Three percent pay raises for eligible county employees have made it over the first hurdle when those increases were approved last Thursday by the Gray County Court of Commissioners. The commissioners met all



After 7 decades, POW's prized gold ring comes home

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) - After a year and a half behind barbed wire as a prisoner in World War gone," he said of his late II, 2nd Lt. David C. Cox father. had just about reached his breaking point.

Deliveries of Red Cross parcels to Stalag VII-A had all but ceased, and the U.S. his fellow POWs were subsisting on scanty rations of bug-infested soup and bread. Outside the wire, Adolf Hitler's forces showed no signs of giving

Cold and hungry, the North Carolinian made a difficult decision. He slipped the gold aviator's ring — a gift from his parents — off his finger and passed it through a fence to an Italian POW, who handed back a couple of chocolate bars.

He would never again see the ring. But it did not disappear.

Last week, about a dozen family members and friends gathered in the living room of David C. Cox Jr.'s Raleigh home and watched as he slit open a small yellow parcel from Germany. The 67-year-old son dug through the crinkly packing material and carefully removed a little plastic box.

"And here it is," he said with a long sigh as he pulled out the ring. "Oh, my goodness. ... I never thought it would ever hap-

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

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

George W. Howard

George W. Howard was born in Wellington in 1948. He attended school in Wellington and enlisted in the Navy in January of 1966. After boot camp, he graduated from Basic Hospital Corps School in August 1966 and Field Medical Services School in June of 1967 while assigned to the Fleet Marine Force.

Later that month he was shipped to Vietnam for a 13-month tour. He was stationed with the 3rd Marine Amphibious Force's 2nd Combat Action Group south of Danang. As a medic for infantry Marines in combat, he also helped take care of Vietnamese civilians treating ill patients and even delivering babies.

He married Sue Ellen Derr in Oceanside, Calif. in November of 1968, earned his GED in August of 1969 and graduated from X-Ray Technician School in 1971. In 1976 George left the Navy and returned to the panhandle with his wife and two sons. The family later grew to four sons.

He re-enlisted in the Naval Reserve in 1983 and in 1986 he began long-term the Pantex Plant.

He was recalled to active duty in January of 1991 where he was stationed for three months at 29 Palms, Calif. and then at the Naval Hospital in Portsmouth, Va. George retired from the Reserve in 2000 as a Senior Chief Petty Officer after 26 years of service to his country. His medals include the Vietnam Service Medal with three Bronze Stars,

others. George resides in Clarendon where he enjoys farming and ranching when he is not entertaining his grandchildren.

Dempsey Malaney

Col. Dempsey Malaney was born in Perryton in 1941. He attended his 12 years of school in Perryton. He graduated from West Texas University in May of 1965 where he was active in ROTC, the Rifle Drill Team and served as Corps Commander his senior year. He then received his Master's Degree from the University of Northern Colorado in 1974.

Colonel Malaney served in the military from 1965 until his retirement in 1991. He served in the Armor, Military Intelligence and Aviation Branches of the US Army. His medals include the Bronze Star, the Vietnam Gallantry Cross with Palm and numerous other awards and citations.

In July of 1969 while serving in Military Intelligence of the U.S. Army, Captain Malaney received The Air Medal Citation for his participation in more than twenty-five aerial missions over hostile territory in the Republic of Vietnam.

In 1991 Colonel Malaney received The Legion of Merit citation for his contribution to the deployment of Joint Stars to Desert

Homer Thomas

Homer Thomas was born in 1921 in Bates County, Mo. He moved to the Texas Panhandle in his early years, attending school in the Gem City community east of Canadian.

Mr. Thomas enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1942 and was stationed at Fort Benning Georgia.

While serving in World War II, he was stationed in Northern France as a tank driver and mechanic. While driving his tank in October of 1944 during the Battle of The Bulge, the tank was hit and exploded. Cpl. Thomas was seriously burned and was taken to a hospital in England for medical treatment. After returning to active duty his feet were frozen in Northern France in the Black Forest during a very severe winter.

Cpl. Thomas was discharged in November of 1945. He received the American Campaign Medal, the EAME Campaign Medal with 4 Bronze Stars, the Good Conduct Medal, the WWII Victory Medal and two Purple

After discharge, Homer returned to farming and ranching in the Canadian Texas area and later owned and operated The Thomas Meat Processing Plant until his retirement in 1977. He was a member and later Chief of the Volunteer Fire Dept of Gem City. He was very involved at the First Christian Church of Canadian and was awarded the Conservationist of The Year Award in Hemphill County in 1997 for his

love of nature. Homer Thomas died on June 9, 1999.



