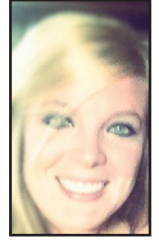

Bank fraud suspect to appear in court

An initial appearance is scheduled for 9:30 a.m. Thursday at the federal courthouse in Amarillo for Erin Dawn Trevathan, who on Feb. 13 was indicted by a federal grand jury in Lubbock on one count of bank fraud.



Trevathan will appear before Magistrate Judge Clinton E. Averitte in the first-floor court room of the U.S. District Court at 205 SE Fifth St. While a loan officer at Pampa Federal Credit Union, Trevathan is accused of falsifying bank reports and statements from 2008 until she was terminated in December 2010. She also is accused of altering books and

Man killed in fire

STAFF REPORT

A 74-year-old man died Saturday in a motor home fire at 730 Murphy Ave., city spokesman Donny Hooper said.

Hooper said dispatch received a call of a fire around 5:30 p.m., and when firefighters arrived the motor home was engulfed in flames.

The fire was under control around 6:50 p.m., he said.

After containing the blaze, firefighters did a preliminary search of structure and found the body of Harold Pendergrass.

An autopsy was ordered and state fire marshals were called to assist in the investigation, Hooper said.

Five units with 11 personnel responded to the scene, Hooper said. An investigation is ongoing.

Active shooter seminar keeps residents prepared

One can never be too prepared in a state of emergency — the senses are heightened, blood pressure rises and tension mounts. Stress levels escalate even higher when it's a life-threatening situation.

These are weary times with reports regularly written about violent vigilante standoffs in shopping malls, movie theaters and schoolyards while talking heads on TV preach the pros and cons of gun control.

So what can Mom and Pop Pampa do in times like these? How can the average citizen protect themselves and their families if an active shooter were to open fire at a local school, church or government office?

There are three basic steps to ensure safety in such a situation: Avoid, Deny, Defend. "There's not a certain way that this

would go," said Pampa PD public information officer Stormy McCullar. "It just depends on the situation."

Avoid an active shooter by running

and getting out of the situation. "Get your family to a safe place and call 911," McCullar said.

Deny access to the shooter. McCullar said individuals close to the line of crossfire can hide and deny access by choosing a favorable hiding spot.

Defend against the shooter. Sometimes, there's no other way except to defend yourself.

"If you're in a room, start piling heavy objects at the door," McCullar said, adding that citizens should use what's at their disposal, like a cup of hot coffee or coffee pot.

"You can defend yourself. It's OK," McCullar said.

The seminar also featured information on the difference between concealment and cover. McCullar said concealment isn't going to protect someone. To truly be protected, a person must be covered, behind something solid that is not explosive.

Bill calls for emergency alarms at Texas schools

As the 83rd legislative session approaches, Texas lawmakers are considering making firearms more available to teachers and other school personnel.

While some state lawmakers have filed school safety bills aimed at

increasing gun access or regulation on school property, one legislator is taking a different approach to protecting Texas' schoolchildren.

State Rep. Eddie Rodriguez, D-Austin, on Friday filed House Bill 1353, which would require school districts to equip their schools with electronic emergency alarms that notify police in the event of a school emergency, like a school shooting similar to what occurred in December at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Conn.

"If [emergency buttons] are good

enough for convenience stores and banks, they are good enough for Texas schools," Rodriguez said.

He added that installing an emergency system that notifies police could drastically cut response time to emergency situations at schools.

According to a CNN timeline of events at Sandy Hook, initial calls for help were made at approximately 9:30 a.m., and police and first responders arrived to the school about 20 minutes later.

