Accuracy in the court

Karen Morris describes her job as like throwing an opened can of Campbell's alphabet soup into the air and then putting it back together after all those noodles hit the floor.

"I hear in English, think of it in court reporting and then the computer puts it back in English," said Morris, who in March was hired as the official court reporter for the 223rd District Court by District Judge Phil Vanderpool.

She replaced Richard Mackie, who retired after serving the court for 21 years. Mackie was preceded by the late Bob Baker, who moved from Mississippi



to Pampa in 1950 to work as the official court reporter for the 31st and 223rd District courts until he retired in 1992.

Morris said Baker was known for taking notes by hand using Pitman shorthand, which is more refined than the Gregg shorthand used for note taking in the business world.

Morris has nothing against nostalgia, and keeps

City Commission to consider \$50K EDC grant

The Pampa City Commission will meet at 4 p.m., Tuesday to consider approving a \$50,000 grant from the Pampa Economic Development Corp (EDC) for support of the Gray Pampa Community Fund.

The Commission will also consider an ordinance that would amend revenues and appropriations for the City of Pampa for FY 2012-13. The amendment provides an additional \$150,000 for the planned seal coat project, water well construction, installation of a fire wall in City Hall, purchase of playground equipment and demolition project expenses. The ordinance also records a grant received by the City from the Pampa EDC.

Also on Tuesday's agenda are proposed appointments of Carl Novian, Kevin Redding and Josh Crawford to the Construction Board of Adjustments and Appeals. The selections of Novian and Redding would fill two unexpired

Permanent school fund on county agenda

The Gray County Commissioners Court will hold its regular business meeting at 9 a.m., Wednesday in the Gray County Courthouse.

The Commission will consider establishing a policy for distribution of the county's permanent school fund. The commissioners at their last meeting began discussing an equitable means of allocating funding to each of the four school districts in Gray County: Pampa, Lefors, McLean and Grandview-Hopkins. The school districts may utilize the funding to pay for capital and permanent improvements to their facilities.

The commissioners will also discuss installing Internet and cable access in the new terminal at Perry Lefors Field Airport and they will consider bids for refurbishing the hangar sign at the airport.

Other notable agenda items include replacing the heating, ventilation and air condition system

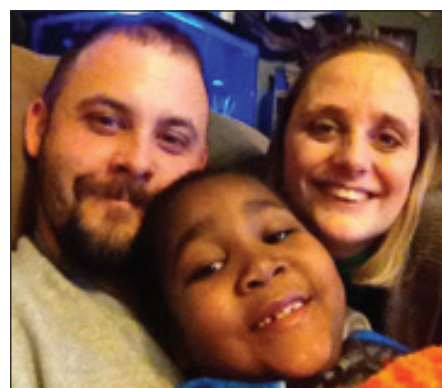
Foster kids deserve a loving mom, family

Obama looks to middle-class jobs tour

WASHINGTON (AP) — Aiming to show he's still focused on creating jobs, President Barack Obama is beginning a series of quick trips around the country to resurrect ideas from his State of the Union address that became overshadowed by the intense debates over gun control, immigration and automatic spending cuts.

Obama on Thursday was dropping in on Austin, Texas, and using that bustling state capital as a backdrop to talk about attracting jobs, providing skills training and ensuring that hard work begets a decent living.

The president argued in February's State of the Union address that an economy that is growing and creating well-paying middle-class jobs must be the guiding principle for Washington policymakers. He proposed a broad expansion of pre-kindergarten to accommodate every 4-year-old, calling it a smart investment that will help improve educational outcomes, along with raising the federal minimum wage to \$9 to help working families.

Both ideas faced almost immediate resistance from some lawmakers who said the proposals cost too much and could stunt the economy, and Obama has barely discussed either proposal since then.

At the time of the speech, the debate over gun-control legislation was heating up following the December massacre of 20 first-graders and six educators at a Connecticut elementary school.

A bipartisan group of senators was drafting a sweeping immigration bill desired by both political parties, and Congress and the White House were blaming each other for \$85 billion in automatic spending cuts that would kick in March 1. The series of field trips Obama begins Thursday marks an attempt by the president to remind the public that he hasn't forgotten about the issue that concerns them the most: the econ-

omy and jobs.

The outing also comes amid questions about whether the second-term president has enough sway to get his agenda through a divided Congress before attention turns to the November 2014 midterm elections.

