City seeking volunteers to assist in disasters

Emergency services director wants to start CERT classes to train citizens.

Fred Courtney, emergency management services director for Pampa, is looking to start training for CERT volunteers, but needs about 10 or 12 interested people before he can get it up and running.

CERT stands for Citizens Emergency Response Team, which is a nationwide program to train everyday people — bank managers, sales clerks, teachers, oil field workers — to assist first responders during disasters like the recent tornadoes in Oklahoma.

Despite emergency personnel from out-of-town agencies coming in to assist local authorities, first responders are nonetheless overwhelmed by all the victims who need assistance in the first hours of an enormous disaster. Factors such as number of victims, communication failures and road blockages will prevent people from accessing emergency services they have come to expect at a moment's notice through 911.

"Look at all the police, firefighters and EMTs at Moore," Courtney said. "They couldn't go everywhere. The more people we have CERT-trained the more people we can rescue. We are trying to get people to get training to help in a disaster."

Training classes won't be scheduled until **CERT** cont. on page 3

Local dentist retires after 53 years

The United States was toe-to-toe with the Soviet Union in a race when Dr. Jim Alexander started practicing dentistry in August 1961.

On May 15, Alexander retired after 53 good years of family dentistry, first in Borger and then in Pampa.

He now plans to move in June to the Austin area with his wife Sarah. One of their son-in-laws, Brian, is building a small house for the couple to live in.

The Alexanders have been married for 41 years. "It's been good, all of them," he said during an interview last week in his office in the NBC Plaza.

Alexander said he decided now was the time to retire because both his and Sarah's health has been getting a little bad. But he will miss his practice and patients.

"It's been a great time and I've had wonderful patients," he said. "I've enjoyed the loyalty of my patients and I appreciate all of them."

Alexander was born in Little Rock, Ark. and moved to Borger in 1940, where his father became manager of the JCPenney store.

He attended Baylor University in Waco and in 1961 graduated from the Baylor College of Dentistry.

After practicing for two years in Borger, he moved to Pampa, where he practiced as a family dentist until two weeks ago.

All of the dental records at Alexander's office have been transferred to Dr. John Sparkman at 2401 N. Hobart St.

Okla. twister debris would create mile-high pile

MOORE, Okla. (AP) — Before residents of Moore can rebuild, they'll have to deal with the debris from the deadly tornado that devastated the Oklahoma City suburb: crushed wood, mangled siding and battered belongings that could make a pile reaching more than a mile into the sky.

The splintered remains' first stop is a landfill where it will be sorted, then recycled or burned. Bricks, for instance, will go to charity projects such as Habitat for Humanity; wood, paper and clothing will be incinerated.

"I could be sad about it, but it's not going to make anything come back. It's just a house. It's just stuff. We have each other," Jessie Childs said as bulldozer and backhoe operators reduced her house near the Plaza Towers Elementary School to a 10-foot pile of rubble.

The school was destroyed

in the top-of-the scale EF5 tornado that carved a 17-mile path of destruction on May 20. In all, 24 people were killed, including seven children in the school.

With each load of debris, Moore moves another step closer to recovering from the storm that damaged or destroyed 4,000 homes and businesses. Against a cacophony of snapping lumber, crunching metal and the beep-beep of bulldozers in reverse, Clayton Powell sorted through the lasting remains of his Moore home.

"You're sifting through rubble piles trying to find that one photo, memories you can't restore," Powell said. "I'm sure there are a few things I haven't even thought of and won't miss."

Presidential approval of a major disaster declaration typically covers 75 percent of the cost for communities to remove debris. In Moore's case, President Barack Obama approved even more assistance. Under a pilot program, the federal government will pay 85 percent of debris removal costs for the first 30 days and 80 percent for the next 60. The expectation is that quicker debris removal speeds up the overall recovery.

The Oklahoma Department of Transportation brought in 400 of its workers and 250 pieces of equipment, including dump trucks and front-end loaders, to help with the process, said Transportation Secretary Gary Ridley.

