Hays announces bid for US Congress

■ Amarillo businesswoman will take on incumbent Mac Thornberry in Republican Party primary.

 AMARILLO — Amarillo businesswoman Elaine Hays announced her candidacy for the Republican nomination for the U.S. House of Representatives, District 13 earlier this week. Hays was joined by State Board of Education Representative Marty Rowley, Republican activists, family and friends for the announcement. The district includes 41 counties in West, Central and North Texas. Hays will take on 20-year incumbent Mac Thornberry in the Republican primary. "We can't wait another two years to get spending under control," Hays said in a released statement. "We can't wait another two years to overhaul Washington, to create real jobs in the private sector and to make opportunity available to the American people again." **HAYS** cont. on page 3

Perry to announce 'exciting future plans' on Monday

 Gov. Rick Perry has sent an email to close friends saying he will announce his "exciting future plans" on Monday in San Antonio. Perry previously said he would announce in early July whether he would run for re-election; he has also said a decision about whether to make another presidential bid won't come until the end of the year. In the email obtained by The Texas Tribune and first reported by CNN, Perry invites supporters to join him and his family for an announcement at mid-day Monday in San Antonio.

He does not specify a location for the announcement, and says details will follow. It's looking increasingly unlikely that Perry will seek a fourth term in the Governor's Mansion; his gubernatorial campaign team has largely been disassembled, and his fundraising pales in comparison to that of his likely successor, Attorney General Greg Abbott. Whether he'll take another stab at the presidency is still unclear.

The run starts at 7:30 a.m., the turtle races start at 2 p.m. and the rest of the events occur between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m.

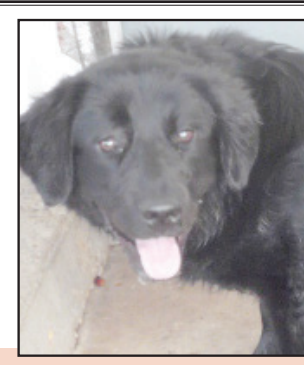

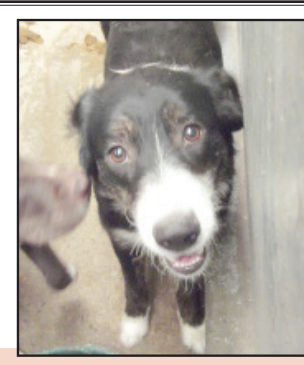

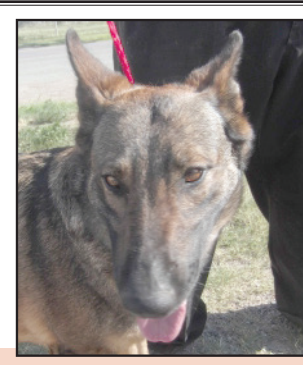

As a result, my belief in a healthy lifestyle combined with preventive care plays a large part in how I approach their care."

Kuo is a 2002 graduate of the St. George's University School of Medicine in Grenada, West Indies.

He received a bachelor's of science in chemistry with a minor in psychology in 1997 from University of California, Riverside.

He did clinical fellowships at Louisiana State University at Children's Hospital in New Orleans and did his residency at Children's Hospital of New Jersey at Newark Beth Israel Medical Center.

He also did an internship in pediatrics at Mt. Sinai School of Medicine at Jersey City.

From 2005 to 2006, he worked as research assistant with Robert Olympia, M.D., Children's Hospital of New Jersey at Newark Beth Israel Medical Center.

Hays was raised in Bridgeport on the eastern side of District 13. She began her career in the finance industry as a stockbroker and later became a certified financial planner. She met and married her husband, Tracy, and has lived the past 28 years in Amarillo raising their four children Taylor, Rachel, Ryan and Caleb. During these years, she earned a master's in finance from West Texas A&M University, co-authored two books and completed 51 hours of doctoral studies in economics from Texas Tech.

"I am running because it's time we had leadership that will make the tough choices to cut spending, that will not stand idly by on the issue of entitlement reform, and that will fight from the front lines to defend our Constitutional freedoms," she said.