Since his second inauguration, Obama has lost a bid to expand background checks for gun buyers and was similarly unsuccessful at getting lawmakers to undo the spending cuts. On Thursday, the Senate Judiciary Committee is scheduled to begin considering and voting on scores of proposed changes to the immigration bill, which is facing opposition from conservatives, religious leaders and others.

His jobs proposals have stalled in Congress, with Republicans showing no interest in job-creation plans based on new federal spending. They also argue that Obama's regulatory regime and new health care law — the president's signature domestic policy achievement to date — are hindering more robust job growth.

"The president doesn't seem to understand that it's his policies that are undermining economic growth and job creation," House Speaker John Boehner said Thursday as the president departed.

Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell ridiculed Obama's trip as mere image-building.

"If you're someone who's all about the visual, then of course putting on a pair of goggles or showing up at a factory is a great way to at least look like you're doing something about job creation," he said.

By traveling to Texas to begin this renewed attention to his jobs initiatives, Obama is choosing a state represented by two of the most conservative Republican members of the U.S. Senate — John Cornyn and tea party hero Ted Cruz. Texas also has the second-highest

Statewide gas price increases slightly, still less than last year

HOUSTON — The statewide average for a gallon of regular unleaded in Texas is now \$3.38, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is 4 cents more than last week but 25 cents less than last year.

Today's statewide average is also 17 cents less than the national average which is now \$3.55.

Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the state, drivers in Dallas and Ft. Worth are paying the most on average at \$3.41, and drivers in Beaumont are paying the least at \$3.28 a gallon.

Since national gas prices peaked at the end of February, motorists nationwide have felt welcome relief at the pump in the form of falling prices.

In recent weeks, the exception to this downward trend was limited to six states in the Great Lakes region where the transition to summer-blend gasoline and heavy rains triggered supply concerns and provided a catalyst for higher retail prices.


Recent signs of economic recovery have supported higher oil prices recently and led to slight increases in many parts of the country including Texas.


"Although we've seen the prices go up over the last week, we're still doing much better than we

were on this same day last year," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Sarah Schimmer. "In fact, consumers are paying about \$47 to fill up the typical 14-gallon size fuel tank today and they were paying about \$51 for the same amount of fuel one year ago."

As we approach Memorial Day weekend, AAA Texas will continue to monitor gas prices week by week so drivers can make informed decisions about their travel plans. AAA Texas also encourages motorists to maintain their cars and trucks according to manufacturer's recommendations to increase their vehicle's fuel efficiency.

in her office on the third floor of the Gray County Courthouse a 100-year-old Stenotype machine that she bought on eBay and has collected machines from all over the world.

But to do her court reporting, Morris relies on a state-of-the-art Stenograph machine that resembles an Etch-A-Sketch with a odd-looking keyboard attached to it.

The unit, which belongs to Morris, cost her around \$6,000 and the specialized software set her back for another \$4,000. Rather than typing onto a paper roll like the old machines, the new devices store everything the stenographer types onto a flash card.

"I'm a geek. I like technology," she said.

Earlier this week, Morris said she filed electronically 8,000 pages of proceedings for a federal bankruptcy case. In this day and age, it's difficult to fathom how much time that would have taken if all of those pages had to be typed on a typewriter.

If you watch court-room dramas on TV or at the

movies, you will usually see a court reporter sitting near the witness stand quietly typing while the prosecutor and defense attorney take turns grilling a witness.

"What we do is a mystery (to the general public)," she said. "We are silent."

Silent, that is, until people in the court room start speaking out of turn or don't speak loud enough for the court reporter to hear them.

When that happens, Mor-

ris said, it is her official duty to interrupt and ask a speaker to repeat what he or she said or ask people to only speak one at a time.

In most court rooms, however, the judge will do that before the court reporter needs to speak up.

Court reporters must be certified by a state board, and to say you must type quickly with accuracy to pass the battery of tests is an understatement.

For questions and testimony, the minimum is 225

words per minute. For jury charges, 200 words per minute. For transcription, which is something you might do if you were typing the Congressional Record, the minimum is 180 words.

"Each test is five minutes and you must have 95 percent accuracy," Morris said. "Along with that there is a general knowledge test with English, law and medical terms that you must pass with 75 percent accuracy."

Keep in mind these are only minimum standards. Morris said her top speed when a speaker gets excited is 330 words per minute.

"We are required to be 100 percent precise," she said. "We are there to protect the record and are certified by the Texas Supreme Court."

