## Amarillo Federal Credit Union holds groundbreaking Monday

Redesigned Pampa branch location set to be completed by Thanksgiving.

epresentatives with the Pampa branch of Amarillo Federal Credit Union (AFCU) joined members of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce's Gold Coats and the community on Monday for a ceremonial groundbreaking of its new branch location on Hobart Street.

Construction of the redesigned AFCU branch is scheduled to be completed by Thanksgiving.

"Mid-November is what we're hoping for," said branch manager Allison Watson.

Watson then shared some physi-

new facility.

"It will have a four-lane driveup with the first lane being ATM only," she said, adding that the new branch will be larger than the old one and will have improved technology. Watson said the tellers will have at their disposal automatic cash dispensers that will count the money for them.

"Another improvement will be a covered drive-up," Watson said. She added that credit union customers had complained in the past about how the old facility did not feature a covering for the driveup service.

The new AFCU branch, upon completion, will be located at the site of the former facility, at 900 N. Hobart St.

Gregg Bliss, architect from Amarillo, will lead the design of the new credit union branch.

AFCU maintains charter member facilities in Gray, Potter and Randall counties.

AFCU and Bennigan's both broke ground on their new establishments this week, serving as a sign of growth and economic development for Pampa.

## Two injured in Monday crash

Two women were transported to the hospital around 3 p.m., Monday for minor injuries after they were involved in a vehicle collision at Duncan Street and Kentucky Avenue.

Jana Gregory, 57, of Pampa, was driving her 2006 Mazda north on Duncan Street, according to a Pampa Police Department crash report. Jessie Roberts, 19, of Pampa, traveling east-

bound on Kentucky Avenue, failed to yield the right of way to Gregory in her 1995 Cutlass Ciera and drove across the intersection. Gregory then crashed into the passenger's side

of Roberts' car, according to the accident report. Gregory and her passenger, Allison Stark, 26, were transported by Pampa EMS to Pampa Regional Medical Center.

Roberts was cited for failure to yield right of way from a stop sign and violation of driver's license restriction B, which is failure to have a driver 21 or older in the front seat.

Gregory is the executive adminstrator of the Pampa United Way and Stark is adminstrative assistant for the Pampa Chamber of Commerce. Stark's supervisor, Chamber Director Lori

Byrne, said both women were released from the hospital Monday night and were doing OK Tuesday.



## How to save water indoors

Single-family residential indoor water use in the United States is an average of 69 gallons per

person per day! It doesn't take much to realize that figure can be substantially reduced, mostly with just a change of habits, though serious conservers will want to consider replacing some fixtures and ap-

Most residential water use is, not surprisingly, in the bathroom.

Toilets made before 1980 use 5 to 7 gallons per flush (gpf). In the 80s, 3.5 gpf was the standard, and since 1992 new toilets sold in Texas must use no more than 1.6 gpf. And while earlier "low-flow" models often took repeated flushes — thereby negating the advantage — newer models (some as low as .8 gpf) have addressed that issue and work well.

If you have an older model, put a plastic bottle or bag filled with water in the tank to displace water, thereby saving 0.5 to 1.5 gpf. (Do not use a brick as they can crumble and damage the fixture.) Make sure the tank does not leak (you can test it with a few drops of food coloring) and don't use the bowl for a trash can.

Do you prefer a bath to a shower? A fiveminute shower uses only 10-25 gallons. A full bathtub, however, can require up to 70 gallons of water. Pre-1980 showerheads use 5 to 8 gallons per minute. Since 1994, showerheads must use a maximum of 2.5 gallons per minute, and newer models — like the newer toilets — work much better than older models.

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



## DPS trooper takes millions in drugs off the street

AMARILLO -Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Monday on Interstate 40 yielding 45,500 grams — or 100 pounds – of methamphetamine that was valued at more than \$3,600,000.

On May 13, at approximately 6:52 a.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 1992 Winnebago motor home traveling eastbound on I-40 for a traffic violation.

The traffic stop was conducted two miles east of Conway in Carson County. During the traffic stop, the trooper conducted a search of the vehicle and 45,500 grams of methamphetamine were discovered. The illegal drugs were located inside false compartments in the vehicle.

The driver of the vehicle was identified as Felix Lopez Vasquez, 58, of Perris, Calif. and his passenger was identified as Victor Hugo Gutierrez, 43, of Orange, Calif. The driver and passenger were placed under arrest for possession of a controlled substance, a first degree felony, and booked into the Carson County Jail. The drugs were allegedly being transported from Perris, Calif., to Tulsa, Okla.

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## Live free or move

Forty-three million Americans moved from one state to another between 1995 and 2010 - about one-seventh of Americans.

It's good that we can move! Moving provides one of the few limits on the megalomania of state bureaucrats.

**STOSSEL** think of it as a political decision. They just go where opportunities are, and that usually means where

there's less government.

They're leaving my state, New York, in droves. California, despite its great weather, also lost people, and wealth. Other biggest losers were Illinois, New Jersey and Ohio.

Travis Brown, author of "Money Walks," tracked the movements using IRS data. On my TV show, he revealed that Florida was the state that gained the most: amount of people and

"You're seeing a massive their income coming in: \$86 billion." Arizona and Texas also

gained, which made me wonder if Americans just move to states where it's warm. "No," said Darcy Olsen, president of Arizona's Goldwater Institute. "Weather explains just 5 percent of the migration ... the Census Bureau asks, and they say, to find a job."