"In the 20 years since we sent the current incumbent to Congress, the debt has gone up, and confidence in government has gone down," Hays added. "Trust has plummeted with revelations of privacy violations and agencies targeting citizens based on ideology."

"It's time for our elected representatives to lead by example, to apply tough reforms to themselves, before asking it of the American people."

She is campaigning on four pillars to restoring voter confidence, which includes: a "no budget, no pay" law, banning the practice of Congress exempting itself from the laws it passes, pension reform and term limits.

Hays said she is committed to returning America to sound fiscal and economic policies.

"I've spent the bulk of my life in one area of the district or another," she said, "I've lived among people who cling to the values of God, family and country, and I've formed conservative convictions that run deep, to my core."

GALWAY, Ireland — The intense debate over immigration reform in the USA has riveted many in this bucolic area in the west of Ireland. That's because in addition to millions of Hispanic aliens, a significant number of Irish would benefit from immigration clarity. Just ask anyone in the Woodside section of Queens, New York.

The census estimates that there are nearly 35 million Americans of Irish descent living in America,

physically made it here, you were an American. Simply showing up entitled you to pursue the dream of prosperity.

But today our country is fragile. The economy is stagnant, and social problems dominate the landscape. Back when my people arrived from Galway, in the 1840s, there was little in the way of social welfare and entitlements. You either earned your way or wound up in the street. America did not support immigrants; it simply gave them a chance.

What has not changed is the humanity of most Americans. People without an agenda realize that most illegal aliens are here to feed their families, not to cause trouble. But we also realize that our federal government has allowed and sometimes encouraged immigration chaos, which has damaged the fabric of the nation. You simply cannot allow more than 10 million people to occupy your territory without any accountability. And that's what has happened.

I told the good people in western Ireland who approached me that I hope a fair but tough immigration bill passes this year — one that will put an end to the porous southern border and make undocumented aliens earn their citizenship over an extended period of time.

The most powerful nation on earth should be able to pass a fair, effective immigration law that combines compassion with responsibility and does not injure hardworking Americans who are taxed up to here.

We SHOULD be able to do that. It will be shameful if we don't.

Immigration reform can be much simpler

The Senate is so out of touch that some leaders think the way to pass a path-to-citizenship bill for immigrants in the country illegally is to budget \$40 billion for extra immigration enforcement over the next 10 years. This is the type of cynical ploy that makes everyone hate Washington.

The Senate wants to reward people who have broken immigration law — and then tell voters it's OK because it wants to spend more to enforce the laws it will have overridden. The Heritage Foundation panned the Gang of Eight's measure — with amendments, it runs more than 1,100 pages — as "a massive, sweeping, complicated bill that works at cross-purposes to its stated goals."

Supporters say the bipartisan Senate bill would

make immigrants in the country illegally stand in the back of the line, pass a background check and pay fines and back taxes to qualify for citizenship. The process would take 13 years.

Senate Democrats might say they are willing to live with a 13-year waiting period before applicants can register to vote, but you just know that they'll try to find ways to change the law or allow authorities to ignore it. It's not fair to the 4.4 million people waiting to immigrate legally, argued Heritage's Jessica Zuckerman.

GOP Sens. Bob Corker of Tennessee and John Hoeven of North Dakota sponsored a "border surge" amendment, which, sorry, only reminds voters how feckless immigration enforcement is already, when there is no path to citizenship for immigration scofflaws.

Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., is desperate to pass the bill because, he warns, if Congress does not pass a big immigra-

tion bill, the Republican Party will alienate Latino voters further. I agree that the GOP has to find ways to reach out to Latino voters. This bill could not do it, however, especially because Republicans have announced that they'll vote for the measure only if Washington spends billions to secure the border. Those who see illegal immigration as a function of a porous border ignore the fact that an estimated 40 percent of those in America illegally entered legally and then overstayed their visas.

During the 2012 election, President Barack Obama deftly played the immigration card. He signed an order for a temporary Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program, which allowed some young adults in the country illegally to apply for work permits and avoid deportation.