Court reporters who perform substandard work or don't meet filing deadlines can be fined financially, have their licenses revoked or even sent to jail. And while in jail, they are required to finish their work.

"It's the only job I know of where you can get sent to jail and still have to work," she quipped.

Morris is the past president of the Texas Court Reporters Association and a liaison from the associa-

tion to the Court Reporters Certification Board, which hears complaints against court reporters. She has testified before the State Legislature on behalf of court reporters in Texas.

Morris joked that court reporting is the "second oldest profession."

The profession was born with the rise of Western Civilization in Greece, where they were called scribes.

Scribes proliferated through Judea, Persia and the Roman Empire, and they preserved the Ten Commandments for posterity.

They recorded Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, and today keep the Congressional Record and create the instantaneous closed-captions on television that are so important for the hearing impaired.

The most famous court reporter, Morris said, was British novelist Charles Dickens.

Morris lives in Amarillo and is a five-year survivor of breast cancer. She worked for 30 years as a court reporter for the 108th District Court. When she was diagnosed with cancer and had to take chemotherapy for several months,

she retired from that job in 2008. After treatment, she worked freelance for five years. Although she now has a daily commute and earns less as a county employee than when self-employed, Morris said she couldn't be happier.

"Judge Vanderpool is a great boss to work for and his staff is wonderful," she said. "It is like one big family working at the court house." Vanderpool said he made a good choice when he hired Morris.

"She does an excellent job, is well experienced and is current on the latest technology," he said.

A beverage people either love or hate

I admit that I happen to be one of those who love my coffee. As I make all the usual preparations for our breakfast, it is the preparation of our coffee that gets the most attention, and the thing that I look forward to the most.

My earliest memory of drinking coffee goes back to my early childhood when Mom would make me "coffee-milk" — mostly milk with enough coffee to give it flavor.

Later, like most college students, I drank my share of coffee to stay awake studying.

There were coffeehouses in southern California where I lived during the '50s and '60s, but they were largely patronized by "beatniks" smoking pot and reciting poetry. In my early working career, a co-worker prepared the coffemaker every morning.

I strongly suspect she brewed the coffee, threw it out, poured in water, and that became our "coffee." I never really tasted good coffee until I was in my 30s and my husband and I traveled to Denmark for the first time. That coffee was so bold that it walked over and jumped in our cups! It made the Folger's and Maxwell House stuff I brewed at home taste like dishwater, and it was a few

years before we found coffee beans at home that we could grind for a really good cup of coffee. When our daughter was a teen, we made a trip to California, where we had our first cappuccino in a coffee shop in Beverly Hills.

The cup was roughly the size of a bird bath, and the barista, the person who brews and serves the beverages, had swirled a heart in the foam atop the cappuccino. I was captured at the first sip. Since that time, we have judged our area of residence by the availability of really good coffee. It seems that the small, cozy coffee shops serve not only great brew, but also great atmosphere. The first such shop we patronized was in Antioch, Illinois and we would stop there on Sundays after church.

That was where we were introduced to a very comforting drink called chai (which is actually the Indian word for tea) which we were served while browsing at the books the coffee shop had stacked on tables and shelves. We moved to a small town in Indiana — Connersville, which is about an hour east of Indianapolis — where we met Brian Kays. Brian opened a coffee shop/bookstore downtown in an old store which is decorated with a lot of warm mellow wood and cozy booths, and served some of the best coffees. We became quite fond of Chicago Blues coffee there, plus the ready availability of good books.

Brian himself is quite a personality, although he is unable to speak or walk due to Cerebral Palsy.

After 15 years and a loss of most of the city's businesses, Brian's is flourishing. Our short time living in Georgia, north of Atlanta, introduced us to a shop called The Serene Bean, another shop with ambiance and warmth.

That brings us here to Pampa, and we were very happy to discover The Coffee Shop on Cuyler, another warm, friendly shop with the finest coffees and friendly staff. We can see the progress that is starting to re-energize downtown Pampa, and hope that this shop will last. In our opinion, Starbucks can't hold a candle to these small, friendly coffeehouses. In the past year I have become acquainted with a series of "cozy mysteries", one of which is known as the "Coffeehouse Mysteries" written by Cleo Coyle.

Besides being entertaining, Ms. Coyle writes of the history, production, and preparation of coffee and coffee drinks. Coffee has become more than just an eye-opener in the mornings; it has become something worth savoring and enjoying, especially with a favorite person or group of people. And now, if you'll excuse me, I'm going to go enjoy some coffee and a good book!