As residents pick through the remains of their homes for the few surviving personal treasures, they've developed a way for crews to know when it's OK to take stuff away. "If it's out on the curb, anybody can come out and get it," said Charlie Baker of Blanchard, watching a bulldozer raze his daughter's house and push it to the street.

A relative found her Tiffany necklace, but there's not much else worth salvaging. Jumping into the pile quickly after the storm, Kathy Duffy struggled to even find things that actually belonged to her sister, who was out of town when the storm hit.

"None of the clothes we found is theirs. None of the pictures we found is theirs," Duffy said last week. "That's definitely not theirs," she said, pointing to a pair of large black sweatpants draped over a chair.

Paul Borges, who lives on the east side of Moore, found a crowbar and a 1979 baseball card featuring a player he had never heard of.

A neighbor found one-half of a \$100 bill.

What happened, didn't happen during the Legislative session

It's been a whirlwind of an end to the 83rd Legislature's regular session, and with Monday's announcement of a special session, lawmakers aren't done. Here's a look at the deals reached and the measures that fell short during the 140 days of the regular session.

Budget

The budget negotiations ended up more convoluted than usual this session. In the end, four key bills needed to make it to Perry's desk: SB 1, HB 1025, HB 6 and HB 7. By Sunday evening, all did. A pivotal resolution, SJR 1, also was passed by both chambers and doesn't require Perry's signature, which means Texas voters will decide in November whether to amend the constitution to create two water infrastructure funds.

If Perry signs HB 1025, those funds will start off with \$2 billion in them. Perry's signature on that bill remains an open question, as he expressed reservations about how the bill spends \$1.75 billion from the Rainy Day Fund to undo an accounting trick lawmakers used last session to make the budget appear balanced.

Paying for tax relief was also high on the priority list of budget negotiators. Several tax measures made it to Perry's desk, including HB 500, the major franchise tax relief bill of the session, and HB 800, which provides tax credits for business spending on research and development. HB 7 will wind down the System Benefit Fund, an account set up to help low-income Texans pay their utility bills. A related fee most Texans pay on their utility bills will stop being collected in September if Perry signs the bill.

Transportation

For all the talk of finding

a robust, reliable revenue source for the Texas Department of Transportation this session, lawmakers are leaving the agency's funding woes largely unaddressed. The budget deal includes \$400 million in gas tax dollars for TxDOT that in the past had gone to the Department of Public Safety. But that is far short of the \$4 billion a year TxDOT said it needed in extra revenue just to maintain current congestion. A last-ditch effort by the Senate to dedicate some Rainy Day Fund money to the issue was rebuffed by the House.

The so-called shale counties in West and South Texas that are undergoing an oil drilling boom did end up with some aid for their roads, which have been torn up by all the truck activity. HB 1025 includes \$450 million for TxDOT to address that issue. SB 1747 will let counties to draw \$225 million from that funding for local roads. It also allows those regions to develop County Transportation Reinvestment Zones that would let them take the revenue from increased property and sales tax revenue to address the problem.

Public Education

Two major education bills — SB 2, which expands the state's charter school system, and HB 5, which changes high school testing and graduation requirements — are awaiting an OK from Gov. Rick Perry. Neither measure generated much debate in the Legislature's final days as lawmakers finally approved them after months of committee hearings and contentious behind-the-scenes negotiations.

Under HB 5, high school students would take a foundation curriculum of four English credits; three science, social studies and math credits; two foreign language credits; one fine arts and one P.E. credit; and five elective credits. They

would add a fourth science and math credit when they select one of five diploma "endorsements" in areas including science and technology, business and industry, and the humanities. The state will require five standardized tests in English I, English II, algebra I, biology and U.S. history. School districts will have the option of offering diagnostic exams in algebra II and English III that will not count toward their accountability rating.

Under SB 2, the state cap on charter school contracts will increase by about 15 a year to 305 by 2019. Drop-out recovery and charters created by a school district would not count toward that cap. High-performing charter schools from out of state would. Up to five charters focused on special-needs students would not count toward the cap. School boards would have the authority to vote in favor of converting low-performing campuses in their districts into charters. And the Texas Education Agency, not the State Board of Education, would oversee the charter approval, renewal and closure process.