Texans challenged to save 40 gallons of water daily

COLLEGE STATION — The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service is strengthening its challenge to Texans to save millions of gallons of water annually as well as money on their monthly water bills. The 40 Gallon Challenge is a program that calls on residents and businesses to reduce their average water use by 40 gallons per day, according to Dr. Diane Boellstorff, AgriLife Extension water resources specialist in College Station. Boellstorff became involved in the voluntary national program in 2011, serving as the Texas representative. After one year, she and AgriLife Extension economist Dean McCorkle in College Station completed an economic impact study in November, which showed that Texas participants, based on average municipal rates, were saving an estimated \$299,000 a year, in addition to the water savings. "At the time that we did the impact statement, we were able to count 80 programs from 89 counties, and participation continues to increase," she said. "For example, the impact statement mentions 1,050 participating households saving 71 million gallons of water annually, but today's numbers are 1,152 participating households saving 80 million gallons annually." That change has come in only three months. Boellstorff said many AgriLife Extension agents are beginning to deliver the program in their local counties. She is also making presentations to spread the program across the state. This water resource conservation tool is one of many programs initiated

and supported through the Southern Region Water Resource Project, funded through the U.S. Department of Agriculture — National Institute for Food and Agriculture. Dr. Mark McFarland, AgriLife Extension state soil fertility specialist in College Station, is the project director. The 40-Gallon Challenge allows Texans to compete against other Americans who are taking the challenge in their states. At the program's website, www.40gallonchallenge.org, Texans can pledge to adopt water-saving practices and see how many gallons of water they can expect to save. The website also shows the most popular practices being pledged, the practices that are saving the most water daily, and counties and states that are pledging the most daily savings, Boellstorff said. Currently, the top water savers in Texas are "reduce irrigation station runtimes by two minutes," "use a broom instead of a hose to clean driveways and sidewalks," and "fix a leaky toilet." In Texas, the three counties registered to save the most gallons are Collin, Ellis and Dallas. Boellstorff credited the higher rate of participation in these areas to work done by Susan Ballabina, AgriLife Extension regional program director for family and consumer sciences, and Clint Wolfe, urban water program manager at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center at Dallas. To start saving water and take the challenge, go to the website and complete the checklist of water-saving practices, Boellstorff said. The checklist includes both indoor and outdoor water-saving tips.

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas police say a fight that started in a crowded bar has led to the fatal shooting of a man outside as he left with his girlfriend. Police are trying to identify at least two suspect sought following the gunfire early Tuesday. The victim died later at a Dallas hospital. His name wasn't immediately released. Investigators say the woman who was with the man wasn't hurt. Police are trying to determine what led to the argument. Further details weren't immediately available.

Texas lawmakers take up \$2B water measure

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas lawmakers are expected to begin public hearings on a proposed \$2 billion fund to finance water projects across the state. The State Water Development Board says Texans need to spend \$53 billion over the next 50 years to make sure the state has enough water for a growing population. Committee Chairman Alan Ritter has proposed a \$2 billion revolving fund that he says can finance those needs. Texas has one of the fastest growing populations in the country, and a recent drought has demonstrated the state's vulnerability.

Keller Police Chief Mark Hafner said so-called panic buttons may alert police more quickly, but he warned of a potential downside: technical failures because of inactivity.

“Those buttons sit there a long time,” Hafner said.

The legislation calls for three or more emergency buttons to be located at each school. One of the buttons must be in the principal’s office, one in another location and one as a mobile version worn by a designated school employee.

Catherine Clark, associate executive director of the Texas Association of School Boards, expressed concerns about how schools would fund the emergency systems. She said local school boards can already decide to

install emergency buttons if they choose, and that an “unfunded mandate” would not be the answer.

“I can’t imagine why we would need legislation for something we can already do,” she said.

Rodriguez said that although there is not yet a funding mechanism for the bill, he does not foresee the expense being “extreme,” and he said he would work over the next weeks to find adequate funding options.

Another school-safety bill, filed by state Rep. Jason Villalba, R-Dallas, would create something similar to the federal air marshal program, which places armed officials on flights to protect against attacks.

While school districts can already decide if they want to allow teachers to carry concealed handguns, Villalba’s legislation would allow a school to designate one faculty member as a “school mar-

shal.” The chosen faculty member would undergo a training and certification process to learn how to defend the school as a last line of defense during an attack.

Villalba who said his legislation was about more than just letting teachers have guns, added that he thought the bill “crafted a middle ground.”