Mother love

My daughter was born on Mother's Day, 23 years ago. It was the happiest day of my life — matched only, almost three years later, by the birth of my son.

I had never felt such love before.

Hooray for Hallmark. Years passed. My own mother died. My

daughter went off to college and then graduated. My son went off to college.

I see young mothers struggling with squirmly children,

exhausted mothers losing their tempers in the mall, mothers and daughters walking and shopping, women my age caring for their own mothers, and I know how hard some of those moments are. But still, I am hopelessly jealous.

I want to say to those tired women, "Don't you know how lucky you are?" — as if my saying it would somehow light a bulb in their brains, calm their nerves, make them realize that the days may be long but the years are so very short. They fly by, and suddenly you are alone at the mall, on the walk, and instead of a squirming child in your arms, you have time on your hands, instead of too many calls from your mother, there are no calls at all.

So this column is not for all the mothers who will be surrounded by family on Mother's Day; it's not for the sons and daughters who will be toasting their mothers on what is the biggest day of the year for eating out.

This one is for those of us who have lost our mothers, for those of us whose children won't be with us that day, for those who never knew the joy I did or who loved and lost.

This one is for those of us who are trying to make our peace with the hardest part of being a mother (or a child), which is not sleepless nights, expense, exhaustion or aggravation. It's letting go.

It is true. From the time our children are born, we begin the process of letting them go into the world, and they begin

the process of leaving us. That is a mother's most important job: not to hold on, but to let go. All of those stories about the mother bird sitting on her eggs and then the baby birds flying away... How could I have missed that? My mother hated birds. Maybe that's why.

There is a scene in "White Oleander," a wonderful novel about the foster care system, that describes teenage girls, abandoned by their mothers, giving birth, screaming in pain, crying out for their mothers.

To grow up without a mother's love leaves a hole you never stop trying to fill. But no matter how we try, no matter how much we love, in ways big and small, we disappoint our children, we do things wrong, we fail them.

"Just you wait," I want to say to those young women. "If only I could do everything again," I say to myself.

I remember a moment, years ago, driving with my two young children in the back seat. I was one of those girls who always had an easier time with my professional life than my personal life. I knew I was smart, but no one ever told me I was pretty. I knew I could support myself, but I feared I would always be alone. And there I was with two children — my children, my blessed, beautiful children! And I wanted to freeze the moment, to be there always, right there.

But of course, that is not how life works. Children need to grow. They need to have their chance at life, with all of its ups and downs. And as they age, so do we.