Higher Education

Both chambers approved HB 29, which will require that public universities offer incoming students a four-year, fixed-rate tuition option. The issue has been one of Perry's priorities, but it almost didn't make it — the Senate had to suspend its rules on the session's final day to adopt the conference committee report. In anticipation of the bill passing, nearly every board of regents in the state has instructed its institutions to begin offering such an option.

The Legislature approved SB 215, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board sunset bill, which allows the agency to continue operating for the next 12 years but also reins it

some of its authority. The bill prohibits the board from issuing a certificate of authority to a foreign institution offering professional degrees, meaning the American University of the Caribbean will not get its wish to send medical students to Texas. Additionally, the bill alters the eligibility requirements for the TEXAS Grant program and changes the rules so that institutions do not lose money through the B-On-Time loan program.

Campus carry may not have passed this session, but lawmakers did pass SB 1907, which allows concealed handgun license holders to store firearms and ammunition in locked cars on college campuses.

High up on the list of unfinished business this session was SB 16, which would have issued nearly \$2.7 billion in bonds for campus construction projects around the state. The bill got stuck after the Senate refused to concur with House amendments to the bill, and the House declined to acknowledge the Senate's request for a conference committee. On the last day of the session, there were still efforts to save the bill, but the challenge proved too great.

Energy

The extension of the Railroad Commission's life has been approved by both the House and Senate. The oil and gas regulatory agency will survive for four more years, but must go through an especially rigorous review process in 2017, after failing to do so this session and last. The extension was contained in the conference committee report on HB 1675; the measure now goes to the governor for a signature.

Ethics

The chambers signed off on SB 219, an omnibus reform bill for the Texas Ethics Commission — but not until after they had stripped

off a range of amendments that would have forced lawmakers and special-interest groups to be more transparent. They left on the bill measures to let lawmakers remove their home addresses from their financial statements and a study backed by some Republicans to consider moving the state's public integrity unit away from the Travis County district attorney's office.

Meanwhile, Perry vetoed a "dark money" bill — SB 346 — aimed at getting politically active nonprofits to disclose their donors.

The only standalone transparency bill to make it, SB 1773, calls for an interim study on whether the state's financial disclosure and ethics laws need to be updated.

Criminal Justice

The reform bill for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, SB 213, is headed to Perry's desk. The bill reauthorizes the state's sprawling prison system and provides for the expansion of re-entry programs for inmates who are released from state custody. The House and Senate had included differing provisions regarding the potential closure of two prison units.

In the end, the bill was silent on that, merely leaving language in the budget to guide TDCJ officials in deciding how to address their approximately 12,000 empty beds.

The final version of SB 1 directs TDCJ to reduce "bed capacity" at correctional facilities in order to cut costs. It says TDCJ should prioritize keeping open state-owned facilities over private facilities. That means that advocates for the closure of two privately operated facilities, one in Dallas and another in Min-

eral Wells, will probably continue their campaign to ensure those facilities are shuttered. While the Corrections Corporation of America, which runs the facilities, says they are safely operated, critics say conditions there are unsafe for inmates.

Legislation to establish an innocence commission to review wrongful conviction cases failed again this legislative session. Critics, including state Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Southside Place, argued that HB 160 was unnecessary because lawmakers have already addressed many of the problems in the criminal justice system that have been uncovered in dozens of wrongful conviction cases.

enough people are signed up for a class, but altogether the training takes 24 hours, Courtney said.

CERT volunteers get training in basic first aid and triage, which is determining the priority of patients' treatments based on the severity of their injuries.

Courtney said they also will learn light rescue and damage assessment.

CERT volunteers are not meant to replace first responders, who have years of training and experience and do what they do for a living.

However, Courtney's plan is to train CERT volunteers to go beyond just basic first aid. "We'd like to train them as weather spotters and have them take the three courses from the National Incident Management Systems that all first responders are required to take," he said. "We'd like to ask people to do that, and as time goes by as time have them take CPR and other advanced training."

