When Pampa Regional Medical Center Chief Executive Officer Brad Morse came to town, his first order of business was to make the medical situation in Pampa even better. With Borger a half hour drive away from Pampa, he decided to see if there was any way for the medical centers of Pampa

and Borger to work together.

"When I first got here I went over to Borger and said 'Is there anything we can do together'," Morse said. "We are only 30 miles apart so it makes sense to at least try to be friends. So we talked about possibly sharing an ear/nose/throat doctor.

"There wouldn't be enough work in just Pampa or just Borger to have that specialty and keep them 100 percent busy. So we decided to start searching for a doc-

The partnership between the medical centers of Borger and Pampa are in no way a merger and there is not a financial combination. The only sharing in the costs will come with the paying for a shared physician.

"We found someone who is amiable to both places, we decided to split the expenses bringing that person here and keeping them here," Morse said. "When he is starting out he is going to work two and a half days in Borger and two and a half days here.

Commissioners discuss heliport, courthouse landscaping

The Gray County Court of Commissioners met on Thursday morning for the first meeting of the month. Commissioners Joe Wheeley and Neil Fulton were absent from the meeting.

First, the commissioners considered the election judges for the November election and voted to provide flu shots for employees and their de-

They also decided to install road crossing signs at Chisum Trail, Rider Street and Perry Street. The Gray County Heliport was another topic, as it was brought to the court's attention that locks are needed for the entrance. The commissioners considered the idea of taking donations to pay for the locks.

There was also a sign recently installed on the building, which will be moved in order to be more visible to people driving by the building on 30th Street. Commissioner Gary Willoughby said that there have been leaks in the EMS roof due to a problem with the air conditioning. A full update on the building will be provided at the next meeting.

Feds approve Texas' request for West recovery

The West community will receive additional federal funding to rebuild following the explosion of a fertilizer depot in April that killed 15 people and flattened much of the town, Gov. Rick Perry announced on Friday.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency provided millions of dollars in aid immediately after the explosion, but the agency initially rejected the state's request for additional financial assistance. The state's appeal, submitted in early June, has now been approved, and President Obama has signed a major disaster declaration for the area, ordering federal aid to supplement state and local recovery efforts. "This, along with the disaster relief funding





Mexican bid to smuggle phone into prison in coffin

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexico City prison or make extortion calls. prison authorities say they have quashed an attempt to smuggle a prohibited cell phone into a city prison in the coffin of an inmate's mother.

Prisoners in the city have the right to have the casket of a deceased parent or child brought into the prison yard so they can bid farewell to their relative. But city correctional spokesman Emilio Castelazo said Friday that before the coffin was allowed into the Santa Marta Acatitla prison, guards searched the casket and found the cell phone inside.

Castelazo said a criminal complaint has been filed. Several relatives were with the coffin at the time. Cell phones are banned because inmates frequently use them to coordinate criminal activities outside

Police: Pa. robber left pink shoes, fled on bike

ALTOONA, Pa. (AP) — Police in central Pennsylvania are hoping to find the person who fits a pair of pink shoes he left behind after police say he accosted a woman, took \$200 from her, then fled on a neon green bike.

Altoona police Lt. Jeffrey Pratt tells the Altoona Mirror, "We have his shoes" — a pair of pink Adidas. Police say the robber swiped a bank envelope containing the cash out of the woman's hands after she left the Investment Savings Bank about noon Thursday. They say the suspect ran out of his shoes before hopping on a black-and-neon-green-colored BMXstyle bike and peddling away.

Neglect at The Times

After a long three-year gap since their last exclusive sit-down interview with President Obama,

New York Times would be ready to ask tough questions on the most contentious issues of the day, beginning

with the deepening Obama scandals.

Wrong. Instead, the Times defined the "news" in this interview to be Obama's counter-attacks. Their stories focused on Obama's accusations that (a) the Republicans are liars about Obamacare, (b) the Republicans exaggerate the benefits of building the Keystone XL pipeline and (c) the Republicans oppose his use of executive power because he has the "gall to win the presidency.'

The national media are faithfully executing their Obama second-term call to preserve and protect his

They are steering clear of any story that might imply that the president has in any way cut an ethical corner or abused his power. More: House Republicans investigating Obama scandals must be viewed as an assembly line for organized character assassination, not congressional oversight.