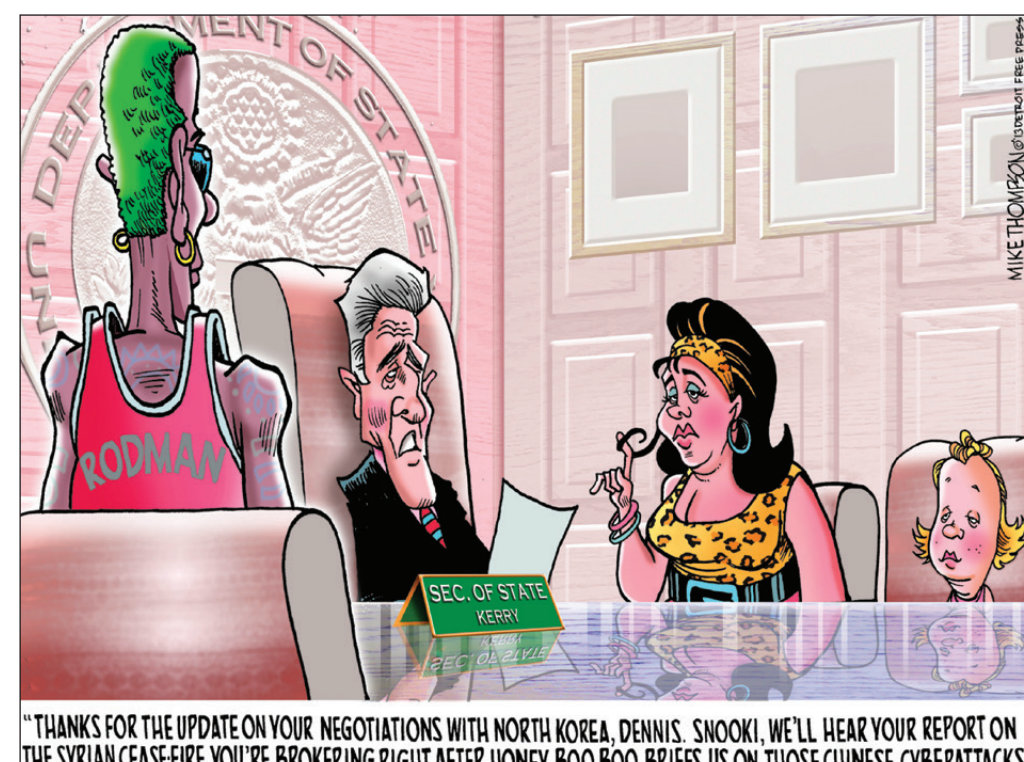

50 years on, finding profit in 'truth' on JFK case

On the very day John F. Kennedy died, a cottage industry was born. Fifty years and hundreds of millions of dollars later, it's still thriving.

Its product? The "truth" about the president's assassination.

"By the evening of November 22, 1963, I found myself being drawn into the case," Los Angeles

businessman Ray Marcus wrote in "Addendum B," one of several self-published monographs he produced on the assassination. For him, authorities were just too quick and too pat with their conclusion.

"The government was saying there was only one assassin; that there was no conspiracy. It was obvious that even if this subsequently turned out to be true, it could not have been known to be true at that

time." Most skeptics, including Marcus, didn't get rich by publishing their doubts and theories — and some have even bankrupted themselves chasing theirs. But for a select few, there's been good money in keeping the controversy alive.

Best-selling books and blockbuster movies have raked in massive profits since 1963. And now, with the 50th anniversary of that horrible day in Dallas

looming, a new generation is set to cash in.

Of course, the Warren Commission officially concluded in 1964 that Lee Harvey Oswald had acted alone — and issued 26 volumes of documents to support that determination. But rather than closing the book on JFK's death, the report merely served as fuel for an already kindled fire of doubt and suspicion.

Since then, even government investigators have stepped away from the lone assassin theory. In 1978, the U.S. House Select Committee on Assassinations ended its own lengthy inquiry by finding that JFK "was probably assassinated as a result of a conspiracy."

That panel acknowledged it was "unable to identify the other gunman or the extent of the conspiracy." But armed with mountains of subsequently released documents, there has been no shortage of people willing to offer their own conclusions.

Among the leading suspects: Cuban exiles angry about the Bay of Pigs fiasco; Mafiosi enraged by Attorney General Robert Kennedy's attacks on organized crime; the "military-industrial complex," worried about JFK's review of war policy in Vietnam.

One theorist even floated the notion that Kennedy's limousine driver shot the president — as part of an effort to cover up proof of an alien invasion.

Anything but that Oswald, a hapless former Marine, was in the right place at the right time, with motive and opportunity to pull off one of the most audacious crimes in American history.

"As they say, nature abhors a vacuum, and the mind abhors chance," says

Michael Shermer, executive director of the Skeptics Society and author of "The Believing Brain," a book on how humans seem hard-wired to find patterns in disparate facts and unconnected, often innocent coincidences.

Polls underscore the point.

About 6 in 10 Americans say they believe multiple people were involved in a conspiracy to assassinate Kennedy, while only one-fourth think Oswald acted alone, according to an AP-GfK survey done in mid-April. Belief in a conspiracy, though strong, has declined since a 2003 Gallup poll found 75 percent said they thought Oswald was part of a wider plot.

The case has riveted the public from the start. When the Warren Commission report was released in book form, it debuted at No. 7 on The New York Times Best Sellers List.

Two years later, attorney Mark Lane's "Rush to Judgment" dominated the list. The Warren Commission, he argued, "frequently chose to rely on evidence that was no stronger and sometimes demonstrably weaker than contrary evidence which it rejected."

The book has since sold millions of copies in hardcover and paperback, says Lane.

Since then, dozens of books with titles like "Best Evidence," "Reasonable Doubt," "High Treason" and "Coup D'Etat in America: The CIA and the

Assassination of John F. Kennedy" have sought to lay responsibility for JFK's death at the highest levels of the U.S. government — and beyond.

British journalist Anthony Summers, whose BBC documentary became the 1980 book "Conspiracy," says many conspiracy buffs "are fine scholars and students, and some are mad as hatters who think it was done by men from Mars using catapults."