Courtney said CERT volunteers often work in teams. For instance, a church, neighborhood or employer might have a group who are all CERT certified.

Another goal of Courtney's is to have a registry of people with private storm shelters. That way after a big storm emergency personnel or CERT could go around to check to make sure they got out of those shelters.

Courtney said sometimes people will get complacent after several years without a major tornado. "We haven't had any se-

vere weather to speak of since 2009," he said.

But the EF5 tornado that carved a two-mile wide path or destruction in Oklahoma last Monday is a stark reminder that disasters can strike when you least expect them.

Gang of Eight increases unemployment

Many students are so discouraged about the lack of job opportunities for STEM graduates that they have switched to more promising course majors, such as accounting. The lobbyists lied to us by reciting the slogan that the “best and the brightest” are foreigners, rather than Americans, and must be imported so we can benefit from their brains and labor. The notion that the best and the brightest are foreigners is false and contemptible, since most of the world’s great inventions and innovations are American. In pursuit of this foolish notion, tens of thousands of foreigners have been imported to take jobs in the tech industries. The corporations welcome this deceit because they pay them less than Americans, bring in foreigners who are not high-skilled for entry-level jobs, force experienced Americans to train them and then lay off the Americans. The Gang of Eight is so enamored with this racket that their proposed

doubles the number of guest worker visas. The Gang of Eight bill raises H-1B visas to 115,000 a year and allows up to 180,000. The globalists who want to give us a foreign workforce invented a cutesy slogan: “staple a green card” to every master’s degree or Ph.D. that a foreign student receives from a U.S. college in STEM subjects. The Gang of Eight puts no cap on the number of green cards to be issued, no quality standards for the colleges that grant the degrees, and no effective requirement that tech companies must seek U.S. workers before offering jobs to foreigners. Colleges can also make this a profitable racket. A master’s program usually takes only one year, so foreign students can buy the right to U.S. residency and a tech job by the price of one year’s tuition at any U.S. college. Republican Senator Jeff Sessions of Alabama, who has been the people’s friend throughout the negotiations, said, “One of the things that most upsets the American people about Washington is drafting a bill with special interests in secret and jamming it across the finish line in a way that minimizes public involvement and input.” The lobbyists are still objecting to language in the bill that requires employers to ensure that an “equally qualified” American is not available for a job opening before hiring a foreign temporary worker. The Senate Judiciary Committee also defeated a Senator Chuck Grassley (R-IA) amendment to require that employers assure the government they have made “good faith” efforts to hire American workers. Senator Chuck Schumer (D-NY), a usually voluble big-government liberal, claimed this would give the government “too much power” to interpret! The Gang of Eight beat back several other GOP amendments on border security, such as a Ses-

Museum Musings What’s in a name, Pampa?

The White Deer Land Company’s goal was to carry on the history of the White Deer Lands through museum work.

To many, it is a bit confusing why this museum is not in the town of White Deer, or more about the town of White Deer. Here’s the story... In the days when Apaches, Comanches, Kiowa and Kiowa-Apaches roamed this area, an Indian saw an albino deer drinking at a creek which became known to the Indians as “the creek of the white deer.” Most of the 26-mile-long creek, which flows northward to the Canadian River, is in eastern Hutchinson county. Early Spanish explorers referred to the creek in their language: “El Rito del Venado Blanco.” The Spanish name was Anglicized by the early American traders and explorers and became White Deer Creek. In 1886, the insolvent Francklyn Land and Cattle Company was reorganized and called the