That action was in concert with the president's support of the Development, Relief and Education for Alien Minors Act, legislation that would

provide citizenship to young people who, as children and through no fault of their own, entered America illegally with their parents. These kids never set out to break immigration law; the government should not punish them for their parents' decisions. These kids want to live the American dream, just as they want to honor their parents' sacrifices.

House Republicans should feel free to ignore whatever mega-bill the Senate approves. Instead of a Senate-lite bill that would legislate in opposing directions, the House should focus on measures that would address distinct problems. Let members start by passing a DREAM Act to legalize adults who didn't break the law because they were too young to consent.

More air passengers showing up with guns

WASHINGTON (AP) — Several times every day, at airports across the country, passengers are trying to walk through security with loaded guns in their carry-on bags, purses or pockets, even in a boot. And, more than a decade after 9/11 raised consciousness about airline security, it's happening a lot more often.

In the first six months of this year, Transportation Security Administration screeners found 894 guns on passengers or in their carry-on bags, a 30 percent increase over the same period last year. The TSA set a record in May for the most guns seized in one week — 65 in all, 45 of them loaded and 15

with bullets in the chamber and ready to be fired. That was 30 percent more than the previous record of 50 guns, set just two weeks earlier.

Last year TSA found 1,549 firearms on passengers attempting to go through screening, up 17 percent from the year before.

In response to a request from The Associated Press, the agency provided figures on the number of firearm incidents in 2011 and 2012 for all U.S. airports, as well as the number of passengers screened at each airport. The AP analyzed the data, as well as weekly blog reports from the agency on intercepted

guns from this year and last year.

TSA didn't keep statistics on guns intercepted before 2011, but officials have noticed an upward trend in recent years, said spokesman David Castelvetter.

Some of the details make officials shake their heads. As one passenger took off his jacket to go through screening in Sacramento, Calif., last year, TSA officers noticed he was wearing a shoulder holster, and in it was a loaded 9 mm pistol. The same passenger was found to have three more loaded pistols, 192 rounds of ammunition, two magazines and three knives.

Screeners elsewhere found a .45-caliber pistol and magazine hidden inside a cassette deck. Another .45-caliber pistol loaded with seven rounds, including a round in the chamber, was hidden under the lining of a carry-on bag in Charlotte, N.C. A passenger in Allentown, Pa., was carrying a pistol designed to look like a writing pen. At first the passenger said it was just a pen, but later acknowledged it was a gun, according to TSA.

A passenger in March at Bradley Hartford International Airport in Connecticut had a loaded .38-cal-

ber pistol containing eight rounds strapped to his lower left leg. At Salt Lake City International Airport, a gun was found inside a passenger's boot strapped to a prosthetic leg.

TSA doesn't believe these gun-toting passengers are terrorists, but the agency can't explain why so many passengers try to board planes with guns, either, Castelvetter said. The most common excuse offered by passengers is "I forgot it was there."

"We don't analyze the behavioral traits of people who carry weapons. We're looking for terrorists," he said. "But sometimes you have to scratch your head and say, 'Why?'"

Many passengers found

to have guns by screeners are arrested, but not all. It depends on the gun laws where the airport is located. If the state or jurisdiction where the airport is located has tolerant gun laws, TSA screeners will frequently hand the gun back to the passenger and recommend locking it in a car or finding some other safe place for it. The government doesn't track what happens to the people who are arrested.

Is it plausible that some people are so used to carrying guns that they simply forget that they have them, even when they're at an airport about to walk through a scanner? Or do some people try to bring their guns with them when they fly because they think they won't get caught?

Jimmy Taylor, a sociology professor at Ohio University-Zanesville and

the author of several books on the nation's gun culture, said some gun owners are so used to carrying concealed weapons that it's no different to them than carrying keys or a wallet.

The most common reason people say they carry guns is for protection, so it also makes sense that most of the guns intercepted by TSA are loaded, Taylor said. Many gun owners keep their weapons loaded so they're ready if needed, he said.

Even so, Taylor said he finds it hard to believe airline passengers forget they're carrying guns.