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst came out in support of state funding for a program that would train select school employees to carry concealed handguns and respond to active-shooter situations.

“[The emergency system bill] is a much more sensible conversation than the nonsense talk about arming teachers,” said Harley Eckhart, deputy executive director of the Texas Elementary Principals and

Supervisors Association.

Eckhart said that although the funding aspect of the bill is a large concern, he sees it as a better alternative for school safety than other proposals by lawmakers to bolster school safety with firearms.

Rodriguez said allowing guns on school property would “open up a lot more problems.”

“Schools should be a place for learning,” he said. “Having guns on campus distracts from that.”

records of the credit union to conceal the manipulation and reconciliation of accounts.

Christy L. Drake, the assistant U.S. Attorney prosecuting Trevathan’s case, said details of the indictment will not be discussed at Thursday’s court proceeding.

“She will be advised of the charge, a bond will be set and we will inquire whether she has an attorney,” she said.

Drake said the next step will be to set an arraignment, where Trevathan will be advised of the formal charges and be able to enter a plea.

When someone is indicted of a crime, Drake said, he or she is still presumed innocent, and that most defendants will enter a not guilty plea at their arraignment.

Kathy Colvin, a spokeswoman for the U.S. Justice Department in Dallas, said her records indicate Trevathan does not yet have an attorney.

Asked if she could discuss any of the details in the case, Colvin said information on the investigation that led to Trevathan’s indictment is not public record.

The case was investigated by the FBI, said Katie Chaumond, a public affairs specialist with the FBI in Dallas.

Chaumond said no other law enforcement

agencies were involved in the investigation.

In May 2011, Trevathan was subpoenaed by the Pampa Federal Credit Union to give a deposition, according to records at the Gray County District Court Clerk’s Office.

Trevathan gave deposition in a civil case under the court’s order in July 2011.

The civil case was closed and the deposition was never filed as part of the civil case, according to court records.

tor for the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI), said Tuesday Jacob’s death was caused by a shooting.

There were several people in the apartment at the time of his death, but she didn’t know how many.

Authorities are calling Jacob’s death suspicious, which means it could have been accidental, a suicide or a homicide, Brown said.

She said the OSBI is awaiting an autopsy report from a state medical examiner, along with the results of forensic testing by her agency.

“It will take a few weeks to do the forensics,” Brown said.

Activated Attention Disorder. After he left, I decided to go through my mail before I washed the car. I laid my keys on the table, put the junk mail in the garbage can and threw it out. Then, I decided to pay the bills, but after a 15-minute search, I learned that I had thrown both my keys and bills in the garbage. Thank goodness the trash truck was late.

To top it off, after I opened my checkbook, I only had one blank left, but three bills to pay. At that point I got it. My son had properly understood my issues. When I told my friends my story, they confessed that they, too, were experiencing short-term memory losses. Are their ways to help solve these challenges?

A: Psychologists agree that as we age, we will have more difficulties than we wish because we try to continue our multi-tasking. When we were younger, we enjoyed listening to the radio, watching TV and other distractions while we were able to accomplish other things. As we age, that does not work too well. What works best is to be more efficient and move forward by staying focused and solving our priorities one at a time. Determine what you want to do most, accomplish it, and

choose your next priority. **Q:** We planned a nonstop flying trip from Seattle to Paris this summer. Not having crossed so many time zones, we fear we will experience some circadian uneasiness and jetlag. Are there techniques to minimize these occurrences? **A:** Jetlag affects every traveler differently. To make trips more comfortable, travelers have their own “magical tips” to survive. Some individuals try to adjust to the time at their destination a week before take-off. Travelers also often choose to carry their own food, not drink alcohol during the flight, avoid dehydration by drinking only water, soda or bubbling water, scheduling night flights or using other recommended techniques.

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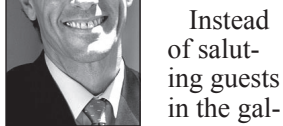
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Giving a false doctrine

One year, perhaps soon, a president of the United States will enter the House chamber to address a joint session of Congress and crack the old mold of the State of the Union address.