Unlike the later coverage of Watergate, there were no reporters like The Washington Post's Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein, who were told by their editors, "Get on this and don't get off it," says Summers, whose works focused on people and events largely ignored or treated cursorily by the official investigations. "Nobody went down there and really did the shoe leather work and the phone calls that we're all supposed

to do," he says.

For many, the Kennedy assassination has become "a board game: 'Who killed JFK?' So you feel free to sit around and say, 'Oh! It's the mob. Oh! It's the KGB' ... and have no shame," scoffs Gerald Posner, whose 1993 book "Case Closed" declared that the Warren Commission essentially got it right.

The Oswald-as-patsy community has vilified Posner.

But the lawyer says he didn't set out to write a defense of the Warren Commission. Instead, he planned to go back through the critical evidence to see what more could be determined through hindsight and more modern investigative techniques — "and then put out a book that says, 'Read THIS book. Here are the four unresolved issues of the Kennedy assassination, with the evidence on both sides.'"

The plant blew up on the night of April 17 after a fire erupted at the facility in the rural town of West.

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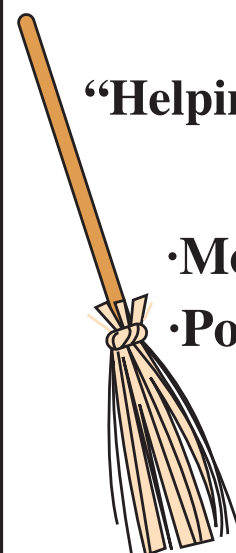
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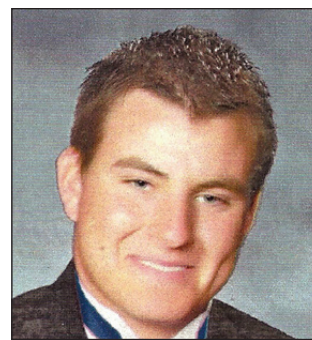

Golf Thought of the Week

■ Failing to plan is planning to fail, so write a playbook.

This is one of those sayings that applies in full to golf. You can't expect to get the best out of your round without planning. How often do you hit an 'excellent' drive, only to discover you really should have hit a No. 3 wood instead of the driver, and you're in a bunker? And how good does it feel when you plan to avoid a hazard or deal with some weather condition and it works? Do less of the former and more of the latter with a playbook.

I don't suggest something as detailed as the Tour Pros use. They have caddies to help generate amazingly full plans for all sorts of eventualities, pin placements and weather changes. Club golfers are better off with some important basics that will improve your scores and make the game more fun. Try these:

Ensure you know some distances before playing a new course. This information is usually available online these

days. It helps just to know where you'll need what club off the tee, for example.

For your regular courses, keep notes on things like the way various winds impact on your distance and how the greens receive the ball in different conditions. We tend to assume this is all in our memory banks, but that is often the first step in 'planning to fail'.

Note good and bad places to miss. This actually is planning to fail, but the good kind. If you know a particular green is a disaster zone to one side, but leaves plenty of options to the other, you can often save shots just by taking measures to be sure to miss the 'danger zone'.

Of course, you'll come up with your own factors to track and plan as you go along.

The point is, having a plan is better than making quick decisions on the tee or once you're already short-sided behind a pot bunker. Feel free to contact me about planning your round to save shots.

OJ to get Las Vegas court hearing on bid for new trial

LAS VEGAS (AP) — O.J. Simpson will return next week to the Las Vegas courthouse where he was convicted of leading an armed sports memorabilia heist to ask a judge for a new trial on the grounds that his lawyer botched his case.

Simpson will take the witness stand to testify that the Florida lawyer who collected nearly \$700,000 is to blame for his armed robbery and kidnapping conviction in 2008 and his failed appeal to the Nevada Supreme Court in 2010.

Simpson's testimony in open court will offer a first look at the aging 65-year-old former football star since he was handcuffed and sent to prison more than four years ago. Simpson didn't testify at his Las Vegas trial or in the historic case that led to his 1995 acquittal in the slayings of his ex-wife and her friend in Los Angeles.