"My wife and I check on things like eye drops and Chapstick to see if we're allowed to take them on a plane, so it's a little difficult to imagine that you aren't checking the policies about your loaded firearm before you get to

the airport," he said.

Occasionally passengers stopped by TSA are people who are used to carrying guns because they work in law enforcement, security or the military, but that doesn't appear to be the case most of the time.

Robert Spitzer, an expert on gun policy and gun rights, theorizes that for some, the "I forgot" answer is an excuse, "just like somebody who walks out of a store with an unpaid-for item in their pocket. The first thing that person will say is, 'I forgot.' Do people forget sometimes?

Sure they do. But are there also people who try to shoplift to get away with something? Sure there are, and I think that's no less true with guns."

Eighty-five percent of the guns intercepted last year were loaded. The most common type of gun was a .38-caliber pistol.

Airports in the South and the West, where the American gun culture is strongest, had the greatest number of guns intercepted, according to TSA data.

Of the 12 airports with the most guns last year, five are in Texas: Dallas-

Fort Worth International, 80 guns; George Bush Intercontinental in Houston, 52; Dallas Love Field, 37; William P. Hobby in Houston, 35, and Austin-Bergstrom International, 33. Hartsfield-Jackson in Atlanta had the most for any airport, at 96. Others include Phoenix Sky Harbor, 54; Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International in Florida, 42; Denver International, 39; Seattle-Tacoma International, 37; Orlando International Airport in Florida, 36, and Tampa International in Florida, 33.

Improving your game

■ The fastest way to lower scores.

If you can find the time to take 10 minutes out of your next trip to the golf course, I'd like you to practice a quick drill.

Find a 10-foot putt to a hole on the practice green. The putt needs to be perfectly flat or as flat as possible. Then I want you to take 10 golf balls and, from on or about the same spot, see how many of them you can hole.

You should be striving to sink about seven out of 10 to mark yourself down as a good putter. Sinking eight or even nine is very good.

Let me give you one tip. With the first putt, try and ignore the fact that you miss

(if you do) and concentrate, noting which side you missed and then adjust your aim accordingly. Most people's eyes tricks with them, even over just 10 feet.

This is a really worthwhile drill to perform every time you visit the course. Honing your ability to sink makable 8 to 15-foot putts will mean more rewards out on the course.

Incidentally, I once read that Curtis Strange (or maybe Freddie Couples) recommended that you never

practice little three-footers before a round. His argument was that it presented you with the opportunity to have a negative experience that you would carry out onto the course. I certainly recommend this 8 to 15-foot putting drill before your round. It sharpens your aim.

At Tour de France, Cavendish edges toward legends

MARSEILLE, France (AP) — Mark Cavendish will never be the greatest Tour de France rider, because he will never win the race five times like Eddy Merckx of Belgium and Frenchman Bernard Hinault. Still, the sprinter with thighs like thick hams could outdo both those legends — by winning more stages at cycling's premier race.

By Cavendish's warp-speed standards, his 24th stage win on Wednesday was a ride in the park. The teammates who led Cavendish to the finish, sucking him along in their wheels, building up his speed, were toiling like clockwork. Stamping on his pedals, head down, thighs pumping like pistons, Cavendish then whooshed off alone for the last 150 meters (yards), leaving everyone else in his wake.

Cavendish was carrying so much momentum and this win in Marseille, France's second-largest city, was so comfortable that he was able to sit up in the saddle and make a hand motion like cracking a whip as he crossed the line.

One more stage win will tie Cavendish with Andre Leducq, the Frenchman who got 25 stage wins in the 1920s and 1930s, put-

ting him third on the all-time list. Beyond Leducq is Hinault, who notched up 28 wins in the 1970s and '80s. Merckx's monument is 34, won from 1969 to 1975. Jacques Anquetil and Miguel Indurain also won five Tours, but didn't win as many stages as Hinault and Merckx. Anquetil won 16; Indurain got 12. All seven of Lance Armstrong's Tour wins were stripped for doping.