Instead of saluting guests in the gallery and reading a legislative wish list, the president will take a full hour to offer an in-depth analysis of one subject. He could start by saying: “The state of our union is in decline.”

The president then could tell us that the link between economic growth and job and wage growth is broken. He could say:

“As we were coming out of the recession, a Wall Street Journal headline said, ‘No Rush to Hire Even as Profits Soar.’

“The head of the temp agency Manpower told analysts that his biggest clients want 15 to 25 percent of their staff to be temp workers, and some want even more.

“A financial newspaper article started with this lead in 2011: ‘The income of the typical American family — long the envy of much of the world — has dropped for the third year in a row and is now roughly where it was in 1996 when adjusted for inflation.’

“Meanwhile, corporations are enjoying record profits and have many hundreds of billions of dollars in cash.

“Why are businesses doing better and workers doing worse?”

“In the 28 years after World War II, worker productivity rose 96 percent, and average hourly compensation rose 94 percent. In the 38 years after that, worker productivity rose 80 percent, and hourly compensation rose 10 percent.

“Corporations are taking a share of the gains that used to go to workers.

“So income inequality has grown. The U.S. now ranks fourth among

34 advanced countries in income inequality. That news is made worse by this news: The chances are dropping for a poor kid born in the U.S. to do better than his parents. Among advanced nations, the United States is now a low-mobility country.

“We are not who we were.

“What’s happening?”

“For years, economic policymaking in America has been dominated by one powerful belief: If rich people and corporations have more money, they will invest more money, and that investment will create more jobs and higher wages. This belief has been the justification for decades of tax cuts.

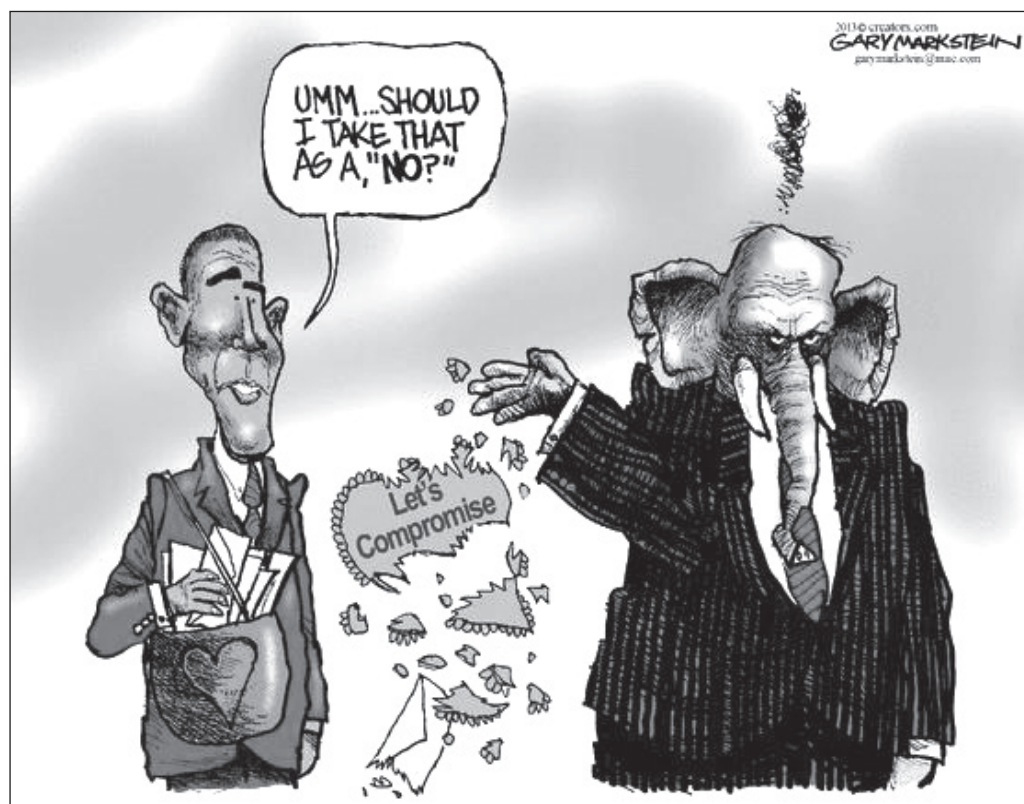
“But as it turned out, this did not induce corporations to create jobs or increase wages. Instead, companies began to cut jobs, hire temps, freeze wages, close plants, bust unions, shift costs onto workers and move operations offshore.