This is especially true at the Times, which sees the president as a far too special historical figure to get the punishing scrutiny applied to people the Times thinks are slackjawed country bumpkins, such as Mike Lee, Ted Cruz and Rand Paul. They see Obama as a Jackie Robinson figure, a racial pioneer who endures the angry, spitting fury of the right-wing mobs with

great courage and flair.

The tea party apparently deserves punishing investigations by the IRS because their opposition to Obama is clearly based on racism, just like the people who spat on Jackie Robinson. In his interview with the Times, when asked about over-enthusiastic use of executive power, Obama sneered at conservatives. "Some of those folks think I usurp my authority by having the gall to win the

presidency. And I don't think that's a secret." He added: "But ultimately, I'm not concerned about their opinions — very few of them, by the way, are lawyers, much less constitutional

lawyers.' Instead of asking one solitary question about scandals, the Times decided it was more important to ask the most obvious question imaginable about Martin Luther King: "March on Washington coming up soon. Are you going to do anything to mark it? Are you planning on being a part of the 50th anniversary?" Why, yes, Obama stressed: "I have a copy of the original program in my office, framed."

Obama's critics on the Left were upset that Times reporters Jackie Calmes and Michael Shear failed to ask about surveillance programs and the Snowden case. They failed to upbraid him about his Justice Department's crackdown on journalists or requiring Bushtrashing/Pulitzer-winning Times colleague James Risen to testify in court. What about drone attacks? These lines of inquiry are reserved for the dreaded warmongering "neoconservatives" of Team Bush.


Obama isn't the only Democrat who is being awarded with feigned ignorance by the Times. The "newspaper of record" looked ridiculous when disgraced former congressman Anthony Weiner was forced to admit he kept right on "sexting" strange women who were not Mrs. Weiner after he resigned and promised to end his creepy online sexual misbehavior with strange women. I rescued him as a kitten when some kids had tried to bury him in a dirt

He had so much dirt in his nose and ears that he couldn't hear well out of one ear and had a continual tilt to his head. When he was about three, he disappeared for a few days, and we finally found him in the garage with one eye missing and a broken jaw, apparently the victim of a collision

He was a sweet, loving cat who lived in our hearts and our home for about eight years. There was always a succession of injured or abandoned critters because they seemed to find my brother on a regular basis.

There was a sparrow who liked to snuggle into the hollow of Pat's chest. The little sparrow even survived a kitchen fire, much to the amazement of the firefighters who came to put out the blaze. The unnamed bird was released into the wild after he decided to bite Pat on the lip and refused to let

We once had a blue heron that walked into our front yard, covered in oil and unable to fly. Mom and I bathed him and fed him sardines. I suspect he only ate the sardines out of desperation, and after only a few days he was able to fly away.

Obama's solution to help the kids

As President Obama heads for a nice vacation at Martha's Vineyard, a place

of wealth, I want him to work on a simple math calculation. One of the major themes of the president's administration

is that there is a tremendous problem of "income inequality" in this nation that must be addressed.

Obama's solution is to redistribute income using seizure tactics.

His plan is to have the federal government provide subsidies for those with low incomes by taking money from business and the affluent. The problem is that high taxation restrains economic expansion and inhibits the country from creating new avenues of wealth. If the affluent spend less and

business invests less in expansion and development, wages for workers stagnate because there is heavy competition for jobs.

The president does not seem to understand that.

But the core problem of "income inequality" stems from failure to seize opportunity. If an American is insufficiently educated and does not develop useful skills, he or she will not be able to earn much money in the marketplace. And little is being done about

So here's the math deal, Mr. President. Right now, approximately 48 percent of American children living in female-headed households are poor. That's compared to a poverty rate of 11 percent for kids living in a married-couple situation.

The out-of-wedlock birth rate for African-Americans is close to 73 percent. For Hispanics, it's 53 percent; for whites, 29 percent. And sadly, most of these chil-

dren are growing up without fathers in the home.

So where is the national campaign to discourage women from having babies out of wedlock? Is the Department of Education doing anything about that? The media? Anyone?

Back in 1992, then Vice President Dan Quayle derided a TV character named Murphy Brown (played by Candice Bergen) for having a baby outside of marriage. Quayle was mocked unmercifully by the elite media and the salon set.

But Quayle was right. According to the U.S. Census, 34 percent of unwed mothers do not work, and that is driving abject poverty.