White Deer Lands because of the creek near which the company buildings were located. Soon, the company moved its headquarters to an experimental farm near the present day town of White Deer which became known by the name of the company. In 1892, the company moved its headquarters to the present city of Pampa and sometime thereafter changed its name to the White Deer Land Company, whose building still houses the White Deer Land Museum today. However, Pampa wasn’t always known as Pampa and there is quite a story behind that, too. The American explorer Randolph B. Marcy was near the site of present-day Pampa in June, 1852, when he made his historic journey from his camp near present-day Lefors to the Canadian River. He struck out northwestward across the Llano Estacado “where the eye rests on no object of relief within the scope of vision.” M.K. Brown once told a reporter: “Prior to the coming of the railroad, there was absolute-

ly nothing but God’s green earth where Pampa now stands.” The site of present day Pampa was one of the stations on the route of the Southern Kansas Railroad. It was designated as Glasgow, a name chosen by construction engineers in honor of a banking firm located in Great Britain as it was financing an American land holding company in the Panhandle of Texas. Later, this name was changed to Sutton to honor M.V. Sutton of Kansas, related to funding the construction of the southern Kansas Texas Railway. The U.S. Postal Department would not accept this name when they applied for a post office years later. Many names were recommended, however George Tyng came up with the name of Pampa, as the lay of the land reminded him of the Pampas in Argentina. Pampa in Spanish means wide open spaces or vastness. The U.S. Postal Department accepted this name in 1892 and so it remains today, Pampa.

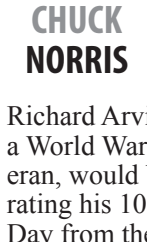

Special veterans to remember

I recently read a great story about the oldest living American veteran. And then it made me think about my brother Wieland, who gave his life in Vietnam. Last Friday, Fox News reported that Richard Arvine Overton, a World War II Army veteran, would be commemorating his 107th Memorial Day from the front porch of his Texas home, which he built after coming home from World War II. Overton was born May 11, 1906, the same year as the big San Francisco earthquake. He will shortly become a supercentenarian — someone who is 110 or older, an achievement that only an estimated 200-350

people in the entire world have obtained. He married twice over nearly 12 decades on earth but never had any children. But if you think sitting on his porch is all Overton does to bide his time, consider that Overton just traveled to Washington to see the National World War II Memorial. (His trip was provided by Honor Flight Network, a nonprofit organization that gives veterans free trips to memorials erected in their honor.) He served in the South Pacific from 1942 through 1945, with time also spent in Hawaii, Guam, Palau and Iwo Jima. Regarding his recent trip to Washington, Overton told Fox News: “At my age and my strength, I’m able to stand up and do anything. My mind is good, so I’m able to do what I want.” He added, “I got good health, and I

don’t take any medicine.” So what’s Overton’s century-plus longevity secret? I doubt that it’s his dozen-a-day cigar habit or the splash of whiskey in his morning coffee. He credits his old age to taking daily aspirin and keeping his stress low. And he keeps his body moving. He said: “I also stay busy around the yards. I trim trees, help with the horses. The driveways get dirty, so I clean them. I do something to keep myself moving. I don’t watch television.” Beyond these things, Overton maintains his spiritual health by faithfully going to church every week. Austin Mayor Lee Leffingwell told Fox News in a statement: “I’ve spoken with Mr. Overton on a few different occasions, and admire his spirit for life

and his country. He is truly one of our unsung heroes and we are privileged that he calls Austin his home.” I join Leffingwell and millions of other Americans each Memorial Day in saluting all of America’s heroes. And I know Overton joins us in particularly giving thanks for the freedom fighters who sacrificed everything for our country, including my dear brother Wieland, who paid the ultimate price June 3, 1970. My father fought in World War II at the Battle of the Bulge. I served four years in the Air Force in South Korea, and my brother Aaron served in the Army there, too. And our brother, Wieland, was killed in action in Vietnam when he walked point alone and drew out enemy fire so that others in his platoon could fight

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sions proposal to require 700 miles of double-layer fencing along our southern border. The Gang also defeated Texas' Republican Senator Ted Cruz amendment that would triple border patrol agents.

As bad as the Gang of Eight bill is for high-skilled workers, it is a disaster for low-skilled U.S. workers because the big majority of new immigrants will be low skilled. The bill will swallow up opportunities for our own citizens to join the ranks of the employed and it will depress the wages of both U.S. citizens and immigrants.