“After decades of cutting taxes and seeing corporations cut wages and workers, it’s becoming clear that we’ve been in the grip of a false doctrine.

“Businesses do not create jobs because their taxes are lower. They create jobs when there is consumer demand they can’t meet without more workers. If we want to create jobs, we should create demand. And if we want to create demand, we should try to get more money in the hands of people who will spend it. That means the middle class and working class.

“That is the Henry Ford model. Pay your workers high wages and they’ll have the income to buy expensive products and fuel a strong economy. Instead, we’re in a Wal-Mart model. You pay your workers the least you can so the most they can buy is low-price merchandise made in low-wage factories in foreign countries.

Dorner: another angry fatherless black man with a gun

My new book, “Dear Father, Dear Son,” talks about the No. 1 social problem in America — children growing up without fathers.

In 1965, Daniel Patrick Moynihan wrote “The Negro Family: A Case for National Action.” At the time,

25 percent of blacks were born outside of wedlock, a number that the future Democratic senator from New York said was catastrophic to the black community.

Moynihan wrote: “A community that allows a large number of young men to grow up in broken homes, dominated by women, never acquiring any stable relationship to male authority, never acquiring any rational expectations about the future — that community asks for and gets chaos. Crime, violence, unrest, unrestrained lashing out at the whole social structure — that is not only to be expected, it is very near to inevitable.”

Today, 75 percent of black children enter a world without a father in the home.

Divorce is one thing, where, for the most part, fathers remain involved both financially and as a parent. When I pressed the point of murdering ex-cop Christopher Dorner’s father, one local news source told me his

father apparently died when Dorner was small. He was reportedly raised, along with his sister, by a single mom. Little else is known.

In the documentary “Resurrection,” rapper Tupac Shakur, who was raised without a father, said: “I hate saying this cuz white people love hearing black people talking about this. I know for a fact that had I had a father, I’d have some discipline. I’d have more confidence.”

He said he started running with gangs because he wanted to belong, wanted structure and wanted protection — none of which he found in his fatherless home. “Your mother cannot calm you down the way a man can,” he said. “Your mother can’t reassure you the way a man can. My mother couldn’t show me where my manhood was. You need a man to teach you how to be a man.”

Why is it when white murderers go on a rampage, the media quickly delve into the relationship or lack thereof with the killer’s father? They want to know what went wrong with that relationship — and when and how and why.

After Adam Lanza massacred 26 people and his mother in Newtown, Conn., NBC News reported: “A source close to the family said that in 2001, (father Peter) separated from Adam’s mother, Nancy, but he still saw Adam every week. In 2009, the Lanzas officially divorced, when

Adam was 17. ... But the source close to the Lanza family said that by 2010, Peter Lanza was dating a new woman, whom he later married, and Adam suddenly cut his dad off.”

After Jared Lee Loughner murdered six and wounded 13 people in Tucson, Ariz., The Associated Press wrote that Loughner’s “relationship with his parents was strained.” Newsweek quoted a Loughner neighbor who described the father as “very aggressive, very angry all the time about petty things — like if the trash is out because the trash guys didn’t pick it up, he yells at us for it.”

After Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold killed 13 at Columbine High, one did not have to search long to read about their fathers. One such piece began: “The father of one of the boys was asked some years ago to jot down his life’s goals in the memory book for his 20th high school reunion. His answer was succinct, straightforward and, it seemed, not unrealistically ambitious: ‘Raise two good sons.’”

“The other father prided himself on being his son’s soul mate. They had just spent five days visiting the Arizona campus where the teenager planned to enroll in the fall, and recently discussed their shared opposition to a bill in the state legislature that would have made it easier to carry concealed weapons.”