Instead of an expensive suit and tie, Simpson will be dressed in blue Nevada Department of Corrections clothing — grayer, heavier and limping a little more from long-ago knee injuries, friends say. He is now Nevada inmate No. 1027820, a far cry from his playing days when Simpson wore jersey No. 32, won the Heisman Tro-

phy, earned the nickname "The Juice" in the NFL and gained induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Simpson is scheduled to be in Clark County District Court beginning Monday for the entire five-day hearing. He could testify Wednesday before a judge who has agreed to hear 19 separate points, mostly claiming that lawyer Yale Galanter provided such poor representation that Simpson deserves a new trial.

Simpson is serving a nine-to-33-year sentence that makes him first eligible for parole at age 70.

If he wins a new trial, prosecutors would have to decide whether to retry him for an incident that happened in September 2007 or offer a plea deal sparing the time and expense of another trial.

In a sworn statement outlining his upcoming testimony, Simpson said he told Galanter in advance that he planned to confront two collectibles dealers in Las Vegas and retrieve what he expected would be family photos, heirlooms and personal sports mementoes that he believed had been stolen from him after his "trial of the century" in Los Angeles.

1998 — Kerry Wood of the Chicago Cubs set the major league record for strikeouts in consecutive games (33) by fanning 13 Arizona Diamondbacks in a 4-2 victory. The record for strikeouts in two starts had been 32, set by Luis Tiant in 1968 and matched by Nolan Ryan (1974), Dwight Gooden (1984) and Randy Johnson (1997).

New spire permanently installed on WTC tower

NEW YORK (AP) — A tall, heavy spire was fully installed atop One World Trade Center on Friday, bringing the New York City structure to its symbolic height of 1,776 feet.

Loud applause and cries of joy erupted from construction workers assembled below as the huge, silver spire was gently lowered and secured into place.

"It's a pretty awesome feeling," Juan Estevez said from a temporary platform on the roof of the tower

where he and other workers watched the milestone.

"It's a culmination of a tremendous amount of team work ... rebuilding the New York City skyline once again," said Estevez, a project manager for Tishman Construction.

He said the workers around him were "utterly overjoyed."

Installation of the 408-foot, 758-ton spire was completed after pieces of it had been transported to the roof of the building

last week. It will serve as a world-class broadcast antenna and also as a beacon to ward off aircraft.

The building is at the northwest corner of the site where the twin World Trade Center towers were destroyed in the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks.

The 72-story 4 World Trade Center is under construction at the southeast corner of the site.

Lee Ielpi, whose firefighter son died after responding to the attacks,

watched workers secure the spire from his office at the nearby 9/11 Tribute Center, which he co-founded.

"The building looks spectacular. ... I'm looking forward to the day when the cranes come down and they light the spire at night," he said. "It's supposed to be a very moving experience."

The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, which owns the site, said the LED-powered light would be activated in the next few months.

Former chemical company head enters guilty plea

HOUSTON (AP) — The former president of a Port Arthur chemical company has pleaded guilty to occupational safety crimes that resulted in the death of an employee.

Matthew Lawrence Bowman, former president and owner of Port Arthur Chemical and Environmental Services, pleaded guilty

Thursday in federal court to violating the Occupational Safety Health Act and making a false statement.

The U.S. Department of Justice says Bowman admitted to not properly protecting employees from exposure to hydrogen sulfide, a poisonous gas. Truck driver Joey Sutter died in December 2008 after exposure.



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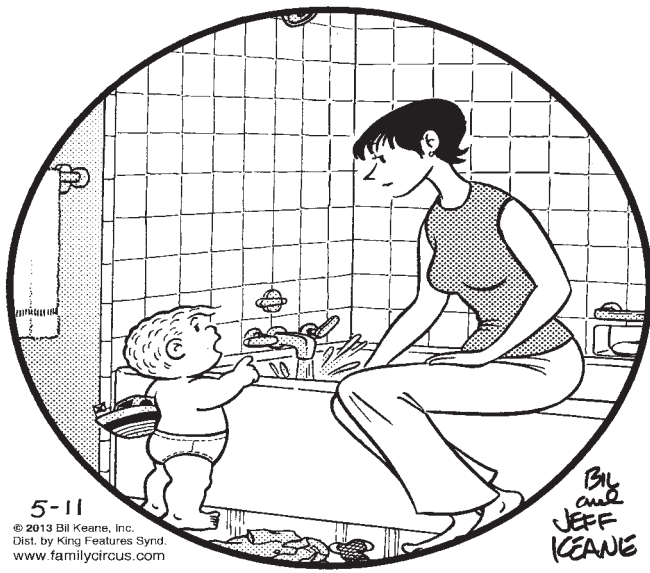