America offers the most people the best opportunity to pursue happiness. That's why millions of illegal immigrants have poured into the country — most of them poor. They believe they have a shot at improving themselves economi-

But children living in poverty without fathers to guide them are at a strong disadvantage in our competitive society. Obama's solution is to throw as much money as he can into programs to help these kids. But that will never

The traditional American family has always been the foundation for success in America.

But now it is being destroyed in some precincts. Welfare programs and public schooling will never overcome disadvantage on the home front. It is time for Obama to lead. The way to foster "income equality" is to encourage traditional upbringings and discipline.

Just do the math, Mr. President.

The White House and its allies said the new loan structure would offer lower rates to 11 million borrowers right away and save the average undergraduate \$1,500 in interest charges.

Democrats were already talking about changing the deal when they take up a rewrite of the Higher Education Act this fall. As a condition of his support, Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee Chairman Tom Harkin won a Government Accountability Office report on the costs of colleges. That document was expected to guide an overhaul of the deal just negotiated.





The Buffalo Bills (my mom's team since she is from Western New York State) will be interesting to


They got Kevin Kolb and drafted Florida State quarterback E.J. Manuel. Kolb will be looking to prove he can be a starter in the NFL.

for the semester for what he termed poor academic judgment. A highly touted defensive lineman also backed out of his letter of intent and is headed to UCLA.

Kelly said none of that will have any effect on this year's team.

"It was in the rearview mirror the next day. We don't even think about it, don't even talk about it. It's history," he said.

Kelly said he decided to name quarterback Tommy Rees as the starter before the start of practice because of his experience. He said, however, that doesn't mean the job is his for all season.

"I made him the starter for Temple. My expectation is that he would take the job and continue to lead our football team," Kelly said. "He's the most experienced. He's won. He knows our offense verv well. He's a senior, well respected. He's got all those things. It was really a quite easy decision."

Tougher decisions will have to be made at running back, linebacker and elsewhere, where the Irish lost veteran players.

"It's going to be fun. We have a lot of veterans coming back, but there's going to be a lot of things that we're going to have to evaluate," he said. "We're going to have a lot of players that will get that opportunity.

Notes: There were two items of note on the Notre Dame roster released Friday. First, basketball player Joey Brooks, who redshirted last season as a senior and was listed as a tight end during spring football practice, is no longer on the roster. Kelly said he didn't want Brooks taking opportunities away from younger players like

Lil' Learners Daycare is a hands-on learning experience

Kevin Rumrill has opened a daycare that she runs out of her house. Originally from Pampa, Rumrill recently returned after a stint in Colorado. She said she went through some life changes and it seemed like a good time to return to the area. Both of her children were born in Pampa and she has always enjoyed the town.

When Rumrill returned to Pampa after a career in education in Colorado, she still wanted to work with kids but wasn't interested in re-entering the school system. That is how she got the idea to open her own daycare, called Lil' Learners. Rumrill had previously worked as a paraeducator and was nominated for paraeducator of the year.

The curriculum for Lil' Learners focuses on hands-on learning and teaching children to recognize and read words at an early age. Rumrill will practice with the children daily, working with the letters of the alphabet and pictures in order to accelerate word recognition.

Other hands-on activities include working with edible finger paints and edible play dough in order to reduce the risk of harm. Rumrill focuses her disciplinary lessons on the book "7 Habits of Happy Kids," and has a paper tree on the wall in the back room with the seven habits, which she will go over daily with the children.

Other activities offered at Lil' Learners include music, nutrition lessons and Bible lessons. Rumrill also has a shaded playground set up in her backyard for outside play time. At the end of the day, Rumrill will review all the day's lessons with the children.

Rumrill has two employees working with her, Liana Goode and Shanell Jennings. Prior to employment, the women had to go through a background check as well as CPR and first aid training and certification. They are also required to take 30 hours per year of continued education classes in child care.

Although Rumrill does not currently have any form of financial aid for families, it is something she has begun to look into getting. She can have up to six full-time children ages 3-5 enrolled as well as six part-time children up to 11 years old, as she also has an after-school care curriculum. Drop-ins are also accepted on a first come, first served ba-

As for her future plans for the daycare, Rumrill says she would like to have full enrollment and wants to have a date night when she will have children over so that parents can have a night out. Once she reaches full enrollment she also wants to do a community project.