Five days after James Holmes killed 12 in the movie theater in Aurora, Colo., we learned from the Daily Mail all “about

the glittering career of James Holmes’ father, Robert, who has degrees from Stanford, UCLA and Berkeley and currently works as a senior scientist at FICO in San Diego.”

The article’s headline was, “Did Colorado maniac snap after failing to meet expectations of brilliant academic father?”

But what about Christopher Dorner? The media seemingly imposed a no-fly zone of silence over even writing or talking about his father.

The Los Angeles Times, for example, wrote: “Dorner grew up in Southern California with his mother and at least one sister, according to public records and claims in (his) manifesto.” Not one word about the father. We soon learn the mother’s name and whereabouts. But the media are apparently incurious about Dorner’s father. Why? Is it that the media expect a certain level of appropriate behavior from whites — that when a white person commits a heinous act, we must necessarily explore what kind of relationship he had with his father?

But when it comes to black miscreants and their fathers ... crickets. Why? To ask raises uncomfortable questions about the perverse incentives of the welfare state, which hurt the very formation of stable, intact families — the ones more likely to produce stable, non-paranoid children.

What Jesus didn't tolerate

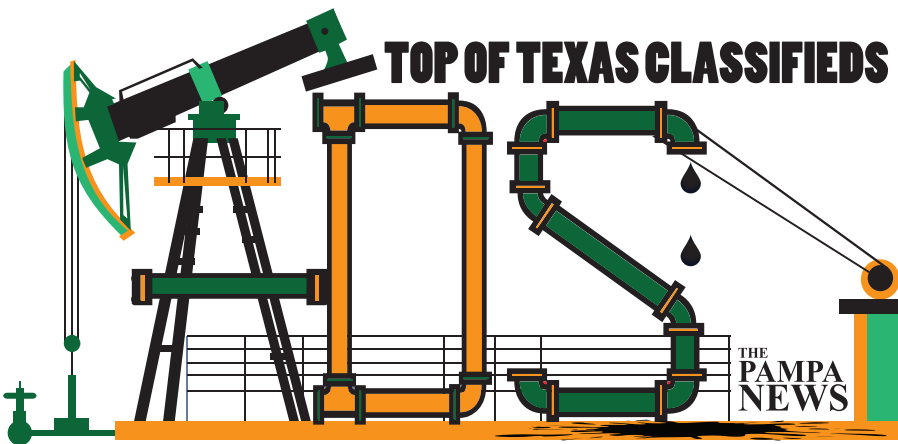

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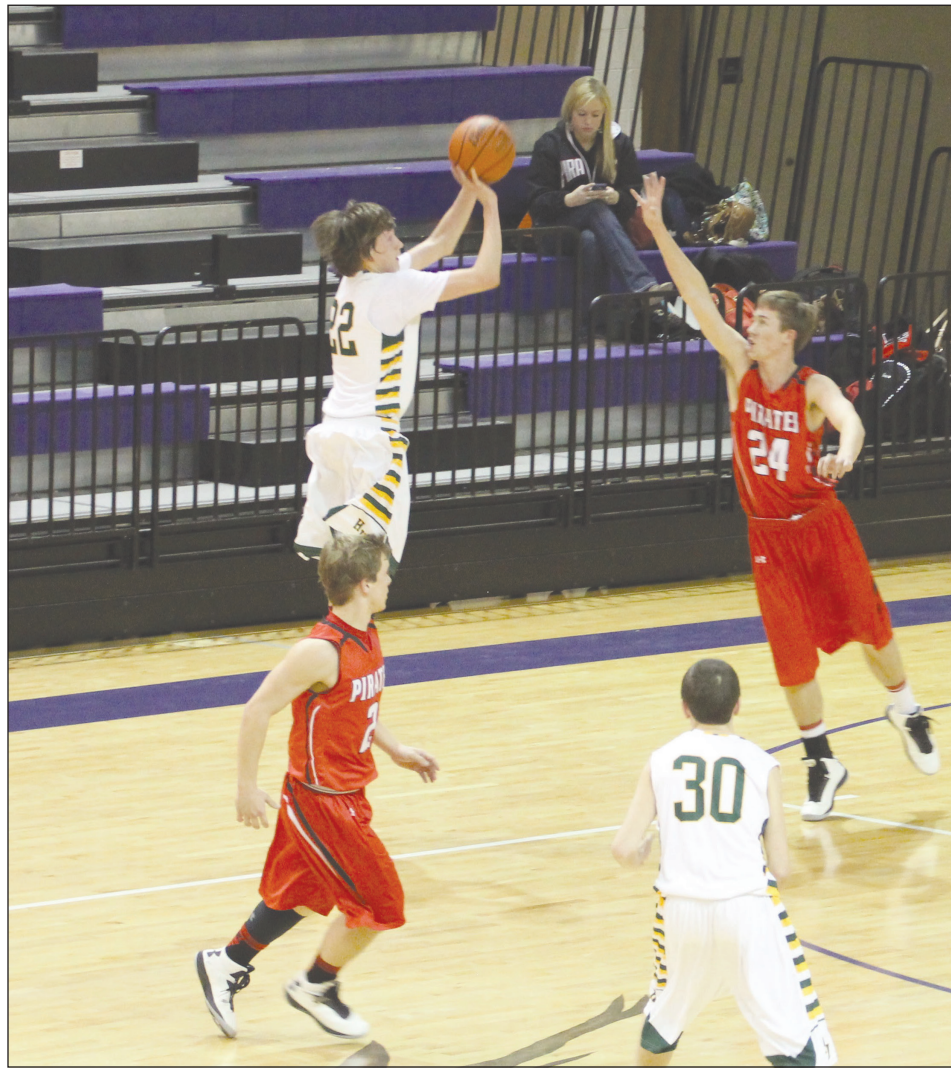

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The Hustlin' Harvesters traveled to Canyon on Monday night for their bi-district playoff round game against the Lubbock Cooper Pirates.

The game was played in the Canyon High School gym.

Derrek Pollard put Pampa on the board with a 15-foot jumper with 6:10 to play in the opening period. Ty Hutto followed with a three-pointer.

