Heart and three Distinguished Service Medals. While many career officers left military service embittered by Vietnam, Schwarzkopf was among those who opted to stay and help rebuild the tattered Army into a potent, modernized all-volunteer force. After Saddam invaded Kuwait in August 1990, Schwarzkopf played a key diplomatic role by helping persuade Saudi Arabia's King Fahd to allow U.S. and other foreign troops to deploy on Saudi territory

as a staging area for the war to come.

On Jan. 17, 1991, a five-month buildup called Desert Shield became **Operation Desert Storm** as allied aircraft attacked Iraqi bases and Baghdad government facilities. The six-week aerial campaign climaxed with a massive ground offensive on Feb. 24-28, routing the Iraqis from Kuwait in 100 hours before U.S. officials called a halt.


Schwarzkopf said afterward he agreed with Bush's decision to stop the war rather than drive to Baghdad to capture Saddam, as his mission had been only to oust the Iraqis from Kuwait.

But in a desert tent meeting with vanquished Iraqi generals, he allowed a key concession on Iraq's use of helicopters, which later backfired by enabling Saddam to crack down more easily on rebellious Shiites and Kurds.

While he later avoided the public second-guessing by academics and think tank experts over the ambiguous outcome of the first Gulf War and its impact on the second Gulf War, he told The Washington Post in 2003, "You can't help but ... with 20/20 hindsight, go back and say, 'Look, had we done something different, we probably wouldn't be facing what we are facing today.'

After retiring from the Army in 1992, Schwarzkopf wrote a best-selling autobiography, "It Doesn't Take A Hero." Of his Gulf War role, he said: "I like to say I'm not a hero. I was lucky enough to lead a very successful war." He was knighted by Queen Elizabeth II and honored with decorations from France, Britain, Belgium, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia; the United Arab Emirates, Qatar and Bahrain.

Teen that escaped prision gets 4 years

WACO, Texas (AP) - The second of three inmates who tried to escape from a Central Texas detention center for juveniles has been given four years in prison.

The Waco Tribune-Herald reports that the three teenagers were charged as adults after the July escape attempt.

All three are 18 years old. One of them, Larry Jefferson Burge, pleaded guilty Thursday in Waco. Burge and two others slipped through a hole in a perimeter fence at the McLennan County State Juvenile Correctional Facility.

They were caught in a wooded area about two miles away, three hours after their escape.

Burge's attorney declined to comment afterward.


Another of the inmates also got four years in prison. The third has asked for a court hearing to be rescheduled to next year.


Trains playing major role in Plains oil boom

It also means a steady parade of trains carrying the hazardous material rumbling out of North Dakota and Montana and across the country.

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


Obama could reshape 5th Circuit during 2nd term

NEW ORLEANS (AP) The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals is widely viewed as one of the nation's most conservative federal appellate courts, but President Barack Obama could get a chance to change that perception in his second term. Ten of

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dents. But six of those GOP-nominated judges are eligible for senior status or will be in the next four years, a change that would allow the Democratic president to nominate their replacements.

The court, which reviews cases from Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi, also has two open seats that already can be filled.

Federal judges don't have a mandatory retirement age and aren't obligated to take senior status, a form of semi-retirement that allows them to continue hearing cases. While there's no telling how many seats may open up, even a handful of vacancies would give Obama an opportunity to reshape the court's ideological bent during his second term.

Russell Wheeler, a Brookings Institution visiting fellow who is an expert on judicial selections, said it's plausible that the Democratic-nominated

judges among active 5th Circuit judges go from being a 2-to-1 minority to holding a slim majority before Obama leaves office.

"I wouldn't call that math. I'd call that informed speculation," he cautioned. "It really all depends on the degree to which (Obama) can find nominees that Republican senators find acceptable."

A senator from the state where a vacant seat is located can block a hearing on a nomination. Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi each have at least one Republican senator. And, practically speaking, Senate rules allow any senator to prevent a confirmation vote on a nominee.

Judges aren't immune from basing their retirement decisions on political considerations, so the 5th Circuit's Republican-nominated judges may be inclined to wait out Obama's second term before vacating their seats.