Granting amnesty to 11 million illegal aliens will, of course, act as a magnet for future illegals coming across our border, as well as substantially increase the legal immigrants coming in through the family unification process. Estimates are that the Gang's bill will bring in 33 million

immigrants over the next 10 years. The biggest victims demographically will be African Americans because most of the 33 million immigrants will be low skilled. Legal and illegal immigration over the last several decades accounts for 40 percent of the 18-point percentage decline in African-American employment rates, according to evidence produced by the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights.

The Gang of Eight bill will punish black Americans to benefit foreigners and tech company profits. Where are the civil rights advocates when we need them?

their way out to freedom. Many souls were saved on that day because of my brother's bravery. (My mom wrote a chapter on each of us and, for the first time, told Wieland's war story at length in her autobiography, "Acts of Kindness: My Story," available only at <http://www.chucknorris.com>.)

Here are the numbers of those who sacrificed their lives in major wars since the Revolution:

- Revolutionary War: 4,435.
- War of 1812: 2,260.
- Mexican War: 13,283.
- Civil War: 525,000.
- Spanish-American War: 2,446.
- World War I: 116,516.
- World War II: 405,399.
- Korean War: 36,574.
- Vietnam War: 58,220.
- Gulf War: 383.
- Afghanistan War: 2,175.
- Iraq War: 4,486.
- Total: 1,171,177.

Like so many other members of our armed forces, Overton witnessed many of his military friends die in the line of duty during World War II. Then, down through the years, he had to say goodbye to a host of others.

Overton said this past week: "I know I had someone from my platoon until recently, but he passed, so now I don't have anyone that I know. So I feel lonesome by myself sometimes. I would love to ask some of them some questions, but nobody is here. Everybody's passed."

Though I understand Overton's sentiments about his fallen comrades, not a single veteran should ever feel alone, because they all should be surrounded always by those who admire them.

On behalf of millions of Americans, my wife, Gena, and I salute Richard Overton and all of America's veterans, pray for those active in service and humbly bow in thanks for our fallen military heroes, who gave their lives so that we might live ours.

Please mark your calendars on Sept. 12 and participate in Freedom Day USA, when businesses across the country will show their appreciation for U.S. service members by providing free goods and services to them and their immediate families.

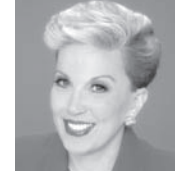
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Dear Abby...

Another problem is I am having a lot of feelings for his best friend, and he has feelings for me, too. I don't want to tell my boyfriend because I love him and don't want to lose him. I also don't want to ruin his friendship with the other guy.

My boyfriend wants to have sex again, but I don't. I wish I could take it back. What can I do? — LOST AND CONFUSED

DEAR LOST AND CONFUSED: Because you had sex once does not mean you are compelled to do it again. Feeling as you do about the best friend is a strong sign that as much as you care for your boyfriend, you are not in love with him.

If you are being pressured to have sex, it's important for YOUR sake that you tell your boyfriend you feel it happened too soon, you're sorry you did it, and you have decided to wait until you are older to start again. It would be an intelligent move for you because your affections appear to be all over the map right now.

I am also concerned because you didn't mention whether you both used birth control. It's a sign of maturity when couples plan ahead and take precautions to avoid an unwanted pregnancy. (And yes, a girl CAN get pregnant the first time.) In fact, there's a word for teens who have sex on the spur of the moment and don't use birth control: It's PARENTS.

DEAR ABBY: My friend is a compulsive talker. "Chatty Cathy" draws detailed descriptions of people I don't know and don't care about and lingers over past and current tribulations. I tolerate her behavior because she's a kind person, but she is oblivious to how much she dominates a conversation. It's like something compels her to fill every silence with monologue.

Others do it out of nervousness or insecurity because they are uncomfortable with silence — even if it is a momentary pause in conversation.

Because her behavior has had a negative impact on her employability, the next time she mentions problems at work, it would be a kindness to suggest to her that, because it's a happening repeatedly, she discuss it with a psychologist. That's not hurtful; it's helpful.