Both were answered by the Pirates to make the score 5-5 early on.

Cade Engle added a three of his own with 3:56 to play in the first.

On Cooper's ensuing possession Pampa got a steal followed by an Engle layup to give Pampa their biggest lead at that point, 12-9.

The Pirates would, however, go on a 7-0 run to end the first quarter with the lead at 16-12.

In the second quarter the basket looked as big as the ocean for Pampa.

Jon Cox started things off with 7:20 to go by hitting his first three-pointer of the game.

Hutto nailed his second three of the game shortly following Cox's three. That tied the game at 18 all.

Cooper would take a timeout with 6:33 to go in the period.

After that break in the action, the Harvesters

would take the lead and never look back. Hutto hit his third trey with 4:50 to go, giving Pampa its largest lead at 25-18.

Cox added another three to give Pampa a 28-20 lead and make the second quarter run for Pampa 16-4. Pollard added a bucket with 2:50 to go and Hutto hit his fourth three of the first half and ballgame with 1:30 left in the half.

Pollard had one of his nine blocks with 1:18 and Cox added a basket with 35 seconds left.

Pampa would be up 16 at the half 38-22.

The Harvesters outscored the Pirates 26-6 in the second quarter. The 16 point margin was also the largest lead of the game for Pampa at that point. Pollard joined in on the three-point parade with a trey at the 5:12 mark of the third quarter to give Pampa a 45-24 lead.

Pollard had yet another block at 4:15, that was followed by a Cox three with 3:31 left.

That three-pointer gave Pampa its largest lead of the game of 24 points at 48-24.

Patterson Alvey added a block with 34.7 seconds left and Pollard had another block with 30 seconds left.

Jake Green had a put-back layup at the buzzer for the Harvesters.

Pampa outscored Cooper 16-10 in the third to take a 54-32 lead into the final period.