"Some (judges) don't consider it at all," Wheeler said of timing. "For others, it's an important consideration."

Two judges nominated by Obama already serve on the 5th Circuit. Of the remaining active judges, six were nominated by George W. Bush; four were tapped by Ronald Reagan; two were picked by Bill Clinton and one was nominated by Jimmy Carter. The court also has seven senior judges, five of whom were nominated by Republican presidents.

The 5th Circuit is one of 13 federal circuit courts. Obama has made a deeper imprint on the Richmond, Va.-based 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, long considered an equally conservative court. He nominated six of the 15 active judges on the 4th Circuit, swinging the court's majority in favor of Democratic nominees.

"It's a little early to tell, but there's a feeling (the 4th Circuit) is not as conservative as it was and has shifted away from that conservative reputation," University of Richmond law professor Carl Tobias said.

However, Tobias said tallying up the number of Democratic- and Republican-nominated judges would be a "crude instrument" for assessing a court's ideological leanings.

"Judges are not automatons," he added.

Case in point: When the U.S. Supreme Court considered the constitutionality of the Obama health care law's individual mandate, Chief Justice John Roberts, who was nominated by George W. Bush, sided with the Democratic-nominated justices in upholding the law.

The 5th Circuit has a reputation for being a corporation-friendly, pro-prosecutor foe of death penalty appeals and abortion rights advocates. It also tends to favor employers over employees and shows more tolerance for organized, state-sanctioned prayer than other circuits.

University of Houston Law Center professor David Dow, who clerked for 5th Circuit Judge Caro-

lyn Dineen King in the mid-1980s, said judges' decisions are guided by Supreme Court precedent and statutory language far more than their personal ideology.

"There's frequently room for people to disagree on what a statute means, but there's usually not a wide range of disagreement," he said. "The significance of ideology in most cases can be overstated."

Dow, who founded the Texas Innocence Network and has represented more than 100 death row inmates in state and federal appeals, estimated that 95 percent of the cases on the 5th Circuit's docket would be decided the same way no matter which direction the court leans.

Even if Obama is able to fill several 5th Circuit seats, legal experts doubt he would try to stack the court with liberal-leaning judges. Sheldon Goldman, a University of Massachusetts at Amherst political science professor who has studied the politics of judicial selection, said he would expect Obama to nominate candidates with centrist credentials to avoid opposition from Republican senators who could hold up the nominations.

"A moderate is the best any Republican can hope for from the Obama administration," he said.


Obama has nominated 42 circuit court judges and has had 30 confirmed as of early December, according to Wheeler.



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


As a team Pampa shot reco

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

Indians sell TV network to Fox Sports Media Group

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Cleveland Indians sold their regional TV sports network and telecast rights for Indians baseball games to Fox Sports Media Group, in a deal announced Friday.

Fox Sports Media Group said it will have the exclusive long-term local telecast rights for the Indians.

While no financial terms were released, The Plain Dealer reported that Fox Sports is paying an estimated \$230 million for SportsTime Ohio and \$400 million over 10 years to broadcast the games.

Since the 2006 season, the team's games have been on SportsTime Ohio, a Cleveland-based regional

sports network created by Indians owners Paul and Larry Dolan.

The Dolans had hoped that owning their own network would give the team more revenue and allow them to control programming much like the New York Yankees' YES Network and the Boston Red Sox's New England Sports Network.

Paul Dolan said in a statement Friday that the sale of SportsTime Ohio will strengthen the franchise and help its ability to build competitive teams.

Fox Sports Media Group, which is owned by News Corp., already owns 20 U.S. regional sports networks. News Corp. in November said it was

acquiring a 49 percent stake in the Yankees' YES Network.

The addition of rights to Indians games gives Fox Sports Ohio adds to its lineup of the Cincinnati Reds, Cleveland Cavaliers, Columbus Blue Jackets, Columbus Crew, Xavier Musketeers, and Cincinnati Bearcats.

SportsTime Ohio also has carried Mid-American Conference football and basketball and high school sports.

"The acquisition of SportsTime Ohio solidifies our business in Ohio," said Jeff Krolik, executive vice president of Fox Sports Networks