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Pampa Animal Shelter seeing overabundance of animals

Many dumped illegally by owners.

The Pampa Animal Welfare Society (PAWS) is seeing higher than normal rates of animals at the Pampa Animal Shelter.

And what is even more disconcerting is many of these animals are not taken to the shelter during regular business hours, but dumped there when the shelter is closed.

PAWS is a volunteer organization that helps care for the animals at the city's shelter on Municipal Drive.

On their Facebook page on Thursday, PAWS posted, "We are just at a loss. Why are so many people dropping their animals off at the shelter, or worse dumping them when no one is there. Does anyone have any insight on this subject? The numbers keep increasing!"

Many people were disgusted at the fact that people were leaving animals during the night when the shelter is closed, saying it is heartbreaking and the city needs stricter laws.

One person said it also is happening at the Borger Animal Shelter.

PAWS president Faustina Curry said that while the Pampa Animal Shelter states this is normal for summer, Curry maintains she has never seen it this

"It is illegal," Curry said of dumping animals at the shelter. "The new animal shelter may have cameras and signs up and hopefully this will deter animals being left there."

Curry said that something else that will keep from this happening is getting people to commit.

"A dog is a commitment," Curry said.

The rate of animals coming to the shelter is so bad that some are being euthanized shortly after arriving at the shelter. Curry also said that the new shelter, set to open Nov. 1, will not be a no-kill shelter, and although bigger, will still not have enough space to house the animals at the rate they've been receiving them.

Another way to help control the pet population is getting the stray wild cats spayed and neutered.

PAWS has a program where if a citizen has a semi-wild cat (a cat that hangs by the residence but is not owned by a citizen) wants to feed the cat, they will help them neuter the cat so it won't breed and have kittens that don't have

On Labor Day, PAWS will be conducting an adoption at Chautauqua — Pampa, an event that celebrates the arts and academics.

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Pampa ISD student dress code 2013-14

The Pampa ISD Dress form of tobacco, alcohol, Code seeks to raise expecta- drugs, lewd, sexual innuentions among our students, promote academic excellence, promote grooming and hygiene, instill discipline, prevent disruption, promote safety and teach respect for one another. Campus standards for students in grades PK - 3 will be defined in each campus handbook.

General rules for grades

• All lower garments must be worn to ensure that the midsection is covered at all

• All lower garments must be worn at the waist, fitted properly hemmed or cuffed.

- All lower garments must be worn in a manner which eliminates the presence of sagging at all times.
- Male students must tuck their shirt tails into their pants in a manner in which their waistline can be determined.
- All upper garments must have sleeves, and must be worn in a manner which eliminates exposure of the male chest, or female cleavage, shoulders, back, armpits, midsection and undergarments.
- If belts are worn, they must be cinched, sized appropriately, worn through all belt loops, and contain no inappropriate writing or studded attachments.
- Shoes must be worn at all times. House shoes are not acceptable.
- Undergarments are required and shall not be visible at any time.
- All clothing must be sized appropriately, be in good condition, free from any holes, tears, or fraying, except at the hem or cuff. Patches may be worn on clothing, if the patch is of like color and fabric.
- · Shorts, skirts, skorts, and dresses must be knee length.

Unacceptable dress for grades 4-12:

- Caps, hats, gloves and head coverings are not permitted to be worn indoors.
- Sweatbands, bandannas, hairnets are not permitted to be worn, unless required by class.
- · Under Armor and Spandex-type of material may not be worn as outerwear.
- Trench coats and dusters are not permitted.
- Clothing may never be
- worn in a manner which reflects gang affiliation.
- Clothing containing any

dos, vulgar, racial slurs, or inappropriate writings, pictures

or embroidered emblems are

not permitted.

• Cheer leading outfits that do not conform to the dress code are not permitted to be worn at school except during pep rallies.

Outerwear for grades

 Coats, jackets, windbreakers, sweatshirts, hoodies, or other outerwear may not be worn in the classroom unless an exception is granted by the teacher.

Jewelry, tattoos and hair · all students

- All facial piercing (to include tongues) are prohibited for both genders.
- Students are allowed to wear piercings in their ears.
- All tattoos must be cov-

Deviations from the Dress Code for the purpose of promoting school spirit, holidays, or special events are left to the discretion of the campus principal.

With respect to dress code variances based upon medical or religious reasons, documentation from a medical provider or established religious authority will suffice for such variances to be

At the campus level, the campus administrator will have complete and final judgment on all matters concerning the interpretation of the student dress code. Matters concerning appearance and dress not specifically covered within the dress code policy shall be within the discretion of the superintendent.