People move where jobs are, and the states gaining the most — which also include North Carolina and Nevada — follow what she calls "the magic formula. Lower taxes and good labor policy, which means, to a business, being free to hire and fire the people you want. (In) the most successful states you see both — no income tax or low taxes coupled with right-towork laws.'

The states that lost the most people and money were New York, California, Illinois, New Jersey and Ohio.

This competition between states makes it possible for states to learn from each other's suc-

T.W. Shannon, speaker of the Oklahoma House of Representatives, told me that he's learned. His state, where the economy had long been sluggish, finally figured out they could spur growth with tax cuts.

"We are moving to reduce our state income tax rate. ... Every time we have done it in the past, we have seen increased revenues and growth." Shannon adds, "Capital won't flow to a hostile environment."

No, it won't. You'd think politicians would figure that out. But they rarely do. Brown's income data shows that capital flows to friendly environments: "States like (Texas, without a state income tax) gained \$146 billion, whereas the reverse, the states with the highest among personal income-tax rates, lost over \$120 billion."

The owners of the basketball team the Houston Rockets give prospective players pamphlets that detail how many Rolex watches and Bentleys they could buy just from tax money they'd save if they move to Texas.

Behind this clash is larger disagreement about how to handle the economy — promote growth by shrinking government or boost public services for the poor. The state-bystate contrast keeps getting sharper. Crudely put, blue states keep getting bluer, and red states keep getting redder. Krugman looks at Texas and sees policies — and Republican politicians — he doesn't like.

Ironically, one reason Texas continues to have problems with poverty, despite its population growth, is that people don't just move between states. They also move from other countries in search of opportunity. For about a million people, that meant moving across the border from Mexico to Texas. They start low on the economic ladder but do tend to move upward over time.

For some reason, politicians most sympathetic to those immigrants are clueless about why U.S. citizens move from state to state.

College, the president of the school, Dr. John Silvanus Wilson Jr., will be beaming with pride as the nation's first black president addresses the nation's only

college dedicated to educating primarily black men. But when the speech is

done and the photos are taken, President Obama will jump on Air Force One to head back to Washington, D.C. to battle his Republican critics.

As for Wilson, the man who served under Obama as executive director of the White House Initiative on Historically Black Colleges and Universities before being named the 11th president of Morehouse, is going to have to spend a lot of time repairing the rupture with his alumni that is of his own making.

It all began earlier this year when Wilson, a 1979 Morehouse graduate, invited Philadelphia pastor Kevin Johnson, who is also an alumnus of the school,

to be the baccalaureate speaker this weekend. All was well until Wilson got wind of an opinion piece Johnson wrote in a black newspaper in Philadelphia that criticized President Obama's lack of blacks in his cabinet, as well as policies that would directly

benefit African-Americans. Wilson contacted Johnson about the piece, and instead of the university president accepting it as simply one man's opinion, he altered his previous decision. Johnson claims he was disinvited, but Wilson denies that, writing in a column posted on the university's website: "I subsequently made a decision to adjust the format of the Baccalaureate program and opted for a more creative, multi-speaker approach that is used by many leading institutions. This sharing of the stage comports with the spirit of upholding democratic ideals, including freedom of speech and expression, and is entirely consistent with the spirit of camaraderie that Morehouse holds dear.

"As president, I believe this is in the best interest of the college. In this instance, I decided to ask this invited speaker to share the Baccalaureate stage with two other speakers so as to reflect a broader and more

inclusive range of viewpoints."

Let me break down Wilson's 451-word column he titled "Keeping Our Focus," down to two words: Absolute nonsense.

It is clear that Wilson was perfectly fine with all of the other things Johnson has said or written since he invited him to be the baccalaureate speaker. But lo and behold, when the pastor chose to criticize Wilson's former boss, President Obama, all of a sudden there was a need on the Morehouse campus for broader viewpoints.

The move by Wilson has angered a number of Morehouse graduates, a number of whom I've personally talked to and corresponded with over the last few weeks.

A group of prominent Morehouse graduates, calling themselves Citizens for Change, released a statement condemning Wilson's decision.

"If President Wilson turns his back on one of our most distinguished alums because of an exercise of free speech and political commentary, he will have set Morehouse on a dangerous course and departed from the great tradition bequeathed to us," said the Rev. Dr. Amos Brown, senior pastor of

Third Baptist Church in San Francisco in the release. "In 1947, Dr. King warned that, 'If we are not careful, our colleges will produce a group of close-minded, unscientific, illogical propagandists, consumed with immoral acts. Be careful, 'brethren!' Be careful, teachers!' We are potentially witnessing the realization of King's greatest fears.'

The invoking of King, a distinguished graduate of Morehouse, clearly rankled Wilson, who wrote in his column to the university, "In brief, this matter is not and has never been about censorship. Nor has it anything to do with stifling or limiting 'prophetic voices,' disturbing the 'King legacy, or deviating from any of the proud traditions of the College."

Maybe Wilson can call President Obama and ask him how his fence-mending golf outings, dinners and drinks with the Republicans are going. He might be doing a lot of that soon in Atlanta and around the country to sooth the bitter feelings of Morehouse graduates.