Sports Briefs

Packers' Nelson to star in new Wis. tourism ad

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — Green Bay Packers wide receiver Jordy Nelson will star in a new Wisconsin fall tourism ad.

The state Department of Tourism says Nelson and his wife, Emily, will appear in the commercial, directed by Wisconsin native Jerry Zucker.

The Greater Green Bay Convention and Visitors

Bureau will hold a premiere party at the Meyer Theater in Green Bay on Aug. 1. The ad will start running in Milwaukee, the Twin Cities and Chicago on Sept. 9.

State Tourism officials say Nelson also plans to write a monthly blog during the football season for TravelWisconsin.com and appear at the Governor's Conference on Tourism next March in Lake Geneva.

Zucker directed "Airplane!" with his brother, David Zucker, who has directed two previous Wisconsin tourism ads.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Washington Nationals have activated catcher Wilson Ramos from the disabled list and optioned catcher Jhonatan Solano to Triple-A Syracuse.

Ramos was listed in the starting lineup for Thursday's Fourth of July matinee against the Milwaukee Brewers.

Ramos missed 44 games because of a strained left hamstring.

He was batting .250 with two home runs and six RBIs before he was injured.

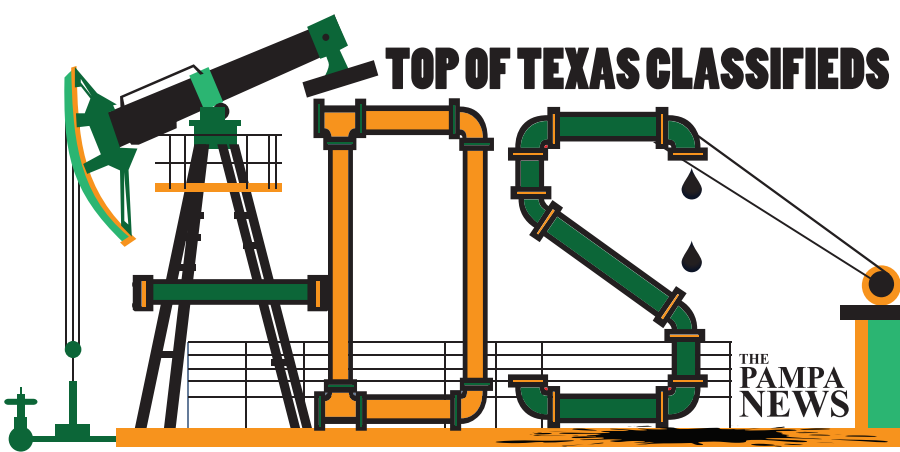

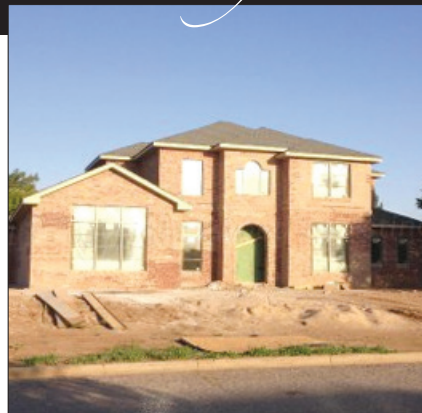

DEAR PROUD PARENTS: Infertility among couples is no longer a deep, dark or shameful secret, and the fact that you needed help to have your children shouldn't generate gossip or whispers because, frankly, it isn't shocking or titillating anymore.

When your children are old enough to be told the facts of life, they can be told that they were conceived through in vitro fertilization. They do

not have to be told every detail all at once. When they are older, they may ask questions about why it was necessary — and when they do, their questions should be answered honestly and in an age-appropriate manner.

DEAR ABBY: Last year I started dating the man I thought I would someday marry. We connected instantly and had a deep love for each other. We argued during most of our relationship, but strangely, never stopped feeling the way we did at the start. Our connection was undeniable and our love endless.

One night we got into a heated argument over "inappropriate" emails between him and an ex. The argument escalated and I was arrested. Worse than being in trouble with the law for the first time in my life was losing my other half.
